

# MAYOR REBUTS CRITICS

## The Westmount Examiner

### City administration honest and efficient though dull, he says

WESTMOUNT'S scholarly Mayor A. Sydney Bruneau delivered his "State of the City" address last night at the annual meeting of the Westmount Municipal Association in Victoria Hall before a gathering of almost 250 residents, including 60 women.

The mayor, lifting his usually-mild voice a notch and sticking to a prepared text, drew on Polonius, Russian and Chinese brain-washing, Goebbels, Ribbentrop, St. Paul, medieval 'ceintures de chasteté', and a reference to the City crest to bolster what boiled down to:

### 'Public' gesture precedes closed council session

Westmount City Council sat for its statutory meeting Monday.

And they had an audience.

For a few moments they allowed six citizens to observe their deliberations.

The meeting started promptly at 8:00 p.m.

One gentleman entered five minutes later, just in time to watch the meeting adjourned. The mayor and councillors then moved into another room to proceed in closed session.

#### TWO MATTERS

During the "open meeting", two matters were discussed.

It was agreed that a taxi stand could be allowed on property on Atwater near the corner of St. Antoine as long as the company paved the land. This decision was reached in approximately five minutes.

Secretary-Treasurer Swan took the floor.

In his hand he carried a document.

There was an air of suspense. Gist of his remarks was that the Department of Municipal Affairs of the Province of Quebec had approved by-laws 627 to 631, amending several other by-laws, which had been reported by Council in mid-March. The approved by-laws cover apartment parking and the sale of milk.

Mayor A. S. Bruneau then addressed the meeting: "Is there any other business?"

No reply.  
"Then I declare this meeting adjourned until Monday, May 12, at 9.00 p.m.," he said.

All stood up.

**OUT OF PUBLIC EYE**  
Mayor and Council moved into private quarters, no longer under the eye of the public.

The "public" hesitated, slightly stunned by the brevity of the deliberations, and then moved away like reluctant scholars at the end of a term.

#### TRAFFIC REROUTED

Police report that due to sewer work, Western from Claremont to Decarie will be closed to through traffic from 7 p.m. today until 7 p.m. Sunday. Traffic will be diverted to Sherbrooke.

Starting Monday, Claremont, which is being widened and rebuilt, will be closed to through traffic from Western to Sherbrooke for a period of four weeks. The MTC bus No. 4 will be rerouted and turn south on Victoria instead of on Claremont.

(a) There is "much ado about nothing" in the demand for open council sessions;

(b) The attempt to obtain open council sessions is based on the idea that if a "false statement is repeated often enough it will be accepted in time as truth"; and

(c) In law and in fact council meetings are "open to the public."

#### REVIEWS 1957

Before launching into his lengthy dissertation on open council sessions, Mayor Bruneau reviewed the City's achievements during 1957. Finances, he said, stood high, as the spirited bidding that won a 100.18 mark for the city's four and one-half per cent bonds revealed.

The \$169,000 surplus of '57, he warned, could not be expected again, and was largely occasioned by the fact that the Westmount share of the sales tax had been increased by \$17,000;

Federal government grants in lieu of taxes on Crown property brought in \$27,000 and an adjustment of Quebec Hydro accounts added another \$31,000 to the pot.

The revamping of the city lighting program was proceeding even a bit ahead of schedule, he added, and the roads department achievements had won recognition even in foreign lands.

#### LIBRARY TRIBUTE

Speaking of the civic library, he paid tribute to the work of Chief Librarian Miss Kathleen Jenkins and staff, but expressed surprise at a segment of the report that took Westmounters to task for clipping pages and pictures from valuable volumes, and he also made reference to citizens who read in the bath-tub and returned books that had obviously fallen into the water. "Possession of wealth," he said, "obviously does not necessarily imply possession of decency."

