## Westm'nt Remembers

Some 2,000 Westmount residents turned out Sunday afternoon to bow their heads at the Cenotaph as five Union Jacks fluttered in the light breeze and the solemn notes of the Last Post marked the annual Remembrance Day commemoration service.

Tribute was fittingly paid to the fallen of World War I and World War II, as well as the Korean Conflict

The solemn ceremony began at 2.30 p.m. with the singing of 'O Canada'. Prior to the opening, The Royal Montreal Regiment marched to the site from the St. Catherine street Armoury. Conducting the service was the chaplain of the RMR, the Rever-

end J. M. Doidge, of St. Matthias Church. Prayers were offered for those who paid the supreme sacrifice, and for the spirit of dedication on the part of the living, as well as for the Queen and Commonwealth, and for peace and brotherhood among nations. The entire assembly joined in the Lord's Prayer.

Mayor C. H. Drury laid the first wreath at the base of the memorial. Some 39 other tributes were placed by various military units, ladies committees, civic organizations, and by private citizens.

The singing of "Abide With Me" was followed by the Last Post. A two minute silence was broken by the sound of Reveille.

The twenty-minute service concluded with the singing of "God

Save the Queen." A march-past by members of the armed forces and veterans of the Royal Canadian Legion took place.

At its conclusion the crowd moved slowly away, leaving the wreaths and flags but taking with them private memories of personal loss.

A man will appear in Westmount court today with his ankle in a cast to face a charge of breaking and entering a Victoria avenue home.

A native of France and of Greek origin, he faces court as the result of a phone call on the part of an alert woman and quick police action; and has the cast as the result of a leap from a two-storey window in an attempt to elude capture.

The drama began at about 5.30 p.m. Monday, when a woman noticed a man acting in a suspicious manner in front of 621 Victoria. As she watched, he slipped into the driveway. The woman knew that the home-owners were away and immediately called police.

Westmount officers sped to the scene, and as they were preparing to enter the building for a thorough search, the man leapt from the second-storey window.

He rose from the ground and made an attempt to escape — but police were close behind. A scuffle followed and the accused was taken into custody.

Coins from a collection and other items from the home were found on his person. However, a search of his Queen Mary road room failed to reveal anything more incriminating.

Since the man was complaining of a pain in his ankle, he was taken to hospital, where an examination showed that he had suffered a broken bone in the ankle. A cast was placed on it and he was placed in police cells.

In court today he is expected to plead guilty.

Just two weeks ago another home, farther north on Victoria avenue was broken into and several items reported stolen — including coins from a collection.

As a corollary police note: if you see or hear anything suspicious, call police immediately.

## Police, fire building is officially opened

The City of Westmount has officially opened its new \$900,000 police-fire headquarters and City Hall Annex.

The new building, situated on the east side of Stanton street, was opened during two-hour long ceremonies Saturday afternoon. Officiating at the function were Hon. J. Richard Hyde, Speaker of the Quebec Legislative Assembly and MPP for Westmount-St. George, and Mayor C. H. Drury.

Also in attendance were top public safety figures in the province.

Mr. Hyde, in a speech before unveiling a plaque, lauded the example that Westmount sets other municipalities, and paid tribute to its efficient and dedicated administrators.

Mayor C. H. Drury introduced Mr. Hyde, who was thanked by former Mayor J. C. Cushing, Commissioner of Public Safety, Alderman M. L. Tucker, served as chairman.

**Van-Doos story related**

A lesson in cooperation, quiet dignity and achievement for all Quebecers is to be found in the history of the Royal 22nd Regiment — the famed Van-Doos — and their story was told Wednesday noon to Westmount Rotarians by Col. J. L. G. Poulin, of the general staff at Quebec Command.

Let us, he said, look to the past for guidance in the tasks ahead. There are problems, he admitted, some of them of our own making, and he expressed the hope that in the example of the Van-Doos there lay the possibility of an opportunity for Quebecers to show all Canadians that they could get along together and work together.

