Irwin Watson and Wes Hamilton Purchase Famous Polled Herefords

Last week some Hereford breeding stock arrived in Pontiac county to improve that breed of beef cattle. Mr. Irwin Watson Shawville has purchased at the Circle "T" Ranch sale at Broadview, Sask., the beautiful two year old Polled Hereford heifer Fairview Mixer Lass 45L-x527094. It is the understanding that this strain of Herefords has been dehorned by nature for several generations.

At the same sale a joint purchase was made by Irwin Watson and Westburn Hamilton both of Shawville, of the Polled Hereford two year old sire Circle T. Domestic Mischief 109D-x519479. The bull should contribute materially to the improvement of local strains of Polled Herefords. It is interesting to note that the strain of the Hereford breed has been free of horns for a number of generations.

Of course the Polled factor has not been stressed at the expense of the other all important beef qualities of these Herefords. These men are to be

complimented on their initiative and enterprise in journeying to the West, and in making the considerable expenditure involved in the two purchases.

Co-op Medical Board Meeting

The changing picture in hospital and surgical insurance prompted discussion at the board meeting, Wednesday June 26, held in the Co-op Office.

Directors present pondered the question of balance between the present premium rate and the foreseeable member potential of the Pontiac Co-op Medical Services. They came to the conclusion that, due to involving factors, it would not be feasible at this time to grant increased benefits by a higher rate of premium.

Claims considered by the board amounted to \$3,123.26 and approved for payment as follows: The Equity (for envelopes) \$9.52, Pontiac Rural Telephones \$8.23 Surgical & Anaesthetists bills, \$1,080.00, Grace Hospital, \$75.00, Victoria Hospital, Renfrew, \$92.85, Scarboro Hospital, \$8.00; Ottawa General (2 claims); \$412.90 Chapeau Community, \$305.00, Montreal Hospital (2 claims) \$352.00, Pontiac Community (18 claims) \$683.51 Stratford General, \$114.00.

The question of coverage for initial services following an accident, with or without bed care, was brought forward and cleared by the meeting.

There were three applications accepted on the Combination Benefit Plan.

The next board of directors meeting will be held Thursday, July 31, in the Pontiac Co-op Medical Services office on Main Street.

Paul Martineau Speaks Again

On June 24, in a debate concerning an amendment to the Juvenile Delinquents Act to provide for secrecy and destruction of records, Paul Martineau rose to endorse the bill saying he believed it to be another step forward in the rehabilitation of juveniles. Mr. Martineau spoke in English.

His arguments for the amendment included a comprehensive analysis of the types of juvenile delinquency derived from his experience as crown attorney. He said that more important perhaps than any other reason for destroying records of delinquency after five years (as suggested by the bill) is that it gives to the former juvenile a feeling of absolute security which is most necessary to complete his rehabilitation.

On the following day, Wednesday, June 25, Paul Martineau addressed the House in the French Language, to congratulate the Minister of Finance on his budget. He pointed out his riding of Pontiac-Temiscamingue is as great in area as the entire province of Nova Scotia, its population and landscapes are diversified, its limits are within a few short miles of the national capital in fact parts of the riding are within the federal district.

He suggested that the government should give generous subsidies to farmers.

Russell Judd Gets Nurse's Home Building Contract

A special meeting of the Pontiac Community Hospital Board was held in Shawville on Monday night. The purpose of the meeting was to make a final decision on the building of a nurses residence. By unanimous decision of the directors, it was decided to go ahead with construction of the residence, and the contract for construction was awarded to Russell Judd, Shawville contractor. It is understood that the contract was for an amount in the vicinity of \$50,000.

The plans, prepared by Ottawa architects McLean & Burgess, call for single nurses bedrooms, recreation and sun rooms, and a suite for the nursing supervisor. The heating unit will be a separate unit within the building. The exterior will be mostly a brick finish, to blend with the existing hospital structure. The new building will be situated to the east of the hospital.

Work is to start as soon as the architect can get up to Shawville, and will be completed probably within six months.

No Decision At Bristol Board

Nine visitors appeared at the meeting of the Bristol School Board last Monday night, one of whom took the seat at the Board table left vacant by the absence of Trustee Fred Graham who is away on holidays.

