## Current Events Club Held Lively School Debate

"Are we expecting too much from our schools?" "Are teachers free to teach?" "Should we have federal aid to education in Canada?" these and the educational set-up in the province of Quebec were the substance of a panel discussion before the Current Events Club of Westmount Senior High School at its regular meeting last week.

Bruce MacFarlane in his talk on the freedom of teachers stressed the fact that teachers have to use moderation in political and religious discussions. In his speech on "Are we expecting too much from our schools?" Skip Warnok emphasized the fact that most parents are inclined to load too much of the responsibility of educating their children on the schools. Valerie Ross endeavoured to show why there should be federal aid to education in Canada. Doug Turner gave a detailed account of the unique organization of schools in this province. A very lively discussion followed, including a popular demand for a wider range of subjects.

The retiring president, Danny Usher of 11-Bb, perhaps the most dynamic officer in the four years of the club's existence, was presented with a silver mounted and suitably engraved gavel in appreciation of his services this past year.

The manager of the Montreal Royals Baseball team, Wally Austin, will be the speaker at the concluding meeting of the season next week.

Commission for Westmount, H. C. Jay, of the Quebec Home and School Association, Max Ford, a former principal of the school, now a prominent businessman, and E. Pitcairn, principal of Queen's School.

Mr. DeLalanne, who spoke at the business session which followed the entertainment, said that the Westmount Commission had not yet reached a decision on whether they should turn complete administration of the schools over to the Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal. He said, "We think joining of all the boards is inevitable, but when it will come we cannot say." There was no compulsion for Westmount to join the Protestant School Board for Greater Montreal at the present, he said. No questions were asked by those present.

The operetta staged by the junior grades in which about 40 children took part was the highlight of the evening. Miss Luba Sluzar, music teacher, was responsible for the musical production, with Mrs. S. Melnick having trained the dancers. The scenery and costumes which evoked much admiration were designed and made by the class teachers.

The choir of the senior grades 5 and 6, numbering about 50, concluded the entertainment with a dramatized song version of the life of the composer, Stephen Foster. The singing was excellent as was the work of the commentator, Ted Harrison, a student in 6B. Master of Ceremonies was Harold Downie also of 6B who showed good showmanship. Nicole Wanner, another pupil, was soloist and handled her part well. Miss Luba Sluzar directed the choir and Mrs. G. Harterre accompanied.

Following the concert, the children were shown movies in another part of the school, during which the business of the annual

## Reddy Hospital Receives \$94,833 From Blue Cross

At the 9th Annual Meeting of the Quebec Hospital Service Association, which operates the Blue Cross Plan in the Province of Quebec, it was revealed that 600,000 Quebec residents are now subscribing to the Blue Cross hospital plan, and that 80% of that number also subscribe to the surgical plan.

During 1950, a number of residents of Westmount were admitted to the Herbert Reddy Memorial Hospital, and Blue Cross paid \$94,833.00 on their behalf. Blue Cross has now paid well over \$21,000,000.00 since 1942 for care given Quebec residents. 85 hospitals located in Quebec are now affiliated with Blue Cross, and 1913 Quebec doctors are participating in the Plan.

Although hospital and medical costs have steadily increased since 1942, when Blue Cross was first established, Blue Cross has weathered every increase, has decreased its rate of operation expense to a low of 9.1%, and has maintained its financial reserves at a sound level. Reserves now stand at \$1,431,000.00.

The Blue Cross Plan now has nine years' experience, and this will prove of great benefit to the public in the years to come. Hospital and medical protection is undoubtedly the form of insurance or protection which has the largest utilization. During 1950, it was established that 127 out of every 1,000 Blue Cross members were admitted to hospital.

## School Union Undecided De Lalanne Tells Roslyn

Mrs. G. C. Liersch, 55 Forden Street, was re-elected president of the Roslyn Home and School Association at the recent annual meeting.

J. A. De Lalanne, chairman of the Westmount Board of School Commissioners, who attended the meeting, told those present that certain parts of the administration of Westmount Protestant Schools could probably be better carried out under the proposed plan for administrative union with the Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal.

But, he told the meeting there were other aspects not so favorable to the plan and the Westmount Board has not yet made up its mind to accept the union.

Mr. De Lalanne said that the fact that the members of the Montreal Protestant School Board, who form the nucleus of the Greater Montreal board, were appointed by the City of Montreal and the Provincial Government rather than elected by the rate-payers was a factor that might weigh against the union idea. Also, he believed, Westmount teachers preferred the system of supervision now in force in Westmount schools to that in force in the rest of Montreal.

Mr. De Lalanne asked whether there was any point he had not covered to the satisfaction of those present, but no questions were forthcoming.

Mrs. G. C. Liersch, president, thanked Mr. De Lalanne for coming to the meeting and for his explanation of the proposed school changes which she said had been the cause of much discussion in Westmount.

## General Ritchie Sends Telegram to Col. Knox, R.H.R.

Lieutenant Colonel J. W. Knox, M.B.E., of 420 Clarke avenue, Westmount, regimental commandant of the Black Watch, received a wire on Monday from General Sir Neil M. Ritchie, K.C.B., K.B.E., D.S.O., M.C., A.D.C., chairman of the British Joint Services Mission in Washington, and Colonel of the parent Black Watch Regiment, congratulating Col. Knox on the fact that the Black Watch (R.H.R. of Canada) had been selected as one of the Canadian regiments asked to form a company in the special brigade designed to form part of the European force.

General Ritchie's telegram read as follows:

"The news that a Company of the Black Watch of Canada is to proceed to Europe has been read with great pride and satisfaction. Pride particularly in the knowledge that you have been singled out for this duty to represent your city overseas. Satisfaction in the appreciation that you will add to the laurels and fame of the Regiment.

