THEIR MAJESTIES VISITED THE CANADIAN PAVILION—THE KING AND MR. FISHER.

Dublin, July 11.—The first day of the visit to Ireland of King Edward and Queen Alexandra was a great success.

After this function the royal pair returned to Kingston in a motor car, being greeted everywhere with hearty demonstrations of goodwill.

ORANGEMEN ORDERED NOT TO PARADE.

Forbidden to March in Buckingham on 12th.

PROCLAMATION ISSUED BY THE MAYOR—TROOPS ARE IN READINESS FOR TROUBLE.

Buckingham, Que., July 11.—The following proclamation issued yesterday by Mayor W. H. Kelly, and large posters, with the following words, were posted in conspicuous places in different parts of the town:

PROCLAMATION. Whereas, in the interest of the peace and welfare of our community, it is urgently necessary to suppress all party displays within the town of Buckingham; it is hereby strictly forbidden to hold or take part in any assembly or gathering in the streets of this town for the purpose of forming into a procession, or of parading or making any ceremony, on the 12th day of July inst., under the penalties of the law concerning unlawful assemblies.

Given at the Town Hall of Buckingham, this 10th day of July, 1907. W. H. KELLY, Mayor.

The Mayor says he received the affidavits of two responsible citizens that trouble would likely ensue should the Orangemen be permitted to march in the town on July 12, and he had acted accordingly. He refused to give the names of the makers of the affidavits, as it would serve no good end. The Mayor was in Ottawa and saw Col. Hodgins and arranged, he says, with him to have two companies of troops in readiness to come here at a long time, attended the late Queen Victoria and others of the Royal Family, died yesterday. London, July 11.—Sir William Henry Broadbent physician-in-ordinary to the King and the Prince of Wales, and who for a long time attended the late Queen Victoria and others of the Royal Family, died yesterday. He was born in 1825.

BURGLARS CRACK BANK SAFE.

Carry Off \$3,280 From St. Croix.

VAULT WAS BLOWN OPEN—A REWARD OF \$500 IS OFFERED FOR THE ARREST.

St. Croix, Que., July 11.—At an early hour yesterday morning, presumably between 1 and 2 o'clock, burglars gained entrance to the Provincial Bank, and succeeded in carrying off a sum of \$3,280. Against this loss the bank is insured in the American Guarantee Company, which will offer a reward of \$500 for the arrest of anyone implicated in the affair. Provincial Government detectives are already working on the case.

ENTRANCE WAS GAINED BY WAY OF THE FRONT DOOR OF THE BANK, WHICH THE BURGLARS MANAGED TO BREAK OPEN, AND THEN THEY PROCEEDED TO OPERATE ON THE BIG VAULT WITH DYNAMITE, AND SUBSEQUENTLY GOT INTO THE SAFE THAT WAS INSIDE, WHERE THEY SECURED THE MONEY.

NO ONE SLEEPS ON THE BANK PREMISES, BUT A NOISE, NOW SUPPOSED TO HAVE BEEN MADE BY THE EXPLOSION OF THE DYNAMITE, WAS HEARD BY SLEEPERS NEXT DOOR, BUT NOTHING WAS THOUGHT OF AT THE TIME, AND IT WAS NOT UNTIL ABOUT FOUR O'CLOCK THAT THE BURGLARY WAS DISCOVERED.

IT WILL ALSO BE REMEMBERED THAT JUST A YEAR AGO THIS WEEK, THE NAME OF HOWARD WAS VERY PROMINENT IN JUDICIAL CIRCLES, WHEN THE PRISONER'S BROTHER, FOREST HOWARD, WAS SHOT AT GLEN BARRINGTON, BY MRS. TRACEY, WHO WAS IMMEDIATELY ACQUIT BY DISTRICT MAGISTRATE MULVANA, ON THE PLEA OF SELF-DEFENCE.

THE COMPLAINT IN THE PRESENT CASE IS EMILY GIBB, WHOSE TESTIMONY BEFORE JUSTICE LADD, YESTERDAY, WAS AS FOLLOWS, IN PART: I HAVE KNOWN THE PRISONER SINCE HE WAS FIRST CONVICTED, MONTHS AGO WHEN ON AN ADVERTISEMENT TO BE EMPLOYED AS HOUSEKEEPER, THE ACCUSED CAME TO SEE ME, AND XANTED TO MARRY, WHICH I REFUSED.

