Chamber charges education makeshift, poorly-defined

SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP) — Planning education goals in terms of available funds and the conditions of teachers' collective agreements is wasting vital resources of energy and money, the Quebec Chamber of Commerce was told Thursday.
A report presented at the chamber's annual meeting said Quebec education is a makeshift process hampered by poorly-defined goals and lack of co-operation at the administrative level.
Common sense should be used to develop goals that will fulfill the real needs of students for a complete well-rounded education.
The terms of teachers' contracts and the providing of funds for education should be decided after a proper plan is drawn up—not before.
The 35-page report, prepared by the education committee of the chamber under Charles Plamondon, is a working tool submitted for study and possible modification before its conclusions are incorporated into the chamber's statement of policy.
The chamber says the report constitutes a "strong indictment of the state of education reform in Quebec," and alleges there is a lack of co-operation between the education department and educational institutions.
"The basic principles of education are not respected because the administration is poorly organized and changes in key posts occur too frequently," the report says.

For Cystic Fibrosis

300 to shine shoes

SHERBROOKE (GF) — Feel like getting your shoes shined and helping youngsters afflicted with cystic fibrosis at the same time? Great. Then be downtown in either Sherbrooke, Lennoxville or Magog Saturday, as more than 300 Bishop's University students will be on hand to relieve you of pennies in aid of this worthy cause.
Cystic fibrosis, you ask, what has that got to do with me? What about cancer and other respiratory diseases? Granted work must continue in other medical fields, but the horror of cystic fibrosis is that it harms children.
That's right. It is the most common and serious chronic disease affecting children today, and the hereditary disease is found in one of every 1,000 to 2,600 births, according to the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.
First identified as a separate disease in 1938, it affects the lungs and digestion, preventing the flow of digestive juices from the pancreas into the small intestine. Thanks to cystic fibrosis, the child is prey to pneumonia and often suffers from malnutrition.
The worst part is that the disease is a staggering economic drain for most families. Cost of drugs, equipment and other items required in the home may run to \$1,200 a year. And the disease is still not under control, regardless of the medical miracles of the sixties.
The Bishop's students are part of a 58-campus campaign across the country, and the local youths hope to raise \$3,000 this year to aid the struggle. Get a shine tomorrow, and help the youthful unfortunate.

Enrollment rises in the regionals

SHERBROOKE (GF) — Area regional high schools report enrolment has increased for the 1970-71 school year, and Alexander Galt Regional High School is leading the way with 200 more students than last year.
More than 2,900 persons have registered thus far, scheduling officer Mrs. Sylvia Loomis said, and the number is expected to reach 3,000 by the end of the month.
Richmond Regional High School now has 950 students and more are being taken in each day, according to Carol Fontaine of the office of the secretary-treasurer, Eastern Townships Regional School Board.
And out Cowansville way, the Massey-Vanier High School authorities seem to be right on top of the situation.
"Exactly 1,971 students have been registered to date," director-general Malek Hanna said Wednesday. This is about the same number as last year.

Says more doctors seek to leave

QUEBEC (CP) — Dr. Augustin Roy, registrar of the Quebec College of Physicians and Surgeons, said Thursday the number of doctors seeking certificates of good standing to practise outside Quebec has jumped in the last week.
The college has received 260 requests so far, he said in an interview, and another 40 are expected within the next few days.
Usually by this time of year, the college has received about 150 certification requests.
Dr. Roy said it appears the doctors, concerned about lagging negotiations over implementation of the medical care insurance act, are preparing for any eventuality.
Judge Andre Montpetit has been asked to act as conciliator in the dispute between the government and the Quebec Federation of Medical Specialists.
The doctors say the Health Insurance Act passed in July will remain unacceptable until clauses concerning the right to opt out and control of professional standards are amended.
At present, doctors who opt out would not have any bills paid by the government.