"I hope I may have the opportunity of seeing you before your departure. You have my very best wishes."

It will be recalled that General Ritchie recently visited the local Black Watch regiment, and was honored at a ceremony held in the Bleury street armory.

Col. Knox is quite enthusiastic over the response to the call for volunteers and expects that the Black Watch company will be up to strength at an early date. Recruiting is proceeding daily at the armory.

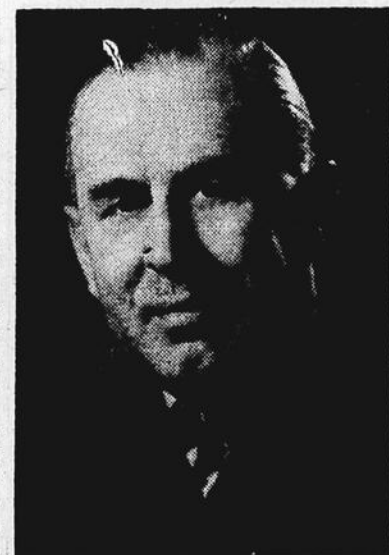
## "Toujours la Politesse" — Damages Steps, Drives Off

## Religion Helped By Science Says Rabbi H. J. Stern

Religion and psychiatry are "help-mates, not harm-mates," and both come to terms in insisting that life must have meaning, Dr. Harry J. Stern said in his sermon at the regular Sabbath service in Temple Emanu-el, Westmount, Friday night.

Speaking on "Science, Psychology and Religion," he said that these three are the central influences on human life today. Religion is the oldest, since it is practically coincident with the experience of mankind, he added.

While science has made miraculous strides, its authority is being questioned today. "Its power of redemption is questioned and it is no longer holding the confidence of men. Science has no values, conscience, or feeling. It must be controlled by some influence wholly beneficial."

Psychology, said Dr. Stern, is an outgrowth of science and has done great good, but it has its limitations. Some of the finest psychologists are today calling upon people to return to religion, for religion gives value to life.

As science needs religion, religion also needs science, the rabbi contended. "Science without religion makes man a brute; religion without science makes man a fanatic. Science gives sight; religion gives vision. Science describes; religion prescribes."

## Atmosphere Of English Inn Not Exported—Richardson

Maple Leaf Wing, R.C.A.F. Association met on Wednesday night in No. 401 Squadron Mess, 4450 Sherbrooke Street, Westmount, and heard Stuart Richardson, of the Northern Electric Company, speak on "The Taverns of Old England".

Many things have been exported from England, he said, but nobody has yet exported the atmosphere of an English Inn.

President A. G. McNiece, thanked Mr. Richardson for his most interesting discourse which he said brought back memories to those who had served overseas during World War II. Many of the taverns mentioned were well known to Canadian flyers, he said.

Mr. Richardson, who is an authority on the subject, has made a study of the English Inn, its origin, and its effects on English history.

The speaker said that there was a tradition in the early days of England that food and rest should be given the traveller. This was provided at the house of the village squire. He was known in these days as "the lord of the lands." As years went by the title was abbreviated to "landlord" — a name which is still in use.

Mr. Richardson stated that in the period that the early English churches and cathedrals were being built it became necessary to provide accommodation for those making pilgrimages. This necessitated the building of inns on church property. So the English churches and inns grew up side by side. Many still in existence give evidence of this alliance. We have inns named "The Angel," "The Mitre," "The Five Loaves," "The Cross Keys" (for St. Peter) and "The Salutation" for the Virgin Mary.

The speaker went into great detail regarding the strange names of English pubs. No name was given at random. There was always a reason for giving a pub a particular name.

Mr. Richardson expressed the thought that the pubs had given

## Red Feather Challenge To Citizens Rotary Told

Stuart Richardson, of Northern Electric, a member of the Public relations committee of the Welfare Federation spoke Wednesday at Westmount Rotary on "The Challenge of the Red Feather". Richardson outlined the establishing of the Red Feather Speakers Bureau which aims to supply competent speakers on Welfare Federation topics. Since the establishing of the bureau two months ago over a dozen speaking dates have been arranged and many other requests have been received for speakers for the fall and winter. The Speakers Bureau is operating on a year round basis.

Mr. Richardson went on to outline the establishing of the Welfare Federation in Montreal and the tremendous effect it has had on the community. "We are fortunate," he said, "in having established in Montreal something which is considered as a model in other parts of this continent." In addition, he said, "We are also fortunate in securing the interest and the time of those who administer the organization from the top level and also because of the energy and enthusiasm of the professional staff."

"That we have been able to establish an organization like this is a feather in our caps, a Red Feather. Red Feather means that we admit certain responsibilities which go with citizenship. It is an indication that we reach for the good life, that we recognize hardship, pain and distress and that we endeavour to locate the cause and provide the cure."

"Red Feather is a challenge to every citizen. It calls for the best effort of all those who have the interest of this community at heart and who are willing to volunteer their time on its behalf," said the speaker.

The speaker was introduced by James Lawson and thanked by Jack Colton. Philip Page introduced and welcomed the visiting Rotarians.

**New Stamps to Commemorate Anniversary**

**Green Fingers Come By Work Claims "Bob" Eaglesham**

"People aren't born with green fingers," said "Bob" Eaglesham, head gardner at the Westmount Greenhouses in an interview with The Examiner.

According to Bob, green fingers are something you either grow or they just get stained that way from handling a lot of plants.

Bob Eaglesham is the man who ought to know, for he has had his hands in the soil ever since he was a boy on his father's small farm in his native Scotland.

Green fingers it is that Bob has. To verify this all one has to do is to pay a visit to the Westmount Conservatory. There one will see part of his handywork. Or if you\*

were one of the 30,000 who visited the Annual Spring Show you would have seen the finished product in full flower.

