JURY DISAGREED

In Granby Manslaughter Case.

Sweetsburg, Que., Oct. 18.—The Charbonneau manslaughter case came to a rather unlooked-for close yesterday afternoon, in the Court of King's Bench here. The case for the Crown closed at noon, a number of witnesses subpoenaed not being examined. The defence began its proof after adjournment and concluded at half past three. Several witnesses had been examined in the morning to prove that Desouteaux had been in good health on the day he died and had not complained of any accident. Dr. Auguste Mathieu, coroner of Granby, was recalled to prove that the symptoms noticed by Drs. Cowley and Fournier were quite reconcilable with the Crown's theory that the fracture which caused the blood clot was received at the time of the row. The last witness for the defence was the accused himself. He explained that he thought deceased was raising his hand to strike him and he struck him in the face with his fist. He deceased fell on his hands and knees and accused thought he was looking for stones, and when he rose and came towards witness again the latter hit him again on the jaw. He swore positively that he did not kick Desouteaux.

Mr. C. A. Nutting, K. C., addressed the jury on behalf of the Crown. The Judge charged the jury against the accused. The Jury retired until 7 in the evening, and at that hour they reported that they could not agree upon a verdict. They were locked up for the night. A disagreement is generally looked for.

Sweetsburg, Oct. 19.—The jury in the Charbonneau manslaughter case again reported yesterday morning that an agreement could not be reached, and were discharged. The accused was admitted to bail in \$1,200, to appear before the next term of the Court of King's Bench.

Montreal Butter Market.

A feature in the butter market has been the large exports during the past four weeks, amounting to 91,413 packages, valued at about \$1,000,000. This brings up the total exports for the season, from Montreal, to 323,108 packages, against 227,463 packages for the corresponding period last year, showing an increase of 106,558 packages. The market during the past two weeks has lost its activity, and prices are declining to 1 1/2c per lb. This has been partly owing to the poor quality of a considerable quantity of the fall make, which has shown up mottled in color and broken in texture due to its being overworked. Fancy creamery is in fair demand with transactions at 20c to 21c, but the pressing on the market of so much that is below choice has a depressing effect. Good qualities change hand today at 20c, and what might be classed as very good 20c. A round lot of Eastern Townships creamery was placed at 20c, but the buyer admitted that it was not finest. Western creamery is quoted at 19c to 20c. Western dairy butter is slow sale, for straight lots, and prices range from 14c to 16c to quality.—"Trade Bulletin."

Game is reported to be very plentiful in the vicinity of Orford Mountain.

Coaticook taxes telephone poles at the rate of 50 cents per pole per annum. The companies protest vigorously but they end up by paying.

The School Commissioners of Coaticook have sold \$12,000 of four per cent debentures to Mr. D. W. Davis, of Derby Line, Vt., at par. The proceeds were used to erect a new academy building.

The Richmond by-law authorizing the taking the taking of \$10,000 in the St. Francis Bridge was defeated in various ways. On the date advertised for voting, only half a dozen persons put in an appearance and no poll was demanded. In consequence the by-law was not sustained.

The Coaticook Council is having a scrimmage with the Penman Manufacturing Company over the terms of a bonus by-law. The by-law calls for the employment of 20 men for two months of the year and a monthly pay roll of \$8,500. The Company has defied it but it is nevertheless pleading piteously for its bonus instalment. The factory meanwhile is shut down.

The St. John's (Quebec) News says:—"Mr. Frank Marchand, of St. John, has been appointed manager of the Great West Life Insurance for the Eastern Townships, and left for Sherbrooke, his headquarters, on Wednesday evening. Mr. Marchand has energy and ability and a pleasing address in his favor, and no doubt he will prove his worth in his larger field of operations."

SOLD EVERYWHERE.

Several British Successes.

WEARING THE ENEMY OUT.

Boers Getting No Rest In Orange River Colony.

Pretoria, Oct. 19.—Several British successes are reported in the Orange River Colony of the day. General De Lisle, who is north of Harrismith, took fifteen prisoners and a large number of cattle. Twenty prisoners and two hundred refugees have been brought to Kleksdorp. They were gathered during a march from Kroonstad.

General Rawlinson and Rawlinson are working in conjunction near Villiersdorp. General Rawlinson attacked the Westhuizen commando, and the Boers, in retreating, ran into General Remington's command. Three of the burghers were killed and thirteen captured, a number of wagons and carts and much live stock were also captured. General Rawlinson captured a few wagons and a considerable number of cattle.

