Latest contribution to Ice Fund is \$5,000 from Consolidated

On behalf of the Ice Committee, Carson Hodgins accepted the generous donation of the Consolidated Paper Corporation Limited at a dinner Friday night in Clarendon Hotel. On behalf of everyone at the dinner he voiced appreciation to this new industrial group for their assistance in the campaign to have artificial ice at the arena here; and on behalf of the entire community he thanked Consolidated for the great favor.

It was a small speech but it said all. Consolidated's local chief, Doug Covey handed the check to Carson during a brief ceremony which included words of welcome from Shawville Mayor Young, words of thanks from Lions President Bill Orr, words of praise for the Ice Committee from Mr. Covey and also short messages from Sidney Sheppard representing the Agricultural Society, & the Company's personnel man, Bob Bourget.

Also at the head table were Alex Webster, Forester, Keith Horner, manager of the Senior Hockey Team, the Pontiacs and Bank of Montreal Manager Bill Main, who is treasurer of the ice committee.

Roast beef and pumpkin pie with whipped cream were among the main courses at the excellent dinner served by the hotel and during the after dinner coffee the presentation was made.

Bill Main was master of ceremonies and started things off with his own sincere interest in the artificial ice project, not only for his own four sons but for the entire community. He expressed his personal appreciation to the members of Council and the Lions and the various co-workers and townspeople who were bringing about "this tremendous thing for our area". He also welcomed Consolidated and its employees into the neighbor-

hood and said he was happy to know that so many of them were becoming part of the community.

Bill said he was looking forward to the fellowship of these newcomers and the many good times which they would be enjoying together.

Doug Covey on behalf of the Consolidated fellows there at the dinner, thanked the hosts and then said that though his company was still only in the construction phase and would not normally have considered contributing to any local fund drives until the company had been at work in the community long enough to assess the various needs, he felt that the current campaign was in a different category than the usual yearly money drives. This was one request which had to be answered now or never. So he gave \$5000 to Carson with praise for the ability of the campaigners.

Mr. Covey said the artificial ice when installed will benefit to some degree every Consolidated family which locates in the area.

The chairman then said the new donation put the committee to a place where artificial ice will be a certainty. The campaign had started eight months ago and was now near success.

The Mayor's address included the statement that the entire County will be better off in the future for Consolidated having decided to come here and his words were greeted by assenting applause of the listeners. He then invited them all to a social hour which wound up the memorable occasion on an informal note.

Vinton-Couloungue RC school site chosen

A Vinton-Fort Couloungue area Roman Catholic French Academic and Trade School complex will be built on the property owned by William Ladouceur between Vinton and Fort Couloungue. The 80 acre farm has been chosen as the site by the Outaouais Board after a study by Hull architect Jean Issalys. The school will accommodate over 700 students.

The disposition of English-speaking high school students in Pontiac County is still in question. Father May of Vinton has offered free property to the school board if it will build a separate school for English-speaking Catholics in Vinton while the Ottawa Valley School Board has renewed an option on property in Shawville for a site for a school which would provide High School in the English language for anyone.

