Acting career rewarded

MONTREAL (CP) — Gilles Pelletier, well-known theatre, television and film actor, has been awarded the Victor Morin 1970 theatre award, it was announced Thursday.

The award, which includes a \$500 prize for outstanding work in the theatrical profession, will be presented Oct. 8. Mr. Pelletier, 45, is well-known in French Canada for roles in weekly television programs, in classical and contemporary plays and in films.

Favours wiretapping

QUEBEC (CP) — Justice Minister Jerome Choquette said Thursday he favors the use of wiretapping by provincial police, provided its use is regulated by his department.

Mr. Choquette told a news conference electronic eavesdropping "is the only truly effective method we have in fighting organized crime with success."

He added, however, that only police departments should be given access to such equipment. Mr. Choquette was referring to the seizure of electronic eavesdropping equipment at a private investigation agency's offices Wednesday.

The justice department revoked the operating permit of Citadel Investigation Agency Ltd., after the raid on the agency's head office in a Montreal suburb.

A spokesman for the federal justice department said in an interview Justice Minister John Turner would introduce legislation in the House of Commons in the next two months on the control of electronic spying.

Asks reliance on reputation

QUEBEC (CP) — Guy Bertrand, defence counsel for Leo Tremblay, called on a jury Thursday to consider the former politician's "reputation and honesty" before returning a verdict in his trial on theft of 28 valuable paintings.

In his summation, Mr. Bertrand said the past record of the accused should outweigh Crown testimony by Tremblay's former handyman and chauffeur, Etienne Blanchet.

Tremblay, who once led the defunct right-wing Christian Nationalist party, faces charges of theft and possession of stolen goods in a 1965 theft of paintings and some coins from the Quebec Museum.

The paintings, part of a collection owned by the late Quebec premier Maurice Duplessis, have been valued at about \$2 million.

In his summation, Mr. Bertrand described Blanchet, arrested in 1969 after he attempted to sell one of the stolen paintings to Mrs. Eric Kierans, wife of the federal communications minister, as "a coward, a chronic liar and a No. 1 candidate for perjury."

Offer special legal aid

QUEBEC (CP) — The provincial justice department Thursday offered a special legal aid grant to Sandy Saunders, 25-year-old Eskimo sentenced to two years in jail for attempting to break into a house.

Justice Minister Jerome Choquette told a news conference the aid will be given if Saunders decides to appeal the conviction.

"We have to understand that the Eskimo's way of life is different from ours and that they have no doors on their homes," Mr. Choquette said.

Saunders was convicted in Montreal Aug. 22.

Mr. Choquette added that he intends to appoint a permanent justice of the peace for Quebec's northern regions who could "explain our way of life to the Eskimos and try to adapt our principles to their mentality."

"It would be great if we could find an Eskimo able to do the job."

Saunders also received a suspended one-year sentence on charges of grievous assault and common assault.

Open-armed greeting to forestry convention

SHERBROOKE (GF) — The City of Sherbrooke continued its policy of attempting to make this city a convention centre by throwing open its arms to the more than 525 persons who attended the 25th annual convention of the Eastern Townships Forestry Association yesterday at the Le Baron Hotel.

Guests were treated to a civic reception, city tours and a ladies' reception at the Sherbrooke Country Club. Mayor Marc Bureau opened the day-long meeting with the words "welcome to the most beautiful city in Canada."

In his initial remarks, president M. Alex Babin of Granby thanked the mayor for the city's effort, and said it is this type of interest on the part of Sherbrooke which made his association locate its central office here.

Others present for the opening ceremony included Archbishop J.M. Fortier, Paul Gervais M.P. and Paul Murdoch, the association's new president. The evening banquet was attended by Hon. Keith Drummond, minister of lands and forests and Hon. G. Masse, minister of natural resources.

In the 1969-70 annual report tables by vice-president Lucien Bedard of Sherbrooke, he said "your association has become a giant after having been born a dwarf."

Looking back over the years since its inception in 1945, we have to realize the gigantic work the association has accomplished, he said.

He referred specifically to reforestation, the area's forest inventory, the development of maple groves and wood lots and the support given to 4-H clubs.

Mr. Bedard, who has been a stalwart in the organization for several decades, spoke with pride when he said that in 1945, 40,000 trees were planted in the Eastern Townships, while so far this year over nine million have been planted.

He also seemed very pleased that the area forest inventory has finally been completed.

"At last," he said, "firms which rely upon a supply of forest trees will be able to base economic decisions on the availability of a specific number of trees."

Mr. Bedard reflected especially upon the growth of the 4-H clubs sponsored by the forestry association, saying the numbers of participants has increased many times over the years. "And let's not forget our forestry days, our 4-H relays, the ornamental work done in our schools, the tree festivals, and our 10-year-old Le Progres Forester magazine."

"Others may remember the 14 courses given for the classification of hardwood and our interest and involvement in country fairs," he said.

With only small resources and the constant faith of its directors, the association has become a giant in the field of forest education, he said. This is due to the thousands of Eastern Townships residents whose only concern over the years has been to overcome the lack of interest in forestry, he concluded.

QUEBEC (CP) — The province's medical care insurance legislation will come into effect Nov. 1, regardless of whether agreements have been signed with doctors' professional associations over their participation.

Premier Robert Bourassa told the Quebec national assembly health committee Thursday negotiations with the doctors cannot continue indefinitely and the government must protect the population.

"That is why I am announcing today that the government, while remaining ready to negotiate with the parties concerned, intends to take necessary steps to have the medical care insurance plan come into effect Nov. 1," the premier said.

He did not say what steps the government would take, but special legislation by the national assembly appears to be the only way the insurance plan can be brought into effect before the agreements between the government and the doctors are signed.

The health committee re-issued an invitation to Dr. Raymond Robillard, president of the 4,000-member Quebec Federation of Medical Specialists, to appear before it today to present the federation's point of view.

WAS TURNED DOWN

Dr. Robillard had rejected an invitation to appear before the committee Thursday because, he said, the government had no intention of changing its position on the federation's demands.