Following the history of the Van-Doos from its inauguration in First World War days, through the Second World War and on to Korea, Col. Poulin outlined the difficulties faced by the regiment and the manner in which deprivation and hardship had been endured.

He listed battle honors of the regiment — including Vimy, Passchendale, Hill 70, Arras, Rimini, San Martino, and some of the short, sharp and deadly engagements of the deep valleys and rugged mountains of Korea.

In conclusion, Col. Poulin spoke of the more recent contributions of the regiment now celebrating its 50th anniversary — Pakistan, Egypt, the Congo and Indo-China.

**School tax share arranged**

The Westmount Catholic School Commission will not share in the neutral income tax to be assigned to each of the Catholic school commissions on the Island of Montreal.

The Montreal Catholic School Commission has approved a preliminary report establishing the percentage to be assigned each commission.

The report is in keeping with legislation in Bill 139 governing a new allotment of the neutral school tax in Montreal. The law guarantees 20 per cent of this income to the Protestant School Board of Montreal. The rest will be distributed among 14 Catholic school commissions.

In addition to Westmount, three other school municipalities — Town of Mount Royal, Cote St. Luc and St. Viateur (Outremont) — will not share in the neutral income.

### IRISH REGIMENTS ON PARADE

Three famous Irish regiments — bands, drums, pipers and dancers — will be on show here November 25 at the Forum: the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, the Royal Ulster Rifles and the Royal Irish Fusiliers. With them will be Irish dancers from the Women's Royal Army Corps. The show, expected to draw a capacity house, is for one night only.

## Three Irish regiments on show

Nearly everyone loves a parade, especially when it's staged by one of the world's leading military regiments.

This has been proved repeatedly here when Canadian Concerts and Artists, Inc., packed the Montreal Forum for the regimental bands of the Black Watch, the Scots Guards and the Grenadier Guards. Now Canadian Concerts is presenting the massed bands, drums, pipers and dancers of not one, but three famous Irish regiments — the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, the Royal Ulster Rifles and the Royal Irish Fusiliers.

They, along with Irish girl dancers from the Women's Royal Army Corps, will be at the Forum Wednesday night, November 25, providing the thunder of drums, skirl of pipes and stirring sound of martial music.

The three regiments recently launched a 56-city North American tour in the U.S. where critics

promptly began applauding the spectacle. In Cincinnati, the Enquirer said, "There was precision and there was fire" and termed the program "an excellent military review."

The program ranges from such offbeat military material as the Grand March from Aida to Binge's Coronet Carillon, from Martiuna's Espana Cani to When Irish Eyes Are Smiling.

All three regiments have fought bravely through most of the great British battles including Waterloo and both world wars. The Inniskillings first fought in the 17th century against 7,000 French troops under deposed James II. Both the Royal Ulster Rifles and

the Royal Irish Fusiliers, the latter also known as the Princess Victoria's after the young princess presented its colors, were founded in 1793 when Britain was uneasy about the new revolutionary government in France.

The Women's Royal Army Corps was formed in 1949 to succeed the Auxiliary Territorial Services and contains experts skilled in 30 trades, among them radar and signal operation, and drivers.

Brunet Director of the Quebec Provincial Police; Herve Poudrette, Chief Security Officer for the World's Fair; Jean Belanger, C.P.R. and Edward Spearing, C.N.R. heads of their respective railway's investigation departments. Host for the occasion was Westmount Public Safety Director Edward C. Harper.

Before the official opening the guests signed the Golden Book at City Hall, and proceeded with Mayor Drury to the new complex where they were taken on a tour.

Work on the three-storey brick building was begun in October 1963 and completed in April. It houses Westmount's protective and communication services, as well as departments that have overflowed from City Hall.

At the south end of the building, 15 Stanton street, are located the Health Department, the Personnel Department, the Welfare Department and the Finance Department. In the centre is the fire headquarters. It is connected by doors to the adjacent police department.