Cadieux leaves defence for Paris post

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau confirmed months of speculation Thursday when he announced the resignation of Leo Cadieux as defence minister and his appointment as Canadian ambassador to France.
The grey-haired Mr. Cadieux will replace Paul Beaulieu who is leaving the Paris post for health reasons to accept the less onerous post of Canadian ambassador to Portugal.
Mr. Cadieux's successor as defence minister was not announced.
Donald Macdonald, president of the Privy Council and government leader in the Commons, is expected to get the job Meantime, pending an appointment, Treasury Board President C. M. Drury will be acting defence minister.
Mr. Cadieux, who has been defence minister for three years and before that associate minister for 2½ years, leaves Ottawa for Paris this weekend.
He has been a Liberal MP for eight years, representing the Quebec ridings of Terrebonne and, since 1968, Labelle.
The prime minister's office released an exchange of messages between Mr. Cadieux and Mr. Trudeau, both dated Sept. 16, containing the minister's resignation and Mr. Trudeau's reply.
Mr. Cadieux expressed gratitude for the opportunity he had been given "to serve both my country and the Canadian Armed Forces, for which I retain a strong affection."
PRAISES CADIEUX
In his reply the prime minister paid tribute to Mr. Cadieux's "calm and lucid judgment" as a cabinet member.
"The review of our defence policy has been one of the most important problems the government has had to deal with," Mr. Trudeau told him.
Mr. Cadieux has been intensely popular with servicemen for the battles he has waged to prevent mass cuts in the strength of the armed forces.
Despite his efforts, he was forced by budget restraints last year to order a reduction of 16,000 in over-all strength—to 92,000 from 98,000. The cut is to be completed by 1978.
Mr. Cadieux also fought in vain against proposals to reduce Canada's military contribution to NATO. A series of cabinet meetings on the issue culminated in an announcement by Mr. Trudeau that Canada would cut its forces in Europe and reorient defence policy towards North America.
Later it was announced that the forces in Europe would be halved to about 5,000—and would relinquish the nuclear role there which they had held since 1963.
Mr. Beaulieu, 57, new ambassador-designate to Portugal, is a Montreal native who has been in the external affairs department since 1940. He speaks fluent Portuguese.
He has been Canadian ambassador to Lebanon and Iraq, and to Brazil. In 1967 he was appointed Canadian ambassador to the United Nations in New York, and the following year was named ambassador to Paris.

Municipal election

Move to fill party slates

SHERBROOKE — It appears that the Sherbrooke municipal election campaign will develop basically into a case of the "ins" versus the "outs".

Reports indicate that two of the sitting aldermen at present listed as independents — Ald. Carl Camirand in the south and Ald. Antonio Pinard in the west — will throw in their lot with the Civic Action League, headed by Mayor Marc Bureau, in opposition to the Sherbrooke Party slate organized by Marcel Savard, a former alderman who is seeking election as mayor.

Five of the seven CAL members of the council, in addition to Mayor Bureau, have announced their intention of seeking another term, while two, Raymond Martin, Centre Ward, and Hilaire Bellevue, West Ward, have indicated their intention of stepping out of civic politics.

Should Aldermen Camirand and Pinard adopt the CAL ticket, the party now in power at the City Hall would have candidates already nominated for seven of the 10 council seats.
These are Romeo Quintal and Gerard Deziel in the east, Romeo Bergeron and Carl Camirand in the south, Antonio Pinard in the west, Raymond Bergeron in the centre and Luc Lamoureux in the north.

Indications are that the league will announce its remaining candidates within the next few days, most likely candidates being Roger Gingues in the west, Bernard Matte in the centre and Jacques O'Bready for the North Ward seat now held by Ald. Everett Nicol.

The Sherbrooke Party has already nominated candidates for seven of the 10 aldermanic seats with an eighth to be announced at a meeting to be held early next week in the East Ward, possibly Tuesday.

The preliminary line-up of Sherbrooke Party candidates, in addition to Mr. Savard, comprises: north, Jean-Marc Donahue and Keith Morgan; centre, Michel Cloutier; south, Yvon Ellyson and Florian Roy; east, Gerard Bessette, and west, Don de Lafontaine.