The specialists have threatened to go on strike if necessary to support their demands that the medical care insurance legislation be amended to their satisfaction, and some

specialists have already begun to withdraw some services.

Health Minister Claude Castonguay also told the committee the government is ready to "clarify" a section of the legislation dealing with supervision of doctors by the Quebec Health Insurance Board.

The four modifications would make clear that the Quebec College of Physicians and Surgeons alone may exercise control over the professional acts of doctors while the board would determine payment to doctors on the college's advice.

MDs warn of services withdrawal

MONTREAL (CP) — The 4,000-member Quebec Federation of Medical Specialists issued its "first public warning" Thursday of what it called an impending withdrawal of services by doctors in the province.

The action is being taken to protest the provincial government's medical care insurance plan which goes into effect Nov. 1.

The federation said in a statement he situation is "serious."

Dr. Raymond Robillard, federation president, said at an earlier news conference that as many as 20 per cent of practising specialists might provide only curtailed services today.

He said partial withdrawal of services had been started by individual doctors a week ago and was especially noticeable in Quebec City and Trois-Rivieres.

The partial withdrawals involving shorter office hours, slower treatment of patients and restrictions on the number of appointments were not directed by the federation, he said.

At a news conference he emphasized that advance warnings would be issued to the public if there was a move by specialists toward a general strike.

DEPENDS ON GOVERNMENT

A federation spokesman said a complete walkout by the specialists would depend partly on the reaction of the government and other medical groups.

The federation represents 64 per cent of doctors in Quebec, outnumbering the 2,300-member Quebec Federation of General Practitioners.

Dr. Gerard Hamel, president of the general practitioners who was in Quebec City for the opening of a special legislature health committee called to discuss the medical care legislation, said "there is no question of a strike or partial strike for now" by GPs. He said his group neither supports nor denounces the specialists' action.

Re-examine Montreal taxation

MONTREAL (CP) — With the young Montreal Urban Community facing capital expenditures of nearly \$700 million for public transportation and water treatment plants alone, the whole municipal taxation system will have to be re-examined, Lucien Saulnier said Thursday.

The chairman of MUC's executive committee told the Quebec Union of Municipalities that legislation creating the community last January "does not provide for any subsidies in this regard."

Mr. Saulnier suggested that the provincial government assume the full cost of education by 1980. To accomplish this, school boards would gradually give up their share of real estate taxes to the city and be reimbursed by the government.

Will suspend services to hi-jacking states

MONTREAL (CP) — The council of the International Civil Aviation Organization Thursday narrowly approved a United States proposal calling for a multilateral agreement to end air services to countries for "international blackmail."

The 27-member council approved the measure by a 14-to-3 margin with 10 abstentions. Minimum support from 14 countries was needed for approval.

This means that the measure will go before the ICAO legal committee, currently meeting in London, where it will be discussed.

From there the legal committee will decide whether it will be incorporated into a new international convention or added to existing conventions such as the Tokyo convention.

The approval was seen as a major victory for the U.S. delegation, which has argued that prosecution of hijacking is primarily a technical not a political problem and therefore under the jurisdiction of ICAO.

The three council members opposing the measure, Egypt, Tunisia and Lebanon, have argued that such a matter is political in nature and should be handled by the United Nations.

Illnesses plague leaders

CAIRO (Reuters) — Both the Egyptian interim president, Anwar El Sadat, and former premier Aly Sabry were reported today to have suffered heart attacks during President Nasser's funeral.

Cairo's authoritative Al Ahram newspaper says the attacks, which prevented the two leaders from taking any further part in the funeral rites Thursday, were brought on by exhaustion and the emotion of the last few days.

Thieu sees end to War in Vietnam within three years

SAIGON (CP) — President Nguyen Van Thieu of South Vietnam predicted Thursday that the Paris peace talks will end in failure and that the Vietnam war will be reduced to a relatively minor frontier action within three years.

He said there "aren't too many militarists" in his government but acknowledged that corruption is rampant.

The president spoke of a split developing in the North Vietnamese government and a lowering of the North Vietnamese morale and mentioned the possibility that the Hanoi regime might be overthrown one day. Reunification of the North and South was a future possibility.

Thieu also said that North Vietnam will never recover from the Southern allied incursions into Cambodia earlier this year.

The bombing of North Vietnam was a "defensible reply to aggression that had set the North back 20 years." It was a "mistake" to halt it in 1968.

These points, plus some strong remarks about such world figures as United Nations Secretary-General U Thant, former president Charles de Gaulle of France and Prince Norodom Sihanouk, deposed Cambodian head of state, and his American critics, were highlights of a wide-ranging interview that Thieu granted this reporter.

The president said that the Paris peace talks will never get

anywhere. This was because if the Communist regime agreed to peace it then would have to explain to its people why 600,000

North Vietnamese died in a war that they had not won.

DISAGREES WITH THAIS

He disagreed with a recent Thailand proposal to expand the Paris peace talks to include the Soviet Union and Communist China.

Neither of those powers "would ever sign any agreement

unless they gained from it, and they are not going to gain from this war."

The war would end with the pacification of the South, the decline of North Vietnam's war-making potential through manpower losses and morale problems, and divided leadership, and loss of the "United States as the imperialistic bogeyman, through the carrying out of the Nixon Doctrine, which I entirely approve."

The Nixon Doctrine is the American plan for Southeast Asians to help themselves with outside material assistance.

He said already there was a split in the Hanoi government. Le Duan, Communist party secretary, and Defence Minister Vo Nguyen Giap were committed to the war. But Truong Chinh, North Vietnamese dialectician, wanted greater concentration on the North and a de-emphasis of the war.

Thieu said South Vietnam will help Cambodia if it is heavily attacked by North Vietnam. But he expressed doubt that the Northern alliance has the capability of launching such a "major assault."

THE TURNING POINT

The overthrow of Prince Sihanouk by the Lon Nol regime in Cambodia and the subsequent incursions into Cambodian sanctuaries by the Southern allies was a "decisive turning point in the war."

