Fight annexation Cushing urges

Westmount received a firm warning Monday night when retiring mayor J. C. Cushing urged citizens to be ever alert to the threat of annexation. "Westmount residents," he said, "must take a greater interest in municipal affairs. Citizens must

support the council in helping to battle any threats of annexation. We must not lay down our guard for a minute." He stated that it could not be in the best interests of Westmount or any other suburban municipality to be controlled by another corporation.

"Westmount pioneered in the construction of snow melting ponds. "Property values have greatly risen in the past few years," Mr. Cushing said, "and Westmount's credit rating is higher than Montreal's or that of any other city on the island. He attributed this rise partly to the establishment of new schools in

Thieves to have clean shirts

What size shirt does a burglar wear? Indications are that one local thief, while enjoying a certain "well-laundered look," this week is not too particular about proper neck sizes and sleeve lengths as he stole 20 bundles of clean clothes from a laundry at 152 Abbot avenue in Westmount on Sunday.

Police reported that someone had entered the laundry through a narrow transom which was only secured by a single nail. Doors were locked. Finding only five dollars in silver on the premises, the thief selected twenty bundles of laundry apparently at random, and carried them to his car parked some distance away.

Reviewing the highlights of his term as mayor, before an estimated 140 persons at the inaugural session of the City Council, Mr. Cushing commented on the many improvements made in the field of public works. He noted that in the past four years Westmount completed an addition to the library, constructed a swimming

Strike at bakery called 'illegal'

Employees of the Wonder Bakeries Limited, went on strike Wednesday, establishing 15 pickets outside the building at 323 Prince Albert Street. The move was apparently in sympathy with the employees of James Strachan Limited of Montreal, who walked off their jobs last week.

Mr. R. Rae, company spokesman, said that there was no

real dispute between management and employees. "It is nothing more than an illegal strike," he said.

While all of the employees concerned with production were involved in the strike, "we are carrying on with limited production," Mr. Rae said.

Westmount Police has been at the bakery since the strike began and have reported no incidents.

A four alarm fire which broke out on Greene avenue near Sherbrooke, Wednesday night, demolished a row of stores and offices and threatened a nearby block of apartment buildings.

One fireman was injured when falling plaster struck him in the eye and was taken to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, where he is reported in good condition.

The fire, which was reported at 11.15 p.m., caused an estimated \$140,000 damages. It was well established when firefighters arrived to see flames shooting out of windows on the first and second floors of the buildings. Police officials said that it was one of the most spectacular blazes they could remember. Sixty firemen, under the direction of Police and Fire Chief E. C. Harper brought the fire under control in an hour and a half.

New school planned for city

The Board of Directors of Miss Edgar's and Miss Cramp's School have made a formal application to the City of Westmount to construct a two story school on Mt. Pleasant avenue, between Cedar and Montrose. Mrs. John Corbett, Chairman, in announcing the plans, said that the school, on its present location at 1761 Cedar avenue, needed more space and facilities, as it had increased its enrollment in the past few years by about 60%.

Miss Edgar's and Miss Cramp's, a private school for girls, now located in the City of Montreal, near the corner of Cedar and Cote-des-Neiges has an enrollment of 166. Grades one to eleven are taught.

"In addition to being overcrowded we are located on a desperately bad and busy corner," Mrs. Corbett said. "Young students are simply unable to cross here and they all have to be called for. We used to draw our students primarily from the East of us, but now most of them come from the North and West. The new school will be more central."

Mrs. Corbett noted that, with more room, the school would be able to teach kindergarten and grade 12, increasing their size by about 30 students. "There is no future in adding to our present building as the property is in Montreal's 'Green Belt' and we would never know how long we could stay here."

"A new school is necessary at this time due to the need for better feeding arrangements, proper kitchens, and a bigger library," she added. "We should have more laboratory space for science students as well as a regular art room."

Mrs. Corbett said that many locations for the new school were considered, but they were all in dangerous locations for pupils crossing the streets. "The Board of Directors concluded that the Mt. Pleasant site was the most convenient for students and we'd really prefer to be in Westmount."

Properties destroyed

Commercial properties damaged or destroyed are: Victor Trower, Photographer, and Fold-door of Canada Limited and Decorative Trends Incorporated, at 1374 Greene, the Pro-Arte Shop and J. Pool at 1378 Greene, and Trimlex Company, Bridgeport Fabrics of Canada and the Donahue Corporation of Canada at 1378 Greene.

