## Rev. R. B. Keefe Will Succeed Canon Oliver

Rev. R. B. Keefe, L.Th., Church in Sillery, a suburb of Quebec City, will succeed Canon Gilbert Oliver, L.Th., M.C. as rector of St. Matthias Anglican Church; it was announced last Sunday.

Canon Oliver's retirement early in the New Year will climax 42 years in the ministry, of which 28 have been spent as rector of St. Matthias Anglican Church. He has been active in many charitable causes both as chaplain and as a service club member.

Rev. Keefe, Canon Oliver's successor, was ordained in the Montreal diocese following his graduation from the British Columbia Anglican College in 1941. Until he joined the Canadian Army as chaplain in 1944, he was assistant at the Church of the Ascension.

In 1946 he became assistant at Christ Church Cathedral and in 1948, rector at Sutton. About two years ago he succeeded Rev. Charles C. Campbell, now rector of St. Phillips Church, as rector of St. Michael's Church at Sillery.

Rev. Keefe will take up his new duties at St. Matthias on Feb. 1st.

Whoever is caught napping by old man winter, it isn't going to be the Westmount Roads Department. City Engineer, J. R. Day, reports that his snow removal crews are all ready to swing into action the moment the beastly stuff appears.

The addition of a new snow blower, and another cinder-spreader unit, brings snow removal equipment to a total of 5 snow blowers, 10 road plows of various sizes, including a grader, 12 sidewalk plows, 2 front end loaders and 2 cinder-spreaders. Actually there are 6 snow blowers, but one being too small for general road work, is used for in front of buildings, in parks, and on skating rinks where a large blower can't maneuver.

Westmount covers an area of 976 acres, has 32 miles of streets, and 62 miles of sidewalks. Altogether this gives the equipment 94 miles of plowing which shouldn't prove too difficult providing the snow isn't dumped on us one foot at a time.

The greatest difficulty in plowing is the parked car. Naturally the plows have to go around it and plow it in. When it is towed out, it drags a lot of snow with it, and somebody has to go back and clean up. Winter parking restrictions should minimize this sort of thing though, and with a little co-operation from residents, it should be almost negligible.

Garbage cans present another hazard to snowplows, particularly the blowers. These machines apparently, are equipped with sharing pins, and when they strike an object which will not go through the cutting rotors, the pin shears off and the machine is tied up for a day or so until it can be replaced. And guess whose money is being spent while it's tied up? That's right!

## 'Negative' Wins In Local Gambling Debate

### 'Moral Defeat' Vital Point, 2 Judges Agree At Session By Current Events Group

Current Events Club of Westmount Senior High School this week debated: "Lotteries should be legalized in Canada". Three teachers judged the debate which was attended by club members. Julie Adams and Barry Shiller were a strong affirmative, and tested their powers against Sharon Miller and Jim Boake.

Barry Shiller broke the ice by dramatizing the feeling of hope and expectancy enjoyed by the otherwise pessimistic. He accentuated the beneficial role played by certain organizations in sponsoring fresh-air camps, building of parish halls through raffles. He suggested a well-run, honest lottery, as opposed to speculating on the stock market.

Sharon Miller felt the feeling of expectation associated with lotteries was juvenile. She described the moral value of contributing "from the heart", insisted lotteries harm 'weak' people who may become addicted to gambling. She claimed the legalization of lotteries invites corruption.

Julie Adams, began by stating the purpose and essence of a lottery. She developed Barry Shiller's argument on the moral loss in types of market speculation. A brief history of lotteries and their useful functions illumina-

ted this argument. Many worthy institutions, she said, depend on lotteries. In a vote any Canadian districts which were tested, approved lotteries.

Jim Boake made a strong sally against those who say that gambling, a natural human trait, is acceptable. Cruelty and other human, harmful traits are frowned upon, he said. Why not, he asked, stop gambling here? He demonstrated how lotteries distract interest from private donations and diminish private charity. He mentioned that lotteries invite corruption... are against the law. He said that only 18 per cent of money received from lotteries goes to the attested organizations.

In Barry Shiller's one-minute rebuttal he stressed lotteries are a "good way of attracting great sums to charity."

The judges, by a split decision of two to one, decided that the negative side were the winners. The principal weakness in the affirmative side was said to be their failure to answer the moral defect in gambling as brought out by the negative.

Barry Shiller was especially complimented by the judges.

