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SIR ED. CARSON OUTLINES THE DUTY OF NEUTRALS

EX-ATTORNEY GENERAL SPEAKS ON INTERNATIONAL — PRAISES WHITLOCK AND GIBSON, AMERICAN MINISTERS.

London, Nov. 26.—s. 15 p.m.—Speaking as the guest of honor at the American Luncheon Club today, Sir Edward Carson, former Attorney-General, discussed the "duty of neutrals."

Sir Edward expressed the fear that international law had been greatly encroached upon, by the impotence of the neutrals themselves. Sir Edward said:

"I am proud to be an Irishman, but at the same time I am not a hyphenated Britisher."

Discussing neutrality, Sir Edward said: "America is the greatest neutral of the present moment. When I mention America as the greatest neutral naturally I turn to the conduct of neutrals in relation to the mitigation of the horrors of war. And nothing fills me more with dismay when I think of the outcome of the horrible period through which we are passing than the fact—I am not blaming anybody, but it is a fact—that international law, the product of all the peace instincts of all nations with a view to preventing interruption to civilization, even in time of hostilities, had, I fear, been entirely abolished, or at any rate greatly encroached upon by the impotence of the neutrals themselves."

Sir Edward then explained that conventions adopted in times of peace could only be upheld by neutrals.

"Abolish the power of countries not at war and you abolish international law itself," the speaker said. "This war from the start has shown the ineptitude and powerlessness of neutrals."

He showed the invasion of Belgium showed the futility of guarantees, although they were supported by the great powers of Europe, and added:

"The necessity for maintenance, the sustaining and supporting of international law and international jurisprudence becomes more vivid—is more brought home to us—when we remember that a breach of international law, necessarily in the rules of war, leads to reprisals—and reprisals know no limit. Therefore, the first breach leads on in the downward path almost to its abrogation."

"Just as you may delude or mystify or lull into a sense of security our own citizens by speeches and orations—you will not thereby win a war—so in the international sphere you may by diplomatic notes, numerous and strong, satisfy the consciences of your citizens, but you will not by a mere note maintain the obligations put upon you as parties to international law, which is to prevent of civilization and to mitigate the horrors of war."

BRITISH DRIVE HE TURKS BACK

ADVANCE IN MESOPOTAMIA
CONTINUES — PRAISE FOR
GENERAL TOWNSHEND.

London, Nov. 26, 8:04 p.m.—Turkish troops resisting the British advance in Mesopotamia are falling back, according to an official announcement tonight, reporting a Turkish retirement on Diah, ten miles from Bagdad.

The announcement says: "A telegram from Sir John Eccles forces in Mesopotamia, under date of the 25th, reports that General Townshend's troops were in possession of the battlefield, while the Turks were reported to be retiring on Diah, ten miles above Ctesiphon and the same distance from Bagdad. General Townshend was engaged in clearing the field of wounded and prisoners."

"At first it was stated that 800 prisoners had been taken. It now appears that no less than 1,300 have been marched back to Lajj."

"Our wounded are reported to number about 2,500, of whom 1,800 were leaving that day for Basra. The number of killed has not yet been reported."

"General Nixon praises the excellent handling of the troops by General Townshend and the splendid spirit shown by them after their severe losses and hardships from want of water and food."

for the future, since if international law proved futile in this conflict no faith could be put in future conventions. There could only be one safeguard for peace—increased armaments and the maintenance of greater armies than in the past, he said.

Referring to the United States, he praised "the brave and human efforts made by Brand Whitlock, Minister to Belgium, and Hugh Gibson," in the case of Edith Cavell, the English nurse executed in Belgium.

"We are grateful to them. America ought to be proud of them, as I am sure she is."

Sir Edward concluded with the expression of the hope that the United States and Great Britain would be drawn closer together in the interests of civilization and humanity.

FRENCH WAR MINISTER'S NEW REGULATION.

Paris, Nov. 26, 7:10 p.m.—The latest order issued by Minister of War Gallieni, prohibiting families of soldiers writing direct to the officers of regiments at the front for news regarding the soldier's fate, has resulted in a letter of protest from Cruesse Connevet, a member of the Chamber of Deputies.

HEAVY SUBSCRIPTION TO THE WAR LOAN.

Toronto, November 25th.—Interest in the Canadian War Loan continues at fever heat. At all the branches of the several banks and the various financial houses handling the issue, large numbers of subscribers besieged the offices throughout the day. "The most tender for the loan, the largest single subscription recorded is that of the Canada Life Assurance Company which has tendered for \$1,500,000 of the loan."

BULGARIAN AND GERMAN FORCES TRANSFER THEIR ATTENTIONS TO THE ANGLO-FRENCH TROOPS

Important Military Developments May Be Looked For On The River Vardar—Enemy Abandon Advance On Monastir—Big Russian Army Is Massed On Bulgarian Frontier — Varner Is Likely To Be Attacked

London, Nov. 26.—The Serbian army having been driven back to the borders of Albania and Montenegro where they are being attacked by the Austro-Germans, the Bulgarians with the assistance of General Gallwitz's forces are now giving their attention to the Anglo-French troops. Important military developments may therefore be looked for on the Vardar river. The Bulgars appear to have abandoned definitely, for the time being, their advance on Monastir in order to attack the French positions on the Cerna where fighting already has been reported. So far the French have held their positions, but despatches from Saloniki hint that it may be necessary to withdraw from Krivolak to the south-east where British and French reinforcements are being concentrated. While the results of these movements are being watched with some anxiety better news from the Allies' point of view comes from the northern frontier of Bulgaria where a big Russian army is massing.

It is reported that General Alexei Kuropatkin is to command this Russian army of invasion, which will either be sent up the Danube or allowed passage through Rumania, to attack Varna from the land side. Other Russian forces are being organized at Odessa and Sebastopol and will doubtless be sent either to the Bulgarian or Turkish coast.

It is reported from Switzerland that the Austro-Germans are sending reinforcements into the Balkans to meet this new Russian offensive, but other sources state that these reinforcements are en route to the western front because of the fact that the Balkan campaign is having a direct effect on all fronts.

In Galicia the Austria-Germans are attacking in the hope of compelling the Russians to divert a part of the Bessarabian army thence. While the Austrians, opposing the Italian offensive on the Isonzo, are unable to get assistance, they are counter-attacking with terrific fury and have thus far prevented the Italians from capturing Gorizia, which has been hard pressed for nearly a week.

Late reports from Mesopotamia show that the British hold the battlefield of Ctesiphon and that the Turks are retiring to Diah, within ten miles of Bagdad. Prisoners taken by the British have been increased to 1,300 while the British wounded alone number 2,500. Troops engaged in this region are undergoing hardships unknown in other campaigns, there being a shortage of both food and water.

The Turks are showing more activity in the Gallipoli where, with new supplies of ammunition, they made an attack on the Allies' positions without making any gains.

Athens, Nov. 26, via London, Nov. 27, 1:52 a.m.—It is understood that the Greek reply to the note of the Entente powers agrees to a partial demobilization with a view to relieving the strain on the country's finances, and that it also undertakes to withdraw Greek troops from Saloniki and distribute them to other points on the frontier.

Some of the government papers assert that the cabinet has discussed the question of instituting judicial proceedings against E. Venizelos, the former Premier, because of his recent manifesto urging his followers to abstain from taking part in the coming elections.

Denys Cochin, the French cabinet minister, who has been the recipient of public ovations and honors while in Greece, left for Italy today aboard the Greek cruiser Helle.

SIGNS IN FRENCH ON STREET CARS

ALD. FISET BRINGS UP MATTER
AT CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

A complaint was made by Ald. Fiset at the meeting of the City Council last night that the signs on the street cars were only in English.

He accordingly made a motion that instructions be given to the City Engineer to ascertain if the inscriptions on street cars are in both languages and if not, that they be in conformity with the law.

Ald. Fiset explained that people from the country, who had no knowledge of English, were often at a loss to comprehend the English inscriptions.

A NOBLE MESSAGE FROM SIR WILFRID

PARTY CONSIDERATIONS
MUST BE SUBORDINATED
TO COUNTRY THESE DAYS.

Toronto, Nov. 26.—Representatives from practically every country in the province attended the eleventh annual meeting of the General Reform Association of Ontario held today. These included many members of the House of Commons and the legislature. The keynote of the addresses delivered was the need of subordinating party politics to the duties entailed on the country through her participation in the war. Hon. George P. Graham delivered a message from Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The leader of the Federal Opposition strongly urged Liberals, young and old, to concern themselves wholly for the time being with the task of achieving victories for the Imperial arms, rather than with the political problem of winning party victories at the polls. In his address Mr. Graham urged that the Liberal party continue its investigations before the Public Accounts Committee to check irregularities and worse with which it appeared the government was unable to cope unassisted. This he declared was a patriotic duty incumbent on members on both sides of the House.

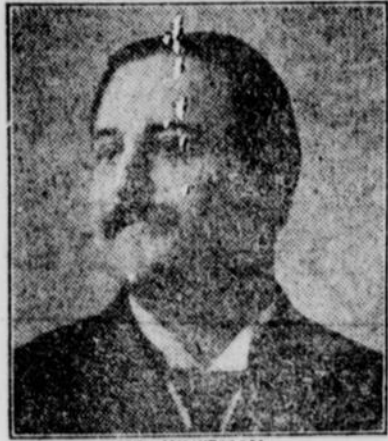

NEW ART OF MUSICAL SPECTACLE SHOWN IN THE "BIRTH OF A NATION."

David W. Griffith's Great Drama Illustrates Salient Events of the American Civil War, Which Came to a Close at Appomattox—"The Goddess." Tonight

"The Birth of a Nation," bringing forward David W. Griffith's new art of musical spectacle, with two performances (matinee and evening) daily opens an engagement of one week at the Auditorium Monday. The first half of the great picture exhibits the salient events of the American Civil War, which came to a close at Appomattox just fifty years ago. Lincoln's call for troops, Sherman's march, the Battle of Petersburg, Lee's surrender to Grant and the awful tragedy at Ford's theatre live before the spectator of the Griffith's drama. In the second half the South's "second uprising" this time against the carpet-bagging regime, is shot in a thrilling story of Reconstruction days. The romance of the "Little Confederate Colonel" Ben Cameron, with the Northern Elsie Stoneman, and that of the Unionist Captain, Phil Stoneman with Margaret Cameron, the South Carolina lassie, maintain two threads of continuous love-interest throughout the story. The fun and frolic of plantation days, as well as the heart-ache and pathos of the stricken South, are shown.