On the ground floor of the police department is situated the latest in telephone and radio equipment. The communications room can even maintain radio contact with constables on the beat through walkie-talkies. Included in the building are police offices, prison detention cells, a line-up room, the Municipal Courtroom with teakwood furnishings, a bomb-proof shooting range, and a room for civil defence training. In the second-floor civil defence room is a papier-mache scale model of the City of Westmount showing every building. The complex is designed to serve as a command centre in times of national disaster.

The combination of high-powered cars and the human desire to save a minute or two in a journey of five miles or a hundred miles is one of the massive problems

facing traffic control officers today. It is also an element that is filling many of our cemeteries throughout the country. — Melita (Man.) New Era.

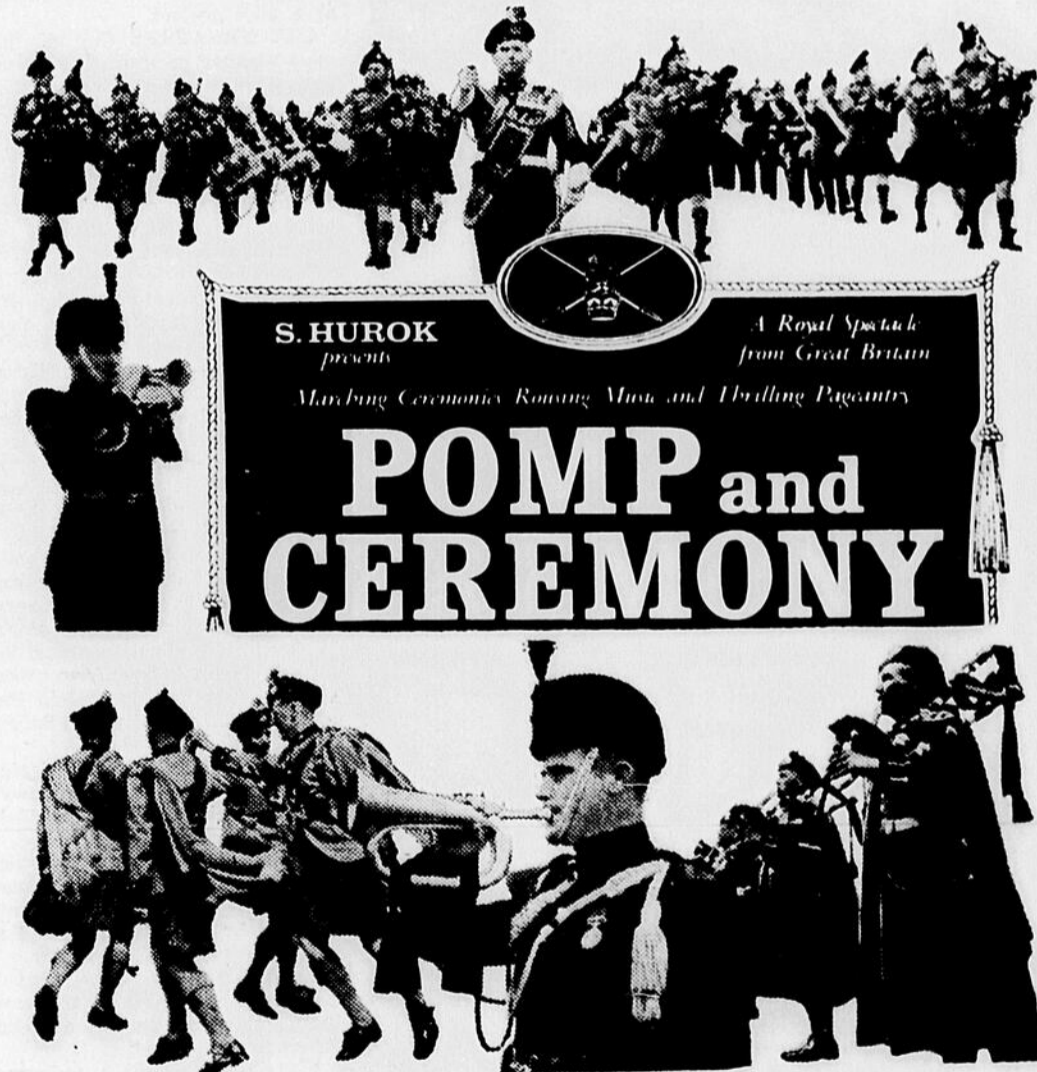

# Animal Protection League active on local scene

Do you want a cat or dog?

All that is necessary is a call to Mrs. Lewis of the Animal Protection League at 486-8463.

League members have stray animals which they keep until permanent homes can be found.

"We try not to destroy them," a spokesman for the league reported. "If members can't look after them we board them with vets until we find a home. There are always animals available for good homes."

The Animal Protection League, now numbering close to 450 persons, was founded by F. W. Dakin in order to publicize criticism of the means by which animals were destroyed by the S.P.C.A.

The experience resulted in the S.P.C.A. installing new gas chambers, and league members realizing there was room for a second animal welfare organization.

Now the group finds their greatest need is for volunteer labor. Sought at present is a man or woman to manage affairs for the league. The position would appeal to a retired businessman who wants to keep

active, the spokesman declared. Anyone interested should contact the president, E. L. van Hardenbroek, 5080 Circle Road, Montreal.

The league advocates the spaying and neutering of ani-

mals to end surplus breeding, cause of 90 per cent of animal welfare work.

The society is awaiting the next sealing season to see if protests made to Ottawa have brought about a change in the

methods of capturing the seals.

Further, the group is interested in the means of trapping animals in general. "We would like to see a ban on leghole steel traps," the spokesman said.

The league is the first animal society here to support the Canadian Federation of Humane Societies (Ottawa) which represents 33 member groups.

Future plans include a possible campaign to build a shelter, and tag days in several communities in the spring.

