

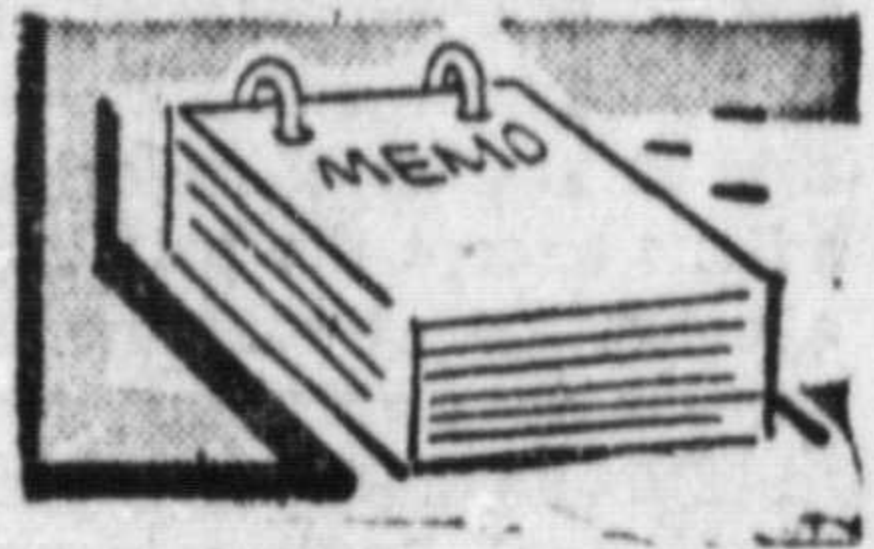

At the Pontiac County Farm Forum Annual Meeting held Monday night in the newly decorated Hines Hall the Farm Forum Executive for 1954-55 was elected as follows:

It was decided at the meeting that the Fiscal year would end March 31st this year and each year hereafter. Farm Forum in Pontiac County is greatly supported by grants from the County Council as well as the Clarendon and Bristol Councils. We have two new forums this year, making a total of 22 forums with prospects for more new forums next year. This year, as in other years, our county allotment is paid up to date at the office.

We started out by sponsoring a Float for Coronation Day depicting the contrast in farming methods during the reign of Queen Victoria and the present era. We also had a refreshment booth at the exhibition grounds for the big celebration. This worked out so well that we had another booth for the Shawville Fair for three and one half days. Each forum taking their turn at operating the booth.

Several car loads attended Farm Day at Macdonald College in June. Four Forum members participated in the Tractor Competition; one

member, Delmer Barber, taking the highest single score in the contest (239 points out of 250); the team placing third.

Our Association was responsible for Miss Roberta Ridley of the Information Centre at Macdonald College coming to Shawville on March 9, giving us a very interesting talk on her work and how it could be made of more benefit to Pontiac County. She met members of the Women's Institute in the afternoon and the Farm Forum Executive, Secretaries and representatives in the evening. We had a very good attendance.

Last Fall we sent two delegates

to the Compton County Leadership Forum.

One of our members, Mr. George Stones, the Agriculture Teacher at our new High School has tried his hand at writing a story on Pontiac Farm Forum entitled "Through the Years of the Pontiac Farm Forum", which was published in the April issue of the Macdonald College Journal.

As we now have a new Executive for the coming year much credit goes out to the retiring executive for a very successful farm forum year.