The great Out-of-Doors is Mr. Griffith's special field. Great battle scenes and the rides of the clan are staged with thousands of participants. There are 5,000 scenes in the spectacle and (it is estimated) no less than 200,000 interesting historical details. On the musical side Mr. Griffith attempted something previously unheard of in connection with motion pictures. This was the synchronizing of a complete symphonic score with the appearance of the important characters and the enactment of the principal scenes. This instrumental music is played by a large orchestra, and supplemented by part-singing behind the scenes. Somehow the old war-time tunes, thus thematically treated, make the "counterfeit presentments" of long ago seem irresistibly real. Among the leading players in what was probably the largest theatrical cast ever assembled may be mentioned Joseph Henabery as President Lincoln; Donald Crisp and Howard Gaye as Generals Grant and Lee; Effie Marsh as Flora Cameron; Henry Halthall, Lillian Gish, Elmer Clifton and Miriam Cooper as the quartet of lovers; Ralph Lewis as Congressman Stoneman; Spottiswoode Aiken and Josephine Crowell as the elder Camerons, and Walter Seigman as Lynch.

The prices are 25, 50, 75c, and \$1.00 at evening performances; 25, 50 and 75c or matinees. The 12th chapter of "The Goddess" is on the bill tonight.

Marlborough refused to be bled. According to Isaac Disraeli, the duke, "aware that if he gave any order or suggested any alteration he might be involved in the expense of the building, was never to be circumvented—never to be surprised into a spontaneous emotion of pleasure or disapprobation. Although friendly with Vanbrugh, he never spoke to him or to any one acting under his orders about Blenheim."—London Globe.

DALY'S IMPECUNIOUS EMPLOYEE.

Augustin Daly had in his employment a man who always addressed him a note periodically asking for an advance of money. 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OPERATIONS OF FIFTH BRIGADE IN TRENCHES

CONSTANT SUCCESSION OF RAINY WEATHER—THE WATER THREE FEET DEEP IN LINES — SPIRIT OF THE MEN IS GOOD.

From about the middle of October up to the present date, 3rd November, there has been almost a constant condition of rainy weather. The first part of this period was more or less the same as that which was experienced last year by the 1st Division, just about the same time. While there were certain short periods of cessation in the rain, these were immediately taken advantage of by working parties. Day after day from 1000 to 1100 men were kept employed throughout the lines, in building trenches, strengthening positions, retrenching the works and making all preparations for the winter's occupation of the lines. This work has been proceeding very satisfactorily indeed within the area of the 5th Brigade. Several new communication trenches had been completed and support lines built from one to the other, a matter which had been sadly neglected by the Regiments who had occupied the trenches prior to their being taken over by the Canadian Division.

The terrific rains however, of the past week have fairly undermined the foundations of the earth works, parapets and barbed wire, with the result that practically the whole amount of work that had been done has been absolutely destroyed, and even worse, as the banks of communication trenches have all caved in, the parapets of the trenches have toppled over, the dug-outs of the men have collapsed and in the trenches themselves there is the most serious condition of an accumulation of mud and water. In many places in the lines the water is over three feet deep, while there is on an average two feet throughout. The little creeks that intersect the lines, from one end to the other have become swollen torrents, overflowing their banks everywhere, and with little hope of subsiding, as the ground appears to be so thoroughly saturated as to prevent the proper absorption of the water. It is to be noted, of course, that this fearful condition exists, not only in our own lines but in the lines of the Germans as well. Our friends the enemy, have been busily occupied in pumping the water from their lines and in attempting in some way also, to save their positions opposite us. To such an alarming extent has the position been endangered on both sides, that it seems to be an understood arrangement that, to ameliorate the conditions, exposure has been absolutely necessary, and while this exposure has been carried on, as little as possible of course, this unwritten understanding of no attempt to shoot on either side seems prevalent, while this necessary exposure work is in a state of prosecution.

No one can have any idea of the conditions that exist unless they were to see them for themselves. The trenches are nothing but a maze of mud and slush, in some places over the men's heads. There are no such things as dug-outs in places for the men to sleep or rest. Consequently it could not be possibly understood other than by those in the trenches themselves. Everywhere, however, the men are smiling and cheerful. There is never the faintest murmur of a grumble of whimper. Officers and men accepting the inevitable and all buckling in with a vigor and energy that speaks volumes for itself.

One instance alone should be recorded of the spirit of the men. The 25th Battalion had been in the trenches through all this period, and the worst six days of all. They were due to come out tonight. One company, consisting of four officers and about 200 men volunteered to remain over for another six days with the Battalion that was coming in, for the purpose of assisting in some way to put their trenches in better condition for the remainder of the Battle. Just pause to consider what this means to these men. They had been working in this sea of mud and water for six days, not a dry ditch on them, very little rest, continual rain and the only food was such as could be secured at odd moments, and then the usual "hippy beef and cold hard tack" and at the end of this period these men willingly volunteered and their offer is accepted, for another period of six days. Captain Tupper, the officer in charge of this company and his other officers and the men have set an example that will have lasting effects throughout the whole Division. It is this spirit, this indomitable spirit, that will never be downed.

The 22nd French Canadian Regiment, under Col. Gaudet, also volunteered to come back one day sooner into the lines so that the work of cleaning up the trenches and in some way putting them into shape might be carried forward with dispatch. This is the spirit that dominates throughout the whole Division. Each man striving with all his power to help along the work and to help his comrades opposite him.

Another very pleasing event in connection with the 5th Brigade was the anniversary gathering and dinner of

the officers of the 24th Battalion. Just a year ago yesterday their Battalion was organized and mobilized and consequently the occasion was a very fitting one for a reunion of their officers and guests. Col. J. A. Gunn, the very popular commanding officer of the Regiment, presided, having on his right General R. E. W. Turner, Commanding the 2nd Division, and on his left Col. Topping, commanding the Artillery Brigade supporting the Infantry; opposite was Major Hill, 2nd in command of the Regiment, having on his right General D. Watson, commanding the Brigade and on his left Col. Fotheringham, A.D.M.S., 2nd Division. Over sixty officers and guests were present. General Turner in very happy terms took occasion, in proposing the health of the 24th Battalion, in pointing out how he had already been associated with two other Montreal Regiments during his command of the 3rd Brigade, and that Col. Gunn was the third of the Commanding officers from the Victoria Rifles of Montreal, with whom he has had the pleasure of associating during the present war, the other two being Colonel Meighen and Colonel Burdett. Col. Dunn in replying made an excellent impression and paid a warm tribute to the co-operation and splendid work of the officers and men of his Regiment. Col. Gunn requested Capt. The Rev. Mr. Shatford, Chaplain of the Regiment to augment his few words and the discourse of Capt. Shatford was one that will never be forgotten by any who were present. The Rev. gentleman held his audience in the closest attention and his remarks interspersed with most amusing incidents, were conducive in no small manner in elevating the aspirations and determination of all present in the great responsibilities and duties which lay before them. It was realized by all that occasions such as that, with the splendid, encouraging words of officers such as Capt. Shatford, undoubtedly bring out the very best in the officers, and those others who were privileged to have heard him.

Similarly to the week before, when the 22nd Bn. held their anniversary, the occasion of last night's gathering was also unique. The re-union was held within the walls of the old Belgian convent at Loere, with the good sisters assisting at table, and everything being prepared by them as well. The storm and wind howling outside, and the thunder of the big guns, heard even over all: such an occasion will never be forgotten and will ever linger in the memory of all present. Shortly after 10 o'clock the gathering broke up, as usual each little party off to their own huts or dug-outs, preparatory to their taking up their part in the front line tonight.

RAILROAD DEAL.

New York, Nov. 26.—It was learned today that the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad had sold to Kuhn, Loeb & Company and Speyer & Company, bankers, \$60,000,000 five per cent. refunding and general mortgage gold bonds. The company will use part of the proceeds to redeem its \$40,000,000 gold notes maturing in 1917 and 1918 which are subject to prior redemption.

DETAILS OF HORRIBLE MASSACRE OF ARMENIANS

FIENDISH CRUELTY RESPONSIBLE FOR THEIR DEATHS — BUTCHER BATTALIONS GOT IN THEIR WORK—WOMEN ASSAULTED.

London, Nov. 26.—Viscount Bryce tonight made public the details of further Armenian massacres, which, in a letter accompanying them, he says, "surpass in horror, if that were possible, what has been published already."

"I feel," his letter continues, "that such crimes ought to be exposed to the utmost, and that the charity of other nations will more than ever be drawn to the unhappy refugees when it is known what their friends and fellow-countrymen have suffered."

Viscount Bryce says the details confirm and amplify the ghastly history of deportations by which Armenians in northern and eastern Anatolia were driven to a death of fiendish cruelty. The first part of the evidence he says, was received by the committee of inquiry in the United States and the second part comes from an Armenian gentleman at Tiflis, who received it from refugees who escaped from regions where the events happened.

"The sufferings of the peasants and the mountaineers in the regions of Van, Mush and Samun," Viscount Bryce says, "seem to have been even more terrible than were those of the peaceful townfolk described in Part One of the report. Every successive piece of evidence increases the horror of the story and confirms the dreadful certainty of its truth."

After giving the parts of the evidence received from the United States, Viscount Bryce says that the following extracts were taken from his correspondent at Tiflis:

"Towards the end of May Djedvet Bey, the military governor, was expelled from Van. Djedvet fled southwards and entered Sairt with some 8,000 soldiers, whom he called 'butcher battalions.' He massacred most of the Christians of Sairt, the details of which nothing is known. On the best of authority, however, it is reported that he ordered his soldiers to burn in the public squares the Armenian Bishop, Eglise Vartavet, and the Chaldean Bishop, Adad Sher.

