BATTLE OF VERDUN BREAKS OUT WITH UNUSUAL VIOLENCE

Germans Made Good Use of The Respite by Reforming Lines And Advancing Artillery Positions. Fighting Continues as Desperately as Ever, But Situation on Both Sides Remains Unmodified. Russian Advance is Attributed to The Fine Work of the Artillery. Field Fortresses Supposed to Be Impregnable Taken by Assault Despite Latest Scientific Device

Paris, June 13.—(Special)—The battle for Verdun has broken out with unusual violence on the east bank of the Meuse, after the lull following the capture of Fort Vaux. The Germans put the respite to good use. They brought up fresh effective, reformed their lines and advanced their artillery to positions from which they have begun a methodical pounding of the main French defenses, especially the powerful batteries at Tannenberg and Fort Souville. At the same time the French advanced line, which was shattered with shells all day Sunday, has been subjected to a series of fierce onslaughts at Thiaumont Farm, the position on which the French line pivots. The French on their part have not been idle during the past few days. Thiaumont Farm bristles with well-placed machine guns, and the German masses, toiling up the slope which leads to the French positions, have been driven back again and again, while their reserves have been kept copiously showered by sprays of shells from the French batteries at the rear and on the other side of the river.

The fighting continues as desperately as ever, but the situation on both sides remains unmodified so far. The fighting is characterized by eye witnesses as infernal. It is estimated that the Germans used up thirty thousand infantry in assaults on the trenches west of Fort Vaux and at Thiaumont. The attacks followed each other in such close succession as practically to merge one in the other.

PELL MELL FLIGHT OF AUSTRIANS BEFORE RUSSIANS

London, June 13.—(Special)—All the special despatches from Petrograd remark on the fine work of the Russian artillery, to which the recent swift advance is mainly attributed. They contend that the Russian advance proves that the German-constructed fortresses of steel and concrete, which were supposed to be impregnable, can be taken by assault despite all the latest scientific devices. The incomparable Russian guns and mining, says one correspondent, made short work of five-fold fortified lines.

It is reported that in some places where the Austrian preparations were most elaborate the Russians captured twelve lines of entrenchments in rapid succession, while armored motor cars supplemented the cavalry in pursuit of the retreating force. The pursuit was facilitated by the excellence of the roads which the Austrians had constructed for their own transports. Northwest of Tarnopol the Russians employed gas reservoirs captured from the Austrians, "overwhelming the enemy with his own poisonous fumes."

Lutsk was surrounded by nineteen rows of entanglements when the Russians received the order to storm the place at dawn on Wednesday. The issue hung in the balance until noon, then a breach was made in the Austrian position. The town of Dubno, say the despatches, was almost demolished by the Russian artillery fire which preceded its occupation. Before their departure the Austrians removed all the civilians capable of working.

HUNS RENEW ATTACKS ALONG VERDUN FRONT

Paris, June 13.—(Special)—German troops last night renewed the attack over the whole section of the Verdun front west of the Thiaumont farm. They succeeded in entering some advanced trenches at one point, but were repulsed elsewhere. The French War Office announced today. The French trenches penetrated by the Germans are on the opposite side

of Hill 321, to the west of Thiaumont farm.

West of the Meuse there were no important actions during the night. The bombardment was heavy in the region of Chattancourt.

ALLIED FLEETS BOMBARD BULGARIAN COAST

Paris, June 13.—(Special)—A Saloniki despatch to the Radio Agency says that Allied fleets are bombarding the Southern Bulgarian coast from Porto Lagos to Dedagatch. The population is fleeing inland, the despatch says.

RUSS. CAVALRY BROKE UP ENEMY COMMUNICATIONS

London, June 13.—(Special)—A despatch to the Daily News from Petrograd says:

"The story of Lutsk repeated itself with another town far in the Austrian rear, where the garrison, thinking the reports of the Russian advance exaggerated, took no steps until too late. The cannons were heard nearer and nearer in the evening and there was wild panic in the streets, with soldiers running from house to house and shouting, 'The Russians are coming! The Russians are coming!' The officers fled without giving orders. Two companies which attempted to collect their baggage were captured bodily when the Russians poured into the town. Much is due to the Russian cavalry, which destroyed the enemy's communications and broke through to the rear. In some cases they actually met the Austrians in full retreat. One battery of four-inch guns was captured, with shells lying ready for reloading. The guns were swiftly swung about and the shells put into them by the Austrians were sent shrieking after the men who had been loading them."

