A WOMAN FIRED POINT BLANK AT MUSSOLINI Private Members' Resolutions To Be Taken Up Today

An Attempt Made To Assassinate Italian Premier

Mussolini Was Shot Through Nose—Shooting Occurred While Premier Was Leaving Session of Congress of International Surgery in the Place di Capote to Enter His Automobile—Woman, Who Is About Fifty Years Old and a British Subject, Was Rescued from Crowd With Great Difficulty and Rushed to Jail—News of Attempt Created Sensation, Not Only in Rome, But in Other Cities Throughout Italy Where It Was Made Known.

(Associated Press Despatch)
ROME, April 7.—An attempt was made to assassinate Premier Mussolini this morning. A woman fired a revolver point blank at him, but he escaped with a slight wound. Mussolini was shot through the nose. The shooting occurred at about 11.15 a.m., while he was leaving the session of the Congress of International Surgery in the Place di Capote to enter his automobile. A great crowd was around the entrance cheering the Premier, when the woman pressed to the front and, pointing a revolver directly at him, pulled the trigger. The woman was rescued from the crowd with great difficulty and was rushed to the jail where women prisoners are confined. Meanwhile, Mussolini, submitting to medical attention, maintained great composure. He ordered that immediate dispositions be taken to preserve order, and that no retributions be taken. News of the attempt created a sensation not only in Rome but in the other cities throughout the country where it was made known.

The semi-official Stefania Agency says the immediate reaction was the organization of manifestations of loyalty to the Fascist chief. The woman who fired the shot gave her name to the police as Violet Albina Gibson, nee Dalkey. She is fifty years old and a British subject. While Mussolini and his Fascist regime have a firm grip on all Italy, the opposition has been active, especially since the kidnapping and assassination of the anti-Fascist deputy Matteotti in June, 1924. Early last November a plot against the Premier was uncovered. Tito Zaniboni, a former Socialist deputy, was arrested in a hotel room adjoining the Chigi Palace, on the balcony of which Mussolini was to deliver a speech. The authorities declared he was equipped with a rifle, with telescopic sights and intended to shoot the Premier from the window of his room. Zaniboni and others arrested at the time are still awaiting trial. Mussolini is no stranger to wounds. In February, 1917, while serving on the Austrian front, he received the major portion of a charge of a hand grenade. Ninety-eight wounds were counted on his body and he was invalided home, returning to the editorship of his newspaper, the Popolo d'Italia. He organized the Fascist party at Milan in March, 1919, with a group of young war veterans as the nucleus. He entered Rome at the head of the Fascist forces on October 31st, 1922, and has been in power since.

CHIEF OF OPPOSITION TO FASCIST GOVERNMENT PASSED AWAY AT CANNES

BILLY SUNDAY MAY BE CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENT
CANNES, April 7.—Giovanni Amendola, chief of the opposition to the Fascist Government in Italy, is dead here. He was 45 years old. Signor Amendola was an Italian in 1922 and later Minister of the Colonies. Signor Amendola was badly injured last July at Montecatini, Italy, when he was beaten by twenty unknown persons who had been besieging his hotel. At the time he was injured Fascist newspapers expressed the belief that it was due to his opposition to the Government.

Grand Duke Nicholas Is Able To Reside In France, But Pretender To French Throne Denied All Rights Of His Native Soil

Socialists and Communists Will Undoubtedly Stir Up
Trouble and Demand that Government No Longer
Harbor Nicolas, Provided He Accepts Leadership in
Russian Restoration Movement.

PARIS, April 7.—Paris awoke this morning to find that it had two pretenders to thrones. One of them is the Duke of Guise, aspirant for the throne his ancestors held in France at the beginning of the eighteenth century. The other is Grand Duke Nicholas Nicolaievitch, who has been requested by a Congress of Russian Monarchists, to fight for the throne of the Czars in Russia. Under the law voted in 1886 the Duke of Guise, who has announced that he will replace the late Duke of Orleans as head of the French Royalists and as "pretender" to the French throne, is doomed to exile. By strange irony of fate Grand Duke Nicholas, on the other hand, will be able to live in intrigue at his chateau near Paris, while the head of "the oldest French family" is denied all the rights of his native soil. This anomalous situation is certain to have a repercussion in the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate when they convene, for while French

NINE PASSENGERS INJURED IN TRAIN ACCIDENT

Observation and Two Pullman
Cars of Ocean Limited Left
Rails and Rolled Down Em-
bankment.

MONCTON, N.B., April 7.—The fourth main line wreck on the Canadian National line within three months occurred at Atchison's Sliding, forty miles east of Amherst, last evening, when the observation and two pullman cars of the Ocean Limited left the rails and rolled down an embankment. Nine passengers were injured, none of them severely. Paul Landry, of Sydney, with a broken leg, was the most seriously injured.

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CAUSED SENSATION IN
LONDON

LONDON, April 7.—News that Premier Mussolini of Italy had been shot and wounded by a woman giving the name of Violet Albina Gibson caused a sensation in London. The third daughter of the late Lord Ashbourne is the Hon. Violet Albina Gibson, aged 50. The Press Association says: "In connection with today's attack on Mussolini, the Press Association is informed by a member of the family of the late Lord Ashbourne in London that the Hon. Violet Albina Gibson is at present in Rome. She is a lady of some what eccentric temperament."

Dr. F. H. Bradley Sworn In As A North Ward Representative—Purchase Of Equipment By Electric Department Causes Discussion

Mayor Welcomed Newly-Elected North Ward Representative—Only Discussion of Meeting Resulted from Report of Electric Department—Department Favored Purchase of Generator and Water Wheel at Cost of About \$46,000, to Be Paid for by Revenue of Department and Not by Citizens—Aldermen Labrecque and Lorange Objected—Had Not Had Time to Study Matter—Left Over Until Meeting This Evening—Reports of Different Committees Read and Adopted.

ALDERMAN Dr. F. H. Bradley was sworn in as an alderman of the city and a representative of the north ward at the regular meeting of the City Council held at the City Hall last evening, following which he took the chair formerly occupied by ex-Alderman A. C. Skinner.

