Pro-Cons Elect Patrick H. Irwin

Patrick H. Irwin was elected president of the Young Progressive Conservatives of St. Antoine-Westmount at the annual meeting of the association held on Thursday, 6th January. He succeeds J. Wallace Beaton, now employed in France. In reviewing the activities of the past year, Mrs. Margaret M. Rogers told the meeting that the club's decisions on several important Canadian problems were now embodied in the declaration of policy of the Progressive Conservative Party.

Mr. Irwin reaffirmed the purposes of the group, which, he said were (1) to familiarize young men and women with Canadian affairs and problems, (2) to discuss and decide upon policies designed to solve these problems and (3) to take democratic action to have these policies made effective. "We are most anxious to have many young men and women of the district join in our activities. The future well-being of Canada will soon be in our hands, so we must prepare now for that task," the new president concluded.

Other officers elected were: Mrs. Margaret M. Rogers, first vice-

president; Alan H. Brown, second vice-president; Rene Pouliot, secretary-treasurer; J. Kenneth MacDonald; and E. E. Chambers.

Following the meeting the film "Fortress of Freedom" was shown, which depicted highlights of the Progressive Conservative National Convention at which George A. Drew was elected leader of the party. Forest fire prevention and textile manufacturing were the subjects of other films shown.

Thumbnail Sketch Of J. S. Cameron

James S. Cameron, newly elected Mayor of Westmount, was born in Stellarton, N.S., and he joined the Northern Electric Company, where he is now vice-president, in 1910 as a factory engineer. He became the company's first plant superintendent in 1914 when the Northern Electric and Manufacturing Company and the Imperial Wire and Cable Company Limited were amalgamated.

He was subsequently superintendent of the cable shop, assistant general superintendent, telephone division manager and, after being supervisor of manufacturing for some time, was made assistant general manager of manufacture. His appointment as vice-president (manufacturing) was announced shortly before last Christmas.

Mr. Cameron was educated at Pictou Academy and he graduated from McGill University with a B.Sc. in Mechanical Engineering in 1908.

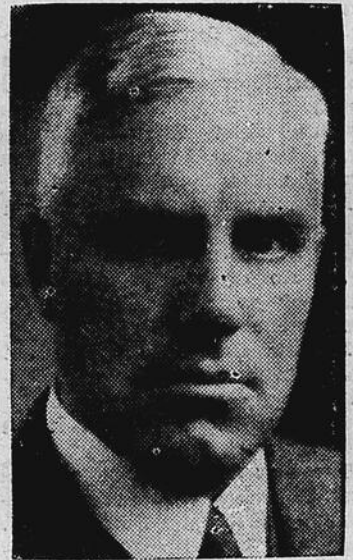

A Prophet In His Own Country . . .

John Hampshire could find no outlet for his creative ability and flair for automotive design in Canada, his own country, so he set out one day in 1935 from his home at 53 Chesterfield avenue and headed for New York. Today, he is in the front rank of outstanding U.S. industrial designers.

Early in the spring, National Breweries will put into its interurban delivery service three new semi-trailer trucks, the design of which will make second glances by passers-by a commonplace occurrence, and these trucks shall pay tribute to the genius of John Hampshire.

Mr. Hampshire, now 38 years old, lives in Westport, Conn., and he was recently in town to visit his mother and to spend a few days on the ski trails of the Laurentians.

Besides his work for National Breweries, Mr. Hampshire is now designing equipment for another Canadian company, but under the contract terms, he is not at liberty to divulge any information, although he does say it is for one of the largest firms in the land.

The new Breweries trucks will have fairly orthodox cabs but their bodies will be distinctly modern. They will be panelled with aluminum and finished in

the familiar green of the Black Horse trucks now in use and will carry about 21,000 pounds of beer, or 500 to 600 cases of pints with 24 pints to a case.

They are now being built in Toronto and the first three in the series will be brought to Montreal for finishing in the National Breweries garages. Cost of the bodies is reportedly \$12,000 alone.

They hope to put more of his trucks on the road eventually so, when you see something ultra-modern in brewery trucks, you can say, with civic pride: "That was designed by John Hampshire. He's a Westmounter."

A FIGHT WITH AN OCTOPUS

Here's an interesting little story from the BBC's current London Letter:

Sir Arthur Grimble, in a recent BBC programme, told of a fight with an octopus. He has had a great dread of these fearful fish since childhood but it had lain dormant for years until when he was serving as a district officer in the Gilbert and Ellice Islands, he watched two islanders at their business of catching and killing octopi for food. This fish, termed a decapod because he has two short arms in addition to his eight long ones, anchors himself in a niche on the lagoon reef a few feet below water and stays there, looking for some tasty morsel to pass nearby, when he strikes and holds the victim inescapably in his suckers.