A number of British columns are operating in all the districts of Orange River Colony. They are giving the Boers no rest, and are gathering in stock and grain and a few prisoners. Recceing parties are continually sent in all directions. They occasionally found a few Boers, who galloped off when discovered. They then hide and snipe the British when they are returning from their hard marches. The columns are passing through a difficult country in the south-eastern part of the colony. They have found that the Boers have deserted their farms, taking everything possible with them, and are hiding in the mountains.

Five extra trucks weekly have been allowed to bring frozen meat to Bloemfontein.

COUSIN OF SCHEEPER'S CAUGHT.

Kroonstad, Oct. 18.—The column under commander Major Holmes, operating to the west of the railway line and north of the Sand River, killed one and captured several Boers, as well as a hundred heads of cattle. Three days after the column captured the whole of commandant Marais' laager, consisting of 17 wagons, 10 carts and 800 cattle. At the same time two Boers were killed, two wounded and twenty made prisoners.

Some South African Constabulary who left Pretoriusburg overtook at dawn, when fifteen miles out, thirty of Nieuwoudt's commando. They chased the Boers for five miles and captured thirteen, including Adjutant Scheepers, cousin of commandant Scheepers, and Field Cornet Vanderwall. Scheepers will be tried on a charge of shooting Kaffirs in cold blood. The constabulary lost one man killed by a Boer, who surrendered and who treacherously killed the constable with concealed arms. Every prisoner carried on his saddle two legs of mutton, owing to the country being short of food-stuff and stock.

Klerksdorp, Oct. 18.—Col. Bing's column arrived at Witkopps Drift from the Orange River Colony, bringing in 20 prisoners and 325 refugees. A party of Boers was discovered on some islands in the Sand River, near Paays. A detachment of Yeomanry was sent across the river to prevent their retreat. Wearing nothing but their bandoliers, the Yeomanry stormed the island and eventually captured 20 of the enemy. The prisoners are fine stalwart men and look like ideal guerrillas.

Commandant Dreyer and Field Cornet Van Vuren, with ten followers, part of a commando 300 strong, have been brought to Masereu, having been caught in a fight with Yeomanry and mounted infantry near Jamesburg Drift, on Basuto border. The prisoners were mostly boys, says a Reuter's special telegram, and the majority of the Boers were dressed khaki, every man being doubly or trebly armed.

BOTHA'S NEPHEW CAPTURED

London, Oct. 18.—A correspondent of the "Times" at Dundee reports fighting south of Vryheid, in which a son of Mr. Reitz, ex-State Secretary, and Emmet, (Louis Botha's nephew), were captured.

Why The Duchess is Popular.

The Duchess of Cornwall and York is evidently a stalwart of the British stalwarts. As a guard at Winnipeg started to remove a little miss who had clambered to the top of a gate through which the royal party must pass and who strenuously resisted, the Duchess, taking in the situation at a glance, said, "Tell him to leave that little patriot where she is, she understands the British principle of 'What we have we'll hold.'" The touching little sequel is that as the gate swung open with the little vixen, the Duchess plucked a rose from a bouquet she carried and handed it to the child, who laughed in a great glee. In the light of this incident with its accompanying sentiment it is easy to understand the popularity of the Duchess with the British people.

CANADIANS SURPRISE A BOER LAAGER.

Put Boers To Flight.

TWO CANADIANS KILLED AND OTHERS WOUNDED.

Pretoria, Oct. 21.—A force of Canadian scouts surprised a Boer laager near Balmoral. The Boers fled after a short fight.

The Canadians had two men killed and an officer and two men wounded.

CONFLAGRATION AT SYDNEY, C. B.

Business Blocks In Ashes, and Many Dwellings Destroyed.

On Saturday afternoon fire broke out in the business portion of the town of Sydney, C. B., and before it could be got under control some twenty-five residences were destroyed, in addition to many places of business over which many people lived, consequently many people found themselves without homes in the evening. At a rough estimate the loss is placed at \$800,000, of which \$200,000 is covered by insurance.

The Duke of Cornwall and York issued a farewell address to the citizens of Canada on Saturday night. He expresses warm thanks for the hearty and affectionate welcomes accorded to the Royal party everywhere.

DISTRICT MAGISTRATE AT SWEETSBURG.

Some Smart Sentences Passed.

Judge Mulvena held a term of Court at Sweetsburg on Friday last and dealt with several cases that had been held over from a former term.