Regular business routine took up the attention of the Council, and the meeting progressed without discussion until Alderman Newton, chairman of the gas and electric committee, brought forth his report, which provided for the purchase of a generator and water wheel for the Weeden plant at a cost of \$46,000, to be paid for from the current revenue of the department and not by the ratepayers. This clause brought forth opposition from Aldermen Labrecque and Lorange, who stated that they had not been given an opportunity to study the matter before being asked to vote upon it. It was therefore decided to leave the matter over until this evening, when a meeting will be held. Prior to the reading of the minutes and the considering of the business of the meeting His Worship Mayor Brault in a few well-chosen words, welcomed Alderman Bradley to the Council and expressed the hope that he would endeavor to serve the city to the best of his ability.

Alderman Bradley replied to the Mayor's remarks and expressed his pleasure in being privileged to sit on the Council. In his remarks the newly-appointed alderman paid a tribute to the Chief Magistrate, saying "I wish personally to speak a word of appreciation of you Mr. Mayor." Alderman Bradley then said that he had much respect for the Mayor's judgment and did not know of one case where his decision had been to the disadvantage of the city.

Daylight Saving From May 2nd
Till September 26th.
A letter was read by Mr. Antonin Deslauriers, the City Clerk, from the Montreal Daylight Saving Company stating that Montreal was to adopt the advance time during the summer and asked the Sherbrooke Council to do likewise. A motion was then made by Alderman Tetrault and seconded by Alderman Bradley that daylight saving go into effect in Sherbrooke on May 2nd and remain in force until September 26th.

Motion of By-Laws Given
Motion of two by-laws to amend by-laws already in force were given by Aldermen Newton and Houlihan. These motions will come before the Council at its next regular meeting. Alderman Newton gave notice of by-law to amend electric by-law 373 with reference to special contracts to be made with large consumers using more than 500 H.P. of electric current. The notice of motion of the by-law given by Alderman Houlihan was to amend by-law 459 concerning licences.

Electric Department Report Brings
Fourth Argument.
In presenting the report of the electric department, which provided for the purchase of a generator and water wheel for the Weeden plant at a cost of about \$46,000, Alderman Newton, chairman of the gas and electric department, read a report signed by Mr. J. WILL EXPLORE INTERIOR OF DUTCH NEW GUINEA

Expedition Plans to Use Aero-
plane for Flying Over Jungles
and Mountains.

BATAVIA, April 7.—The expedition headed by Professor Matthew W. Stirling, of Berkeley, Calif., sailed this morning for Sourabaya to explore the unknown interior of Dutch New Guinea. "If Pigny tribes are in New Guinea we will find them," declared Stanley A. Hedberg, historian of the expedition. He said they hoped to bring back interesting material, not only for science, but for the world in general, "for New Guinea is the last of the really unexplored countries of the world." An aeroplane will be used for flying over the jungles and mountains.

Lafontaine, which will be addressed by Abbe Oscar Maurice on "Concordance de l'Enseignement Secondaire Avec l'Enseignement Primaire," and at the Mount Royal Hotel, where an address will be given by Dr. Clarence Webster, of Shediac, N.B., on "Ideals in Education." Sir Robert Falconer, K.C.M.G., will be chairman. Both meetings will be followed by a discussion. The University of Montreal is entertaining the French guests at luncheon. At 4 p.m. there will be a general meeting of the conference and election of officers. The evening meeting at 8.30 p.m. will be addressed by M. Jean Bruch, College of France, on "La Geographie Saine," and by Dr. Thomas Hunt Morgan, Columbia University, his subject being "The Outlook of Biology."

Board of Trade To Be Given Room In City Hall.

In the report of the City Hall Committee, Alderman Lorange, the chairman, announced that the request of the Board of Trade for a room in the City Hall to be used as an office, had been granted and that such a room would be provided upon payment of \$2 monthly for the use of electric light. The report of the road department provided for the construction of a side walk on First Avenue at an approximate cost of \$4,798.50, and also for the paving of Convent Street at an approximate cost of \$6,920. The department refused to agree to the request made by the Sherbrooke Railway and Power Company for the paving of Moore Street between Melbourne and Dufferin Avenues.

KENNEDY DECLARES HE WOULD NOT RESIGN IF HE COULD — STATEMENT MADE BY PROGRESSIVE MEMBER

Mr. Kennedy Stated that He Would Not Be Influenced by
the Finding of the Alberta Court Which Established the
Fact that He Sits in Parliament Without Having Been
Properly Elected—Under the Law He Could Not Resign
from the House While a Protest Stood Against His
Election, But He Would Not Resign if He Could, Nor
Would He Withdraw from the House or Refrain from
Voting—He Would, However, When the Session Was
Over, Insist that the Charges Which Had Been Laid
Against Him in the Liberal Petition of Protest Be Fully
Prosecuted.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 7.—Private members' resolutions will be debated in the House of Commons today. The Senate will also sit. Yesterday in the House D. M. Kennedy, Progressive member for Peace River, read a statement dealing with the contention that he should resign his seat. A bill to provide loans to settlers on Crown lands was considered in committee and progress reported, also some estimates for the Department of Marine and Fisheries were carried. The Senate gave second reading to the interim supply bill and adjourned after a brief session.

BILL AUTHORIZING LOANS WAS GIVEN SECOND READING

(Associated Press Despatch)
OTTAWA, April 7.—Second reading was given in the House yesterday afternoon to a bill authorizing advances to settlers on Crown lands. A. W. Neill (Independent, Comox-Alberni) thought that the exercise of authority under this act should not be divided between the Department of Immigration and the Land Settlement Board. Henri Bourassa (Independent, La Belle) pointed out that in the province of Quebec all Crown lands were situated more than 15 miles from the railways. Under the act, therefore, Quebec province would not benefit. He suggested that the bill be amended in this respect so that Quebec would be able to profit under the bill.

In committee on the bill, Hon. Chas. Stewart stated that of course any application for a loan under the legislation could be rejected. Improvements must be made to the land by the settler before he could obtain a loan. Col. James Arthurs (Conservative, Parry Sound) asked if the Minister had received any statement from the governments of Ontario or Quebec in regard to their attitude toward this legislation.

