

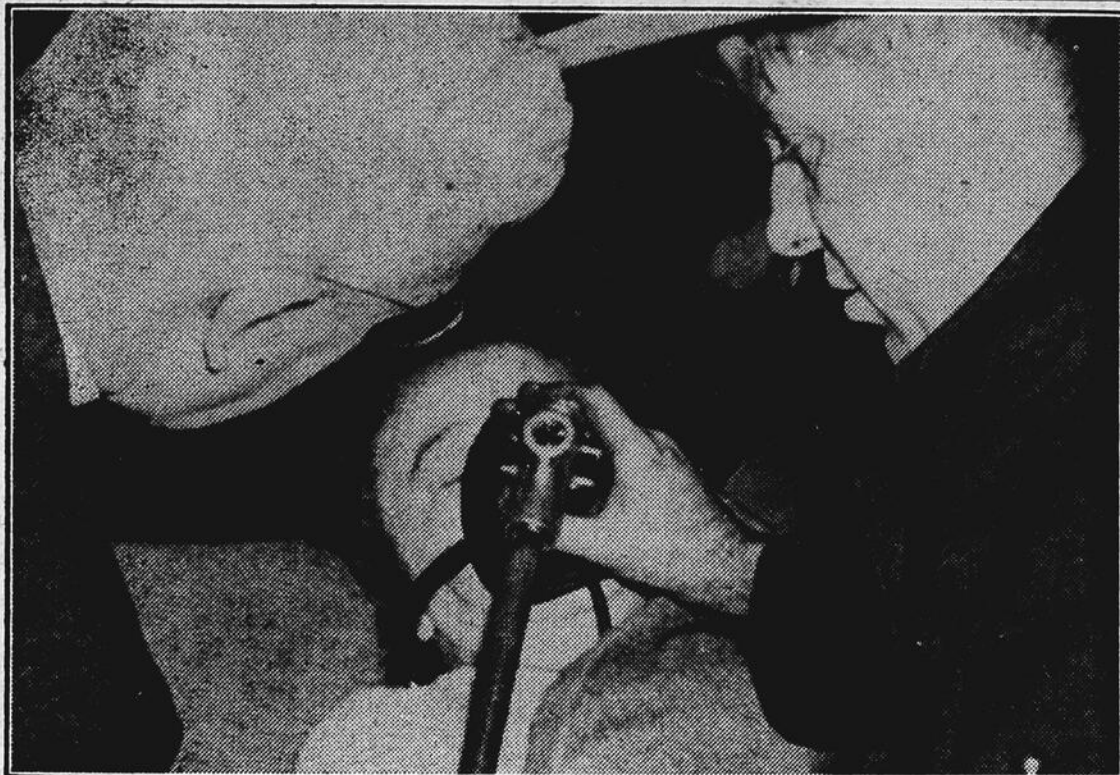

Kings H. & S. Assn. Plan Interesting Meeting Series

The Home and School Association of King's School, Westmount, has drawn up plans for a busy and interesting year.

The executive committee, under the chairmanship of Mrs. R. G. Reid, have held several meetings to date and the opening general meeting for all members will be held on Wednesday, October 25, at 8 p.m.

This first meeting of the year is arranged and run by Mr. Frank Sharpe, principal of the King's School, and the staff of the school and is designed to allow the parents of the students to become familiar with the school, the teachers and the activities of their children at the school. Later on in the season, an interesting programme has been arranged by the executive, including questions and answer periods with Mr. Savage and School Commissioners of the City of Westmount.

Perhaps the highlight of the year's activities will be the children's carnival to be held on the City of Westmount skating rink in February for the King's School students.

Chief, Three Firemen Hurt In Apartment House Blaze

Four members of the Westmount Fire Department were injured and a score of people rescued when a fire broke out in the Central Court Apartments, 250 Lansdowne avenue, Sunday.

The blaze started in Locker one of the locker room, but the heavy smoke forced a number of occupants from the apartments to call for help as the fire fighting apparatus came.

Under the direction of Director W. C. Cobb, who sustained a broken left rib during the height of the battle, seven people were rescued from the building. Mrs. D. Matthison, wife of the superintendent of the building, was taken

from her ground floor apartment and rushed to the Homoeopathic Hospital, where she was treated for shock and minor injuries.

Others rescued from the windows of their apartments were W. M. Baker, C. E. Knowles, Mrs. Knowles, Mrs. King, Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Hayes.

