THE Commissioners for internal communications for the county of Dorchester, and for that part of the county of Buckinghamshire lying in the district of Quebec, will receive proposals for the following objects, viz.:

1st. To repair Craig road from the line of the district of Three-Rivers to the settlements of St. Giles; that is to say, to make the carriage road 18 feet wide, with a ditch three feet wide on each side; the road to be sufficiently bridged where it shall be necessary, with paving pieces not less than 15 feet in length; and to make besides, a clearance of 18 feet on each side outside of the ditches.

2d. To complete in the manner above described, the road existing at present between Craig road and the settlements of the parish of *Sainte Marie*.

3d. To complete in the manner above described, that part of the road from Craig road about the place called Lord's settlement in Ireland, to that part of the line of the district of Three-Rivers in Wolfestown, where it meets the road traced by Mr. Pennoyer.

4th. For the construction of a solid bridge, to be built of wood, on the river Etchemins, near the river Saint Lawrence, in the parish of *Point Levi*. These proposals to be accompanied by a plan.

5th. To clear the landing place for canoes at *Point Levi*, before Captain Labadie's, and for easing the steepness of the hill from this landing place to the brow of the Cape. — The proposals for which also to be accompanied by a plan.

6th. To examine the river Chaudiere, from its mouth to its source, and report on the possibility of rendering it navigable, by means of dams, canals, or other works, with a plan, details and estimates of the probable expence of such works.

7th. To examine the road commonly called the Kenebeck road, with a plan, containing the deviations which may be necessary to make, and an estimate of the probable expence of changing and completing the said road.

Sealed proposals for the said works, plans, and details, will be received by the said Commissioners at their office at Quebec, from this day to Monday the 7th of July next, at ten o'clock in the morning. The proposals to mention the time at which the Contractors propose to deliver the works, plans and details above mentioned.

Two good and sufficient securities will be required for the execution of the five first works. — Their names must be mentioned in the proposals.

One half only of the works mentioned in the first and second clauses will be required in the course of the present year.

Pour réparer le chemin Craig, depuis la ligne du District des Trois Rivières, jusqu'aux établissements de St. Gilles; c'est-à-dire, de mettre le chemin qui servira au roulage des voitures, de 18 pieds de largeur, avec un fossé de trois pieds de largeur, de chaque côté, suffisamment ponté où il sera nécessaire avec des pièces de pavé qui ne seront pas moins de 15 pieds de longueur; et de faire un abais en outre de 18 pieds de chaque côté en dehors des fossés.

2me. De compléter en la manière ci-dessus désignée le chemin actuellement existant entre le chemin Craig et les établissements de la Paroisse Ste. Marie.

3me. De compléter en la manière ci-dessus désignée cette partie du chemin depuis le chemin Craig vers l'endroit appelé *Lord's settlement*, dans l'Irlande jusqu'à cette partie de la ligne du district des Trois Rivières dans Wolfestown où elle rencontre le chemin tracé par Mr. Pennoyer.

4me. Pour la construction d'un Pont solide, bae en bois, sur la Rivière Etchemins près du Fleuve St. Laurent, Paroisse de la Pointe Levi; ces propositions seront accompagnées d'un plan.

5me. Pour nettoyer la place de débarquement des Canots à la Pointe Levi, devant chez le Capit. Labadie, et pour adoucir la côte depuis ce débarquement jusqu'à la cime du Cap, les Propositions seront aussi accompagnées d'un plan.

6. Pour faire la visite de la Rivière Chaudiere depuis son embouchure jusqu'à sa source, et faire un rapport de la possibilité de la rendre navigable par le moyen d'écluses, canaux, ou autres ouvrages, avec un plan, devis et estimations de la dépense probable pour faire de semblables ouvrages.

7me. Pour faire la visite du chemin vulgairement nommé chemin de Kenebec, avec un plan contenant les deviations qu'il seroit nécessaire d'y faire, et une estimation de la dépense probable pour parfaire, et changer le dit chemin.

