A Razor-Back Ship. Lying at a private wharf in Alexandria, Virginia, is a new vessel, the first of a new type of vessel intended to revolutionize the ocean carrying trade. It is the work of Mr. Fryer, the designer and builder of the vessel. She is a steamship, and will cross the Atlantic in three-fifths of the time now occupied by the "ocean greyhounds" of commerce.

Mr. Fryer has sought to apply the palcecar idea to ocean travel. He has built a ship which will 222 feet long is only 16 feet beam. Its equilibrium is to be maintained by the use of a counterweight of machinery below the water-line. The narrow prow of such a vessel will cut the water like a knife. The vessel will be reduced to a minimum. The heavy compact machinery will furnish ample power for the single screw, and the little razor-back vessel will cleave through the water at a high speed which will seem incredible at first. All of this, of course, if Mr. Fryer's hopes are realized. The vessel is to be a practical test of the counterweight system. Then the "Howard Casars," as the new ship is called, will be taken to New York. She is expected to appear in the harbor of Alexandria in four to five weeks.

The one drawing of the lottery he proposes to divide as follows:—Two hundred and fifty thousand rubles for himself, 250,000 for his bride, 250,000 for the journal which conducts the lottery, and a 250,000 for the poor of Russia. The Count argues that this will be the lowest price a title—ever paid by any woman for a bona fide title of Countess. He declares that he belongs to one of the oldest families in France, has a comfortable fortune, unimpeachable character, and an unsullied name, and that he will furnish documentary proof of his claims. His fortune, however, he says, is not sufficient for him to live in the requisite fin de siecle style.