Also injured during the blaze were Lieut. Frank Billingham with a sprained right knee, fireman Dave Clarke who was rushed to the Homoeopathic Hospital where two stitches were placed in a deep cut on the middle finger of the right hand and Fireman J. M. Babeu, who was cut on the left index finger.

Dense smoke from the burning locker caused damages to apartments throughout the building, occupied by: G. T. Frayne, Mrs. H. McKenny, Mrs. Johnstone, J. Maddey, G. Kingsborough, W. M. Baker, J. Leibovitch, M. H. Callaghy, J. D. deWolf Reid, C. E. Knowles, E. J. Anderson, M. G. King, A. Williams and R. G. Hayes.

Chief Cobb was due to go on vacation on Monday but insisted on going along with Captain Durocher when the fire call came in at 3:30 p.m.

Air Cadets Seek Recruits Here

Sixth Annual Star Night Is Arranged by Society

On Wednesday, October 18, the Montreal Centre of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada, of which many members are residents of N.D.G. and Westmount, will present to the public its Sixth Annual Star Night. The event, sponsored by the City of Westmount, will be held as usual in Westmount Park. Approximately 20 telescopes, owned and operated by members of the Society, will be set up in the southeast section of the Park, at the corner of Western and Melville Avenues, just in front of the bandstand.

The purpose of Star Night is to give residents an opportunity to view the Moon and other celestial objects through a telescope. The Moon is the object most frequently demanded by the public. It will be at the first quarter phase, which is a most favorable time for observing it, with many of its "maria" and craters clearly visible.

Another object on the program is the planet Jupiter and its four major satellites: Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto. These satellites revolve about the planet just as our Moon revolves about the Earth and consequently they are sometimes hidden from our view.

Early on Wednesday evening all four satellites will be visible, but at 9:40 p.m., any spectators fortunate enough to be at the eyepiece of a telescope will see Europa disappear behind the planet. The Pleiades, a cluster of stars more familiarly known as "The Seven Sisters," is another object on the program. Although only six stars are visible to the unaided eye, more than a 100 can be seen through a moderate size telescope.

The Double Cluster in Perseus is another beautiful object that will be viewed on Wednesday evening. It is considered by many the loveliest star cluster in the heavens. Mizar and Alcor, double stars in the constellation of the big Dipper, and Albireo, a double star in the constellation of the Swan, complete the observation program.

In addition to the telescopic observations, there will be a program of moving pictures and slides. Two astronomical films, "The Milky Way" and "The

Fire Department Has Busy Weekend

Captain Durocher of the Westmount Fire Department told The Examiner that the twenty-four hours Sunday to Monday morning was a very busy time for the fire department. In addition to the Lansdowne apartment and the Brooke avenue fires there were three leaf fires two of them being in Westmount Park.

Captain Durocher says that leaving a pile of leaves is not good as boys have a habit of setting a match to the dry leaves which in some cases are close to buildings and a major conflagration could easily be caused as a result.

The captain also volunteered the information that over 7,000 copies of the list of fire hazards published in last week's Examiner had been mailed to Westmount householders. It is hoped by the Fire Department that citizens will co-operate by following the suggestions offered to reduce fire hazards.

Westm't To Have New Tel. Exchange Early Next Month

Some Westmount telephone subscribers will soon have a new telephone exchange. Glenview, the 34th local exchange will be opened early next month to bring phone service to more than 1,200 waiting applicants in the west end.

The new Bell exchange will serve subscribers in some sections of Westmount, St. Henri and Point St. Charles according to an announcement by G. H. Lowndes, the company's manager.

The dial equipment in the new central office will be located in the Wilbank dial centre on Atwater avenue and will go into operation early on the morning of November 13.

Hundreds of additional telephones will be connected in the area before the end of the year as outside wires and cables, necessary to connect subscribers' telephones to the equipment in the dial centre, are strung along pole lines and placed underground in the south-western section of Montreal and adjoining sections of Westmount.

In addition about 500 subscribers now serviced by the York manual office will be transferred to the new Glenview exchange, and will receive dial service at the beginning of December.

In preparation for the inauguration of the Glenview exchange several hundred telephones bearing the letters GL before the numbers on the dial have already been installed in the applicants' homes. The work will continue until the capacity of the exchange is reached. All waiting applicants who will receive service from the new exchange are being notified, Mr. Lowndes said.