Les propositions scellées pour les dits ouvrages, plans et devis, seront reçues par les dits Commissaires à leur Office à Québec, d'hui à Lundi le 7^e Juillet prochain, à dix heures du matin. Les propositions feront mention du tems où les contracteurs se proposeront de livrer les ouvrages, plans et devis ci-dessus.

SCIENTIFIC INTELLIGENCE.

From experiments on the strength of different kinds of Wood made by Col. Beaufoy, and recorded in the present Number of Dr. Thomson's Annals, the pitch pine appears the strongest wood; next to that the English oak with straight and even fibres; then the English oak irregular and cross grained; fourthly, the Riga fir; and fifthly, the Dantzic oak. If the strength of the pitch pine be called 1000, the strength of the English oak will be, from the mean of two experiments, 923. Of the Riga fir, 782. Of the Dantzic oak 663. Call the mean strength of the English oak 1000; the strength of the Riga fir will be 816; but the weight of the Riga fir is to that of the English oak as 659 to 1000. Therefore the decrease of weight being in greater proportion than the increase of strength, it is better in dry places it is better to use fir beams than oak, independently of the saving of expence.

Royal Society.—On Thursday, Feb. 27, a paper by Sir Everard Home, Bart. was read, giving an account of a number of fossil bones of the rhinoceros found in a lime stone cavern near Plymouth, by Mr. Whithy. Sir Joseph Banks had requested Mr. Whithy, when he went to superintend the Breakwater at present constructing at Plymouth, to inspect all the caverns that should be met with in the quarrying, and to send him up any fossil bones that might be found. The fossil bones described in this paper occurred in a lime-stone rock on the south side of the Cutwater. This lime-stone is decidedly transition. The cavern was found after they had quarried 150 feet into the solid rock. It was 45 feet long, and filled with clay, and had no communication whatever with the external surface. The bones were remarkably perfect specimens. They were all decidedly bones of the rhinoceros; but they belonged to three different animals. They consisted of teeth, bones of the spine, of the scapula, of the fore legs, and of the metatarsal bones of the hind legs. They were compared by Sir Everard with the bones of the skeleton of a rhinoceros in the possession of Mr. Brookes, which is considered as belonging to the largest of the species ever seen in England. The fossil bones were mostly of a larger size, though some of them belonged to a smaller animal.

Electricity.—Some very curious discoveries, highly interesting to the lovers of Natural History, have recently been communicated to the Royal Society, by Mr. Todd, a medical gentleman, as the result of numerous experiments on that wonder of nature, the Torpedo, or Electrical Fish. Mr. Todd observes, that the shocks received from the animal were never sensible above the shoulder, and seldom above the elbow joint: the intensity, also, of the shock, here no relation to the size of the fish, but an evident relation to its liveliness, and vice versa. The shock did not always follow the touch, but required a degree of irritation, such as pressing, pricking, or squeezing the animal; whilst not unfrequently animals to appearance perfectly vivacious, suffered this irritation without discharging any shock whatever. But the most curious fact is, that when caught by the hand, they sometimes writhed and twisted about, endeavouring to extricate themselves by muscular exertion; and did not, until they found these means unavailing, attempt the exercise of their electrical power; though in many instances they had recourse to that power in the first moment of coercion. It was also ascertained by repeated experiments, putting two animals of equally apparent health into vessels of water, drawing successive shocks from one, and suffering the other to remain quiescent, that the death of the animal was hastened by the abstraction of its electric fluid!

THE BOUNDARIES OF THE UNITED STATES.

The commissioners under the fourth and fifth articles of the treaty of Ghent, for the purpose of settling the boundary line between the north eastern frontier of the United States, and the British dominions, and to determine whether the islands in the Bay of Passamaquoddy and the Bay of Fundy are comprehended in the boundaries established by the treaty of 1783, assembled in this place on the 10th of May last.

The commissioners under the fourth article were employed for some days after their meeting in an examination of facts, documents, maps and plans, in order to be possessed of a state of the controversy on both sides. After which, J. T. Austin, Esq. agent of the American commissioners, opened a written argument in behalf of the United States, which employed him a week.