"On June 25, the Turks surrounded the town of Bitlis and cut its communications with neighboring Armenian villages. Then most of the able-bodied men were taken away from their women by domiciliary visits. During the following few days all the men under arrest were shot outside the town and buried in deep trenches dug by the victims themselves. The young women and children were distributed among the rabble. The remainder, the 'useless lot,' were driven to the south and are believed to have been drowned in the Tigris.

"It is in such a fashion that the Turks disposed of about 15,000 Armenians at Bitlis. At Mush early in July the authorities demanded arms from the Armenians and a large sum in ransom of notables of the town. The head men of the village were subjected to revolting tortures. Their finger nails and then their toe nails were forcibly extracted; teeth were knocked out, and in some cases noses were whittled down, the victims thus being done to death under shocking lingering agony.

"The female relatives of victims who came to the rescue were assaulted in public before the very eyes of their mutilated men. The shrieks and death cries of the victims filled the air, yet they did not move the Turkish beasts.

"In the town of Mush itself the Armenians, under the leadership of Gotoyan and others, entrenched themselves in churches and stone built houses and fought for four days in self-defense, but Turkish artillery, manned by German officers, made short work of all the Armenian positions and every one of the Armenian leaders, as well as their men, were killed in the fighting.

"The ghastly scenes which followed may seem incredible, yet these reports have been confirmed beyond all doubt. The shortest means employed for disposing of the women and children in the various camps was by burning. Fire was set to the large wooden shed in Aljian, Mograkom, Khosjogh and other Armenian villages, and these absolutely helpless women and children were roasted to death.

"Many women went mad and threw away their children. Some women knelt down and prayed amid the flames which were burning their bodies. Others shrieked for help, which came from nowhere, and the executioners, who seemed unmoved by this unparalleled savagery, grasped infants by one leg and hurled them into the fire, calling out to the burning mothers there are your lions."

"Turkish prisoners who apparently witnessed some of these scenes were horrified and maddened at remembering the sight. The odor from burning flesh, they say, permeated the air for many days.

In the hill country of Susam the surviving warriors found themselves surrounded at close quarters by 30,000 Turks and Kurds. Then followed one of the most desperate heroic

struggles for life which have always been the pride of the mountaineers. Men, women and children fought with knives, scythes and stones, and anything else they could handle. They rolled blocks of stone down the steep slopes, killing many of their enemies. In the frightful hand to hand combats women were seen thrusting their knives into the throats of Turks.

"When every warrior had fallen, several of the younger women who were in danger of falling into the hands of the Turks, threw themselves from the rocks, some of them with infants in their arms."

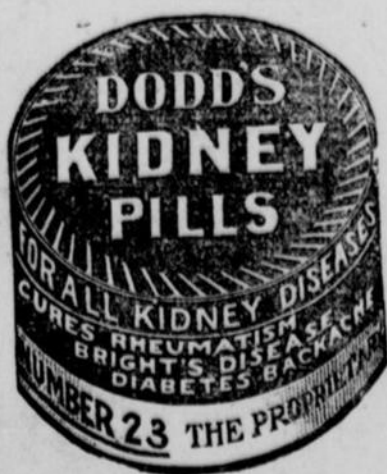

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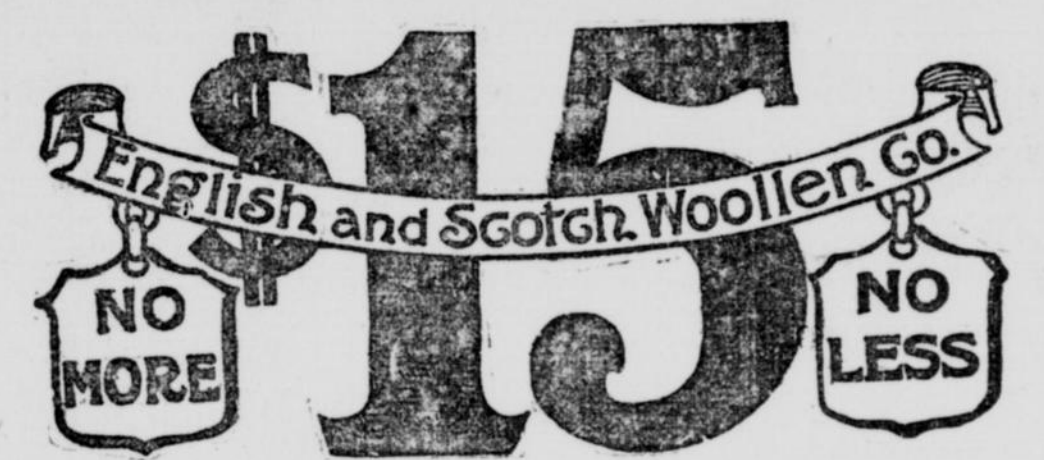

CHURCHILL'S SUCCESS.

The retirement from the British cabinet of Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill has been hailed with mingled joy and regret by the German newspapers. The Cologne Gazette, for instance, is quoted by recent London newspapers as saying that it is greatly pleased at the "downfall of Churchill." According to the translations of the Gazette's article the editor takes much comfort from the fact that Mr. Churchill, though threatening to dig the German fleet out of the Kiel Canal "as one digs rats out of their holes" failed in the attempt. "The fleet," says the Gazette, "is still safe. Churchill's threat failed."

If the Cologne Gazette can find comfort in the fact that Mr. Churchill did not actually destroy the German fleet, but allowed it to remain hidden in the Kiel Canal, they are very easily satisfied. Even though Mr. Churchill did not carry out his threat to "dig it out," yet it must not be forgotten that Mr. Churchill, as head of the Admiralty "put it in" or bottled it up in the Kiel Canal and had no difficulty in "keeping the bottle corked." For all practical purposes a fleet which is imprisoned as von Tirpitz's is, is useless for the purposes for which it was built.

The Kaiser's great fleet was intended to protect Germany against the loss of her commerce, and this it has wholly failed to do. The money lavished on the German navy has been wasted because of the navy's inefficiency, and that navy is for the same reason responsible for a trade loss to the German nation many times greater than its first cost. An oft-quoted statement made by von Tirpitz, as chief of the German navy, is republished in an English exchange as evidence of just what this loss of trade means and the effect it will have on the German nation. His statement, made some time before the outbreak of war, is as follows:

"For the German Empire of today the security of its economic development, and especially of its world-trade, is a life question. A naval war, for economic interests, will probably be of long duration, for the aim of a superior opponent will probably be all the more completely reached the longer the war lasts."

"An unsuccessful war of the duration of even only a year would destroy Germany's sea trade and would thereby bring about most disastrous conditions, first in her economic, and then, as an immediate consequence of that, in her social life."

"Quite apart from the consequences of the possible peace conditions, the destruction of our sea trade during the war could not, even at the close of it, be made good within measurable time, and thus would add to the sacrifice of the war a serious economic depression."

The German fleet is in the Kiel Canal and, consequently, of no value to Germany. The British navy put it there during Mr. Churchill's tenure in the Admiralty. Whether it keeps it imprisoned until after the war, or permits it to come out to the open sea where it will be destroyed, is a matter of secondary importance. The main feature is that its usefulness is already gone. And in achieving that result Mr. Churchill did not play a minor part. German newspapers may consider that he has failed, but so long as the British navy rules the seas there will be ample evidence to the contrary.

VOLUNTARY SYSTEM BEST

The correspondent of the Berliner Tageblatt has been visiting the British prisoners taken at Givency and Loos in the fighting last October. He remarks upon their intense love of cleanliness. "The great majority look as soldiers should look, simple, sturdy, good-natured. When they were mustered for transportation they began to hum something which soon swelled into a loud song. marched like athletes. If they walk into battle with the same swing as into captivity, they are to be respected." The correspondent interviewed some of them, with this result:

"The majority of them did not believe that compulsory military service would be adopted by England, and one of the non-coms, who would gladly have returned to the thick of the fight, expressed himself as opposed to the system. 'What is the merit in fighting,' he argued, 'if you are forced into it?' Strange, this English point of view! And the chance of the war? Most of them believe firmly that Germany must exhaust herself. Kitchener could get as many soldiers as he wanted."

Surely this is one of the strongest arguments against conscription. There is something fine in voluntary enlistment, and the fact that Great Britain has raised three million men in that way is something to be proud of. Other European powers might have done it. Great Britain has done it. Canada has done remarkably well under the voluntary enlistment system, and those people who are advocating conscription surely do not realize just what has already been accomplished and what is possible in a great free country where men will fight for love of liberty rather than through compulsion.

PRESS COMMENT.

A western contemporary draws attention to the fact that of the 2,800,000 enlistments from the North in the American civil war, more than 2,000,000 were young men of less than 21 years of age, and more than a million were 18 years of age and under. The Brantford Expositor suggests that these figures are worth thinking about. They are given by Frederick I. Paxson, professor of American history in the University of Wisconsin, in his book dealing with the great struggle between the North and the South. The population of the Northern States in 1860 was 22,700,000, or say nearly three times the present population of Canada. If Canada should produce recruits up to the level of the North in proportion to population, the Dominion would send some 900,000 men to the war, of whom some 600,000 would be under 21 years of age. The Confederate States had a population of 8,700,000 at the beginning of the civil war, but of these only 5,096,000 were white. In other words, the available fighting population of the South was much less in 1861 than that of Canada today. Yet the 11 states which made up the Confederacy sent to the war almost all of its 1,200,000 men who were between the military ages of 17 and 50. Practically every young man in the South, from the age of 17 upwards, became a soldier. These figures are useful today when we are considering Canada's contribution to the great cause in men. They show that while we may have kept pace with the demands of the government and with its ability to equip we are still far from reaching the limit of our capacity.

The German-American activities in the United States are apparently causing serious concern to the authorities of that country. The situation has rarely if ever been paralleled in history, and it is complicated by the fact that a well-organized force of public opinion in America is more or less in sympathy with the German cause and presumably with its methods. It is known that the enemy, in preparing for the present war, literally honeycombed every country in the world with spies and secret service agents, but in the case of the United States, he practically founded a state within a state. That it was a grossly dishonorable return for the hospitality which America has always extended to German settlers was probably not considered for a moment. That, however, by the way. The problem that calls for im-

mediate settlement is contained in the fact that the German and Austrian Embassies at Washington have become the focus of a conspiracy against the laws and liberties of the United States; that bribery and corruption on a vast scale have emanated from those sources; that Proclamations from foreign powers have been exhibited throughout America, threatening death and other punishments, in utter contempt of the supreme authority of the United States Government within its own frontiers. Munition factories have been dynamited, outlying ships have been wrecked by bombs placed on board in American harbors. American citizens have been corrupted to act as spies and messengers for the secret service of Germany and Austria.