"Moon," will be shown, with commentary by F. DeKinder, and a series of slides of celestial objects, with commentary by J. W. Duffie. Another feature is a "Question and Answer" period, when the questions most frequently asked by the spectators will be answered by Henry F. Hall, secretary of the Montreal Centre and Dean of Sir George Williams College.

Made Equipment

Many of the telescopes in use on Star Night were designed and made by the members themselves. Two or three will be making their first public appearance, having been finished just in time for this event. The telescopes are of two main types — refractor and reflector — but each has its own special features and will be well worth the spectators' attention.

The event will be opened officially at 8 p.m., with J. W. Duffie, president of the Montreal Centre, as master of ceremonies.

If weather conditions should prove unpromising on Wednesday, Star Night will be postponed until Thursday evening. Announcement to this effect will be made over radio stations CFCF and CJAD between 6 p.m. and 7 p.m.

Admission to Star Night is free and everyone is welcome.

Mayor Cameron, Aldermen Inspect Reddy Hospital

Mayor J. S. Cameron, of Westmount, together with Alderman R. Panet-Raymond and Alderman W. A. Kennedy, were taken on a tour of inspection of the Herbert Reddy Memorial Hospital, Tupper Street, Westmount, on Wednesday.

Also present were members of the hospital's board of trustees and special guests.

Greeting Mayor Cameron and his two aldermen on arrival were Col. Wilfrid Bovey, O.B.E., M.L.C., president of the hospital; H. M. Browne, superintendent, and several members of the board of trustees.

Alterations and improvements in four departments of the hospital were shown to the visitors. The four departments in which especial interest was evinced were — Home Care Office, Outdoor Clinic, Pharmacy and Nursery. The latter is unique in hospital departments in Canada. Established through funds under the Federal-Provincial health plan, the nursery provides a special bassinette in a separately-enclosed glass cubicle for each child. The bassinette is equipped with facilities for diaper-changing and other nursing attention and is designed to protect the infants from all possible sources of infection.

Only when medical examinations are necessary will the tots be removed from their partitioned chambers. The design includes location of examination rooms adjoining the nursery.

This system of caring for newly-born babies, with children of public and private wards enjoying exactly the same privacy, has been employed with success in a number of hospitals in the United States.

The remodelling project included the replanning of all floor space to provide additional space for maternity beds. The maternity section has accommodation for 37 babies and 34 mothers.

The Home Care Office, a new idea in hospitalization and the first of its kind to be established in Canada, is an experiment under the direct aegis of the federal government, Col. Bovey said.

He further added that the re-conditioned pharmaceutical department was in charge of the hospital's pharmacist A. J. Adams. Also present at the inspection

were Dr. E. E. Robbins, chairman of the hospital's medical board; Dr. M. B. Donaldson, medical officer of health for the City of Westmount, and Miss Helen G. Hewton, director of nursing for the hospital.

Mayor Cameron and the official Westmount party expressed themselves as being very impressed with what they had been shown, and congratulated Col. Bovey on the very advanced strides in hospitalization, which had been taken by the Herbert Reddy Hospital. It was a source of great gratification that a Westmount Hospital should lead the way in this new field he said.

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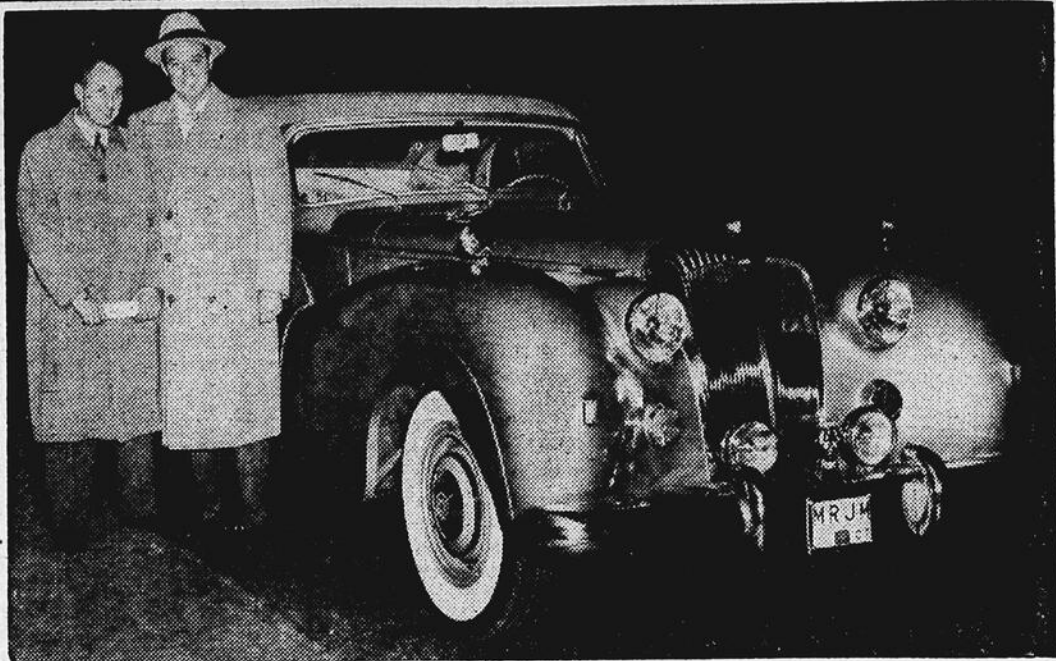

