## EDUCATION.

Mr. C. E. COLLIER

**PROPOSES** shortly to remove to the Mansion-house, situated one mile on the Desport road, adjoining the residence of the late Judge De Bonny, for the purpose of keeping a *Classical, French, and English, Boarding School*, for young Gentlemen.

The terms will be moderate, and no pains spared to render it an economical institution, and essentially serviceable to youth, by the permanent engagement of qualified instructors in each department, and its respect to its domestic arrangement, for which the extent of the premises afford considerable advantages.

The Public may rely that *moral and religious duties* will be inculcated and enforced; that in the *education, government, meals, and recreation of the young gentlemen*, a methodical system will be introduced, and persevered in; while the advantages of a regular mode of living, and of so airy a residence; the small number of pupils, compared with a Day school, and the superior opportunity such an institution affords, to exclude exceptional boys, are the prominent objects which it is hoped will entitle the "Quebec Boarding-school" to public patronage.

**INSTRUCTORS.**—The great influx of talent into the Province, this year from Europe, has enabled Mr. Collier to enter into permanent engagements with qualified Instructors, and the following branches will be taught: The Greek, Latin, French, and English languages; Mathematics, Geography, with the use of the Globes, Writing, Arithmetic, Book-keeping, &c. &c. Dancing, and Music Masters, will also be engaged.

**REGULATION, &c.**—The youth belonging to the English, French, and Scotch Churches, will have strict attention paid to the performance of their several duties, under Tutors belonging to the respective Churches.—Family prayers will be read by them in separate apartments, and the *language, manners and conduct of the pupil sedulously attended to.*

**VACATIONS.**—An annual vacation of one month will be given. Young Gentlemen whose friends reside at a great distance, may continue at school during the recess.

**TERMS.**—very moderate, and proportioned to the children's age. The stipulated sum, to include Board, Education, Washing, and every other incidental expense; clothes, books, music, dancing, and medical attendance, excepted.

**DOMESTIC ARRANGEMENTS.**—A Semptress will be retained in the house, to make and mend the clothes, so as to render the institution desirable for youth, even in an economical point of view. The Board will be plain but liberal. The premises are extensive, with excellent pleasure grounds, and afford every opportunity to procure plentiful supplies of vegetables, fruit, milk, &c. &c.

Mr. COLLIER, who is actuated by a deep sense of gratitude for the encouragement he has received from his friends and the public in general, since the earliest establishment of his Day-school in Quebec, cannot allow the present occasion to escape without observing to his patrons, that such zeal in the cause of Education, must eventually produce, in its diffusion and extension, the happiest result to the society; and he assures them on the other hand, that it has indelibly impressed on the object of their patronage, a sincere desire to revive, on every future occasion, the grateful and unaffected sentiment which he has now the honor publicly to avow.

## COMMUNICATION.

## THE HEBREW NATION.

The following Correspondence has taken place between the Rev. S. Hirschell, principal Rabbi of the German Jews in Great Britain, and J. J. Lockhart, Esq. M. P. for Oxford, on the subject of some observations reported to have been made by the latter in the House of Commons, in the course of a debate on the Bankrupt-laws.—We give insertion to the Article with pleasure, as containing a vindication of a whole nation (among whom are to be found many most valuable Members of Society,) from a slanderous imputation, originating in a misconception of the words of the Hon. Member—for which those who are acquainted with the difficulties under which Reporters labour, will make due allowance.—