"Some say it will take the enemy nine months to recover. I say they will never recover."

He said the closing of the port at Kompong Som, the loss of access to the Cambodia rice harvest and the seizure of the sanctuaries, "even more than the heavy loss of men and equipment, has caused the enemy permanent paralysis."

Increasing pressure on the Ho Chi Minh Trail would aggravate the North Vietnamese difficulties. He would vehemently oppose any unconditional cessation of the bombing of the trail which snakes from North Vietnam through Laos, Cambodia and South Vietnam.

The North Vietnamese eventually would overthrow or alter their system of government with which they would inevitably become dissatisfied. This was already worrying Chinh.

Reunification was an unrealistic objective "at least for the next few years" but it was a long-term possibility. Meanwhile, he did not contemplate an invasion of the North.

He ridiculed views that his government should have a different base.

NOT TOO MANY

"There aren't too many militarists in it, but we have had to draw upon the army as a source of training, discipline, competence and leadership, because these qualities cannot be found elsewhere in our society."

The use of the military was common in all under-developed countries. Generals were not uncommon in American political history, from George Washington to Dwight Eisenhower.

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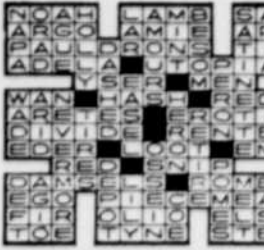
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Answer to Previous Puzzle

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Experts criticize marketing plan

OTTAWA (CP) — The Manitoba government and an influential university professor each slammed a body blow Thursday into the federal government's legislative attempt to knock down recently-constructed inter-provincial trade barriers.

Bill C-197, government legislation to establish national agricultural marketing boards, has been pushed as the federal answer to the national chicken-and-egg war since the mid-September federal-provincial conference.

Manitoba Thursday became the sixth province to pass legis-

lation enabling its marketing boards to regulate imports—eggs in the case of Quebec and broiler chickens in the cases of Ontario, British Columbia, Nova Scotia, Saskatchewan, and now Manitoba.

Both Samuel Uskiw, Manitoba agriculture minister, and Dr. David MacFarlane, chairman of the McGill University agricultural economics department and a member last year of the federal commission on agriculture, expressed general approval of bill C-197 before the Commons agriculture committee.

But both said the bill itself is not going to solve the inter-provincial trade war. To accomplish that, the government is going to have to challenge the provincial restrictions in court.

Mr. Uskiw said the bill, essentially enabling legislation to give the provinces a vehicle for marketing co-operation, would develop to where provinces would decide to opt out of an agency dealing with a particular commodity group.

To work, he said, the bill needed a clause forbidding any abstaining province from restricting the imports of other participating provinces.

But Mr. Uskiw and Dr. MacFarlane both disagreed with Mr. Olson's reasoning.

In the Mideast

To recognize El Fatah only

AMMAN (CP) — Jordan's new government will recognize in future only one Arab guerrilla organization—the moderate Al Fatah headed by Yasser Arafat, a spokesman said Thursday.

Major Adnan Abu Odeh, information minister, said: "We are not going to suppress anyone, but we want to deal only with Al Fatah."

The new government, headed by Premier Ahmed Toukan, took office at the end of Jordan's nine-day civil war last week. Outlining its policy for the first time, Odeh said all other guerrilla groups are illegal. He suggested their members join up with Al Fatah.

The minister spoke ditherly of Marxist groups which he charged were using the Palestinian Arab cause as a cover for advancing their political aims.

The Jordanian government has offered 5,000 dinars (\$14,000) reward for the capture of Dr.

George Habash, leader of the Marxist Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine, and for Nayef Hawatme, chief of the even more extremist Popular Democratic Front.

He said many guerrilla leaders now admit Arafat was misled by the Marxists and that Fatah now is in the process of reviewing its policies.

Military authorities meanwhile reported Jordanian troops and armor had completed their withdrawal from the capital in accordance with the ceasefire agreement concluded in Cairo.

Candy campaigner appointed

SHERBROOKE — Russell Marois has been appointed chairman of the 1970 trick or treat candy campaign, sponsored by the Eastern Townships section of the Kidney Foundation of Canada.

The announcement was made today by Gaston Cote, president of the local section of which Mr. Marois is executive secretary.

In accepting the post, Mr. Marois said he hoped everyone would respond to the urgent need for funds. The first annual campaign will open Oct. 14.

Saskatchewan's medicare experience

Feelings ran high as services cut

REGINA (CP) — A 10-month-old Saskatchewan boy died of meningitis about eight years ago while the province's doctors were withholding services in a fight against the government's medical care insurance plan.

The boy had to be driven 85 miles to Yorkton hospital—where he was dead on arrival—because medical services in towns 22 and 54 miles away had been halted.

The coroner's jury made no recommendations and laid no blame in the death after a doctor testified that the type of meningitis that caused the death "was a rapid thing."

But feelings ran high on July 1, 1962, the day the boy died and the day on which the Saskatchewan medical care insurance plan commenced operations.

"This is mainly a time for calmness," said Regina Leader-Post in a July 3 front-page editorial.

"There is no real reason for anyone to panic with respect to the limited medical service now available," said the newspaper, noting that doctors had no intention of withholding services that were essential to health.

QUEBEC FOLLOWS

The Saskatchewan furor over medical care insurance is recalled by the current situation in Quebec where doctors have started a partial withdrawal of services to protest the province's medical care insurance plan.

The government, in office since 1944, regarded the 1960 general election, in which the plan was a hot issue, as a mandate.

Opponents of the government said it drew only 40.8 per cent of the popular vote in the election and some pressed for a plebiscite.

Some doctors, opposed to compulsory aspects of the scheme that was the first statewide plan of its kind in North America, took down their shingles and left the province for such places as Montana or British Columbia. But most stayed.

The crisis lasted for three weeks and ended with a 3,500 word statement from a Saskatoon hotel room, a memorandum of agreement between the province and the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

End of a tradition

LENNOXVILLE (PT) — The executive committee of the corporation of Bishop's University has officially abrogated the section of the rules, orders and regulations (ROR's) of the university which pertains to academic dress, thus abolishing the compulsion of wearing academic dress as it has existed up until now at the university.

