The Duke of Connaught yesterday opened the Irish lace exhibition in the Mansion House, Dublin.

Lord Dufferin is enjoying a well-earned London holiday, and all the great dinner-givers are struggling for his company.

It is rumored at Copenhagen that Prince Waldemar, the youngest of King Christian's children, will shortly be engaged to the Princess Victoria, second daughter of the Crown Prince Frederick William of Prussia.

LAVAL THREATENING.

It is stated that the authorities of the University of Laval have notified the Council of Bishops of the province that unless the University question is settled in accordance with the recent papal rescript, neither the College nor its Montreal branch will be opened after the midsummer vacation.

THE DISCORDANT BLEUS.

L'Etendard, the organ of the Bleus who are dissatisfied with the Mousseau Government, publishes every day over its editorial columns the following announcement:—

"La Minerve and Le Monde are, according to their own admission chiefly the property of Mr. Senecal. Of what value, then, are the lies and slanders daily retailed by them for the purpose of rehabilitating their patron and blackening honest men."

THE SITUATION.

Mr. Mousseau has been a party to a grave breach of the Quebec election law, which requires the Speaker of the Assembly to have a writ issued within thirty days after he receives the judgment of the Court declaring the constituency vacant. The Premier is still making desperate efforts to conciliate the discontented wing of his party. It is said that Mr. Taillon laid it down as a condition of his acceptance of a portfolio, that Dr. Ross should also enter the Ministry, but that gentleman declined the perilous honor the Premier wished to thrust upon him. Under the circumstances Mr. Mousseau failing help from the Castors, has thrown himself as a last resort upon Mr. Desjardins, member for Montmorency, who was his chief champion in the House last session, that gentleman having just gone down to his county, presumably to note what chances he has of reelection. If they are at all favorable, an election there is anticipated in less than three weeks.

MUSICAL.—Mr. F. W. Mills, at the request of two managers in England, preparing a manuscript copy of the operetta entitled "The Mayor of St. Brieux," which he wrote especially for Lady Dufferin's private theatricals at Government House, Ottawa.

PROTECTION AGAINST FIRE!—All the city steam engines, reels, ladders and horses of the fire brigade were out of the city yesterday afternoon attending the procession in St. Sauveur, until brought home by a double alarm at five p.m. This should not be allowed by the Town Council.

A HEAVY GALE.—The present has been one of the most uncertain seasons within the memory of that ancient individual, the oldest inhabitant. Here we are at the end of June, and hardly a day has passed without rain. The wind yesterday, with unusual copiousness, suddenly veered round from south to north and then to the east, from which it blew with great force, increasing towards evening to almost hurricane violence. The residents on the Island who went down by the five o'clock boat give her great praise for her staunch seagoing qualities. Some of them, however, were awfully seared, and there was much sea sickness among the women and children. Old residents on the Island report it the heaviest blow they remember.

GONE INTO CAMP.—The Infantry and Volunteer Batteries mustered at Levis this morning from east and west and went at once into camp. The boys have rather lively weather for camping out, but the fields are dry and the parade ground and tents are all in a well sheltered hollow. This lovely place possesses the rare combination of complete seclusion, river and forest scenery, easiness of access by the Levis and Island steamers and at moderate charges, boating and bathing facilities, etc., and as no spirituous liquors are permitted on the grounds, perfect order and quiet always prevail.

THE CAP SANTE UNKNOWN.—An inquest was held yesterday on the body of the unknown man found floating up the river abreast of Cape Santé on Friday, and the remains not having been recognized or claimed were ordered to be buried. The body is that of a young man of about 5 feet 9 inches high, with red hair, no beard, had on reddish brown tweed pants, dark blue cotton overalls, and blue overall frock, shoes studded with nails. He seemed to have been engaged painting.

BOYS AND GIRLS FOR CANADA.—One hundred boys from Dr Barnardo's Homes, London, England, arrived by the "Polynesian" for situations in Ontario. They are under the escort of the Rev. F. Fielder, governor of the Homes, of which Lord Cairns is President. From the same institutions, (which support and train 1,400 children) about 100 girls will be sent out for adoption and situations in July.

WOMAN AND MAN SHOT.—During the progress of the St. Jean Baptiste Procession at St. Sauveur yesterday some ruffians driving along in a calèche fired off pistols promiscuously among the people. A young woman was shot in the left side and will it is reported die from the wound. A man was also shot, but not seriously, in the leg. The police are after the scoundrels.

THE CROPS.—Reports of the growing crops from various parts of the province say hay is far above the average; wheat not much grown, in some places up to average years, but in other sections far below; oats generally poor; corn, average in some districts, and in others not good; apples are an average crop.

NEW COURT HOUSE.—Judging from the number of men employed and other evidences of vitality in its construction, the new Court House will be finished in about half a century! The same remarks will apply to the new exomining warehouse and some other public works now under way here.

FAT CATTLE LOST.—Mr. Xavier Letourneau, of St. Pierre, River du Sud, a day or two ago had 40 fat oxen shut up in a barn for the night, with the doors tightly closed. The heat of the animals was such that the air became suffocating and they were all choked to death.

SAD DEATH.—While the pupils of the Convent of Terrebonne were waiting for the cars, a girl fell through the flooring of the closet of the North Shore Railway station and was smothered to death.

GIRLS' HIGH SCHOOL.—The public closing exercises of the Girls' High School will take place on Wednesday at three o'clock, in the hall of the Y. M. C. A.

PICNIC.—The pupils of the Friars School of St. Johns Suburbs, with their professors and teachers and the vicars of the church, had a picnic to the Island yesterday.

PUBLIC OFFICES CLOSED.—All the Government Officials got a holiday yesterday on account of St. Jean Baptiste day, which occurred on Sunday.