The Gilbertese hunt these abominable fish in pairs, a dangerous job which they take very lightly. One man acts as bait, the other as killer. The bait dives near the lurking decapod and is caught in the tentacles, which seek to pull him into his niche. The killer then dives down, snatches at the octopus, jerks his pinioned colleague smartly backwards and so tears the decapod adrift. Immediately the bait gives a kick which brings him to the surface with the decapod clinging to him. He turns on his back and exposes the beast for the kill. The killer grabs the great fish's head, from behind, turns the face towards himself, plunges his teeth between the bulging eyes, and bites down and in with all his strength. The decapod dies instantly. The suckers release their hold and the partners string their catch on a pole and set off to get the next one.

Sir Arthur asked many questions as to how the job was done. The boys explained the simplicity of the operation and, as he was known to like swimming and fishing, their courtesy impelled them to offer him a chance to join in the fun. He could not refuse, for a district officer cannot afford to show fear of doing what the islanders regard as ordinary work.

"I hope I didn't look as yellow as I felt when I stood to take the plunge", he said.

He described his encounter with the fish saying, "I remember chiefly a dreadful sliminess with a Herculean power behind it. Something whipped around my left forearm and the back of my neck. In the same flash something else attached itself high on my forehead and I felt it crawling down inside the back of my singlet. My boyhood nightmare was upon me.

THE GREEN MIRACLE

Plants actually think.

Hard to believe isn't it? But it's true. Maybe they don't think in the same way we humans do, but there are many scientists in this world today who are prepared to risk their careers to back this statement.

Plants can see.

In various experiments made by botanists in an unnamed country it has been proven that plants have eyes with which to see. In one test the plants reacted to various colors of light, preferring dark shades for light. Small eyes were discovered on the branches and stocks of many of the plants, and

even though they were nothing but small cavities covered with a thin, but transparent skin, they reacted in much the same manner as its human counterpart.

Plants Can Move

The most common example of this statement is the Sensitive plant, an easily grown greenhouse plant that "withers" or "droops" when touched. The plant seems to protect itself from its enemies by imitating a dead plant. Other examples are the insect eating plants, the venus fly trap, the pitcher plant, etc. Many people believe that the whole plant kingdom is always on the move, but at such a slow pace that it is practically invisible to the human eye.

Even today, many relics of this fallen kingdom hold a controlling position on old terra firma. Take grass for instance. Try doing without it. And the palm tree (not quite as important). There are many others that need not be mentioned.

A walk through the tropical room of the Westmount conservatory will bring you a little closer to nature. Try and name a few of the strange plants and flowers there; see if you don't remember such old friends as the sugar cane, the coffee plant, bamboo, and even a bread fruit plant. They are all there, and many more. Just a few more examples of nature's green miracles.

Canadians Laid Basis For World Health Organization

At an open meeting of the Westmount Branch, United Nations Association, Dr. Léon Gérin-Lajoie traced the formation of the World Health Organization. In 1945, the Canadian Medical Association presented to the Canadian Government a plan for the formation of a Health Division under the United Nations. This plan was favorably received and the C.M.A. were asked to prepare it for presentation at the U.N. conference. As this plan for world health was the only one submitted containing concrete suggestions, it was adopted as the basis of discussion.

It was soon found that there was a distinct interlocking of interests between the infant W.H.O. and the other agencies of the U.N. Representatives of these others began to attend as observers. The I.L.O. and the F.A.O. were early participants. They realised that health was a great factor in the production of food and manufactured goods. UNESCO was interested because better nutrition and health were necessary before peoples' minds could be influenced, he explained.

Many commissions were set up to study existing problems, such as standardization of diagnosis, International Pharmacopeia, anti-toxins and laboratory practice. A plan has been developed between F.A.O. and W.H.O. to develop an area where people are under-nourished, agriculture primitive and health sub-normal. This area is ten million acres in extent and the cost would amount to about two million dollars, the doctor continued. Disease control and improved agricultural methods would work for improvement in the lot of the people, and would act as a pilot experiment which could be copied in other backward areas.

It is a sad commentary on the apathy of the world that this comparatively small sum is not yet forthcoming, he said.

Mr. Baker was named president of The McArthur Chemical Co., Ltd., at that time a C.I.L. Subsidiary, in 1940. He retired from Canadian Industries Limited last year.