So-Ed Plans at Local "Y" Show Rapid Growth of Club

So-Ed is coming to Westmount again. This was the word received from W. H. Hopper, Chairman of the Westmount Y.M.C.A. fall So-Ed Committee. Hopper announced the dates of the program to be from October 20 to December 8, and it is to be held in the Westmount Y.M.C.A. every Friday night during that time.

So-Ed is rapidly achieving the place in Westmount it has in other cities across the continent, that of a most important phase of social and educational learning in the community. The name and the idea sprung from the Canadian Y.M.C.A. less than a decade ago, and since that time it has grown tremendously with hundreds of programs being conducted annually, and a national committee to co-ordinate its activities. It is basically a program to meet the needs

and interests of young adults both socially and educationally.

The Westmount "Y" So-Ed will follow the general pattern of dividing each evening into three parts, the first involved in learning a skill or interest of your own choosing, the second part is spent with a variety of speakers on various interesting topics, and the final part of each evening is a social get-together of dancing, games, and refreshments.

Registration for the Fall So-Ed is to take place at the "Y", 4585 Sherbrooke St., West, on October 20, at 8.15 p.m. Following registration, the first session of activities is slated to begin with a choice of instruction in the following interest groups: Bridge, Ballroom Dancing, Badminton, Effective Speaking, and Swimming; a social and refreshment period will round out the evening. The following Friday night will see the interest groups first on the bill and the start of the lecture series immediately after. The topics and speakers will be announced later, but Hopper stated that the subjects would be covered by outstanding speakers in their field.

It was pointed out that enrolment in most of the groups is limited so that early registration on October 20 is advised. The Committee responsible for the entire undertaking is as follows: Chairman, Bill Hopper Past-Chairman, Don Ferguson; Vice-Chairman and Treasurer, Jim Kennedy; Secretary, Mary Jeanne Saunders; Activities, Inglis Edwards; Social, Mary Lochart and Pat Fisher.

Residents Warned Against Bogus Magazine Sellers

Westmounters and other local residents are warned by Detective Lieutenant Felix Prysky of the Montreal Fraud Squad to beware of a high pressure group of fake magazine salesmen who have developed a racket which it is claimed has netted them "thousands of dollars" within the past few weeks.

The salesmen, Lieut. Prysky said, refuse to accept cash payments for the fake subscriptions on the pretext that their boss demands payment from them in cheques.

But the cheque when issued speedily undergoes a face-lifting, the amount on the cheque being raised in some instances from \$2 to as much as \$950.

Police are on the trail of the fake salesmen but in the meantime potential victims are warned to check and double check before parting with cheques to unknown canvassers.

Fire Damages Six Apartments

Six apartments were damaged by smoke and water, and one fireman was hurt, when a blaze broke out in the stairwell at the rear of 41 Brooke avenue at 4:30 a.m. Monday.

Fireman Leo Fitzgerald was rushed to the Western Division of the Montreal General Hospital where he was treated for a deep cut on the ball of the right foot, before returning to the scene of the blaze.

The fire was finally checked in the rear wall of the kitchen at 45 Brooke avenue, an upstairs apartment with two streams being required to battle the blaze.