The abrogation was announced

by college principal Dennis Healy in a notice dated September 29, in which he quoted the now-defunct section 67b of the ROR's, which states, "All faculty members and students shall wear a gown of prescribed fashion at Chapel, lectures, meals and at such other places and times as may be prescribed by the Principal."

Faculty and students are urged to maintain the tradition and

continue to wear academic dress on all appropriate occasions even though it is no longer compulsory, the announcement said.

Bishop's has been practically the only college in Canada to require academic dress to be worn on everyday occasions.

In recent years, however, the enforcement of the regulations at lectures has varied according to the mood and temperament of the instructor, with dining halls remaining the only places where gowns were strictly required, and a fine impossible for the absence of them.

Graduates will still be required to wear academic dress at convocation, however, and gowns will be available for rent for the occasion.

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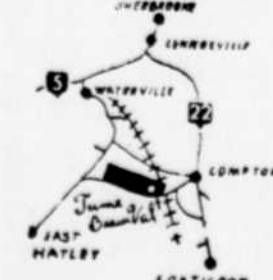

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Senate offers a choice

Perhaps the Canadian Senate does — or can — play an important role in the administrative processes of this country by fulfilling its originally-designed function of reviewing proposals emanating from the Lower House and bringing them into line with common sense.

At least the exhaustive report of the Senate Banking Committee on taxation reform should give the cabinet an opportunity to re-think some of the more radical proposals contained in the Benson White Paper.

The key to the Senate recommendations may be obtained in the section which rejects a wholesale change of the tax system proposed in the White Paper. Rather the committee feels that it would be more sensible and safe to introduce gradually amendments to the existing tax system, such as a limited capital gains tax and partial amendments to the dividend tax credit and natural resources incentives, rather than take the chance of perhaps seriously and adversely affecting the whole economy of this country.

Perfect tax systems, the Senators say, are the fabric of dreams — not of human endeavor.

The strength and weakness of Finance Minister Benson's White Paper proposals have been argued long and loud in the press and in the halls of Parliament, with the submissions varying to reflect the particular interests of the individual argument.

But the Senators seem to have walled through the flood of opposing arguments and come up with a document that could form a basis for a sensible revision of the tax structure in Canada.

That there are inequities and deficiencies in the existing tax system cannot be denied. But this is no reason to throw out a system that on the whole has worked fairly efficiently and with which the economic life of Canada has become adjusted.

Whether the Trudeau Government will accept the Senate proposals as a basis for revising taxation is something still to be determined.

When he first presented his proposals, the Finance Minister indicated they must be accepted on an all-or-nothing basis. Admittedly he has modified his stiff views somewhat over the months, but it will be a bitter pill to swallow if the Government has to admit that the Carter Commission and the White Paper were wasted efforts.

Let's make an exchange

After more than two decades as a poor relation, Communist East Germany is now staging its own version of West Germany's "economic miracle."

But along with boom times has come something the socialist planners did not plan on — the appearance of pretty, shapely women.

This has the Communists so worried, news reports say, "that the state now finds it necessary to warn that beauty is only skin deep and a good lathe operator with a sound ideological background makes a better wife than a Western-type sex queen."

The fear is that productivity on a collective farm or in a factory will suffer if female workers pay more attention to their appearance than to fulfilling contract quotas.

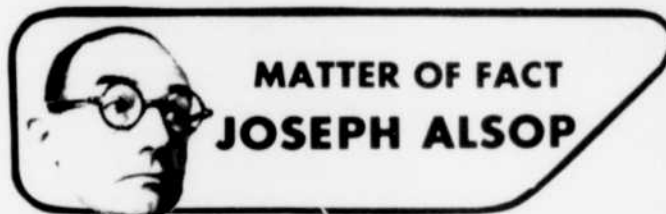
"Young World," the official newspaper of the Communist party youth organization, ran a series of articles warning against imitating "the primitive sex appeal found in western nations" and has launched a campaign against long hair, lipstick, eye make-up and other cosmetics.

Make-up, it declares, is no substitute for intelligence and achievement.

Maybe North American nations can work out a deal with East Germany. We will send them our women liberationists who are tired of being treated as sex objects and want to be appreciated for their intelligence and ability to achieve and they can send us their female lathe operators and tractor drivers who are tired of achieving and would like to begin being appreciated for more "primitive" reasons.

WASHINGTON — Last Sunday the Israelis had their usual defensive force of a few more than 70 tanks on the Golan Heights facing Syria across the border. By Tuesday, the tank force on the Heights had been increased to close to 400.

One must still keep all fingers and toes crossed. But as these words are written, it appears that another full-scale war has been avoided in the Middle East. As the simple figures above-given should indicate to anyone, the Israelis were about ready to intervene when the Syrians called off their invasion of Jordan. And the evidence is also clear that the Israelis would have had strong American support.

Fortunately, the Soviets got the message, and more important, they believed it. As these words are written — for one must preface every hopeful statement with that phrase — they have called their dogs off. That is one main key to the hasty Syrian retreat from Jordan.

The other key, equally important, is the fine showing made by Jordan's Arab Legion, led with superb courage by King Hussein. Without the bravery and skill of the Jordanian soldiers, and the firmness of King Hussein and Marshal Habis Majali, nothing could have been accomplished. The Fedayeen would have won hands down.

That way, there would have been war, too. For in that event, it can be stated on highest authority, the Israelis were fully prepared to seize the Heights across the Jordan River, and perhaps to go even further.

In short, this is an extraordinary story, deserving to be told rather fully. And it begins in Jordan, with King Hussein and his army. Despite the enormous risks, and the Fedayeen's many provocations, the king had been waiting, waiting, waiting, month after month after month — until the disorders, follies and arrogance of the publicity — inflated Fedayeen had made every soldier of the Arab Legion almost unbearably angry.

