THE FEARS A RIOT Taylor, of Kentucky, Asks for Help From the President.

WOULD REMAIN GOVERNOR. Goebel, Who Has Been Declared Elected, May Not Recover From His Wound.

Washington, Feb. 1.—President McKinley has received a long message from Governor W. S. Taylor, of Kentucky, dated today, at Frankfort, Ky. Governor Taylor refers at length to the situation in Kentucky and declares that he considers himself the legally elected executive of the state, and asserts that the conditions of affairs at the present time is most critical. He says that riot may occur at any time which will cause much bloodshed. Governor Taylor says that he is doubtful of his power to control the situation, and appeals to the President to take the matter and secure peace in the state by recognizing him as the Governor of Kentucky. The appeal is very earnest, and the aid of the administration is urgently requested.

MAY NOT RECOVER.

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 1.—Governor Goebel passed an unfavorable day, although he was fairly comfortable when night came on. He has half a dozen doctors around him, and the reports of his condition vary according to the last physician who leaves his room. His strength is maintained to a great extent by injections. His kidneys have been treated by the use of the electric light, but have not yet recovered. He has had slight symptoms of pneumonia, but has not yet appeared, but have not as yet become so serious as to cause alarm in themselves. The doctors as a whole entertain no hopes of his recovery.

For the first time since the shooting there was today signs of a peaceful settlement. The original proposition looking to an amicable adjustment came from the Republican side, just before noon, when T. R. Edelean, of Frankfort, one of Governor Taylor's attorneys, appeared at the Capitol Hotel, to hold a conference with Judge Prior, Louis McQuon and Col. Wm. Scott, the legal advisers of the Democracy. After a short talk Mr. Edelean declared that Governor Taylor and the Republicans were anxious to avoid anything that might possibly lead to serious trouble, as the present conditions might do if nothing was done to prevent it.

ARE EAGER FOR PEACE.

He was assured by the Democratic attorneys that they were as anxious to save any clash between the parties as the Republicans could be. Mr. Edelean then proposed to submit the case of the rival governors to the Kentucky Court of Appeals, which, he declared, judging by the action of Judge Hanson, would probably be decided against Governor Taylor. He then wanted the right to submit the case to the United States Supreme Court, for final settlement. The talk was informal. Mr. Edelean merely stated his position that the opposing attorneys might be in a matter under advisement.

SLAPS AT TAYLOR.

Two direct slaps were given Governor Taylor today by public officers, who declined to obey his orders. The first came from President Rodman, of the Farmers' Bank, which is a state depository. Some vouchers on the bank were presented to Governor Taylor in favor of some of the militia officers, who wanted money for their companies. When the vouchers were presented at the bank payment was refused. President Rodman said he did not see how he could pay out the money on orders signed by Governor Taylor until he knew for certain who was the actual Governor of Kentucky. He has asked an opinion from the attorney of the bank, he said, and when it was received he would act accordingly. The second slap was given by Governor Hayes, who is serving a five year term for manslaughter, having been sentenced March 1897. Governor Hayes was sent to Warden Lillard, he decided that he could not turn the man loose until he was satisfied that the Governor of Kentucky was the man who had taken the position. He made no reply to Governor Taylor, but declined to honor the vouchers on the bank. He agreed with the position taken by the warden, and the man was kept in prison.

CAUSES INDIGNATION.

The action of Lillard, who is an ardent supporter of Governor Taylor, aroused intense indignation among the Republicans, and it was declared that a detachment of soldiers would be sent to the penitentiary to take the man away by force if Warden Lillard persisted in his refusal to release Hayes. No such talk, however, came from the office of Governor Taylor, or that of Adjutant-General Coffey. The talk was naturally resented by the Democrats, and Lillard received open offers of aid in case he should decide to engage in battle with the soldiers over the right to enter the hall and take out Hayes. When asked if he intended to offer resistance to a detachment of soldiers, the warden replied, "Oh, no, it would not do for me to attempt any such thing, but I have fourteen guards only, and they could not do much against soldiers."

CHURCHILL ON THE NATAL SITUATION

War Correspondent Points Out Why Buller Needs at Least Another Division to Relieve Ladysmith.