Mr. Stewart replied that he had not. Colonel Arthurs suggested that it would have been advisable to approach these provinces. Mr. Stewart answered that it was found to be more satisfactory to approach provincial governments when you had some definite proposal to make to them. The bill was an attempt to treat all provinces equally. Of course the provincial governments must be prepared to give the Dominion priority of claim against their Crown lands. When the bill was through, he would be enabled to go to the provinces with a definite proposal.

W. A. Boys (Conservative, North Simcoe) asked if there was any particular demand for the legislation. He could not conceive of any such demand from Ontario. He also asked if the bill was to enable settlers to obtain loans when they had security or when they had no security. If they had security, they could obtain loans.

The Minister said that the bill was the result of a persistent demand throughout Canada and in essence its purpose was to promote homesteading. It would probably be taken advantage of chiefly in the Prairie Provinces. Hon. Hugh Guthrie (Conservative, South Wellington) said that provinces other than the three prairie ones would scarcely be affected except in the expenditure. If the making of the loans resulted in the settlement of Crown lands, then there was much merit in the measure.

Forke in Favor of Measure.
Robert Forke, Progressive leader, believed that when land was settled by an industrious homesteader, the country as a whole benefited more than the homesteader himself. Mr. Forke was in favor of the bill. He believed that those who took advantage of it would be mostly foreign-born or the children of foreign parents. In the middle western states today, these were proving to be the most successful farmers, and native Canadians were, as a whole, inclining more towards business and professions than toward agriculture.

Col. Arthurs spoke briefly opposing the bill because of its local applications to the western provinces. W. K. Easing (Conservative, Kootenay West) thought that the first duty of the country was to look after settlers already here on the land. As this was not being done, he could see no sense to a measure designed to bring in settlers. H. A. Mullins (Conservative-Marquette) stated he was "absolutely opposed to this measure." He could not see any justification for a bill to assist "spoon-fed babies." The

Much Land Available For Settlers.
Dr. Manion made a plea for some time scheme which would colonize the great section of northern Ontario from Sudbury to the Manitoba boundary. There were hundreds of thousands of acres available for settlement purposes in this section. He said that the time to consult the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, as well as all the others, was before

SHERBROOKE HOSPITAL STATISTICS

Statistics furnished by the Sherbrooke Hospital for the month of March show that on the first day of the month there were thirty-five patients in the hospital and on the last day forty-seven. During the month ninety-eight patients were admitted, forty-seven of these being to private and fifty-one to public wards. There were thirty-two men, fifty-six women and ten children, of whom forty-three were from Sherbrooke and fifty-five from out-of-town points.

Five births were recorded and two deaths. Seventy-seven operations were performed and fourteen emergencies treated.

In the X-ray department forty-one cases were dealt with and six fluoroscopies.

The diet kitchen served 9,867 meals.

Two nurses graduated in March and six probationers were accepted into the training school.

ST. GERARD MAN RUN OVER BY A FREIGHT TRAIN

Philemon Morin, Twenty-Two Years of Age, Died at St. Vincent de Paul Hospital This Morning as Result of Injuries Received Yesterday Afternoon—Coroner Dr. Bachand Decides Inquest Not Necessary.

Philemon Morin, twenty-two years of age, son of Mr. Thelphore Morin, of St. Gerad, died at the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital here this morning from injuries which he received yesterday, when, in attempting to board a freight train at St. Gerad, he missed his footing and fell under the wheels of one of the cars.

The unfortunate accident, which claimed the victim's life, after several hours of intense suffering, occurred about two o'clock yesterday afternoon. Morin, according to information received attempted to jump on a freight train which was passing through St. Gerad. In attempting to board the moving train however, he missed his footing, and before he could save himself had fallen under the wheels of one of the cars. The wheels passed over him, practically severing both legs. Dr. Lemieux, of St. Gerad, was immediately called following the accident and, after rendering what help he possibly could, ordered Morin's removal to the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital. Upon his arrival at the hospital it was found necessary to amputate both legs, and although everything possible was done for him, he passed away early this morning.

An inquest had been arranged for ten o'clock this morning, but Coroner Dr. L. C. Bachand, after being told of the circumstances of the accident, decided that an inquest was not necessary.

FALSE RELIGION OF BLACK MAN AFRICA'S CURSE

Rev. Gabriel Maguire, D.D., F.R.G.S., Looks for Time When Missionaries and Teachers Will Replace Whiskey and Gin in Africa.

"The false religion of the black man is the curse of Africa, and I look forward to the time, when, instead of sending ships laden to the gunwales with whiskey and gin, the white races of the world will send boatloads after boatloads of missionaries and teachers to the Dark Continent," said the Rev. Dr. Gabriel Maguire, F.R.G.S., in a most interesting and educational address delivered in the Art Hall last evening, the theme of which was, "With the Cannibals in Congo."

Dr. Maguire, who is pastor of the Westmount Baptist Church, has recently received a call to Virginia, and leaves for the south on April 20th, in order to take up his new duties about the middle of May. He came to Sherbrooke on the invitation of Mr. W. P. McVie, secretary of the local Y.M.C.A., and his talk was under the auspices of that institution.

Mr. Meredith Wilson, president of the Rotary Club, acted as chairman, and in his introductory remarks, said that he hoped Sherbrooke would be favored with many more visits from Dr. Maguire.

The speaker, who has been associated with missionary work in Africa for a period of seven years, carried his hearers on a mental journey into the heart of darkest Africa: "into the land of the men who file their teeth," Dr. Maguire, in beginning, stated that the next time he spoke in Sherbrooke, he would take his audience still further into the mysterious interior of Africa, namely, to the country where the pigmy men live.

Dr. Maguire gave full intimation that he certainly intended to return to Canada, also to Sherbrooke. "I am going to the United States," he said, "to create a feeling of friendship between the two countries. All I will have to do in my new calling is to preach on Sundays. I am to have all the assistance I require in my visiting; a secretary to write my letters, etc. The remainder of my time I intend to devote to travelling from city to city, in an endeavor to swing the United States into the League of Nations. The salvation of the world is the

Anglo-Saxon race, and sixty per cent of the people of the United States are Anglo-Saxons."

The Land of Little Men

Prior to launching into his address on cannibals, Dr. Maguire gave a brief outline of what his next talk in this city would be on, namely, the pigmies of Africa.