The visitor in Graham's chair was Ken Musgrove, secretary-treasurer of the Pontiac County Protestant Central School Board. His message to the Board was a suggestion that they send the No. 4 pupils to Shawville next term and the pupils from No. 10 school to Elmside. Having made the suggestion Mr. Musgrove talked about it further for about two hours, after which he left the table and the School Board adjourned the meeting.

During Mr. Musgrove's presence at the table the Board named a temporary chairman, Hilliard Beattie, and passed for payment a bunch of outstanding bills. They also moved and seconded a motion that the children of No. 10 should go to Elmside for a year as an experiment. When Musgrove retired from the discussion at eleven o'clock, the Board Members discussed their own opinions on the motion. They decided that a decision of the Board on this question would be unfair to the newly constituted Board after July elections. For this reason, the mover retired his motion for possible re-introduction at the next meeting.

One proposal made by a Trustee, Russell Lacas, was that a resolution go on the books immediately to start work, on the numbering of seats on the Board. It was decided on Mr. Musgrove's suggestion, to leave this matter over for the new Board.

During Mr. Musgrove's debate, a number of interesting facts were stated concerning education in the schools of Bristol last year.

At Schools No. 4, 7 and 10 a total of seven pupils wrote (Continued on Page Five)

TWO SIDES

Now is the time to remember that every question has two sides to it. From the point of view of any people, possibly including the educationists of Quebec, it would seem that progress can best be served by closing up two of Bristol's little one room schools and sending the children from those back-country districts to larger schools by bus and car, and sometimes by horse drawn sleigh and snomobile.

There is no doubt that it is possible for a large consolidated school to provide a better education for children, but experience has shown that where it is possible it is not always done. A good teacher in a one room school is far more valuable in the experience of the child than a mediocre or bad teacher in a great modern high school. Everything, in fact, depends upon the teacher.

There are those who cannot but agree that an ideal educational situation exists where one teacher has a dozen children to personally conduct through the year's work with all the care and attention to individual differences that is possible only in the small school. This sort of care is not possible in a large school and having all the children at the same artificial level of education doesn't change this situation.

If a teacher is consumed with ambition to teach SUBJECTS she will be best suited in the large classroom; but that teacher whose vocation it is to teach CHILDREN, can do better in the intimate one room school relationship.

Unfortunately, though, there is more to consider than the education of the child. Finances also must be studied. When it becomes financially impossible to support the one room school, then the problem resolves itself around the best possible large school with which to amalgamate.

Many things must be thought of in this connection, not the least of which is the means of transporting children. Only town children who ride the school busses once a year to a party consider this mode of transportation fun. The little ones who daily bounce over country roads, roads never intended for bus travel, in crowded busses, do not benefit by time thus spent. Upon arrival at school after a school-bus ride they are not best fitted to assimilate their education. After the ride home they have had a very heavy day, sometimes with no let up on account of some teachers' habit of keeping bus pupils in during lunch hour and recess. When snomobiles are substituted for busses in rough weather, the situation is even worse.

The prospect of adding to this bus ride another jaunt over bad roads by car makes the cost in health, comfort and peace of mind of a town education even greater. (When the roads improve the situation will improve but this is pure conjecture and doesn't face facts as they exist today.)

If children must leave their own district to go to school, the best possible arrangements should be made. There would be nothing gained unless there was a distinct improvement in education at the larger school.

There is a strong agreement among educationists that PROGRESS must be served but there is an equally strong feeling among people outside this elite fold that CHILDREN must be served. It often resolves itself into a deadlock between EDUCATION and EXPEDIENCY and for our part we would like to see the one considered at least on a par with the other.