While present indications are that the mayoralty fight will be a straight battle between Mayor Bureau and Mr. Savard, there are recurring rumors that other citizens might seek the honor, presenting themselves as independents.
But for the most part, these individuals have indicated they would not enter the race.
For instance, at a meeting of the Sherbrooke Party Tuesday at which Keith Morgan was named a North Ward candidate, Raynald Frechette, former MNA, declared that despite pressures put to bear upon him, he would not run for municipal office and urged support both for the Sherbrooke Party and Mr. Morgan.
Another possible candidate, Claude Genest, president of the

Province of Quebec Chamber of Commerce, reportedly has old friends that he is not interested in the post of chief magistrate.
There has been some talk that Armand Nadeau, a former mayor, might seek to re-enter the council but this is highly unlikely as it is improbable he would resign his post as a commissioner of Loto-Quebec for a try at new municipal honors.
The resignation of Mayor Nadeau a few months ago to accept the Loto-Quebec post resulted in the election of Mr. Bureau as mayor by the members of the council.
A fourth possible entrant, Dr. Gerard LaSalle, has shown little indication that he will present himself.
So, barring unforeseen eventualities, it is probable that there will be a straight fight for all council posts, with the exception of the North Ward seat now held by Ald. Nicol.

Magog Lions hold mixed supper

MAGOG — The Lion's Club here has started its activities for the year 1970-71.
A mixed supper was held on Sept. 15 during which the new candidates and their wives were received.
Roger Bouchard, president of the Lion's Club, and Normand Rouleau who were delegates at the International Convention held in July, explained how they had traded banners with several clubs across the world.

An invitation is extended to all members for the next meeting which will be held Oct. 5 at the Cabana Lodge at 7 p.m.

Border surveillance beefed up in Vermont

MONTPELIER, Vt. (AP) — The United States border patrol, faced with a growing bank-robbery problem in remote northern Vermont, announced Thursday it is sending six additional agents to the area for duty along the Canadian border.
This will bring to 35 the number of patrolmen assigned to Vermont-Canadian border duty, the announcement said.
In three bank robberies in three months in northern Vermont, losses have exceeded \$123,000.
In each instance, the robbers fled over unsupervised dirt roads into Canada, avoiding arrest. Investigators say the holdups have been the work of a highly professional gang apparently based in Quebec.
There are 37 unsupervised dirt roads along the border. The additional men are to patrol these roads on an unscheduled basis.

Survey in progress

May create ET marketing Bd.

SHERBROOKE (CJ) — The Eastern Townships regional administration of the department of agriculture is now studying the possibility of establishing a co-operative marketing centre.
Representatives of the University of Sherbrooke, the Catholic Farmers Union and several other organizations in the district are taking part in this study.
The project, initiated by a group of farmers, is especially designed to regroup the milk cows belonging to several farmers. The marketing centre, planned to service 200 cows at the start, could be expanded to handle 200 animals.
It would comprise a pasteurization plant and a factory to produce cheese and yogurt.
At the same time, the project forecasts the creation of a co-operative society for consumers which would provide the public, in addition to the previously-mentioned products, with meat, fruits and vegetables sold directly by the producers.
The promoters of this extensive project believe such a centre would promote the production of superior quality milk by permitting the spreading of the cost of modern equipment over a larger number of cows.
Furthermore, this regrouping would eliminate the transportation difficulties and produce a sensible reduction in handling costs. Thus there would be an important improvement in the prices received by the producers, the promoters claim.
The results of the survey should be known early this fall.

QUEBEC IN FOCUS

Quebec VD ups and downs

MONTREAL (CP) — The incidence of gonorrhoea in Quebec increased in 1969 from the previous year while the number of syphilis cases declined, the Quebec Health Department reports.
Statistics made public Thursday show there were 4,509 cases of gonorrhoea reported in the province last year, compared with 3,511 in 1968.
Reported syphilis cases in 1969 totalled 397, down from the 1968 figure of 433.
More than 3,900 cases of venereal disease were detected in the Montreal area, 340 in the Quebec City region and 570 in the rest of the province, the health department reports.