"A firetrap"

Police officials stated that "in spite of the modern fronts, facing Greene avenue, the buildings in back were a fire trap—old and falling apart. Cracked walls provided a passage for the fire from building to building.

The department worked through the night to completely drown the fire. Flames were still spotted from time to time until yesterday afternoon.

Investigations are continuing as to the cause of the fire.

This was the worst fire that Westmount had experienced since July of last year when flames gutted an apartment at Kensington and Sherbrooke.

Motorists find cars 'too warm'

This was a cold week with many stalled automobiles blocking the streets, but two local residents found their cars a little too hot, as they tried novel ways to warm them. One motorist on Belmont avenue placed a blanket over the hood of his car. He left the motor running, unfortunately and the blanket soon caught fire from the heat of the engine. Quickly extinguished by firemen, the blaze destroyed the blanket, but only scored the paint on the hood.

Residents of Clarke avenue were startled Sunday when they noticed a large cloud of black smoke coming from the engine of a parked car. When firemen arrived, they found that the owner had placed a large oil lamp under the hood, "just to unfreeze the moving parts a bit." Little damage was sustained aside from scorched wires.

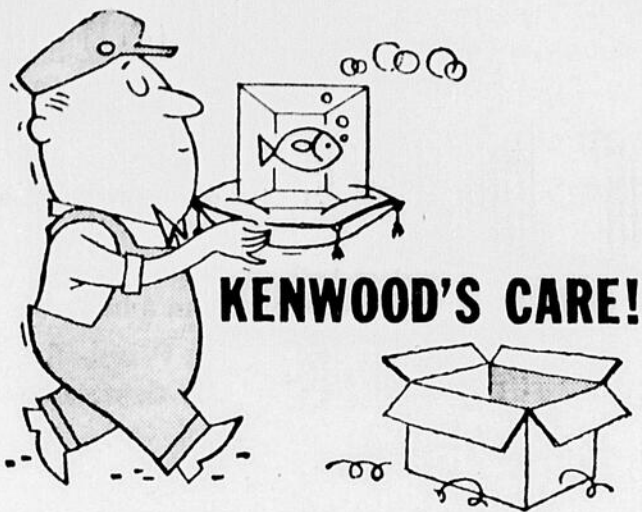

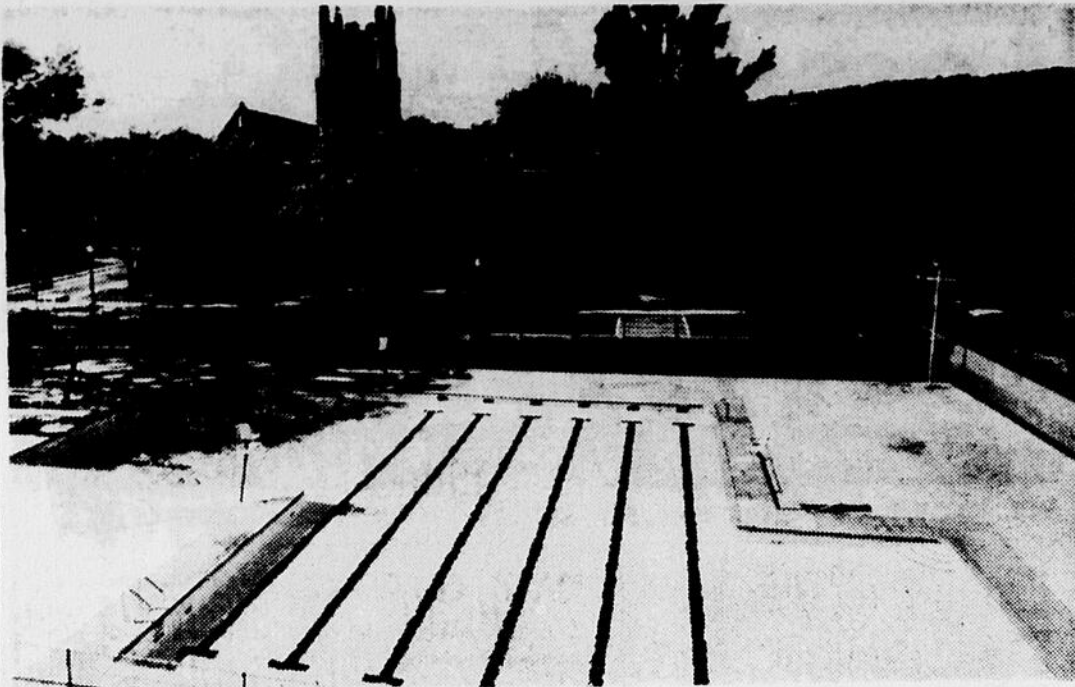

Westmount pool wins award

The City of Westmount's first municipal pool received an award for "design excellence" in the International contest sponsored annually by the National Swimming Pool Institute in association with Swimming Pool Magazine.

