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## Duplan Dyeing To Participate In Million And Half Dollar Army Contract

The Duplan Dyeing Co. of Valleyfield, a subsidiary of Duplan of Canada Ltd. will participate in the production of new fabrics which will eventually lead to the dressing of the Canadian Army in a new 100% Canadian-made combat uniform.

The Duplan of Canada Ltd. plant in Montmagny, Que., will start cloth deliveries in about two or three months and will run the order through over the next 18 months. Dyeing and finishing will be handled by the Duplan plant in Valleyfield.

Mr. R. Tremaine, manager of the Valleyfield plant told the SUN that the contract will mean a small employment increase and that he expects to be in full swing on the order in a couple of months.

Right now a 60,000 dollar expansion program is being carried out at Duplan which will provide some 7,000 additional square feet of space. Five years ago Duplan Dyeing had 65 employees. Now it provides work for 120.

The initial order for the new Army uniform is expected to involve the purchase of close to 1 million yards of fabric. Together with new special combat boots the all weather uniform (50% nylon, 50% cotton, by weight) will cost around \$90.00. It took three years to perfect the uniform which was eventually field-tested in 1960-61 by the Royal 22nd Regiment ("Van Doo's") at Camp Valcartier near Quebec City.

## RECOUNT GIVES CHARTRAND 3 MORE VOTES

At the request of E. Courchesne of 45 St. Jean Baptiste a recount was held last Saturday morning at the Valleyfield Court of the votes cast in last week's Monday election between Messrs. Joe Degré and J.O.L. Chartrand for a seat on the Valleyfield Council.

The recount gave Mr. Chartrand an increased majority of 8. The original count gave Mr. Chartrand 270 votes and Mr. Degré 265.

The recount was held before Judge Maurice Fortin.

## MGR. CADIEUX INVITES REV. HALL TO V'FIELD CATHEDRAL

What some consider as a milestone in inter-church relations in Valleyfield and perhaps in the province of Quebec, or even Canada, was reached when the Rev. John Hall of St. Mark's Anglican Church was invited by Mgr. J. D. Cadieux, parish Priest of the Valleyfield Cathedral, to meet with him and the people of his parish in the church hall during recent Christian Unity week. This took place on Monday January 22nd.

The day before Mgr. Cadieux had asked Mr. Hall if it would be all right for him to appeal from the Cathedral pulpit to the people of his parish to contribute in prayers, and in a tangible way, to the rebuilding of St. Mark's church. Mr. Hall agreed wholeheartedly. Mgr. Cadieux had originally planned to come with his wardens to the rectory to make

a presentation but when it became apparent that the response from the people was much bigger than had been anticipated Mr. Hall was invited to come over to the Cathedral.

The Rev. Hall told the SUN that he had been received "with

## Who Said No Patronage?

The population of Beauharnois must have increased considerably in the last 18 months or the residents are consuming a much greater amount of liquor... (both we know not to be so). In any case the building where the Liquor Commission has been housed for over ten years is, now suddenly not big enough any-

more and a new building is being constructed on a lot belonging to Arthur Couillard next to the Beauharnois Cleaners on St. Laurent street. The building, with a 7 foot basement will have two storeys and will cost \$35,000. The first floor plus basement will be occupied by the Liquor Commission and the second by Mr. Couillard and family. The building must be ready for occupancy by the 1st of April.

A reliable source informs us that Mr. Couillard has a ten year lease in his pocket for renting the building to the Liquor Board for \$42,000. In the meantime the owner of the building where the Liquor Commission is now situated René Ragotte, who was former Manager of the store, loses his last source of income with the move while he is saddled with a big mortgage. The other two Liquor Commission employees were also replaced by Liberal party supporters. Furthermore the number of employees has increased from 3 to 4 with one part time help when things get really "busy".

## Beauharnois Election Campaign For Feb. 5th Warming Up

Monday, February 5th Beauharnois citizens are once again being asked to elect a Mayor and a number of aldermen. It seems to us that one of the first things the new Municipal administration should do is amend the electoral bylaw, so that the Mayor is elected every 3 years and the aldermen only 4 at a time and not all eight every 2 years. Two years barely gives the new men time to get their feet wet, also it disturbs the continuity of the city administration.

From where we sit it is obvious that the main battle will be for the seat of Mayor, while in the aldermanic field 5 aldermen were elected by acclamation and three have to be elected on Monday, February 5th. Running in the St. Louis ward are Jean Boyer against A. Robichaud and E. Julien against Paul Emile Gariépy. In the Beauce Ward Antonio Dupuis is running against Maurice Lamoureux. Of all these men Mr. Julien has been with the council for four years, Mr. Antonio Dupuis two years while the others are new at the game.

