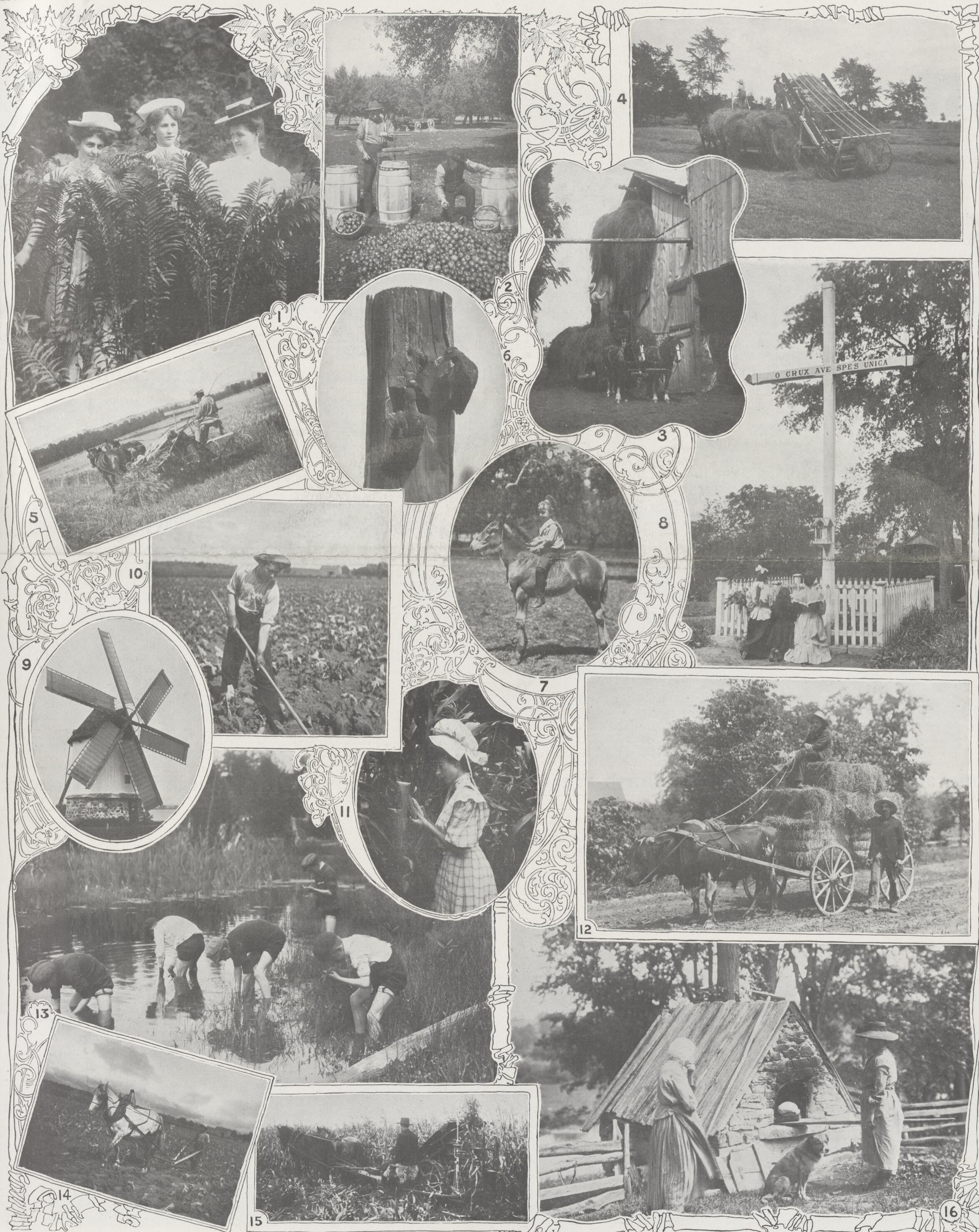

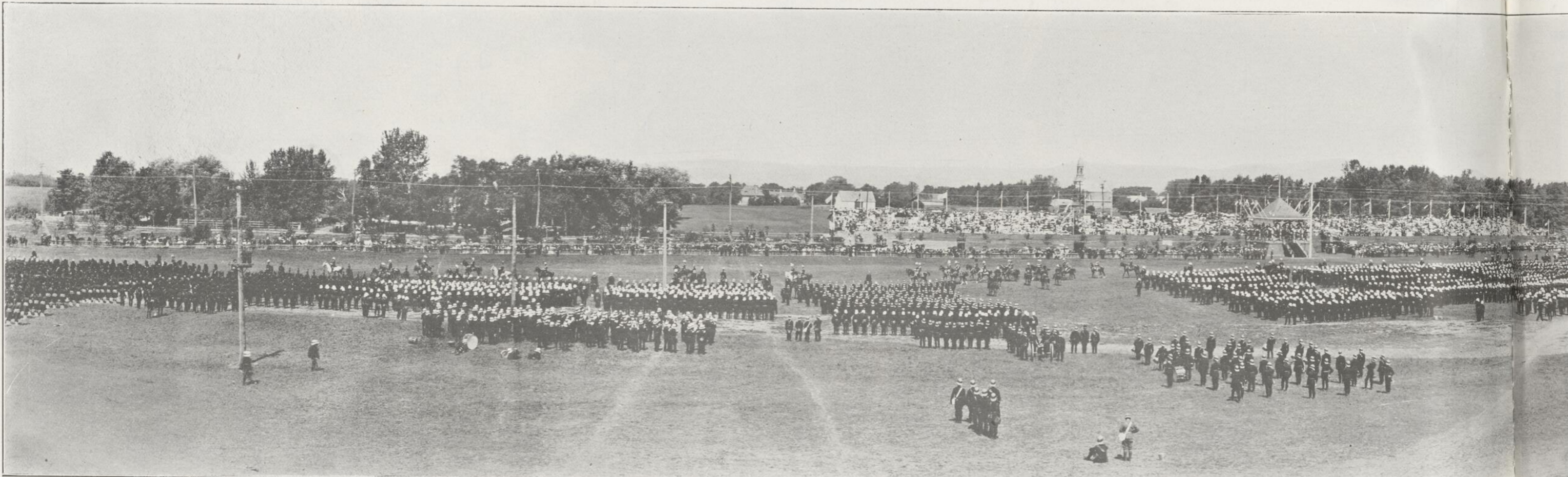

Panoramic View of the Most Powerful Naval Squadron That Has Ever Visited Canadian Waters: British, French



SCENES FROM THE TERCENTENARY FETES AT QUEBEC—One of the most impressive and majestic of the many inspiring spectacles witnessed at the recent Tercentenary Celebration was that which forms the subject of the above panoramic picture. In the background seen the city of Quebec below the Plains of Abraham and the citadel is the mightiest fleet of warships ever seen in Canadian waters. To the extreme left are six of the British men-of-war, and the United States battleship New Hampshire. In the centre are H.M.S. Indomitable (in rear), the French ship Leon Goussier, and the British ship Prince of Wales, and in the foreground the sound waves struck the adjacent heights of Quebec and Levis, and rolled down the river between the cliffs. On the whole, the display of naval strength seen at the Tercentenary was one of the most inspiring and imposing spectacles connected with the celebration.

Panoramic View of Canada's Greatest Review Which Took Place on Plains of Abraham: An Historic Picture