In announcing the award at the industry's annual convention in Miami on January 22nd, Robert Hoffman, Publisher of Swimming Pool Age, advised the Canada Gunite Company, designer builders of the pool, that the Westmount entry was the only municipal pool selected for an award in the International division of the contest.

"With scores of fancy residential and lush resort pools entered from England, France, South Africa, Italy, Australia and especially from Latin American countries where labor costs are so much lower," Hoffman commented, "it is amazing that a Canadian municipal pool can compete at all."

The 200,000 gallon Z-shaped pool

features both 25-yard and 25-meter racing courses and is similar to other pools built by Canada Gunite across the country. It was opened in August, 1962.

NEW MEMBERS WANTED FOR RAPIDLY GROWING BUSINESS

SPCA Statistics released

The report of W. N. Dunlop, general manager of the SPCA, given last Thursday at the annual general meeting, indicated 76,725 dogs and cats were destroyed during 1962, 41,890 of them at the owners' request.

Of the total destroyed, 23,503 were dogs; the rest were cats.

Mr. Dunlop pointed out in his report that 79,290 animals were received by the SPCA during the year, and of this, 598 dogs were returned to owners, and one cat. Placed in homes were 1,142 dogs and 824 cats, plus seven horses (former police horses bought by the SPCA and sold to private owners).

The financial statement for the year indicated a gross operating loss of \$53,445.77, which was partly covered by income from other investments.

Net operating loss for the year was \$10,818.86, or more than \$8,000 over last year's reported loss.

Biggest increase in expenses shown in the financial statement was for public relations, \$4,643.33, which had no counterpart during 1961.

The City of Westmount and interested promoters are today arranging for the construction of a mammoth apartment building on the site of the Grey Nuns' Farm, opposite the Westmount Athletic Grounds. Plans call for four building blocks, to enclose a central park-playground court. The first block is to be ten stories in height with space underneath for 500 automobiles. The erection of this building, which will cost about \$2,500,000 would provide a practical solution to the local unemployment problem.

Ed. Note — An apartment was finally built in 1957 — the first construction of any type on that block.

Policy of secrecy hurts police good name

IT'S been some time since the Examiner has even mentioned the propensity of Canada's best-run City (Westmount, of course) for conducting much of its public business in private.

We have well documented this in the past. The practice stands undenied. And unchanged. And Westmounters by and large don't particularly care one way or the other — so long as the City continues to show all the outward evidence of being well run.

In congratulating the new mayor, His Worship C. M. Drury; newly-elected Alderman D. N. Byers, and re-elected Alderman I. S. Backler and Alderman M. L. Tucker, whose acclamations were finalized with ceremonies this week, the Examiner but expresses the hope that they and their colleagues might experiment a little more than have their predecessors with giving the citizens the benefit of their individual views on some of the more important civic matters which will pass before them at the council table during their terms of office.

The fear of being misquoted or misunderstood, of being caught in controversy, of making mistakes which all might see, of being ridiculed — these are human traits, understandable, with which we and all Westmount citizens sympathize. And like most fears, they are mostly groundless.

The citizens are genuinely interested in knowing of civic problems and how they may be worked out. This interest may be passive, but it is positive.

We've long since stopped stridently urging wide-open council meetings for Westmount. We now only quietly suggest they be tried, as we believe the outgoing council made some tentative steps toward doing.

Meanwhile, "keeping mum" has one department of the City's services in hot water with some citizens this week — a department

Stop hedging on Dorchester issue

Sir:

At last, after decades of planning, Montreal is to get her subway. It will be a major factor in preventing traffic congestion in the downtown area; it will do the same in this area, when it is extended to Westmount and N.D.G.

Not only will Westmounters be able to utilize the subway in travelling downtown but they will also benefit due to a decrease in traffic as motorists leave their cars in outlying lots to take the subway. The subway, which will be completed in time for the Centennial of Canada and the World's Fair in 1967 will be an achievement of which, Westmount, as a responsible community on the island, should have every right to be proud.

Why then does Westmount delay in co-operating with Montreal in permitting the land on the west side of Atwater — land that is now only a parking lot — to be used as a terminal for the St. Catherine street line? Why does Westmount "hedge" when asked to pay her share of subway costs?