FRENCH OFFICIAL STATEMENT

Paris, June 13.—(Special)—The French official statement says: "On the left bank of the River Meuse there has been a bombardment in the region of Chattancourt. On the right bank of the river the Germans yesterday evening renewed their attacks along the entire sector to the west of the Thiaumont farm, and they penetrated some of the advanced trenches of our line along the slopes of the east side of Hill 321."

ITALIANS DRIVE BACK THE AUSTRIANS

London, June 13.—South and southeast of Trent, the Italians are continuing to drive back the Austrians, according to Rome. Gains have been made by the Italians in the Arsa Valley and the Pasubio sector, along the Posina-Astico line and southwest of Asiago. Farther north, in the Sugana Valley, fresh progress toward the Mase torrent is recorded for King Victor Emmanuel's men, who repelled two counter-attacks near Scurelle. In the Lagarina Valley the Austrians are heavily bombarding the Italians on Coni Zugna.

IN THE CAUCASUS

A Russian cavalry force of 1000 men operating between the Caucasus and Mesopotamia fronts have been annihilated by the Turks, who also captured a large amount of war material, according to Constantinople. On the remainder of the front in Asia Turkey, there is no change in the situation.

GOVERNMENT ROAD WORK AT EAST FARNHAM

East Farnham, June 13.—(Special)—Work has begun on the Government roads in the corporation here, under the supervision of Mr. John McCall.

RUSSIANS PILE VICTORY ON VICTORY

Austrians Offered No Resistance in Town of Lutsk and Fled Westward

EXTRAORDINARY SCENES WITNESSED WHEN RUSSIAN RESERVES MARCHED INTO TOWN.

London, June 13.—(Special)—The Russians are piling victory on victory, says a Daily News despatch from Petrograd. There is evidence of the Austrians' miscalculation of the Russian strength. The Lutsk environs were heavily fortified, and only fell after a twenty-hour battle, but the Austrians did not expect the fall of the town. It has not suffered, because, after the fortifications were outflanked, the Austrians were utterly nonplussed and, taking to headlong flight, offered no resistance in the town but fled westward with the Russians at their heels.

The Russians entered Lutsk at 8.30 in the evening. The Archduke Frederick had dined there at noon. The Archduke Ferdinand, however, more wary, left the day before. When the pursuers had passed through the town and the Russian reserves marched in to music, extraordinary scenes were witnessed in the streets. Men, women and children threw themselves on the necks of the rescuers, and the whole town cheered.

It is evident that the stories of the Austrian lack of food were not exaggerated. Great stores of wines and spirits were captured, but absolutely no eatables.

The Russian organizations have already opened feeding stations, and these are surrounded by the hungry but pitifully joyful population.

GREEK ARMY DEMOBILIZED

Order Given by King Constantine Follows Blockade of Ports By The Allies

Athens, via London, June 13.—(Special)—King Constantine decided yesterday to order the complete demobilization of the Greek army. The demobilization of the Greek army follows the blockade of the ports of Greece by the Allies and the placing of an embargo on Greek ships in British and French ports.

The steps were taken as a result of the occupation of the Greek fortresses in Macedonia by Bulgaria at the end of May. The Allies were aroused by negotiations which were opened with Bulgaria and Germany by Premier Skouloudis.

TEUTONS TAKEN BY SURPRISE

Russians Succeeded in Concealing Plans For Their New Offensive

MILITARY EXPERT SAYS EVENTS NOW IN PROGRESS MAY MARK TURNING POINT OF WAR.

London, June 13.—(Special)—The military correspondent of the Morning Post discussing the present war situation, says:

"The Russians have shown their usual perspicacity in choosing the time and scene for their new offensive, and their customary adroitness in concealing their plans from the Germans and Austrians who appear to have been taken completely by surprise."

"The country south of the Pripiet marshes has recovered from the flood following the spring thaw and the roads are in tolerable condition. The Germans are deeply committed to their offensive in France and the Austrians to their operations on the Italian frontier. It is difficult for either to desist and to withdraw troops with a view to re-establishing the situation in Russia."

"A month ago the case would have been different. The fragmentary way in which the Germans have brought up reinforcements to Verdun, and the necessity they have been under of denuding other parts of the front, would seem to indicate that they have few reserves left in hand, while the British force in France has been gaining steadily in strength and efficiency."

"The transfer of troops to Russia would not only entail the abandonment of the offensive, but would create the opportunity for which the Allies have been waiting in France. The events now in progress in fact, may mark the turning point in the war."

OFFICER TAKEN FOR REBEL AND SHOT

British Sergeant Charged With Murder of Lieutenant Lucas And Brewery Employee

AN INCIDENT OF THE IRISH REBELLION, HITHERTO KEPT SECRET CAME OUT IN COURT MARTIAL.