World Service In Action

SYRIA

From many parts of the world reports reach Geneva Headquarters concerning the opening up of new Y.M.C.A. centres. Writing recently from Beirut, Ibrahim Chermayel describes the difficulties and the remarkable development of the new Association of which he is General Secretary. Originally founded in 1937, but re-established as recently as 1945, this Association is already actively at work among the youth of many national and religious backgrounds in Palestine.

His report is the first milestone in the history of a young National Movement, for it is less than two years since the French Na-

tional Alliance handed over to the Lebanese Movement full responsibility for this Beirut Association — an Association which has since maintained a growing programme of activities amongst youth.

In addition to the reading room with current periodicals in English, French, and Arabic, there is a growing library, and night classes and public lectures are held, whilst the Y.M.C.A. Rover Patrol has recently undertaken responsibility for the inoculation of the whole village of Chanai against typhoid fever. A number of joint activities have been organized by the Polish and Lebanese Y.M.C.A.s and by the Y.M.C.A. - Y.W.C.A. Over £3,000 was raised by this Association in their recent campaign with another £350 from membership subscriptions.

RAPID RECOVERY IN BRITAIN, HOLLAND

Just returned from a three-month tour of key European countries, Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., Chairman of the Share Through CARE Committee and Vice-President of the American Association for the United Nations, reported at a press conference early this week that the people of Europe are filled with apprehension about the future.

"The question uppermost in everyone's mind," he said, "is 'Will there be war?' Despite this apprehension, however, reconstruction is going on amazingly well. They are putting tremendous energy into solving their own problems. But they have a real appreciation of their own weakness and that, without our help, those problems are insurmountable."

"There is a great need," Fairbanks stressed, "for assurance that America will continue its interest. That America will con-

tinue to help with food and material in the tremendous problems which the Europeans themselves are working desperately to solve and which they can overcome only with our help."

In Italy, Fairbanks said, he found the country still poor but remarkable for its mood, energy and greatly revived productivity. In Rome he distributed CARE parcels to unemployed people living in caves. He found the people and press very receptive to both American organizations which he represented.

In Holland Fairbanks reported an impressive record of reconstruction. The slums in Amsterdam, were as neat and clean as a pin. Rubble has been cleared away and the war damage was evidenced only by the gaps. Both Belgium and Holland, he said, were extremely optimistic about the Benelux Agreement.

In France he found the picture more confused. They are being continually bombarded by extremely opposing viewpoints.

It was in Great Britain that he found the most remarkable progress. "England will recover in a few years the strong position it occupied before the war, given any kind of break." Its reconstruction is exciting to see and it is visible in the streets, the factories and throughout the country. Production is surpassing itself daily. The children are healthy. Though there is still austerity, there is the added feeling that the austerity program is worthwhile."

