UNITED STATES.

BOSTON, May 24th.—ANNEX ROGERS, JR.—The Worcester Argus furnishes the following additional particulars relative to the death of this man:—

We understand that Rogers for a week or more preceding his death, had been afflicted with false hearing, false sight, and other symptoms of hallucination similar to those which he is said to have manifested before his attack upon Mr. Lincoln. On Friday evening, during prayers in the hall leading from the main building to the chapel, he asked a person, who was not his regular attendant, for permission to go out; and was put off with the answer that the services would soon be ended. He then repeated his request to his proper attendant, and received a similar reply. Presently without any previous warning, he stepped upon a seat and sprang headlong through the window. The height from the ground is about 15 feet, and he probably fell upon his head, being found insensible. Rogers was remarkably agile and athletic; and so sudden was his movement, that his feet only were seen passing through the sash of the window. The noise was like the report of a gun; and some of the patients present still believe it to have been that which they heard. One lady says she dodged behind a seat for fear there should be another. Rogers remained speechless until he expired on Sunday morning.

OBTAINING AN APPOINTMENT.—If the following incident related in the correspondence of the "Paris Court Journal" be literally true, it certainly exhibits the effect of impudence, and the fear of reproach astonishingly developed. A worthy Minister indeed, to be intimidated by a scribbler!

Not long since, one of the Ministers is said to have received a visit from one of our celebrated feuilletonistes, when the following scene is reported to have taken place. "Monseigneur," said the visitor, "I crave a quarter of an hour of your Excellency's time, while I read a paper which interests you personally." The Minister graciously bowed assent, when the man of letters began to read a flattering biography of the Minister. "But it is too much," said the auditor; "I cannot derive all this praise." "Oh!" replied the journalist, "if your Excellency is not pleased with this biography, here is another." And without changing countenance he commenced a second as offensive and satirical as the first had been kind and flattering. The Minister was evidently embarrassed; the man of letters, profiting by it, said, with the utmost coolness and effrontery, "Will his Excellency choose between them? The occupation of a journalist is difficult and fatiguing; it would suit me far better to dictate protocols. If your Excellency has a consular post to bestow, the first biography can be published; if not, the second will appear." And without another word the visitor departed. A week had not elapsed ere a literary member of society received a diplomatic appointment, and the same day, in one of our first literary reviews, appeared a most interesting biography, extolling the public and private virtues of this officer of the crown.

MORE IRON WORK.—We have announced the building of iron ships, iron pulpits, iron light-houses, and now our foreign intelligence brings the news that an iron church is to be erected in Germany.

EXPORT TO ENGLAND.—Barque Lazon, Goodrich, which cleared at this port on Wednesday for Hull, has a cargo of 350 tons cattle bones.

NEW YORK, May 28.—CUBA.—However dreadful may be the example made of the persons engaged in the late conspiracy in Cuba, it is indispensably necessary. With the horrors of St. Domingo before their eyes, it is impossible for the authorities of Cuba to pass it by with indifference. It always has been the case that a revolt or conspiracy to revolt among the blacks to take possession of the Government involves the massacre of the whites—the females probably may be reserved for a worse fate. By striking terror among the rank and file of the slaves in the execution of their leaders we have the only guarantee of safety. We can hardly believe that the English Consul, Mr. Turnbull, was, or is implicated in this terrible catastrophe.

OBSERVANCE OF THE SABBATH.—SUPPRESSION OF NEWSPAPER HAWKING.—The grog shops and other dens for the propagation of vice and crime, being now closed on Sundays, the hawking of newspapers through the streets on that day comes next in order, and will, we are informed, receive the attention of His Honor the Mayor, and a large force of constables on Sunday next. It should be suppressed, and the efforts of the city authorities for that purpose will be sustained.

HAVTI.—The Schooner Hume, Capt. Conklin, in thirteen days from Maragone, arrived here yesterday. Capt. C. reports that on the 3d of May, the mulattoes had elected Gerreir, president, that the blacks were still carrying on war, under a person called General Pickett, (derives his name from his method of fighting with pickets or short sharp sticks,) and had taken possession of Maragone, Aux Cayes, Arcane, Jeremie, Laveau, and all the small towns west of Maragone, committing a great many massacres in the course of their attempts. The schooners Hume and Falcon had each taken three or four hundred fugitive mulattoes to Port au Prince. It was reported that Pickett was threatening an invasion of the latter place, as soon as he could muster his troops.