We must co-operate. Of course it will mean extra expenses, extra difficulties, perhaps even higher taxes for a while. We will pay for the widening of Dorchester; we must pay for the subway. It will benefit us many times more.

Spectator deck for bath house

Architect Grattan D. Thompson, 4135 Sherbrooke street west gives the following description of the bath Westmount swimming pool. "The Bathhouse will be 133 feet long and 22 feet wide; containing 56 coin-operated lockers, and 300 clothing compartments divided as follows: 28 lockers, and 100 clothing compartments for girls; 28 lockers and 200 clothing compartments for boys.

Also included one man's and women's dressing rooms with lockers, clothing compartments, dressing stalls, lavatories and showers, a small office, mechanical equipment room and storage room and a spectator roof deck of a material well suited to such an installation. The foundations will be of concrete, with exterior brick walls and stone trim. There will be aluminum windows of full height glass, looking onto the pool deck, terrazzo floors, painted concrete block partitions. Color schemes will be decided on at a later date."

A series of lectures to the Westmount Police by leading judges, lawyers, criminologists, and a journalist has been so successful that some of the speakers have come back to hear other lectures. The series, completed during December, gives Westmount police an unusual opportunity to hear the view of a variety of experts in the fields related to their work. Attended by all on the force, the series was regarded as a horticulturally valuable part of the training programme for the newer members. Chief Training Officer, Andrew Lowson, who organized the lectures, says that the speakers were glad to co-operate in giving their time for this course. It was the first series of this type to be held in West-

mount since early 1930's.

"This week the lectures are being preserved in a special loose leaf book form," stated Inspector ANDREW LOWSON, "and they will be issued to all members of the force for special reference, training, and examination purpose." The ten speakers in the series were: Fred Kaufman, Miss Claire Barrette, Judge John Long, Harvey Yarosky, Dr. Rosaire Roussel, Bernard Pecelet, Joseph Cohen QC, Leon Levinson, Jacques Dueros QC, and Judge Redmond Roche.

Rotary assists 'Peace Corps'

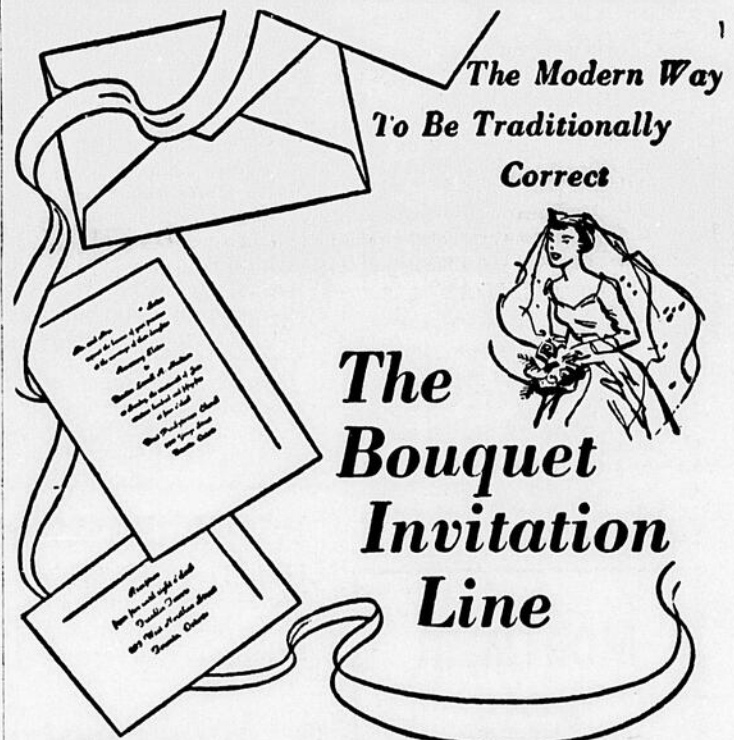
Three Sir George Williams students helped last summer to install the first hot water showers ever seen in a Peruvian city of about 5,000. The aim of the project, sponsored by the YMCA, and assisted by the Westmount Rotary Club was to establish a type of "Canadian Peace Corps," to help inhabitants of poorer countries. Their wish was also to gain a better understanding of social problems, to exchange ideas, and to break down "the stereotyped impression of Canadians as rich gringos with no real skills other than making money, and no concern for any distant country."