When his army was straining at the leash — and only then — the king dismissed the civilian cabinet, called on Marshal Habis Majali, and ordered a showdown and, if necessary, a fight. The toadlike Yasser Al Arafat and the other Fedayeen leaders had grown so overconfident they were taken by surprise. They were still so overconfident that they decided to fight.

So the cruel fighting began. The Jordanian soldiers' fierce loyalty to King Hussein, and their burning anger against the Fedayeen, were the factors no one had counted upon — Yasser Arafat above all. It was a horrible business, for the Fedayeen constantly used the cowardly tactic of shielding themselves behind civilians. But the first day was hardly over when it was clear that the Arab Legion and the King had the upper hand.

The scene must shift, now, to Washington and Jerusalem, Moscow and Damascus. In Washington, there were two very major but hidden developments in the first stage of the crisis. For the first time since he came to the White House, the President took personal, continuous charge of Middle Eastern policy. As a consequence, the former misunderstandings between Washington and Jerusalem vanished like a mist, and

the closest co-operation was quickly inaugurated.

It was a bit of luck that the skyjacking, with their danger to American lives, had preceded the internal fight in Jordan. In consequence, doing something to strengthen the 6th Fleet in the Mediterranean was already in the Washington air, so to say.

On Friday of last week, the mighty carrier John F. Kennedy (with its name to bring good luck!) got the order to head for the Mediterranean at full-speed. With its Marine landing force aboard, the Guam followed after. And the two 6th Fleet carriers, Saratoga and Independence, steamed toward the potential trouble zone with orders to maneuver up and down the eastern Mediterranean coast no more than 100 miles offshore.

Moscow was unimpressed by all this, however, possibly because Moscow had been getting used to what can only be called a wormlike American posture in the Middle East. Moscow's investment in the Fedayeen, as it has now turned out, was also immensely higher than anyone had supposed. This is shown by the quantities of Soviet arms and other equipment that are now being found in the Fedayeen hideouts, which are "five or 10 times" what the most pessimistic had predicted.

Toward the end of last week, therefore, Moscow gave Damascus the green light to move to rescue of the Fedayeen in Jordan. There is no question of Moscow's role, for the Soviets have advisers with every unit of the Syrian army. Even the Syrians (and one must underline that "even") would never have moved against Moscow's veto.

It is hard to know just when Damascus got the green light, for terrorists from Lebanon may have crossed Syria to help the Fedayeen in Jordan even before the Syrian-controlled terrorist units of the SAIQA crossed the border. In any case the really important development occurred last Sunday, when the Soviet-supplied T-52 tanks of the Syrian armored forces began pouring across the northern Jordanian border.

That brought the play back to Washington and Tel Aviv. From Washington, "One of the sternest messages this country has ever sent" was expedited to Moscow. It warned of "the gravest consequences" if the Syrian invasion of Jordan was not promptly called off. Simultaneously, a COD intelligence-gathering aircraft from the 6th Fleet was rather ostentatiously ordered to Tel Aviv, with the unexplained mission of exchanging air target information.

On Sunday in Tel Aviv, too, the border-crossing by the Syrian armor caused urgent orders to be issued for massive reinforcement of the Israeli armor on the Golan Heights. It was a breathless moment. And it could have been a lot more breathless if it had not been for the magnificent showing of the Jordanians, with their Centurion and M-28 tanks heavily outnumbered, at least initially, by the 300 Syrian T-52s.

One must add that the Jordanian tank commanders were vastly assisted by the miserable performance of their Syrian opposite numbers. In the tank battles between the Syrians and Jordanians, the Syrians lost no less than 139 T-52s, or close to half their force. But of these, only 70 were knocked out by the Jordanians. Bad maintenance, ill-conceived maneuvers and other noncombat causes immobilized the rest.

By Monday, Moscow must already have perceived that the green light to the Syrians was not producing the prompt and decisive results that had surely been hoped for. Perhaps this was the reason that on Monday, Moscow sent Washington a strikingly conciliatory reply to the grim U.S. note of Sunday. But the Israeli armored movement up to the Golan Heights continued, swiftly and remorselessly.

Background

OTTAWA — An awareness of the bitterness of the Canadian Jewish community to Dr. Al Forrest of the United Church Observer came to me during the 1968 York Centre election campaign in Toronto.

He and anything else not pro-Israel were challenges put to the candidates by the aggressive, alert and vocal electorate of the heavily-Jewish constituency.

The clergyman-editor had (and has continued) to decry the plight of the Palestinians dispossessed by the creation of Israel.

He's critical of the churches in the West for their lack of compassion and for their dile acceptance of the Israeli interpretation of their conflict with the Arabs.

To a degree publicly, but much more within the Protestant churches, the Forrest stand caused much argument and hesitation not least because of a fear that a general Protestant militancy of the Forrest brand would bring on the churches as a whole the terrible charge leveled at him of being anti-Semitic.

This is the main background explanation for the study tour of the Middle East sponsored by the Canadian Council of Churches.

I was one of the 19 participants who

have just returned from three weeks in Israel, Egypt, Syria, and Lebanon.

There were 13 Protestant clergymen from five denominations and eight other active laymen. The four embraced some 60 encounters — lectures, briefings and interviews — with government officials, military and commando leaders, and with Moslem, Jewish and Christian spokesmen.

The quality of many of the briefings was high, especially one at the Vatican in Rome, several in Beirut from teachers at the American University, and those given by Israeli officials in Jerusalem.

The study group has prepared a report to the Canadian Council of Churches which will speak, one might say, the conclusions of the whole group functioning as a committee.

It's my impression that the group agreed with the critical thesis advanced by Dr. Forrest: The Palestinians have been the forgotten crux of it all.

The group had many misgivings about the reaction this may draw from the Canadian Jewish community. Each member tended to prize the good relations existing between this community and their churches. They want to "keep the bridges," not destroy them.

My own responses to the Arab-Israeli dilemma paralleled that of the study group. The main distinction I discerned

was that my companions began the swing with more benevolent neutrality.