**Rev. Miles Kelly,  
Ascension Parish,  
Is Heard on Radio**

The Christian's charitable obligation to aid the souls in Purgatory was explained in a radio talk Sunday afternoon by Rev. Miles Kelly, assistant at the Church of the Ascension of Our Lord, Westmount.

Speaking on The Catholic Hour program over station C.J. A.D., Father Kelly said, in part:

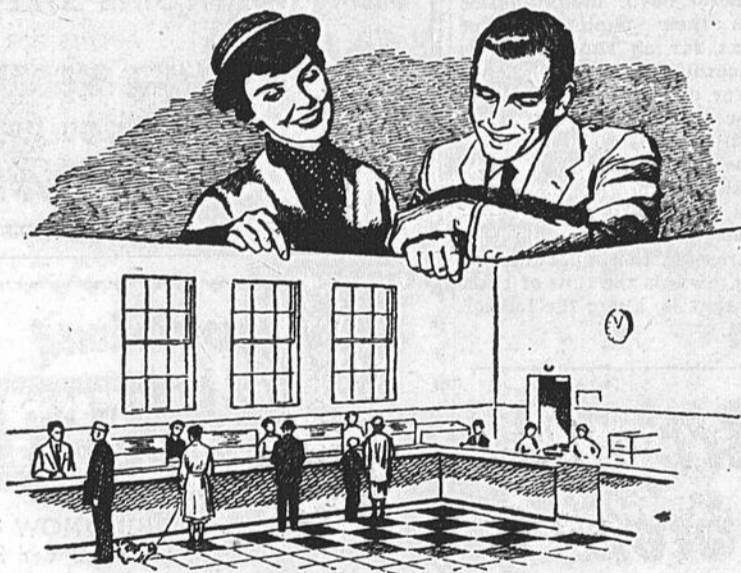
"The Church teaches that as in this world there are different states, so there are different states in the other world as well. We are taught that the state of any individual in the world to come depends precisely on the condition of his soul when death has called him to the judgment seat of God.

"With this in mind the Catholic World holds that besides Heaven and Hell there is a third state or place where some souls suffer for a time before entering heaven and this place is called Purgatory, where venial sins are wiped out or where complete satisfaction is made to Infinite Justice for mortal sin not completely atoned for.

"Souls in the purifying flames of Purgatory have passed beyond the realm of merit and so are helpless to lessen the penalty for sin. We, on earth, being bound to them by the mystic bonds of the Communion of Saints, can help them to shorten their period of privation and suffering by the infallible means of offering the Holy Mass for them, by praying for them, by indulgences gained for them.

Beginning a new series called "Some Modern Saints," Rev. Norman F. Griffin, of St. Willibrord's Parish, will tell the story of Pope Pius X, on this Sunday's Catholic Hour broadcast at 2:05 p.m.

# Greenhouse Riot Of Color For Annual 'Mums' Event

3,949 chrysanthemus are on display at the Annual Fall Chrysanthemum Show being held at Westmount Park this week and next. Mayor J. A. deLalanne of Westmount opened the show which has been an annual feature of the Parks Department since 1928.

Along with "mums" on display in the grass-domed conservatories of Westmount Park is an advance showing of cyclamen, usually a part of the Christmas display; African violets; a banana plant in fruit; sugar cane and a Bird of Paradise in bloom. Before the opening of the show on Friday evening a reception was held at Victoria Hall, where Mayor deLalanne welcomed guests and presented trophies and prizes to winners of the

children's gardening competition. This competition was inaugurated in 1949 for fourth and fifth grade pupils of the district's elementary schools. Each student is given a plant to pot each spring and instructed in cultivating it. Those with the best plants in the fall receive prizes.

Outstanding schools this year are Roslyn, which was awarded the Mayor J. S. Cameron Trophy, and King's, which received the Alderman R. Panet-Raymond Trophy.

First prize, Catherine Froud, King's; 2nd prize, Marcella Maher, St. Paul's Academy; 3rd prize, Alain Brousseau, St. Leo's Academy; 4th prize, Marilyn Brownstein, Roslyn; 5th prize, Marilyn Pollock, Queen's; special prize, Joanne Taylor, Roslyn.

### Communists Pay New Attention To Canada Now

The official Communist weekly known as "For a Lasting Peace, For a People's Democracy" is published in Bucharest in many languages. The issue for September

23 gives the Canadian Communists unusual prominence.

Under the heading "National Committee Meeting of Labor-Progressive Party of Canada", there is an account of "a recent plenary meeting of the National Committee of the Labor-Progressive Party".