"The pigmy race," said Dr. Maguire, "is one of the most deceitful of all Africa. Stanley, the great missionary and explorer, lost more men going through the pigmy country than in the whole of Africa."

The speaker went on to say that people in this country talked of evolution. Did they ever think of evolution? The pigmies, in his estimate, were devolving instead of evolving. He then held up a knife, taken from the pigmy country, and said that he could prove that it was made four thousand years ago in Egypt, for the simple reason that scientists had discovered a similar type of knife in the tomb of King Tutankamen. He then exhibited a type of grass cloth, the work of pigmy women. Here, he said, was another instance. "The Egyptians may have learned how to make this cloth from the Africans. Why? Because Egyptian mummies, buried four thousand years ago, are found to be wrapped in cloth identical to this."

"The pigmies, too, have secrets that the white man does not know," Dr. Maguire mentioned two kinds of poison manufactured by them, and which scientists in England and the United States have failed to duplicate. One was made from vegetable substance and the other from animal substance.

The Bangala Tribe

The experiences of Dr. Maguire had while among the cannibals was with the Bangala tribe, in the Congo.

Dr. Maguire began by explaining the manner of travelling through the forests of Africa. The clothes of the European visitor consisted of a suit of white material, a cork helmet that covered the shoulders, and thick-soled shoes.

The natives were practically next to nothing. Dr. Maguire held up the costume of an African chief, which was not more than fifteen inches long and five inches wide, and then asked his hearers to picture for themselves the clothes that the ordinary natives would wear!

The goods to be carried were put into oblong boxes, weighing not more than seventy pounds. A native bearer could carry one of these at a steady dog trot for twenty-five miles a day. The direction of the breeze, too, governed the route taken; while it was also advisable to journey in the heat of the sun rather than by moonlight. Dr. Maguire

REV. DR. MAGUIRE WAS SPEAKER AT ROTARY CLUB

Gave Very Inspiring and Useful Talk on Rotary Movement, Pointing Out Great Service Which Can Be Rendered to the World by This Organization.

Very practical and valuable advice was given to members of the Rotary Club at their weekly meeting at the New Sherbrooke House last evening by the Rev. Gabriel Maguire, D.D., F.R.G.S., who delivered a most inspiring talk on "Rotary", bringing out the true aims and motives of this world-wide organization.

In opening his remarks Rev. Dr. Maguire traced the history of Rotary, pointing out that it was founded by a small group of men in Chicago, and that it has grown until today it has taken root in practically every country of the world. The City of London alone, it was stated, has twenty-one Rotary Clubs.

The next point referred to by the speaker was in connection with Rotary's part in the United States during the World War. In this respect Dr. Maguire remarked that Rotary had helped in no small degree to the entrance of that country into the war. While speaking in connection with the United States, the speaker told his hearers that it was generally agreed that the feeling existing between Canada and the United States was not quite as agreeable as might be desired, and stated that there was a duty for Rotary to do in improving this situation, but also assured his hearers that it was the duty of all to be one hundred per cent Canadians. Every man must work for his fellow-men, for his city, then his province and then the whole Dominion, he declared.

Value Of Service Clubs.

The great value to a country of service clubs such as the Rotary Club was also stressed by the speaker. "If you put the motto of Rotary, 'Service before Self' into practice you can get anything you want. If you make an appeal to Ottawa in the name of your club the authorities will have to grant your request because it is the pick of the community who are asking," Dr. Maguire said.

In a very interesting manner Dr. Maguire then compared the entry of General Allenby into Jerusalem, when the gates of the city on foot, with bared head, and when once in the city reverently knelt and thanked God; with the entrance of the former Kaiser of Germany, who entered the city on horse back as a conquering hero.

Anglo Saxon Characteristics.

In concluding his remarks Dr. Maguire paid a great tribute to the qualities and characteristics of the Anglo Saxon-races and remarked that they were the leaders of the world. The one great aim should be to get the United States to agree with Canada and England on world matters, the speaker said, because these three nations were all of Anglo Saxon descent and were leaders. The European nations were already preparing for war, he claimed, and it was therefore necessary for these great Anglo Saxon nations to unite for action in stopping this progress. The only way to bring about this union of the great countries is through the service clubs, he said, and in this respect there was a great work to be done in which the Rotary Club would render very valuable assistance.

During his remarks Dr. Maguire made use of many humorous stories, which added greatly to the interest of his address.

Following Dr. Maguire's interesting talk he was heartily thanked by Rotarians A. A. Munster and K. Wilson.

EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES III.

(By W. O. Rothney, M.A., B.D., Ph.D.)
(Continuing the Consideration of Educational Objectives.)

Civic training is another element that must find a place among educational objectives. It is the business of education to develop in the individual pupil those qualities whereby he will act well his part as a member of a neighborhood, town, province and nation, and that will give him a basis for understanding international problems. He must, at least, be made acquainted with present-day civic problems. He must have practical knowledge of social agencies and institutions, such as municipal, town and county councils, school boards, civic government, and international organizations. There must be developed in him right attitudes toward civic duty, toward law, toward the paying of taxes, toward other people, and toward other nations. The idea of human brotherhood must be permanently established in the lives of the rising generation.

We note, too, that if people use their leisure time well, it recreates their powers, and enlarges and enriches their lives, and makes them better able to bear the responsibilities of life; but that if leisure time is unworthily used, it impairs health, disrupts home life, lessens vocational efficiency, and destroys the sense of civic responsibility. In view of this, education for the worthy use of leisure becomes one of the objectives at which our schools must aim. Pupils must be equipped with the ability and the desire to secure from leisure that which will enrich, enlarge and strengthen the whole personality. To this end the school must not only acquaint pupils with, and foster their interest in, the common means of enjoyment, such as music, art, literature, drama and social intercourse, but must organize, guide and direct the social activities of its pupils, and see that adequate recreation is provided for youth, both within the school and by the proper agencies of the community.