THE VICE-ROYALTY OF INDIA.

Lord Rosebery was offered the Vice-Royalty of India but declined, except upon the condition that the India Jurisdiction Bill be abandoned. Gladstone favours the measure, and will support the Marquis of Ripon's view heartily. Lord Ripon will be made Duke on his return to England in recognition of his great services in India.

In the suburbs of Halifax city many fields of potatoes have been destroyed, a slender worm, about an inch long completely eating the core out of them. It has been observable also in this vicinity that great quantities of leaves have fallen from trees, which is attributable to the operation of some kind of worm.

There is a floating salmon cannery on the Columbia river. It is a two story screw steamer, 160 feet long, 35 feet beam. It has quarters for white, Indian, and Chinese fishermen, and has cost about \$40,000.

Mr. Justice M. C. Cameron, of the Court of Queen's Bench, Toronto, is to be appointed judge of the Court of Appeal, Ontario.

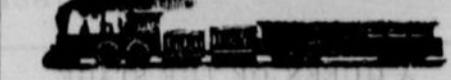

It is stated in a New Brunswick paper that there are two persons at Grand Pre, Nova Scotia, who hold seventeen offices.

The Montreal Diocesan Synod, like that of Quebec two years since, has adopted a scheme for the establishment of an order of deaconesses.

Mr. L. Z. Joncas, Canadian Commissioner to the International Fisheries Exhibition, writes to the Canadian Gazette, of London, on the subject of seaside farming in Canada. His letter is one of the most valuable contributions yet made to literature intended to promote immigration. He shows that the Maritime Provinces and Quebec have not only a fertile soil, but also perhaps the best coast and deep sea fisheries in the world. They have also an abundance of fresh water fish. If the settler does not find fishing congenial, he can find employment in any of the large fish curing establishments along the coast, and can superintend his farming operations at the same time. Going to the Province of Ontario, or farther west, he will find there the same chances of making a good living. His farm will give him a yield at which he will be surprised, and the lakes and rivers of the upper regions of the Dominion will furnish him with any quantity of salmon, trout, white fish, herring and sturgeon, for which he can get good prices. Mr. Joncas' letter is written in a style eminently calculated to infuse into the breasts of Europeans a desire to emigrate to such a country as he depicts.

BY CABLE THIS EVENING

Cholera in Egypt. Damietta, June 26. Of 42 deaths here yesterday, 28 are known to be from cholera. It is suspected the rest were from the same malady. Horrible Butcheries in Africa. Sierra Leone, June 26. The British operations against Chief Gipowe were attended with great atrocities. The native allies butchered and mutilated all males taken prisoners. 82 of the enemy were killed by a single shell. Explosion in a Mine. London, June 26. By an explosion in a colliery at Cardiff two persons were killed and 12 injured.

Railway Collision and Loss of Life. Helena, Montana, June 26. The Northern Pacific gravel train, with a hundred chinamen, ran into a wood train at Heron siding, instantly killing 18 chinamen and wounding 25 others. The engineer of the gravel train was killed and the fireman badly hurt. Nobody on the wood train was injured. POLICE COURT TO-DAY—(Before Judge Chauveau).—A seaman of the Queen of India, for absence without leave, was committed and sentenced to three weeks imprisonment. Four other seamen from different vessels, who had been given in charge for drunkenness and inability to perform their duty were severally sent on board at the request of the captain.

The animals were supplied at a cost of thirty thousand dollars. They now have 900,000 sheep and 200,000 goats, raise a million pounds of wool yearly, and support themselves.

From Halifax this Evening

Halifax, June 26. The steamer Fife, from Shields for Port Caledonia, which struck the shoals near Low Point, C.B., light house, has arrived at North Sydney, C.B., with her propeller broken. Steamer Averill, ashore near Ingonish, is reported lying with her bow on and her stern in fourteen fathoms of water. She is in a dangerous position with her deck submerged to the bridge.

From Ottawa this Evening

Ottawa, June 26. J. A. Mackenzie, of Sarnia, Ont., and Wm. Pugsley, jr., of St. John, N. B., solicitors for the Qu'Appelle, Long Lake and Saskatchewan Railway and the Qu'Appelle and Long Lake Co., are here in the interest of the companies they represent. Mr. Pugsley is just from Regina, and speaks in the brightest terms of the crop prospects of the North West. When he left the C. P. R. was 17 miles beyond South Saskatchewan, and were laying rails at the rate of 3 miles a day. Regina is growing steadily. The streets are being graded, and work was to be commenced on the reservoir at once. The Canada Northwest Land Company were about putting up a solid brick building for their office at a cost of \$15,000. The Government buildings, including a Custom House, were under way, while a good many private buildings were also being erected. The machinery had just arrived for a steam planing mill. Mr. Costigan left to-day for New Brunswick. Mr. Pope returned to the city to-day.

From Montreal this Evening

Montreal, June 26. The Chief Justice has extradited W. C. Phelan for trial in the United States for uttering forged bank bills. A \$500 fire occurred last night in a shed on St. Phillip street. Origin unknown. Local stock market firm this morning.

From Toronto this Evening.

Toronto, June 26. At the Police Court this morning, Ann Healey was sentenced to jail for drunkenness. In the cells she attempted to hang herself with her pocket handkerchief. A constable found her nearly strangled. Last week 555 head of cattle, 278 sheep and 54 hogs were received at the West End cattle market. Marine matters in port are duller than for many years. It is almost impossible to get a shipment of a paying cargo. Lumber is unobtainable and coal hardly worth the trouble of shipment so low is the figure. For a young city, Winnipeg, says the Toronto World, is doing well. Last year the rate of taxation there was one per cent., and the sum realized was \$300,000.