"SIR—I have the honour to address you, in consequence of a report which has appeared in the Daily Papers of the 23d Inst. of an expression used by you, in the House of Commons on the 29d, in a speech on the subject of the Bankrupt-laws. You are therein stated to have said, that 'you were credibly informed, and you believed it to be true, that the people of this persuasion,' alluding to the Jews, 'have no regard to the solemnity of an oath, unless administered before one of their Rabbis.'—I therefore feel it my duty to lose no time hereby most solemnly and unequivocally to assure you, that the information which you are stated to have received on this subject is perfectly unfounded. An oath administered to a Jew, and taken by him, in any place, and before any authority whatever, is a binding and solemn obligation, of which the breach would, according to the tenets of our Religion, entail on him the spiritual punishments of perjury. After this solemn declaration, which I am prepared to substantiate by the most incontrovertible evidence, I entreat, from your well known candour, that you will give as much publicity to the contradiction of your alleged statement as you have done to its promulgation. And I doubt not but you will feel with me, the propriety and necessity of so doing, when you reflect on the consequences which might result from its remaining uncontradicted. The lives and fortunes of his Majesty's subjects, Christians as well as Jews, depending on the verdict of a Jury, might be unjustly sacrificed, if the statement attributed to you, in the debate of the 23d of May, were to influence the minds of Jurymen. I have the honor to be, respectfully, yours.

"SIR—I am honoured with your letter of the 23th of May last. You have been informed, it appears, that I had stated in my place, that 'the people of the Jewish persuasion had no regard to the solemnity of an oath unless administered by one of their Rabbis.' The Reporter of the debates was incorrect in this statement; what I did say, after observing that some of the Hebrew nation were the promoters of false debts before Commissioners of Bankrupts, was, that these persons, meaning and clearly alluding to the antecedent persons, so stated to have been in the habit of thus acting, did not, as I was informed, feel themselves under the same obligation under the oath administered by the Commissioners as by such oaths as they took before their own Rabbis; and I did suggest that some reference and conference should be holden with yourself on this subject; but I have never asserted that it was either a tenet of the Hebrew persuasion or religion, or the moral philosophy of its ancient or modern writers, or of the Hebrew nation in general, that an oath not taken according to and under its own laws and customs, was not obligatory on the conscience of the person speaking under it; and I can assure you that it never was my intention to throw so unmerited a stigma upon the whole of an ancient

and suffering people, from whose records the whole world has drawn its first atheistic revelation of its relation with the Creator, and a knowledge of his laws; but I did feel that in many instances, on the subject on which I was speaking, the obligation of an oath had been set at naught, and I did think the information I had received was true with respect to the persons engaged in such transactions, and the more so, since we have so many examples in the history of human crimes, of bad men being unwilling even in the pursuit of guilt, to load their consciences with the breach of some solemnities peculiarly impressive on them, and whom other forms directed to the same object, would not awaken to a due sense of their conduct. I do not assert, however, that this is peculiar to any nation whatsoever. With the strongest wishes for the happiness, prosperity, and security of the Hebrew nation, and with the highest respect and consideration for yourself, I remain, sir, your most obedient and devoted servant,

## EXAMINATION OF SOME PRINCIPLES RELATIVE TO AGRICULTURE, TRADE, AND TAXATION.

Perhaps in no country in the world are economical principles better understood than in England. Within these last twenty years several agricultural and economical societies have been established in France, Italy and Germany, and, like our public societies in England, have published annual reports of their transactions.—It is almost ludicrous to read what their labours have amounted to. They bear the same reference to our English practical knowledge, which the medical and philosophical societies of Copenhagen and Stockholm bear to our Royal Society of Physicians. And it was the Danish and Swedish societies, who in a report, we believe circulated by authority, recommended the use of friction by iron for all gouty and rheumatic diseases.

But even in England some very crude notions are occasionally circulated through the medium of the press; and when they happen to fall into the hands of readers who want leisure time to examine them, generally lead to error and perhaps to mischief. We have always deemed it our duty to expose the error of such publications whenever they have reached us, and as one now lies before us (*Observations on the Causes of Depression of Trade, &c.*) we shall cursorily correct the erroneous conceptions of the well-intentioned but hasty writer.

