About a dozen white men, thus far, have been killed and eaten by the cannibals.

LONDON MARKETS DULL.

There is also a Good Deal of Talk of Dearer Money. New York, Jan. 5.—The Commercial Advertiser's financial cable from London says:—The markets here were dull and dull to-day, Paris realizing at the settlement. It is preparing for the Tonghian loan. There is also talk of dearer money. Americans opened heavy on profit taking here. New York bought little and the close was depressed, except for Ontario and Western, in which there was good buying here and from New York. The feeling here is that the market will pause until the 1899 prospects seem clearer. Spanish fours were 44. Copper's were dull on the Paris tone. Money was easy. 2175-000 gold was taken from South America and 25,000 arrived from London. The price has relaxed to 77 1/4. The Bank of Bengal has raised its discount rate from 6 to 7 per cent.

MONTREAL STOCK MARKET.

Montreal, Jan. 5.—Business on the local Stock Exchange opened strong this morning, but later became heavy through disquieting rumours of trouble in France. It was said that the Parisian holders of C. P. R. were selling, and this caused the market to lag off. The price for C. P. R. here was 86 to 86 1/2, at which prices some one hundred shares were sold. War Eagle was really the only lively stock in the market, and the transactions in this amounted to over ten thousand shares. The opening price was \$3.00, and at the close of the morning session the last sale was at \$3.13 1/2. There is no doubt a strong interest in the street working toward the amalgamation of the different Electrical interests, and while this may at some time become a fact there is no immediate prospect of its going into effect within the next few months at least. Montreal Gas sold around 20 1/2, some eight hundred shares changing hands; while some five hundred shares of Toronto Street were sold at 10 1/2 to 11.00. Montreal Street Railway sold at 29 1/2 to 29 3/4 and 29 1/2 for moderate amounts. The balance of the market was quiet. Montreal Street Railway earned \$4,156 yesterday, which was an increase of \$692.24 over the same day last year. The earnings of the Toronto Street Railway for the past three months are as follows: 1st, \$1,250.75; Monday, \$3,690.48; Tuesday, \$3,653.79. London Cable quotes Grand Trunk first at 66 1/2, second at 45 1/2, third at 20; C. P. R. 84 and Hudson Bay 21.

NEW YORK STOCKS.

New York, Jan. 5.—Notable gains were recorded in the specialties and some of the railway stocks to-day. The announcement of gold engagements of a million and a half overcame the reactionary tendency of the forenoon and set the market moving upward, which continued to the close. The condition of the exchange and money markets do not seem to warrant the expectation that the import of gold will be a sustaining movement, the theory being that our large balances of five would not be drawn upon largely, while money can be loaned at more profitable rates abroad. A lower range of London prices gave a declining tendency to early transactions here. Manipulation and speculation in cotton, Brooklyn Transit, Peoples Gas gave better tone to the Railway, but on profit taking there were some very substantial losses. With the announcement of the gold imports in the afternoon, the bulls had their own way, especially in Brooklyn Transit, Pittsburg C. C., and St. Louis and Colorado Southern. The railway shares moved rather sluggishly until late in the day when an active demand arose for Louisville, Rock Island and the South Western group, excepting Texas Pacific which broke badly at the end. On the publication of a report that Manhattan Elevated was to be electrically equipped by General Electric, these stocks advanced with prices some 20 to 30 points, and on profit taking early in the afternoon, they receded sharply on profit taking. The purchase of coal lands in Pennsylvania by parties friendly to the Ontario and Western which it was inferred would largely increase the traffic of that road and render it active and strong. Reports of the possibility of Brooklyn Union Gas increasing its dividend rate and forming advantageous alliances bettered prices of that stock five points. There was nothing in the current news to account for the rise in Chicago Gas, except talk of continued good business. Hooking Valley securities were weak on the publication of the reorganization plan, which the movement in the Company's stock was more drastic than expected. The common stock dropped 1 1/2, the preferred four, with a subsequent recovery in no case except the 5's, which regained 3/4 of their earlier losses. Brooklyn Traction was very strong, rising 3/4. Late in the day it was said that while the contract to equip the Manhattan electrically had not been given, that confidence was expressed by General Electric interests that they would get the contract. The closing prices at the Stock Exchange were as follows:—

FRANCO-RUSSIAN TREATY.
London, Jan. 5.—The Paris correspondent of the Times, M. de Blowitz, reviewing affairs in France and in the sphere of French influence during the last year, gives curious and interesting details as to the Franco-Russian treaty negotiations at St. Petersburg. He says:—"The first article of the draft treaty declares that it had not for its object any modification of the European territorial status quo." M. Hanotaux refused to countersign such a treaty containing "Why, it is a repetition of the Frankfurt treaty." Count Muraviev responded, "You will never induce the Czar to sign a renegade treaty." Neither M. Hanotaux nor Count Muraviev would yield. The problem seemed insoluble, when Count Muraviev had a conference with President Faure, who yielded, admitting that it was undesirable to have such an article, but that, on the other hand, it would be impossible for him to return to France without a treaty. Accordingly the treaty was signed, Count Muraviev having declared that Emperor Nicholas would not be able to fight for France if he were ever unjustly attacked by anybody, but would not intervene in a mere war of revenge.