It is not expected that the Germans in America (that is a true description than German-Americans) will ever rise en masse against the Stars and Stripes. There could only be one result to such an insane outbreak, and that would be the ultimate expulsion of every German and Austrian from this continent. But the situation is sufficiently scandalous, even if the possibility of an armed German rising be discounted. It seems as though President Wilson is only at the beginning of his difficulties. One thing he will have to realize sooner or later: that American courtesy is wasted upon German Kultur and that the only argument appreciated by the latter is that of the Big Stick.—Montreal News.

RUSS WOMEN IN WAR.

Many Have Been Decorated With High Honors.

The retreating Russian army has sent many thousands of its wounded to Petrograd to save them from the German and Austrian military prisons, and among these wounded there have been discovered so many women that one hospital in the Russian capital has been set aside for them. It has been known for some months that several hundred women were probably fighting shoulder to shoulder with their husbands and brothers under the Grand Duke Nicholas, but the actual number is very much larger than was suspected.

The grand duke admitted them to the ranks in various regiments from the beginning, so it is announced now and there was no necessity of concealing their sex if they were willing to be assigned to duty in the transport and commissary services and to keep away from the fighting line.

But as they saw the men fall in the regiment he women rushed forward and filled up the gap, afterward being allowed to keep the positions won with such bravery.

A number of them have been promoted and have become full-fledged officers, and others have been decorated for gallantry with military crosses of St. George. The youngest perhaps, is an 18-year-old Vilna school girl, Kira Bashiriowa, who enlisted under the name of Nicholas Popin.

She had her feet frozen, but continued fighting until she was wounded and taken to the field hospital where it was discovered that she was a woman.

Alexandra Kokovtseva also enlisted under an assumed name in the Ural Cossack regiment to which her husband belonged, and in which he had fought in the Russian-Japanese war. After having been wounded twice in the East Prussian campaign, she showed such extraordinary courage that she was recommended to be promoted to become a colonel, although her sex had been found out, and as a colonel she has served ever since.

LATIN FOR TEACHER TO MODEL SCHOOL

MEETING OF PROTESTANT COMMITTEE OF COUNCIL OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

A largely attended meeting of the Protestant Committee of the Council of Public Instruction was held yesterday at the Parliament buildings.

The session was presided over by Sir Wm. Peterson, and those in attendance are His Lordship Bishop Williams, Hon. W. G. Mitchell, Hon. Sydney Fisher, Rev. Dr. A. T. Love, Dr. W. M. Rowat, Mr. W. S. Bullock, Mr. J. A. Dale, Rev. Principal Parrock, Mr. Robt. Bickerdike, Rev. E. I. Rexford, Mr. John Whyte, Mr. W. L. Shurtleff, Hon. Geo. Bryson, Mr. C. McBurney, Mr. S. Laird, Miss I. Brittain, and Dr. Geo. W. Parmelee, secretary of the Committee.

Miss Brittain was present as representative of the Provincial Protestant Teachers' Association. Some considerable discussion was had upon the report of the sub-committee on text books and course of study.

A small sub-committee with the Hon. S. A. Fisher as convener was appointed to consider the general question of the cost of text books in this province as compared with the cost elsewhere and to study the question of rapid and satisfactory distribution to the trade and to the pupils.

It was freely said that some publishers were not giving the trade discounts which they are obliged by their contracts to give. A series of resolutions from the Teachers' Association was read the principal one urging that the Committee endeavor to secure legislation empowering women to act as members of school boards. Committee seemed on the whole to be decidedly sympathetic, and will study the case in order to see what steps can be taken in the desired direction. The Montreal Council of Women added their support to the petition of the teachers.

The much discussed question of Latin for entrance to the Model School class of the school for teachers was decided by a narrow majority. This subject will continue to be required.

A memorial from the Presbytery of Montreal was read approving certain features of the new course of study, and recommending the consolidation of small schools and the plan of making the school a social centre.

Mr. Bickerdike recalled the fact that the Committee had ordered a few years ago the flying of the Union Jack over all public schools during every school day of the year. The Secretary said that notice had been given to all school boards but that to the best of his belief the order was honored in the breach rather than in the observance. He was instructed to put machinery in motion in order to have compliance with the wishes of the Committee in this respect.

A memorandum from Macdonald College was read in which a larger grant to the school for teachers, now \$5,000, annually, was asked for. The request was sent on to the Government for favorable consideration.

The Secretary reported that an examination had recently been held for candidates who wish to qualify to act as inspector, and that the examiners recommended that Charles McBurney, B.A., Lachute, and Claude Adams, B.A., Granby, receive a first-class certificate of qualification. The recommendation was adopted. One candidate failed to satisfy the examiners.

Wild Cinnamon.

Although the cultivation of cinnamon on the plantations in French Indo-China is constantly increasing most of the product is obtained from a wild shrub growing in the forest. When a native discovers a cinnamon tree he must make a declaration before the local administration, who cut down the tree and authenticate its product. The profits accruing to the discoverer of a single tree sometimes reach a large sum. The variety most prized is the wild royal cinnamon of Thanh-Hao, which is thought by the Chinese to possess a high medicinal value.

WHY TOD SLOAN WAS CHASED FROM OLD ENGLAND

Additional details of the circumstances attending Tod Sloan's deportation from England are given in the subjoined cable to the New York Sun from London, under Tuesday's date: "Tod Sloan, the former jockey, was arrested yesterday on a deportation order under the Defense of the Realm act, which permits the deportation of an alien without the necessity of assigning a reason."

"A French actress named Dherlys, who played in the French revue at the Garrick theatre, was arrested with Sloan. She will be sent to France with her mother. The ground of arrest in both cases was the charge of keeping a gambling house. Officers, after being plentifully plied with

liquor, are said to have lost considerable sums at cards. Associated with Sloan, it is alleged, was an Englishman who is well known to the police as an expert card sharp.

"The police cannot prosecute any of the principals, because the officers, dreading publicity, do not want to figure in court proceedings. Sloan has been in London about four months. He has been watched by the police since his arrival. The authorities were aware of Sloan's unsavory connection with the card scandals some time ago which resulted in an exodus to Paris of English and American card sharps. The authorities also knew of Sloan's association with the habits of Ostend against whom sharp practices at cards have been charged, which the police have not forgotten. The police decline to dis-

INSPECTION OF THE NEW 40-INCH MAIN

REPORTS MADE BY CITY ENGINEER AND THE CITY ANALYST.

At the meeting of the City Council last night Mayor Drouin read a report from City Engineer Baillairge on the inspection of the new 40-inch water main which was made recently.

There was also a report from Dr. Guimont, Chief of the Civic Laboratory, on certain analysis made by him in connection with the inspection.

On motion of Ald. Verret the reports will be placed on the order papers of the Council for the next meeting.

The reports are as follows:—
MR. BAILLAIRGE'S REPORT
City Hall, City Engineer's Office.
Quebec, November 26th, 1915
His Worship the Mayor.

City Hall, Quebec:—

Re: Inspection of the New 40" Main.

Dear Sir,—In conformity with the clause of the resolution of the City Council passed on the 12th of November, 1915, relating to defective joints which might exist on the 40" main, said resolution reading as follows:

"That the City Engineer be instructed to have an inspection made of the 40" main pipe, beginning at the intake at Lorette, down to the Bridge on the River St. Charles, in order to ascertain whether there are defective joints, and also ascertain the amount of supposed damage caused by the water which escaped from the said main pipe, or by some other cause."

I beg to report that I have made a careful inspection of said 40" main on its whole length, foot by foot, from the bridge over the River St. Charles, to the Chateau d'Eau, at Lorette.

Wednesday, the 17th inst., I inspected the part between the bridge over the River St. Charles and Riviere des Meres and on Tuesday, 18th, the part between Riviere des Meres and the water head at Lorette.

The resolution of Council was forwarded me Saturday, 13th inst. On Monday the 15th and Tuesday the 16th, I remained in town to oversee the opening and closing, as the case might be, of the necessary valves, in order to make sure that the City was fed solely by the 40-inch main.

Thus the 17th was the first day on which I could leave the City, and as previously stated, I then began the inspection of the 40" main.

The ground being covered with snow and ice, the location of defective joints was rather difficult.

During this inspection, I was accompanied by M. Forrester, Water Works Engineer, Mr. Conolly, Jr., representing the contractor for the new 40" main, also by the gang of men who are in the habit of making the necessary repairs to water mains between Quebec and Lorette.

I made sure to have the men composing this gang accompany me as it was these same men who had stated that there was a great number of defective joints on the 40" main.

One must not think that it is an easy thing to establish the existence of defective joints, specially at this time of the year, after the wet season and the first snow fall.

At certain points, say about six (6) different places, it was easily ascertained by the water running on the surface that a defective joint existed. In other cases, say at 9 different points, there were pools of water. After sounding with a steel bar, water escaping from the pipe can be heard. This test is practically conclusive.

Again, in other cases, say at about

twelve different points where pools of water existed, it was very difficult to establish even by sounding if the water came from the pipe or not, as there were depressions in the ground which would naturally allow the water to station in these low spots, and the men of the repair gang although experienced, could not agree among themselves, which further proved the difficulty there is in arriving at a definite conclusion, until such time as the excavations are completed.

Now, if you consider that there are more than 3,000 joints on the whole length between Quebec and Lorette, and that only 15 defective joints have been established, with any degree of certainty, you will see that the proportion is very small.

Regarding damages caused to riparians proprietors by flow of water from said pipe or other causes, Mr. C. P. Casgrain, Assistant Manager of the Water Works Department, and Secretary of the Water Works Committee, informs me in his letter dated November 15th that he has received no claim for damages due to the above causes.

The only two claims handed me by the City Legal Advisors were one from Mr. Hercule Trudel, and another from Mr. C. T. Parent, Mayor of Charlebourg.