One other objective remains to be noted, namely, character training. In a democratic society this becomes paramount among the objectives of education. Pupils must be led to build their characters on the basis of the Golden Rule. "As ye would that men should do to you, do ye also to them likewise." They must be trained to test all conduct by this touchstone, and to practice this principle in all relationships of life. They must be taught what is right and what is wrong, and why. And they must leave the school with a strong prejudice against everything that is unworthy of themselves, or inimical to society; and with pronounced sentiments in favor of everything that makes for the welfare of mankind and the upward moral trend of human life.

These objectives are the minimum that should be aimed at in any educational programme for the schools of a democratic country. Any course of study that does not make specific and adequate provision for each of the objectives here enumerated cannot be regarded as adequate for our day and generation.

PRESS COMMENT

POLAND AND THE LEAGUE.

(Warsaw Robotnik)
The grant of a permanent seat to Poland is the logical consequence of the signature of the Locarno Treaties. Since the Little Entente actually possesses a permanent seat, Poland would be the only signatory of Locarno outside the Council. As the problems of Eastern Europe are no less important than the problems of the west, this would mean an injustice of great danger to peace, of which Poland would be the victim.

A BIG JOB FOR PEACE-PREACHERS.

(Salem News)
The organization of women opposed to war, which recently objected to the continued manufacture of war toys has been told that the manufacturers will continue to make such articles because wars will always happen. Whether that is true or not is a matter of opinion, although it is the sentiment of this country that we must always be prepared. But children do like tin soldiers and drums and toy cannon and it does not take propaganda to make them do so. There is something fascinating about such toys. And if peace organizations are going to abolish everything that smacks of the soldier they have a big job to do at the start with English literature. It is better that youngsters should be given a chance to know that such a thing as war has existed and then be educated to the point where they disapprove of war, than that efforts should be made to keep them in ignorance of the past and the possibilities.

WHO THREW THE WRENCH?

(Philadelphia Public Ledger)
There may have been some doubt who killed cock robin at Geneva. Brazil has had to take a considerable amount of blame. It was merely a suspicion that Italy had a hand in it. The Fascist press, however, has no doubts about the matter. "It was Signor Mussolini's prompt action," exults the Rome Tribune, "that caused the downfall of this absurd farce." Another Fascist organ adds this pleasant note: "Italy alone among the great nations, thanks to the Fascists, has long ago abandoned all utopian ideas of peace and, having concentrated her attention on preparations in every field, is on the watch and can be ready at a minute's notice." Italy is in the League of Nations, but not of it; at peace, for the time being, but scarcely peaceful in tendency. Italy is playing with the same sort of fire as the Prussian junkers played with prior to 1914. The experience of others is not so good a teacher as it is sometimes cracked up to be.

CRIME AND CHANCES OF ESCAPE.

(St. Paul Pioneer Press)
A murderer in this country has a three-to-one chance of escaping arrest; after arrest, a twelve-to-one chance of escaping conviction; after conviction, a hundred-to-one chance of escaping the death penalty. This is the conclusion reached by an American publicist who has made a careful study of the crime situation. All but eight of the States retain capital punishment for first degree murder; but with the chances of escape from arrest, conviction and execution thus favoring the criminal, capital punishment is a joke. The re-establishment of the death penalty where it has been abolished will not alone prove it murder. There must be more efficient police work, speedier trials, surer convictions—and no escape from the death penalty once it has been imposed. Then capital punishment will be something to conjure with. A man will think twice before deliberately planning a murder or a crime in which murder is likely to be involved if the chances are, as in Great Britain, a hundred to one against his escaping the gallows or electric chair.

THE LEAGUE AND WORLD PEACE.

(Ottawa Journal)
Mr. Ramsay MacDonald declares that the world has just witnessed "one of the most tragic failures British diplomacy has ever met," and adds: "It is doubtful now whether the League of Nations will survive."

But if the League cannot survive a mere peace-time difficulty about the composition of its Council, does its survival matter a great deal, either one way or the other? If the statesmen who meet at Geneva cannot be depended upon to decide such a comparatively simple matter without breaking up like a Donnybrook fair, why should they be depended upon, how could they be depended upon, to avert a threatened war?

But the League will survive. It will survive not because of anything that will be done, or left undone, at Geneva, but simply because it rests upon the secure foundation that the world is sick of war, is still sore with the wounds of war, and will support anything, however ineffective, that may make war less likely.

It would be folly to depend upon Geneva as a guarantee of peace. Men have not yet learned to beat swords into ploughshares, to dispense with force. But they have learned, paid in death and debt for their schooling, that force settles little; and for that reason Geneva will remain as an expression of the world's desire to strive for something better.

OUR NEIGHBOR, THE MAN IN THE MOON.

(Boston Transcript)
A Paris despatch to the Brooklyn Daily Eagle has it that a telescope being built by Professor George Willis Ritchey will be so powerful that, when viewed through it, the moon will appear as only ten miles away. Our esteemed Brooklyn contemporary is a highly reputable newspaper. It specializes, among other things, in the printing of sermons. If it says that Professor Ritchey's telescope will put a picture of the moon in the class with the movie "close-up" we know that it is satisfied of the truth of its assertion, with the qualification that this will be possible if the "baking" of the giant reflector of the new telescope is a success.

It is certainly to be hoped that no accident will thwart the plan to make the man in the moon a near neighbor. A Massachusetts scientist has devised a scheme of shooting a rocket to the earth's satellite. After touching off his missile, were Professor Ritchey's telescope handy, our astronomer might be able to see the rocket land. Its impact on the moon ought to be sufficient to kick up dust enough to be seen at an apparent distance of ten miles. If this process of enlarging the telescope goes on what may we not expect? There is the much-discussed question of the markings on Mars that suggest the existence of canals. If some giant telescope of the future should reveal Martians canoeing on these waterways a long controversy would be happily ended, and science would have achieved another triumph.

THE EGYPTIAN SPHINX.

(Christian Science Monitor)
After more than a year's eclipse political activity in Egypt is about to revive, for new elections to the now suspended Egyptian Parliament will take place at the end of May or the beginning of June. There seems to be a general expectation that Zaghlul Pasha and his party will secure a majority, and if so, judging by the past record of the Nationalist leader, political controversy is likely once more to be the order of the day. Zaghlul has been the stormy petrel of Egyptian politics for many a long year, and though the experiences of his last period of office may have chastened him somewhat, they are not likely to have altered completely the fiery nature of his political ideals and character.