HE WENT TO COWANSVILLE, NEAR WHERE HE LIVED, AND THEN TO RICHMOND BY TRAIN. WE WERE MARRIED BEFORE D. W. CARPENTER, JUSTICE OF THE PEACE, WHO GAVE ME A CERTIFICATE, WHICH I NOW POSSESS, AND WE CAME BACK TO LIVE AT FARNHAM, GLEN, IN THE EAST PART OF THE TOWNSHIP OF FARNHAM. SHORTLY AFTER, I HEARD BY MEMBERS OF THE ACCUSED'S FAMILY, THAT HE HAD A WIFE LIVING IN THE STATES, ALTHOUGH HE HAD TOLD ME THAT HE WAS A WIDOWER.

THE BIGAMY CASE AT SWEETSBURG.

Prisoner Who Escaped Brought Back to Sweetburg.

Sweetburg, July 11.—(Special.)—As reported in yesterday's Record, Albert Howard, charged with bigamy, who escaped from officers here, was captured yesterday morning, by the High Constable, on the train near Richmond.

YESTERDAY MORNING, ALBERT HOWARD ARRIVED BY THE EARLY TRAIN, UNDER THE KEEPING OF HIGH CONSTABLE BOJERT AND HIS ASSISTANT, WITH HANDS LOCKED UP BEHIND HIS BACK, A MEASURE OF PRECAUTION CONSIDERED NECESSARY ON ACCOUNT OF HIS PREVIOUS ESCAPES, NOT ONLY THIS WEEK, BUT HE HAD ONE FLED FROM THE HANDS OF THE LATE HIGH CONSTABLE N. GALE.

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THE TREATMENT OF THE INSANE.

Ontario to Study Systems in Europe.

Toronto, July 11.—(Special.)—The Provincial Government has appointed Hon. Dr. Willoughby, minister without portfolio, Dr. C. K. Clarke and Dr. Edward Ryan, medical superintendents respectively, of Toronto and Kingston Asylums, as a commission to examine into and report upon systems followed in Germany and France in the treatment of the insane.

DRS. CLARKE AND RYAN ALREADY HAVE STARTED FOR EUROPE, AND HON. DR. WILLOUGHBY, IT IS UNDERSTOOD, LEAVES AT THE END OF THIS WEEK. THIS MOVE IS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE INTENTION OF THE GOVERNMENT, AS STATED DURING LAST SESSION OF LEGISLATURE, TO ADOPT MORE MODERN SYSTEMS THAN NOW PREVAILING, IN THIS COUNTRY, IN RESPECT TO THE TREATMENT OF MENTAL DISEASES.

POPULATION OF THE DOMINION.

An Increase of Over 1,100,000 Since 1901.

ESTIMATE MADE AT OTTAWA—NOW 6,504,900.

Ottawa, July 11.—A careful estimate of Canada's population, made by the Bureau of Census and Statistics, based on immigration returns since last census and the normal natural increase in population, shows that on April 1st last, the total population was 6,504,900, an increase of 1,135,585 since the decennial census of 1901. If the same rate of increase is maintained until 1911 the decennial census of that year will show a population of over ten and one-half millions.

HAIL STORM TERRIFIC.

STONES WEIGHING OVER TWO OUNCES FELL IN AMELIASBURG TOWNSHIP.

Belleville, Ont., July 11.—Princes Edward County was Tuesday afternoon visited by one of the most terrific hail storms experienced for years.

THE STORM WAS PARTICULARLY SEVERE IN THE SECOND AND THIRD CONSECTIONS OF AMELIASBURG TOWNSHIP, WHERE HUNDREDS OF DOLLARS WORTH OF DAMAGE WAS DONE. NEARLY ALL THE WINDOWS ON THE WEST SIDE OF THE RESIDENCES WERE BROKEN, AND AS ALL THE WINDOWS ON THE WEST SIDE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN THE VILLAGE. MANY VALUABLE WINDOWS IN VICTORIA CHURCH, SOME MILES FROM THE VILLAGE, WERE DESTROYED.

STUNNED BY LIGHTNING. Colborne, Ont., June 11.—A heavy storm passed over here accompanied by rain and hail, some of the hailstones measuring four and a half inches in circumference, and breaking windows. Lightning struck and damaged a dwelling at the station, and a house at Lake Port. In both instances the inmates were stunned.

KNOCKED OVER DISHES. St. John, N.B., July 11.—During a heavy storm, which passed over this district Tuesday, a yacht lying at anchor at Westfield was struck by lightning, and the main mast splintered. The vessel entered the kitchen of Fred Walters' house at Westfield, where members of the family were seated. Dishes were knocked over, but no one was injured.

SIX YOUNG MEN DROWNED. PLEASURE BOAT CAPSIZED IN PENOBSCOT BAY.