Mr. Hercule Trudel's claim bears date of July 26th; and is for a sum of \$97.00 for damages incurred during the year 1914, and \$400 to \$500 for the current year. I had an interview with Mr. Trudel on the 19th of November, and this gentleman positively declares that previous to the laying of the 40 inch main there was no water on his property, while some of the men state that since many years, to their knowledge, the part of the property on which Mr. Trudel claims damages was a swamp.

There is no doubt that there are two places where the joints are defective and if these joints cause the flooding of his ground as Mr. Trudel contends, he is entitled to an indemnity.

The claims of Mr. C. T. Parent, Mayor of Charlebourg amounting to \$250 is settled. I proved to this gentleman that the water of which he complains on his property does not come from a defective joint. This water according to me comes from a line ditch situated between his property and that of Mr. C. Trudel, said water instead of following its natural course follows the 40" main at the point where it intersects the line ditch, and flows to a point on his property where the men pretend that there has always been a spring.

I am convinced by the tests made by the City Analyst, Dr. Guimont which he explains himself in his report hereto annexed that this water which floods Mr. Parent's ground comes from the line ditch.

I have taken the necessary steps to allow the water to follow its natural course.

Mr. Parent declares that, provided the water does not flow over his property he is ready to relinquish his claim.

CITY ANALYST'S REPORT
Municipal Laboratory, City Hall.
Quebec, November 26th, 1915
Mr. Baillairge,

Dear Sir,—In conformity with verbal instructions received from His Worship the Mayor, Friday the 19th inst., I have the honor to submit the present report on the study I made of the water supposed to flow from a spring near the 40" main passing on Mr. Parent's property.

To obtain the necessary data, I made tests on the ground and chemical researches in my laboratory.

Saturday morning, the 20th inst., Mr. Baillairge and the undersigned went to the specified spot to take a sample of the said spring water. On my return to the laboratory I took a sample from the water tap in order to establish the chemical difference which might exist between these two waters.

The result obtained in my researches on the different physical characters and chemical properties of these two samples of water were positively different.

The finding of a flow of water underneath the 40" main, in the air well, situated on Mr. Parent's property, necessitated excavating under said pipe in order to establish its sort.

Wednesday the 24th, we returned to the same place and in presence of Mr. Baillairge, city engineer, and Mr. Forrester, Water Works Engineer I made several tests with coloring fluids.

The first test was made with a solution of Methylene Blue placed in the stream of water dividing the property of Messrs. Parent and Trudel.

In about twenty minutes, the water running under the 40" main showed positive traces of the coloring fluid previously thrown in the stream. To further ascertain the results another test was made with a solution of Fluorescein and the result was equally positive.

To determine if the same water found in excavating under the 40" main was following the course of said main and thus might feed the spring, some Fluorescein was added to the water under the pipe. In about twenty minutes a positive reaction due to the coloring of the Fluorescein was observed in the water at different points where the flooding occurred.

The results of the chemical tests of the samples of water taken from the dividing stream and in the excavation under the 40" main are practically the same, and in no way resemble the results obtained with our Water Works Water.

The conclusion obtained from tests and observations made is that the water flowing at this point under the 40" main and which floods a little portion of Mr. Parent's ground part-

INVISIBLE ICEBERGS.

Conditions Under Which They Can
Not Be Seen on Clear Nights.

In a recent communication to the
New York Tribune, Albert H. Thayer,
the artist, asserts that many vessels
have been lost by collisions with
icebergs because under certain con-
ditions of sky and light they are in-
visible. He cites the fact that on
the occasion of the Titanic disaster,
although the black ship was clearly
visible to survivors at a distance of
several miles, they could not see the
white bergs against which they ac-
tually heard the wash of the sea.

Mr. Thayer claims that on a clear,
starry night the bergs are so nearly
the same color as the sky that they
are totally invisible and that the same
is the case under many conditions
of cloudiness, the only exception
being when the side of the berg
viewed is in such shadow that it
shows black against the sky. In
other words, it is impossible to see
white against white.

In answer to the criticism of those
who say they never saw a berg at
night that was the color of the sky
the answer is that this is very natural
because this is the very condition
under which the berg is invisible. Mr.
Thayer makes the suggestion that a
very simple way to avoid the danger
of colliding with an invisible berg
would be to use a searchlight. The
reflection would show up the berg
very plainly.

MR. WIGGS ABROAD.

En route to Kansas City.

Nov. 23rd, 1915.

To the Editor of the Chronicle:

Dear Sir,—After a short sojourn in
Los Angeles, where we were favored
by having Mayor Sebastian place his
private car at our disposal to see the
sights of the city and also calling on
Mr. Wiggins, the Secretary of the
Chamber of Commerce, we continued
our journey to San Diego to see the
Pan-Pacific Exposition in that city,
the most southern in the United
States. We also took time to make a
short run into Mexico, just across the
border to the town of Tijuana,

which was exceedingly interesting, as
it enabled us to see some Mexican life
and customs. After retracing our
way to Los Angeles we continued our
journey to Riverside, Cal., where we
stopped at the wonderful "Mission Inn"
enriched with a great collection of
curios gathered from Mexico and
Spain, illustrative for the most part,
of the old Spanish missions of Cali-
fornia. We took a motor ride to the
top of Mount Robidoux, there getting
a glimpse of one of those glorious
sunsets for which California is noted;
also of the surrounding orange groves
watered by a vast irrigation system
and where the celebrated "Sunkist"
orange grows, so well known in Que-
bec.

Taking the train at San Bernardino,
we continued to Williams, branching
off there for the Grand Canyon, Ari-
zona. Only those who have visited
this sublime sight can realize the deep
feelings of those who see for the first
time its vastness, its almost unfathom-
able depths, its solitude; not a sign of
life to be seen anywhere, except a tiny
speck away below us, which with our
field glasses we recognize as the
guides' huts. The Canyon is 217 miles
long, over 7,000 feet deep and in places
we visited 10 miles and 20 miles wide.
Standing at "Suicide Point" our guide
holding us by the hand, we tried to
fathom its great depth, while from
"Grand View Point" where two great
capes, one sixteen miles in length,
stretch out into the Canyon, forming
a huge amphitheatre 20 miles wide
and twenty-five miles to the furthest
shore, the sublimit of the view there
disclosed is beyond description, the
Colorado River appearing like a tiny
thread and yet the guide told us the
portion we saw was 8 miles long and
300 feet wide. Not having the time
at our disposal we did not descend
into the Canyon, it being an overnight
journey to do it properly. We were
loath to leave this wonderful sight and
trace our way to Williams, to continue
our journey homeward through the
great Mojave desert, to Colorado
Springs. The journey of 28 hours
through this vast desert is very mono-
tonous, not a vestige of life to be seen
except on occasional Indian and
saw and papoose strapped to her
back, passing on ponies or a Mexican
pueblo ranch or some dead cattle lying
on the ground. Just a word about
this great railway system—the Santa
Fee—on which we are travelling,
stretching from Mexico on the south
to Chicago on the north, and from the
Pacific to the Gulf of Mexico with
eleven thousand miles of railway
track, by means of which we travel
over the Sierra Nevada, through Can-
yons, over deserts, touching some of
the greatest sights to be seen in the
world, on again, on again through the
most fertile plains where grow all
manner of fruit, vegetables and flow-
ers, too numerous to enumerate, miles
and miles of barley and corn fields,
thousands of cattle, horses, cows,
sheep and pigs) browsing on the hills,
thus giving the traveller, as he sits
comfortably in his steel coach await-
ing for his well appointed Harvey
meal, (telegraphed ahead for), at the
next station, a faint glimpse of the
vastness in extent and potentialities
of the nine big States through which
we are travelling. Nothing seems to
be neglected for the comfort and
pleasure of the traveller.

Stopping at Colorado Springs, at
the beautiful "Antlers Hotel," at the
foot of Pike's Peak, we naturally had
to climb to its summit, 14,100 feet
above sea level, and a wonderful engi-
neering feat, the Cog Railway, pro-
vided us with an easy means of doing
so. What a sight, mountain tops, 80
to 125 miles away to the south in
Mexico, the great painted desert of
Colorado, stretching as far as the eye
could see with what looked like a cab-
bage patch, as the guide called the
city of Colorado Springs, 18 miles
away, at our feet. One could imagine
that only a trip in a balloon could give
such an extensive view. We also vis-
ited a remarkable cave in the vicinity
called the "Cave of the Winds" and
another celebrated spot called "The
Garden of the Gods", on both of

which some extraordinary rock forma-
tions are to be seen.

On our return journey we purpose
spending a short time in Denver,
Kansas City and Chicago and from
thence going home via Toronto and
Montreal, but after all nothing will be
more welcome to us than the dear and
familiar sight of old Quebec.

Thanking you, Mr. Editor, for the

RETURNING

INVALID SOLDIERS.

A Shelter for Lost or Abandoned
Animals.

To the Editor of the Chronicle:—

Sir,—In view of the discussion now
going on in a portion of the Press, I
may perhaps add my own experience
in support of the local authorities.

When the early steamers with re-
turned wounded commenced to ar-
rive, I was requested by a Montreal
newspaper, temporarily short of a
man, to interview on two occasions
the men on these steamers, and get
their stories of life at the front. I
reported myself to Major Sharples in
command of the Citadel, where these
men were then staying, and
stated my business. That gentleman
courteously gave me the free run of
the rooms, and told me I was at lib-
erty to question the men.

Whilst the conversation with the
men chiefly concerned their experi-
ences in battle and in the trenches,
and whilst I was able, much to my
satisfaction, to speak to a man and
get his address who had actually
seen the body of the crucified Ser-
geant Bristow whilst it was still stuck
up against a barn door, with a bayo-
net through each hand and others
through each foot, and thus provide
a witness against the German beasts
who were at that time denying the
story, some supposed grievances of
some of the men in regard to local
treatment were even then broached.
These complaints I took note of but
did not publish. I nevertheless took
care to enquire about them, and
found them groundless.