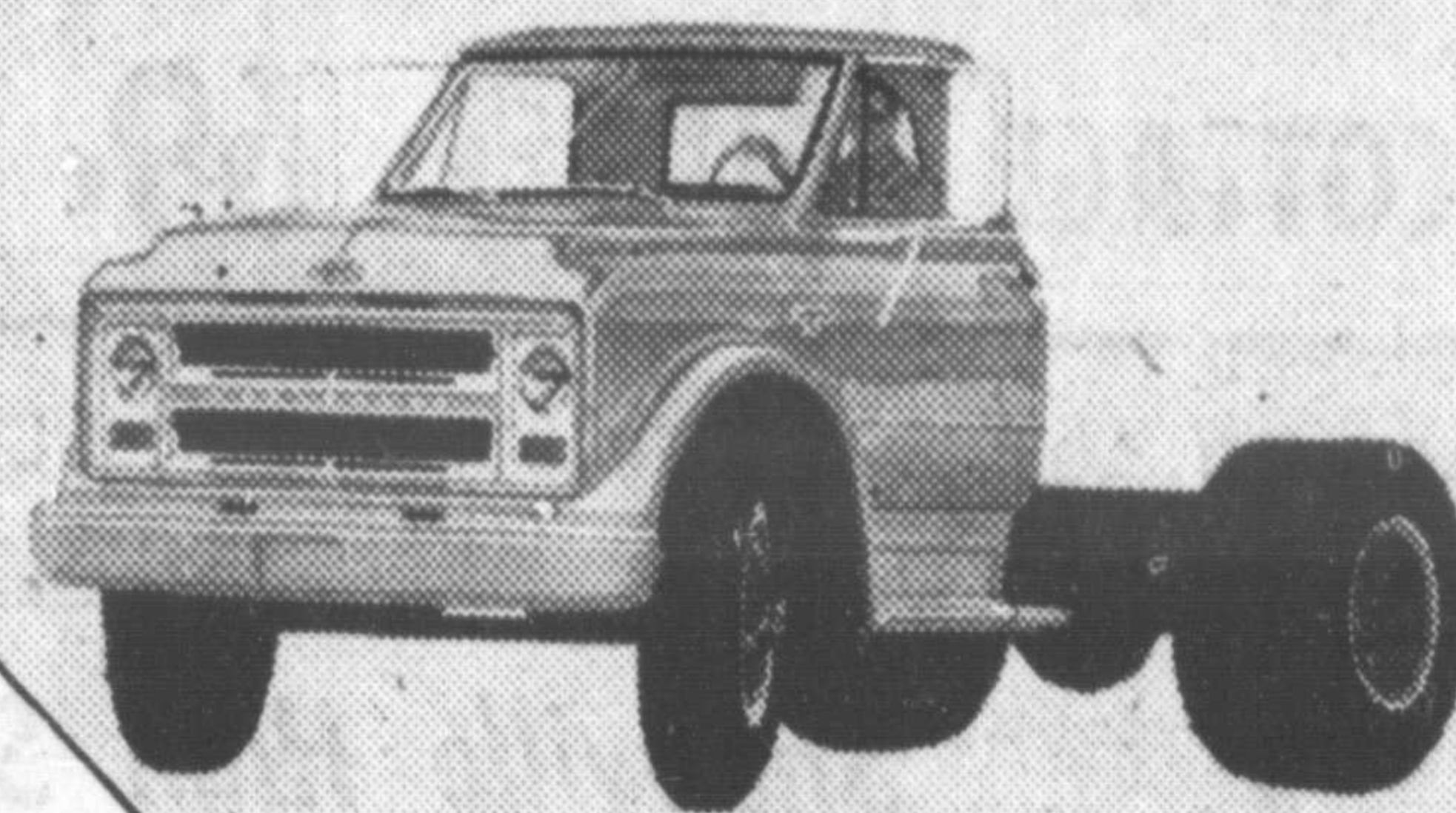

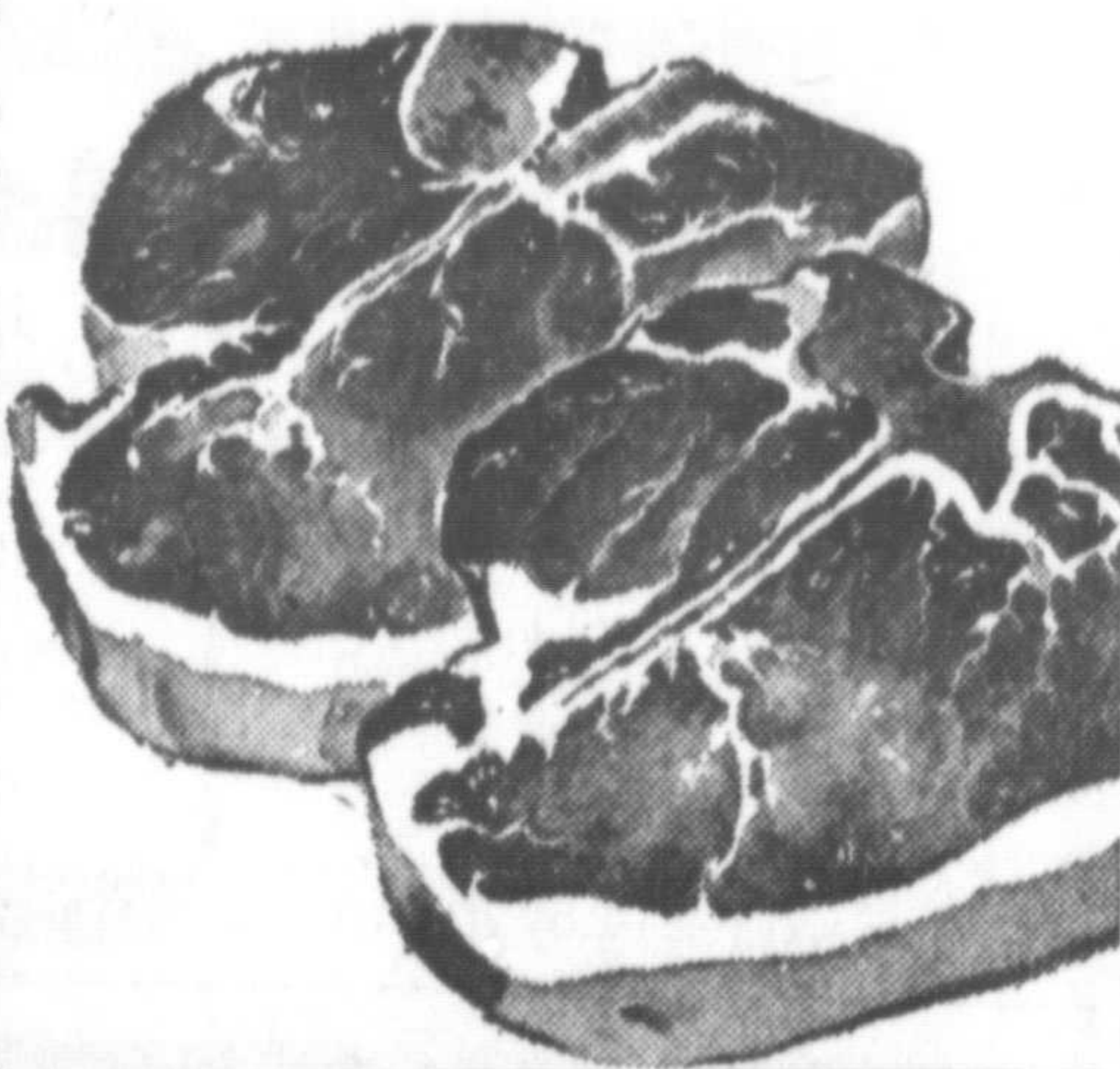

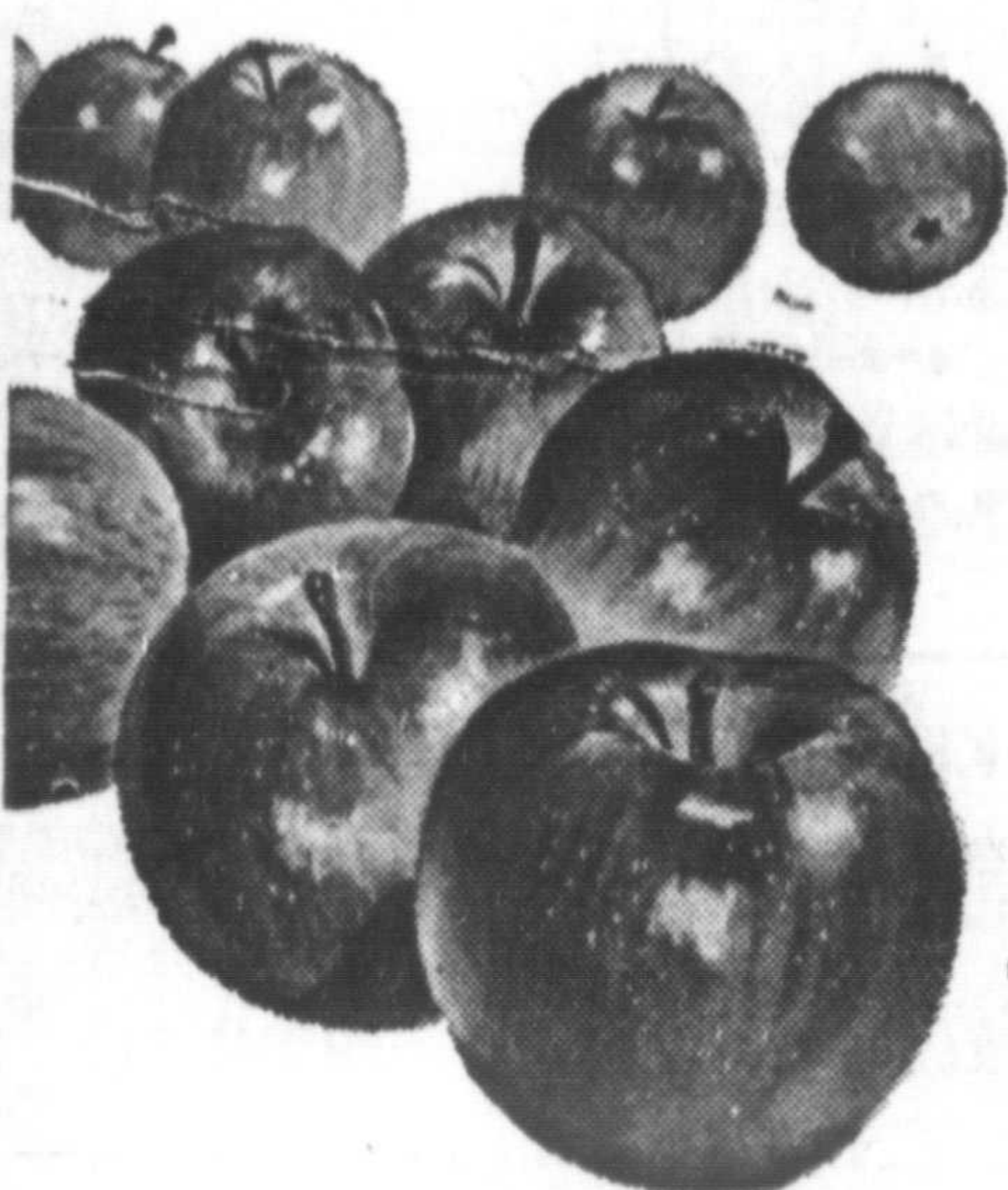

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Zion United Church celebrates 100 years at Upper Eardley

Although no records of ministers in charge before 1900 can be found, it is an established fact that Upper Eardley United Church, now known as Zion United Church was a hundred years old last Sunday.

To celebrate their centennial, friends and neighbors of the little white church gathered to worship at this venerable land-

mark on top of Bradley's Hill, on Highway 8.

Bright fall colors on the Laurentian hills formed a breath-taking backdrop; scenes of surrounding cultivated fields and the beautiful expanse of the Ottawa River to the south brought thoughts to those who attended the celebration of bygone years when their ancestors, the Milks,