DISTRESSING OCCURRENCE.—On Tuesday afternoon last, the wife of Dr. Brantner, of Pottsville, having left her infant child, about 6 months old, asleep in her chamber, went below to attend to some of her domestic duties. Upon returning, she found a large cat lying upon the infant's breast, with its head near the child's mouth, as if in the act of sucking its breath. Upon examination the child was discovered to be dead, having met its death in this most extraordinary and horrid manner.

CANADA.—We are yet without Montreal papers of Thursday. The Albany Argus of yesterday does not contain any allusion to the rumors of a revolution which we gave on the authority of passengers from the frontier. We said yesterday that the story was improbable, although we considered it our duty to give it publicity.—Sun.

Frost in the west part of Pennsylvania has ruined the corn. The Macon, Georgia, Telegraph, of 21st inst says: Though Spring is scarcely half gone, we are in the midst of Summer—the thermometer ranging from 87 to 95 in the shade! In fact, there has been no Spring! the seasons having made but one step from Winter to Summer. For 8 or 9 weeks, we have not had rain enough to lay the dust in the church yard.

CHANCELLOR KENT, ON THE IMPEACHMENT OF JOHN TYLER.—In reply to a note of enquiry addressed to him, by the editors of the Courier, Chancellor Kent has written the following letter:—

"New York, 26 Union square, May 21, 1844. Dear Sir—I acknowledge your favor of yesterday, and I take the liberty to refer you to Story's Commentaries, vol. 2d, from page 252 to p. 273, or § 783 to § 804, for all the authentic information and authority that may be wanting. You will perceive that the impeachment Power over 'high crimes and

misdoanors" is very broad, as defined and practised under the sanction of the Common Law, by which it is to be construed and governed. I think there can be no doubt that the enormous abuses and stretch of power by President Tyler afford ample materials for the exercise of the power of impeachment, and an imperative duty in the House of Representatives to put it in practice.

SANDUSKY, Ohio, May 18.—HURRICANE.—On the 11th a storm broke upon us with great violence, doing more damage than any which has ever preceded it in this place. Among the buildings injured are the store and shed of Townsend & Lewis; the store occupied by Morgan & Co., Van S. King, J. K. Lockwood, G. B. Smith, and the unoccupied part of the Building in which Peck & Stapleton's hat store. These were partially unroofed, as well as the Wesleyan chapel; and several other buildings shared the same fate, the names of whose owners we do not know.

We learn that extensive damage is done to the timber in the woods in the vicinity.—[Clarion.] This tornado appears to have swept over a considerable portion of Northern Ohio. The Western Reserve Chronicle, published at Warren, says:

Huge forest trees were prostrated to the ground, and some farmers had all of their woodland swept clean of its standing timber. So far as we have been able to learn, the townships of Farmington, Bristol, Mecca, Fowler and Bezetta, suffered most in this country.—Fences were prostrated in all directions; and some cattle, sheep and horses were killed. A gentleman from Bristol, informed us, that upon going out after the storm had subsided, every thing appeared new and strange; his fences were prostrated to the ground, his forest had disappeared, and all in the space of a few minutes. In some sections where the forest trees withstood the force of the wind, entire sugar orchards were uprooted and destroyed.

NEW YORK, May 28.—Captain Conklin, of the schooner Hume, who arrived yesterday from Maragone, (a small port near Port au Prince,) St. Domingo, which place he left on the 14th of May, informs us that the ports of Maragone, Aux Cayes, Serimee, Lausane and Petreviel, were all in the hands of the rebels. A great number of the Mulattoes Mustee Quadrons had been massacred. The rebels were in considerable force, and were waiting reinforcements in order to attack the capital. In the event of its capture much blood will be shed. Capt. C. on the 5th of May, took on board of his vessel upwards of 400 women and children, and transported them to Port au Prince to escape the fury of the rebels.

The night the H. sailed the consignee came on board and was desirous of smuggling his family on board, as he stated affairs were momentarily getting more serious, and he was fearful there would be an indiscriminate massacre.