The contest for Mayor however is of a different calibre altogether. Mayor David Morell in his middle forties is being supported by a group of citizens who call themselves the Proprietors League. Mr. Morell is a self made building contractor who obviously enjoys the support of the labor class. While he is a man who never really had any Municipal administrative ambitions it must be said in all fairness to him that he has made the best of it during his short term of office, from December 1960 to January 1962. He allowed himself to be elected by an organization who aim at only one thing... reduce taxes and city expenses even if it means a complete halt to any progress in the city of Beauharnois. They allege that previous administrations have robbed the city and taxpayers.

Dr. Gustave Dubuc, on the other hand is not only a man who, through his profession, has come in contact with administration and organization but has also had two years' experience as an alderman from 1952 to 1954. Dr. Dubuc is being supported by a group of Beauharnois Citizens who call themselves the Citizens Association and who aim at what they call "cleaning up the city administration" and to bring Beauharnois out of its "stagnant state", which they feel will remove the apathy of the greater part of the population in regards to municipal affairs.

## Textiles May Be Entering Phase Of Further Improvement

(From the annual Montreal Gazette Business Review)

For the first time in over a decade, Canada's primary textile industry is in a position to look ahead with some hope, for at present mills are experiencing a trading change that could bode well for all concerned.

If the trend apparent during 1961 is extended it will mark the beginning of the third business phase that this industry has known in the past 15 years; first being the postwar boom, followed by the dark depression of the past decade.

Industry optimism stems from a number of 1961 mulcations, such as an increase in domestic production, a levelling of the volume of imports, and the arrest of annual cuts in employment. All of these lead to a key figure contained in the following table showing the total Canadian market for fabric, of all fibres - that figure which shows the industry as having obtained 51 per cent of the domestic market. It is higher than 1960, and the first increase that this figure has shown since 1950. Almost as gratifying and important as this hope for better business ahead is the fact that the primary textile industry in

this country is fully equipped and prepared for this better business.

Despite the difficult conditions since 1950, this industry has never ceased believing that it had a vital role to fill in the Canadian economy and the future of this country. From this belief came the confidence that inspired Canadian companies to undertake capital and repair expenditures totalling more than \$800,000,000 since the end of World War II.

These amounts were never easy to find, but the investments and effort were worthwhile, and led to many official references to the Canadian textile industry as among the most modern, efficient and capable of any in the world.

## Bell Telephone Rates To Increase

Because the Valleyfield local calling area has outgrown its present rate group, increase will go into effect on 1st March 1962 to bring rates into line with those charged in other centres with a similar number of telephones. M. R. Boileau, Bell manager for this region, said this week.

The increases are relatively small. For example, the monthly charge for two-party residence service will be only 20 cents higher, and individual residence service 25 cents higher.

The transfer of Valleyfield into the next higher rate group was recommended by Bell Telephone in a report to the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada, submitted October 31, 1961. The report stated that the number of telephones in the Valleyfield calling area had increased by more than five per cent beyond the maximum limit of the present rate group.

Telephone rates for any exchange are governed by the number of telephones in the local calling area, recognizing the principle that the value of service to each customer increases as the number of telephones increases.

The Valleyfield calling area has expanded steadily in recent years and its progress has

been accompanied by a parallel growth in the number of telephones. Telephone customers served by the Valleyfield exchange now have 11,000 telephones in their local calling area.

The following table provides examples of the new monthly rates for typical classes of service in the present and new rate groups for the area:

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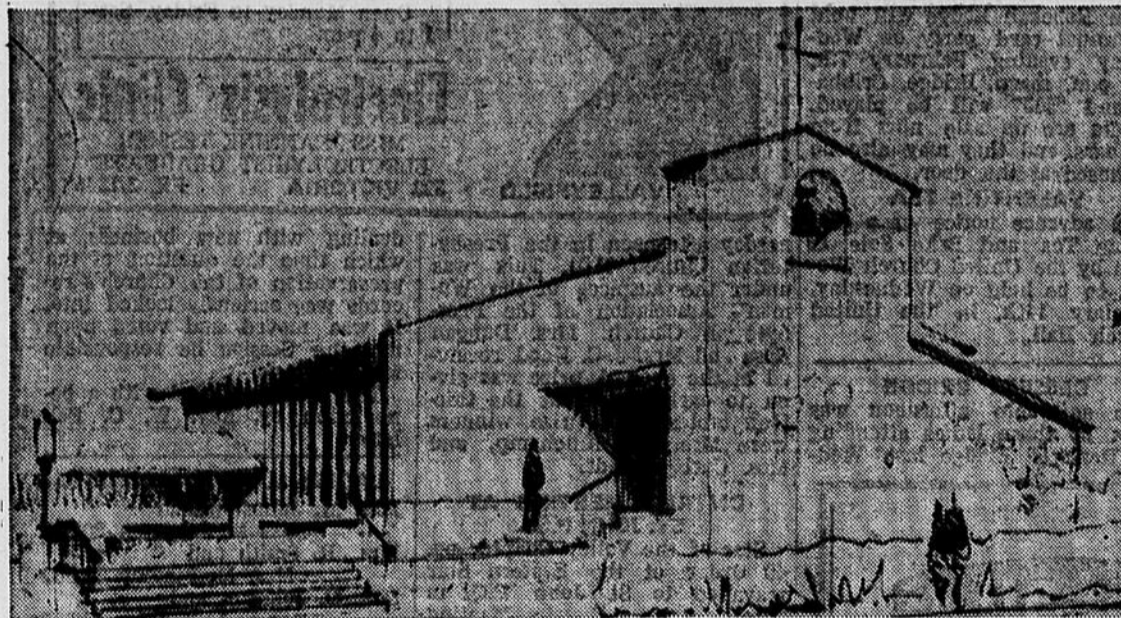

cerning the textile industry's future, particularly in the light of past experiences, must necessarily be guarded, as the overall picture is still far from satisfactory. Mills are still only supplying slightly more than half of the total Canadian market for fabrics of all types, and the profit situation is only a shade better than last year. This industry remains powerless to deal with prices offered on Canadian markets by foreign competitors - Asian countries, in particular - which have resulted in a damaging reduction in the number of mills and employees since 1950.

**MORE BUSINESS FOR THOSE LEFT**

The effect of this competition has, paradoxically, created one reason for renewed hope - with fewer domestic mills left open there is more business for those remaining.

This has been one reason. Others have been devaluation of the Canadian dollar opposite the U.S. dollar; rising level of consumer spending which has meant more money for clothing and other products; and better business conditions in United States (a major competitor in the cotton field) leaving less

## The Three Chateauguays Agree Heights Should Join Police Force

(By Mrs. Barbara Fraser)  
 Monday night, at a meeting of the Police Commission at the Chateaugay Town Hall, it was agreed that the Heights should enter the police amalgamation now in force between Chateaugay and Chateaugay Centre, at a cost of \$9,000. per year to the Heights.  
 Chateaugay Centre representatives submitted a contract to the town of Chateaugay to cement the police amalgamation on a 50-50 cost-sharing basis. This was met with stiff opposition from the Town of Chateaugay officials who contend that the Centre should pay a larger share of the cost.  
 However, the contract was submitted to the Town for study and it is expected that they will submit a counter-proposal.  
 Also, included in the contract was the admittance of Constable

Gravelle to the permanent police force, to be in charge of the Children's Brigade. This suggestion was also opposed by the Town.  
 The six month contract with Chief Gervais which expires on January 9th has been automatically renewed by the Centre, has not as yet been renewed by the Town.  
 On January 19th, Mr. Asselin resigned as secretary to the Chief of Police and has been temporarily replaced by Constable Giroux. Three applications for the position were submitted and the final decision rests with the Chief.  
 The meeting closed at 11.45 p.m. and it was agreed that each town, Chateaugay and Chateaugay Centre, would meet with their separate councils Tuesday night with the purpose of approving the admittance of the Heights to the police amalgamation.

## Candid-Comments

Talking to a friend the other day, a man who has been a long time associated with small town politics, and the subjects of amalgamation came up. He was of the opinion that the old expression "unity is strength" applies to the government of municipalities, in a very real sense. He cited a typical instance of what can, and apparently does happen quite frequently where the local council consists of a handful of men. One of the alderman, it appears, has a cousin, and the cousin wants to get a permit to build an addition to his house. The permit is granted, because Old Sam is a member of council and can push such a thing through for a friend very easily. There's nothing illegal in this, but it's the beginning of the patronage system which seems to have riddled the provincial government like a termite taking a piece of old pine.  
 It's easy to see that the example cited above could easily be multiplied, and that somewhere along the line "personal favors" become the order of the day, to the detriment of the municipality at large. And you can't altogether blame "Old Sam," who naturally wants to appear to be a big shot who gets things done.  
 In a council composed of, say, twelve or fifteen members, this begging of small favors becomes more difficult, according to our friend's reasoning. Our own thought on the subject is that by exchanging small councils for big ones, perhaps all you're really doing is enlarging the opportunity for working the angles.