Egypt, in fact, will this summer have the opportunity of making a fresh start in the task of learning to govern itself, in the effort to do which it failed so lamentably two years ago. The British Government reached the decision to recognize the independence of Egypt, to allow its leaders to draw up a constitution for themselves, and to give the Egyptian people full control of their own domestic affairs, in the year 1922. It made that decision in the hope that the Egyptians, recognizing that British control of Egyptian affairs during the preceding forty years had lifted the country out of a condition of poverty, oppression and misrule into one of exceptional order, peace and prosperity, would co-operate with the London Government in solving the four questions outstanding between the two countries. These questions were the protection of British communications through the Suez Canal, the defence of Egypt against foreign attack, the protection of foreign residents and property within Egypt, and the future relations between Egypt and the Sudan.

Dr. Parker, one gathered, after a sojourn in the teeming maelstrom of our nation's beauty makers in solemn session, is to the association what ham is to eggs or Izzy to Moe. And the association howled in wild applause when Dr. Parker dished up the sideburn-mustachio-bald trinity.

"It's only logical," says he. "There is a capillary attraction in the human system for hair. If it's not allowed to grow hair on the top of the head, sideburns and mustaches are the only reasonable thing. Even now we see more women with traces of mustaches than ever before!"

As to the bald stuff, that's simple too. "Bobs cause strain on the top of the head!"

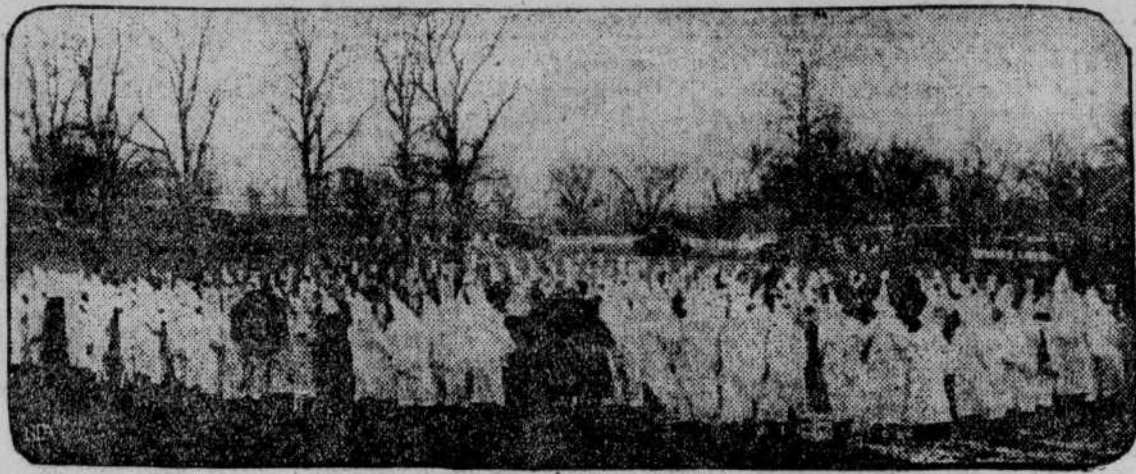

RECOMMEND INCREASE IN
JAMAICA'S CUSTOMS DUTIES

Plan Made to Enforce Employment of Jamaicans Unable to Enter U.S. on Account of Immigration Quota Law.

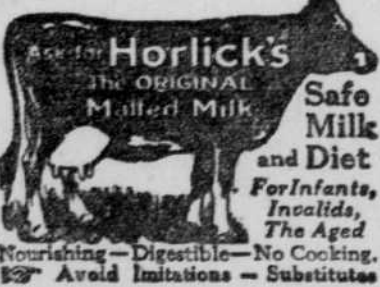

HE'S FOUND HIS LAST POLE—ONLY LIVING MAN TO HAVE BEEN ON TOP
OF WORLD SAYS "NEVER AGAIN!"

By David Dietz, News Service Writer.

MOUNT WILSON, Cal., April 7.—Our universe is only one of many existing in the vast stretches of space.

There are a million universes within the range of the great 100-inch telescope here at the Mount Wilson Observatory, the largest telescope in the world.

It is impossible to tell how many universes would come within the range of an even larger telescope.

It may be that the number of universes in existence is infinite, literally stretching out through space forever.

The largest of these universes measured so far is about one-seventh the size of the universe in which our sun and earth are situated. But there is no reason for supposing that this is the largest one.

May be Larger Universes.

There may be universes out in space as large as our own and even larger.

These facts, the most amazing which have been brought to light in modern astronomy, were unearthed by Dr. Edwin Hubble, a member of the Mt. Wilson staff.

Of course, there has been preliminary work in this direction. But it remained for Dr. Hubble to clinch the matter by direct observation.

The stars which shine in the heavens constitute our universe. At first astronomers thought this was all that existed. But later they found that the stars constituted a system confined to a certain portion of space while other objects lay far out in space beyond this system or universe of ours.

The objects are the so-called spiral nebulae. They are invisible to the naked eye, but in the telescope look like whirling spirals of luminous cloudlike material.

Proving the Speculations.

There was much speculation about their nature. Finally some astronomers suggested that these nebulae might be other universes of stars which were so far away that they appeared to be condensed into luminous cloudlike stuff.

Now Dr. Hubble has proved that this is actually the case.

He turned the big 100-inch telescope on the outer portions of the nearest of these spirals and took photographs with exposures of several hours. The resulting photographs showed that the outer arms of the spiral were actually composed of stars.

The 100-inch telescope differs from the more familiar sort of telescope in that it has a mirror at the bottom of the tube instead of a lens at the top. The observer instead of looking into an eyepiece at the bottom of the tube looks into an eyepiece set in the side of the tube at its top.

The telescope is called the 100-inch because the mirror is 100 inches in diameter.

A 45-Foot Tube.

This mirror weighs four and a half tons. It is set at the bottom of a 45-foot open-work tube of steel. The tube, mirror and other parts



which have to be removed as the telescope is used, weigh 100 tons.

The telescope stands in the centre of a great dome which is 100 feet high. The observer stands on a platform which is hung from the top of the dome. Motors move this platform so that when the telescope is pointed at an object, the platform can be brought alongside the telescope's top to permit the observer to look into the eyepiece.