Bob's strong hands are the trade mark of his craft. They are thick, calloused and ingrained with the soil he works, but they are tender and caring when it comes to nursing along the young green shoots.

A native of Dalmellington, Ayrshire, he came to Canada in 1928 and from that day to this he has worked for the City as a gardener. For a number of years he was outside working in the parks and playgrounds. Since 1935 he has been inside in the greenhouses with the exception of a five-year period when he was away serving with the Air Force. The last two years he has been head gardener.

As the head gardener Bob has the overall responsibility for all sections of the greenhouses although his own bailiwick is the tropical house.

Round the year there are more than 100,000 plants to plant, water and fertilize. 30,000 of these are what are called annuals, petunias, azinias, astors, lobelia, alysum, etc., being used for the parks. Another 15,000 are grown for the Spring flower show, 5,000 to decorate the flower clock and 1,000 are mums. The remainder are spread through the greenhouses on year around show.

Bob's pet project in the conservatory is the orchid display. He prefers the tropical plants because they are colorful, a little out of the ordinary and "make you feel as though you are down in the tropics."

According to him the art of gardening is something that is passed on from generation to generation. Not so long ago the older gardeners used to guard trade secrets but nowadays pass them freely on to the younger ones.

The tricks of the trade said Bob are knowing what type of soil to use, how to feed the plants, keeping them clean, how to spray for insects, how to repot and knowing when the plant reaches maturity.

Bob lives in Chateauguay Heights with his wife and four children. "When asked if he was ever going to go into business for himself, he smiled and said he had a big enough job where he was.

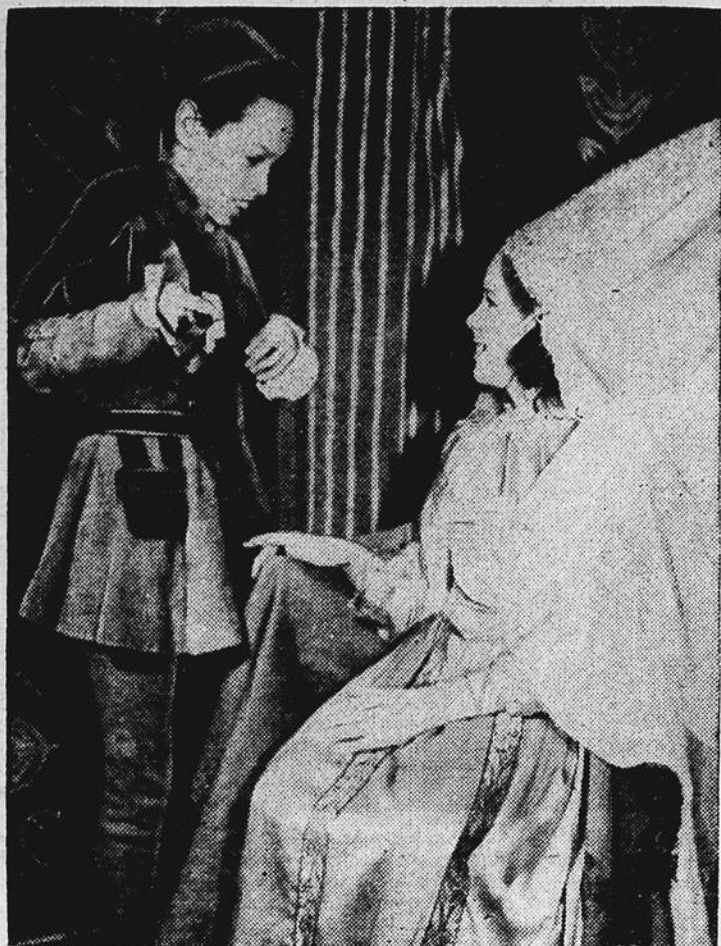

some qualities to the English people. He thought the very existence of the pub with its communal character affected those who frequented its bars and brought some life, some warmth, some friendship, into their otherwise frequently dull lives.

For hundreds of years the English pub was the heart and centre of English life. News from the outside world came to the inn and went from there to the countryside. The inn was the meeting place for the early lodges, courts of law, coroners juries, town councils and so on. When a proclamation was received from the King it was first posted on the door of the inn on the theory that sooner or later everyone would pass that way.

An English inn has a character all its own. Many things of an English character have been ex-

ported. Nobody has yet satisfactorily exported the atmosphere of an English Inn, Mr. Richardson said.

Church music by boy choristers from Anglican churches in the province of Quebec was presented in a unique non-competitive festival on Saturday afternoon in Trinity Memorial Church.

## Y.M.C.A. Work In Korea Carries On Despite War

"The Y.M.C.A. has ceased to exist in Northern Korea. In the South, its postwar expansion has been rapid and spectacular. Since war ended in 1945, 15 new city, town and rural Y.M.C.A.s have been organized, bringing the total up to 19. Secretaries now number 87. Student Associations operate in 18 colleges and universities, and in 54 high schools..."

Such was the picture in last year's report on Korea. But this picture was shattered by bombs when war broke out on June 25. Again, Y buildings were turned into ruins. Y members became refugees, casualties, martyrs. Three board members of the Seoul Y.M.C.A. were among 30 Christian leaders arrested by the Communists, marched out of Seoul and probably executed. Two secretaries of the staff were killed in the battle. So were the wife and child of another staff member.

As it could, the Y.M.C.A. plunged into relief work. At Pusan, 36 secretaries — 15 of them volunteers — joined to help refugees in the area. Later they organized a War Time Emergency National Committee to guide relief and plan re-establishment of regular work when it is possible.