Tim Buck is reported as stating that, as a result of Geneva, tensions have so relaxed that "the members of the L.P.P. now have new opportunities to build the Party". So the L.P.P. adopted a "Plan of Work to build the Party and extend the circulation of the press."

"Bold participation in the forthcoming municipal elections" was forecast. This article in the Communist world weekly is unmistakable evidence that Canada has become a main object in the new campaign to complete the eviction of freedom from this planet.

## The Church II

With the Covenant at Mount Sinai "the Church that was in the wilderness" was founded. It had its Torah — its Law — its Way of Life. It remained for it to grow according to the will of God. For it is one thing to found a society, a very different thing to train it. It might be said that Alfred the Great founded an Anglo-Saxon-Danish State, but he still had to provide a training for it. So through Moses God established His people — "the Church that was in the wilderness" and then its training began.

The training followed two lines: the way in which the people were to deal with God, and the way in which they were to deal with one another: their duty towards God, and their duty towards their neighbour. The training was long and hard. First they had to learn that Jehovah alone was their God, and required their whole worship; they must not go after the so-called gods of Canaan. Then they must learn the character of God, and that took still longer. That training was largely the work of the prophets who taught their people that God is righteous, holy, loving, majestic; in fact, that there is no noble adjective that is not to be applied to Him.

Then there came the two hardest lessons of all. The first is that because God is holy and loving His people must be of the same character. The second is that they must manifest that same character to one another. The two fundamental laws were the same which our Lord quoted: "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God," and, "Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself." But they were not new laws when they were delivered to the Children of Israel. They are the fundamental laws of the human race. Men have always known that they must love God; that is, set their minds to Him. They have always known that they must love their neighbour; that is, set their minds to their neighbour for his good. They have always known that they must protect one another. There was nothing new there; what was new was the reason given for observing the law. The reason is the character of God. It is set out most clearly in the nineteenth chapter of Leviticus, one of the great chap-

ters of the Old Testament. The chapter begins: "Ye shall be holy: for I the Lord your God am holy." Then follow the great rules of conduct to God and man. And fifteen times in the one chapter the reason is given: "I am the Lord your God."

From then onwards the Church that had been in the wilderness was being obtained in the knowledge of the character of God, and in the way that knowledge was to affect conduct.