The complaints were firstly, that
they had poor quarters; secondly
that their food was indifferent and
badly cooked, tea like dishwater, etc.,
thirdly that they were unnecessarily
detained here for days and days, in-
stead of being sent home to their
families, where they were longing to
be; fourthly that the people of Que-
bec did not seem to be aware that
they had been to the war at all, as
there was not even a bugle to meet
them, and not a cheer raised by the
citizens as they passed through the
streets. The first complaint I satis-

fied myself was unfounded by walk-
ing through the quarters and in-
specting them; the second I brought
to the attention of Major Sharples,
who said that occasionally similar
complaints were made to him, but on
all such occasions he had himself ex-
amined and tasted the food and
drank some of the tea, and found
them good. Regarding the third
complaint, Major Sharples satisfac-
torily explained that it was unavoid-
able that there should be some little
delay, because each man had to pass
before the Medical board, and that
board could only examine a certain
number of men per day. The fourth
complaint I thought there might be
something in, and I published that
in the paper I was acting for. Later
on, I think it will be admitted, that
there was left no grounds for any
such reflections.

I remember one man who wore a
face of very portentous expression,
who told me he had nothing to say
until after he had gotten his dis-
charge, but that then he would have
a good deal to say. He left me under
the impression that, at some future
time, there was going to be an ex-
plosion in his vicinity compared to
which that of one of the celebrated
"Jack Johnsons" would be merely
moonshine. The complaints were
very much in the minority I may re-
mark, and I had no doubt in my mind
at all that Major Sharples was doing
all that was humanly possible to sat-
isfy the legitimate demands of all
parties.

Turning now to what is perhaps
the greater object of this letter, we
often find that our kindness to hu-
man beings meets with little acknow-
ledgment, but how different it is with
the dumb, or what we are strangely
accustomed to call the lower animals!
Who can doubt for instance the hon-
est thankfulness to be noted in the
eloquent expression of the intelli-
gent eyes of a dog that has been be-
friended? It is one of the great mys-
teries why Divine Providence should
have created poor animals dumb, so
that they cannot tell us where they
are suffering and why; and the one
exception who did these things was,
after all, only an ass!

If any gentleman or lady, in the
English-speaking portion of our
community, felt impelled to set aside
part of his or her wealth to found a
temporary shelter for lost or aban-
doned animals they would be doing a
world of good, and if the Ladies'
Branch of the Society for the Pre-
vention of Cruelty to Animals would
take charge of it it would be well
looked after. Such a scheme need not
be expensive. For instance, a build-
ing and a small piece of ground on
the outskirts of the city could be
leased from some farmer for a mod-
erate annual rental, and fitted up for
the reception of found animals,
(which after a time if unclaimed
could be put to death by merciful and
painless means), or for animals such
as cats, whose owners, going tempo-
rarily to the sea-side, would be will-
ing to pay for their care in the mean-
time. There would then be a defi-
nite place where a man finding an
animal, and perhaps being willing
and able to pay for its keep for a
short time till he could find a home

CASUAL COMMENT

THE ENDING OF THE WAR, AS IT MAY BE.

By J. M. Harper.

The true pacifist is being given a little more rope in these latter days, though neither Mr. Henry Ford, of Detroit, nor Baron Courtney, of London, can be inclined to think so, considering the mauling they respectively have been having from the critics. It is easy to equip the terms "optimist" and "pessimist" and "pacifist" with inverted commas, and make a tin can of any one of them to tie on to the tail of any dog we may meet "to warn the rabbits away from him" as the Montreal Star would say in its funny column. In presence of a certain individual who was warning himself up into a rage against Mrs. Pankhurst and her methods, the reply was advanced: "You had better be careful; the Londoners may by-and-by erect a monument to that lady, in commemoration of her courage in fighting such a strenuous battle for the Sisterhood that would have the franchise." And some strenuous pacifist may also have a monument erected to his memory, when his advocacies are seen in the right light, to the saving of millions of human lives in the years to come. At least, that gentleman is being given a little more rope in his explanations, even while the war-storm continues with us, by those who have so far been able to ward off the German kultur-microbe, to the undoing of their common-sense. Outrage for outrage cannot possibly be given a place in our British civilization. And the pacifist who would save himself from admiring a British outrage on the sea or in the air, while execrating a similar German outrage, has surely something about him to commend. In fact, to turn a deaf ear to our pacifists of the right stamp, it would be next to impossible to make a feasible forecast of how long the war is going to last, as it may be; and, as we all know there is no more insistent problem to think of or speak about, in public or private, as the days and weeks and months go by, than this one.

By the way, the public has very lately been having the best of good counsel from three of our most prominent pacifists, namely, Sir Edward Grey, Mr. Balfour, and Mr. Asquith, who tell us that the war cannot be brought to an end until Germany and her allies are subdued to the after-handling point. These gentlemen were pacifists before the war was started, and they are going to be pacifists again, when once the war is over. An inconclusive peace is something which no true Britisher can allow himself to have any pre-conceived share in. And these three distinguished pacifists have told the world so. Britain and her Allies can never sue for peace from such a quartette as Germany, Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria, nor can they even negotiate for peace with these powers, until there is a prospect of their being properly bound to keep the peace in terms of an agreement that cannot be broken by any future massing of "a largest army possible" in any of them. The diabolism of outraging civilization can never be given rein to in any such "Entente" again. Their military commanders have virtually proven themselves to be heathen in their attitude towards God, and barbarian in their cruelty towards men, women and children. The scene of Miss Cavell's death, with her outstretched figure lying on the pavement where she was shot and with her murderers standing by and looking complacently on at their victim, proves this to the whole civilized world. And what has been done, at the convenience of the Kaiser, such men as these or their posterity may do again and again. And the personage who must plan out an arrangement—an international arrangement to obviate such happenings again—is none other than the true pacifist. There must never be given to Germany another chance of running amuck among its next-door neighbors. Sir Edward Grey tells us this and he is a pacifist, and has always been one; Mr. Balfour tells us this and he is a pacifist at heart; Mr. Asquith tells us this, and was it not he that put off as far as he possibly could the shedding of human blood in Ireland on the battlefield? And every farseeing statesmanly minded pacifist tells us the same thing. Any peace which leaves Prussia to mass "a largest army possible" ever again would be a peace worse, for the generations of men, women and children to come after the present generation, than has been the havoc made upon industrious little Belgium, and is now trying to repeat itself in Serbia. Nobody can be other than convinced of this, be he optimist or pessimist or pacifist, worthy of being internal, as he may be, in the estimation of this journalist or that platform speaker who would make capital for himself out of an incessant "gnashing of teeth" against even the spelling of the term "pacifist" and out of vapors about what ought to have been done to save the situation in Europe over a year ago. The well-balanced statesman-pacifist has more of a saving for Britain and her Allies in his little finger than such bushwhackers have in their whole body, to make good the latest statements of Sir Edward Grey, Mr. Balfour, Mr. Asquith, and our own Sir Robert Borden, as an aid to our getting at the question in a sensible way, as to how long the war is going to continue before the true pacifist gets in his best work in peace-making of the right and lasting kind, in behalf of the British Empire—our very own Empire—and the world at large.

This war is not like any other war that has ever been. It is a war of exhaustion, not of brilliant decisive victories, one of which might end the war tomorrow. And in calculating how long it may last we have to measure, as near to the truth as possible, the respective resources of the opposing nations engaged in it. There can be no doubt in any one's mind that Germany has already the failing stock of her resources in her mind's eye. Knowing so well now her methods of espionage, to measure out "the lay of the land," there need be no hesitancy in reading aright the feelers that are being put out by certain adroit diplomatic agents, in some of the neutral countries, to get Britain and her Allies into the hole of refusing an offer of peace at the hands of the Kaiser. The Kaiser and his militant entourage cannot but know that the resources under his control are insufficient to cope with the resources under the control of his antagonists. The very fact that there has been a dropping of hints—the forerunning hints of German cunning—as to the terms that might come to be offered by the Kaiser to bring about the end of the war, is conclusive that Germany's handicap which she had from her preparedness is not going to give her a final victory.

The war will certainly last during the winter months, if not well into the summer. That is to say, omitting the adventitious events that may come to pass at any moment, during these months, Germany is going to be at the end of her tether, as far as men money and food supplies are concerned, before the autumn of 1916.

Punch has a cartoon in one of its latest issues, which represents Master John Bull watching from his balcony the German engines on their mission of "massacring the innocents," and claiming these to be his best recruiting agencies. As an offset to this, the German militants maintain that the popularity of the Kaiser still holds with the whole German people. But the war is one of being able to supply a falling away of resources against a similar supply or keeping up of the armies of the Allies. It is a drain on national resources against a drain on national resources. And to get at the matter arithmetically, one has to count how many men Germany and her Allies can muster from month to month, to keep up their armies at the front, during a winter and spring, and possibly the first half of next summer, and how many men Britain and her Allies can keep up at the front during these months, drain on their numbers for drain.

Germany and her allies cannot depend on a muster of more than thirteen million men to keep up its front; and, at the rate of losing three hundred thousand of these a month, as they have been losing every month since the war began, the end of the war may be looked for at the end of four or five or six months. And the prognostic of final success for Germany's opponents is no fanciful one, when it is taken into account what numbers Britain and her Allies will have

to draw upon to keep up the strength of their armies from month to month during these months. These numbers will be more than double Germany's thirteen millions of men, with a depletion of the German forces estimated at the same as it has been on an average, month by month since the war began. Should that depletion continue in the same ratio as heretofore, Germany herself cannot but see that with the fuller strength of Britain and her Allies mobilized, the chances of a speedier depletion of her forces at the front are against her being able to prolong the war beyond another six months, unless she makes up her mind to fight it out to the very last man. An English estimate of the situation is embodied in these words: "We know not to a precise date at what point the German effectives in the field must decline. It may be somewhere before the winter is well at its severest; but that decline must become apparent to everybody before the summer has departed."