I was more strongly pro-Israeli, more captivated with Israel's achievements, and much less ready to allow for Arab flaws — especially the violent rhetoric and the bloodthirstiness toward the brave, new (relatively) Jewish state.

Such a substantial shift in judgment is never easy on any self-confidence in one's own reasonableness. Some of the metamorphosis was, admittedly, more emotional than rational.

The Palestinians were tense and excited by the hijacking of the four passenger jets. (As an aside, we met a large group of the released victims in Cyprus later and found without exception that they'd been impressed by the cause and the devotion given it by their Palestinian abductors.)

One refugee camp looks much like another, bleak, packed warrens of people, most of the older one's listless. The younger ones are not.

They are inspired by the fight for freedom and the training Al Fatah gives them in guerrilla warfare.

For example, on a dusty, stony hillside by a camp of thousands, a crude parade square had been grubbed and fenced with barbed wire. Boys and girls from 10 to 15 guarded the gates with sub-machine guns.

Drill instructors marched groups of uniformed kids around, all chanting slogans in step. A commando course with ropes, obstacles and ladders seemed as familiar to the kids as it was to our line soldiers in the last war.

You register the dedication when you see a tight-lipped girl of 10 and 11 snaking along a taut rope for 30 yards, eight feet above the stones.

Most of the young leaders spoke English. BAs and MAs seemed common. There's even a dotting of PhDs in the Al Fatah establishment.

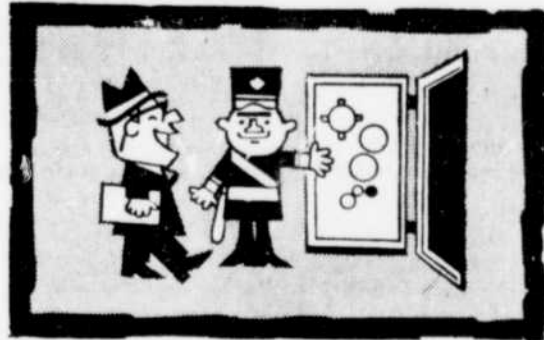

"What the public wants and what the situation demands is leadership in a national crisis."

He had encouraged democracy, welcomed opposition—provided it was not just a Communist front—and encouraged development of political parties. The political party system grew slowly, however, and not on of the 140 political movements in South Vietnam could have held the country together in the last five years.

Thieu said he has no fears of a coup and added that communism is "completely unacceptable to almost all of the South Vietnamese people."

He acknowledged that governmental corruption is rampant. But he said he has never tolerated it and is pledged to eliminate it, "both individually and radically." Its incidence would be reduced by a forthcoming economic program that would include pay increases for the military and civil service—to reduce the "temptation for corruption"—modernization of tax-collection techniques and other measures. Village and hamlet elections had "put power in the hands of the people and eliminated corruption where it had previously been worst, at the local level."

COMES WITH WAR

He emphasized that he believes that corruption exists in any country in wartime and often continues after hostilities end. He had noted it in France in 1949 and in South Korea in 1957.

He was asked about two of his closest associates, Dang Van Quang, advisor for security and pacification, and Gen. Cao Ban Vien, military chief of staff.

Quang had been removed from his former position as commander of Third Corps "on the basis of rumor only" and he now was in a position "where corrupt practices would be difficult even if he did wish to enter into them."

The only allegations concerning Vien had to do with allegedly lucrative business interests of his wife. "If she is violating the laws she will be prosecuted." Thieu said he agreed with such experts as Gen. William C. Westmoreland, former head of the U.S. forces in Vietnam, that North Vietnam was on the verge of a general collapse when the present Johnson partially halted bombing in April, 1968. He said he opposed the bombing halt or any other unconditional concession to the North, unless it led quickly to peace.

Although he said Johnson's halting of the bombing of the North was a mistake, he expressed gratitude and admiration for the former president. He said Johnson was "in large measure, the savior of the freedom of Vietnam."

He had some hard words for others.

FAVORS COMMUNISM

Secretary-General Thant had always "favored communism over nationalism in Vietnam and advocated unilateral allied concessions." His most recent call for a broadly-based coalition government in South Vietnam was "unjust, contrary to the principles of the UN, which oppose interference in the internal matters of states, and revealed him as an unsuitable occupant of his position."

De Gaulle was an "angry and uncharitable proponent of lost causes whose policies on Vietnam had been 'motivated by anti-Americanism.'"

Sihanouk was an "angry, desperate and hopeless man." Some of Thieu's critics in the U.S. Senate were "not constructive, ignorant and politically motivated" and incompetent to judge South Vietnamese developments because they had never visited the country. However, he was encouraged that the majority of Americans were aware of the progress that had been made.

Coverage by the foreign media in Vietnam varied from objective to incompetent and irresponsible but there had been great improvement during the last couple of years.

Thieu said that he was elected in 1967 on a platform of a just peace, implementation of democracy and improvement of social conditions.

"Like all politicians, I believe that I could win re-election, but whether I seek another term next year or not depends on the degree to which I feel I have succeeded in the enactment of that platform."

Nguyen Van Thieu gave the distinct impression that he felt he had succeeded rather well.

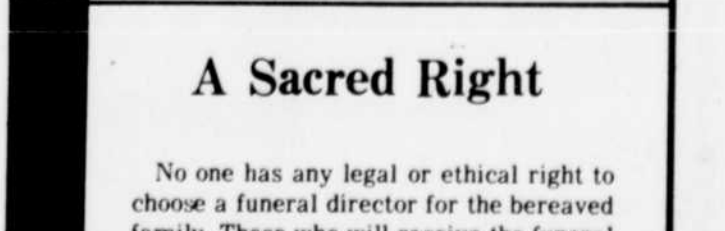

The twins in the Sign of Gemini represent Mr. Safe and Mr. Sorry in a common vacation disaster. Mr. Safe is jumping into the water to save his own life. Mr. Sorry has been smoking while re-fueling.

CANCER

The crab goes into its shell when disturbed. The crab in the Sign symbolizes home and security. The Sign is a reminder of family tragedy caused by careless use of the barbecue starter.