W. Chipman, Esq. the agent on behalf of the British government, then entered into his argument in favour of the claims of the nation, which occupied him one full day. These respective arguments have been interchanged, the commissioners adjourned to meet on the 25th of September next, at which time the parties will be heard, in reply to each other.

The commissioners under the fifth article of the late treaty, appointed two parties of explorers, consisting of thirty persons of each nation, and a suitable number of surveyors to proceed from the monument upon the St. Croix, and pursue the boundary line to the highlands which divide the waters which empty into the Atlantic from those that fall into the St. Lawrence. The commissioners adjourned to meet again on the 10th of May

next, to receive the report of the exploring parties, and of the surveyors.

By the treaty of Ghent, it is provided, that in the event of a difference of opinion upon the subject under the consideration of the commissioners, his Britannic Majesty and the government of the United States, agree to refer the difficulty to some friendly sovereign or State, then to be named for that purpose—and in consequence of which expectation all the arguments are delivered in writing.

According to the construction of the British agent, the boundary line would cut off part of the river St. John's, and about two millions of acres of land from the District of Maine.

Northern Boundary.—The duty of the commissioners under the fifth article of the late treaty of peace, is to fix the boundary line, from the monument already established at the source of the St. Croix to the highlands between the waters of the St. Lawrence, and those that fall directly into the Atlantic, thence along the height of land to the source of the Connecticut river, and after descending said river to the 45th degree of longitude, along that parallel of latitude to the St. Lawrence.

We believe that until very lately there has been but one interpretation of the language of the treaty of 1783, in describing this part of the boundary line of the United States. All that appeared to be wanting was, that the country should be surveyed, and the line designated by fixed landmarks. But now we understand that a new claim has been set up by some people in the British Provinces, of a large tract of land which has heretofore been supposed to belong to the district of Maine. Whether this claim is urged by the agents of the British government we are not informed. They pretend that the highlands intended in the treaty as forming the northern boundary of Maine, are those which lie south of the river St. John's, and not the ridge between the St. John's and the St. Lawrence.

The treaty thus describes the northern boundary of Maine; "along the said highlands which divide those rivers that empty themselves into the river Saint Lawrence from those which fall into the Atlantic Ocean to the northwesternmost head of Connecticut river." Colonel Bouchette, in his late elaborate and valuable work upon Lower Canada, maintains that, by the rivers that fall into the Atlantic, are meant those that fall directly into the Ocean, to the exclusion of St. John's, which falls into the Bay of Fundy, and that the boundary line instead of running from the source of the Connecticut, northwesterly, along the main ridge nearly parallel with the St. Lawrence, ought to run nearly in an easterly direction, on a secondary ridge south of the waters of the St. John until it is intersected by the astronomical line running north from the source of the St. Croix. This appears to be a very strained construction of the treaty, and we presume will never be admitted as the true construction of that instrument.

The line between Lower Canada and the states of Vermont and New York was established by actual measurement in pursuance of orders from the governments of the province of New York and Quebec, in the years 1771, 2, 3, and 4, from a monument fixed on the western bank of the Connecticut, to another at the village of St. Regis on the St. Lawrence, a distance of about 126 1/2 miles. It is admitted that this is in some respects irregular, and deviates sometimes to the north, and sometimes to the south, from the course in which it was intended to be run. It has also been repeatedly asserted, that the position of the monument on the Connecticut is not right. Dr. Williams maintained that it was some miles too far south, and Colonel Bouchette on the contrary contends that it is more than three miles too far north.

Whether it is intended to revise and run anew this line, which has been considered as established

for more than forty years, we are not informed."

PITTSBURG, June 6.

Steam-boat Constitution.—The account published in our paper of the 30th ult. respecting the unfortunate accident on board the steam boat Constitution is confirmed. A letter from a gentleman who was on board the boat a few hours after the melancholy occurrence, to his friend in this city, gives the following particulars.

