SAID TO BE A FORMER RUSSIAN AMBASSADOR TO FRANCE.

London, March 16. — The Evening News to-day publishes a sensational Dreyfus story. It declares that the former Russian Ambassador to Paris, Count Von Mohrenheim, is the real culprit who sold both Russian and French secrets to the German Government, adding that the Russian Government itself is convinced of his guilt, and that it is only to avoid a public scandal greater than that of the Dreyfus affair that he is unpunished, further than the intimation that he is not to show his face within the Czar's dominions.

AN ARKANSAS BATTLEFIELD.

FIVE MEN KILLED IN A FACTION FIGHT AT HOT SPRINGS ABOUT AN ELECTION.

Hot Springs, Ark., March 16. — Five lives were lost here at six o'clock this evening in a faction fight over the coming mayoralty election.

The dead men are: Tom Nole, chief of Police; James Hart, detective; T. Goaley, captain of police; J. Henkle, driver of a beer wagon, and Louis Williams, son of sheriff Williams.

The shooting occurred on Central avenue, a public thoroughfare. Saloons have been closed by the police and considerable excitement prevails.

THEY DECLINED THE INVITATION

Norway Legislators Insult the Crown Prince.

Crown Prince Snow-balled While Passing Through the Streets of Christiania.

Christiania, March 16.—Sixty Leftists, members of the Forthing, the Executive Assembly of Norway, have declined an invitation to dine with the Swedish Crown Prince Gustaf, who is acting as Regent of Sweden and Norway during the absence of King Oscar II., who is in Southern France, seeking to recuperate his health.

The refusal of the Norwegian legislators to accept the hospitable invitation of the Crown Prince, emphasizing the feeling provoked in Norway by a recent saying of the Crown Prince in a public meeting at Stockholm, that he would not object to lead the Swedes against the headstrong Norwegians in a resort to arms to settle the quarrel between the two countries, and the most striking indication of the open enmity which exists between the two countries, has been shown in Christiania of late years.

A few nights ago, while the Crown Prince was returning from the Military Club, he met a crowd of people who hooded him and pelted him with snow balls.

The Norwegian papers condemned the demonstration, describing it as in any event a purely personal incident, but the refusal of the members of the Forthing to dine with the Regent has its bearings and its significance in a public protest against the continuance of the union with Sweden.

In spite of the acts of the Forthing last winter, legalizing the adoption of the separate Norwegian flag, an overwhelming majority of the people of Norway bitterly oppose the existing regime.

INCREASING THE ARMY. Of late, in both Norway and Sweden, there has been an ominous increase of military and naval forces, with clearly one object in view—to suppress, if necessary by arms, all claims which may lead to an entire separation of the two countries.

The objection to the union is stronger in Norway than in Sweden, and the latter is in a state of great excitement, declaring an irrevocable union without prejudice to the separate Government constitution and laws of each country, cannot be continued without changes of a radical character.

NORWAY'S GRIEVANCE. Norway's present grievance is that it is deprived of her just share in the common government, but the present grievances are of commercial origin and provoked by the unfair trade interests of the two countries. Their commercial policies are diametrically opposed, Sweden having adopted protectionism and Norway free trade.

SMALL-POX

Is Spreading Rapidly in the State of North Carolina.

Raleigh, N.C., March 16.—Small-pox continues to spread in this State. The Counties in which cases have been reported to the State Board are—Currituck, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Gates, Bertie, Tyrrell, Edgecombe, Warren, Wayne, Johnston, Wake, Alamance, Guilford, Buncombe, New Hanover, Northampton, Columbus, Halifax, McDowell and Moore.

So rapidly is the disease assuming the proportions of an epidemic that the State Board of Health has appointed a special commissioner for the purpose of supervising the work of the commandery from Admiral Von Diederichs to Prince Henry.

TAKE SUPREME COMMAND.

Berlin, March 16.—Prince Henry of Prussia has started for Kiao-Chou Bay, where all the war vessels composing the two German squadrons of the Far East waters will assemble for the formal transfer of the commandery from Admiral Von Diederichs to Prince Henry.

GOT A LOAN.

Madrid, March 16.—The Spanish Government has concluded a loan of thirty million pesetas with the banking house of Urquijo. The money was handed over yesterday and will be devoted to paying the arrears due the Spanish troops which have served in Cuba.

ITALY THANKED.

By Lord Salisbury for its Prompt Action in the Martino Matter.