Dublin, June 13.—An incident of the Irish rebellion which heretofore has been kept secret, came out at a court martial yesterday. It concerns the shooting by a sergeant of the guard at the Guinness Brewery of his officer and an employee of the brewery, whom he took for rebels. The defendant is Robert Flood of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers. He is charged with the murder of Lieutenant Lucas of King Edward's Horse and William J. Rice, who was employed at the brewery.

The prosecutor explained that Lt. Lucas took over command of the guard on the night of April 28. It was very dark at the time. Lucas was unknown to the sergeant, and when he opened a window, which was contrary to instructions, Flood ordered his arrest, the prosecutor said, and later his execution, as well as that of Rice.

Later Lieutenant Warwick arrived at the brewery and, rushing up toward the guard, was also shot. According to the prosecutor, the guard was very "jumpy."

Some of the commands which Lucas gave were misunderstood by the guard, the prosecutor said, leading him to suspect the lieutenant was not what he represented himself as being. It was too dark to recognize his uniform.

STREET RAILWAY AND THE CITY

Financial Position Prevents Company From Making Extensions And Improvements This Year

PRESIDENT ASKS CITY TO ADVANCE COST ESTIMATED AT \$100,000 FOR FIVE YEARS

The conference expected to take place last night between Mr. C. J. McQuaig, President of the Sherbrooke Railway & Power Co., and the City Council was not held as Mr. McQuaig was not present.

The Secretary-Treasurer read the following letters instead: Sherbrooke Railway & Power Co. Office of General Manager, Sherbrooke, Que., June 12, 1916.

Dear Sir:—I hand you herewith letter to the Mayor and Council of the City of Sherbrooke, from our President, which is self explanatory.

I am further asked to advise you that Mr. McQuaig will be on hand at our office here this evening and should the Council desire his presence, same may be available by telephoning us at 474.

Gentlemen:—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of a letter from your Secretary-Treasurer enclosing report of Special Committee of May 18, 1916, amended by Council June 7, 1916.

I desire to express to the committee and to the Council my appreciation and thanks for their courtesy and their earnest effort to help the company to a final solution of the question at issue.

In order that the Council should fully appreciate the company's position, I enclose the Annual statement for the year ending June 30, 1915, from which you will see that at that date the company had loans of \$20,000.00 from a bank and \$38,862.00 from the firm of McQuaig Bros. & Co., in addition to other current accounts amounting to \$40,916.00 against which it had active assets amounting to about \$48,000.00, only \$21,144 of which was in cash. You will notice also in the Profit and Loss Statement an item of \$5,000.00 charged to capital account against power unsold, the earnings of the company being insufficient to provide for the whole of the bond interest.

No charge has been made by me for my services as President or by Mr. Johnston as Secretary, so all of the earnings of the company have been devoted to its service.

This year, although one of our large customers has not yet resumed business and the early part of the year showed only a slight improvement our net earnings should show an increase of about \$11,000.00 so that the company's position will show a clear surplus.

Next year we expect a substantial improvement over these figures.

You will notice that the statement presented to you has been audited by Messrs. Bryce and Francis.

It may interest the Council to have the following comparative earnings of the Street Railway for the ten months ending April 30, viz.:

Our estimate of the earnings for the complete year is that they should be between \$10,500.00 and \$11,000.00.

It is our expectation that when the extension of the West Ward is complete and the other routes altered to meet changed conditions caused by the rapid growth of the West Ward the whole system will show a satisfactory increase in earnings.

Now owing to the rapid increase in the demand for power throughout the district including the city of Sherbrooke, in order to protect manufacturers who otherwise would have been obliged to curtail their output this summer it became necessary to secure more power and an arrangement was made to purchase all the power the Shawinigan Power Company can deliver over its present transmission line between Victoriaville and Windsor Mills amounting to about 2,000 horse power and a new line between the latter point and Sherbrooke is now under construction and should be in operation about July 15. Some of the poles for this line were, I believe, delivered in Sherbrooke last week.

The company has been obliged to raise additional funds in connection with this new service and the distribution of same, in which it has been generously assisted by several of the manufacturers in this district.

It is, however, I regret to say, impossible for the company to raise any further sums for the extension and improvement of its railway service this year. Certain negotiations are under way, however, which might enable it to do so next year.

I realize, of course, how important it is that the West Ward should be given a car service and also that the City should be in a position to carry out its improvements in Wellington St. and to endeavor to meet the position. I beg to submit the following proposal:

GOVERNMENT CONTROL OF PUBS.