In the matter of Bristol No. 10 pupils moving to Elmside next year, a careful study has been made of what this would cost with no attention having been given to the possible costs of keeping the children in their own school; this would possibly include added salary to a teacher qualified to teach grade eight as well as grades one to seven. No discussion of rebuilding Elmside to accommodate three classrooms can seriously be followed without also knowing what it would cost to rebuild No. 10 to meet immediate require-

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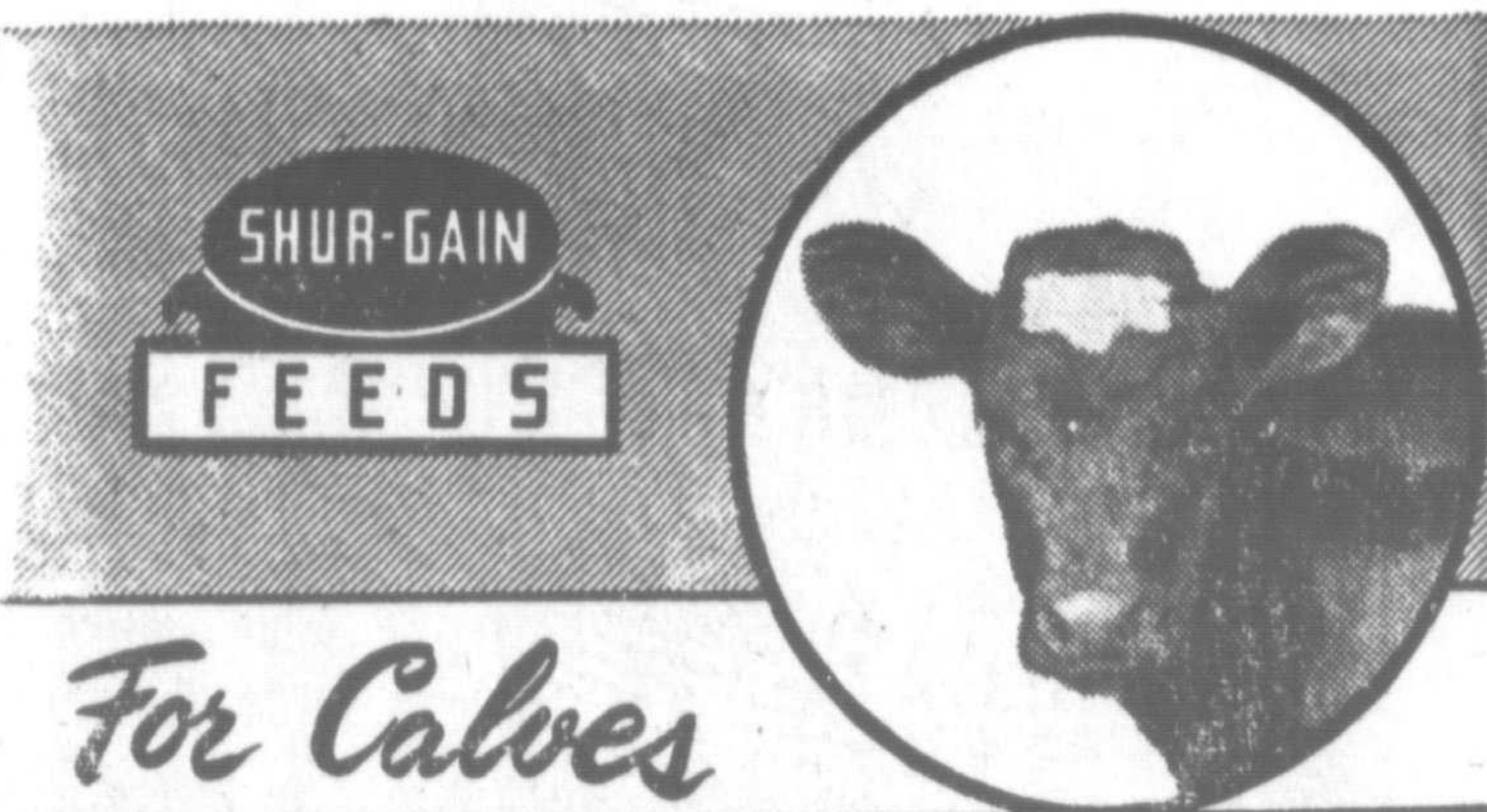