LEO

The lion in the Sign represents power. It is the task of those born under the Sign to guard against improper fusing and frayed wiring. In a household circuit, use only a 15 ampere fuse.

The maiden in the Sign of Virgo represents the baby sitter. She should know that matches and children are a sure fire combination. Matches must be kept out of the reach of tiny fingers.

Prevent Catastrophe

by following the rules set by the City of Magog Fire Chief. More than half of the fire and loss of life by fire are in the home. Nearly all could be prevented by practicing the following rules:

Fire Prevention Week

OCTOBER 4th — 10th



SMOKING — Never smoke in bed, in the barn, the clothes closet or the garage.
MATCHES — Do not let children play with matches. Keep matches in a safe place.
PUT OUT CIGARETTES AND MATCHES BEFORE THROWING AWAY. BE SURE THEY ARE EXTINGUISHED.

GARBAGE — Do not keep garbage and waste, especially in the cellar, barn or cupboard. Burn carefully. Never while it is windy. Burn in protected place or incinerator. Watch the fire and be sure it is completely extinguished.

ALL SHOULD BE CLEAN — Pipes and all heating equipment should be cleaned and checked at least once a year. Use a protective screen wherever necessary. Do not install pipes between ceilings, roof or partitions.

DO NOT OVERHEAT —

CHIMNEY COVERS — Use metallic covers. Do not wallpaper over. Do not stuff with rags.
ASHES — Only use metal containers. Do not dump ashes near places that may cause a fire.

GASOLINE - BENZINE - NAPHTHA — Do not use for lighting the fire, the explosion that may result can cause fatal burns and death.

ELECTRICITY — That all work be done by experts. Light cords should not be used as extensions or hung over nails.

ELECTRIC FUSES — Use only 15 amperes for ordinary circuits. Never use a penny to boost the fuses.

ELECTRIC IRONS — Always disconnect when not in use.

PORTABLE GAS STOVES — Protect the top with asbestos covering.

LAMPS, CANDLES, ETC. — Do not put close to curtains, or other inflammable materials.
DECORATIONS — Do not place inflammable decorations over light bulbs, flame or warming oven.

OILY DUST MOPS OR CLOTHS — Keep the mops in a closed metal box. Burn the cloths, they may cause spontaneous combustion.

REMEMBER — A careful person rarely has a fire; a neat and orderly place rarely burns.

ATTENTION: We ask that you cooperate by keeping stove and furnace pipes clean, and replacing any defective pipes. Chimney sweeping is now terminated.

623 die in fires

Snuffing out 623 lives, fire last year destroyed more than \$191,000,000 worth of property.

The human toll comprised 316 men, 126 women, and 181 children.

The number of child victims was the lowest in 20 years.

The \$191,000,000 property waste was the highest in history, an increase of at least \$25,000,000 over 1968. The loss excludes forest and government building fires.

The preliminary estimates of reported fires was 64,369. This compared with 64,657 in the previous year. These figures maintain the downward reduction over the past 10 years.

The annual assessment of fire destruction, by the Joint Fire Prevention Publicity Committee, Inc., is based on current reports by the provinces to the Dominion Fire Commissioner. The Committee is a joint enterprise sponsored by the Association of Canadian Fire Marshals.

The dangers of electricity

Electricity powers many of the necessities and conveniences in the modern home, but it can also cause trouble unless given a reasonable amount of attention and care, says director Charles Audet of the Sherbrooke Fire Department.

Failure of many householders to treat electricity properly is emphasized by National Fire

Protection Association figures which show that about one of every seven dwelling fires is caused by misuse of defective electrical wiring and equipment, says director Audet.

To see if there might be uncorrected electrical hazards in your home, try answering "yes" or "no" to these questions:

1. Is the right size fuse (15

amps for lighting circuits) in each socket in the fuse box? Do you use a new fuse — never a substitute — after each blow?

2. Do you use extension cords within safe limits of their capacities (500 watts for the most commonly used type)? If you must use an extension cord to feed an appliance drawing more power than this, is it of the heavy duty type?

3. Are extension and appliance cords replaced immediately at the first sign of frayed or cracked insulation? Do you make sure that cords are never run under rugs or hooked over nails?

4. Are electrical appliances checked periodically to make sure they are in good operating condition, and are they repaired or replaced at the first sign of trouble?

5. Is your television antenna installed where it cannot fall across power lines, and is it equipped with a properly grounded lightning arrestor?

If there are any "no" answers on your list, take corrective measures immediately, urges director Audet.



Be prepared

Behind almost every family tragedy in a dwelling fire is the fact they were totally unprepared for the emergency, says director Charles Audet of the Sherbrooke Fire Department.

"National Fire Protection Association studies show the great majority of the 6500 lives taken by home fires last year in Canada and the United States were needlessly lost because of failure to preplan and rehearse escape measures", the director points out.

"The first rule of safety from fire is escape: Get everybody out at the very first sign of fire. But unless you have done some thinking and planning, you may not be able to escape."

Prepare a home life safety plan for your family now, urges director Audet, then rehearse it to make sure that everyone, including children, knows exactly what to do.

Here are pointers to help you plan:

1. Carefully figure out at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms. Allow for blocking of stairways and halls by fire.

2. Make it the rule to sleep with bedroom doors closed, because closed bedroom doors will hold back flame and smoke, allow extra time for escape.

3. For upper floor escape, a window may be your only alternate route. Be sure exit windows work easily, and are low and large enough to get through. Use any available porch and garage roofs as ways down to safety. If needed, install ladder. Locate children in bedrooms with easy rooftop escape.

4. Pick an outside assembly point where the family will meet for "roll call", and be sure everyone understands that the house must not be re-entered for any purpose.