From the New Orleans Picayune, of the 19th May, DISASTROUS CONFLAGRATION!

TEN SQUARES LAID IN ASHES—BETWEEN TWO AND THREE HUNDRED HOUSES BURNED!—We are called upon to record the particulars of one of the most extensive and disastrous fires which has ever occurred in our city. Between 12 and 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, the flames burst forth in the carpenter's shop of Mr. Gott, near the northwestern corner of Franklin and Jackson streets, which, before they could be got under, spread to the adjoining tenements with frightful rapidity.

Since writing the above, we have heard it stated that the number of houses destroyed will not fall short of two hundred and eighty, and many think that three hundred will not cover the entire number. Hundred of families are thus left homeless and shelterless.

NEW YORK, May 29th.—CONFLAGRATION IN NEW ORLEANS.—The fire of the 18th inst., was one of the most destructive that ever occurred in New Orleans. 275 buildings were consumed. The devouring element by successive changes of the wind, which veered about capriciously, from N. E. to S. W., was carried from and to Canal and Common streets alternately, burning down Jackson street, Tremé, Marais, Villere, and Robertson streets, sheer home to Claiborne street, confining itself within the 2nd Municipality, between Canal and Common streets.

NEW YORK, May 29.—OUTRAGE.—This term of reproach was applied, in a paragraph which we copied the other day from a Canada paper, to the secret removal of a steambot from the Canada to the American side. We learn that the whole matter is of a private nature; that the abstraction of the boat, if so it can be called, was the act of one part-owner, who had some disagreement with the others; and that whatever may be the rights or wrongs of the case, there is nothing of a public or national character about it.—Com. Advertiser.

[From the Providence Transcript, May 29.] Last night, about twelve o'clock, a company of forty or fifty young men of this city attempted to create a disturbance among the Irish, by making an attack upon their houses with threats to burn one of them.—News of this coming to the city marshal, he immediately, accompanied by a strong body of the city watch, hastened to the scene of the threatened outrage.

When they arrived they found a crowd collected.—Threats were made and a few stones thrown. The police and watch remained concealed until they discovered those who appeared to be the ringleaders, and then rushed out and secured them. Two or three were locked up in the watch-house. Groups of men continued around the place until three o'clock this morning, but were closely observed by the police officers and a number of watchmen, who remained all night on the ground. The motive for these riotous proceedings—aside from the love of mischief and brutality which seems to be an active principle in some minds—was presumed to be a savage attack made late on Saturday night, by two men whom their speech betrayed as Irishmen, upon Mr. Gilman, as he was going home from his store. He was struck on the head with a club, but a quantity of papers in his hat so deadened the blow that he kept his feet and was able to defend himself, on which his assailants fled. On the same night two other citizens were attacked, probably by the same men, one of whom was arrested. There were strong symptoms of a riot on Sunday night, but the watch were active and maintained quiet.

U. S. SHIP PREDLE,

Aux Cayes, St. Domingo, May 7, 1844. This city is in the possession of the negroes, and the whole island is in a state of war, anarchy and confusion.

NEW YORK, May 29.—MUNICIPAL REFORM.—Our citizens are beginning to reap the advantages promised them by a change in the administration of the city government. The measures taken to preserve order and tranquility meet with the hearty approval of all good citizens. The closing of the grog shops on Sunday was commenced the first week after the new government was organized, and has since

been persisted in so efficiently that last Sunday very few of these places, even in the most retired parts of the city, were open. The Five Points never before presented such an appearance. Perfect quiet reigned there, and not a drunken person was to be seen. The measure taken to abate the intolerable nuisance, to which all travellers landing from steamboats have for years been subjected, from the riotous and brawling hackmen are matters for congratulation with all who have been annoyed or imposed on by them.—Every hackman is now obliged to remain by his vehicle and there wait till he is employed, and any infraction of the law in exacting more than the legal fare, is punished to the extent of the penalty.

The two reforms we have mentioned are well worth the effort made to change the city government; but we trust these are only the beginning. There are yet many abuses to be corrected and nuisances to be abated.