### Staff Hid Under Floor

When the Communists first took the southern capital Hyun Dong Won, of the Seoul Y staff, hid under the floor of a friend's house by day, did Y work by night. Bombs destroyed the Seoul Y buildings; yet all through the summer the Y.M.C.A. cared for 60 orphans, some of whom lived in the Y ruins and organized themselves under the boys' work secretary. After the UN forces retook Seoul, a small Y building, 12 by 21 feet, was built of rubble in the ruins of the old. Humorously, hopefully, Y members erected a sign: "The smallest Y.M.C.A. building in the world, the ??-est Y program in the world". No news has arrived regarding this Y since Seoul fell a second time to the Communists.

Most startling was the rebirth of Associations in two North Korean cities during the brief UN occupation. At Hamhung, Y work sprang up after a 10-year blackout. At the Communist capital, Pyongyang, the Y had been closed by the Japanese in the 30's; the Communists had suppressed it when it started in 1945; but during 40 days of freedom in 1950, a new Y here grew spontaneously to 2,000 members and began classes, held concerts, helped wounded soldiers, and cleaned up the city!

Hopeful of the future in Korea, the International Committee of the Y.M.C.A. has set up an emergency project to provide \$150,000 of aid to this movement. At year's end, a World Services secretary flew to Pusan as a concrete pledge of assistance. One of the first things he did was sit in

Applicants must have junior matriculation or its equivalent. Initial rank on appointment to a commission will be second-lieutenant.

## CROSSING GUARDIAN PLAN JUSTIFIED

### Westmount Children Better Protected Than In Other Municipalities

Westmount parents have a very real reason to thank the City Council for having instituted the system of "Crossing Guardians" for the protection of children going to and from school, in view of the heavy toll of accidents involving children which has recently occurred in Montreal.

Credit must also be given to the traffic squad of the Westmount Police Department who have been very alert in curbing speed

artists and dangerous drivers. The number of cases of individuals charged with traffic infractions appearing before the Westmount Recorder in recent weeks is proof that our police are on the job.

To those who were rather skeptical as to the success of the crossing guardian plan, the results achieved, and the absence of serious accidents must have been convincing.

It is hoped that it will be found possible to increase the number of guardians so that more intersections in the vicinity of our schools may be protected. This is one expense with which few will disagree. A child's life saved, or a child saved from permanent disability and disfigurement, is well worth the spending of a moderate sum from our taxes.

The best investment Canada has is in her native born children — the men and women who will lead the nation in the next two or three decades.

A suggestion received by the Examiner is that during the summer months crossing guardians might be posted in the neighbourhood of playgrounds which are mostly used by very young children. This is perhaps one service which could be performed by volunteer mothers.

### Christian Science

From this it follows that Adam was not the ideal man for whom the earth was blessed. The ideal man was revealed in due time, and was known as Christ Jesus. Through discernment of the spiritual opposite of materiality, even the way through Christ, Truth, man will reopen with the key of divine Science the gates of Paradise which human beliefs have closed, and will find himself unfallen, upright, pure, and free."

Mtl. School for Nursing Aides Announce New Extension Course

To broaden the experience of the Nursing Aides and to make them of assistance in a wider field, arrangements have been concluded for a two months Extension Course in the care of convalescent and non-critically ill children. This Course, which is being given at the Children's Memorial Hospital, has been made possible through the co-operation of Miss Dora Parry, R.N., Director of Nursing, and Miss Madeleine Flander, R.N., of the teaching staff of the Children's Memorial Hospital. It is available only to graduates of the Montreal School for Nursing Aides, and only after the completion of at least six months experience in a general hospital. The course consists of organized classroom instruction, correlated with ward experience in both infants' and older children's departments and instruction will be on a level with the six months course given at the parent school.

Aides Value Proven

The establishment of schools for the training of auxiliary nursing groups is on the trend of modern nursing. Almost every province in Canada is following this trend. In each case they are trying to meet the particular needs in their respective communities.

The Montreal Nursing School for Nursing Aides which was opened in 1948 as an experimental school is now an establishment institution. Five classes have completed the course and the sixth one is in training at the present time.

The course of instruction and experience as outlined by the Association of Nurses of the Province of Quebec is definitely slanted towards preparing Nursing Aides to assist in caring for the sick in the wards of general as well as convalescent hospitals. As it was thought the community needs could be served best in this way. Following the course, the Aides are privileged in having an additional six months experience as salaried employees in the wards of one of the general hospitals under whose auspices the course is given. The Aide then receives her certificate and pin from the school and though, it is hoped she will continue in the hospital work, she may change to some other branch of the work if she so desires.

Requirements for Entrance

Requirements for entrance to the Montreal School for Nursing Aides are as follows:

Applicant must be 18 years of age or over; must possess minimum educational standard of one year high school; must be in good health and present a doctor's certificate to that effect; and must have aptitude for the work.

Classes are received yearly, September and March. Course is of six months duration - and

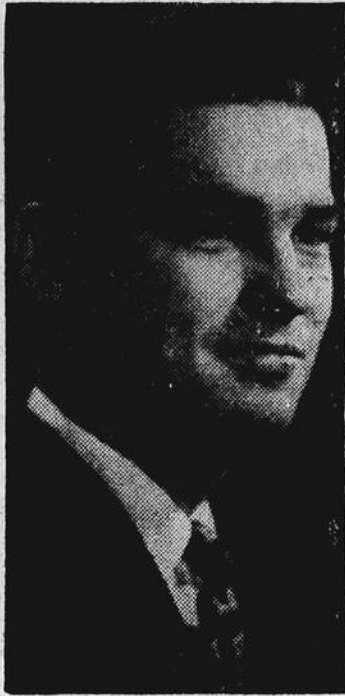

## Curried Veal Lends Oriental Air to Dinner

With the aroma of spices wafting though the kitchen conjuring up a picture of Oriental mystery, Curried Veal may prove to be an exciting entree to prepare and serve. The savory veal surrounds a mound of crisp toasted rice cereal, which gives very much the same effect as a true East Indian pastry, always served with their famous curries. Our western substitute for chutney might be spiced fruits or preserved. So be certain to include one or more of these delicacies with this main dish.