Barchois mill stays open

QUEBEC (CP) — Forests Minister Kevin Drummond announced Thursday that Charles H. Nadeau and Sons Co. Ltd. has agreed to maintain operations at its new mill in the Gaspé town of Barchois.
The agreement ended a feud which began last month when the firm decided to transport wood cut in the Barchois region to its other saw mill in Port Daniel, 40 miles southwest.
Citizens of Barchois staged a demonstration Aug. 13 to prevent Nadeau trucks from picking up wood for delivery to Port Daniel. They were afraid the local mill would eventually be closed, putting workers on the unemployed list.

Seek three in 80G heist

MONTREAL (CP) — Richard Pare, 23, and Gilles Roy, 26, pleaded not guilty Thursday to charges of conspiring to extort and of threatening by letter in connection with a \$200,000 abortive extortion against Air Canada.
Preliminary hearing was set for Sept. 24.
Both men were arrested Tuesday after delivery to an Air Canada ticket office of a note threatening that airline property at Montreal International Airport would be bombed unless \$200,000 ransom was paid.
Flights were delayed up to two hours as security staff searched offices and planes for a bomb.
There was no application for bail.

Quebecers hit NB credit union

EDMUNDSTON, N.B. (CP) — Four Quebec men charged with the armed robbery of St. Francois, N.B., credit union, appeared in court here Thursday.
Ray Colombe, 21, of South Stukely pleaded not guilty and was ordered to stand trial Oct. 2 before Provincial Court Judge Joseph E. Berube.
The other three, Paul Loyer, 22, of West Shefford, Daniel Westiver, 23, of Waterloo and Reid Colombe, 19, of South Stukely, entered no plea. A preliminary inquiry, also on Oct. 2, was ordered.
Loyer and Ray Colombe were released on cash bail of \$2,000 each while the other two were remanded to jail.

Expelled priest expected back

MONTREAL (CP) — Rev. Maurice Lefebvre, 48, a Canadian Roman Catholic priest expelled Wednesday from Bolivia for anti-government demonstrations, will likely return to Bolivia from Argentina within two or three weeks, a spokesman for his home seminary said Thursday.
Rev. Maurice Decarie of St. Joseph's Province in Montreal said Bolivian charges that Father Lefebvre joined demonstrations staged by labor and left wing student groups were "probably true."
"It would not be the first time he participated in such groups," Father Decarie added.

Plead not guilty of extortion

PASPEBIAC, Que. (CP) — Three armed men who escaped with an estimated \$90,000 from a Banque Canadienne Nationale branch in this Gaspé Peninsula community were being sought in a nearby wooded area Thursday.
The men climbed into the building through a basement ventilator shaft Wednesday night, police said. They seized the bank manager when he arrived Thursday morning, waited for seven other bank employees to arrive, then forced them to open the vault.
They escaped in the bank manager's car, which they abandoned a few miles away for another stolen vehicle.
That car broken down at St. Jogue, 10 miles north of Paspebiac, and the thieves took to a nearby forest where about 40 Quebec Provincial Police, aided by a helicopter, began a search.