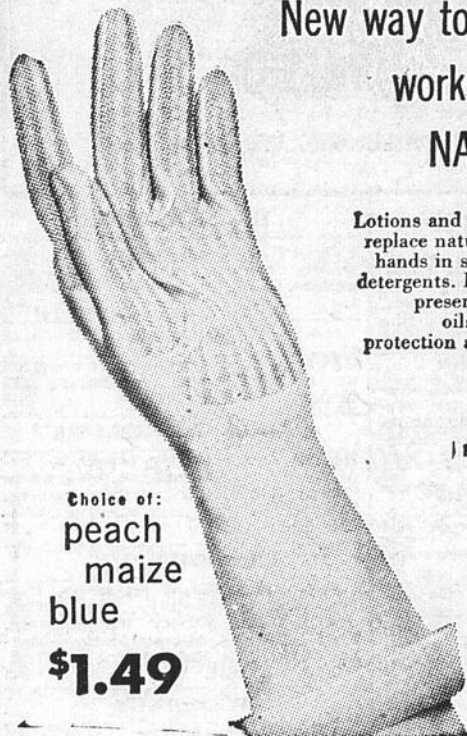

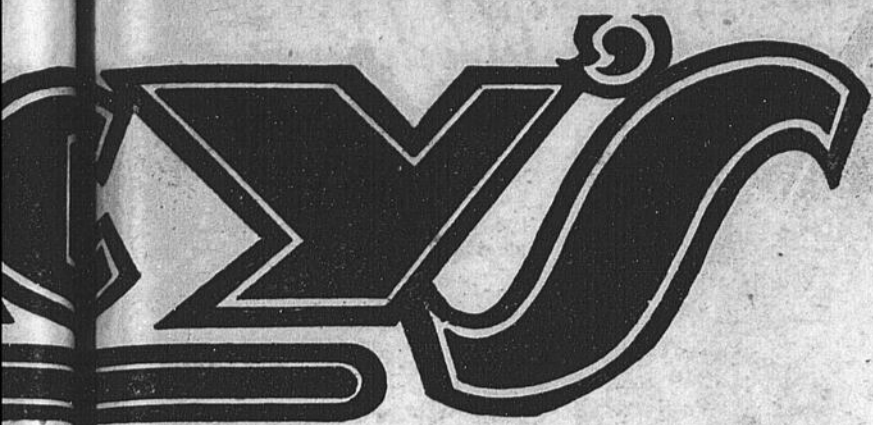

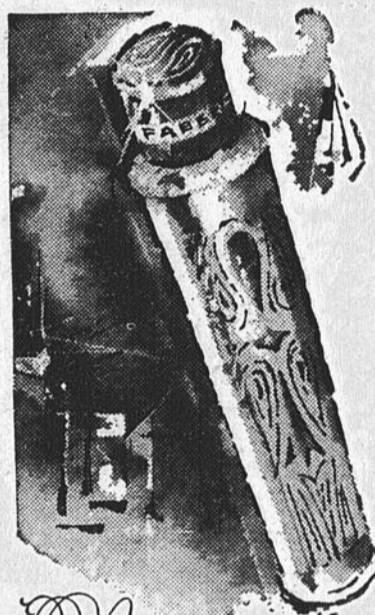

## JJWL Members Plan Food Fair 'Around The World In Foods'

The Jewish Junior Welfare League announces for their only money-raising of the year in the form of a Food Fair and Luncheon to be held at Victoria Hall on Wednesday, November 30. "Around the World in Foods" is to be the theme with a complete selection of delicacies from the kitchens of those expert in French, Hungarian, Chinese, Jewish, German and other cuisines.

Booths will be set up so that cakes, cookies, preserves, pies, meats, etc., all made by members of the League, can be purchased. Flowers, commercially packaged foods and special favorites of the small fry will be also available for sale.

Proceeds from the Food Fair and from the Souvenir Program Book are used to support the many community projects aided by the League. Just recently another school, the Ahuntsic School was added to the list of those which have a hot lunch program sponsored by the League. Other schools to date are the Aberdeen, Strathearn, Connaught and Peace Centennial Schools.

The Jewish Junior Welfare League also provides grants for the education of New Canadians, and needy students at the McGill School of Social Work are also subsidized. Besides these and other grants of money made yearly, the members of the Jewish Junior Welfare League devote tireless hours to hospital clinics, such as those of the Jewish General Hospital, Montreal Children's Hospital, the Reddy Memorial, School for Retarded Children, and the Julius Richardson. Group leaders are trained for service in the YM-YWHA in Snowdon and Davis Buildings. Members of the League do toy-making, make layettes for distribution to needy mothers through the various agencies. Magazines are collected, recovered and distributed to hospitals throughout the city. Volunteers aid in play therapy, and others are soon to teach residents of the Old People's Home the use of knitting machines. Still other girls assist the various fund raising groups in the city by tagging and canvassing. While in addition there are League members staffing the Red Cross Blood Donor clinic.

**Friday Nite Club:** The Friday Nite Club continue to meet every Friday night for social activities. The weekly program

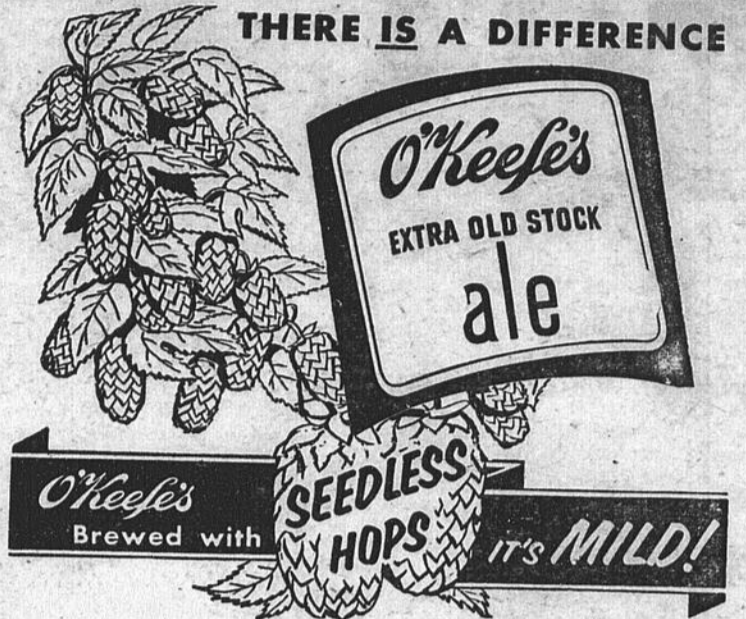
alternates between square and social dancing. Jack Proud is the leader for the square-dancing. The group also attend the Saturday afternoon musical jam sessions.