And finish the meal with a bright touch of color by serving Raspberry Sherbet in Meringue Shells.

#### Curried Veal

- 2 cups sliced onion
- 1/2 teaspoon minced garlic
- 1 cup diced celery
- 3 tablespoons fat
- 1 teaspoon curry powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 cups milk
- 2 cups diced cooked veal
- 1/2 cup quartered almonds
- 1 cup chopped pimiento
- 3 cups oven-popped rice cereal
- 3 tablespoons melted butter

Cook onion, garlic and celery in fat until lightly browned. Combine curry powder, salt, pepper and flour; stir into first mixture. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly. Cook until smooth. Add veal, nutmeats and pimiento, simmer about 10 minutes. Combine rice cereal and butter and heat thoroughly. Arrange toasted cereal in center of platter; surround with Curried Veal. Serves 6.

#### Raspberry Sherbet In Meringue Shells

- 1 envelope plain unflavored gelatin
  - 1 tablespoon cold water
  - 3 tablespoons hot water
  - 1 box quick-frozen sweetened raspberries
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1/4 cup lemon juice
  - 2 egg whites
- Soften gelatin in cold water, dissolve in hot water. Mash raspberries, after allowing them to thaw. Squeeze through cheese cloth. Add milk and lemon juice. Add gelatin mixture to berry mixture. Place in refrigerator tray and freeze to a mush. Remove from trays, beat until smooth, then fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Return to refrigerator trays and freeze.

#### Meringue Shells

- 4 egg whites
  - 1/8 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 cup sugar.
- Beat egg white until foamy. Add salt. Gradually beat in sugar. Shape rounds of meringue about 4 inches in diameter on unglazed paper on baking sheet. Build up sides about 1 1/2 inches using pastry tube. Bake in slow oven (275 degrees F.) about 50 minutes. For serving fill meringue shells with raspberry sherbet.

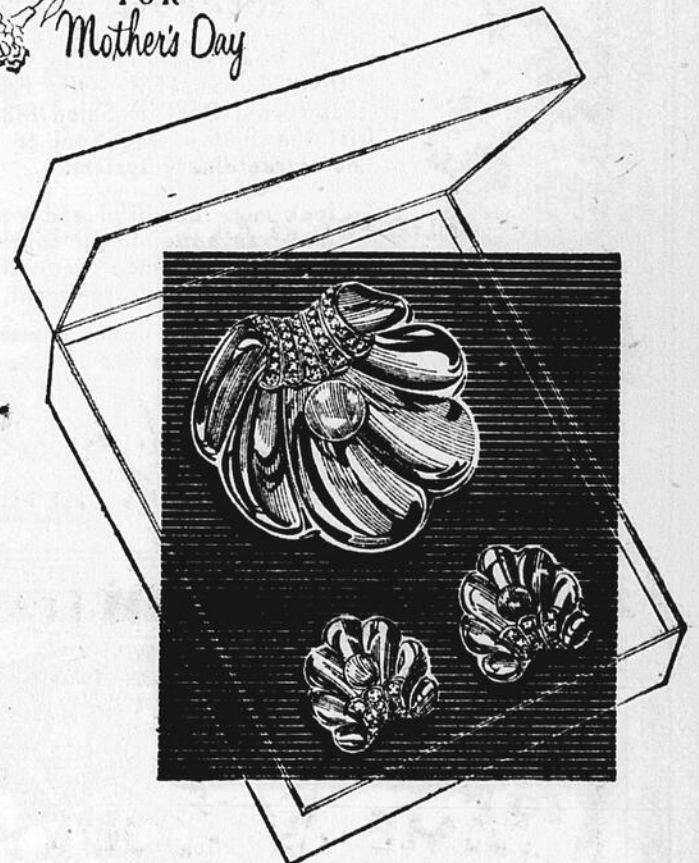

**Grilled Duckling Is Ideal For Open Fire Meal**



DUCKLING HALVES broiled over outdoor grill.

For that open fire meal, now that the spring urge is on you, grill halves of duckling.

Fresh killed duckling is on the market now, and quick-frozen ducklings are available at frozen food counters under brand names of leading meat packers.

Depending on the heartiness of appetites to be served, plan half a duck per person for hungry folks, or a quarter per person for more restrained eaters. Wash the duckling in cold water and dry carefully. Cut off neck and wing tips. Cut duckling in half, or quarters, and cut out the backbone. Arrange pieces of duck on rack. Place over the prepared oven heat, about 15 inches above the coals, with the cut side, or inside, down. Let grill for 15 minutes. Turn and continue cooking for another 15 minutes. Brush all over with a seasoning sauce and let grill a minute or two longer. Because the fat drips out steadily as the duckling broils, there is not much point in basting with a sauce until the duck is done. However, when the duck is half done and turned, sauce can be brushed over the cooked side.

**Seasoning Sauce:** The duckling pieces can be brushed with a Chinese type of honey glaze, consisting of ¼ cup strained honey, 1 teaspoon kitchen bouquet and ½ teaspoon salt per duck, or with a more highly seasoned Spanish type of barbecue sauce such as the following:

**Barbecue Sauce for Grilled Duckling**

(Makes about ¼ cup sauce, or enough for 2 ducklings)

One tablespoon butter, 1 small clove garlic, minced, 2 tablespoons minced onion, 2 tablespoons wine vinegar, ¼ cup catsup, 3 tablespoons honey, 1½ teaspoons kitchen bouquet, ½ teaspoon dry mustard, ½ teaspoon salt.

Melt the butter over moderate heat. Add garlic and onion. Let cook about 3 minutes. Add vinegar, catsup, honey, kitchen bouquet and seasonings. Stir to mix well. Bring just to boil. Use for basting grilled duckling.

