CANADIAN AGENCY IN PARIS.

THE HIGH COMMISSIONER AND HIS WORK
—UNPROFITABLE EMIGRATION CANVAS-
SING—MR. SENECA'S OFFICE.

A gentleman who has just returned to the city from an extended tour through Europe, speaking of the recall of Mr. Fabre, the High Commissioner for Canada at Paris, remarked that the Dominion would not lose much if the Canadian Agency in Paris was shut up altogether. The position occupied by Mr. Fabre, he said, was a sinecure, he doing very little for his \$3,000 a year besides piloting about Mr. Senecal, Sir Charles Tupper or any other Canadian with a great deal of political influence who chanced to reach France. Mr. Fabre's office was littered up with a great deal of emigration literature, but at the time of his visit the total number of emigrants sent out to Canada was one. Canadians visiting Paris, he said, were given the cold shoulder, by the officials, and the duties undertaken at the London office were ignored altogether.

THE HEAD QUARTERS OF SENECA.

A humiliating fact for Canadians in connection with the agency was, that in Paris it was regarded merely as the European office of Mr. Senecal. The flat occupied by the agency was leased and furnished throughout by Mr. Senecal, and the principal apartments were occupied as private offices by Messrs Senecal and Dansereau.

Speaking of Mr. Senecal's steamship scheme, the gentleman stated that the project has fallen through altogether. During the time of Mr. Senecal's last visit to Europe the Canadian agency was filled with gentlemen interested in the affair, expecting Mr. Senecal to return to Canada, however, without getting further than London and some of the capitalists, thinking they had been slighted, refused to have anything further to do in the matter, and the scheme fell through.—Star.

THE DEATH ROLL.

CHARLES READE.

LONDON, April 13.—Charles Reade had been suffering intensely for several months with emphysema and enlargement of the liver. From the first diagnosis by Sir Joseph Fayre, physician to the Duke of Edinburgh, and Drs. Wilks and Chapman, there was only a faint hope of his recovery. From a state of acute suffering he passed on Sunday last to a comatose condition from which he never recovered. During the early part of his illness he was in the full enjoyment of his faculties and he had recently undertaken to contribute a series of tales to *Harper's Magazine*, followed by studies of Biblical personages. These last were unique in conception, as is shown by the preliminary sketch of some of them which he had prepared. The last words from his pen will first appear in America. The papers generally do justice to Mr. Reade's genius, his intense sympathy with distress, his hatred of abuses, and generous, even chivalrous character, which occasional splenetic outbursts against personal enemies obscured but for a moment. There lived no man of warmer affections and deeper sincerity of nature; only his friends knew his most winning qualities.

HENRY JAMES BYRON.

LONDON, April 13.—Henry James Byron died yesterday. Deceased was the son of Henry Byron, British Consul at Port au Prince, Hayti, and was a native of Manchester. He is well known to the playgoing public as one of the most skilful and prolific writers of burlesque extravaganzas. His first production was "Fra Diavolo"; it came out in 1858 and was very successful. Numerous other successes followed, his last piece being the well known comedy of "Our Boys," which was played for the 1150th time at the Vaudeville in London on August 9, 1878. Mr. Byron contributed largely to periodicals, was the first editor of *Fun*, and is the author of the novel "Paid in Full."

MOLYNEUX'S NILE RESEARCHES

PROPOSED ENGLISH EXPEDITION ACROSS THE KOROSKO DESERT.

NEW YORK, April 13.—A London cable despatch says the indications that the Government intends to undertake an autumn campaign toward Khartoum are multiplying. Preparations for such an event are being actively made. The survey of the Nile as far as the second cataract, which Capt. Molyneux undertook some weeks ago at the command of the Admiralty, to determine the feasibility of the use of gunboats, has been completed, and Capt. Molyneux returned to Cairo last Monday. He has now been ordered to report on the upper reaches of the river as far as Shendi. He is also to report on a scheme for getting the English regiments

ACROSS THE KOROSKO DESERT.