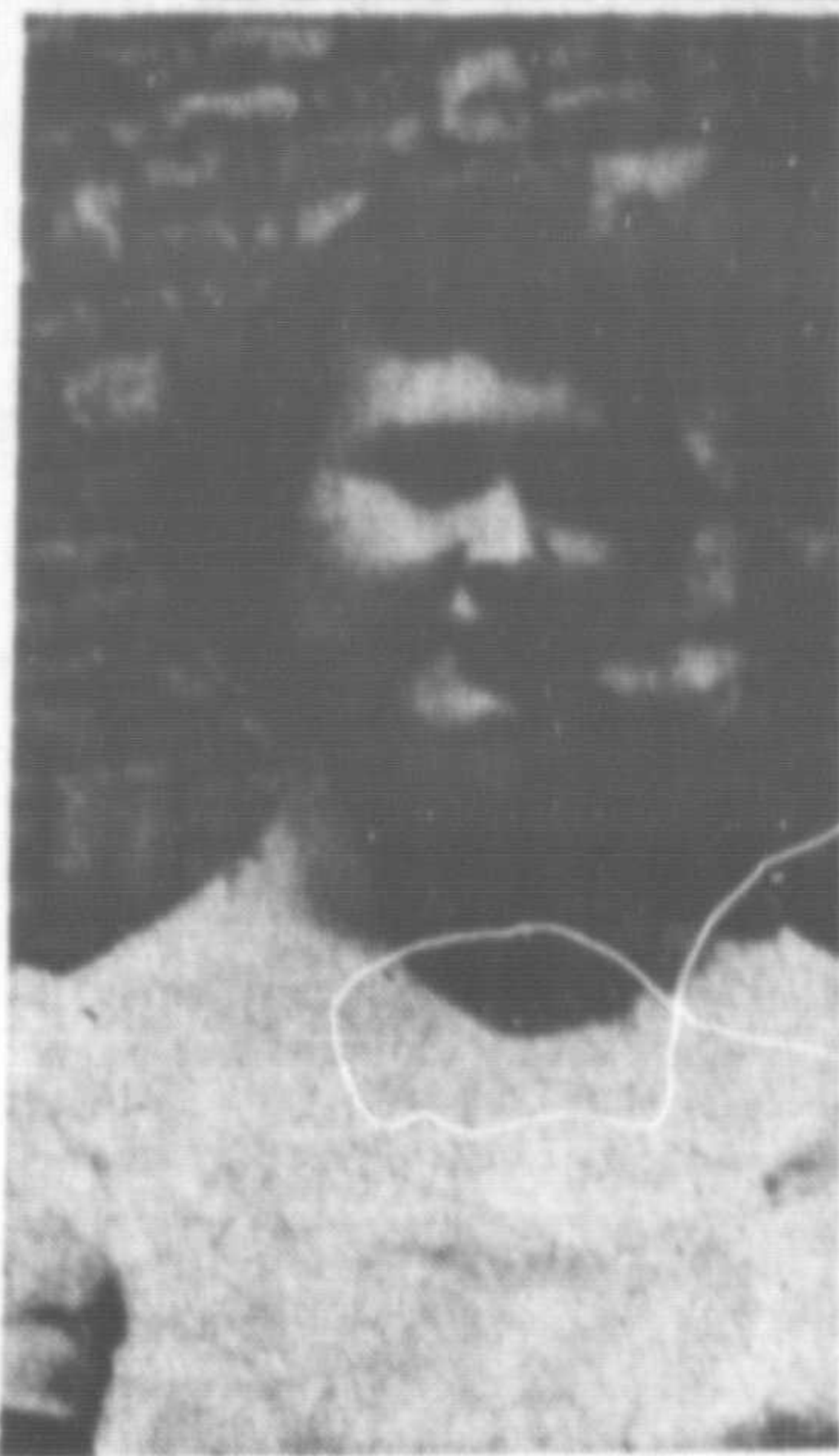

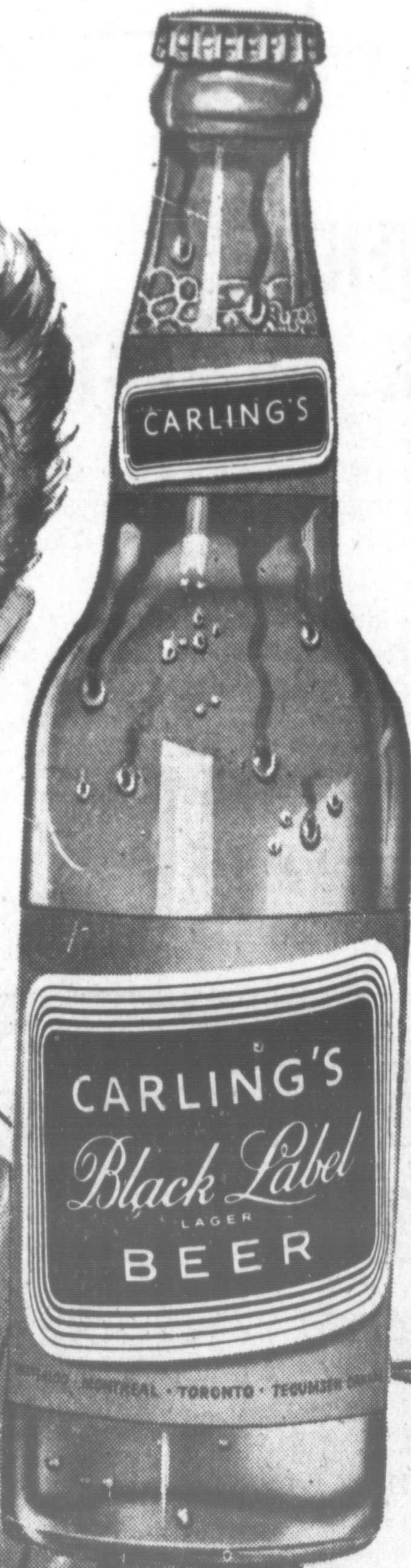

Mr. Musgrove said that without consulting the Clarendon School Board he could never assure No. 4 parents that their children could be taken at Shawville, including one boy in grade eight. He also said that Clarendon had stated definitely that they have not room for the five grade-eight pupils from No. 10. His proposal to send all No. 10 to Elmside would be quite feasible, he insisted, with little expense involved. They would turn the well lit basement room into a further class room and then divide the classes; Grades 1, 2, and 3 in one room; grades 4, 5 and 6 in another; and 7, 8 and 9 in the third. This, he said, would make for better education in all rooms.

Mr. Musgrove also proved with figures how money could be saved by closing No. 4 school.

Mr. Lucas, taking in all sides of the problem including those of the teacher, the educational standards and the individual child, felt that a child receives a very good education in the small school, though not as good as is obtainable in Shawville.

An interesting side to the question of expansion at Elmside was learned during the last few minutes of discussion. This is the fact that a third

of the pupils at Elmside last year were Roman Catholics and there is every indication that, even with the influx of Protestant pupil, if the other Bristol Schools were to close, the proportion of Roman Catholic children at Elmside will begin to pay taxes to the Municipality of Bristol, the school taxes will be divided according to church affiliation, of mine employees. As long as the Roman Catholic children continue to attend Elmside School, all these monies go to this school, but whenever they decide to go by bus to St. Mary's Quyon, the entire part of taxes apportioned to them will go away from Elmside School. Building plans at this time should take such eventualities into consideration.

Mr. Musgrove's suggestion to close No. 4 he said, came through him from the Central School Board although that Board has engaged a teacher for No. 4 for the coming term.

Mr. Musgrove also stated that they have not looked for a teacher for School No. 10 but he did not accredit the suggestion for closing No. 10 to the Central School Board.