And so, as the motors pointed the great telescope and moved the platform across the great dome, Dr. Hubble discussed these distant universes.

"The nearest of these universes is hundreds of thousands of light years away," he said. "That is, they are so far away that it takes the light from them hundreds of thousands of years to reach us. The speed of light is 186,000 miles per second."

"Only a handful of them are near enough to analyze in detail, but it is fair to assume that the others resemble them in general, but are farther away."

Just Like This Universe.

"In analyzing these near ones, I find the same sort of thing which is found in our own universe of stars. For example, these are the same sort of giant blue stars and the same

sort of variable stars.

"By comparing the brightness of stars in the nebulae with that of similar stars in our own system we can estimate the distance of these universes from our own."

"We find that the average diameter of these universes is about 10,000 light years, and that there are less than 100 of them within three million light years of our own universe."

"As I have said, there are a million of them within the range of this big telescope. The outermost ones of this million are eighty million light years away."

"What is beyond those eighty million light years we do not know."

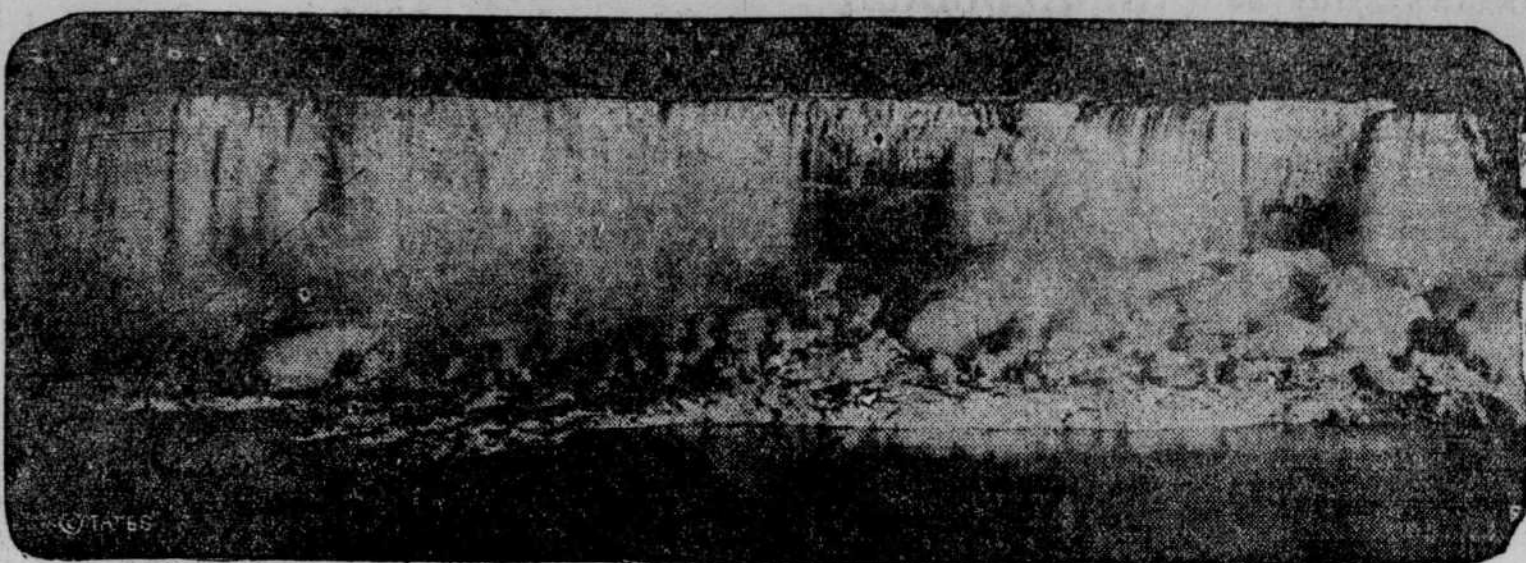

had tried the latter method on one occasion, and was overcome by what is known as "moon sickness."

Fiercest of All Animals

Dr. Maguire related an incident in his experiences which terminated extremely disastrously for him. One day he had attempted to shoot an African buffalo, the fiercest of all animals. His aim had not been true, and he compared the charge of the buffalo to the rush of a locomotive. He endeavored to pull himself up onto the branch of a tree. The enraged animal was too quick for him, and before he could get out of danger, it had ripped a deep wound on the front of his body. Only the quickness of his head man, with his native knife, saved him from being trampled and torn to death.

tors would not risk operating on He had also been subject to malaria fever thirty-three times. On one occasion his usual weight of some two hundred odd pounds being reduced to one hundred and seventeen, and that when he was recovering from the disease.

Insects and Snakes

The speaker dealt at some length on the insects and snakes to be found in the African jungles. He mentioned in particular the driver ants, who travelled in army formations and cleaned away every living thing in their path, even human beings if found lying on the ground. With regard to snakes, Dr. Maguire stated that most people shuddered at the thought of them. Nevertheless they were the cleanest animal living. They ate nothing but what they killed themselves. Their bed was also of the cleanest leaves. Dr. Maguire added that he had eaten snake meat more than once, and claimed that it was one of the most delectable dishes that could be tasted.

Embalming

The speaker then went on to speak of the funeral service of an African chief. The chiefs were all buried in a process that continued for a period of seven months. This was another instance which went to show that the black man once knew a higher form of civilization.

Livingstone, "the great doctor, the friend of the black man," as the natives were wont to call him, was returned to England in a perfect state of preservation. Dr. Maguire then went on to explain the manner in which the Africans go about the process of embalming. "Did the Egyptians get it from the Africans, or the Africans get it from the Egyptians?" he queried.

Usually, two or three wives of a dead chief were slain at the grave-side by the witch doctor of the tribe, and thrown into the open pit into the arms of four men. Dr. Maguire stated that time after time he had come upon mounds where chiefs had been buried, and in each instance, this which had contained whiskey and gun were scattered around the grave.

In an equally interesting way, the speaker related the ritual to be gone through prior to a wedding.