In the case of F. de la Durantaye, of Granby, who was convicted at a previous term of having broken into the Granby Rubber Factory at Granby and stealing therefrom 220 lbs. of rubber, was sentenced to five years in the Penitentiary. This is his fourth conviction for similar offences.

The Court sentenced H. Ouimet, of East Stanbridge, to three years in the Penitentiary on a charge of having broken into a soiled box car at Stanbridge in June, 1895, and with having stolen therefrom a quantity of bonded goods. Ouimet was also found guilty of having broken out of jail in September, 1895. Sentence on this charge was suspended during his incarceration on the previous charge.

Ernest Favreau, who was convicted of intimidation and attempted bribery to G. P. R. employees during the recent strike at Farnham, was allowed to go on suspended sentence upon giving bonds for his good behavior for the next year.

A Lalnier and J. Lereau, both hotel keepers in Farnham, were each charged at the instance of L. A. Perkins, Provincial Inland Revenue Collector, and fined \$30 and costs, or three months in jail, for selling liquors on Sunday.

Ernest Gilbert, a boy of fifteen years of age, from St. Armands, was committed by a local Justice of the Peace, charged with stealing an axle of a wagon. Upon a motion to quash the indictment, presented by Mr. McCorkill on behalf of the accused, he was discharged. The Court remarked, in discharging him, that there was not a tithe of evidence against the accused.

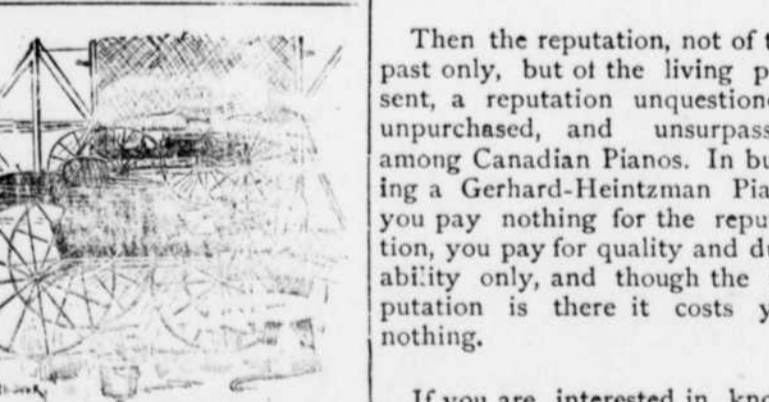

Riches of Dawson.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 19.—Mr. J. Francis Lee, traffic manager of the White Pass & Yukon route, who has just returned on the 'Dolphin,' has spent nearly six months in Dawson. Regarding his impressions he said: 'I was favorably struck with the wonderful improvements that have been made this year in the methods of hydraulic mining. I want to emphasize the permanency of these camps. The best possible evidence of this permanency is the decision of the interested parties to construct new lines of railway reaching out of Dawson. These new roads will open up that tremendously rich country lying between Indian River and Quartz Creek, which is incomparably more valuable than any district in South America. Further, it is the richest mining district in the entire world.'

A Blow For Canadian Flour.

It looks as if Australia intended to hit a blow that will land upon the Canadian export flour trade. Late advices from that country announce the possibility of the Government there imposing a duty of about \$1.30 a barrel on flour, and if it comes to a head it will likely shut Canadian flour out entirely. It is only in the last few years that our enterprising Canadian millers have opened up a market for their hard wheat flour in Australia, and so popular has the flour become there that exports have steadily increased with time, and the American millers, who were competing with similar brands of flour in the same market, were getting a little the worst of it.

A Heavy Death Rate.

London, Oct. 19.—Returns from the refugee camps in South Africa for September show a total white population of 100,418; deaths among the whites, 2,411, of which 1,904 were children. The colored population is shown to be 38,549, among whom there were 391 deaths during the month.

We are informed that the figures given in last week's report of Conductor Stevens's settlement with the Boston & Maine Railroad were incorrect. We cannot ascertain the exact amount paid Mr. Stevens, but a conversation with him leads us to believe that it was considerably more than \$5,000, the amount stated last week. Besides Mr. Stevens's claim, Mrs. Stevens filed a claim for caring for her husband. The company recognized the justice of both claims and the matter was settled in a manner satisfactory to both parties.—Stanstead Journal

Society Ladies' Influence In Promotions Must Cease.

London, Oct. 19.—Right Honorable Robert William Hannbury, President of the Board of Agriculture in the present cabinet, made a sensational speech on military matters yesterday. He said no government could be trusted which would not put reform of the War Office to the forefront of its programme. He added: "We have got to end the system where the smart ladies of society have a voice in promotions."