**Cold Storage For Food Could Be Answer To Housewife's Prayer**

By CAROLE McDONELL

Despite inflationary prices, there is good news these days for anyone interested in food, and who isn't? Cold storage is rapidly becoming known as the best way of preserving just about everything, but its most outstanding use of late is, however, in keeping food for weeks, months, and sometimes years.

Housewives who are frozen food fans will remember how warily they approached the counter the first time, and how delightfully surprised they soon were at the freshness and flavour of the item. What many of them still do not realize is the properly handled foods retain, through their frozen state, all nutritional values that they had before processing. All this means that fresh fruit, meat, vegetables, etc., can be bought at the best times and kept throughout scarce or expensive seasons. It means that amateur hunters, fishermen, and gardeners can keep their beloved bounty for gradual consumption by themselves and families instead of having to quickly part with it for fear of its deterioration. And, best of all, it means that important meals can be planned months in advance.

Of course there are a couple of catches to all this. First of all, every item to be stored has to have a particular high quality and stage of maturity if it is to emerge triumphantly from its Big Sleep. Secondly, few foods "take" well unless they are frozen expertly and very quickly. Besides home freezers are mostly still very expensive and must be very large to hold whole animals or food crops.

**Big Freeze**

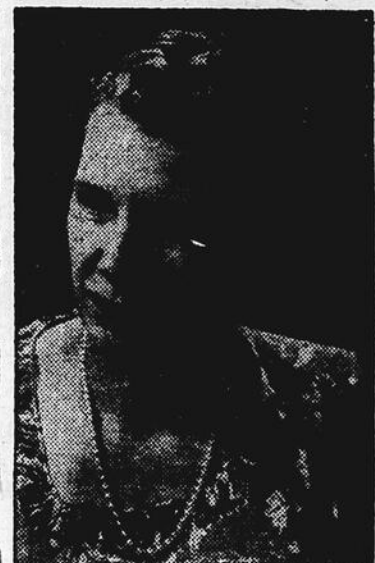
But again there is a bright side, and it is found in the huge, modern locker plants such as the ones owned by Gatehouse and Sons Inc. We decided to see for ourselves the mechanics of a system which has applause from local home makers, and upon invitation from Mr. Robert Manuge, the company's courteous and efficient young sales manager, we paid a visit to the spacious facilities at their Greene avenue store in Westmount, and literally went into a deep freeze.

As Mr. Manuge remarked, "If the people only realized how simple it is." For the consumer, perhaps, but not for Gatehouse's. There are storing rooms, freezing rooms, smoking rooms (smoking meats, of course!), curing rooms, rooms for cleaning and preparing, and more rooms. The huge locker rooms, in which we were most interested, contain 1,000 units, each capable of holding about 190 pounds. More than half have been "leased" already, and the bulk of their contents changes with the seasons. Last fall there was 15,000 pounds of deer meat on the premises, and the company is now bracing itself for the onrush of duckling and salmon. Then will come berry and garden crops.

**Buy in Season**

The outstanding feature of the plan is that reasonable goods can be purchased at Gatehouse's in large quantities and at lower

prices. A quick look into a bachelor's locker showed a small horde of broiling chickens. Another customer has been drawing out the various cuts from a whole carcass of beef.

The process itself consists of ballast freezing the prepared, cellophane-sealed item at a temperature of about 35 degrees below zero, after which it is kept at zero until ready for use. A numbered record is kept of each item, so that the housewife can order by telephone if she wishes. A regular newsletter keeps her informed of the latest values and developments.

We tried the frozen fried potatoes the other day and were so agreeably surprised that now we're going to experiment on the frozen pastry dough. Don't know about you, dear readers, but we're now a confirmed frozen food fan.

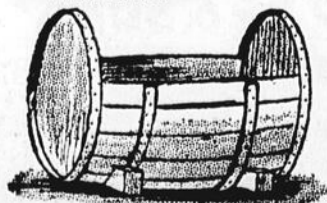

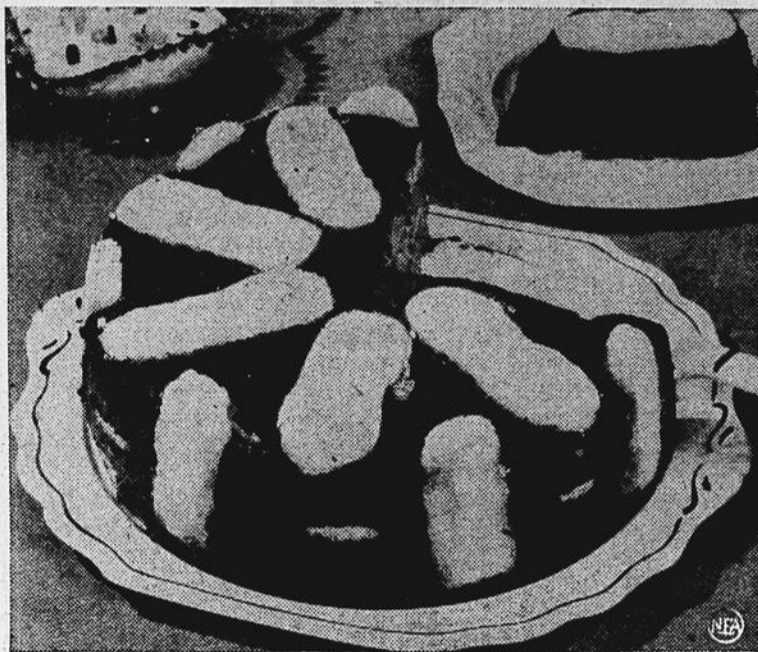

**Bits Lady Finger Dream**  
(Serves 6)

Combine in top of double boiler and cook over low heat, stirring constantly until chocolate is melted: one package (1 cup) chocolate bits, 2 cups milk, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Beat with rotary beater until blended.