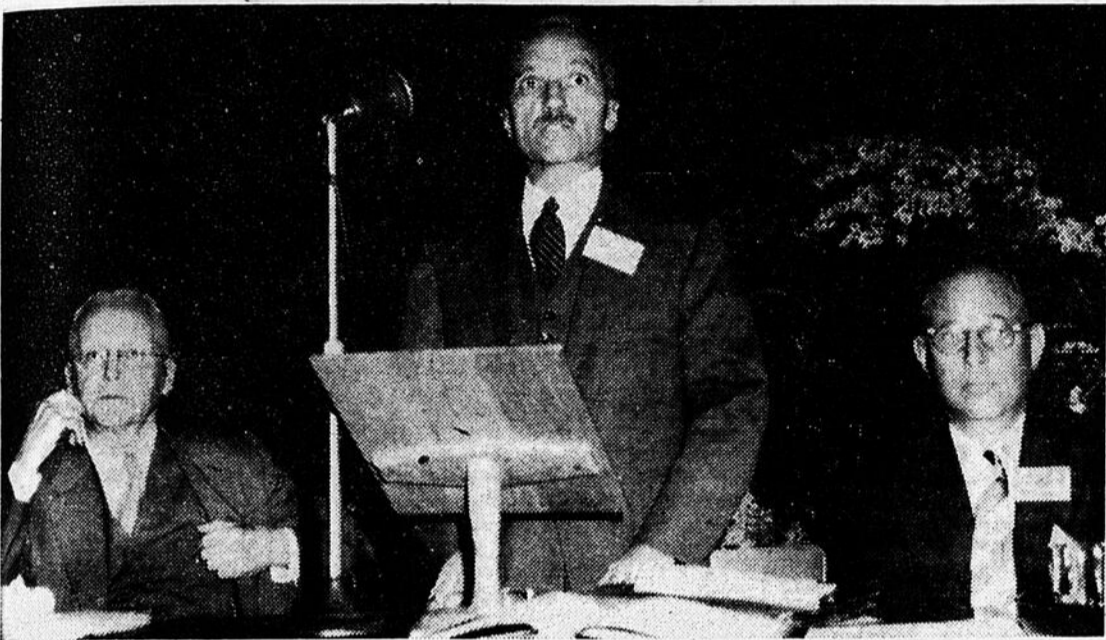

Ex-Officio members of the committee are automatically the three past presidents Tom M. Atkinson, Elliot A. Durrford and A. Ogilvy Leslie.

In addition, 38 members of last year's committee were re-elected to this body.

## Municipal Association hears high schools' band; committee reports tabled

The president's address and answers to questions of the citizenry by aldermen were the highlights of the regular business at the annual meeting of the Westmount Municipal Association last night.

To steal the show, however, a group of youngsters from Westmount Junior and Senior High Schools — the band under the direction of Morley Calvert — did musical wonders. They performed selections ranging from "Little Brown Jug" to a Sousa march to a Tocata for Bands.

The report of outgoing president A. O. Leslie dealt briefly with the work of the executive committees of the Association during the past year.

The education and library committee had its nominees for the civic posts of Library Trustee and Protestant School Commissioner acclaimed to their positions. Committee members also made a study of an extension to the existing public library, which extension is presently under consideration by Council.

The housing and zoning committee restricted their efforts to the dissemination of information concerning the proposed metropolitan government.

The legislation committee submitted two detailed reports to the executive, one concerning the procedures of the City Council and another recommending

that past procedures and precedents be studied before drawing up a set of rules and regulations for the Association.

Due to the efforts of the membership committee, an increase of 140 members was recorded during the year bringing total membership to a record high of 1923.

#### PUBLICITY

The publicity committee, which put out six newsletters during the year and prepared advertising to solicit new members, served as a continuing link between the executive and the membership.

The financial report of the Association showed a cash bank balance of \$1,706 and \$1,500 of Canada Government Bonds.

#### QUERIES

Questions, submitted in writing by mail to the secretary of the association, were answered at the meeting by the aldermen.

Chipman H. Drury, Commissioner of Police and Fire, assured a questioner that the city by-laws adequately provided for the control of the use of air-rifles and other such weapons.

## City council plans attack on elm disease

Westmount council is presently pondering the now famous, and in places, dreaded, Dutch Elm Disease which has swept many communities throughout the United States and Canada laying waste the entire Elm population.

The report discusses various methods of coping with the infection.

Westmount has, within its confines, more than 1,000 elm trees, almost 800 of which are spread along some 30 streets.

In the past 10 years, there have been 21 trees found to be infected with the disease. Though this is a very low percentage, care is required to make sure that it is maintained.

Heretofore the City has confined its attack on Dutch Elm Disease to systematic sanitation methods, i.e., examination, the repair of all trees to reduce the chance of invasion by bark beetles and fungi, fertilization and, when necessary, irrigation, in order to keep the elms in a healthy condition, and removal of diseased trees.

There is currently a strong school of thought that the sanitation methods should be supplemented by a program of spraying. The spraying programme should be carried out between April 15th and May 15th.

That is the decision which faces the Council. Whether to continue in the present manner or to adopt extra preventive measures.

Carefully planned and supervised control operations carried out on a community-wide basis will reduce losses from the Dutch Elm Disease to 1% or less of the elm population.

To prove a point, on which few others agree and involves 100 men (who have been promised other jobs), the "firemen's" union tilts at the Canadian economy, threatens to isolate Canadian communities, and seeks to perpetuate the fast-becoming - outmoded theory of "My union, right or wrong; but right or wrong, my union."

Outcome, if the Prime Minister and the Conservative Government live up to advance billing, will be an immediate inquiry into the advisability of establishing compulsory arbitration for all future labor disputes of vital public concern.

In this way, some good may come out of this serious yet silly situation.

It also may provide an effective answer to those American labor czars who contemptuously sneer at our Royal commissions and the respected jurists and others comprising them.

Parliament convenes Monday. With the Conservative majority, the state of the economy and the temper of the Canadian people, it shouldn't take long to get the rattlers rolling again.