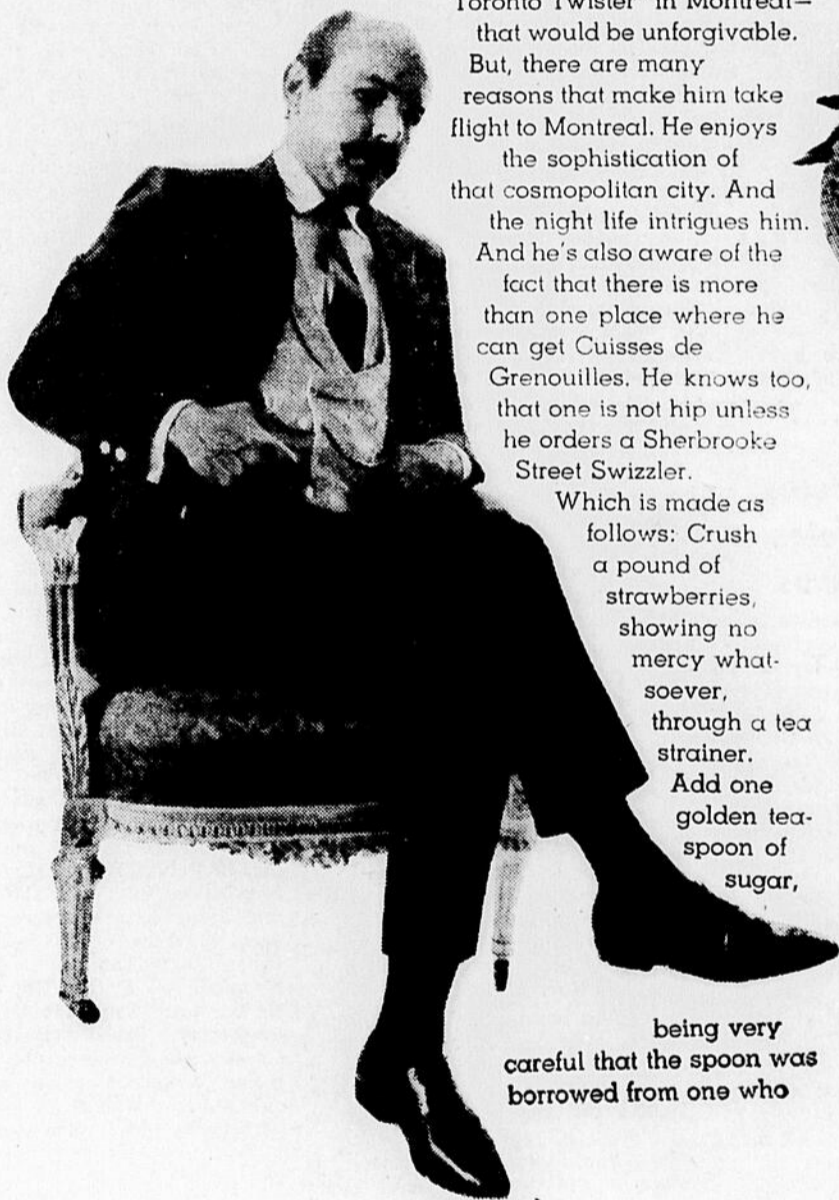

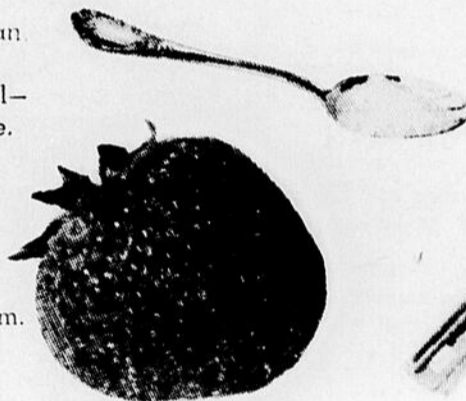

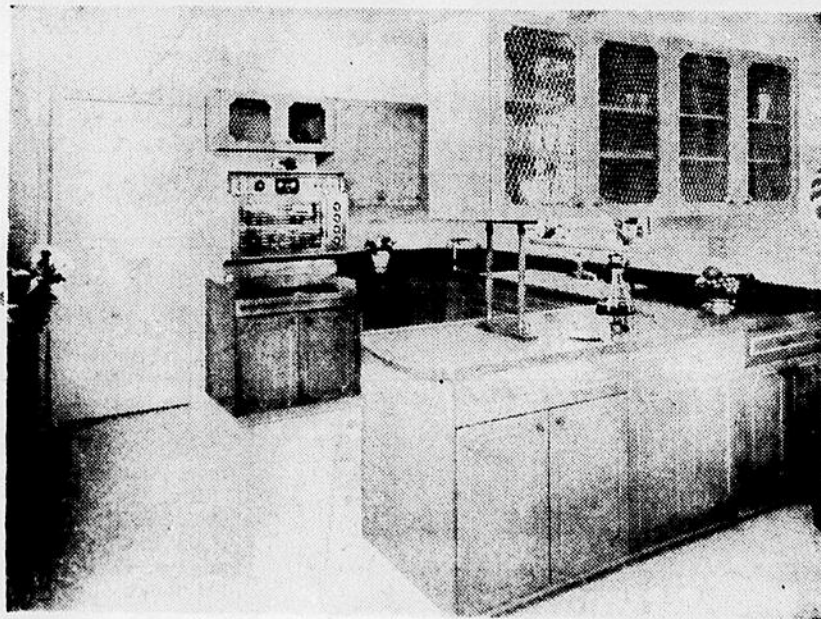

## Musical Sharps, Flats & Naturals

### How Easy It Is — How Hard It Is

To get pupils to do their academic studies and music practice is much more difficult today because of so many outside interests that consume their brain power. The constant watching of television takes a drastic number of hours which should be employed otherwise, so it is no small wonder that there is difficulty in getting the majority of teenage and younger children into a good routine with resultant accomplishment.