## AN ANSWER TO MANY QUERIES

The following is in reply to the many telephone calls I have received, asking what was my position on the referendum of 7-8 of Feb., which dealt with the remuneration for the Mayor and his councillors. From the beginning I have been against any salaries for the following reasons: -  
 Firstly, in the future there will be same people who will present themselves only for the salary and in return they will only be seen at the meetings.

Secondly we are not organized enough to give satisfaction to the taxpayer on every account, to entitle us to receive such a high salary. But if the council had been more moderate in their demands, I would have probably seconded the motion. But as it now stands I am against the remuneration.

An expert on home insulation told us recently that what passes for winter protection in most homes in this province is absolutely useless. To start with he pointed out that rockwool or other forms of blanket insulation (including the blown kind installed by some residents after their homes were completed) will gradually rot away at the "dew point" (where inside temperature and humidity meets outside temperature and humidity and moisture condenses). He

says proper insulation consists of a polyethylene vapor barrier on the inside of the rockwool, and an aluminum sheeting on the outside with an air space between. The plastic vapor barrier should not, he says, be cut for switch boxes, nor have nail holes in it to permit the passage of moisture. He says he cannot understand this "plank" construction and brick veneer. Where the cracks in the planks cross the butted points of the sheathing sheets, cold air enters. It pours in, too, between window frames and walls which normally have only a thin line of caulking on the outside. As for the brick, it apparently keeps out nothing except rain and snow. "Balloon construction" (the use of framed walls) is, he says, the only "cheap" form of construction which allows for a thoroughly wind-tight and well-insulated home.

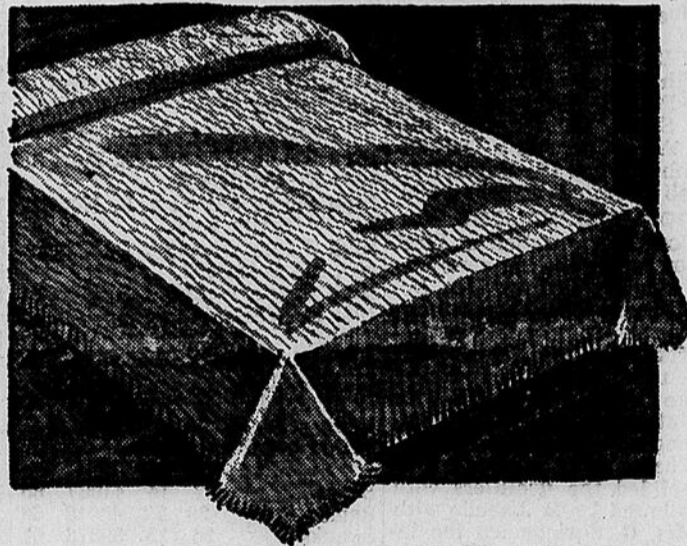
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## LIONS TAKE OVER FIRST IN VALLEY JUNIOR LEAGUE

- 4.—A BRIDGE ACROSS THE ST. LOUIS RIVER.

These projects will be carried out with the promised aid of the Government and will not lead to an increase in taxes.

There is also a Hydro Quebec plan giving the city permission to furnish water to those companies who have power contracts with the Hydro. The city is now studying this proposal which we consider as a great opportunity to raise revenues and evaluation. Only the city is able to give these services as the canal is the natural boundary between Melocheville and Beauharnois.

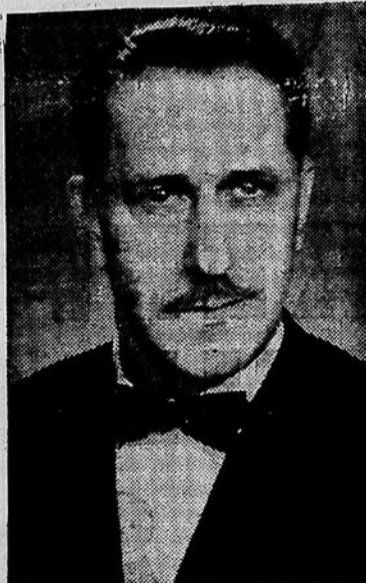