Breweries And Public Houses Will Be Taken Over by State in Carlisle And District

100 WILL BE CLOSED AND STATE BREWED BEER UNDER STATE CONTROL IN OTHERS.

London, June 13.—(Special)—The Chronicle says the Government has decided to purchase, through the Liquor Traffic Control Board, the whole of the breweries and public houses, the latter numbering some 800, in the city of Carlisle and neighborhood. It is understood over a hundred public houses will be closed. At others state-brewed beer will be sold under state control. The Government's action may be repeated in other parts of the country as necessity arises.

HONOR LATE EARL KITCHENER

King George, Queen Mary And Queen Alexandra Attend Memorial Services

London, June 13.—(Special)—Great crowds lined the streets today in the vicinity of St. Paul's Cathedral and stood for hours in the rain awaiting the arrival of King George, Queen Mary and Dowager Queen Alexandra for the memorial services for Field Marshal Earl Kitchener.

The doors of the Cathedral opened shortly after ten o'clock and the vast building was rapidly filled with people who were fortunate to have tickets.

In addition to the services in St. Paul, the memory of the dead soldier was honored by a ceremony in Westminster Abbey, while a third service was held in Canterbury Cathedral.

ACCEPT PROPOSAL OF LLOYD GEORGE

Ulster Unionist Council Authorizes Sir Edward Carson to Negotiate For Settlement

London, June 13.—(Special)—The Daily News says it has received an official statement from Ireland, stating that the Ulster Unionist Council has authorized Sir Edward Carson, the Ulster leader, to negotiate for a settlement of the Irish question on a basis of the proposal of David Lloyd George, but has expressed detestation of Home Rule, and has reserved to itself freedom of action if the negotiations are abortive.

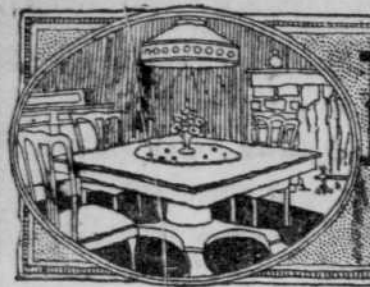
The Battalion is spending thousands of dollars in Sherbrooke; thus the city is to benefit greatly by the stay of the 178th in our midst.

THE ECONOMICAL SQUARE HOUSE

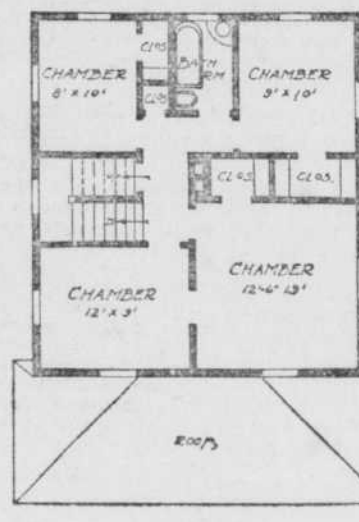
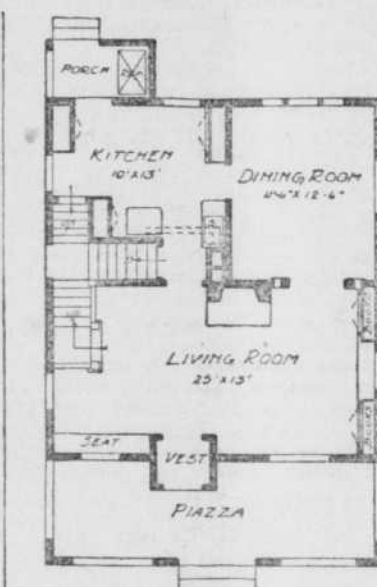
DESIGNED BY CHAS. S. SEDGWICK, ARCHITECT.



THE size of our illustrated square house is 26 ft. in width and 28 ft. in depth. It is of frame construction with concrete foundation, a good full basement and two full height stories, with square hip roof of sufficient height to give good rooms in attic if desired.

The first story is 8 ft. 6 in. in height. The second 8 feet and the basement 7 ft. 6 in. in height. The exterior is designed to be covered with cement stucco to the first story window sills and also the space above the second story window, and the space between to be sided with narrow siding mitred on the outer angles.

The first story is finished in hard wood with oak floor and the second story is in pine and painted and enameled. The plan is conveniently arranged, with a large living room across the front with a wide front piazza and vestibule entrance. The main stairs are at the left end of living room with platforms and combination arrangement, grade entrance and kitchen stairs leading to main platform. There is one central chimney with wide fireplace in living room and flue for furnace. At the right of living room are two book cases with a central window between. The dining room is connected with wide columned arch and the kitchen on the left is provided with ample cupboards, rear porch, etc.