It is perfectly true, that agriculture is the basis of national wealth, that is to say, is the source of that sufficient stock of provisions, raw materials, &c. by which alone a nation can be fed, and by the surplus of which (above what is required for food) it can be provided with the elegancies and luxuries of life. But it is not true, that commerce, or rather trade, and agriculture, are opposed to each other; that the one is a barren consumer of the produce of the other. The true state of their relation is this:—Agriculture produces abundance of food and raw materials to the farmer and landlord; this abundance enables them to employ and pay the manufacturers; and manufactures are thus at first produced and progressively encouraged, until they reach their perfection. The stock of manufactures thus gradually augmented beyond a mere home demand, seeks a foreign market; hence gradually the accumulation of large capitals, and an increasing price of the produce of the land. Agriculture thus returns to the land what it at first received from it. Thus agriculture and trade are mutual dealers, each enriching the other; each buying from the other, and each

as its own means rises, paying more liberally.—that is to say, raising the value of the stock of the other.

To talk of an equitable and steady balance between trade and agriculture, as a thing of institution and regulation, is as much nonsense in the fact as it is in the terms; one might as well talk of a balance between the winds and the tide. Manufactures (having no natural limit) will continue to increase in amount as long as the home and foreign market will take them off, and so long will they encourage and stretch to the utmost the productive powers of the soil. As the market ceases, or becomes diminished, manufactures will diminish; and in the same extent will diminish the competition for the produce of the land, and of course the price. This agriculture and trade will always regulate each other. During the war every thing rose to the level of our enormous trade; during the peace every thing fell to the level of that portion of it which we still enjoy.

There is one thing (however the farmers and landlords may complain of it) tends as much as any thing to maintain the price of agricultural produce, and without which it would be infinitely more depressed—we allude to the Poor Rates. In every other kingdom, when a man ceases to work, that is to say, when there ceases to be any work for him, he ceases to eat, or must eat, as he can, and as little as he can. Hence a diminution of trade and general employ leads to a diminution of consumption, and therein of prices. But in England, by the effect of our Poor Laws, we must feed those who cannot feed themselves. Hence the very great population of this country (as it must all be fed) tends to keep up the price of provisions, even in the midst of the decay of trade.

It is perfectly true, and the writer deserves credit for his clear statement of this important principle, that it will not admit a doubt but that the country is at present greatly overpeopled, and that this excessive population is to be imputed more to our enormous trade during the war than even to our extensive agriculture; this trade creating a demand for men, and by the force of this demand causing more marriages, more births, and more to be nursed to manhood. All this trade is gone, and the surplus population (by the effect of the Poor Laws) are thrown entirely upon the lands. The manufacturer shuts up his factory, and his work men return to their several parishes.

This is true, and something should be done to render the burthen more equal. It is inequitable in a high degree, that one of these establishments should throw all their discharged workmen upon a parish, to which, perhaps, they do not contribute a single shilling. Their workmen are properly their own families and domestics. The burthen of them, as the former profit of them, ought to be peculiarly attached to themselves. We have long thought that this is a part of the Poor Laws which calls for an instant amendment.

The writer seems to fall into the common error of aggravating beyond the result of experience the effects of paper money, and the suspension of the Bank cash payments. Whilst this suspension lasted, and the consequent facility of discount, and the enormous issue of accommodation paper, prices were certainly raised; every one deemed himself richer, and bought and sold, and received and paid, accordingly. But this evil has ceased with its cause, and very little of it, we believe, now continues. The Bank already pays as much as the purposes of commerce require. The country bankers no longer discount for customers whom a change of time has rendered insolvent. There is not at present more public paper required,—that is to say, than is represented by real worth.

Our real opinion, therefore, is, that the state of the currency, as such, has nothing to do with

The continuance of our distress. We are distressed because our foreign trade is gone, and because we are unwilling to descend to that humbler sphere which our home trade would still enable us to enjoy.