### Canon John Willis further honored

A fitting honor to a man who has given long and devoted service to the Anglican church will be paid tomorrow evening at the Montreal Diocesan Theological College when Canon John James Willis will be accorded a Doctorate of Divinity.

Throughout the West End there are a great many people who at one time or another in the past 58 years have numbered themselves as members of a congregation whose clergyman was Canon Willis.

Though no longer on the "active list" of the church, he is honorary assistant at St. Philip's, Montreal West, where he takes his share of public services and engages in an exhausting round of home and hospital visiting.

It was in 1900, in the Parish of Papineauville that John James Willis began his long and fruitful ministry. There he had four charges and travelled forty miles a Sunday to minister to them. His career has been more active than that of many of the clergy. At one period he had no fewer than nine churches under his charge, and at the time of the First World War he was in charge of St. Jude's in St. Henry. For service there beyond the ordinary call of duty the late Bishop John Farthing made him a Canon of Christ Church Cathedral.

For 22 years he was rector of St. James Anglican Parish at Hudson Heights, a charge that includes the pastorate of St. Mary's at Como.

Prior to the presentation of the DD degree tomorrow evening, clergy of the diocese will tender a dinner to Canon J. J. Willis — a devout man of God, whose devoted service to the Anglican cause has almost spanned sixty years.

# Hard work made her dream come true

WHEN Mary Willan Winspear was growing up on the prairie she dreamed of a lovely old house and garden converted into a school with herself ensconced as head mistress.

Mary Winspear, now a doctor of philosophy in English literature with much scholarship and travel behind her, has lived to see the dream,

in 1917," said Dr. Winspear. "The house was built in 1820 and before it became a school it belonged to Judge Trenholme whose daughter Katherine was once on the staff and is now librarian at McGill. Amy Stone, who is an artist, came from Weston-Super-Mare in England. She named the school after her birthplace and the street after the river on which Weston-Super-Mare is located."

Dr. Winspear heard that the school was for sale from Dr. A. Vibert Douglas, dean of women at Queen's University, when the former was on the faculty there. "When I first came here there were 64 girls here

demical school where understanding supplements a good solid basis of acquired knowledge and skill," she said.

### Sense of humor

Her sense of humor came to the fore when she was asked if her school bore any resemblance to St. Trinians of cartoon fame. "That's an amusing thought, but nothing could be more untrue," she said. "Weston bears no resemblance to St. Trinians where the students worked against the teachers. Our spirit and philosophy at Weston is one of close co-operation between the staff and students."

Ironically, Dr. Winspear is a product of the public school system and her own schooling and background is a far cry from the affluent community in which she now finds herself.

Born in Birmingham, England, Dr. Winspear came with her parents to Canada when she was a small girl. The family settled in Namaha, a village of 75 inhabitants on the edge of the Blackfoot Indian reservation, 40 miles east of Calgary. There her father kept the general store and post office and her mother worked hard. Mary Winspear and her two brothers and sisters attended the village school.

"Our life was very primitive," said Dr. Winspear. "Our parents had very limited educations but were determined that their children get the best at any sacrifice. We all worked hard to get through school and university."

From 1914 to 1917 Dr. Winspear and her two brothers went off to high school in Calgary. "We boarded and it meant changing boarding houses every month or so," said Dr. Winspear. "I guess we were too much, the three of us."

### All successful

Her brothers and younger sister have done well for themselves, too. Her older brother, A. D. Winspear, is a professor of classics at the University of Alberta. Dr. F. G. Winspear, a well-known Canadian businessman, lives in Edmonton and paints for a hobby. His oil painting of their father, who is now 88, adorns a wall in Mary Winspear's living room. (Her mother died two years ago.) The younger sister is Mrs. V. X. McEnaney, of Toronto, formerly of the talks division of the CBC, and is now freelancing.

In 1918 on graduating from the 11th grade and a normal school course, Mary Winspear went home to teach in her own village school for a year. She returned to Calgary in 1919 to take Grade 12.

For a few years, Dr. Winspear taught school in Alberta and it was not until 1927 that she and her sister could afford to go to the university. They picked St. Hilda's College, Trinity (Toronto), of Anglican denomination, taking the same arts course and same subjects, among them honor English and history. Dr. Winspear received her BA in 1930, MA in 1931 and her doctorate from the University of Toronto in 1942. In the interest of her doctorate thesis — the Development of the 18th century novel in England, France and Germany — she visited Germany five

with herself in even a more enviable position. She owns a school in an invulnerable, old, grey stone house clinging to the mountainside in an exclusive part of Westmount.

It is Weston School on Severn avenue, Westmount, a private day school for girls. Weston differs from the other private schools in the Montreal area in that it is the only independent English language school for girls which takes them in at the age of three and carries them through to matriculation. Boys are allowed in nursery, kindergarten and Grade 1.

