THE ANNEXATION QUESTION.—On Tuesday night a meeting of the annexation committee of the municipality of St. Saver took place, and Monday evening at the regular monthly meeting, the Council will discuss this most important question in its entirety.

DEATH OF AN OLD JOURNALIST.—We regret to learn of the sudden death in British Columbia of Mr. Henry McNeil Stuart, son of Sir Andrew Stuart, Chief Justice of the Superior Court. He died at the age of 70.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—On Saturday last two children, the sons of five years of age, belonging to Mr. L. Lester, of St. Rod's, were amusing themselves by splitting wood with a small axe. In so doing the youngest had the misfortune to have a finger cut off by the axe in the hand of his brother.

PLEASURE TRIP BY THE STEAMER "VEGA."—On and after Thursday, the 1st August, (weather permitting) the Vega (pre-arranged) will leave the Champlain wharf every Monday, Tuesday and Saturday at 2 o'clock p.m. for an excursion on the river, returning to the same wharf about 6 o'clock p.m.

MONTMORENCI AND CHARLEVOIX RAILWAY.—Men were at work yesterday engaged in transporting a locomotive and passenger cars from the Palais station to the line of the Montmorenci and Charlevoix Railway on the other side of the St. Charles. The first piggy-backing by the line to St. Anne will take place on the 7th instant, and will be composed of pilgrims coming from Lake St. John.

Tender for Water Tanks. SEALED TENDERS ADDRESSED TO THE UNDER-SIGNED, and marked on the outside "Tender for Tanks," will be received until SATURDAY, August 10th, for the construction and erection of 50,000 Gallon Water Tanks at the following places:—Head St. Pierre, St. Charles, Ste. Helene, Riviere du Loup, Capouane, Mill Stream, Eschard, Montcalm and Potholme.

Plans and specifications may be seen at the Mechanical Superintendent's Office, Montreal, P. E., and at the Office of the Station Master at the places where the tanks are to be erected, where forms of tender may be obtained. Each tender must be accompanied by a deposit equal to five per cent. of the amount of the tender.