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Here we were talking about curling, wading through icy puddles, dodging the freezing rain and then all of a sudden it's Spring. How the changing seasons do affect us mentally and physically as well as spiritually and perhaps morally is clearly demonstrated everywhere at this time of year. Babies, long smothered in winter blankets and wool scarves, seem to grow inches in all directions as they emerge in playsuits. School children, freed from long stockings and winter coats burst forth, all bare knees and elbows, to greet the warm sunshine of Spring. Sleds and skates are forgotten in a day and the bicycle population takes a sharp increase. Skipping ropes are heard snapping to the accompanying nonsense rhymes of the little skippers. Baseballs whiz through the air clapping solidly from mitt to mitt. Cars which crept through winter roads with frosted windows tight closed sail along clear highways wide open. Elderly folk, housebound for months, step onto their front porches to soak in a little sun and some of the local news from passers by. People whose presence at church is limited to funerals and christenings are seen there on Easter morning and we can't believe it is only to show off the new cloths. Something in the very air of spring brings out the dormant spirit in us all. Everyone feels an inch taller today than yesterday. We can reach higher and take a bigger step. Our minds are clearer with the windows wide open and the warm wind blowing than they were in stuffy heated rooms. This Spring is just one year better than last year's Spring as each person has just one more year's experience upon which to draw as they walk for this short season on their own private cloud. Winter is the big season in this part of the world. All summer long is spent preparing for winter and almost all the rest of year is winter. Only at this moment have we a few weeks in which we can purely and selfishly enjoy the fact of being alive. To be one hundred percent awake with every sense alert to the contagious thrill of the season—that is to know that every one else, whether they show it or not, is subject to the same overwhelming power of Spring and to feel the common bond which this power creates. No matter who you are or who you think you are, you're a part of this magical season and you may as well give in to it and let the buoyancy of it all carry you as far as possible into the season of work which lies ahead.

Lots of talk these days about the sad fact of depletion of our wood lots but here's a bright note from the Quebec Forestry Association. The movement launched in Quebec last May in order to interest the forest owners and farmers to put their properties under a silviculture regime has been welcome all over the Province; to date 19 tree farms have been recognized officially to a total area of 41,483 acres. According to the recent statement from Q.F.A. the 1954 season will be still more encouraging with more than 50 applications already received. All those who own forest properties, individuals, private clubs, pulp and paper land owners, communities, agricultural associations and educational institutions may qualify for certificate provided they intend to manage their wood land so as to assure a permanent crop. Applications must be made at the Head Office of the Quebec Forestry Association.

They come early this spring, as they do every spring: ghostlike shadows winging their way through snow and sleet to their nesting grounds across Canada from Newfoundland to Vancouver Island.

Crows by the thousands!

Their cawing is a raucous chorus in the still-naked thickets. It may be music to some ears but to the song and game birds in field and forest it means—murder.

According to K. N. Morris, executive director of the Canadian Association of Civilian Marksmen, the crow population of Canada is increasing to a alarming degree. This has sportmen worried because the crow is a notorious pilferer. While he is credited with consuming some insects, his favorite diet is the eggs of song birds and game like partridges, prairie chickens and ducks.

To keep our game bird population in a healthy state, Mr. Morris urges shooters to volunteer their services to local farmers to control the ebonyhued robbers of birds' nest. In western Canada good work is already being done by such organizations as the Predators Control Committee of the Manitoba Federation of Game and Fish Associations. Last year this group paid out bounties on 10,026 crows at 10 cents per crow. In addition to earning extra money for their efforts, sportmen were able to enjoy a first class sport.

In reading the late Archbishop Temple's little book, "The Hope Of A New World" we are carried back nearly fifteen years to the early months of the war when he gave these talks to the British people in a series of radio broadcasts over the B.B.C. They are filled with the quiet confidence of that wonderful period when Britain stood alone against what seemed to be an invincible aggressor, Nazi Germany. What a contrast to our own time when we see hysteria afflicting the most powerful nation in the world to the extent that she sees her enemy behind every tree and rock to the extent that a general paralysis has rendered her incapable of sound judgement or decisive action. I refer of course to the bogey-man scare which seems to have completely captivated our great neighbour to the south. In contrast the best minds among the British found time while engaged in a terrible life-and-death struggle to consider the future and do something to ensure that it would be a future worthy of the sacrifices being made for it. Realizing the necessity of understanding the past in order to better the future the nation was willing to listen to its leaders when they asked the question, "what is wrong with the old world?"