Dr. Winspear lives in quarters on the ground floor of the school. Here, in her spacious private sitting room — dramatic with its 14-foot ceiling, huge window overlooking neighboring rooftops, and abstract paintings, but at the same time restful with comfortable chairs and lots of books — she spoke of her youth and a life spent in the search of knowledge to fulfill her ambition to teach and have her own school.

### Built in 1820

"I bought this school in 1946 from Amy Stone and Mable Seward who founded it

from nursery age to Grade Eleven, and now we have 150 children, all told, with 50 boys and girls under the age of six in the nursery," she said. "Next year the group that started with me — the girls who have grown up with me, so to speak — will graduate. There are eight in the class and most of them hope to get into McGill."

A soft-spoken, youthful-looking woman, tall and slender with glittering blue eyes and ever-appearing dimples, Dr. Winspear has an easy, gracious manner; is sympathetic, understanding and tolerant in her relationships with both children and adults. She has a highly-developed sense of humor and laughs heartily and easily. She is the antithesis of the popular concept of the girls' school principal which is formidable, frightening and stuffy. On the other hand she has had no problem keeping discipline either with her girl students or the veterans to whom she taught English literature at Queen's University right after World War II. "The girls know better than to try to put anything over on me," she laughed.

She will do research in the University of Paris, Institut de Biologie Physico-Chimie.

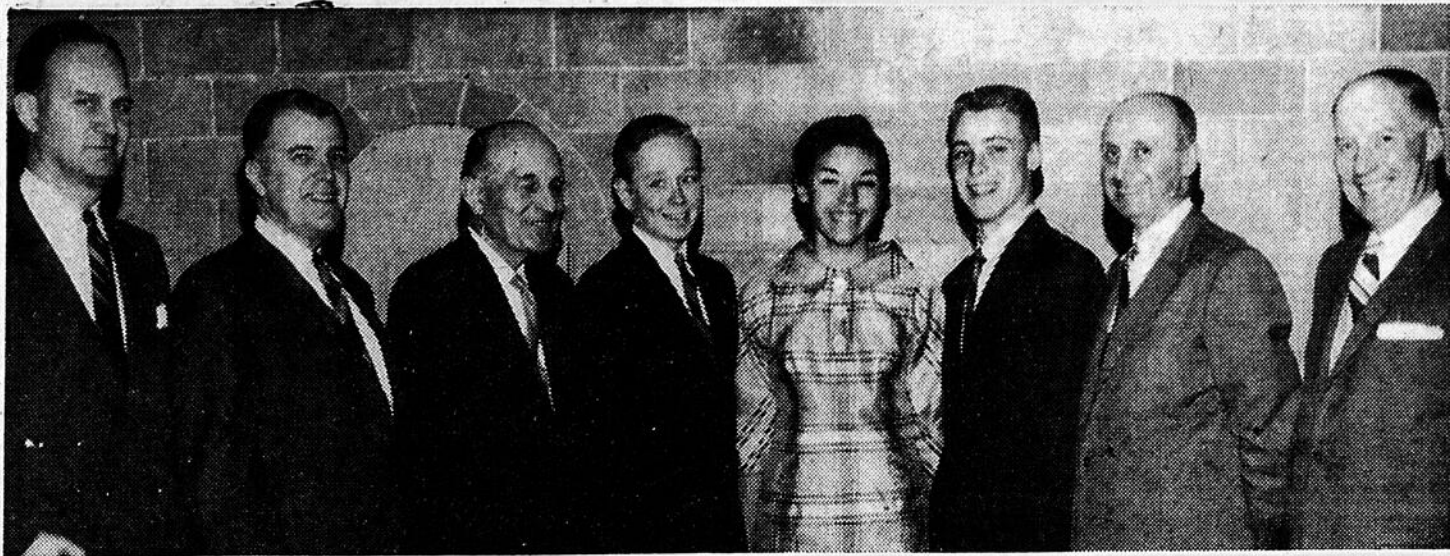

### Art learned in India more than 50 years ago fills days for patient

An art learned half a century ago in India is filling the long days for an 83-year-old patient at the Royal Edward Laurentian Hospital's Laurentian Division at Ste. Agathe-des-Monts.

The sanatorium is one of five hospitals to receive financial help through the forthcoming \$12,000,000 Joint Hospital Fund. Active hospital Auxiliary Units in Westmount and N.D.G., the Women's Auxiliary of Stanley Presbyterian Church, the N.D.G. Lions Club and other groups support the work of the TB hospital.

William Curtis was a busy young British soldier in Secunderabad when he first admired pictures painted in wool, and mastered the craft.

In nine years at the Ste. Agathe sanatorium he has come to love the Laurentian landscape.

Most of his 12 finished pictures are Canadian winter scenes. The nurses and staff at the sanatorium all look out for pictures to serve as models, and are proud when the old soldier chooses their suggestion.