The second story has three good-sized chambers and one small maid's room in the rear over the kitchen. Each of these chambers has a good closet also a linen closet opening in the rear hall, the bathroom also opens out of the rear hall. The attic

stairs extend up over the main stairs and are shut off with a door at the foot. It is estimated to build this snug house complete, without heating or plumbing, for \$2,500 to \$3,500. The roof is shingled and the shingles stained and the outside of house painted a light cream color.

Remarkable Story That Real Francis Joseph Died in 1884

The "Petit Provencal" of Marseilles publishes the following strange story, which is generally believed in Southern France: "A former Austro-Hungarian diplomat who left the service of the Dual Monarchy many years ago and now lives in France states that the present Austrian ruler is an impostor. The real Emperor Francis Joseph died in 1884 after a short illness. He was poisoned, but for political reasons the government and the court kept his death secret. To explain his absence from Schoenbrunn it was reported the monarch had started on a hunting trip in the mountains. Several weeks after the burial of the ruler a Hungarian by the name of Hyjanos, who looked exactly like the dead Emperor, was found and brought to Schoenbrunn. This man played his part to perfection, but he lived only five years. When he died in 1889 another substitute had to be found. "Since that time a dozen old men who look like the original Francis Joseph have been kept in a convent in Bohemia and three of them already have posed as rulers of the Dual Monarchy. The present occupant of the throne of Austria and Hungary is a Bohemian peasant who cannot even read or write." The "Petit Provencal" promises affidavits to prove the story.

Mistaking a thunderclap for the bursting of a bomb, Mrs. Eliza Jane Thurely, sixty-five, dropped into a chair and died. It was stated at the inquest at Hackney.

Forty-three Dublin ammunition box makers were fined half a crown each for striking without notice for a penny an hour increase.

A PEACE RIVER PIONEER

Tells of Rapid Development of the Great West

Mr. M. L. Propst, of Vanrenna, Alberta, who made the first shipment of wheat out of the Peace River country to the Winnipeg market, is one of the pioneers of that great fertile district which now being linked up with the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific by the building of the Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway.

"When grain reached a good price," said Mr. Propst, "I saw where it was possible to haul the grain and just as soon as the steel was laid to end of grade I started my teams. In crossing the Peace River the gorge is some 700 feet deep, and it required doubling on the hill, and it required seven teams to get the heaviest loads up the hill, which is one and one-half miles long. It took seven days for the trip from Vanrenna to Peace River Landing. Though wheat realized about cents per bushel all clear, after expenses were paid.

"For two years our nearest railroad station was Edmonton and all our supplies we were compelled to haul from that point, 500 miles distant, and it had to be done in the winter. Now we have all the modern conveniences here, despite the long transportation by teams of everything. The district is all connected by telephones belonging to a local company. There are several automobiles in the country, of which I own one. This country seems to be more adapted to grain growing than most other parts I have been in, as the crop is sure. I am confident that quality of wheat will get better each year with the development of the country. As it is now, settlers have not had the time to devote to their crop they should on account of long transportation by team and the homestead improvement work to be done."

Peer's Heir Dies

The death of Lord Quenington, the only son and heir of Lord and Lady St. Aldwyn, who was killed at the front, removed the forty-ninth heir to a peerage and the eighth member of the House of Commons since the war began. This is further proof of the willingness with which members of the aristocracy have sacrificed lives in their country's cause. The Earl St. Aldwyn followed his son to the grave within one week of the death of the former. The title, it is understood, became extinct.

CAFE WAITER GAVE UP

Mun Prisoner, Formerly of Paris, Made Dramatic Surrender

A French officer writes: "It was in one of the first line trenches near the Meuse. All day there had been fighting of the most ferocious kind, but now it was night and everything was quiet. Only from the south you could still hear the roar of the incessant artillery duel, and occasionally the stillness of the trench was broken by the explosion of an aerial torpedo, which made the windowpanes of the dugouts rattle. Now and then you heard the soft footsteps of a patrol returning from scout duty between the lines, and the thud of the men as they jumped down into the trench. From time to time a German searchlight searched the sky nervously, but only for a minute or two, then it disappeared and darkness returned.

Suddenly a watcher on a listening post heard a voice whispering in the darkness: "Comrades! Camarades! Je me rends" (Comrades, I surrender). The soldiers in the trench were on the alert, finger on the trigger, ready to fire, but the watcher gave a sign, the voice was very close now, a moment later something heavy tumbled down into the French trench and a man was seen kneeling in the mud wringing his hands. It was a German deserter. Next morning he was presented to me. He looked exceedingly pleased with himself and spoke French like a native, which after all was not so very strange, for one glimpse of his face was enough for me to recognize in him the former head waiter from "Cafe de Paris."