PHILADELPHIA, May 27, 4 1/2 P. M.—THE KENSINGTON MEETING.—Up to the hour of closing, the Native Americans of Third Ward, Kensington, are uninterrupted in their meeting, which assembled at 4 o'clock, and I trust no attempt will be made to disturb them.—Groups of Irishmen are scattered about in the upper part of the District.

The Sheriff has taken precaution to prevent any outbreak, having ordered out his whole police force, comprising several hundred persons. There are several military companies out, for what purpose I know not.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, (Old School) commenced its Annual Session at Louis-ville, on Thursday last. The Rev. Dr. Junkin, of Ohio, was chosen Moderator. The opening sermon by Dr. Spring, of New York, was very able.

EASTERN PROVINCES.

MIRAMICHI, May 22nd.—SHELDRAKE ISLAND.—Government, it appears, has decided on placing the persons afflicted with the Leprosy on this island. Several workmen went down on Friday to put the buildings in repair.

ST. JOHN, (N. B.) May 24th.—MELANCHOLY AND FATAL ACCIDENT.—We regret to announce the occurrence of an accident, near Stanley, by which Lieut. Garden, of the 52d Regiment, stationed at Fredericton, unfortunately lost his life. The particulars, as far as we have been able to learn, are these:—On Saturday last, Mr. Garden, and Mr. Burke of the 23d, accompanied by the two Messrs. Wigan, of Stanley, were driving on the road in that neighbourhood, when one of the traces gave way just as they were about descending a very steep hill; the horses becoming irritated, went off at full speed—the wagon was upset and all of the parties thrown out with great violence; Mr. Garden's head struck against a stone which produced concussion of the brain and fracture at the base of the skull; he survived but a few hours, and spoke but once or twice. The other gentlemen were severely bruised, but escaped without any very serious injury.

ST. JOHN, (N. B.) May 25th.—The Season in this vicinity has been generally cold, and notwithstanding that during several days the sun at noon has been warm and pleasant, yet the morning and evening air has been continually chilly. The weather, however, has been favourable for getting seed into the ground. This morning (25th May) we have a slight fall of snow in the city, and we understand that on Sunday morning last some of the high hills in the neighbourhood were covered with a wintry mantle.

MILITARY ROAD FROM HALIFAX TO QUEBEC.—Sir James Alexander, the principal engineer employed in surveying a line for this great undertaking of the British Government, arrived in St. John on Tuesday, and left town yesterday morning for the Bend of Petticoadie, where, assisted by Mr. McGill, a surveyor from Canada, and a party of ten men, he will commence his labours. We understand that the road is likely to pass through the centre of New-Brunswick, and will therefore prove highly valuable in opening up new situations for settlements, which will have the advantage of the road in their neighbourhood—along which, as has been before stated, Military Posts will be established at different points.

CANADA.

Supplement to the British Colonist, Toronto, May 28.

SIR CHARLES METCALFE DEFENDED AGAINST THE ATTACKS OF HIS LATE COUNSELLORS.

The Rev. EGERTON RYERSON takes this method of informing the Public, that he proposes to offer some remarks in defence of SIR CHARLES METCALFE, against the attacks of his late advisers, and to prove by their own testimony, given on different occasions, that His Excellency is entitled to the verdict of the country, on every count of the indictment got up against him.

Sir Charles Metcalfe may say to the People of Canada, as Themistocles said to the Athenians, who were incensed against him—"Strike but HEAR ME." And if the Public have heard six or seven hundred pages of accusations against Sir Charles, in the form of speeches, addresses, editorials and communications—it is believed they will do His Excellency the justice of hearing one hundred and fifty pages of calm reasoning in his defence.

Mr. Ryerson (unsolicited by any human being) has been prompted to this course by the recent "Address of the Toronto Reform Association to the People of Canada." If that address (sound in general principles) be true in fact and in insinuation, then Sir Charles Metcalfe all that is tyrannical and base, and the British Government is a compound of despotism and treachery; Sir Charles should be dethroned, and the Imperial Government should be hated and despised: and no general declarations of respect for the one or the other, can prevent such feelings from possessing the mind of every reader who imbues the spirit of that most insidious and calumnious address. The legal and constitutional connexion between the people of Canada and their Government may remain; but the moral connexion—the connexion of confidence and affection, the only connexion of strength and happiness—must cease to exist.