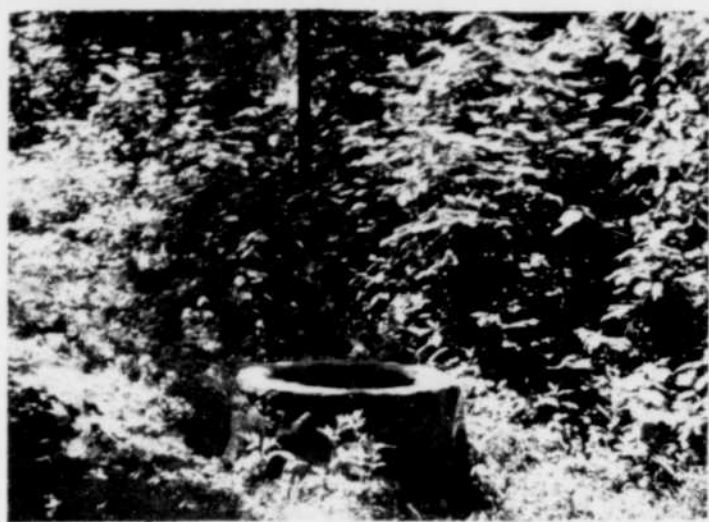

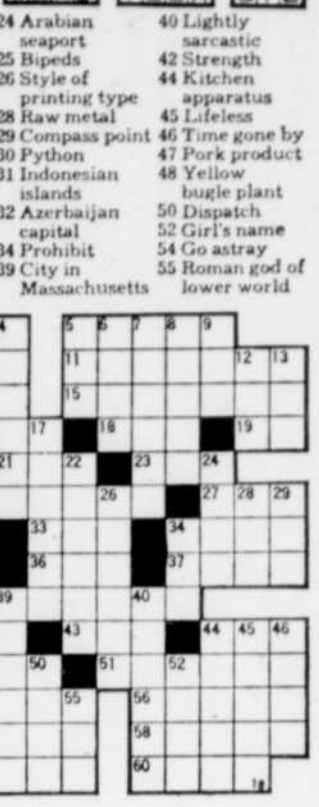

If you think that North and South got a little high when they bid six hearts with 12 high-card points opposite 10 and a broken trump suit we will agree with you and put down the overbidding to exuberance of youth.

The year was 1935. Both players were just 18 years old and appearing in their first tournament.

North was Robert MacPherran who won several national titles including the Vanderbilt in the ensuing years and South was John Crawford whose record of tournament wins is second only to Oswald Jacoby's.

Johnny sat South and was faced with the problem of getting 12 tricks. He had to ruff at least two diamonds in dummy and therefore it was necessary for him to assume a 2-2 trump break. Furthermore if he ruffed only two diamonds he would need a 3-3 club break to give him a parking place for his last diamond.

Cashed the ace of spades and ruffed a spade. Ruffed another diamond and another spade and finally the last diamond.

Back from Osaka, but no rest for Souls

SHERBROOKE — The Souls of Inspiration, a Sherbrooke-based rock group which has just released its first single, returned to the city Wednesday after having performed for two weeks at the Canadian pavilion at Expo 70 in Osaka, Japan.

"The audiences were just amazing," organ player Raymond Cloutier said as he spoke with The Record about the trip. "They run out on the stage and give you presents like fans and beads, and if you don't accept them on the spot it's considered an insult." The Japanese just love foreign performers, he added.

Comprising Cloutier, 21, bass guitarist Don Wilson, 19, lead singer and guitarist Jan Maciejewski, 20, and Mark Paradis, 21, as drummer, the Souls have worked out of Sherbrooke for over two years.

The most recent engagement was Aug. 21 when they performed in concert to a packed house at the Rex Theatre.

They will be performing again this Saturday at the Au Bon Marche store in Sherbrooke.

The group was selected to go to Expo 70 when it beat out more than 300 other bands in the Action Jeunesse '70 contest jointly sponsored by the Canadian Government and Air Canada.

"We just played our kind of music," Jan said, "and the people over there really seemed to dig our sound."

The boys did manage to travel around after their twice daily performances, and were impressed with the beauty of the Japanese countryside.

"You wouldn't believe the landscape," Raymond said, "but the cities are bad news."

"The cities are much too westernized for one thing, and the air pollution is so bad that you can't ever smell," he added.

They chatted with some Osaka University students about the

situation, and were given a demonstration of just how bad pollution really is.

The students developed a roll of film in a river to show the extent of the water's chemical content.

"We were amazed," Raymond said, "the negatives weren't too clear but they came out."

One aspect of Japanese urban life was most enjoyable, however, and it cost only 1,600 yen (about \$4) for almost two hours of sheer pleasure. That's right, the famous sauna baths!

"All I'll say is that it was most relaxing — you probably couldn't print the rest," Don said as his facial expression reflected the beautiful memories racing through his mind.