NAMING THE ANTARCTIC

South Polar Regions Cause Much Worry to Scientists

Although the encyclopedias define the name "Antarctica" as synonymous with "the Antarctic regions," or the whole area lying inside the Antarctic circle, no such use of this name is current among geographers, who—following, we believe, Sir John Murray—applying the name "Antarctica" to the supposed Antarctic continent. Dr. Ludwig Mecking has recently urged the claims of "Antarctica" as a more satisfactory name for this continent, especially when it comes to forming a corresponding adjective. "Antarctica" and "Antarctian" are the natural analogues of "Australia" and "Austrian," "Asia" and "Asian," etc. "America" is only an apparent exception, since it did not, of course, originate as a feminine Latin adjective.

FILMS FOR STOKERS

Teach the One Proper Way to Keep Trains Going

A motion picture theatre, on wheels which has been inaugurated by the educational bureau of several railroads for demonstrating fuel economy to stokers and engine drivers. The demonstration coach is equipped with a moving picture machine which throws pictures of the proper and improper firing of locomotives on a screen at one end of the car, and the classes for instruction occupy the regular car seats facing the screen. Some of the pictures show the difference between a stoker firing, where the coal scoop is held tight with both hands and a jerking strain comes on the back each time a shovel of coal is fired, and easy firing, where the scoop is handled properly and the coal is fired with a swing.

The pictures also show the ease with which coal is placed where it is wanted when the scoop is held properly; the proper method of lining up the sides and corners of the fire box, the way in which to turn the scoop to put a fire directly under the door; the proper amount of coal to pick up in the scoop, and the bad results of picking up too much.

Raw cabbage, eaten without any dressing or with salt, olive oil and lemon juice, is recommended by many physicians as an aid to digestion.

Harnessing Volcanoes

Italy's newest product is electric energy from volcanic steam. Not far from the little city of Volterra is a region of volcanic hot springs that for a century have been a source of boric acid, and that in addition supply heat for drying the crystals and for the power needed in preparing the material for market. Borings of 30 feet or 40 feet are said to yield an unfailing supply of steam at pressures up to more than three atmospheres, and of temperatures up to 200 degrees. The steam has been wastefully used. The steam engines of an old, non-condensing type, but in recent experiments the heat of the springs—on account of the impurities contained—is made to generate steam from fresh water, and this is employed in low-pressure turbines for driving electric generators. The large area to be served with electric energy from the earth's own heat, if present expectations are realized, will include the neighboring cities of Volterra, Siena, and Leghorn.

ACTION AGAINST Q.C.R. DISMISSED

Father Sued For Death of Son Who Exploded Torpedo Found on Company's Track

COURT HELD THAT DEFENDANT HAD RIGHT TO USE EXPLOSIVE AND THAT BOY WAS A TRESPASSER.

Mr. Justice Hutchinson rendered judgment this forenoon in the Superior Court in a case which is of considerable interest to the public. It was that of Cyprien Morissette, Thetford Mines, against the Quebec Central Railway Company in which the latter was sued for \$4000 as damages in connection with the plaintiff's minor son. It appears that on the 22nd of June, 1912, Joseph M. Morissette the minor son of the plaintiff was on his way to his work in the mill of the Asbestos Corporation of Canada. In order to get to his work the boy who was accompanied by his brother went by the way of the track of the Quebec Central Railway Company. It was contended by the plaintiff that his son had always taken this route with the consent of the railway authorities and further, that there was no fence forbidding the public to pass on the railway of the company. Young Morissette picked up a "torpedo" used by the defendant company to make signals, but neither the deceased or his brother knew what it was. On arriving at his place of work, young Morissette struck the torpedo with a hammer, which exploded and injured him, seriously that he died three days later. The plaintiff contended that the company was responsible because it had not closed its tracks to the public, and for having allowed to be deposited on its line of railway torpedoes which are very dangerous instruments.

The company defendant denied responsibility and contended that the boy in question had no right to be on the railway track, and that if the boy came to his death as a result of the explosion of an instrument known as a torpedo, it was the fault of the boy and not of the company. The company had no notice of the fact that the boy was on the track, and had also applied to the municipal council to assist them in carrying this out.