Mr. Ryerson's reply to the accusers of His Excellency, will be contained in ten or twelve numbers—to be first published in the British Colonist, afterwards in pamphlet form, occupying from 100 to 150 pages. The first number will appear in the Colonist of Friday next, the 31st instant, preceded by a prefatory address to the inhabitants of Canada West, on the present crisis, and stating the circumstances and considerations under which the author comes before the public on this momentous occasion.

Mr. Ryerson avails himself of this occasion to say, that the distinguished title which was conferred upon him some time since, has never been adopted by him, nor used in his household—that he thinks the old name is better known and more appropriate than the new one—that he likes new names no better than he likes novel doctrines.

Mr. Ryerson has not thought proper, under present circumstances, to accept the office of Superintendent of Education; nor has any political office ever been offered to him, and he is ready to re-

linquish any situation which he now fills rather than not accomplish this imperative undertaking. For if a Leonidas and three hundred Spartans could throw themselves into the Thermopylae of death for the salvation of their country, it would ill become one humble Canadian to hesitate at any sacrifice, or shrink from any responsibility, or even danger, in order to prevent his own countrymen from rushing into a vortex, which he is most certainly persuaded will involve many of them in calamities more serious than those which followed the events of 1837.

Those editors of Canada West, who wish BOTH SIDES of the differences between Sir Charles Metcalfe and his late advisers to be fully understood by the Canadian public, are respectfully requested to insert this notice.

KINGSTON, May 29th.—H. M. steamer Traveller was sold by auction yesterday at the Dockyard. She was knocked down to Mr. James Russell for the comparatively small sum of £2300. It is understood that there are two gentlemen most favorably known in the navigation of the Lake and River, connected with Mr. R. in the purchase. The Traveller will be fitted up immediately and placed on the route between Kingston and Toronto. (Chronicle.)

BROCKVILLE, May 30th.—Mr. Gawn Russell, the Coroner before whom the inquest was held in relation to the accident which occurred on board the Steamer Dart—the particulars of which were given in our last—writes us further, as follows:—"The man Hoople who got scalded on the Dart Steamer on the 16th inst., died, I am informed, at Kingston on Thursday the 23rd, at 9 o'clock, A. M. The parents of the lad Willis came to the place where he was interred the day after the calamity, and it is difficult to say which was the most affecting scene, the wretched boy before he died, or the anguish of the parents at the loss of their son. They reside about 8 miles north of Perth in the Bathurst District."

FIRE.—On the night of the 27th inst., we learn that the barns of James Sabine, Esq., about a mile above this town, were, with all their contents, totally consumed by fire. The fire was first observed about five o'clock in the afternoon, and was, as they thought, totally extinguished; but about 12 at night it again broke out, and all efforts to stay the flames were unavailing. This is the second time within the last two years, that Mr. Sabine has suffered in this way. One of the men while smoking in the barn, it is supposed, dropped a coal of fire from his pipe, which was the original cause of the disaster.

SHERBROOKE, May 30.—RAIL ROAD MEETING.—At a meeting of gentlemen held at the Magog House in this town, on the 21st instant, for the purpose of taking into consideration a projected line of Rail Road from Montreal to Boston, Captain JOHN MOORE, M.P.P., on motion of A. T. GALT, Esq. seconded by J. PENNOYER, Esq. was called to the chair, and G. R. ROBERTSON, Esq. requested to act as Secretary.

After the objects of the meeting had been explained by the Chairman, and its practicability set forth by several gentlemen, the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted:— On motion of Edward Hale, Esq. M.P.P. seconded by A. T. Galt, Esq.

Resolved 1. That to obtain a Rail Road extending from Montreal through the Eastern Townships to meet a line of Rail-Way now contemplated from Boston to the Province Line in Stanstead, is an object of the highest importance to the Province generally, and to the inhabitants of the Eastern Townships as a line of communication with the commercial and political capital of the Province.

2nd. On motion of Samuel Brooks, Esq. seconded by Alex. Rea, Esq.

That this meeting consider such an object of so great importance, and from the best data now in its possession sufficiently practicable as to justify every effort for its attainment on the part of the Agricultural and Commercial interests of the province.