Mr. Curtis has no living relatives now in his native Ipswich, Suffolk. He came to Canada in 1907, and has seen much of the country, in construction work. But his most vivid memories remain the colorful years in Her Majesty's Army.

As the elderly patient's work hours are limited, the nurses often stop in his room to chat for a moment. Then the veteran campaigner loves to recall Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee, when he took part in the trooping of the colors before the Khedive's Palace in Cairo, or the hot day in January when word reached the Flying Column that the Queen was dead, and orders came to march quietly back to barracks.

It takes Mr. Curtis about a month to complete a picture. He has never sold any, but gives them to his friends. One much-admired picture hangs in the main waiting room of the Infirmary Building.

The recent fire at the Ste. Agathe sanatorium destroyed the old service building, built in 1919, where meals were cooked for the hospital and brought by underground tunnel to the Infirmary.

From the forthcoming Joint Hospital Fund campaign for \$12,000,000, the sum of \$639,802 is allocated towards the Royal Edward Laurentian Hospital's capital-fund needs, including the cost of a four-storey service building at Ste. Agathe. The hospital is also allocated \$643,998 toward the cost of free service for the sick poor.

The new building will provide accommodation for the occupational therapy department, dining rooms for patients and staff, and a laundry.

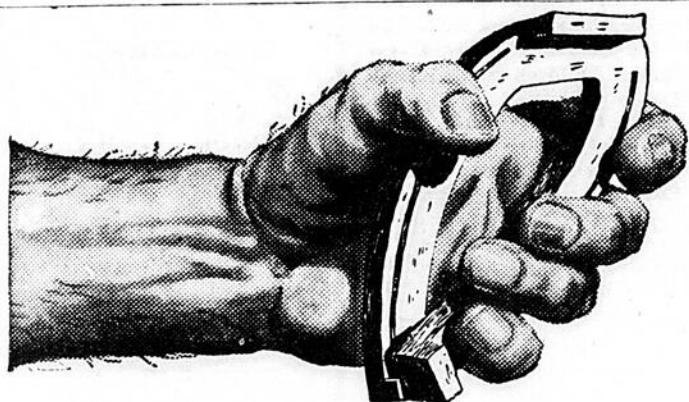

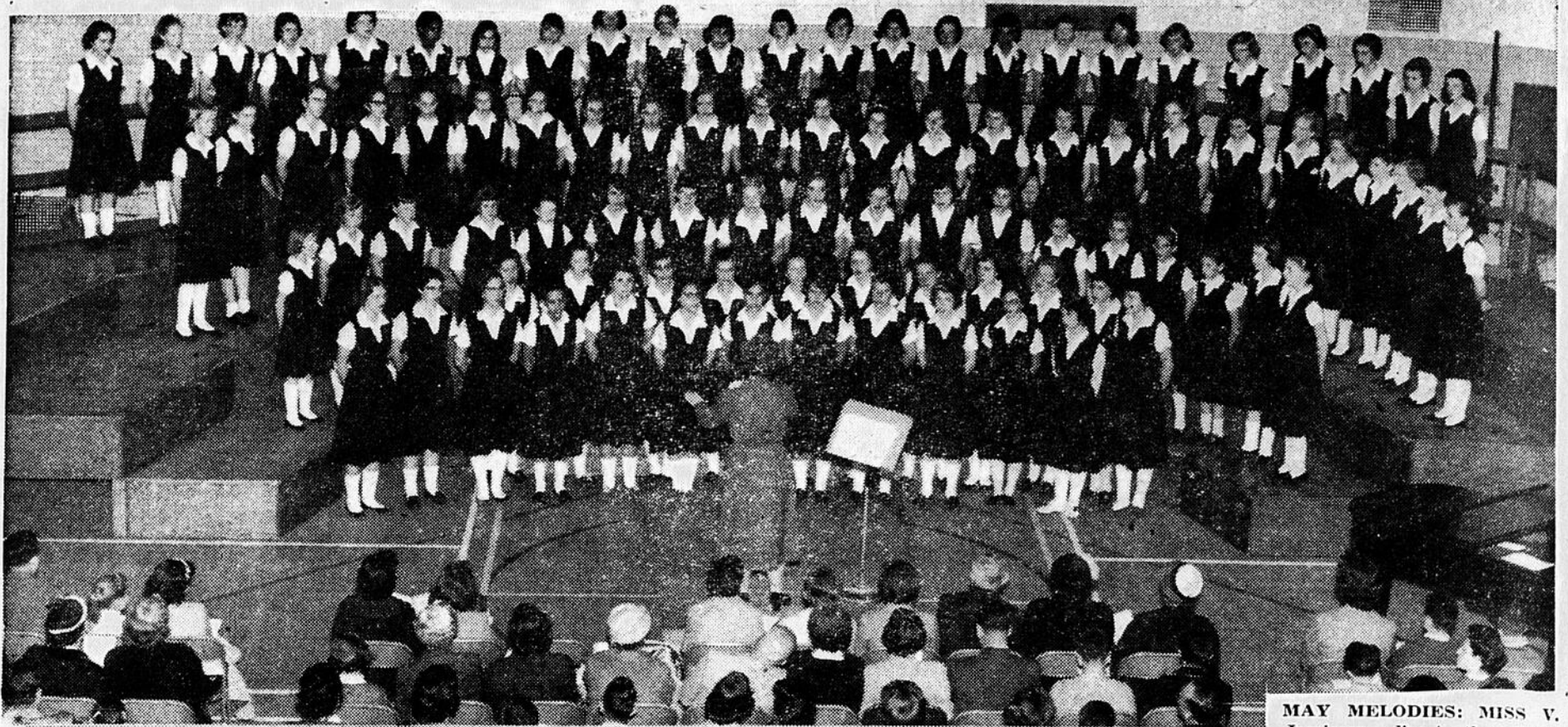

In relating the strength and efficiency of the fire and police departments, he said that so far there has been no suggestion that under metropolitan government these two departments would fall under the control of any authority other than the city council of Westmount.

The new skating rink, he said, was started in November "after the difficulties of agreeing on a site had been met and disposed of" and would be ready shortly. In the summer ahead, he said, the building would be used for basketball, tennis, volleyball, shuffleboard and exhibitions.

**'NO FLOOR SHOW'**  
There is no entertainment or floor show at the council ses-

sions, he said, nor will there be buffoonery and horseplay. There is, however, honest and efficient government at minimum cost — the factors that make Westmount stand out in the front rank of Canada's best-governed cities.

Demand for an open council session, he said, was not new — as a matter of fact, in 1955, as vice-president of the association, and in company with Tom Atkinson, who was then president, he had waited on the city council of the time presided over by Alderman A. Turner Bone, and requested the same thing.

He learned then, as he related now, that the city's sessions had been open for a half century.