5. Know how to call the Fire Department, by Street Box or Phone, and do this as quickly as the house is clear of people.

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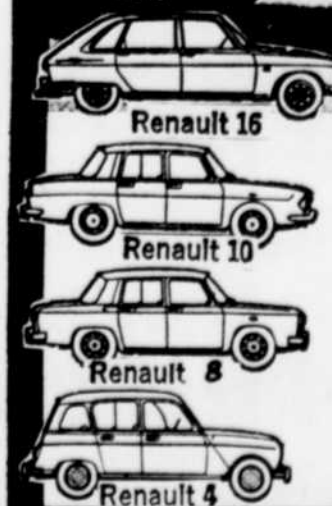

TO UNDERSTAND GOD CAN WIPE OUT DOUBT

LECTURER DECLARES

Faith raised to its highest power becomes a healing understanding of God's goodness, and wipes out doubt, a Christian Science lecturer told an audience in Westmount High School auditorium on Friday evening (September 25).

Faith is a power that is "inherent within each of us — like feeling or thinking, or loving our family and fellowman," said James E. Pike of Chicago, a member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship. His lecture was titled "Life Without Doubt," and was sponsored by the Christian Science church in Westmount.

Men must first understand God if they are to have faith in a supreme being, Mr. Pike said. If this faith is in turn to have good results in their lives, men must know God as good in its "highest and purest form, spiritual good."

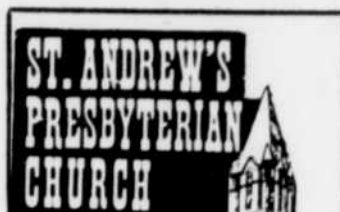
Faith based on God's practical goodness, Mr. Pike said, can take one's life further in useful achievement than anyone can outline.

One form of true faith is intelligence, Mr. Pike said. It leads men to abandon outmoded beliefs. But, he indicated, the cultivation of an intelligent faith often comes through trials that severely test one's vision of God's goodness.

The lecturer went on to tell of how he himself had been lifted out of a difficult situation. When a soldier he had crashed while driving a jeep in enemy territory. Through unlikely events he was returned to a field hospital, where he was told he had internal injuries and broken ribs. Yet in two days, Mr. Pike said, he was enabled through prayer to return to his unit in sound condition.

For several days prior to the accident, he told the audience, he had prayed long and deeply to erase any doubt that he was separate from God's goodness and subject to destruction. He had studied the Bible and the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy. Later, in his time of need after the accident, the practicality of his faith in God's goodness was seen, Mr. Pike said.

Varied Diet Over World Provides Health Clues

By LAWRENCE E. LAMB, M.D.



In many parts of the world it is usual for people in their 70s and 80s to be physically vigorous. They have little or no evidence of what we call atherosclerosis—the fatty deposits in the arteries that cause senility, heart disease and strokes.

During World War II, the islanders of Okinawa were studied and it was rare even for men of 80 to have atherosclerosis deposits in their arteries. The older islanders were physically vigorous, participating in all ways in the activities of the community.

Heart specialists think their diet and physical activity was the key. Habitually they ate a low-fat diet with lots of fish and little meat.

Early studies of the people of China also failed to show any significant evidence of fatty deposits in the arteries of the elderly.

Throughout much of Asia, the rice-eating people who did not have modern abundance were essentially free of the diseases of civilization—mostly related to atherosclerosis affecting the heart, brain, kidney and other parts of the body.

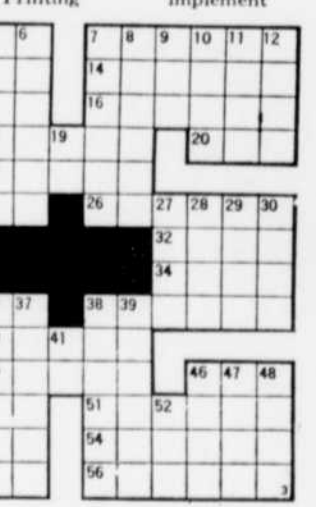
Similar observations were made in Africa. In autopsy studies of 6,500 Bantu not a single example of fatty deposits in the arteries of the heart was noted. Some of the best tribal dancers were vigorous in their 70s.

Hunting and fishing in the E.T.

By NORM NICHOLL

The trout season has officially closed in the Province. However, it might be noted that fishing is still being carried on in many of the lakes for the other species.

For many this is the best time of the year for taking pike, bass and dore. On the other hand, it leaves an opening for the taking of trout. I, like others, have noted many boats still fishing in what usually are considered to be trout areas. For instance, fishing out from the tributaries, along the shoals of the lake where the trout spawn.

The way the law is written there is little that can be done as to where or how regular fishing is carried out. There is no restriction on heavy trolling gear or on what part of a lake is fished. The only way that a conviction can be rendered is to find trout or other closed species in the fishermen's possession.

Previously, the season for all species closed on one date and remained closed until the ice fishing season opened. This caused many factions in the Province to petition for the season as it now is, since many felt they were being deprived of a few more weeks of fishing.

It would seem that it must now be decided whether we want to have such a season and an ambiguous law or whether we want to protect the spawning period.

FIREARMS IN A VEHICLE — It has always been that transporting a loaded firearm in a water vehicle was illegal. With the advent of the new law last June 15 the penalties for carrying loaded firearms in a vehicle during the day have been increased. The most important aspect of the section is that pertaining to night. It is not permitted to have firearms, loaded or unloaded, in a car at night. They must be kept in the trunk; if this is not possible they must be stored in a closed case.

The penalty for infractions range from \$100 to \$500 and up to a three month jail sentence.

The first report of moose hunting in the various parks show that the first hunters fared very well. Both the Laurentide and Matane areas reported that hunters were 100 per cent successful, while at the Kiskissink (a section of the Laurentide) hunters were 75 per cent successful.

First reports of geese flying south have begun to filter through the hunter grapevine. A flock settled down on Brompton Lake this week and another small flock was spotted in the Barnston area.

HUNTERS are reminded that it is prohibited to hunt within a one mile radius of Lennoxville. It would seem that some have found good hunting in the vicinity of Bishop's.

Leo Giroux of Sawyerville sent this item to us: Sportsman asks another: Aren't you deer hunting this fall like before?

Reply: "No. Too busy chasing the Darlings!"