The students, Fred McGregor and Bill Douglas, speaking at the weekly meeting of the Westmount Rotary Club, outlined many of the problems facing South American countries: the vast class differences, the general mismanagement of government, the large increases of extremists, who believe in revolution as the only means to achieve their ends.

Because of the success of the South American project a work camp in Japan is planned for next year.

During the following two years, he taught High School English at the St. John's-Ravenscourt School. Since 1959 he has been Headmaster of the Lower School there where he revised the curriculum and presided over a doubled enrolment.

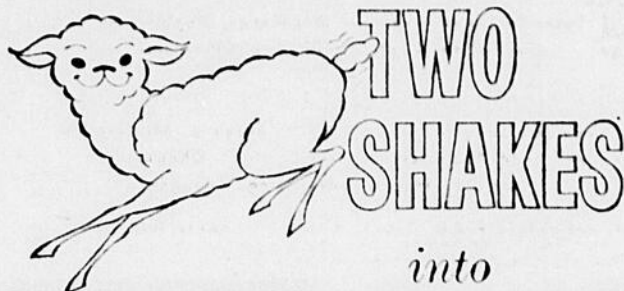

Anglican Diocese to start building fund

Anglicans in the Diocese of Montreal will be asked to subscribe to a building fund appeal for \$250,000, needed by the Montreal Diocesan Theological College for two purposes, according to an announcement by the Board of Governors.

For three years the Governors have been studying the need for accommodation for married students and have decided that only by adding a new wing at the rear of the building on University street can this objective be achieved.

In 1961-62 there were nine married students in training, while this year there are 16.

The new wing, which will contain apartments for married students, will cost an estimated \$180,000. In addition to this, renovations estimated to cost \$70,000 are urgently needed.

Outstanding gift

The present College was an outstanding gift from the late A. F. Gault in 1896, who was one of the great benefactors of

the Anglican Community in Mont-
real.

The intention is to offer the apartments to married students at as low a rental as possible, thus enabling them to live in the College, and to take a fuller part in all sides of College life, than is possible if they lived at a distance.

In view of the greatly increased number of married students everywhere, the Governors believe that this is a forward step for the College to take at this point. They think that it will attract students to the Diocesan College, and will be of great benefit to those who can be accommodated in the new wing.

It is hoped that the Appeal will be launched soon after Easter, and that it will receive a generous response.

This week and next at the Unity Boys' Club Needed—citizenship training

Good citizenship and the meaning of democracy can best be learned through actual experience and participation. Because of its methods, philosophy and informal setting, the Unity Boys' Club of Westmount is in an extremely favorable position to train boys and girls for responsible citizenship. Although this is and always has been one of the primary objectives of the Club, there is an urgent need to go beyond the regular activities and develop an organized and purposeful Citizenship Training Program.

Such a program should include and more specifically focus attention on the following objectives:

1. To develop a respect for our system of government, respect for law and order, and for those who administer the laws.
2. To develop understanding of the rights, privileges, and obligations of citizenship.
3. To foster understanding and respect for the property and legal rights of others.
4. To create an interest in civic affairs.
5. To provide opportunities for boys and girls to learn how to function in our democracy.
6. To develop an understanding of the importance of voting and elections.
7. To develop in boys and girls the skills for democratic participation in our government.

GROUP CLUBS

Group Clubs, as part of a balanced Boys' Club program, provide one of the tools useful in helping to attain the objectives of good citizenship. The group club technique has been used as long as there have been boys' clubs. It has been found to be one of the effective ways of directing youth into constructive behavior attitudes and experiences.

In these clubs, youngsters have the opportunity to learn about good citizenship, practice leadership in democratic procedure, develop a working knowledge, not only of the privileges of a member of democracy, but also of the responsibilities of citizenship. They become aware of the rights of others. The group club process is an outstanding method of emphasizing the sharing of a boy or girl's own personal aims and interests with the general good of the group. This, of course, is one of the first steps toward democratic, responsible citizenship.

OPERATION

Within the last few years, efforts have been made to increase the group clubs at the Unity Boys' Club. This year, ten group clubs are operating on a regular scheduled basis and several more are in the process of organization. We are hopeful that this method of programming will enable us to carry out our objectives of providing the youth of our community with an opportunity to learn the fundamentals of good citizenship.

Obituary

Joseph Simard, 74

Funeral services will be held tomorrow for Joseph Arthur Simard, 74, prominent Quebec industrialist who died Monday in Miami, following a heart attack. Mr. Simard lived at 775 Lexington Avenue, Westmount.