Fire and water damage was reported in the homes of P. Mollett, Mrs. E. Kercher and W. Alloy of 41, 43 and 45 Brooke avenue respectively, while smoke damage was also reported from A. Sugars, D. Slaney and P. Cieply, of 47, 49 and 51 Brooke avenue respectively.

"Receive as well as Give" Minister Tells Rotarians

"Jesus knew how to receive as well as give," Rev. Charles F. Johnston, M.A., Th.D., Assistant Minister of the Dominion Douglas United Church, Westmount, told members of the Westmount Rotary Club at its luncheon meeting, Wednesday.

Speaking in connection with "Thanksgiving" Dr. Johnston, a native of Westmount, said that man does not admit a weakness when asking for help.

"God has made us into a society where we are interlocked and the idea of giving and receiving is a bond that unites us in this society," Rev. Johnston said.

Introduced by Ewart Everson, the speaker outlined three important principles to remember at Thanksgiving time. He pointed out that it was extremely difficult to deal with the individuals whose monumental egotism makes them feel that people do things for them and that they need not give thanks.

He also said that another reason for our lack of appreciation lies in the fact that man is careless and that he should realize he is receiving services on all sides from all kinds of people all of the time. Claiming that people should give thanks throughout the entire year, he said that the key was "constant thought, rather than thoughtlessness."

The speaker also maintained that it was a mistake to think that one can get along without any help from his fellow neighbours.

"Because of the ideal that the self-made man is the best, we have a tendency to believe in these people, and while it is a commendable trait in some respects, it is

wrong to carry it to an extreme," he said.

He claimed that people must face frankly and gladly the needs of themselves and others, maintaining that all belong to one great human family together with the Lord.

The speaker was thanked by Bill Abbott. Frank Kenwood presided.

No Fall Flower Show in Westm't; Reason Economy

The Examiner is informed that there will be no fall flower exhibition in the Westmount Conservatories this year.

Usually the fall flower show has been staged early in November and has attracted large crowds of residents to view the fine display of fall flowers.

It is understood that the cancellation of the exhibition is due to criticism of the expense involved.

Over 150 Boy Scout and Wolf Cub Leaders attended the 15th annual provincial Scouters' Conference held at North Hatley, Que., over the week end. Chief speaker was Major-General F. F. Worthington, C.B., M.C., director of civil defence in Canada, who outlined future plans on national, provincial and municipal levels and described the various jobs Scouts could perform. 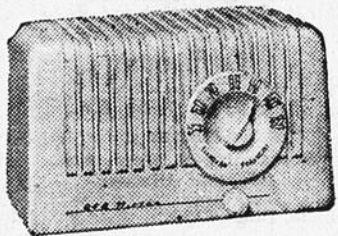
Various Craft Classes To Begin In Westmount

Information about Travel Funds

New regulations covering travel funds were announced by the Minister of Finance on Wednesday, October 4th.

The main point to remember is that Canadian residents require Form H Permit to take out of Canada more than \$50 U.S. or more than \$100 of Canadian and U.S. currencies combined. Form H Permits will continue to be available at banks.

The regulation covering the use of Form H for the export of currency is a safeguard against the export of capital sums where such export would not be permitted through other channels.

Authority has been given to banks and other agents of the Foreign Exchange Control Board to approve applications for U.S. travel funds without reference to the Board for amounts up to:

1. \$500 per trip for bona fide business travel.
2. \$500 per person in the calendar year for other travel.
3. \$2,000 Canadian per year, or its equivalent, for attendance during a full academic year at a university, college or boarding school in the United States.

Applications in excess of these amounts may be referred to the Board and will be approved for reasonable amounts, having regard to the duration of the proposed journeys.

Border Travel:—Individuals may obtain up to \$50 U.S. in any calendar month for use on a trip to the United States where the applicant will not be taking out of Canada more than a total of \$100, of which not more than \$50 is in U.S. funds.

LABOUR MINISTER'S PROBLEM

To Administer Department In Interests Of Whole Country

It is unfortunate that one of the most important departments of government was ever named the Department of Labour. The name has encouraged the belief that the first duty of the department and its minister is to represent the trade unions, and lend government support to all their demands, writes E. J. Young, former M.P., and one-time Director of the C.N.R.

This belief has grown and spread to such

an extent that the unions have assumed they have the right to select the minister and all his lieutenants, and to demand the removal of all those who don't play the game their way. They demand the right to remove even the minister himself.