Wireless Telegraphy in Belle Straits.

Ottawa, Oct. 19.—The Deputy Minister of Public Works has received a despatch from Mr. D. H. Keeley, superintendent of government telegraphs, that the Marconi system of wireless telegraphy was installed on Oct. 10 across the Straits of Belle Isle. He found that the instruments would not transmit messages over a greater distance than seven thousand feet. One of the difficulties of the situation down there is in getting men to perform repairs when a break occurs in the system.

Five Men Were Killed.

New York, October 18.—Five men were killed and two injured this morning when an enormous mass of rock caved in from the side and roof of the Rapid Transit Tunnel, in course of construction on Broadway, about the line of 16th street, in this city.

Lady Aberdeen on South African War.

Toronto, Oct. 18.—An "Evening Telegram" special London cable says: "The Countess of Aberdeen, wife of the former Governor-General of Canada, speaking at a gathering in Dundee, Scotland, said that Great Britain had squandered her sons and her money in Africa, while she allowed the Americans to buy up commercial interests here and in Canada."

The financial embarrassment of St. James Church, Montreal, was again brought up, and it was decided to request the next general conference to make an appeal to the Methodist body at large on behalf of the church.

The Doctors Compensation.

According to a Washington dispatch, Congress will be asked to appropriate \$100,000 for payment of the doctors who attended President McKinley during a period of one week and about ten hours. No statement of the account has been presented by the physicians, the report continues. The sum of \$57,000 was voted by Congress to the doctors who attended President Garfield after he was shot and was openly declared in many quarters to be excessive, although he was under their care for two months and seventeen days. Perhaps it is true that since that time of 20 years ago great strides have been made in medical and surgical learning but the fact remains that the men who attended Mr. McKinley not only failed to save his life, but would have known that such failure was inevitable if they had discovered the extent of his injury, and conditions which resulted from it before his death permitted their enlightenment through the post-mortem examination. The people will expect the doctors in this case to place the value of their services rather high but they have no moral right to make an excessive demand upon the public treasury.—Buffalo Courier.

SENSATIONAL SPEECH ON MILITARY MATTERS.

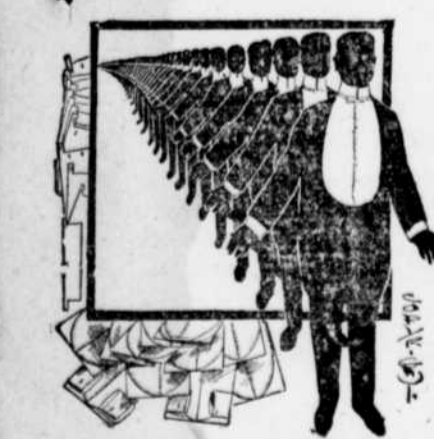

THE AFGHAN SITUATION. Britain and Russia Come To an Agreement.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 19.—The British and Russian governments have come to an agreement regarding Afghanistan. It is asserted in high diplomatic circles here that even should complications arise in Afghanistan in consequence of the death of Abur Rahman, and the accession of Habibulla, these would not lead to a concurrent intervention.

London, Oct. 19.—A rumor that Ayub Kahn had escaped from Meas Kohor, says the Simla correspondent of the "Times," is not believed. It is unlikely that he would attempt to escape, for if he entered Afghanistan his death would be certain, as the Shere Ali faction is extinct. The great tribes are not interested in Ayub Kahn, now that he is old and has lost his prestige.

It is reported from Quetta that the news of Ameer Abdur Rahman's death and of his eldest son's succession has been received quietly in Kandahar.

A rumor of restlessness among the Ghilzais which has gained currency is not supported by evidence.

Ayub Kahn is one of the younger sons of the late Ameer Shere Ali. It was he who, after his brother, Yakub Kahn, had been deposed and sent into captivity by the British, led some of the Afghan tribes towards Kandahar, and whose formidable army, a commander made Lord Roberts's famous march to that city necessary.

After the British retired from Kandahar in April, 1881, Abdur Rahman was left alone to cope with Ayub, and it seemed for a time as though he would be defeated.

Ayub's stronghold, surrendered to Abdur Rahman, and Ayub fled. Later he was captured and has been kept in captivity at Mussoorie, British India.

The Ghilzais, mentioned in the foregoing despatch, were among the chief supporters of Ayub Kahn.