Combine and let stand for 5 minutes: one tablespoon unflavored gelatin, 1/4 cup cold water.

Slowly stir a little of the milk mixture into 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten. Stir into remaining milk mixture and cook over hot, not boiling, water until slightly thickened (4 to 5 minutes). Add, and stir until dissolved the softened gelatin. Chill until mixture begins to set. When almost set fold in 3 egg whites, stiffly beaten, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Line round pan with lady fingers. Fill with chocolate mixture. Chill until firm.

Top with whipped cream if desired. Note: For a party, or large group of people, double the recipe and mold in an 8-inch spring form.

For a supper party in honor of mother on Mother's Day, here's an easy but delicious and different ham mold.

**Ham Mold, New Orleans Style**

One envelope plain gelatin, 1/4 cup water, one 3-ounce package cream cheese, one 10 1/2-ounce can condensed chicken gumbo soup, 1 cup ground cooked ham, 1/4 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise.

Soften gelatin in water. Place cream cheese in a saucepan. Stir to soften. Slowly add soup and mix well. Heat until cheese is blended. Add gelatin, then stir until dissolved. Cool. Fold in ham and mayonnaise. Pour into greased molds. Chill until firm.

where special class pupils carried out school monitor duties with much efficiency and pride. His emphasis on the deep satisfaction derived by special class teachers from the progress of their pupils was corroborated by two such teachers present in the audience.

Open forum followed Mr. Perks' talk.

Professor Noad introduced and also thanked Mr. Perks.

**J. W. Perks Tells Of Progress In Education Of Retarded Pupils**

A comprehensive survey of what is being done to help children who are unable to keep up with their companions in regular classes, was given at the second public meeting of the Association for the Help of Mentally Retarded Children (AHMRC) which was held recently, the chairman, Mrs. M. L. Wollock, presiding. Guest speaker was J. W. Perks, Education Officer of the Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal, whose subject was "Education of Mentally Retarded Children in Public Schools". Remarking that he would speak from experience in the schools, rather than on a psychological basis, Mr. Perks said that progress was marked in facilities for these children, and that a change of attitude had taken place towards the problem in the last 25 years.

Mr. Perks went on to say that the percentage of children unable to keep up with regular classes ranged from 9 to 11% and that the characteristics of these children are highly important to professional observers and parents. Some have an underdeveloped nervous system, are slower and less energetic — these traits being often confused with laziness. At times language difficulties and poor personal habits make their social life difficult. Weakness in reasoning power may cause repetition of mistakes. They are at a disadvantage in holding their place in their age group, and are open to suggestion other than good. These factors may result in emotional strain and anti-social behaviour, or, at times, a complete withdrawal into themselves.

It is possible, Mr. Perks encouraged, for these children to be helped by their teachers. These special teachers must start by recognizing the limitations of their charges, and have a deep personal understanding of their individual characteristics. Their greatest need, they will find, is a sense of security. In this environment they quite often happily apply themselves to achievement according to capacity. The worst danger is boredom. Interest must be invited and held. While this is true of all children, it is especially true of slow children.

**15 Special Classes**

Special classes, Mr. Perks went on to say, are in existence in the British Isles, Canada and the United States. Here, in Greater Montreal, where numbers of pupils in the schools warrant, these classes are formed. In 1929, this city had two such classes. Now there are 15. There is an outlook for expansion of that number. Special class children are not segregated from the other children unless it is considered advantageous; and they attend classes in their own district so that they go along to school with the others, thus creating as little difference as possible.

Mr. Perks went on to explain the judgment involved in placing pupils in special classes. Teachers estimate children in their charge, and when necessary, consult with the Principal or Psychologist, and then with the child's parents. Parents, he said, generally cooperate with sympathetic explanation.

**Westmount Auxiliary of M.G.H. Will Hold First General Meeting**

The first general meeting of the newly-formed Westmount Branch of the Women's Auxiliary of the Montreal General Hospital is to be held at Victoria Hall on Wednesday, at 2.30 p.m., under the chairmanship of the president, Mrs. H. V. Driver. Other officers of the branch are: Mrs. S. A. MacDonald, vice-president; Mrs. Howard I. Turner, recording secretary; Mrs. H. Graham Ross, corresponding secretary; Mrs. J. D. Peters, treasurer. Committee chairmen are: Mrs. Ronald Redpath, sewing; Mrs. J. G. Brierley, volunteers; Mrs. C. P. Reaper, membership.

It is hoped that all members of the Auxiliary who are residents of the West End and who might be interested in participating in the work of the Westmount Branch, will attend this meeting.

Some, however, do not completely understand.

The classes, with 15 to 20 exceptional children each, are held in classrooms well decorated with bookcases, workbenches, tools, etc. There are often a radio and phonograph. Washbasins afford opportunity for patient emphasis on good health habits.

Teachers of special classes are selected for their sympathetic understanding. They receive at least six weeks training in retardation and handwork — many at the Ontario College of Education.

Special class instruction is largely individual — about half academic and half craft work. Reading is taught at the child's own pace. Here Mr. Perks told what transformations take place when the young people realize the ability to read. Other subjects comprise simple arithmetic, speech and geography, (with maps and drawings). Handwork yields sensory or motor training. Outstanding forms here are raffiawork, woodwork, sewing, leatherwork, metalwork, etc. The training here is on a social and recreational basis, with attention to sound, form and colour. In a homelike atmosphere, the young people gain from music, art work, and simple dramatics.

**Novice With Paints Can Beautify Glass Tray**

An opportunity presented itself to me, says a reader, when we received, as a wedding present, a plain glass tray with oak handles and frame. To me it appeared plain and austere, and the thought of painting it suggested itself, but I was just a novice with paints. What I finally did could easily have been done by a child, yet the result seemed quite professional.