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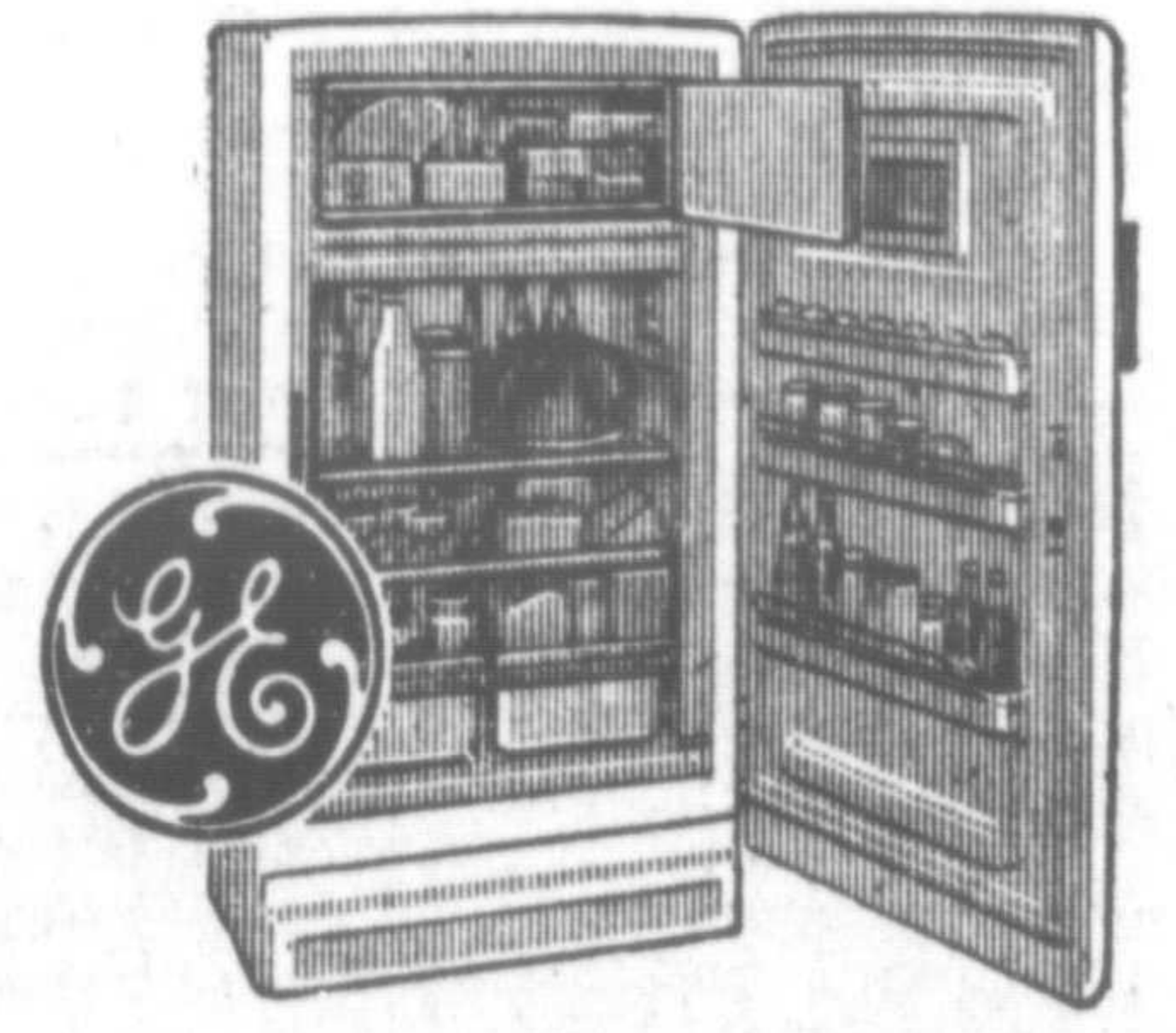

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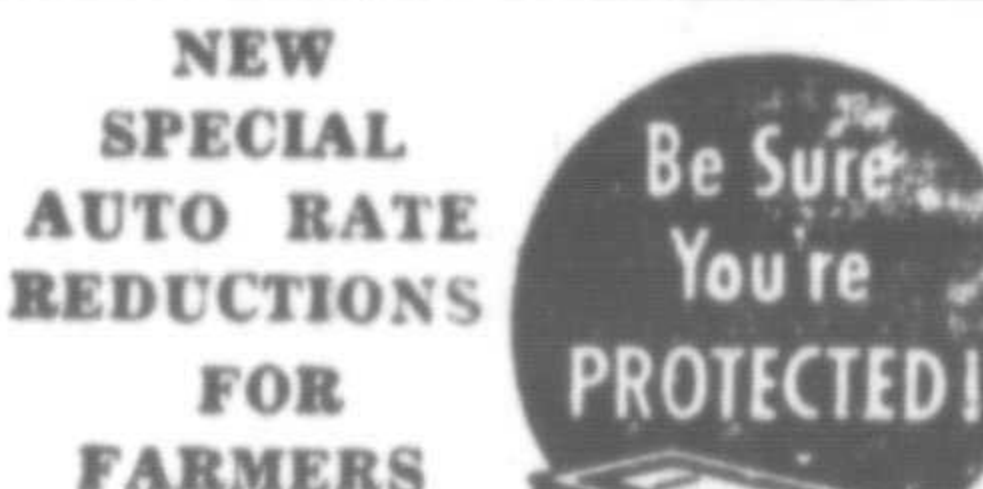