It is true that the low price of corn a year ago occasioned a failure amongst the farmers, and great distress, from the loss of rents, amongst their landlords. But why did it produce this effect? Simply, because neither rents nor taxes declined according to the changed circumstances of the times. The farmers (having to supply only our own markets, instead of those of all Europe in arms,—and even our own markets having become greatly diminished, because the discharged labourers, &c. could not afford to consume so much) could not procure half the former price for their agricultural produce, and still had to pay the same rents and taxes. The cause of their distress, therefore, was in the continuance of this rent and these taxes, when their own means had thus been diminished. But does not this cause point out the remedy? And is not this remedy rather to be sought in the reduction of rent and taxes than in maintaining the high price of corn, and thus destroying manufacturers, and all that immense population not immediately connected with the land?

NEW-YORK, October 25.

**Spanish News**—Capt. Trowbridge, of the ship *Blooming Rose*, who arrived this morning in 11 days from Havana, informs us, that a vessel which arrived there in a short passage from La Vera Cruz, reported that general Mina was closely invested in a fortress by 9000 troops. He had made 2 or 3 unsuccessful attempts to cut his way through.

The day before the *Blooming Rose* sailed, a Spanish fleet of transports arrived there from Caraccas, where they landed their troops.—The ship *Nimfa*, late the *Gen. Scott*, was preparing at Havana to sail to the Maine.

**Latest from England**—By the arrival last evening of the schooner *Weymouth*, capt. Benedict, in 33 days from Liverpool, we have been favored with London papers to the 15th ult. & Lloyd's lists and general shipping and commercial list to the 13th, and Liverpool papers and prices current to the 17th. Wheat and flour were still declining in price.—American flour is quoted at 45s. to 47s. at Liverpool. The quantity imported into Liverpool from the United States and Canada, from the 9th of September, both inclusive, is stated at 11,081 barrels; and the total quantity from the first of January last, at 505,438 barrels.

Accounts from Ireland state that the typhus fever has begun to subside.

The Prince Regent was landed at Brighton on the 13th, having been to sea four days and three nights, during which time he visited the coast of France.

Mrs. Cobden, with her two sons and three daughters, sailed from Liverpool on the 18th in the *Aurora*, for New York.

The papers speak of the universal revival of trade in all parts of the kingdom, and particularly the rise of cotton and linen goods.

Three per Cent Consols, at London, Sept. 13th. 79 3/8 5/2.

Paris papers to the 13th contain nothing of interest. Desbats and Chayoux, who plotted the assassination of Grenelle.

Lord Wellington has been non-suited in his prosecution of the printer of the *Ghent Journal*, and adjudged to pay the costs. It is said the Duke had appealed from this decision.

Sir John M'Mahon, died at Bath.

A dreadful fire broke out on the 5th at Beauquame, six leagues from Amiens, in France. Forty-five houses were destroyed.

A solemn mass has been celebrated at Vienna, and throughout Austria, in gratitude to Heaven for the abundant harvest of this year.

Four ships of war, to carry ten guns each, are ordered to be built at Portsmouth and Plymouth.

A vein of rich copper ore has lately been discovered on an estate belonging to the Marquis of Buckingham, at Sloway, near Bridgewater, in a limestone quarry, about twenty feet below the surface of the earth.

Mr. Vansittart arrived, on Thursday morning, at his house in Downing street, from Ireland.

A young man of fashion, who lately came into possession of at least 10,000l per annum, is said to have lost the whole at hazard.

**London Corn Exchange Sept. 15**—Our market was well supplied with new wheat from Essex and Suffolk the major part of which was very cold and rough and met heavy sale at a decline of 8s per quar. from the prices of this day week.

**Prices at Liverpool Sept. 16**—Amer. flour per bbls 43s. to 46s, English new wheat 10s. 6d. to 11s. 6d; Ashes, 1st pots 51s. & 53s; 1st pearls 63 & 65s.

The quantity of the new wheat is very inferior, old is but a trifle cheaper.

**London Aug. 15**—The Corn market, this morning experienced a further decline of seven shillings per quarter in the price of wheat.

The Duke of Ferman Nunez is appointed ambassador from Spain to the Court of France.

Every thing proves that the Porte is more than ever disposed to maintain with Austria the relations of amity. The news of military preparations in Turkey is denied.