the Merrifields, McAllisters, Findleys, Moores and others there gathered to clear the land of its thick bush cover and build the church of hand-hewn logs to make themselves a place of worship for their Methodist faith.

Prior to the building of Zion Church, the saddle-bag preacher had been conducting services in the homes of the settlers as he travelled his circuit from Hull and Aylmer East along both sides of the Ottawa River to Onslow Village now Quyon.

Elliott, Greene, McMullen, Huntington, Scales and Sanderson were among the names of these travelling preachers but time has erased their actual tenures and the names of the first to use the pulpits of the little white church which was built in 1866.

Records do exist though of ministers starting in 1900 with Wm Halpenny who was there for two years. W. P. Shaver came in 1903 to be replaced by W. P. MacFarlane in 1904, Walter P. Booth in 1905, H. C. Campbell in 1906; Wm. A. Wilson in 1907, L. S. Troop in 1908, Ivan A. Thompson in 1909, J. A. Vaughan in 1911, J. Benson in 1912, Mr. Fluker in 1913, J. A. Vaughan back again in 1914, Arthur Williams in 1915, M. Wilson in 1916, J. Cowan in 1917, George Hobb in 1918, Mr. Butt in 1919, Mr. Maxwell in 1920, A. Sisco in 1921, J. W. Ogden in 1922, Edwin A. Middlemiss in 1923 and George Smith in 1925.

Then came Church Union when Zion joined with Center and Lower Eardley Church forming the Eardley Charge with a minister living in the manse at Breckenridge, where Mr. and Mrs. Ernie Sally now live.