When any member of the pub-

lic was present, he said, matters were discussed openly — but when the committee met in caucus, he failed to see any need for open discussion of what the aldermen already knew.

A much better method of gaining information, he added, was for committee chairmen of the association to keep close liaison with their respective opposite numbers on council.

**LOOK BEFORE LEAP**  
The Westmount council practice of closed committee sessions, he said, differs little from the experience in other councils. Before pressing for changes, he urged the members of the association to "look before you leap. At least visit other municipalities that offer other practice."

The pattern, he said, had been set by the pioneers, men of integrity and devotion to detail; but men who were non-political, not office-seekers and not professional demagogues.

Watchdogs and unwieldy practices are powerless to protect the citizens from public servants who are really minded to betray their trust.

Even the censure de chastité, used by knights of old in an attempt to restrain their women-folk while they were fighting in the crusades, were ineffectual, the mayor suggested.

"What better basis for personal relations than trust," he asked.

Like Paul of Tarsus, he concluded, "the Westmounter would do well to remember he is a citizen of no mean city."

In advising the members of the association on the state of the city, he admitted the aldermen were not perfect. The mistakes, he said, have been honest

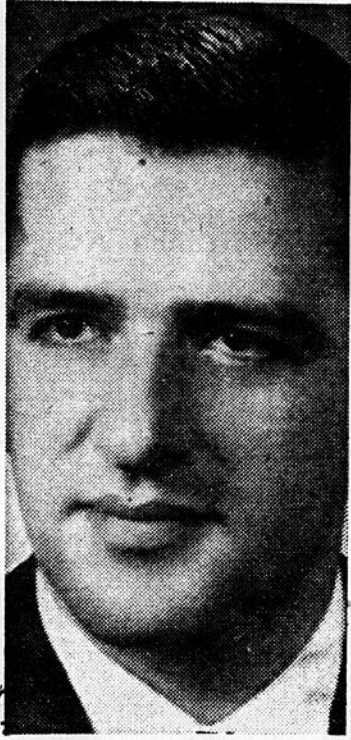

"If at any time in the months of May, June, July, August and September, any dog is found in any public place, and is not held securely on a leash not more than six feet in length, the keeper of such dog, as well as the person who caused such dog to be in such place, shall be deemed to have infringed this By-law."

The Police Department have attempted to enforce the Law during the course of routine duty, being reluctant to have a so-called "drive", however the complete co-operation of dog owners is necessary if such a campaign is to be avoided. For the information of all citizens of Westmount the owner of any dog found running at large is summoned to appear in Municipal Court and if found guilty faces the possibility of a Fine of \$40.00 and Costs. The Police also point out that every dog regardless of age must be licensed.

### How To Keep Lamp

Preventing a youngster from tipping over floor lamps often is a serious problem but one that is quite easily solved. Using a soft drink bottle cap to each in diameter from a piece of 1/8" hardboard and paint it to match the lamp base. Center the lamp on the disc and fasten them together with screws. Screw holes may already appear in the lamp base. If not, they can be made with a power drill.