On motion of L. C. Ball, Esq. seconded by Lieut. Wm. Lloyd.

3rd. That for this purpose it is expedient that a deputation of gentlemen immediately proceed to the Rail Road Meeting to be held at Haverhill New Hampshire, on the 29th inst. to communicate our views on this subject, and that the deputation be empowered to engage competent engineers in order to obtain as soon as possible a Survey and Estimate of a route from the province line to Montreal through the Townships.

On motion of John Felton, Esq. seconded by J. S. Walton, Esq.

4th. That gentlemen favorable to the undertaking be requested to pay such sums as they may be disposed to give for the purpose of defraying the expense of the Survey, into the hands of the Agent of the City Bank in this Town.

On motion of Joseph Pennoyer, Esq. seconded by R. D. Morkill, Esq.

5th. That this deputation consist of EDW. HALE, Esq. M.P.P., A. T. GALT, Esq. Com. of B. A. L. Co. and Capt. BENJ. POMROY, Esq. of Compton, and that they be requested to co-operate with the gentlemen who proceed from Stanstead to the meeting at Haverhill.

On motion of Alex. Rea, Esq. seconded by John Felton, Esq.

That the following Address be adopted by this meeting as an expression of its sentiments on this subject, and that the same be forthwith published in the Sherbrooke Gazette.

It being moved that the Chairman be requested to leave the Chair, Edw. Hale, Esq. being called to the same, it was moved that the thanks of this meeting be given to the Chairman and Secretary, for their able conduct on the occasion.

LATEST DATES.

The New York evening papers of the 29th May, contain accounts from Washington of the 25th. The proceedings of the United States' Congress contain nothing of importance.

It appears that the Great Democratic Convention which met at Baltimore on the 27th, had not agreed on a Candidate for the Presidency up to the evening of the 28th, when ten balloting had taken place. The two most prominent candidates put forward, were the late President VAN BUREN and General CASS. The last report was that they had nominated General JACKSON.

A Convention in favor of Mr. TYLER, the present incumbent, was held at Baltimore the same day, when he was unanimously nominated. Mr. CLAY is returned to Kentucky, and refuses attending any election meetings, or otherwise interfering in elections, since he was nominated by the Whig Convention.

We have nothing of interest from Upper Canada. The politicians continue busy in the newspapers; suppose facts and assert, without proof, any thing they think may forward their views and discredit their opponents; attempt to justify their own misconduct by recrimination of their adversaries, and by irritating and insulting language, are spreading dissension, which in the warmth of personal feelings and hatred can hardly fail to banish reason, and promote violence.

At Montreal they have been getting up political meetings in the country, to be attended by political agitators from the Capital; and in the old fashion of 1837, on Sunday after vespers.

Halifax and St. John N. B. papers of the 25th May were received yesterday. The sudden departure of the Admiral in the *Illustrious*, 74, with other ships of war, from Halifax for the West Indies, has been a subject of speculation in some of the newspapers.

Has the British Minister at Washington asked the Admiral for a squadron "of observation" in the Gulf of Mexico?

We are informed that in the case of the Queen against Patton and others, in the recent term of the Court of Queen's Bench, which we noticed in the *Quebec Gazette* of Friday last, the objection to the form of the action that "the proceedings were null and void," because "the action was not brought either by the Attorney or Solicitor General for Her Majesty," was not maintained; but that the fact having been put in issue by the defendants that Messrs. Lafontaine and Aylwin still respectively held those offices, the judgment of the Court simply ordered that proof should be given upon that point.

THE WEATHER has been fair since yesterday morning but with a cold north westerly wind. This morning there was hoar frost on some low grounds. Vegetation is not now more forward than usual at this season. We see by the newspapers that the frosts of the 21st and 22d May, extended from New Brunswick into the States of Pennsylvania and Ohio.

(From the Toronto Examiner, May 29.) We learn that the Governor General has formed his new cabinet, and that the nominations will be promulgated before His Excellency's departure from Kingston. The arrangements in the completion of the ministry are said to be the cause of the delay in the removal of the Seat of Government to the new metropolis. We have heard that the Hon. Mr. Morris will be Receiver General, the Hon. Henry Sherwood, Solicitor General West, and that the Hon. S. B. Harrison will not be the new Inspector General. Further rumour saith not.—Quebec Gazette.