After Union, the ministers seemed to stay an average of two or three years instead of the

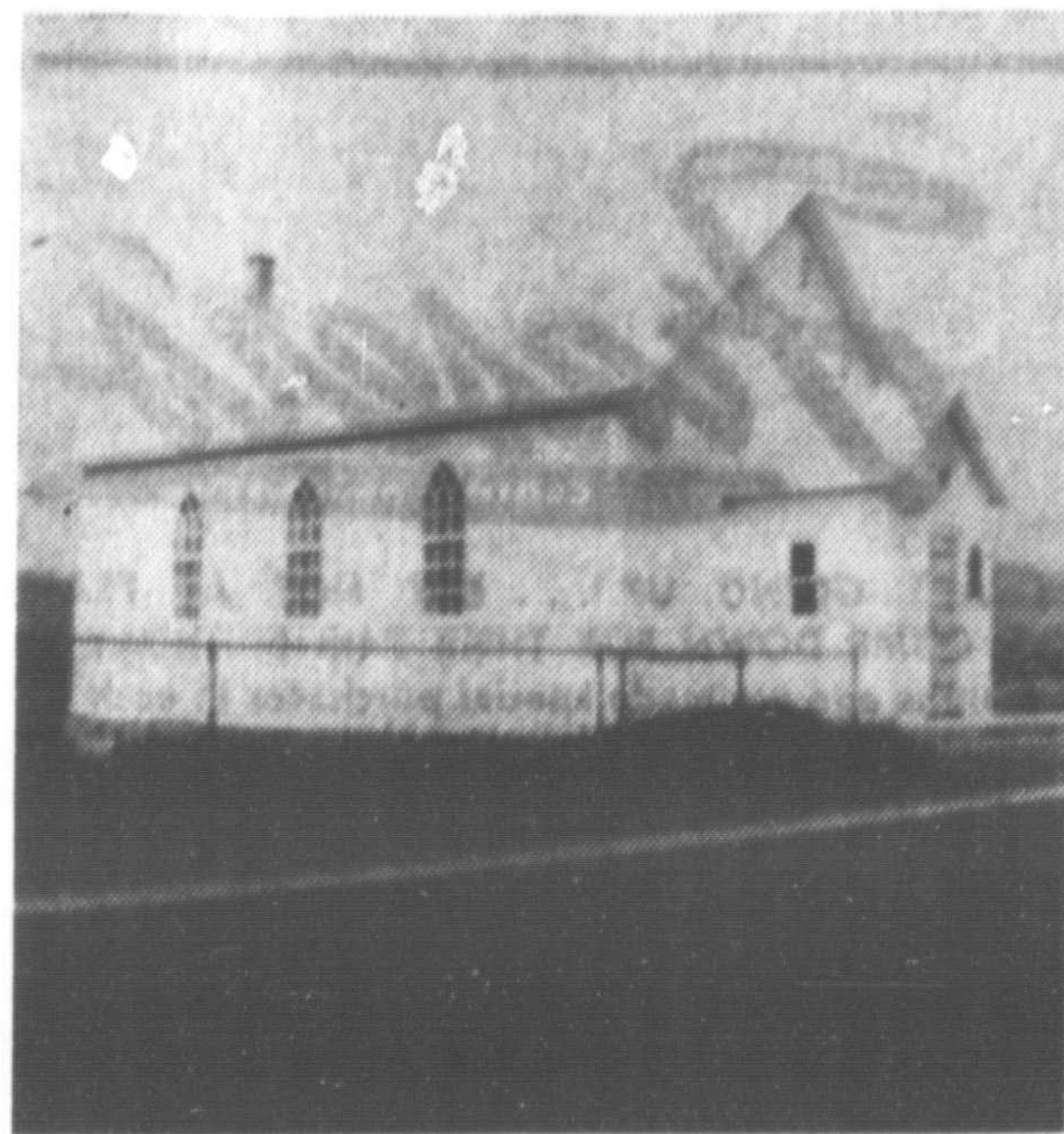
previous one year. R. A. Merrifield was there from 1926 to 1928, G. C. Wood from 1929 to 1931, R. D. Smith from 1932 to 1936, T. W. Bird from 1937 to 1938, J. W. MacLean from 1939 to 1941.

In 1942 the charge was taken by a student supply preacher whose name has not been recorded and in 1943 the shortage of United Church ministers became so acute that the charges of Aylmer and Eardley were joined under Rev Charles Dawes, who remained in charge until 1953.