"At Point Coupee, we found the Constitution she having bursted her boilers and killed eleven of her crew and passengers. The day before, the Washington had left Natchez, at 3 P. M. The Constitution about an hour and a half after, and passed captain S. of the Washington, that night, but losing some of the buckets of her water wheels, they stopped to replace them, which gave the Washington an advantage. The Constitution after repairing her wheels soon overtook the Washington, and passed her again as was observed by the people on shore, it being then daylight. The Constitution's wheels giving out again, they stopped and the Washington passed her once more. During all this time the steam was constantly increasing. The engineer had lain down, and knowing that the steam had not been let off, and that it was increasing to a great height, he sprang up to let it off, but before he was able to effect it, the ends of the boilers next to the forward cabin blew out, and swept every thing before it clear forward to the stem. The passengers had just sat down to breakfast, and the captain and his wife were on the upper deck about to go down. The steam from the boilers was so powerful, that it instantaneously swept every thing that came in its way, first the thin bulk head, tables, chairs, dishes, passengers and lockers, and carried them with such force as not only to scald, but break both men and things in a shocking manner, producing a scene too horrible to relate to a feeling mind. This circumstance will have a tendency to prejudice those unacquainted with the particulars against steam boats in general, but it ought only to be attributed to consummate folly and negligence."

FIRE! FIRE!!

Singular Accident!—A second Phantom!—Caution to Segar puffers!—The following singular accident really occurred near this place, on Monday last. A young man returning from the country in a gig, threw away as he supposed, the fragment of a segar, which he had been smoking. It unfortunately, however, lodged in the cover of the top of the gig, which was let down. In a little time the coal of the segar, by the action of the top of the gig, was fanned into a flame. The driver, being to windward, did not directly discover his situation—and, like another Phantom, drove on, with the insidious flames curling in fantastic wreaths behind him! But their near approach to his system soon convinced him that he was not quite destitute of sensibility. Startled at the singularity of his situation, he stood a moment breathless to enjoy the novelty of the scene! But a little reflection soon directed him to more active exertion—when after burning gloves, fingers, coat, and a brand new Waterloo (which, by the by, was not his own) he succeeded in mastering the destructive element. The covering of the top was entirely consumed, with a part of the morocco and padding. In addition to this misfortune, our Jehu was a butt of wit and railery for every one he met on the road; to use a Georgian phrase, every man, woman and child that he passed, had a pull at him.

And all this mischief proceeded from the unnecessary use of a segar! We could moralize a little on the occasion—but we forbear—because in all probability, our reflections, like the subject of consideration, would end in smoke.

*His Britannic Majesty's Consulate
for the State of New-York, 12th
June, 1817 :*

SIR—Since I entered upon the duties of my office, I have found the Commercial Interests of Great Britain suffer great inconvenience by the irregularity and delay, attending the conveyance of letters between New York and Montreal. This consideration led me in the course of my journey to make enquiry at the Post Office at Whitehall in the United States, and at St. Johns, in order to ascertain whence so much disappointment and delay arose. I therefore take the liberty of offering to your consideration the following observations, as I understand the subject has already arrested your attention, and that you are truly solicitous to remove the difficulties so complained of. It is submitted, that the mail for U. & L. Canada made up at N. York, should be sealed in a separate bag, not to be opened at any of the intermediate towns as has been the case, and that a by bag should be appropriated solely to carry letters to Montreal from any of the post offices on the route, these bags to be inclosed in the United States General Mail. That during the summer months, the mail should be conveyed by the Steam Boats, from Whitehall to St. Johns, which start twice a week, and immediately upon arrival of the Steam Boat, the mail to be forwarded to Montreal, and a mail to be made up at Montreal for New York to return by the same conveyance, so as to reach St. Johns to return by the Steam Boat to Whitehall. The increase of revenue to the Post office of Montreal and the United States, by the mail proceeding by the Steam Boats would be considerable, as passengers are now loaded with letters, by reason of the delay and uncertainty hitherto existing. The interchange of communication between New York and His Majesty's Provinces, embracing such extensive correspondence, should unquestionably be three times a week, if not daily; but the regularity of twice a week by the proposed mode would be hailed as a great object. During the winter, the mail to proceed three times a week from Albany by Swanton, and so to return by the most direct route, as so important a mail as that between Montreal and New York should not travel round for minor accommodations; but others should yield to it. The expense of three times a week, in place of twice a week is very trivial: as the horses conveying the up mail, return next day with the down Mail, while twice a week, the horses are idle two days or return empty.