Born and educated at Baie St. Paul, the son of a St. Lawrence river captain, he worked for a time as a clerk, an accountant, as superintendent of the Sorel Light and Power Company. Later he helped found a company manufacturing electrical equipment and selling automobiles.

Mr. Simard built a grain elevator in Sorel and in 1930 became head of the Sincennes-McNaughton Tugs. Quickly establishing himself in the marine industry, he purchased a British steamer, and the government's shipyard at Sorel, where he made guns and corvettes for the Canadian Navy during World War II.

President of Marine Industries Limited, and chairman of Sorel Steel Foundries, Mr. Simard was a director of North American Elevators, Bathurst Pulp and Paper Company, Algoma Steel Corporation, North American Elevators, North American Transport, Royal Petroleum Company, Labrador Mining and Exploration Limited, Dominion Life Insurance Company, and Sherwin-Williams Paint Company.

Surviving are four sons, Arthur, Jean, Leon, and Jacques, three daughters, Marthe, Louise, and Claire, and one brother Ludger, three sisters, Mrs. Armand Petitclerc, Mrs. Irenee Garipey, and Mrs. Joseph Larochelle.

Services will take place in St. Leo's Church on Saturday.

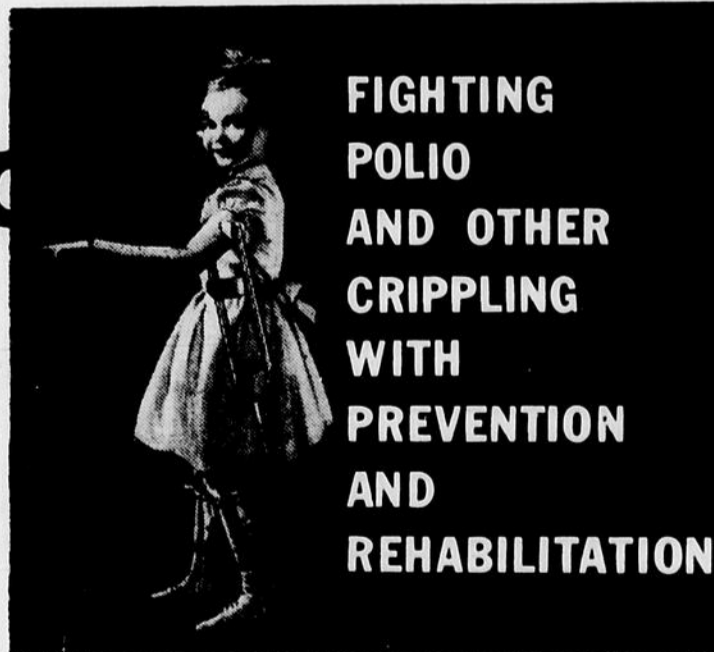

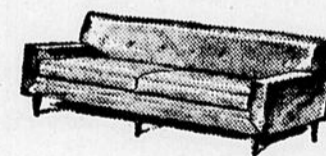

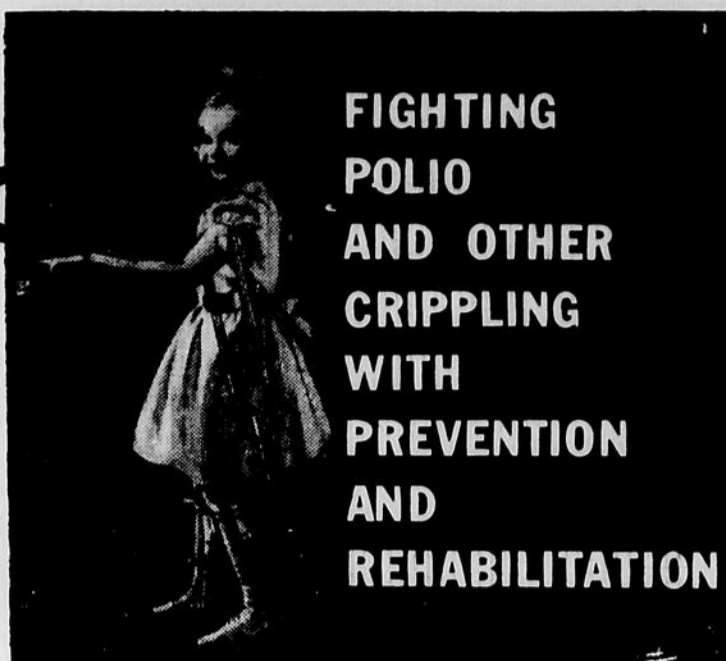