In 1954 John Sherman took over for two years and the following year the Aylmer charge had grown so large that the Upper Eardley group was asked to join with Quyon. Rev Basil Long was the first minister under this new grouping.

From 1958 to 1960 the charge was served by Rev Miss M. Dougherty, one of the United Church's rare and talented lady preachers, and following Miss Dougherty came Fred Elson from 1961 to 1963, Milton Swarzen from 1964 to 1965 and H. E. Harding in 1966.

The worship service on the oc-

casion of the one hundredth birthday was conducted by Mr. Harding with Mrs. Wm Dowd at the organ. Tea was served by the ladies of the United Church Women after the services while guests chatted about days gone by.

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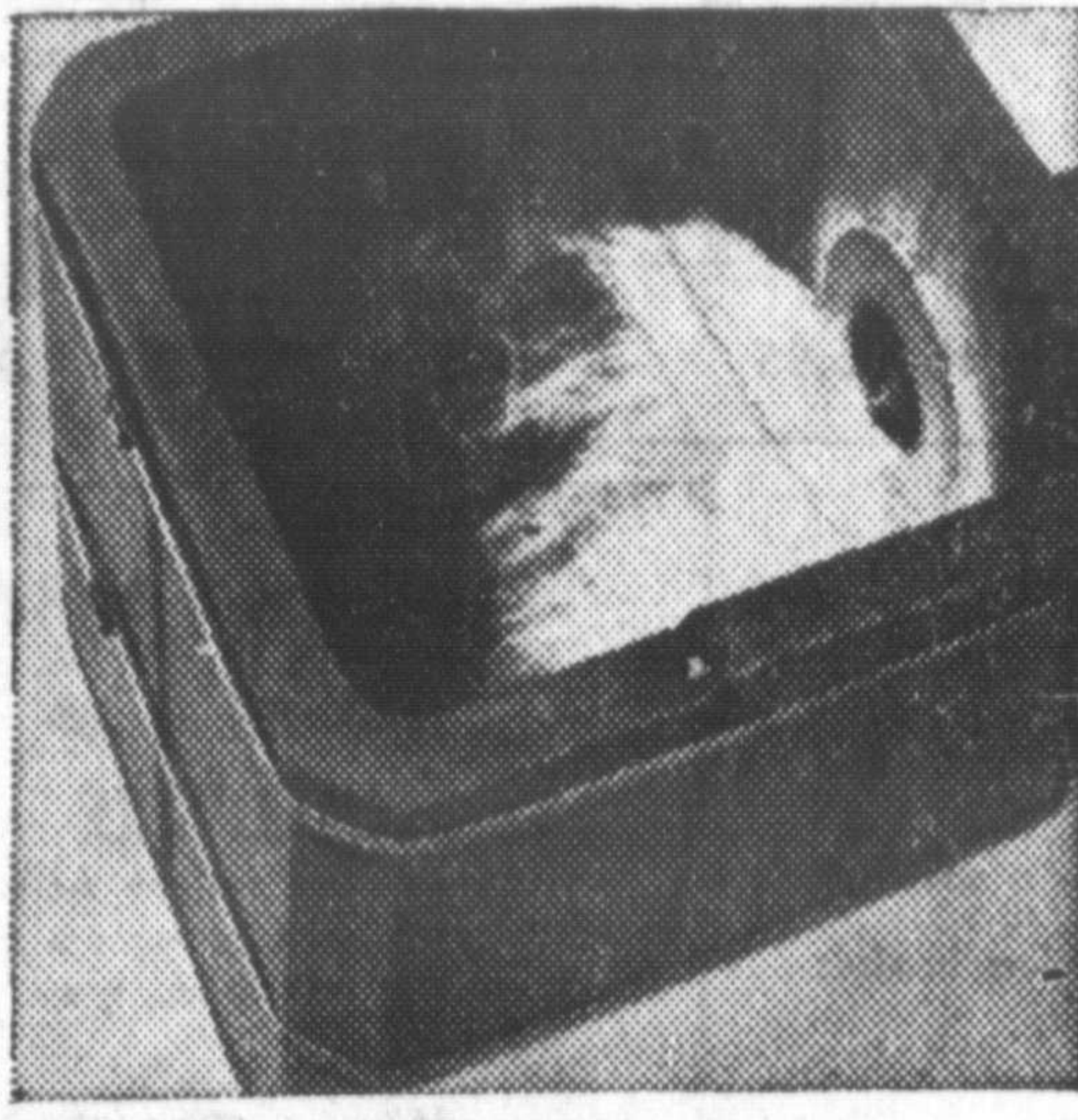
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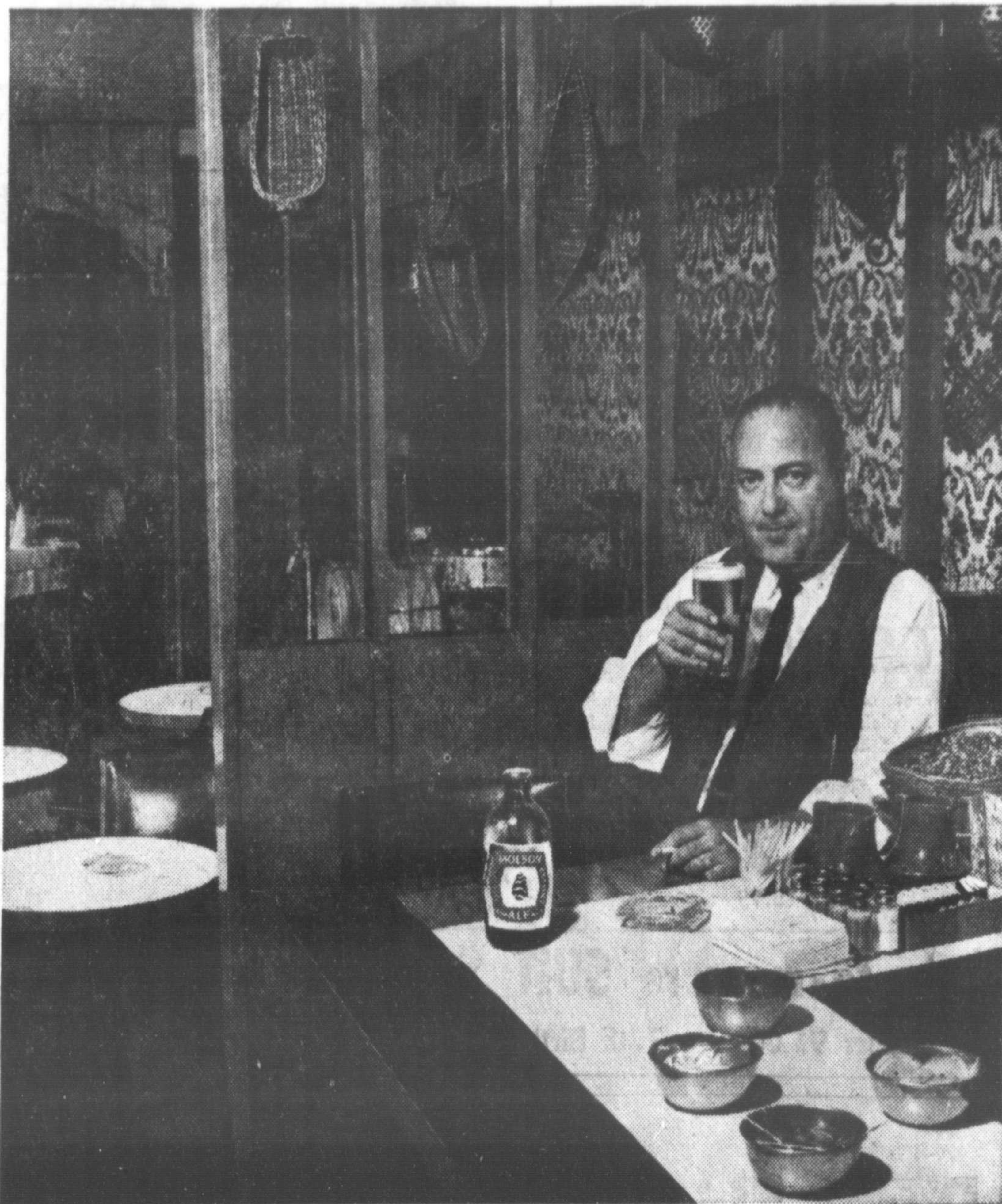
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