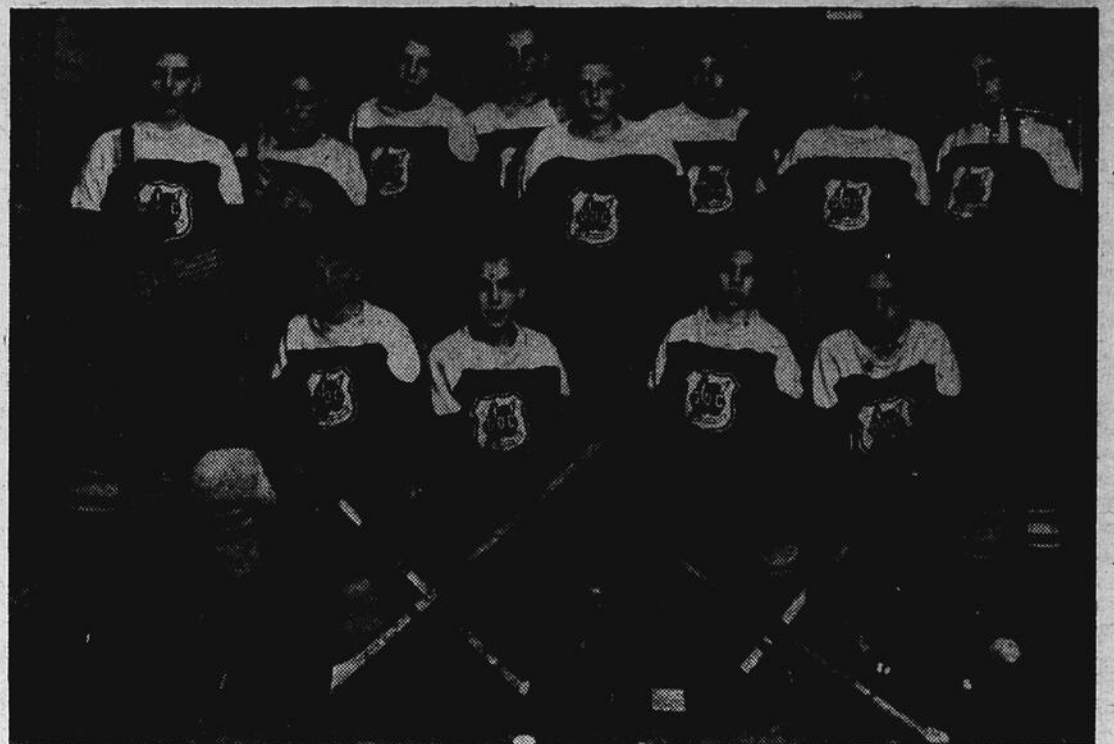

KING GETS CHANCE

Toronto seems to have finally stolen a march on Montreal in the boxing field, with Lt Arthur King, Dominion and British Empire lightweight champion slated for a main event at New York's Madison Square Gardens, the Mecca of all fighters, tonight. Tonight will mark the first climax of King's meteoric rise to fame, finishing a fast-moving series of events that started when the dusky young Torontonian knocked out British champ, Ernie Thompson, in Old Blighty, bringing himself into the public eye for the first time.

But King's big break came when he was signed up by Blinky Palmetto, a shrewd Philadelphia operator, who piloted Ike Williams to the world lightweight crown. With King coming along much quicker than expected, they're saying that Trenton Ike will soon have to give the Canadian a shot at his title, and if that happens, Palmetto will have to choose between his two fighters. Insiders say that the Blinky will string along with King, for he's younger, hence there's more money to be had riding along with Lt Arthur.

This brings to light one very serious defect in the Montreal boxing picture. Johnny Greco is ranked within the first five in world welterweight ranks, and when Ray Robinson graduates to middleweight ranks, which is expected in the near future, Greco will be left as the most powerful puncher in the division. The only man we can see giving Greco any trouble from the division is Bernie Docusen, of New Orleans, a cracker-jack boxer, but a lad whose hardest punch wouldn't puncture a paper bag full of air.

Yet Greco fights only in Montreal, where he knows he can win. The N.I.G. better is so much better than any other Canadian contender, it isn't even funny, and when you send Gus Mell or Gaby Ferland into the ring with him, it's sending in a boy to do a man's work. Of course, the fact that Greco is signed up for 6 fights at the Forum every year doesn't help any, for he can't fight more than 6 or 7 times in 12 months, anyway.

Greco has fought at Madison Square Gardens in main bouts 11 times, whipping Cleo Shans twice, winning, drawing, and losing; with Bobby Ruffin, whipping Tony Janiro twice and losing to the Youngstown, Ohio welter once, drawing, and losing to Beau Jack, and dropping a split decision to Tony Pellone. That's five wins and four losses, with two draws, and Greco is a better fighter right now than he ever was when he fought in New York. But as long as they keep matching him with yeggs like Eric Boon, the over-publicized English dub, they aren't doing justice to Greco.

JUST JOTTINGS

Watch for Boston Bruins to play steadier, more consistent hockey now that Milt Schmidt, one of the all-time greats, is back with the Beantowners. With Milt back in uniform, the Bruins rebounded from 10-2 and 4-0 shellackings at the hands of Detroit and Toronto, to whip the Red Wings right in Detroit.

What will happen to Robert Villsmann, now that he has been beaten in his American debut by semi-bald Steve Belloise, who cut the Frenchman to small pieces before 12,000 at Madison Square Gardens last Friday? The Parisian scrapper, who, billed as a slow starter, couldn't get started within ten rounds against the rugged Belloise, was too badly beaten for any chance of a return fight, so what will happen? Will they ship him back to France, or will he start at the bottom and try to work his way up to the top, again?

Mark Gage Stewart down as the unluckiest player of the year. First he was slapped with a \$1,500 fine by a Toronto court which ruled the winger responsible in a case in which a woman sued for damages inflicted upon her and her husband in a fight between Stewart, then a Toronto Leaf, and Johnny Marchand. Then last Saturday, Stewart was injured in a freak accident, being hit on the head by a puck shot by Gaston Beaudet of the Leafs, who was attempting to clear the disc from his defensive zone.