And when the resources of Germany and her Allies for the feeding of their people,—soldiers and non-soldiers,—are measured as compared with those of Britain and her Allies, the end of the war cannot but be seen as most likely to happen during the summer of 1916, if not before. Germany is already on the brink of bankruptcy. Its money resources, and its food supplies, and its output of munitions cannot possibly be thought of as sufficient to keep things going, even up to the time when the decline in the efficiency of the German lines at the front, drain on their numbers for drain, becomes apparent. And this brings us face to face with the lesson which is ours to learn, every true Britisher of us. The optimism of the above view of the situation does not bring with it any plea in favor of taking things a little easier in the matter of our recruiting. The enervation of the German armies at the front can only be brought about by the battle-front of the armies of Britain and her Allies, east, west and south, being kept at its fullest strength, and that by a persistent recruiting in Britain and its several colonies, in France, in Russia, in Italy, with the combined fleets of all these countries in active watchfulness. Any optimism, or pessimism, or pacifism that would lead to a decline, even to the smallest extent, in our efforts to have all the men at the front we can possibly recruit, would be traitorous, a hundred times more traitorous to ourselves, than a myriad of German spies could be to us. And this is the explanation of the true pacifism of such men as Sir Edward Grey and his colleagues, when they tell us and strenuously counsel every Britisher, to stand by the guns of the Empire—our Empire, and its Allies—until Germany has been stripped of its power ever to run amuck in Europe again. There is no "gnashing of teeth" about the statesmanlike counsel these leaders of thought have been giving us. They virtually tell the democracy of Great Britain and her colonies that the war is in their hands to prolong or shorten. And be this statesmanlike counsel optimism, pessimism, or pacifism, or anything else the man with the "gnashing teeth" may call it, the fight for peace—a right kind of lasting peace—must go on until the Hohenzollern militant madness be given its quietus, until a settlement of international disputes is in sight other than by a massing of "a largest army possible," on the part of each nation, with its attendant shedding of blood of irresponsible citizens on the battlefield.

The assurance of final victory for our Empire and its Allies, has its main prop in the side assurance that there is going to be no let-up in the recruiting of men on their part. The populace is never over-wise in its criticisms of what is going on in the Departments of War. The Houses of Parliament, the Lords and Commons alike, have been implementing this under-wisdom of late. The specially appointed German spies were bad enough for us, as a preliminary exploitation of the war, but this overdoing of open-mindedness makes spies of the whole world against us.

And the accusation of "worse than a German spy" lies at our door in another direction. If the men be forthcoming for the keeping up of our army lines at the front, to promote the wearing out of the enemy's lines of army strength, the money for their support will be forthcoming of a surety. But that assurance must be made doubly assured by our getting rid of the capitalist who would make enormous profits from the sale of army supplies. He is more immoral personally than any spy. The mean fellow ought to be interned in some way or other, the moment he is located; and the Government cannot have any great difficulty in locating him. Quite a number of such rascals are being located in Canada, with punishment mete for their dastardly offense, let us all hope, awaiting them. Every mother's son of such financing traitors should be dragged to the pillory, and everything in the shape of "a patronage list" banished from the precincts of the seat of Government. For, if these be allowed to continue to bring the Empire, even in the very slightest degree, towards bankruptcy before Germany's bankruptcy in men and money and all her other resources is fully assured, they have been doing no other than fighting Germany's battles against their own country. Indeed the German spy is not in it with such traitors. The war is army against army, but it is very much more than that, it is national bankruptcy on the one side as a saving from national bankruptcy on the other. Germany's approach towards bankruptcy is even now apparent. Its capitalists are being rapidly impoverished. The direct draughts upon them personally are enervating to a degree. In Britain the men of great wealth have as yet had no drain upon their means to cause them any agonizing discomfort. And there has been no halt in the recruiting of men for the front, notwithstanding all the newspaper and platform talk about conscription; and there must be no halt in such recruiting, but rather the opposite, until Germany's effectives at the front show a weakening during the winter months, and not even then. More men we must have; and more money—all the money we can scrape together from equal or unequal taxation—we must have, if we would see the war end at its soonest.

No prognostic is ever a sure one, since there cannot but be ever so many eventualities hidden away from the historic eye, as it deals with the possible or probable. But more men and more money, less carping at our pacifists in power and out of power, less extravagance and no enormous profits from Government contracts, holds good as a policy, and must be made to hold good, as a way of our getting ahead of the Hun during the next six months and longer.

AVIATOR BECOMES DIZZY IN FLIGHT

WAS ATTEMPTING TO FLY FROM TORONTO TO NEW YORK.

Binghamton, N.Y., Nov. 25.—Aviator Carlstrom landed at Hooper, seven miles from here this afternoon.

Aviator Carlstrom, flying from Toronto to New York, seized with dizziness, alighted safely at the Broome County Country Club grounds near Hooper, seven miles west of here, this afternoon. He will continue the flight tomorrow.

Victor Carlstrom, pilot of the Curtiss Aviation School at Long Branch, left the aviation field this morning at 9:46 on his projected 600 mile flight to New York. A strong head wind militated against his chances of success. He was reported as passing over St. Catharines at 10:45, and word was received about noon that he had been sighted at Rochester. After that no news of the aviator was received

until the report of his descent near Binghamton, N.Y., owing to an attack of dizziness. Binghamton is 216 miles from New York City.

FRENCH HAVE EXTENDED LINES.

Saloniki, Nov. 24, via Paris, Nov. 25.—2:05 a.m.—The French have extended their lines east of Krivokas as far as Brusnik and Kiresteop, according to reports received here. The Serbian offensive in the direction of Lezkovats has resulted in an important local success.

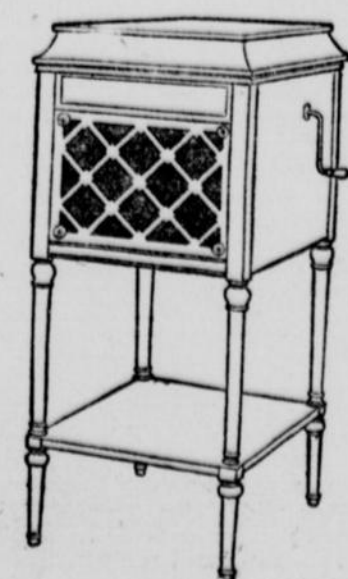

TIMBER REGULATIONS.

GOVERNING Timber on Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and the North-west Territories, the Railway Belt in the Province of British Columbia, and the Three and a-half Million Acres located by the Government of the Dominion in the Peace River District in British Columbia.

Licenses.
 A license to cut timber on a tract not exceeding Twenty-five square miles in extent may be acquired only at public auction. A rental of \$2 per square mile per annum, is charged on all timber berths excepting those situated west of Yale in the Province of British Columbia, on which the rental is at the rate of 5 cents per acre. In addition to rental, dues are charged on the timber cut at the rates set out in section 20 of the Regulations.

Timber Permits and Dues.
 Permits may be gained in the Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, to cut over a definite described tract of land, not exceeding one square mile in extent, on payment of dues at the rate of 50 cents per thousand feet, B.M., and subject to payment of rental at the rate of \$100 per square mile per annum.

Timber for Homesteaders.
 Any applicant of a homestead quarter-section having no timber of his own suitable for the purpose may, provided he has not previously been granted free access to cut a quantity of timber on a quarter-section set out in section 51 of the Regulations.

Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency, for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Land Agency (but not Sub-Agency, on certain conditions).

Duties: Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead, on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3 per acre.

Duties: Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent, also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3 per acre.

Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

SHIPPING NEWS

ST. LAWRENCE ROUTE CLOSES ON MONDAY

THAT IS OFFICIALLY, BUT SHIPPING WILL CONTINUE WHILE RIVER REMAINS OPEN.

Ottawa, November 26.—Navigation in the St. Lawrence route will officially close next Monday, when the removal of the gas buoys which mark the route will commence. These aids to navigation, however, will be replaced as usual by spar buoys, which will remain to indicate the channels to those vessels which continue to make trips until ice conditions forbid. The date chosen is about the same as usual during the last few years.

During the coming winter the new car ferry provided by the intercolonial Railway as a car ferry between Cape Tormentine and Summerside, P. E. I. will be operated by the Marine Department. It will run between Picton and Charlottetown as a ferry. Piers are now under construction for this purpose.

The annual report of the marine Department, issued today, shows what progress has been made in increasing aids to navigation. In Quebec two new lighthouses were put under construction, of one pole light and one steel tower were erected, while extensive changes and improvements were made at twenty-one different stations.

Three new lighthouses were begun in the Montreal district, eight beacons built, one steel tower erected and other improvements made. The number of coast buoys in Canada was increased from 319 to 336. Lighthouse keepers from 1,040 to 1,066, whistling buoys from 30 to 31 and bell buoys from 82 to 86.

The total casualties during the year amounted to 257 vessels with a total tonnage of 212,842 tons, and the loss of \$5,211,700 and 1,114 lives. Of this total 212 were coasting and sea-going vessels, while 45 casualties were on inland waters.

The value of the net registered tonnage of Canada at the latest estimate is given as \$27,972,660.

SHIPPING NOTES.

The Southern Pacific Company, it was announced on November 19th by Julius Kruttschnitt, will shortly award a contract for a large tank steamship to be operated between New Orleans and Mexico oil ports. A libel in Admiralty has been filed in the United States District Court or the Southern District of New York by the New York & Porto Rico Steamship Company vs. William A. Jamieson et al. to recover \$216,531 freight charges.

The newly organized Java-Pacific line announced on November 19th that a monthly steamer service between Batavia, other Japanese ports, Manila, Hong Kong and San Francisco would go into effect December 15. The Java-Pacific is a line formed for the transpacific trade by the Nederland Steamship Co., the Java, China and Japan line, of Amsterdam, and the Rotterdam Lloyd, of Rotterdam.

FREIGHTS AND CHARTERS.

REVIVAL OF JAPANESE SULPHUR INDUSTRY.

The export of sulphur from Japan, says The Japan Advertiser, has for years been on the decline, and quotations have fallen, some of the sulphur mines of small standing having even been compelled to stop working. But since the war broke out the demand in the foreign market has improved, and quotations have gradually risen. The export this year up to the end of August was 27,948,607 pounds, valued at \$203,048, showing an increase of 4,638,451 pounds or \$20,003 compared with the figures for the corresponding period of last year. The destinations have in the past been the United States and Australia in the main, with Canada and India coming next, only quite an insignificant amount being shipped to Europe. Since the war, however, the European supply to oriental countries has been stopped, and the demand in Europe itself has increased. Therefore, Japanese sulphur has now to meet an increased demand in the Orient and America and also in Europe. The prospects of this trade are, therefore, very promising, and it is expected that the volume of trade will soon become as big as it was several years ago when the sulphur trade was on the high tide of prosperity.