Bangor, Me., July 10.—Six young men of a party of seven were drowned in Penobscot Bay late yesterday by the capsizing of a sloop. The dead are: Harry Dugan, 18, of Bangor, sophomore in Bowdoin College; Amos Robinson, 17; Raymond Smith, 19; Roy Palmer, 19; Frederick Kingswell, 19, all of Bangor; Fred D. Vague, 21, of South Brooksville.

SIX BANGOR BOYS RECENTLY WENT TO HERSHEY RETREAT, AT SANDY POINT, TO SPEND THE SUMMER. MONDAY THEY WERE INVITED BY VAGUE TO TAKE A SAILED SLOOP WAS STRUCK BY A FIERCE AND SUDDEN SQUALL, AND WAS CAPSIZED.

LAURENCE D. HALL, OF BANGOR, ONE OF THE PARTY WAS RESCUED BY A TUG. THE OTHERS SANK. NONE OF THE BODIES HAVE BEEN RECOVERED. THE VICTIMS WERE MEMBERS OF PROMINENT FAMILIES.

TOOK A FOOL'S ADVICE. Cornwall, July 11.—George Price, of Cornubrook, not far from Massena, N. Y., across the river from here, is dead as the result of eating Paris green. Price found a package of the poison, and it is said asked a neighbor what to do with it. The neighbor replied jokingly to eat it, as it was good for him. Price ate a quantity of the poison, and upon reaching home he told what he had done, and physicians were sent for, but before their arrival the man was dead.

LACHINE ADOPTS BY-LAW. Property owners in Lachine Tuesday voted on the proposed by-law to borrow \$50,000 for the extension of the waterworks and for sewerage and sidewalk purposes. At the close of the poll it was found that the by-law had been adopted by a majority in property value of \$380,000.

A WOLF SEEN AT CASTLEBAR.

Castlebar, July 11.—(Special.)—A wolf was seen recently in Mr. A. Pope's field. The animal disappeared in the woods and has not been heard from since.

SCHOOL CONTEST AT BURY. Bury, July 11.—(Special.)—At the election of School Commissioners on Monday, Mr. Alex. McLeay and Mr. J. H. Learned were elected, after a close contest.

HORSE KILLED BY LIGHTNING. Frost Village, July 11.—(Special.)—During a severe electric storm Tuesday afternoon, Mr. Forand, the proprietor of the skimming station, had his horse struck by lightning and instantly killed in his barn. The bolt did no damage to the barn.

LIGHTNING AT CASTLEBAR. Castlebar, July 11.—(Special.)—During the storm on Monday night, electricity struck Mr. H. Sparks' barn, containing this as far as the horse was concerned. It also struck a board fence nearby where a horse was tied. The horse broke loose and fell down, but soon recovered.

ONLY A SMASHED BUGGY. Peareton, July 11.—(Special.)—While Mr. Ernest Lamoreaux, of North Starbridge was driving through here, Saturday night, his horse took fright at an umbrella-top wagon, and became quite unmanageable. It succeeded in smashing Mr. Lamoreaux's carriage up and in quick time, fortunately, Mr. Lamoreaux escaped any injuries.

RUN INTO BY AUTO. Waterloo, July 11.—(Special.)—Mr. Lagasse, of Frost Village, met with quite a severe accident on Sunday last by being run into by an automobile. The horse got frightened, upsetting the wagon which contained Mr. Lagasse and two small children. The wagon was very badly broken up and the children narrowly escaped being killed.

SUNDAY TRAFFIC.

CASE AGAINST THE G. T. R. FOR UNNECESSARY MOVING OF TRAINS.

Toronto, July 11.—A case has been brought against the Grand Trunk Railway for breach of the Lord's Day Act by unnecessary moving of trains at Little Park Station on Sunday, the specific date mentioned being April 21. The charge came before Magistrate Ellis at East Toronto Tuesday morning.

Mr. H. S. Osler, K. C., attorney for the defendant, asked for two weeks' time to prepare his answer to the specific charges. County Crown Attorney Drayton and the magistrate consented to this, as it is a test case, and the hearing was deferred to next Wednesday, to be further adjourned one week, unless the defence is ready by that date.

PREMIER WHITNEY OFF FOR ENGLAND.

Goes on Public Business Which, However, He Keeps Private.

Toronto, July 11.—(Special.)—Premier Whitney leaves this afternoon for New York, where he will on Saturday by steamer Campana of Cunard Line, for England.

It reached Stanstead Plain and ran on to the sidewalk in front of the college, containing this as far as the horse's residence. Here the meat was thrown out. A turn was then made across the street, colliding with a telephone pole, in front of the Methodist church, where it left wagon and part of harness.