Guidance masters are a new breed. Not so many years ago, if a student needed guidance or their work wasn't up to par, the teacher spoke to the principal if he or she could not cope with the situation, then the principal usually called the parent and discussed the matter.

NOT TODAY: Some schools have as many as four "guidance masters". Upon enquiring, I found out that Westmount High School and Montreal High each have four — yes, four, guidance masters! A high school in St. Laurent has two.

For this column, I have made a list that might interest parents whose offspring take music lessons. They have a vital role to perform if progress is to be assured so the following may spur interest further and encourage the music student to

practice more. (Many people think it is easy to be a music teacher — who must also be the guidance master — the inspiration — fashionable — and expected to make the student into a superlative player on a small amount of practice in a short time).

● How easy it is to explain that they must practice each piece in sections. How hard it is to get them to do it.

● How easy it is to make them count at the lesson. How hard it is to get them to do it at home.

● How easy it is to tell them how many times to do each scale. How hard it is to get them to do it the number of repetitions you assign.

● How easy it is to tell them to practice separate hands first. How hard it is to get them to do it.

● How easy it is to tell them they must use the correct fingers immediately. How hard it is to get them to watch carefully.

● How easy it is to tell them to play new pieces slowly at first. How hard it is to get them to do it.

● How easy it is to tell them to raise their fingers high. How hard it is to get them to remember at home.

● How easy it is to tell them to lift at the end of slurs. How hard it is to make these breaks.

● How easy it is to tell them to accent the important beats. How hard it is to get

## Judo explained for uninitiated

Judo is a sport, and introduced as such it is one of the best activities that can be programmed in a Boys club.

From the physical aspect, Judo conditions the body, improves the co-ordination and serves as an outlet for excess energy. Judo also develops discipline, self confidence and a kind of reverence.

There are four things that are imperative in setting up Judo as a program. An instructor should be qualified, preferably a "Black Belt", and he should be able to promote and maintain an enthusiastic program.

The class can be either male or female, and can range from eight years of age up. Remember that Judo is a difficult sport to stay with, and after the magic of the word "Judo" wears off and the realm of the same word is discovered, the class must be urged on and there should always be a goal to achieve. A workable class is from eight to fourteen boys.

The mat space should be no smaller than twenty by twenty feet. Judo suits are best obtained from professional Judo clubs. The boys should own their suits, if they cannot afford an imported suit it is advisable to have the suits manufactured locally. The club director could also buy a number of suits and let the boys pay for them on a weekly or a monthly basis.

The word Judo is enough to promote the program itself as it is new, different and exciting.

The first few lessons should be spent on clearing up any misconceptions of what Judo is. Introduce the sport for what it is . . . hard work . . . hard knocks and hard-earned experience.

When working with any group twelve years of age or younger a good free-for-all once in a while is one of the best ways of relieving any shyness, and for keeping a lively and a happy class. Just make sure that they stop when they are told and that the actual lesson is serious business.

One of the best ways of keeping interest up and having Judo desirable is to have demonstrations . . . I.E. At the boys club, on television . . . program it as a special event during Boys Club Week.

Problems: One of the main problems is the popular misconception that after a few easy lessons of Judo one can learn "to throw that big bully who has been pushing you around" . . . or one can "impress his girl friend" . . . or one "no longer has to fear any foe".

What one must realize is that Judo is a sport only to be performed in a gym and on mats and that the activity must be supervised by a competent instructor. It is not to be "practiced" on all of your friends. A way to overcome this problem is to teach the class that it is wrong to fight and that

it takes more courage to walk away from a fight. Another problem is that a boy may easily get discouraged if he doesn't get quick results.

which is often the case. It must be explained that to improve, hard work and constant practice will eventually produce the desired goals.
