The Cause of Red Snow.

"Everybody knows nowadays," says La Revue Scientifique, "that the red tint that now and then appears in the snow is due to a very small alga of simple organization, the protococcus nivalis. It appears, according to M. Hottinger, that sometimes another cause is present, and that is the presence of very small red spots produced by very small insects, called collembolles. But as M. Brun suggests, it is probable that the blood-red color of these spots is due to the presence of the protococcus nivalis, so that it is always, in the last analysis, the protococcus that causes the red snow."

No More Days of Grace.

The Governor of Pennsylvania has affixed his signature to the new law which will abolish days of grace. The passage of the bill has been warmly urged by the Pennsylvania Association of Manufacturers, among those who have been most active in its behalf.

The Oath of Ireland for a Leader.

Unfettered England, as she values her repose, must remain fettered by the undignified necessity of receiving the Oath of Ireland. It is an instance of the luck which haunts Ireland that no one of them combines all the qualities needed for an Irish leader. England, in her secure and settled condition, does not require a leader who requires political servitude. She sees uses to the utmost of their strength, gives them honor while they are alive, with money if they desert, and buries them in Westminster Abbey when they are dead. But she reserves the right to criticize with utter frankness her most eminent sons, and if they displease her she is not above sending them to the gallows.

The Corn Yield Estimated at 2,425,000,000 Bushels.

The New York Produce Exchange is expecting the biggest corn crop in the history of the country, and the figures already confirm the returns which the World gathered recently from its correspondents throughout the great corn belt of the West.

According to the statistics of the Produce Exchange the corn acreage is 22,000,000 and the indicated crop is not less than 2,425,000,000 bushels. The crops of the twenty years preceding have been as follows:—