Sir Evelyn Baring, the English Minister at Cairo, telegraphs the Government that a plan has been submitted by Sir Samuel Baker, at one time Governor of the Sudan, for an English expedition across the Korosko Desert. This plan contemplates the placing of water tanks at intervals along the route to be traversed, which are to be filled with water borne by camel trains. Each tank would be made large enough to hold water sufficient to supply a regiment during a day's march. By crossing this way 10,000 men could reach Khartoum. Sir Samuel Baker urges the undertaking of a summer expedition.

THE FRENCH ARMY.

PROPOSING TO DOUBLE THE FORCES.

The *Sun's* cable says: The bourgeois of France have been thrown into a state of fierce alarm by the acceptance by the Chamber of Deputies of the principle of the new army bill. Under the present system young lawyers, doctors and other persons are able to avoid the five years' term by volunteering for one year, but the new law proposes that nothing short of physical incapacity shall exempt anybody from three years' service. The bill would raise the peace footing of the army from 480,000 to 760,000 men, and the annual cost from 24,000,000 pounds to 30,000,000 pounds. Peace with such an army would be as expensive as war. At present the conscription draws so large a number from industry and agriculture that labor has to be extensively imported from Germany, Italy and Belgium. Probably the bill will be withdrawn.

ALBANI'S ADVENTURE.

Mr. Gyo and Madame Albani narrowly escaped arrest at Antwerp, where the police mistook them for two professional forgers, to whom they were said to bear a strong likeness. They managed to avoid the unpleasant experience only by bolting into the theatre, where they were identified by their friends, with profuse apologies from the authorities.

NEW RULES IN THE ENGLISH NAVY.

Smoking is only permitted during certain hours and in certain places. Only flag officers and captains are allowed to smoke in their cabins. Officers in uniform are forbidden to smoke in the street, and the use of the fragrant weed is altogether denied to officers or boys under eighteen, whether ashore or afloat.

A QUESTION OF VERACITY.

We must confess to not being only a little amused at the fight now going on between Sir Hector Langevin and Mr. Senechal. The latter gentleman has the audacity to impugn the strict veracity of the Minister of Public Works. We should not be at all surprised if the gallant knight took upon himself to go to the almost inconceivable length in retaliation of casting doubts upon the well known exactitude and scruple, which have always marked the great manipulators' business dealings. If this little difference concerned only themselves, we need not say that we should not intervene in any way. They might fight it out themselves to their heart's content, and the more complete became the Kilkenny cut character of the struggle, and the less was left of the respectability of either opponent when it was all over the better pleased the public or a large portion of it should most certainly feel. The subject of dispute, unfortunately for us, is one of vital moment to the Province and City of Quebec. Mr. Senechal's views, on many points, have undergone very considerable changes since when Mr. Chapleau made the celebrated speech in which the declaration was thundered forth—"The Grand Trunk, that is our enemy." Since then the North Shore, we all know, has been sold to the Grand Trunk, by the very men who declaimed so eloquently against the sacrifice such a sale would be of French Canadian interests. It has been said and moreover believed that Mr. Wainwright, when it came to making a bargain, turned out to be considerably the shrewdest railway man of the two. Mr. Senechal has consequently since had to keep in with the Grand Trunk as his only hope of realizing on his bonds. This has led we presume, to the whole difficulty. The Grand Trunk it is thought do not particularly care for the road, except as a means of forcing at some future day, some advantageous exchange or bargain with the Canada Pacific, who do require the road. Mr. Senechal wants the dealing to take the shape of cash of which he is supposed to stand in need for the moment. He however it would seem, miscalculated his influence on the Dominion Government, and when the time came to make the effort, found he was unable to bring the pressure upon the Canadian Pacific Company he was calculating upon exercising. That is so far as rumour can guide us, about how the matter stands to-day. We now reproaches Sir Hector bitterly with not having forced the Pacific Company when he could have done so. We should very much like to know who was originally to blame, if neither the Sir Hugh Allan Syndicate, nor the Pacific Company, bought the road from the Province when it was first for sale, and who it was, afterwards to suit his own greed, placed it in the hands it is in now?

The Pacific Railway pushed by the Government will pay the sum exacted and our political cormorants will have a million or two more wherewith to finish corrupting whatever of purity is left in our political world. Would it not be immeasurably wiser to proceed otherwise? Let the Government, by means of a subsidy, ensure the Northern line going to Quebec and joining the Intercolonial so as to have the commerce of the Pacific brought to Quebec and even to the Maritime ports whether by building a new line taking care always that the subsidy benefits the country and not a dishonest clique—*L'Etendard*.