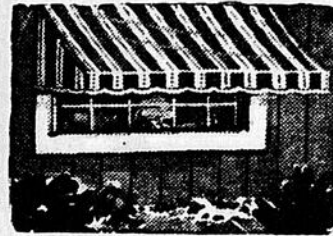

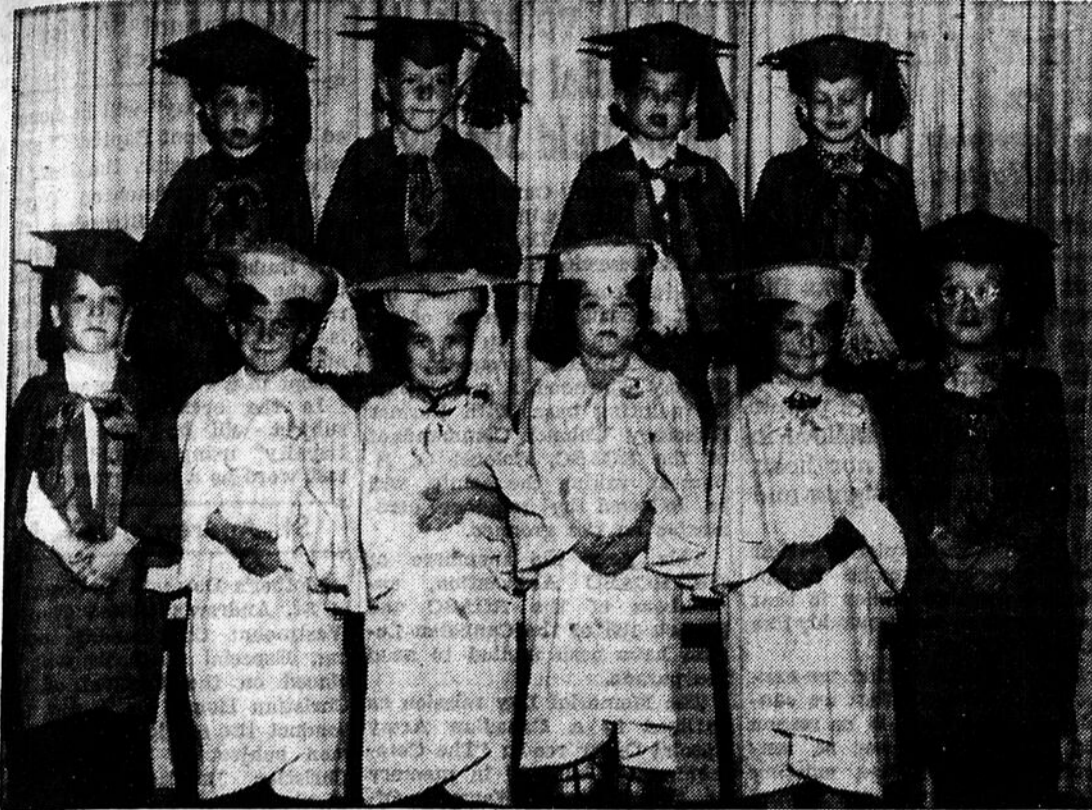

times between 1931 and 1937 and studied during those momentous Nazi-youth years at the University of Munich and Leipzig. She toured England, France, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia.

Through the years Dr. Winspear did a variety of jobs — worked in book stores, acted as a hostess at a summer camp, did publicity and promotion for Canadian Chautauqua, lectured at night at various universities and to workers' educational associations, edited text books among which "Life and Literature"—Volumes 1 and 2—are still in use in some Canadian schools.

"It was travel and work, travelling on freight boats, staying at pensions, and private houses, certainly no hotels," said Dr. Winspear, who taught one year in Birmingham, her birthplace.

## Queens in '45

In 1942 she went on staff at the University of Edmonton as advisor to women students and lecturing in the English department. From there she moved to Queen's University in 1945, lecturing to the veterans on British novelist Virginia Wolfe.

In 1946 Dr. Winspear moved to Weston and has been happy ever since although it was so tough economically for her that she taught summer school at Queen's for three seasons after she had taken on the school. In the summer of 1955 she toured central Africa.

It took her some time to adjust to the loneliness of her new position after being connected with bustling university campuses from 1927 to 1946.

Weston School is a reflection of her plucky personality in that it is flexible. "Small children can learn at their own rate through kindergarten," said Dr. Winspear. "We can push them ahead but never hold them back, and within limits we can arrange courses to suit individuals. We can let the highly intelligent ones move quickly, let those of average intelligence do the same courses but more slowly. This school has a

family atmosphere — the older ones have some responsibility for the young ones and the young ones can look up and emulate the older ones."

## Picks own staff

Dr. Winspear likes to be free to pick her own staff which totals 17, teach English and history to the seniors, and Latin throughout, choose her own books, organ-

ize courses, have consultations with her staff and screen the children she accepts in her school. "Parents can feel free to change the school if they are not satisfied," she said.

