THE COLONIAL TROOPS AT THE JUBILEE.

According to the statements of some of the London papers there seems to have been a good deal of mismanagement about the arrangements made for the reception of the Colonial military contingents to Her Majesty's Jubilee. The fact was not long kept a secret and Sir ALFRED HARRIS' paper, the London Daily Mail, at once made a huge fuss about it. One of the first faults which it found was that most of the Colonials on their arrival had no reception whatever, this referring to those who had arrived before the Canadians. The best evidence of the stir which its articles created is shown by the very different manner in which our two hundred representatives were received, as described in the following extract from its columns of the 17th instant:—"Every one will be delighted to hear that the instantaneous outbreak of popular indignation which has been aroused by the Daily Mail's exposure of the official treatment of the Colonial troops has had its effect. Some one in a position of high authority,—a Very Great Personage, indeed, so it is said, has expressed very decided views on the matter, and the result is plainly visible at Chelsea. One of the causes of complaint was that Colonial troops arriving in London found no one at the station to meet them, and no band to play them into barracks. This has all been changed. On Tuesday night the Canadian contingent arrived at Euston from Liverpool, where they had landed during the afternoon. It was eleven o'clock at night before their special train arrived. But late as was the hour, the authorities were there, Colonel IVOR HERBERT, the commandant of the Colonial forces, was himself in waiting, and with him were Colonel WARD, D.A.A.G., and several staff officers to give the Canadians a hearty welcome, and to conduct them to their quarters at Chelsea, and as to bands, the station was full of them. There were the drums and fifes of the Scots Guards, drums and fifes of the Grenadiers, besides the band of the QUEEN'S Westminsters. So in imposing military order, with music to help the journey and to stir the enthusiasm of the crowd, the Canadians were marched to Chelsea, where they arrived about midnight, and found their quarters and their supper ready for them. Nor is this all. Yesterday morning General Lord METHUEN, commanding the Home District, went himself to Chelsea Barracks, and made most sympathetic personal inquiries of members of the various detachments as to the arrangements made for their comfort, and the quality and quantity of the rations supplied to them. His visit and his sympathetic manner had an excellent effect upon the men of all ranks. None of them mind the roughing it that is incidental to soldiering; none have complained of anything but the want of cordiality in the reception given to them by their official hosts. This cause of complaint Lord METHUEN's visit of yesterday did much to remove. A little civil attention makes a great deal of difference, Lord METHUEN's solicitude for the comfort of the nation's guests was not the only manifestation of his kind. Other highly-placed officers made inquiries, and it having been intimated that the service of food in the Colonial Sergeants' Mess was insufficient, the resources of the British nation were immediately taxed for the provision of three extra waiters. Yesterday afternoon some new detachments from the Far East landed at the Albert Dock. There were native regular troops from Hong Kong, Singapore, and elsewhere, picturesque-uniformed soldiers, accompanied by tall gaily-turbaned Panjabis. They did not land until after dinner. By five o'clock they were safe in Chelsea Barracks, which was much pleasanter to them, and much more creditable to the authorities, than the fifteen hours' foodless wait of the Ceylon Volunteers and the Hong Kong and Straits Settlements Police a week ago. The Canadians, both regulars and volunteers, are fine, stalwart fellows, like all the Colonials. They may mostly be distinguished by their hats, which are of felt, with very straight and very wide brims, and a buckled strap band. They are further distinguished as far as the Volunteers are concerned by the richness of the corps in non-commissioned officers. Out of 197 of all ranks, there are thirty-six officers, ninety-nine sergeants, and sixty-two rank and file. So each sergeant commands nearly two-thirds of a private. When the force arrived, some of the Australian sergeants, anxious to show them some attention after a long journey, invited the Canadian sergeants to go to the mess and take some refreshment. When they found there were ninety-nine sergeants on the roll they were a little surprised. Yesterday the Canadian sergeants so swamped the sergeants' mess that it was found necessary to rig up another mess room. The number of non-coms. illustrates the eagerness with which Mr. CHAMBERLAIN'S invitation to attend the Jubilee has been accepted. In a different way the same feeling has been shown in other Colonies. In South Australia, for instance, the anxiety of all ranks to come to London was so great that officers and non-coms. who were selected as such temporarily resigned their rank to come as privates. There are three Captains in the ranks with the South Australian contingent, and nearly every other private is a non-com. at home. The same thing would have occurred with other Colonial contingents if commanding officers had permitted it. The commanding officer of the Victoria Mounted Rifles, for instance, refused to allow any officer or non-com. to go into the ranks for Jubilee purposes. He insisted on a fair all-round representation of all ranks. Yesterday morning the whole of the Colonial mounted troops, with the exception of the Canadians, who were given a rest after their long journey, were given a little rehearsal of the Jubilee procession. They rode down to the Embankment, where the Colonial procession is to be marshalled, and were formed up in the order of procession, after which they were marched back by way of Westminster, the Mall, and Victoria, to Larkhall. The Australians, who have not brought their own horses, have been supplied with mounts from the stables of the Army Service Corps—useful mounts, though hardly so light as the horses they are accustomed to at home. Most of the mounted Canadians have brought their own horses. All of the above will form very interesting reading to Canadians who have only heard very briefly through the cable of what kind of a reception their representatives received, and of how they impressed people on the other side. As far as the reference to the Canadian Sergeants is concerned, there is only too much truth in it, and some people expressed their minds pretty freely on the subject before the contingent left.