It began to kick and pretty well demolished the balance of the wagon, and was finally caught by Rev. C. S. Clendinning.

John B. Brunden, who admits 101 years, has left his home in Tate Springs, Tenn., for London, where he will meet his bride to be, Miss Rosa McGuire, who has just turned her century mark. Together they will journey back to the little town in Tennessee, where they will be married before an assemblage of 125 "boys and girls," the youngest of whom is merely three years old.

In 1822 Brunden and Miss McGuire, who lived on adjoining farms in Tennessee, became sweethearts. They were parted when the girl's parents decided to abandon their new home in America and return to the one they left in England.

Brunden went to California long before the gold rush of '49. He thrived, and spent a fortune hunting for Miss McGuire. Until recently his search was fruitless.

QUEBEC RINK DAMAGED BY FIRE. Quebec, Que., July 11.—(Special.)—A general alarm called out the fire brigade for a blaze which broke out in the roller skating rink adjoining the St. Louis hotel. POLITICAL CHANGE OF MUCH INTEREST.

LA PATRIE ANNOUNCES THAT HENRI BOURASSA, M.P., WILL RESIGN FROM COMMONS.

La Patrie gives currency to the following: "During the next few days, there will be sensation in the world of politics, if a serious rumor which has reached our ears is well founded, and as those best informed pretend.

"According to what has just come out, Mr. Henri Bourassa, M.P. for Labrador, will abandon his federal seat shortly to enter the provincial arena.

"Mr. Bourassa has always paid particular attention to affairs in the Province of Quebec, to the question of colonization among others. He has often criticized the methods of administration up to the present in force.

"To-day he is credited with the intention of going on the stump for the next provincial elections, which are persistently announced for next autumn.

"It is stated that the member for Labelle has numerous followers. He will direct a third party absolutely independent, but no wise connected with the two existing parties.

"In most of the provincial counties, representatives of the new party will enter the lists as candidates.

"Mr. Bourassa's programme is not yet exactly known, but the political leanings of the M. P. for Labelle are generally understood. He is generally understood to be a representative of La Patrie, as to the rumor, Mr. Bourassa said that he had nothing to say at the moment.

"He will speak at Montmagny, Saturday next, July 13th, at a large meeting called by Mr. Armand Lavergne."

ULTIMATE WORK FOR EMPIRE.

LORD STRATHCONA'S INTEREST IN ALL-RED SCHEME SO DESCRIBED.

London, July 11.-The Yorkshire Herald's correspondent here states that the Government will be only too glad to seize on the reported withdrawal of Australia from the All-Red scheme as an excuse for a refusal to participate.

Lord Strathcona, however, is striving to attain success in a manner which seems to indicate that he intends the scheme to be his ultimate work for the Empire.

DAILY MARKET NEWS

DAIRY PRODUCE. Montreal, July 10th. Owing to the downward trend of the cheese prices in the country, the local market is easier in tone. We quote Ontario, colored, 11c to 11 1/2c, and white at 11c to 11 1/2c, while East Angles are quoted at 10 1/2c to 11c.

The local butter market is steady under a continued good local demand, with finest Townships quoted at 20c to 21c, and undergrades at 20c to 20 1/2c. Receipts to-day were 914 packages.

Campbellford, Ont., 9.-One thousand and four hundred cheese offered: 1, 152 boxes sold at 11c, and 60 boxes at 10 1/2-16c, balance refused at 10 1/2-16c.

Stirling, Ont., July 9.-Nine hundred and five boxes of cheese offered: 65 sold at 11c; balance refused at 10 1/2-16c.

Since, Ont., July 9.-At the meeting of the cheese board to-day, 535 boxes of colored and 150 white were offered; all sold at 11c.

COUNTRY PRODUCE. Montreal, July 10th. There was no actual change in the local egg situation, but the feeling in the market is better. Supplies are still coming forward freely and stocks on spot are fairly large, while the demand is chiefly for local consumption.

Round lots of No. 1 stock are quoted at 16c, and small parcels are selling at 17c to 18c per dozen.

There continues to be a fair enquiry for beans from outside sources and the tone of the market is firm with sales of three-pound pickers in round lots at \$1.40 to \$1.45 per bushel, and small quantities at \$1.50 per bushel.

A fair trade is passing in potatoes and as supplies are limited prices are still steady. Quebec potatoes are selling at \$1.10 to \$1.15 per 90 lbs. on track, and at \$1.20 to \$1.25 in a jobbing way, while red stock in car lots, bring \$1 to \$1.05 on track, and \$1.15 to \$1.20 in a jobbing way.