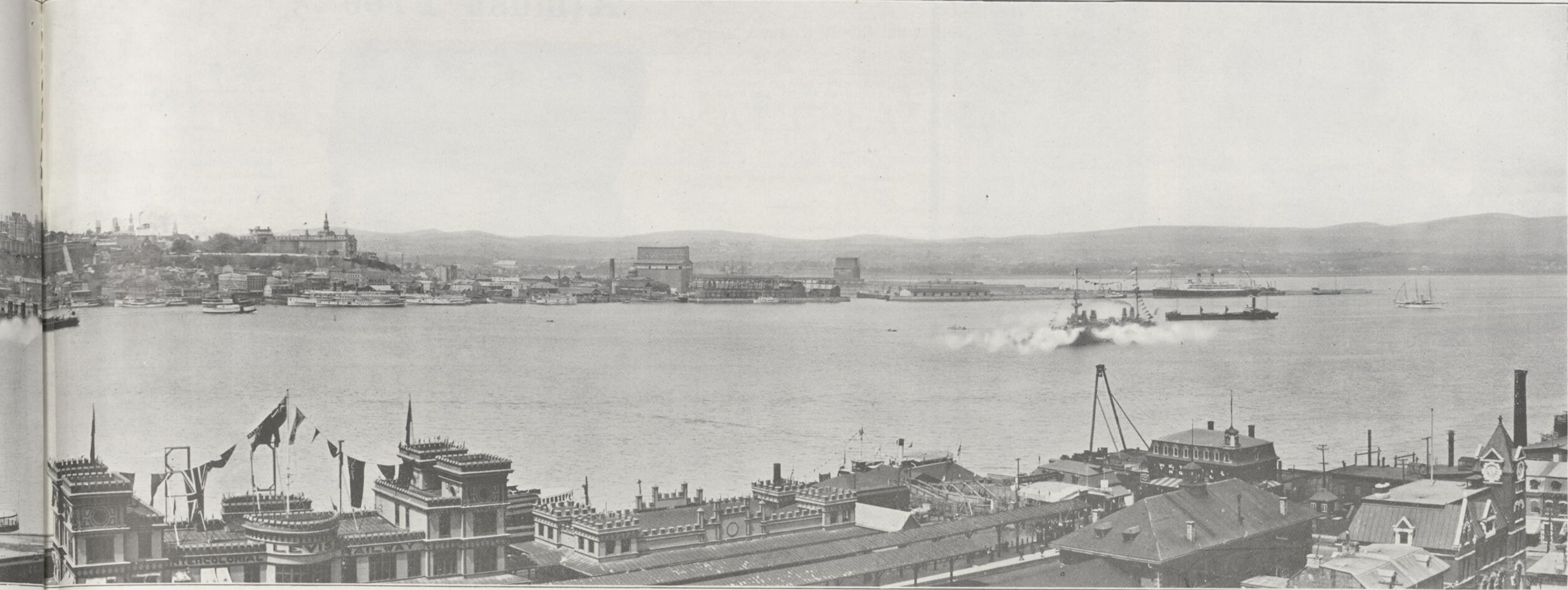
SCENES FROM THE TERCENTENARY FETES AT QUEBEC—The above picture portrays the royal review on the Plains of Abraham—one of the really great battlefields of the world. This review formed one of the most spectacular incidents of the recent Tercentenary Celebration, witnessed by His Majesty King George V, Governor-General of Canada, as well as the leading militia officers of Canada. Among those who witnessed the review were His Grace the Duke of Norfolk; Vice-President Fairbanks, of the United States; Mr. George Wolfe, of Westerham, England, a descendant of General Wolfe who died at the Marquis de Levis, a collateral descendant of the Marquis de Levis, who defeated General Murray at the Battle of Ste. Foye in 1760; and several of the distinguished foreigners who attended the Tercentenary fetes as guests of the city of Quebec. In the above picture H.R.H. the Duke of Wales is seen in the foreground, and beyond them (between the goal and the Ferris Wheel) the shaft which marks the spot on which Wolfe breathed his last. At the close of this review the Plains of Abraham were dedicated to the people of Canada by His Royal Highness.

Panoramic View of the Famous North West Arm at Halifax, Nova Scotia, Where Recent Historical Celebration