HOW THE MONEY GOES.

THE COST OF SPENCER WOOD AND ITS OCCUPANT.

(From the Witness Correspondent.)

Among the departmental blue books annually submitted to the Legislature the one known as the Public Accounts of the Province must be always awarded the palm for light, curious and instructive reading. The accounts just brought down offer no exception to the almost general rule in this respect. Indeed, if anything, they give long odds to their predecessors and still won the day in new and startling developments of favoritism and unscrupulous extravagance. But this is readily explained by the fact that they cover the black letter period in our Provincial history, which compressed the close of Mr. Chapleau's sway and the greater part of the Mousseau regime.

It is among contingencies that the deliver after information in the richest harvest of curious and startling developments to reward his painstaking labors. The maintenance of

Robitaille and his State cost the country—apart from his own salary, which is paid by the Dominion—the astounding total of \$29,129.90 for salaries, office expenses, support and repairing of Spencer wood, &c., during the twelve months covered by the return. His office expenses, exclusive of salaries amounted to the neat little sum of \$2,498.66, including over \$680 for stationery alone, \$340.50 for carriage hire, \$198.20 for travelling expenses, and over \$480 for newspapers and other reading matter to beguile the tedium of his official duties.

QUEEN'S BENCH.

Justices Tessier and Monk presided. The case of Louis Sougraine for the murder of his wife was called yesterday, and Mr. Dunbar in the English and Mr. Pelletier in French addressed the jury.

The first witness, the District Coroner, stated that on the 9th of June, 1883, he held an inquest on the body of a woman found in a fishery in Beaumont. It was very much decomposed.

Revd. Edouard Lamontagne, curate of Notre Dame des Anges, knew Sougraine and his wife Clarisse Bisson, who lived in his parish from October, 1881, to November 1882. Also knew Elmiere Audet, who resided in his parish; identified the body at the Belmont Cemetery as that of Sougraine's wife.

Hermine Auger, of St. Jean Deschailons, servant—About 1st November, 1882, at 6 p.m., heard cries from the river, apparently a woman's,—"Leave me alone; my feet are frozen; I am going to die." At the same time heard a man saying, "I will kill you." And shortly afterwards saw a canoe leave the shore.

Louis Edouard Sougraine, aged 12, son of the prisoner, remembered his mother; she lived with them. Left for St. Anne's in the fall of 1882 in company with his father, mother and youngest brother, now dead. Remembered being a long time in a canoe which his father paddled. When we reached the shore mother and father fought. They had been drinking. We slept that night at the same place where they fought. When we left the shore I saw my mother but she did not come with us. On the way across my father said "don't say anything about what has happened."

The grand juror found a true bill yesterday against John Gumbleton, accused of manslaughter in the case of Mary Dillon, boarding house keeper in Champlain street.

CORONER'S INQUEST.

The body found Sunday last at the foot of the city drain, at the Palais, has been identified as that of Hypolite Bilodeau, of Montmorency Falls, aged about 60 years, who had disappeared since November last. Dr. Vallée, professor of Medical Jurisprudence, made the postmortem, but could not ascertain the cause of death on account of the state of decomposition of the body. A verdict of "Found dead" was rendered.

LAVAL UNIVERSITY.

The professors of the law and medical faculties were officially informed last evening that their faculties would close at the end of the academical year. Professors Langelier and Vallée leave this evening as a deputation to the apostolical delegate now at Montreal.

CONCERT TO-NIGHT.

The concert in aid of Trinity Church takes place in the Victoria Hall this evening. In addition to the other attractions the Rev. Mr. Ker, the Rector, will read Carleton's "Battles of the Factions."

Yesterday was nomination day at the City Hall for Aldermen and Councillors for the ensuing two years.

In the other three wards some of the seats are contested, and voting will take place next week.

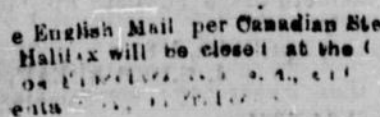