But in all cases, Sir, the sealing of the Montreal mail at New York, and the New York mail at Montreal, is a subject that ought to be adhered to. I have not adverted to the importance of this arrangement, as it respects the Government dispatches, which contribute so largely to the Post Office Revenue of the United States. The delays that have arisen thereto, have been such, that it was proposed to establish a messenger to proceed with dispatches and British letters, regularly between New-York and Montreal. But the harmony that happily exists between the two governments, will not doubt lead to the adoption of any measure having for its object interests so intimately connected with both countries; and no doubt as you, Sir, have been appointed to the head of the Post Office department in British North America, an immediate improvement may be anticipated.

QUEBEC, JULY 1. 1817.

A vessel has arrived since our last, that left Belfast on the 15th of May. She has not, however, added to our stock of European intelligence. Rumours are afloat, that Spain has in contemplation to cede Majorca to Russia; and thus give to the latter such a command in the Mediterranean, as cannot fail to make her formidable both in that sea, and on its shores. But none will so sensibly feel the acquisition of such a harbour and depot to the Russian autocrat, as the Court of Constantinople, whose European territories will lie at the mercy of Alexander, to be grasped whenever he may conceive the occasion fitting to take the waning crescent by the horns, and divest it of that portion of its beams. Happen when it will, it is an event that most tend to ameliorate the condition of the inhabitants of those countries, because civilization has certainly been, for some time to a certain extent, progressive within the Russian dominions; whilst among the Saracens, every thing tending to ameliorate man's condition, receives an incessant check. Savages they are, and savages they are determined to remain. That such may, and do inhabit populous cities, no less than wild deserts, is a truth, that as it is to be lamented, is not to be denied. How many fine countries that once were blessed with the light of learning, the rays of science, and the finest polish of civilization, are now a prey to the darkest minds, the grossest superstition, and the most intolerant prejudices.

There is nothing operates so powerfully as a barrier to civilization, as a non or little intercourse with other nations; which is too much the case with the Turks, and other Asiatics. What little intercourse they have with individuals of other countries, is confined to their sea-ports. Hence their self-vanity, and deep-rooted prejudices, of which a mixture with mankind would greatly contribute to the cure. As subjects of Russia, they would be less confined in their knowledge of other nations, and consequently more disposed to profit by what they might find beneficial in others. To be a Musselman is to be professedly an ignorant man; because the only book he can have any knowledge of is the Koran; whilst his associate is a Mahometan, equally ignorant with himself. If he be seized on by the Russian autocrat, he will become more a man of the world, though not in the degree of more southern European nations. Time only can accomplish great changes. Russians, by having a footing in the Mediterranean, will become more and more citizens of the great commonwealth of mankind, instead of being buried amidst hyperborean snows. A mixture will improve all.

Of South American affairs, we venture to say little, because we give little credence to anything that is said. Were the South Americans generally as hearty in the cause of independence as they ought to be, they would have accomplished their object long before this time; but the consciousness of an incapacity for self government must ever operate as a check on great exertions. They have neither the education nor knowledge of the world requisite to govern themselves. But if they are themselves wanting in energy, it is no less the case with Spain. Hence a lingering warfare must inevitably follow.

Yesterday morning, was unfuriously wrecked in the Traverse, by striking on a rock in a fog, the MARY, Capt. Moore, bound from this port to Greenock. Shortly after striking, she went down, in such a manner that the passengers and crew had barely time to save themselves, without any of their baggage. Col. Smelt, of the 10th, Mrs. Smelt, and Major Burke, of the 100th regt. were passengers. They are returned.