Temple says the following things were wrong with the world as it was and thought at the beginning of World War II; God and His laws are neglected, God and faith in God are optional extras. In civilization largely permeated by Christian principles we have not troubled to know on what those principles rest. On all sides we hear the astonishingly silly saying that a man's religion is a private affair between man and his Maker. We have a sense of outrage when we contemplate Nazi tyranny but they preached what they practised. Their standards were perverted so that their right is our wrong. We did not recognize this because we were so busy settling down into a comfortable enjoyment of a life which sprang from and could only be safeguarded by a living Christian faith. Once again we were blinded by the paradox of a modern English culture which was largely Christian in quality and yet regarded faith in God as a dispensable indulgence.

Archbishop Temple went on to say that this strange paradox reached its climax in the educational system. "We supposed it possible to supply a religiously neutral system". "An education which is not religious is atheistic—there is no middle way." Obviously if we give an account of the world from which God is left out you are teaching children to understand the world without reference to God. If he is then introduced He becomes a mere appendix to His own Creation. For if God exists He must be the most important of all existing things we can understand nothing properly until we see it in its relation to God and his purpose. A neglect of God naturally leads to a violation of His law or his order of things, an order expressed in the economic legislation of the Old Testament whose fundamental principle was

that the allowing of free play to individual initiative was only in such a way that no man acquires the right to possess, to exploit or to hold down his neighbour. Consciously doing what is known or believed to be wrong is only part of the whole great fact of sin. All is sin that falls short of God's will and the essence of man's sin is his self-centredness. Not understanding sin, redemption means nothing and the preaching of the Gospel is largely shooting over the heads of the hearers.

Life finds value in a cause for which it is worthwhile to die. No man serving such a cause, however small his contribution to it, is ever frustrated. War provides us with sharp alternatives; loyalty with death on the one hand and life with shame on the other. The right choice is glorious and comparatively easy. It is easier to die for a cause than to live for it; living for it means the setting-aside of pleasure and self-interest in a host of little choices, where there is no glory, at least in men's eyes, on the one side and no open shame on the other. Yet if life is to keep its dignity and value, we must find something to live and die for in peace as in war. Scientists and artists find this in the pursuit of knowledge or beauty but even for them their chosen ideals never cover the whole of life. Nothing does that except the purpose of God. The only real cure for a sense of futility or frustration is faith in God. Temple goes on to point out that a good many had forgotten this fact and had come to think of comfort, pleasure and amusement as real goals in life. He feels that one reason that the British people did not do their share in maintaining international law and order was their unwillingness for the discipline and discomfort of military training. He continues, "Especially have we been unwilling to ask our neighbours of our children for hard or difficult service. But this is sheer arrogance masquerading as kindness. You cannot insult a man more than by offering him a lower standard of conduct than your own."

Temple concludes this section by pointing out that man has reversed the natural order of things, God's order, in our economic life. In the natural order the object of all industry is the supply of men's needs. The consumer is the person whose interest should be supreme in determining the whole process. For his sake goods are produced and finance comes in as the servant of production. But in our world, goods are produced not primarily to satisfy the consumer but to enrich the producer. The profit-motive predominates over the service-motive. The inversion of all that is right has gone so far that now finance controls production instead of production controlling finance. The consumer meanwhile has become no more than an indispensable condition of successful business enterprise. This predominance of the profit-motive is itself a source of war. The Archbishop goes on further to point out that the economic system which prevails in our country as in his was ineffective in its function by the fact of widespread unemployment. He says it must be remodelled not under the pressure of competing class-interest which might well produce a remedy worse than the disease, but rather by a sincere attempt to find God's way of ordering our life. "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His justice and all these things"—food, clothing, economic good as a whole—"shall be added unto you."

Quebec Safety League

Public groups, social clubs, chambers of commerce, boards of trade, police chiefs, mayors of cities and towns and private individuals have been asked to give full support to the highway safety campaign which will be launched in the province in June.

Roger Lacoste, Q.C., president of the committee in charge of the campaign for the western section of the province, has appealed for suggestions from these groups to make the safety campaign a successful one.

clove of garlic