ITALIAN SHIPPING.

In a general way the war created fairly favorable conditions for the Italian mercantile marine, and the Navigazione Generale Italiana is able to declare a dividend of 7 per cent for the business year ending June 30 last. In spite of the fact that working expenses were much higher than in normal years the net profit was, in round figures, 7,500,000 lire. The care which the company is bestowing on the extension of its fleet is shown by the fact that in the balance sheet the item for ships under construction is no less than 15,781,679 lire, as compared with 6,141,220 lire in the previous year. The item or barges, tugs, etc., is increased from 379,951 lire to 2,713,015 lire, the latter amount including the cost of transfer of a coal depot from Holland to Buenos Ayres. This fact may be taken as an indication of the company's intention to strengthen its South American services with a view to obtaining a large share of the emigration which may be expected to flow from Europe as soon as peace is concluded. The company also contemplates using some new steamers in the North American service.

An effect of the war is seen in the fact that the company has deemed it advisable to increase its reserve for sea risks from 3,500,000 to 6,000,000 lire, while the expenditure or marine insurance was no less than 2,000,000 lire, as compared with 826,300 lire in the preceding business year.

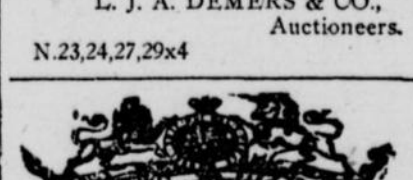

COMMERCIAL NEWS
NEW YORK MARKET.
(Canadian Press).
New York, Nov. 26.—Speculative
sentiment appeared to undergo a
change for the better over the hol-
iday and a moderate increase of ac-
tivity resulted in the forenoon, with
higher prices for many issues. Fur-
ther favorable railway earnings con-
tributed measurably toward this im-
provement, even though that particu-
lar class of securities was relatively back-
ward and heavy in the day's opera-
tions.
Gains in some of the high priced
specialties were sensational. Large
General Motors advancing 23 to 449,
a new maximum. Other stocks that
broke all previous high records were
Cuban-American Sugar on its rise of
9 3/4 to 156 3/4 and American Can
Pfd. rose 1 to 112. South Porto Rico
Sugar rose 99 to 144. Continental
Can 5 to 94 1/2 and Sears Roebuck
1 1/2 to 172. Many of these advances
were largely cancelled in the general
recessions of the final hour.
American Can. Commons was the
most active stock of the session, gain-
ing 3 at 64 5/8. Among the war is-
sues and other stocks coming more
or less directly within that designa-
tion advances of 1 to 3 points were
registered. Metal stocks were in de-
mand at higher prices, led by Amer-
ican Smelting, which more than re-
covered its quarterly dividend on its
rise of 2 to 101 5/8. Smelting
strength bore some relation to the
steady advance in the price of Silver
Metal and other Guggenheim stocks
made further response to the ap-
proaching changes among those prop-
erties.
United States Steel rose a point to
88 1/8, within a fraction of its best
of recent years, but fell back in com-
mon with the balance of the list after
There were again no transactions in
Bethlehem Steel, which has been in
complete obscurity thus far this week.
New Haven's increased weakness—
the stock fell 2 3/4 to 73 3/4—was a
restraining influence on other rails,
some of which were heavy, while
others scored only nominal gains.
Total sales amounted to 640,000
shares.
Among the October railroad reports
was that of Union Pacific, disclosing a
net gain of \$836,000, while Atchafalpa
increased only \$136,000. Purchase of
\$60,000,000 Baltimore and Ohio re-
funding bonds and the tentative sale
of 100,000 shares of Atchafalpa Pfd.
to banking syndicates were announced.
Sterling exchange relaxed a trifle,
but greater strength was evinced in
rates in Scandinavian centers. Local
institutions are expected to show a
cash loss in tomorrow's bank state-
ment.
Bonds were firm on moderate deal-
ings, with a substantial advance in
Missouri Kansas and Texas refund-
ing 4's. Total sales, par value, aggre-
gated \$4,443,000.

GLIMPSES OF OLD QUEBEC

From the Files of THE CHRONICLE, Nov., 1885 and 1815.

THIRTY YEARS AGO TODAY

Fatal Anticosti.

Thirty years ago at this time intel-
ligence was received in town announc-
ing the wreck of the wrecking steam-
er "Earl of Dufferin" near the spot
where the steamer Brooklyn and
Titania (mentioned in this Column on
Thursday last) is now lying a total
wreck, the crew are all saved and
ashore on the island. This part of the
Anticosti Coast is a most fatal part to
shipping. At the investigation into
the cause of the recent wrecks of the
Brooklyn and the Titania on that
dangerous coast, the cause was attrib-
uted to mirage. Is there no way of
combating this fatal illusion? In
these days of advanced science some
means ought to be found to counteract
this fatal deception.

The School of Art and Design.

It is just 30 years ago last night,
that a large number of ladies and
gentlemen attended the inauguration
of the new school of art and design
in St. Joachim Street. The chair was
taken by the Premier, Dr. Ross, who
congratulated the citizens of Quebec
upon the acquisition of the building
and said that if the people would do
their share towards its completion, the
Government would not be found
wanting. Mr. Cyr. Duquet, President
of the Provincial Board of Arts and
Manufactures followed, dwelling par-
ticularly upon the liberality of the
Honorable James G. Ross of this
city, who had given the site and a
good portion of the material for the
structure. Archbishop Taschereau al-
luded to the advantages of education
of the kind that he furnished by the
school. The Hon. Jean Blanchet, the
Hon. Gedeon Ousmet and Mr. James
Carrel, proprietor of the Quebec
Telegraph all spoke of the good work
which was bound to accrue from such
a school in Quebec.

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO TODAY

Peace While There is no Peace.

In this Column yesterday it was
stated that a treaty of peace had been
signed between the allied powers and
the King of France, that means an
official peace, but the question remains
to be answered, is France internally
in a state of peace, are her inhabitants
in a peaceful and contented frame of
mind? It is feared not. Can a nation
be called in a state of peace when
several of its principal fortresses are
still besieged by invaders? Can a na-
tion be peaceful and contented which
has been conquered and a Bourbon
king forced upon the majority of its
inhabitants at the point of the con-
querors bayonets? Our despatch in-
forms us that 173,000 troops of the
allied powers are to be left and sup-
ported for seven years by France.

Another report increases that num-
ber to 202,000, composed as follows:—
British, Hanoverians, etc.50,000
Austrians, under Count Burban. 50,000
Prussians, under Gen. Tauenzien. 50,000
Russians, under Count Woron-
zow.27,000
Bavarians, under Prince Wrede. 25,000

All these troops are to be supported
by France; a country already drained
by the Napoleonic campaigns; for
seven years or may be longer, until
France pays a war contribution of
900 millions. All the pictures, statues,
and works of art which Napoleon re-
moved from the countries which he
overran and deposited in Paris must
be returned.

Louis 18th seems reluctant to abide
by this latter part of the agreement,
so much so that His Holiness the
Pope complains of the King of
France in that respect while he
praises Emperor Alexander and the
Prince Regent of England, neither of
whom are Catholics.

SIX-HOUR DAY FOR LABORERS

AMERICAN FEDERATION CON-
SIDERS QUESTION OF RE-
DUCING WORKING HOURS.

San Francisco, Nov. 25.—Resolutions
providing for investigation to deter-
mine when a six hour day can be es-
tablished in place of an eight hour
day and ousting certain crafts from
the building trades department of the
American Federation of Labor were
considered today by the resolutions
committee of the department.

The measures probably will not
reach the convention until tomorrow.
The six hour day resolution offered
shortened hours as the only remedy
for conditions caused by the "inven-
tion and perfection of machinery"
making it increasingly harder for
working people to continue in steady

TURK OFFENSIVE HAS BEEN REPULSED

HEAVY FIGHTING IN GALLI-
POLI RESULTS IN ADVANT-
AGE TO ALLIES.

Paris, Nov. 25.—Heavy fighting has
been in progress the last few days
in Gallipoli, where the Turks under
took a strong offensive movement
but were repulsed by the combin-
ed fire of the British and French gun
Allied aeroplanes have bombarded
the railway between Constantinople
and Dedeagatch, damaging the
bridges, and warships have bombarded
the coast of Asia Minor.

This information is contained in
the official communication issued to-
night by the French War Office,
which also reports quiet on the west-
ern front. The text of the statement
follows:

"There is no important occurrence
(in the western theatre) to report."

"The Belgian official communica-
tion reads: 'Except for a short bomb-
ardment of Noordschoote, the calm
along the front has been almost com-
plete. Our batteries dispersed enemy
groups to the southeast of the
Chateau De Vicogne, in the direction
of Drei Grachten and towards Luch-
en.'"

"Army of the east: On Nov. 23 our
troops had an engagement near Brus-
nik, to the east of Krivolak, with the
Bulgarian forces. These were repul-
sed."

"Expeditionary corps of the Dar-
danelles: The enemy has displayed
during the last few days an increasing
activity. On the 21st after a violent
bombardment, he attempted three
successive attacks against the British
front for the purpose of re-capturing
the trenches lost on the 15th. His
efforts were everywhere checked and
cut down by the fire of the British
infantry and artillery, to which had
been joined the artillery and machine
guns of the neighboring French
forces. He retired, leaving on the
field numbers of dead."

"On both sides the subterranean
warfare continues with the same ac-
tivity. On the 21st we successfully
exploded a camouflaged. On the 22nd
our sappers came upon a Turkish
branch tunnel, and put to flight the
enemy workers. We immediately
prepared and exploded a mine which
shattered the enemy work."

"The entire day of the 23rd was
marked by rifle firing, an intense
bombardment and a stream of grena-
des from the side of the Turks, who,
although replenished with munitions
displayed nervousness, harassed as
they were by our aeroplanes, which
bombed the railway between
Constantinople and Dedeagatch, and
damaged the engineering works, and
by the monitors and small war craft
which frequently bombarded the
coast of Asia. They are without