The demand for maple product continues slow and the market is dull with no change in prices to note. Syrup is quoted at 6c per lb., nuts, 5c and 5 1/2c per lb. in wood; maple sugar, 7c to 8c.

The market for honey is still quiet, the demand being only for small lots. We quote as follows: White clover, comb, 12c to 15c; white extracted, 11 1/2c to 12c; buckwheat, comb, 9c to 10c, and buckwheat, 8c to 9c per lb.

BAR-ROOM MURDER AT NIAGARA FALLS.

Edward Little, known as "Big Ed," the Victim.

SEVERAL ARE ARRESTED AS BEING IMPLICATED.

Niagara Falls, N.Y., July 11.-As a result of a bar-room brawl, Edward Little, more familiarly known as "Big Ed," is dead, and Harry Daly, Patrick Mooney, George Hillman, Jr., Thomas Donahue and three Negroes, one a waiter and the other two, women, are under arrest.

Daly is directly charged with murder of Little, and others are held as accessories or witnesses.

DOUBLE MURDER IN BUFFALO.

Restaurant Proprietor and a Waitress Killed.

STABBED BY A MAN WHO WAS INTERESTED IN THE LATTER.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 11.-(Special.)-Peter Forrestal, a well known sporting man, and Marie Smith, waitress in his saloon restaurant, were murdered early today.

George Hodson, a painter, is accused of the crime.

The Smith woman formerly lived with Hodson, and he refused to leave Forrestal's place at the alleged cause of the double murder. Hodson was arrested a few minutes after the crime was committed. He was covered with blood, but declared that he had no recollection of what occurred.

Forrestal was sitting in front of his saloon when it is alleged Hodson rushed up and stabbed him with a butcher's knife. Forrestal sank to the ground and his assistant again plunged the nine inch blade of the knife into his body. Hodson it is alleged, then rushed upstairs to Marie Smith's room. She was being asked but was awakened by the bursting open of the door. As she sprang from bed, Hodson, it is alleged, stabbed her twice inflicting terrible wounds.

Forrestal died in five minutes. The woman was taken to a hospital, where she died on the operating table.

WOULD TAKE THE PHILIPPINES.

JAPAN WOULD ALSO CAPTURE THE HAWAIIANS, SAYS A U. S. CONGRESSMAN.

Des Moines, Ia., July 11.-"Neither Japan nor the United States wants a war at this time," said Congressman J. A. T. Hull Monday. "There is a big element in Japan who would welcome war, but the ruling classes are too wise to pick a quarrel with the United States."

"If there is war, we will at first lose the Philippines and the Hawaiian Islands, but we would triumph in the end for the United States would build warships and fight out a victory. We conduct the only nation which can conduct a war and get rich at the same time."

Akron, Ohio, July 11.-The Sterling Company at Braberton is in receipt of an urgent request from Washington to push to completion as rapidly as possible the boilers for the battleships of the navy. The navy will be run day and night until the boilers are completed.

HOTEL KEEPERS SHOULD TAKE A NOTE OF IT.

The imprisonment of the Metcalfe hotel man convicted for a second time of having sold liquor in a local option district simply follows the law. The merits of the law are not in issue. The law is on the statute book and must be enforced. Hotel keepers in other local option districts would avoid much trouble if they kept this exemplary case in mind.-Ottawa "Journal."

RIFLES ARE DEFECTIVE?

A COMPLAINT IN REGARD TO ARMS FOR THE MOUNTED TROOPS.

Regina, Sask., July 11.—Among the men of the 16th Mounted Rifles, or at least among those of the squadron located in Regina, it is stated that the firearms provided by the Dominion Government are unsafe, and should not be allowed in actual range practice. The rifles are of the pattern tested at the Mounted Police Barracks some time ago and condemned. When range practice was tried for the first time by the police, it was found that the lock was unsafe, and in one case a trooper was injured by the blowing out of the lock. Since that time the Mounted Police have gone back to the old Lee-Metford rifle for range and target work, and the others are used only on parade.

Now that the C.M.R. squadron has been formed in Regina, a consignment of rifles has been sent up, and it is intended that they shall be used by the citizen soldiery. A test was made the other day, and it was found that the powder blows through the lock, and that it is impossible to say what amount of damage might be done were the use of the rifle continued. It is possible that an attempt will be made to secure about twenty Lee-Metford rifles for target and range practice, and the C.M.R. will use the others for parade work only.

The cadets of the High School corps use only Lee-Metford rifles in their range practice. The rifle club uses the same arm.