There is an accent on handi-crafts and painting in the school with Fritz Brandtner, the painter, teaching art to the senior school and Mrs. M. Jeffries, the younger ones. French teacher Therèse Fer-aud, a post graduate of the University of Montreal, is in charge of the new program in oral French which starts in the nursery school and is continued through grades one, two and three. The school has received a three-year grant from the MacLean Foundation for this project.

A member of the Canadian

Institute for International Affairs and the Canadian Humanities Association, Dr. Winspear is the new chairman of the fellowship committee of the Canadian Federation of University Women. "I feel strongly the importance of higher education for women and the need for women in academic positions in the universities," she said. "I believe there are fewer women proportionately holding these posts than there were before the war."

As for her own future, Dr. Winspear is deeply wrapped up in her school but she intends to visit India and Japan some day.

Perhaps the most important event of April was the fact that a gang of Irish laborers refused point blank to build a fence through the palace of the Little Folk and further, that the Irish Government surrendered to the Little Folk and left them undisturbed. So there are people in the world, perhaps not only in Ireland, who believe in things and persons whom they can neither see nor hear. There is hope yet for a world gone mad on weights and measures and money values.

Incidentally, Canon Doyle believed in the fairies and even photographed them. He wrote a book about them and illustrated it with photographs which he guaranteed to be real. The only

thing about those pictures that made one hesitate to accept them as genuine fairies is that they looked so unmistakably like genuine fairies.

These are colors that we cannot see and sounds that we cannot hear, and there is no reason why there should not be sentient, rational beings existing beyond the range of our normal senses, and if an Irishman can sense those Little Folk, I should not argue with him for a moment.

Those whose memories go back to 1914 will remember the Angels of Mons. Harold Begbie very strongly believed in them, and the Bible is full of the activities of angels. Harry Emerson Fosdick once wrote a book to show that there were no such things as angels, but at the end he admitted that it was such a lovely idea that he could not give it up.

hobbits and ents. In all these  
stories there is nothing more  
illogical or impossible than the  
conception of space-man in fly-  
ing saucers.

But the Irish workmen have  
bettered the philosophers. They  
simply accept the non-human  
world of their Irish ancestors  
and refuse to have it dislodged  
from their present day in-  
heritance, merely because they  
cannot prove their point by  
saying - "Here is a Lepre-  
chaun. Deny it if you can." Their  
faith in the Little Folk is part  
of life to them. May it long  
remain so.

It is a much more seemly ap-  
proach to mystery than that of

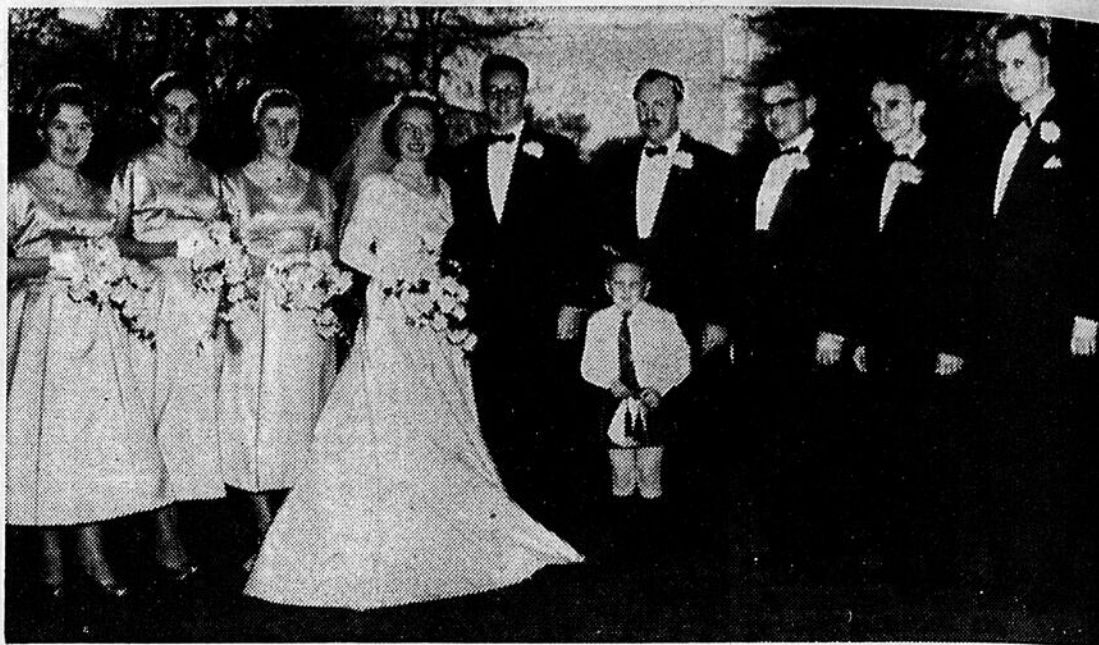