Characteristics of the Bangala Tribe

"The Bangala are not witty. They are, however, kind-hearted, and will divide their food even if starving. They have wonderful minds, and it is amazing how quick they learn. I have preached before a crowd of natives, and after singing a hymn twice in their mother tongue, asked them to repeat it. This they did

to perfection. We white people spoil our minds by giving too much to pen and paper."

Musical Programme

Previous to Dr. Maguire's address, a group of musical selections were rendered. Mr. Ralph Gustafson played a piano solo; Mrs. J. K. Edwards, who is rapidly becoming a favorite with Sherbrooke music-lovers, rendered Woodman's "An Open Secret," and for an encore "Thy Beaming Eyes," by MacDowell. Mr. Gault Parker acting as accompanist, and Mr. Harold Connor favored the audience with a violin solo. Mr. Gustafson accompanying him.

Unique Curios

and not after the bill became law. It was not fair to the rest of the country that a bill should be passed which would benefit merely one section.

G. B. Nicholson (Conservative, East Algoma) asked how many schemes involving the expenditure of large sums of money, the Government proposed to bring down. He mentioned a number of the proposals which the Government has placed before Parliament involving the expenditure of money. There were too many schemes which cost the country large sums.

Mr. Stewart said that Canada had passed the point where an immigration or colonization scheme could apply to one section alone. Any policy must be applicable to the whole country.

Mr. Meighen declared that it was impossible to get the type of scrub land which would come under the bill, under cultivation by means of Government subvention. "Don't try to help the settler by helping him into debt," said Mr. Meighen. If people were in the district and settled, the cultivation of the land was assured.

Mr. Meighen had seen in Prince Edward Island farm lands which were very desirable, yet they had been abandoned. "How can you justify taxing people there in order to cultivate scrub land in western Canada?" he asked. Instead of trying to force virgin land under the plough by means of legislation, it

REPORTED TWO AVIATORS MADE SAFE LANDING

Fliers Land at Circle City—Were on Return from Point Barrow, Where They Had Flown With Supplies Last Week.

NEW YORK, April 7.—The North American Newspaper Alliance announced today that Captain George H. Wilkins and Pilot Ben Eielson landed safely at Circle City, about 150 miles northeast of Fairbanks, Alaska, yesterday afternoon. The fliers were on a return journey from Point Barrow, where they had flown with supplies last week. Captain Wilkins and Lieut. Eielson left Fairbanks in their plane, the Alaskan, March 31, for Point Barrow, 500 miles away, with 3,000 pounds of supplies. Point Barrow is the base for the Wilkins expedition which will explore the Arctic regions this summer.

The fliers reached their destination without mishap four and a half hours later. Because of poor radio transmission, however, a message from them was not received until the night of April 1.

They were not heard from again until yesterday. A sister plane, the Detroit, was being prepared for an attempt to obtain news of them when yesterday's despatch was received.

It would be better to concentrate on the lands already cleared. "The people will go on the land if they can make it pay," he said.

To Put Real Canadians on Land.

Hon. W. R. Motherwell, Minister of Agriculture, pointed out that most of the discussion was irrelevant, as the House had already approved the principle of the bill. The House should allow the bill to be proceeded with an order that it could be taken up clause by clause. Judicious assistance, as proposed, would be productive of excellent results, said Mr. Motherwell.

John Evans (Progressive, Saskatchewan) approved the measure. "Here is a scheme to put real Canadians on the land," he stated. Peter McGibbon (Conservative, Muskoka, Ontario) declared that the bill "does not appeal to this House or to the country." The proposed measure should be withdrawn. J. E. Letellier (Liberal, Compton) believed that, if the legislation were enacted, commendable results would be achieved.

STANLEY CUP
IS CAPTURED
BY MAROONS

Montreal Outplayed Victoria at Every Stage of Fourth Game of Series to Win Out by a Score of 2 to 0.

(Associated Press Despatch) MONTREAL, April 7.—Montreal Maroons have reached the pinnacle. They attained the highest honors to which a professional hockey club can aspire—the Stanley Cup and world's professional title—when they defeated the Victoria Cougars, Cup defenders from the Pacific coast, in the fourth game of the championship series at the Forum last night, by 2 to 0.

Stinging under the defeat received in the third game under their own rules, the National Hockey League titleholders entered the fourth contest, played under the western code, determined to end the series. They outfought the West-erners at every stage of the game and were worthy victors through their aggressive battling.

Nelson Stewart, Maroon ace, capped a season of sensational hockey, his first as a professional player, by scoring the two goals which

brought the titular honors. Both came in the second period and were largely the result of the ability of this star to keep his brain functioning and his eye on the puck and net. It was Stewart's calculating, crafty hockey which proved a big asset in the Maroons' triumphal march.

Montreal clearly earned their victory. Playing under the western rules, they showed none of the early cautiousness which marked their play in the second game, the first contested under the western style of hockey. They tore into the Cup defenders from the start and gradually wore them down to the point where they were able to push their aggressive game to the extent of tallies.

That the Victoria team was fairly beaten in its unsuccessful defence of the trophy was freely admitted by the coast players and officers. A glance at the record of shots on the two goalies during the night gives a fair indication of the balance of play held by the Maroons. Altogether Holmes was called on to make thirty-eight saves, two of which he missed. At the other end Benedict locked twenty-two shots which were dead on the goal, and in so doing for the third time in four games shut out the Cougars.

The difference between the victors and the losers was largely in aggressiveness. Victoria had speed to burn. They fairly flashed over the ice. It was seldom that these dashing players could be found long enough in one place to give them a good healthy body check. They made the game a spectacle for the crowd under their western style of open hockey. But they fell down badly at the defence.

Montreal continually bored in for goals. They sought rebounds off the boards and off Holmes' pads at all times.

There was not a weak link on the Maroon team. Phillips was a veritable star with his rushes and his useful poke check at mid-ice. Siebert tore over the ice and drilled shots which fairly lifted Holmes off his feet. Broadbent worked overtime and made more than certain that his covers did not become dangerous as possible Cougar scorers. Noble, Stewart and Benedict were brilliant on the defence.

Captain Clem Loughlin, on the Cougar defence, was the star for the dethroned champions. Happy Holmes played a dashing game in goal. Frederickson showed great speed, but was closely watched as were Oatman, Walker, Hart and Foyston.
