AFTERNOON REPORTS.

SERIOUS FIRES IN ENGLAND. CARDINAL MANNING'S ILLNESS. A SENSATION IN BERLIN.

Mr. Spurgeon on "Darkest Russia"—British Warships at Alexandria—Terrible Disaster in the China Sea.

LONDON, Jan. 13.—The number of deaths in London, during the week ending yesterday, was 2,100. This number exceeded the aggregate for each of the preceding weeks.

The Times says that the leaders of the Cabinet in Quebec are fully alive to the fact that their unique position would be irretrievably lost should Canada be annexed to the United States, and probably would sell the work for a high price.

The Times' Vienna correspondent says:—A letter from Vienna, published here, states that most of the French and American men-of-war in Chinese waters have been ordered to withdraw to the Yangtze River.

The Chronicle's correspondent at St. Petersburg says that crime is becoming rampant in towns as well as in the country. A peasant village in the Tula Government, increased by the refusal of a tradesman to give his bread to a starving, drenched man, had been the scene of a massacre.

Mr. Spurgeon, referring to the work "Darkest Russia," writes:—"I had the healthiest of hearts when I read that book. I should be quite unable to express my feelings on reading of Russian intolerance of the Jews and dissenters. That such conduct should be the result of a country bearing the name of Christianity, is as sad as it is strange. The czar is greatly injuring his own country by driving out God's ancient people, the Jews, and persecuting the Christians with impunity. Jehovah is patient, but there was a day for Pharaoh, so is there a time for every oppressor."

Cardinal Manning's illness has been the subject of much speculation. It is reported that he is suffering from a severe cold, and has grown worse rapidly. In the bulletin issued last night, his physical condition is described as being very grave and his recovery, if any, is uncertain.

At the instance of the Bank of Montreal, James F. Healy, soap manufacturer, has assigned for the benefit of his creditors. The liabilities are about \$116,000.

The second annual meeting of the Mining Association of the Province of Quebec opened yesterday in the afternoon, commencing at two o'clock, an open session of the Association was held when a number of papers were read. In the evening the members and guests dined together.

The Marine Department to-day received information of the wreck of the tank steamer "L. S. Prudence" yesterday, off Horn Head, six miles south of Renewa, half-way between the Cape of Good Hope and the Cape of Storms. The steamer was bound for Halifax and was carrying a large cargo of coal.

The British Government has agreed to pay half the cost of surveying the east coast of Antigua. The necessity of the survey has been proved by the immense number of wrecks which have taken place on that coast in recent years.

Shortly after twelve o'clock last night fire broke out in a small wooden house on the corner of St. James Street, owned by Michael O'Brien. It had gained considerable headway before the fire brigade arrived and the building was totally destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$5,000.

Directions have been given to push on every arrangement necessary for the opening of the session with the greatest despatch and it is stated that not a day will be lost in making the first of February is still spoken of.

Lady Stanley has received a telegram from England announcing the death of her brother, Col. Bellers, from gripple.

At Alexandria, Jan. 13.—Six British warships have arrived here and are awaiting the coming of Abbas Pasha, who is due to arrive on Friday.

CAROL, Jan. 13.—The Maanul, a powerful independent Arab party, hitherto opposed to the English occupation of Egypt, has been recruited by the Government. 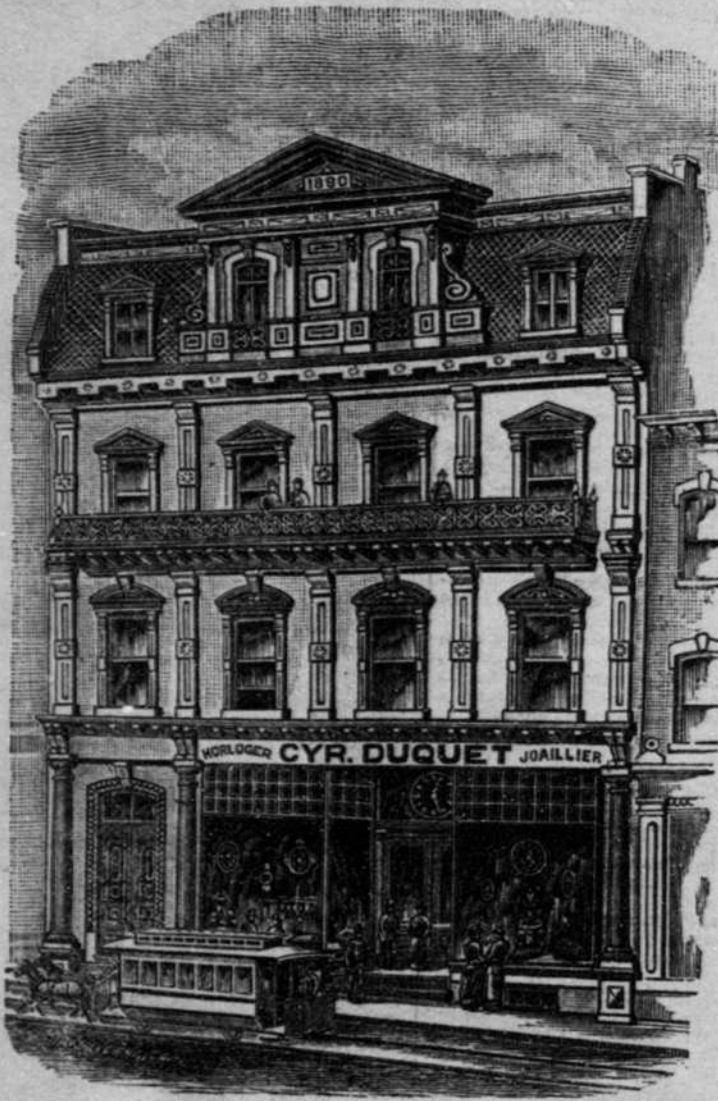
