

The following SIGNALS will be made on the Signal Staff when Vessels are coming into the Harbour of Quebec.

ONE Ball	—	—	for one	Square Rigged Vessel.
One Ball half hoisted	—	—	for two	ditto ditto.
Two Balls close	—	—	for three	ditto ditto.
Two Balls separated	—	—	for four	ditto ditto.
A Pendant of any colour		—	for five	ditto ditto.
A Pendant under one Ball		—	for six	ditto ditto.
A Pendant over a Ball half hoisted		—	for seven	ditto ditto.
A Pendant under two Balls close		—	for eight	ditto ditto.
A Pendant between two Balls separated		—	for nine	ditto ditto.
A Flag of any colour		—	for ten or more.	

The above will be hoisted at the Eastern yard arm, if the vessels are coming up the River.—If they are coming down the River, at the Western yard arm; and as soon as the vessels can be described, one or more of the following Colours or Pendants will be hoisted at the mast head.

- An Union for a Flag Ship, with or without a Squadron.
- Ditto with a Red Pendant over it for a Two-decker.
- Ditto with a Blue Pendant over it for a Frigate.
- Ditto with a White Pendant over it for a small armed Vessel.
- A Blue Pendant for a Merchant Ship.
- A Red Pendant for a Merchant Brig.
- A White Pendant for a Top-sail Sloop or Schooner.

Enemy's Signals.

- A French Jack — — for an Enemy's Fleet.
- A Blue Pendant under a French Pendant, for an Enemy's Ship.
- A Red Pendant under a French Pendant, for an Enemy's Brig.
- A White Pendant under a French Pendant, for an Enemy's Sloop or Schooner.

NOTE, no Signal will ever be made with those describing Enemy's Vessel's, except they are in our possession; in that case, an Union Jack will be hoisted over the Signal.

Signal of Distress.

- A Ball at the Mast head, in addition to the descriptive Colours of the Vessel in Distress.

NOTE, if any other Signals should be hoisted, either on the Garrison or Signal staff, they do not relate to Vessels, but are hoisted for a particular purpose.