This attitude is a menace to democratic government, for democracy could never survive if it allowed itself to be dominated by any one group or class of its citizens.

The first duty of a minister of the crown is to serve the interests of the whole country. The first duty of a minister of labour is to administer his department in the same interests.

War and the legislation of recent years have so strengthened the trade unions that, at times, they are tempted to pursue their own policies without regard for the effect such policies will have on the rest of the population.

It will be the task of the new Minister of Labour to restrain this exuberance and persuade the unions that power is most satisfying and most secure when used in moderation and with due regard for the rights of others.

This will be a different and delicate task; but the new minister, Hon. Milton Gregg, has both the character and the ability to accomplish it.

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N.D.G. Club Hears Dr. Wilson On Development of Psychology

Mrs. K. E. Norris, president of the Notre Dame de Grace Women's Club, presided at the club's opening meeting on Friday at 3 p.m. Guest speaker was Dr. Douglas J. Wilson who addressed the gathering on "Leaves from a Psychologist's Notebook". As a student and professor of psychology for 25 years, Dr. Wilson traced its development on this continent from its "upstart" beginnings through swerves to various extreme theories to its present accepted place with other practical and widely employed sciences.

He expressed his good fortune at being in the rare position to "stand off" a bit from any one field of the work and enjoy a broader

view of the studies and conclusions. He recalled how forgetfulness of the fact that man is neither merely animal or all mind rather than a whole unit led to a school of thought which decided that "we were just creatures of changes in environment." This has been greatly modified as has the blunt admonition developed in the 30's: Do not inhibit the child. This too radical outlook produced not only neurotic children but neurotic parents. It was considered at that time unforgivable to kiss the child goodnight, whereas it has now been found to be "the best thing in the world."

Dr. Wilson closed by saying

that "psychologists cannot tell you how to live or rear your children," but in every human being there are hidden attributes, and we may learn how to release them.

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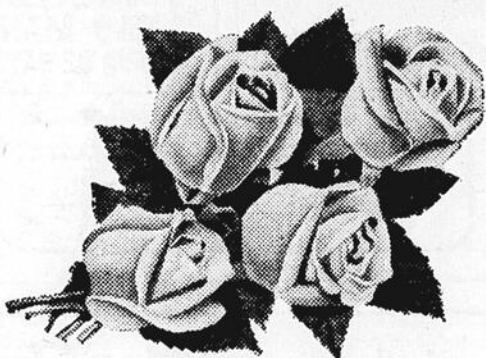
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Seniors Beat Lakeshore 7-5 Play at Three Rivers Sunday

Unity Boys' Club News

A refresher . . . Do any of you remember Friday, June 16, and Saturday, June 17, 1944? If you lived around Dorchester Street near or below Greene Avenue you would, for on those two evenings boys from the ages of 8 to 16 years old — some younger and some older — flocked into the side door of Calvary Church to register with a boys club, which was being organized, equipped and financed by the Rotary Club of Westmount. Thus the founding of the Unity Boys Club. The response put the onus on the Westmount Rotarians. Today the Unity Boys Club is a major project of Westmount Rotary and such has been their success with the boys club that it has become a Red Feather Service under their sponsorship.

From temporary quarters in Calvary Church came support in the way of accommodation for the ever growing club from the Westmount Board of School Commissioners with permission to use Queens School for handicraft classes and gymnasium activities, from the Westmount YMCA and from the Westmount City Council with facilities in adjacent playgrounds for outdoor sports. In a few years the Rotary Club of Westmount raised \$175,000.00 to build and equip one of the most modern boys clubs in America. The Westmount City Council donated a plot of ground on Greene Avenue just below Dorchester Street north of the CPR tracks, with fatherly pride.

Early last October the first sod was turned. Last November the corner stone was laid. On the first of September this year the clubhouse was complete, encompassing one of the most modern gyms, club rooms for boys and girls, handicraft workshops, electrically equipped workshops for hobbyists, library, offices, snack-bar, showers for boys and for girls and meeting rooms for interclub gatherings.

By now Allenby Moss is well known to the boys and girls of this Westmount district. His quiet efficient manner and genial personality have won their loyalty and hearts. 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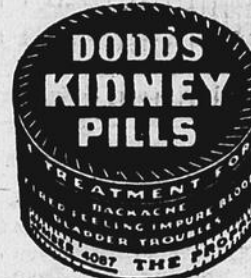
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