[We have seen a great many things of this kind. The *Quebec Gazette* "learns" nothing from rumours.]

Montreal Markets, May 31. Ashes—Pots are coming in freely, and have been taken this week at 25¢ 3/4. They are now lower, and taken this week at 25¢ 1/2 to-day at 25¢. In Pearl's shipping prices have been sold to-day at 25¢. The arrivals are by no means so heavy in proportion as of Pots, and the price means are 25¢.

Flour—In the early part of the week the price settled down to 26¢ 3/4; and during the last two days there has been a little more enquiry for the article than has existed for a month or two—and several lots of the best shipping brands have changed hands at about that figure.

Grain—We have no large sales of Wheat to notice. An inferior lot, rather smutty, was sold at 57¢ 1/4, but a very prime sample would probably be worth 58¢ to 59¢. Peas are offering, and have been sold at 23¢ 1/2. Barley at 21¢ 1/2 per minute, but not much doing. The Barley at 21¢ 1/2 per minute for shipment is very large, not much under 200,000 bushels.

Freights—All the ships now on for London have, we believe, been chartered, but the rates have not transpired. To Liverpool, 5¢ 1/2 barrel for Flour is asked, but we understand that 4s 6d has been taken; 82¢ 6d for Ashes; and 8¢ 1/2 quarter for Grain. At which rate freight to Glasgow has also been engaged.

New York Market, May 29. Ashes—The market is steady at D. 31, and some poor qualities have sold at D. 25. Pearls dull at D. 6 1/2. Sumac—700 bags Palermo have been sold at D. 39. Sugar—The sugar market is very much depressed. Sales of Porto Rico at 5 1/2 a 7 1/2 cents, which is a decline.

Flour—The receipts of Tuesday were 9594 bbls. The market is very dull. Sales of Genesee at 61¢ cis less; Virginia D. 4.80; Michigan and Ohio D. 1.56; a 6.62 Troy County D. 4.87. New Orleans D. 4.62; Georgetown and Richmond County D. 4.87.

Provisions—Beef has fallen to the lowest point; there were sales at 27 1/2 a 25 for Country; City Mess 5 a D. 25. Pork is dull and low, sales at 63 a 61. Lard in bulk at 60 cents; kegs at 61. Coffee—The market is dull, sales of Brazil 6 1/2 a 7; Laguayra 7 a 7 1/2; Porto Rico 8.

Grain—Rye has fallen, and sales at 67¢ delivered. Oats plenty at 51 a 52; Corn is coming in freely, and is selling at 46 to 48¢. Molasses—We notice a continued activity in this article, and prices, which have advanced @ 7 cents within ten days, still retain an upward tendency. The sales comprise three cargoes Porto Rico, and one of St. Croix, together some 1400 hhd., to arrive here, and at New Haven; two cargoes Trinidad Cuba, here, (one for refining,) all on private terms; a cargo of 20,000 gallons New-Orleans, in assorted casks, 50 cents; 200 hhd. rice, and bbls. do. in lots; 30 hhd. Cuba Muscovado, 28¢; and 156 do. Porto Rico, 30 a 30 1/2 mos. A cargo of Matanzas, just arrived, was sold privately, and another remains unsold.

Mananas, May 18.—There is an active demand for Muscovado Sugars and the Stock in market very small, and except what may come from Sagua there is but little remaining on plantation. Matanzas, 16th May, 1844.—No Molasses for sale here, and at Cardenas it has gone up to 4 rials. Sales of Molasses, (Porto Rico), at Boston, at 32 1/2 cents.—(Boston Advertiser, 29th May.)

Philadelphia, 29th May.—Molasses.—No arrivals and but little in first hands. Prices tending upwards. Cuba Sugar Market.—Havana, 16th May, 1844.—Sugars here are firm at former quotations and will doubtless command an advance in a few days. The great number of vessels waiting for weeks to complete their cargoes for Europe, and the orders from that quarter being unusually large, with the present state of the Sugar market in Europe, clearly indicate that this article of our produce must necessarily advance. Planters are anxious in supplying our commercial houses with the orders already contracted with them for, and will not enter into any definite arrangement for further orders at present.