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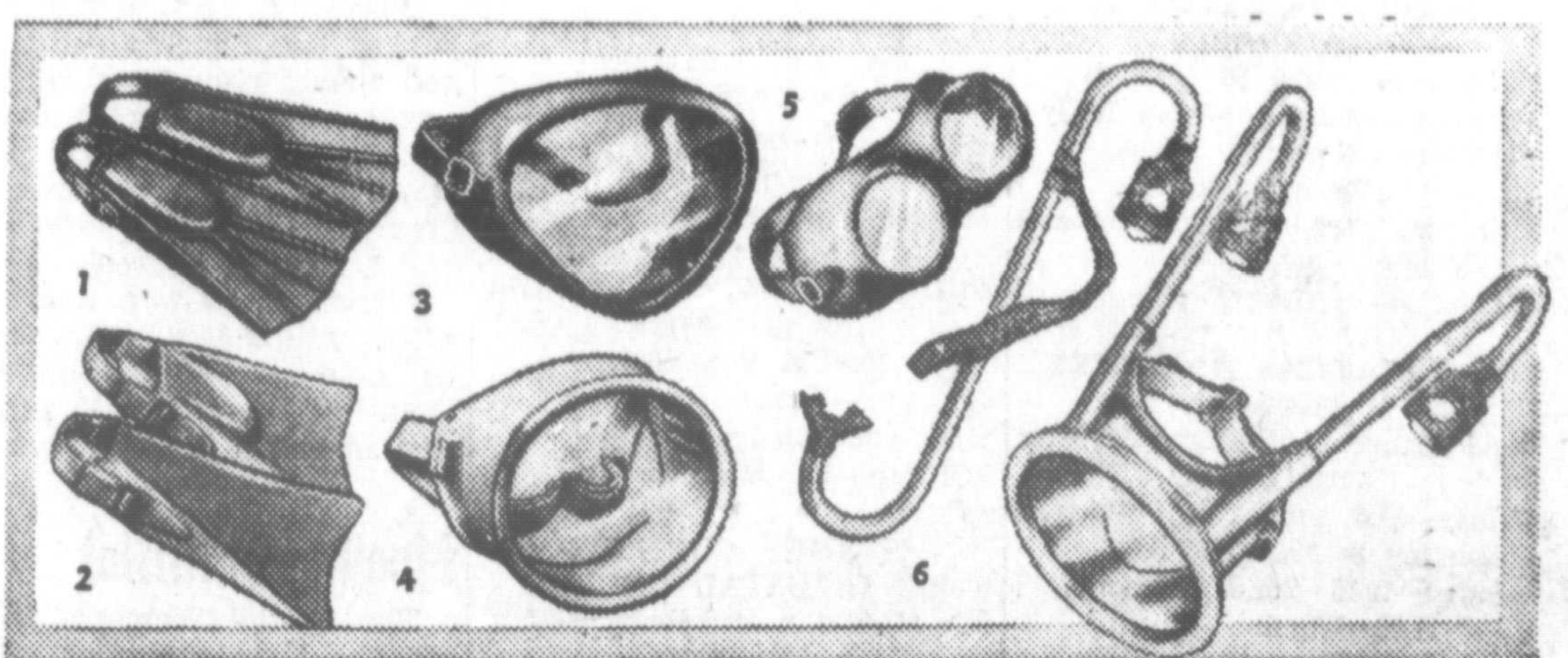
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