The Court in the judgment reviewed the case at length. It was held that the company was compelled by law to use the torpedoes as a means of signals to trains. The boy used the railway track to go to his work because it was the shortest way. While the deceased and his brother stated that they did not know what the torpedo was yet he must have thought it would make a report or a noise otherwise he would not have struck it with a hammer. While the boy in question was only 14 years of age, yet he evidently knew that he had no right to be on the railway track, and as a matter of law he was a trespasser on the railway line. While the boy might not have realized the danger of the article he picked up yet he knew that it was not his, and he had no right to take possession of it, much less smash it to pieces.

The fact that the company was obliged to leave a torpedo on the track from one to five hours it was not singular that one of these should be found near the track. The Court held that the boy was a trespasser on the private property of the railway and that the company was compelled by law to use the torpedoes.

The action of the plaintiff was dismissed with costs.

Philip Morris Kaiser, brought into police court, London, Eng., for theft, declared that on account of his crime he could not get employment anywhere. He agreed to give up his name and be known as PHILIP MORRIS.

INDIFFERENCE OF THE PUBLIC

Fail to Realize The Terrible Evils of Intemperance

MR. TENNYSON SMITH CONTINUES HIS MEETINGS IN SHERBROOKE.

The lecture of Mr. Tennyson Smith given last night in the Art Hall was the continuation of the campaign which opened Sunday morning with the address by Mr. Smith in the Methodist Church and which will be carried on throughout the week under the auspices of the United Temperance Committee. Rev. G. Elery Read presided and opened the meeting with prayer, and a vocal solo was contributed by Mrs. Tennyson Smith, who has a charming voice, and sang "God will take care of you" with much taste and feeling.

The lecture "The Drink Demon," which was to have been given, was postponed to the following evening for personal reasons, and a temperance talk was substituted, which was no less interesting and vigorous. He first spoke of his work in England among the soldiers gathered in the various camps in the country, every one of which he had visited and had gained many recruits for the temperance army. His love and admiration for the men in khaki were boundless and he wanted to take off his hat whenever he met a soldier. He said he was sure that the men did not realize what people think of them—their admiration for those who are willing to fight and die for others. He had been invited by the authorities to go among the troops now training in Canada, and intended shortly to go to Valcartier Camp. As for the war, he continued, "If ever there was a righteous war, it is this one. I believe God is behind the nation. I have always loved the 75th Psalm, and it applies more than ever to the present time, for 'The Lord of Hosts is with us, the God of Jacob is our refuge.' In regard to the temperance movement, the great difficulty is to get people to realize the evil drink is doing, for it is one thing to know something and another to realize it. It is only those who have suffered from this curse that know, and sometimes even they scarcely realize what it is doing. The blindness of people is amazing and their deafness akin to that of the old lady who lived within the sound of the great guns at Shrewsbury, in England, and who when the 80-pounders shook the earth murmured, 'Come in, I'm imagining it was a knock at the door. Indifference is also a terrible drawback in a campaign, but when I stand on a platform I don't tell what I have read in a book, but things that I know, things that I have seen, the misery and suffering from the drink evil that are too real. A great fight is going on in the Old Country to pass a prohibitory law, and when Great Britain does pass that law it will be kept, and well kept."

The pathetic side of the liquor traffic was presented in the most appealing manner. A dramatic incident of the evening was the unrolling of a strip of paper, crimson in color, which was 36 yards in length and contained the newspaper records of the crimes committed in Great Britain in the space of two weeks, directly caused by drink.

CHURCH UNION VOTE TO-DAY

Prediction is That Resolution Will be Carried by Majority of Two To One

OPINION PREVAILS THAT LONG STRUGGLE IN THE CHURCH IS NEARING AN END.
Winnipeg, June 13.—Leaders in the Presbyterian General Assembly say that church union will be carried to-day by a two to one vote. Most conservative judges admit that the project will go through on a vote in the proportion of one hundred and fifty to one hundred. Universally the opinion prevails that the long struggle in the church is ended, and that the union so much discussed will be consummated in this city.

The committee on church union, reported yesterday afternoon, and laid before the assembly a series of resolutions consisting of nine sections, with three sub-sections. The important clause in this document was as follows:

"That this General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada do now resolve to unite with the Methodist Church of Canada and the Congregational Church of Canada, to constitute the United Church of Canada, on the basis of the union, approved by the General Assembly of 1915, and by the majority of presbyteries since consulted under the Barrier Act."

Lord Lovat's Corps
"Lord Lovat's well-deserved promotion to the rank of brigadier-general has been expected for some time past," says an English military expert. "Lord's and Tulloch's corps are in fine fighting trim, and contain the pick of Scotland's manhood of all classes of society. Besides being colonel of his two regiments of scouts, Lord Lovat is honorary colonel of the Fourth (Territorial) Battalion of the Gordon Highlanders, and a military member of the Inverness Territorial Forces Association."