London, March 16. — A despatch to the Chronicle from Rome says that Lord Salisbury, through Sir Philip Currie, the British Ambassador in Rome, has thanked Admiral Cavone, Italian Minister of Foreign Affairs, for Italy's prompt and loyal action in the Martino incident.

For the chief amateur battle the week beginning Monday, July 3, is assigned, while the open event will be held on Sunday, July 4 and 15. The dates for the women's championship have not yet been fixed. The committee also selected the Morris Country Club as the scene for the international team match between the United States and Canada. The date has yet to be agreed upon.

THE TURF.

The House of Lords has decided a long debated question which is of intense interest to the sporting world, namely, whether Tattersall's enclosure at a racing meeting was a "place" under the Betting Acts, where bets could be made.

A friendly action was brought against the Kempton Park Race Course Company to decide the matter, and the case has been proceeding for years in various courts.

The final decision, which has been delayed owing to the absence from England of the late Lord Hershell, has now been given in favor of the betting, but the enclosure is not a "place."

WAS AN ACT OF PROVIDENCE.

A CONVERT GIVES \$100,000 TO PROPAGATE THE TENETS OF HIS NEW FAITH.

Battle Creek, Mich., March 16.—Captain Norman, reputed to be a several times millionaire, has given \$100,000 to the Seventh Day Adventists' Conference, now in session here. A remarkable incident in connection with the donation is related.

Among those in attendance is Elder F. H. Westphal, who has charge of their mission in Buenos Ayres, South America. He came from Southampton in a Hamburg Line boat and met on board the ship Captain Norman. The Captain became interested in the Adventist faith and came to the meeting here. As a climax he has given the magnificent sum of 100,000 to the General Conference, \$100,000 by the Foreign Missionary Board and \$100,000 will be distributed in the work in India, Brazil, Australia and the Argentine Republic. The Adventists believed that the coming of Elder Westphal when he could not really afford the expense and meeting Captain Norman was an act of Providence.

THREE WEEKS IN A SNOW BLOCKADE

Terrible Sufferings of Railway Passengers. EXPOSED TO FIERCE BLIZZARDS

All the Time—Short of Provisions and Water, and Sick From Using Snow.

Cheyenne, Wyo., March 16. — The passengers and trainmen who have been prisoners for three weeks on the Cheyenne and Northern passenger train which has been in the snow drifts at Iron Mountain for that length of time, travelled ten miles on snowshoes yesterday to where the road was open, and were brought here by a special train. Col. E. P. Richardson, of Chicago, one of the passengers, says of the tie-up: "I have been in the war, ship wrecked and in a railway collision, but have never had an experience to equal this in the past three weeks. We were stalled in a high, bleak divide, where a blizzard raged every day. We were short of provisions, and most of the time sick with dysentery from drinking snow water and eating poorly cooked food, frozen at night, unable to change our clothes or wash, and have been generally demoralized and miserable. This morning we ate the last of our stock of provisions, and were brought out just in time to save us from serious sickness."

THE EMPEROR WAS PRESENT.

AT THE TRANSFERRING OF THE LATE PRINCE AND PRINCESS BISMARCK'S REMAINS.

Friedrichsruhe, March 16.—Emperor William arrived here at 11.25 this morning in order to attend the interment of the remains of Prince and Princess Bismark in the new mausoleum.

After the coffins had been borne to the mausoleum, Emperor, Prince Bismark and the Imperial Suite entered, the doors were closed and a guard of honor fired a volley at 12.15 P.M., at the conclusion of the service. The Emperor and the Bismark family then returned to the castle where lunch was served. His Majesty and his suite departed at one o'clock and were accompanied to the Imperial Saloon carriage by the family. The Emperor was cordial in his demeanor throughout the ceremonies.

A REWARD OFFERED.

For the Lynchers of Four Negro Prisoners in Georgia.

Atlanta, Ga., March 16. — Governor Chandler to-day issued a proclamation offering a reward of \$500 for the apprehension and delivery of the first member of the mob, and a further reward of \$100 for each additional person implicated in the killing of four negroes at Palmato this morning. The Governor said: "I regard the outrage as simply irreconcilable. These men had been arrested, as I am informed, and as there was proof at hand to convict them, the law was amply able to punish them."

THE CORTES DISSOLVED.

The Queen Regent of Spain Signed the Decree Yesterday.

Madrid, March 16.—The Queen Regent this evening signed the decree dissolving the Cortes, and convening the new Parliament and authorizing the payment of arrears of pay to the retrained troops. The peace treaty is to be signed to-morrow.