General Lacy, who had been condemned to death, on landing at Minorca, attempted to escape, and was shot in defending himself against the soldiers.

The *Falmouth*, of 20 guns, had arrived at Portsmouth from St. Helena; which place she left on the 29th of July. Bonaparte was never in better health than at that time; the perfect restoration of which he attributes to the constant use of the warm bath. He uses it as the greatest luxury, frequently staying in it several hours, reading a book. He afterwards walks much in the grounds of Longwood; and fills up his more relaxed hours by playing at billiards.

Lord Amherst has duly delivered to the Prince Regent the letter from Bonaparte to his Royal Highness, of which his Lordship was the bearer from St. Helena.

**LORD COCHRANE**—It is stated in the Louisiana Gazette of September 27th, that reports were in circulation in New Orleans of Lord Cochrane's arrival off Apalachicola, with a frigate and other armed vessels. It is said that his Lordship meditates an attack on Pensacola.—*Com. Ado.*

#### THEATRICAL.

After a lapse of nearly three years, the establishment of a regular Theatre is about to take place in this city. We have authority to announce to the public, and admirers of the British Drama, that Mr. Turnbull, (whose histrionic merit is not forgotten in Montreal,) has succeeded in concluding arrangements for the purpose with Mr. C. Holt, and that the spacious building at the south end of St. Paul Street, is immediately to be converted to its originally intended use.

The lease is for ten years on terms reciprocally advantageous to the proprietor and manager, who has already taken measures to engage performers of talent; and, also an assistant artist in the scenic department.

#### WONDERFUL FECUNDITY.

On a farm, near La Prairie, under the management of Mr James Clark, a Scotchman, a piece of ground, not

three-quarters of an acre in extent, was planted last Spring with 10 Bushels of Potatoes, of the English white kind. The crop measured 420 Bushels, or 42 fold—Six of these potatoes were brought to this Office, weighing 12 lbs 14 oz.—One of them weighed 3 lbs 2 oz. The seed was planted in drills 4 feet apart, a practice recommended to farmers who plant on rich ground, or even on an indifferent soil if well prepared and strongly dunged.

QUEBEC, NOVEMBER 4, 1817.

Nothing new has reached us from Europe since our last, but a day or two later dates. Provisions continued to fall and trade to mend. Typhus fever had been prevalent in Ireland, occasioned by poor and bad food. It had also made its appearance at Liverpool in England to the alarm of the inhabitants. But as both those countries know well how to treat such diseases, we cannot fear any extensive spread. The great corrective of epidemic contagion is pure air; and if it be but let in, in sufficient quantities where miasma prevails, it cannot fail of counteracting infection. Pure air is to contagion what fresh water is to salt. Fresh water will lessen the saline quality of the latter, just in proportion to the quantum mixed with it. The same is the case with the mixture of fresh with infectious air. To say, as has been said, that the air is no medium of contagion does not appear to us to be strictly correct; indeed writers are apt to contradict themselves on this head. Pestilential vapours mixing with pure air must contaminate it in proportion to the quantum of miasma mixed with it; but where the pure air is far more abundant than the foul the latter must necessarily be lost, like a bucket of fresh water in the Ocean, particularly if motion be given to the air; when pestilential particles must be wafted through the atmosphere so as to be annihilated in the immensity of space. But if the air be stagnant and circumscribed in its compass, and pestilential vapours mix with it, in any quantity, it must necessarily be infected and infectious to a certain extent.

We have been led into these brief observations by the mention of Typhus fever, and the consideration of what appeared in one of our numbers lately on the subject, which has much dwelt on our mind.

We are informed, that NAT. ATCHERSON, Esq. of Great Winchester street, London, who has for many years evinced the most zealous desire to promote the welfare and best interests of the British North-American Colonies, upon observing from the public prints, the establishment of an Agricultural Society in Quebec, immediately ordered a complete set of "The Transactions of the Society of Arts, Manufactures and Commerce," in London, to be prepared as a present from him to this new Institution, which will be transmitted by an early vessel next Spring.