Candid to Princess
An amusing confession was made by the Princess Royal. She told an intimate friend that she suffered so dreadfully from shyness that she could not bring herself to tell her guests to go to bed. "Well, ma'am," was the reply, "I wish you would depute the honor of doing so to me. Think of the amount of smothered yawns that would be saved." The Princess Royal was highly amused.

RECRUITING FOR 117TH E.T. BATT.

Enthusiastic Meeting Held at Bishop's Crossing Last Evening

EXPECTED THAT TEN MORE MEN WILL BE SECURED FROM DUDSWELL TOWNSHIP.

Bishop's Crossing, June 13.—(Special)—An enthusiastic meeting was held here last evening in the interests of the 117th E.T. Battalion. There was a very large attendance, and a strong plea was made for more recruits for the battalion. The speakers were: Mr. R.A. Ewing, Sherbrooke, Major Ewing and Lieut. J.M. State. The speakers pointed out the duty of all citizens to lend a hand in this great war and it was their duty to encourage every eligible young man to line up and join the colours.

A series of war pictures, which had not been previously shown, were a source of much interest.

An effort will be made to secure ten more men from the Township of Dudswell and \$300 for the regimental fund. "We are going to get both," said Mr. R.A. Ewing to the Record this morning.

WITH THE 117TH AT VALCARTIER

First Church Parade For The Season Was Held on Sunday

CAPT. MOOREHEAD ADDRESSED THE PROTESTANT PARADE, AND 117TH BAND FURNISHED MUSIC.

The first church parade for the season for Valcartier Camp was held in the camp grounds on Sunday. The Roman Catholics paraded at 8.00 while the Anglicans and other Protestants paraded at 9.00. The Roman Catholic parade was chiefly composed of the French Canadian Battalions now in camp. The Bands of the 187th and 20th Battalions furnished inspiring music en route to the place where service was held.

The Protestant parade formed up at the time appointed on a beautiful green field directly behind the lines of the 148th Battalion, and presented a magnificent appearance making three sides of a square.

In the corner of the square was a pulpit made from the drums of the 148th Battalion, covered over with the Union Jack.

In front of the pulpit stood General Wilson, Col. Donal, assistant adjutant general, and members of the headquarters staff. To the right of General Wilson stood the 117th E.T. Robertson, of Montreal, and that as soon as the amount due under the contract, including the amount for the month of May, has been established by the arbitrators, we will be prepared to settle same; the understanding being that, in the meantime all litigation proceedings on both sides will be suspended, each party reserving all its legal rights and recourses, and that as soon as the City names its arbitrator, every effort will be made to obtain the decision of the arbitrators at an early date, and if possible by the 20th of June, instant.

If this proposition meets with the approval of the Council, kindly have the City Attorney instructed accordingly.

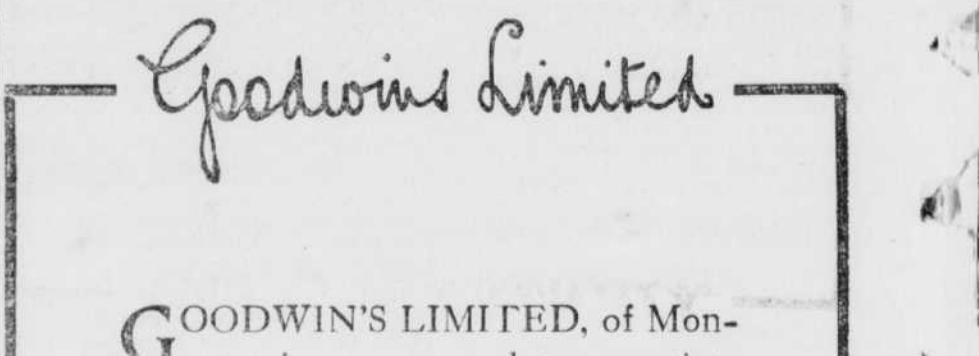

Clause 7—If the present bridge, across the C.P.R. tracks is sufficiently strong and the City will grade the approaches to same to a reasonable extent the company will sweep the snow from its tracks. The city to remove same.

Provided that the City will advance to the Company for a period of five years the cost of the extensions and improvements, at the rate of 6 per cent., payable quarterly and sions and new equipment paid for out of this loan and a lien on the entire property of the company subject to the present mortgage indebtedness. Whole amount to be advanced not to exceed \$100,000.00 and would probably not exceed \$30,000.00 but when the work is being done it is evident that it will be better to spend sufficient to provide a satisfactory service.