I secured a needlework transfer pattern, about the size of the tray. Using a piece of gummed paper, I secured the transfer pattern to the top side of the glass. I then purchased some lacquer paint and painted the under side. I traced the pretty pattern—wild cornflowers and scarlet poppies—taking care to apply last the colors that would normally be used first.

For example, in painting the poppies, the black outline, black centers and black strokes on the Next came the yellow stamens, and lastly I filled in with scarlet the whole of the petals. The secret of getting a clear picture is to let each color dry first before another is added. Sometimes pictures in magazines make good patterns, too.

**C. A. C. Reports**

... On Maple Syrup Grading . . .  
 . . . More Branch Activity . . .

The Maple Syrup Season is here again and thousands of Canadian housewives will be buying this delightful and distinctive Canadian food. Out of these thousands of housewives many will not get Maple Syrup at all! They will part their money and receive in return some product made of sugar and water with a maple flavour. This will probably be sold to them by door-to-door peddlers professing to be farmers selling direct to the home. The cans will have no special labels and certainly no distributors name on them.

The Canadian Association of Consumers Quebec Provincial Branch points with pride to the fact that the Province of Quebec has taken the lead in enforcing the grading of maple syrup. Of course the Dominion Government has long had grades, but unfortunately the producers do not have to use them. In Ontario there is no Provincial requirement for grading at all and the same situation exists in some other provinces. So we have the very confusing picture of overall Dominion Government Grading which is not compulsory, Quebec grading which every attempt is being made to enforce, and other provinces where no regulation exists. The Ontario Provincial Branch of C.A.C. could certainly help the consumer by starting a demand for grading under provincial rules.

In the meantime here are the grades as they exist for Quebec consumers today. Dominion Government grades are Canada Fancy, Canada Light, Canada Medium and Canada Dark. Quebec grades are similar with the addition of the letters "AA", "A", "B" and "C". Thus with both markings the syrup could be labelled "Canada Fancy AA", "Canada Dark B" and many other possible combinations. Trying to figure out some of these gradings would be nearly as bad as figuring your partner's answer in some of the Bridge Conventions. Don't you think that if women were responsible for the grading systems, that they could evolve something simpler? Why not just say "Number One", "Number Two" etc?

**Why Not?**

Another of our Branches is really getting to grips with Consumer Problems. The Lachine Branch has sent in some resolutions to the Provincial Branch which will be forwarded to the National for consideration. One of these had to do with the need for the women's point of view if it is again necessary to conserve materials on the civilian front. Parts of this Resolution read as follows:

"Whereas during the last war, some control legislation, presumably designed to conserve materials, actually did the reverse;

"Whereas a woman with intelligence and imagination, experienced in bringing up a family on a limited income would understand where true economies could be made;

"Be it resolved that the Lachine Branch of the Canadian Association of Consumers urge the Quebec Provincial Branch . . . to petition the Dominion Government . . . to appoint such women on every body formed to control matters pertaining to civilian goods."

Isn't it a peculiar feature of Canadian Life, that, while our economy is increasingly geared to women's needs and women's points of view, Canada has fewer women in public life than any other of the Western Democracies? Your Reporter feels very strongly that Canada would be better prepared on the home-front if her women took a greater interest in the National Housekeeping of the Country.

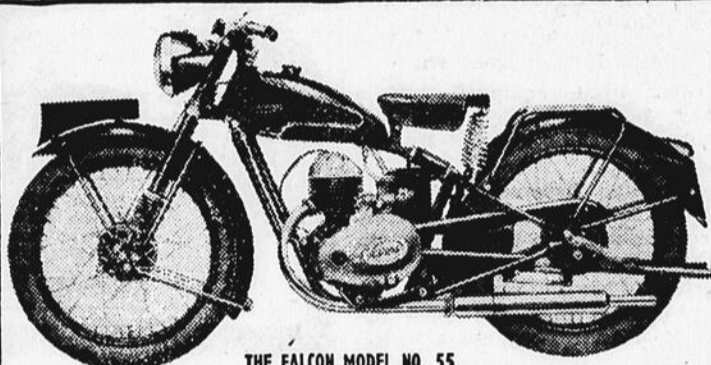

The early start this season due to the dry weather has raised the hopes of local followers that the All Stars will be able to extend the famous visitors.

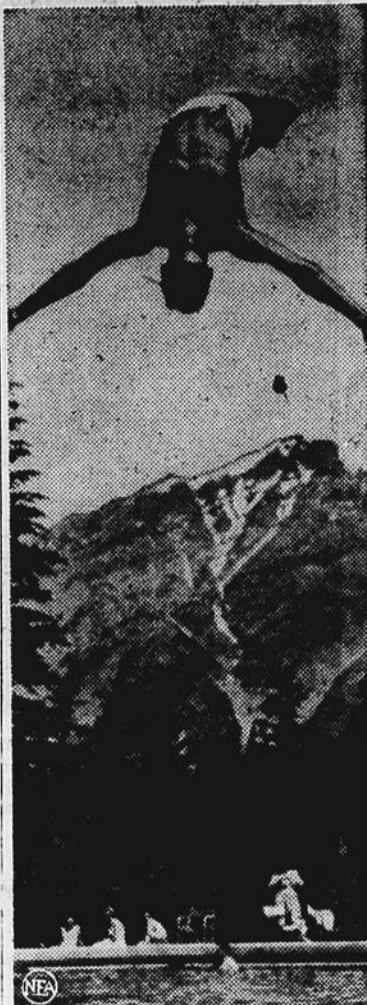
In any event soccer lovers will be treated to an exhibition of the dribbling code and shown the finer touches of the game by the Fulham players.
