DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

OTTAWA, July 16.—As a prelude to the real business of the House to-day, there was quite a bit of shuffling over the bill to amend the Customs Act. This led to the Opposition to resurrect the case of Boyd, Byrd and Campbell, of Montreal, and incidentally that of Ogilvie & Co., which was under the consideration of the Department of Justice with a view to criminal proceedings against the guilty parties, and both of which have been thoroughly thrashed out.

The first proposal that was made by the Department shall act as appraisers, Mr. McCarthy moved an amendment that a Board of Experts should be appointed, to be composed of five members, one in each province and one in each of the four great cities, and a third in hardware, a fourth in leather and the fifth in paints and chemicals. The discussion generally was the same lines as that which has taken place on the question, and the Government's opposition to the proposal was summed up in the statement that the present practice, which is to employ to obtain the opinion of experts in all lines and not allow experts in one line to judge in another line, which he knows nothing.

An incident of the debate occurred when Mr. Martin clearly over-stepped his ground. A question was put to the Comptroller of Customs and he refused to reply and explain. Mr. Martin raised the point that he had already spoken and was out of order.

Mr. Martin was merely wishing to know the date of the meeting of the House. Mr. Foster said it was a most unprecedented thing for a responsible head of a Department to be refused permission to answer a question asked by the Opposition. Mr. Martin asked the question in this view and Mr. Martin withdrew the objection, though, of course, he had been technically notified by Mr. Speaker.

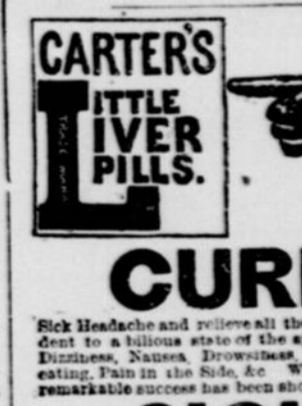