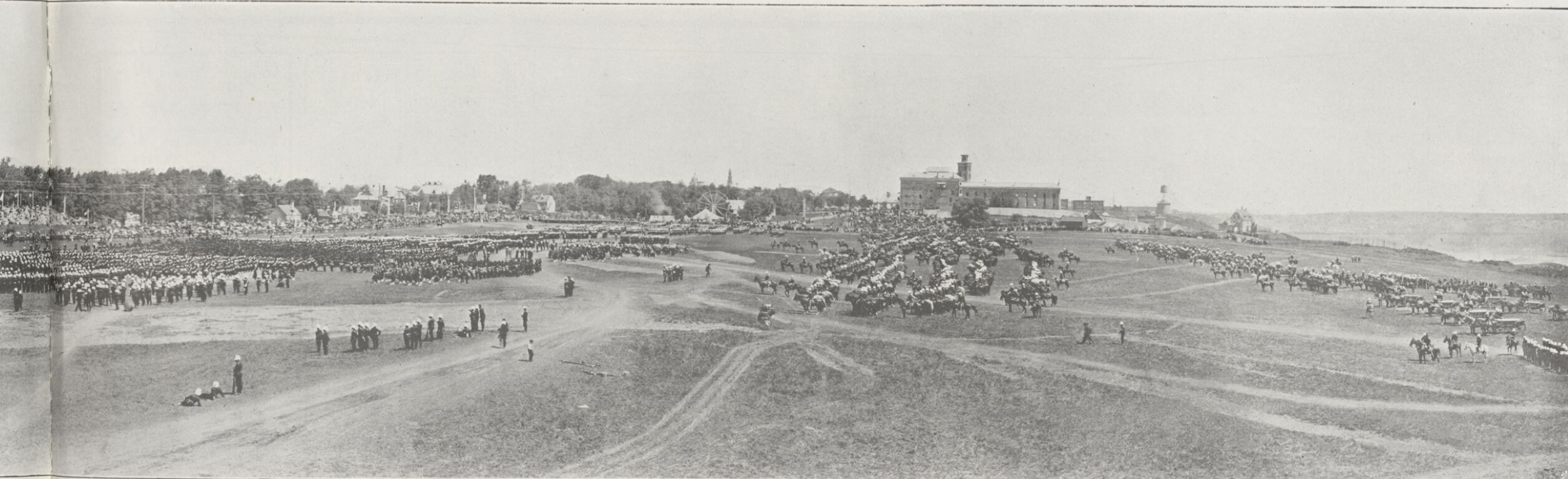
HISTORICAL TOWER IS NOW PROPOSED TO CELEBRATE THE MEETING AT HALIFAX OF THE FIRST ELECTIVE COLONIAL ASSEMBLY WHICH CONVENE ON OCTOBER 2, 1758, AND CONSISTED OF 19 MEMBERS—Nova Scotia thus took her place at the head of the line of self-governing colonies in length, situated in the immediate rear of the city, and, as indicated in the illustration, its greater portion is but little more than a mile and a half distant in an air line from the City Hall. Midway between Point Pleasant at the entrance, and the head of the Arm, an elevated position from which a historical tower might be placed. Such a memorial tower would be seen from a long distance on every side, even from far out on the Atlantic. It would be in the midst of associations made memorable as the homes or haunts of the Howes, Hills, Thompsons, Cunards, Haliburtons, and other prominent names among the early settlers. The road leads to Dutch Village. First wharf on right on the point is that of Governor's Island, a famous rendezvous in former times for military folk. The first boat-house and landing stage is that of the newly-formed "Waegwoitic Club," whose club-house can be seen to the right among the trees.

British, French and United States Men-o'-War Honoring the Prince of Wales With Royal Salute at Quebec



In background seen the citadel and city of Quebec; away on the left the natural "stage" on which the pageants were held; and on the right the Laurentian range of mountains and the ground on which the army of Wolfe encamped in 1759. Riding at anchor in the St. Lawrence immediately in foreground, the H.M.S. Arrogant (to the right). Somewhat removed from these is the second of the French battleships, and, in close proximity to this ship, are a transatlantic collier and the C.P.R. SS. Empress of Ireland, on which several of the British Royal Highnesses, including the Prince of Wales, and is extremely interesting on that account. In all, 231 rounds were fired during this salute by the various ships, and few who heard them will ever forget the thunder of the various detonations and the wonderful series of echoes and reverberations which followed as the salute was fired. Historic Picture From the Fact That the Prince of Wales and Earl Roberts Took Part in the Military Exercises