London, Feb. 2.—Mr. Spencer Wilkinson, in the Morning Post, to-day discusses a long despatch from Mr. Winston Churchill, dated at Pietermaritzburg, and describing the situation in Natal. He says: "This despatch deserves to be closely read. It is an appeal to the public at home, and as it has been passed by the censor, may be taken to represent the feeling of General Buller's army. Mr. Churchill represents the difficulties of General Buller's task in concise terms:—

BOERS WATCH BULLER.

"That is what everyone would expect them to do; and that their main body can ride faster than General Buller's main body can walk, was also pretty generally understood. The consequence is that the Boer army cannot be turned. Whether it is attacked it can put an entrenched front. According to Mr. Churchill there are 7,000 Boers watching Ladysmith, the same number held ready to resist General Buller, and 5,000 kept in reserve, ready either to be sent at need. This General Buller has to attack 12,000 men entrenched on favorable ground. For that purpose, Mr. Churchill thinks he ought to have 20,000 men, instead of 23,000. In other words, General Buller ought to have another division."

LEYS SEEKING ALLIES.

He Wants Great Powers to Intervene if Delagoa Bay is Seized.

Berlin, Feb. 1.—It is strongly rumored in parliamentary circles that the chief object of Dr. Leyds in visiting Paris, Berlin and St. Petersburg is to induce France, Germany and Russia to intervene if Great Britain should attempt to seize Delagoa Bay.

BATHER LIKES MACRUM.

London, February 1.—Canon Farmer, who was forced to leave Pretoria with other British clergyman, has arrived in London. With reference to the Rev. Charles E. Macrum, the former United States consul at Pretoria, he said to a reporter of the Associated Press: "Mr. Macrum was one of the last men I saw before leaving. I told him he would be a great asset to the cause of the Boers in America. He is a very able man, and I think it is chiefly on that account that he left in the midst of the crisis. He is not a strong man and President Kruger may have taken advantage of this. But when I last saw Mr. Macrum he was a patriotic and loyal American."

GROWS OUT OF WAR.

Toronto, February 1.—Gasky Presbyterian Church in Toronto is growing out of the war. The church is to be held in court. Whether the suit will be of a criminal or civil character is not yet decided. A local lawyer to-day received instructions to proceed against R. O. Harvey, on behalf of the Rev. Mr. Waddington, and his congregation. It is understood that Mr. Harvey will not retract. If criminal proceedings are taken it will be on a charge of bigamy. If civil it will be on behalf of the pastor, for damages for alleged libel and slander.

GUESTS OF BOSTON.

Boston, Mass., February 1.—The Boston Society of Civil Engineers today entertained the visiting members of the Canadian Society of Engineers. The guests of the society reached here this morning. They were given a breakfast, and subsequently an informal reception was held, at which Prof. G. Frank Allen, of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, welcomed the Canadians, and Prof. H. F. Hovey, of McGill University, responded. The forenoon was devoted to inspecting the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and this afternoon a trip was taken to the South Station and other places.

MOVIE IS IN PROGRESS.

Apparently, however, a third attempt will be made, without loss of time. Indeed, it seems probable that the movement is now in progress. We must hope that the spirit of every man will be regarded by the public as nerve itself. He only means to prepare our countrymen at home for heavy losses in the coming battle."

IN MILITIA ORDERS.

Annual Meeting of D. R. A. Will Be Held on February 21.

FIGHT AT SPION KOP.

In an interesting comparison of British and Boer methods of warfare, as illustrated during the battle of Spion Kop, showing how the British troops were defeated, mixed and disorganized, and how the machinery of control was shattered, he says: "This would have been the case, had each of them, in pursuance of a general resolve either to hold or to evacuate a position, acted independently of their orders. It was a case of a pack of hounds against a single lion. The Boers, on the other hand, were again collected and sold, showing the advantage of discipline. The British had great superiority in numbers; the Boers have none. The war, therefore, is brought nearer an end even by the Boers' own hands. Mr. Churchill anticipated that the consequences of the war will not be altogether equal. He has there pointed out the increase of respect between the combatants, and contempt for the former wedge of cleavage, will be gone forever."

MANY EUROPEAN SOLDIERS.

Nearly 10,000 Men and 300 Officers Are Fighting in Boer Banks.

London, Feb. 1.—A letter appears to-day from a Hanooverian officer, formerly of the Twenty-second German Infantry, but now in the ranks of the Boer army, which says that nearly 10,000 trained European soldiers, including quite 300 officers, are among the Boers. Referring to the military situation at Ladysmith the officer says:—