Celebration witnessed by upwards of 50,000 people. Nearly 23,000 troops took part, representing almost every unit in the Canadian Militia. In some cases, whole regiments were taken to Quebec from the central cities of Canada; in others, single companies only were allowed to go. By the side of the Prince of Wales were Earl Roberts, V.C., the hero of Kandahar and Pretoria; General Pole-Carew and Lord Lovat, each of whom won distinction in South Africa; His Excellency Earl Grey, who died on this same review ground while leading the British troops to victory on September 13, 1759; Comte de Montcalm, a descendant of the Marquis de Montcalm, who commanded the French army during the siege of Quebec and the battle of the Plains of Abraham in 1759; and Earl Roberts, V.C. Historic Celebration Took Place in Connection With the First Colonial Elective Legislature in the British Empire



Head of the self-governing countries within the present British Empire. Every visitor to the capital of Nova Scotia is familiar with the position and charms of the sheltered inlet of the Atlantic Ocean known as the North West Arm. "The Arm," as generally termed, is about three miles long and is elevated partly from the western shore contracts the waterway and forms "the narrows," where it is only 600 feet wide from shore to shore. At this point the Arm is divided into two lake-like expanses of great beauty, and on the elevated promontory mentioned it has been suggested that the name of the late Governor, Lord Dalhousie, should be given to the waterway. The view shown is from the western shore, and thus be in a neighborhood of old memories and on ground already historic. A description of the picture in detail shows: On the left of photo view of Melville Island, showing Military Prison; also cove at head of North West Arm. Distinction for a Colonial.

Miss Burchell, of Sydney, Nova Scotia, is the first Colonial girl to win the distinction of having passed the Final Examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Music, Oxford University. In 1903 she passed at Oxford the "Preliminary (Arts) Examination for Students of Music," and the First Examination for the Degree of Mus. Bac. For the Second Mus. Bac. Examination candidates are not obliged to go to Oxford. They

are required to submit for examination a musical exercise of their own composition. This must be a vocal work with accompaniment for a string band. The following movements are expected: a five-part chorus, a song or

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The Standard's Series of British War Medals.

EAST AND CENTRAL AFRICAN (Uganda) MEDAL—1897-1899.

In February, 1899, a Medal was granted to the forces employed in the military operations in the Uganda Protectorate from 1897 to 1899.

Obverse: A half-length effigy of the late Queen Victoria, crowned and veiled, and holding a sceptre. Legend, "Victoria Regina et Imperatrix."

Reverse: A figure of Britannia holding a trident in her right hand, and a palm-branch in her left hand, and a scroll, which are extended towards the rising sun, just appearing above the horizon. The British lion is standing behind. In the exergue, in capital letters, "East and Central Africa."

Ribbon: Half red and half yellow. Four bars were issued with this medal, as follows:—

"Lubwa"—To those who took part in the operations against the Soudanese mutineers from September 23rd, 1897, to February 24th, 1898.

"Uganda, 1897-99"—To those actively engaged in Uganda from July 20th, 1897, to March 19th, 1898, other than those against the Soudanese mutineers.

"1898"—To the forces operating against the Ogaden Somalis from April to August, 1898.

"Uganda, 1899"—To the Imperial and Colonial forces employed against Kabarega in the Uganda Protectorate, between March 21st, and May 2nd, 1899. M. A. J.

EAST AND CENTRAL AFRICA—1891-1898.

A medal was granted to all troops taking part in punitive expeditions in East and Central Africa from 1891-1898.

Obverse: The head of Queen Victoria, with diadem and veil, surrounded by the legend, "Victoria Regina." The reverse is in high relief, and represents a skirmish in the bush between British Infantry and a number of semi-nude natives. This is one of the finest designs amongst British War Medals, and is the work of E. J. Poynter, A.R.A. The obverse is by Leonard Wyon, the celebrated War Medal Designer.

The ribbon is composed of three equal stripes of black, white and brown, officially termed "copper." The three colors denote the Zanzibaris, English, and Sikhs respectively, being the various troops engaged.

A bar, "Central Africa, 1894-98," was issued with this medal. The name and regiment of the recipient are engraved on the edge. M. A. J.