But the trip is history, and the group is rehearsing for weekend performances at the Centre des Loisirs in Magog tonight, and at the Rex Theatre in Sherbrooke at 11 p.m. Saturday.

"We haven't had 20 minutes off since we got back," Raymond said. And Sept. 27 the Souls will be featured in concert at Bishop's University.

Musically, the Souls' first single was released recently on the Quality Records label. Entitled Pursuit and Eyes of Nature, the songs are original compositions. An LP is being readied for release late in October, with sessions being held at the DMG studio, Thunder Bay, Ont.

The guiding light for the group has been Procul Harum, Don said, "and we've tried to use that spirit in our own way."

"We're trying to write now as much as possible," he added.

But why describe their music when you can listen and groove to it in person this weekend — The Souls of Inspiration deserve it for having put Sherbrooke on the Canadian musical map. Right on, Souls!

Chosen for titanic task

WINNIPEG (CP) — A third-year honors history student at the University of Winnipeg will be part of an expedition to salvage the ill-fated luxury liner Titanic.

Laura Nield, 19, will act as a recorder of events and procedures during the salvage operation being undertaken by a team headed by Douglas Woolley of Baldoak, England.

The Titanic sank 58 years ago when she struck an iceberg on her maiden voyage. The 46,000-ton ship went to the bottom about 95 miles south of the Grand Banks of Newfoundland with a loss of 1,513 lives.

"This is such a departure from my

normal way of life," said Miss Nield when informed that she had been chosen as part of the salvage team.

The project, expected to cost about \$5 million, is scheduled to begin this month.

The recovery method involved attaching 200 plastic containers filled with salt water to the hull by means of ropes which are capable of withstanding 50 tons of stress each.

"The salt water in the containers will be converted into hydrogen by running electricity through it," she said, "and the pressure of the gas should be sufficient to lift the ship which has a dead weight of 66,000 tons."

Quebec bishops suggest easing marriage rules

QUEBEC (CP) — Roman Catholic bishops of Quebec province approved a document on marriage Thursday which presents a new outlook on the theology of marriage, suggests new guidelines for couples preparing to marry and eases grounds for dissolution of marriages by the Church.

Maurice Cardinal Roy, archbishop of Quebec and Primate of the Roman Catholic Church in Canada, announced approval of the document at a news conference following a two-day meeting of the bishops.

The document says there will be a new approach to marriage annulments, formerly granted in rarest of circumstances.

The new approach would make use of "all the modern advances in the fields of psychoanalyses." Annulments can be granted if what the Church considers to be basic requirements "were not present" at the moment the marriage vows were taken.

Until now, under Canon Law, the Church has considered marriage indissoluble and divorce has not been recognized. Roman Catholics who obtain divorces may remain in the Church, but they are barred from remarrying and from receiving the sacraments.

The document applies only to territory under the jurisdiction of Quebec province bishops. Bishops in other provinces or

countries are free to draft their own regulations.

Annulments once were the sole prerogative of the Vatican, but this was changed by the Ecumenical Council, which transferred the power to local bishops.

Prospective members will be welcomed Sept. 21 at the first annual meeting of the Richmond Board of Trade.

The meeting will be held at 6:30 p.m. at the Bellevue Golf and Country Club in Richmond. Dinner will be served.

"Informal rap" at Bishop's Principal tells students "knowledge is personal"

LENNOXVILLE — "It's your education, and you've got to have a whole lot to say about it," said new principal Dennis Healy to a crowd of about six hundred students assembled in Bishop's University Centennial Theatre last night.

"If you think we're has-beens, ninnies and squares, if you think that none of us can be of any use to you, go back to square one and start again. We're here to help."

The meeting, called by Dean of Arts Philip Deane and dubbed "discussion and general rap session", was designed to share the ideas of both the dean and the principal with all of Bishop's, and to discuss the students' ideas about their education. Bishop's and its future.

"Some teachers want to produce copies of themselves, not to educate. But students are fed up with professors who reduce fascinating subjects to intellectual pabulum and spoon-feed it to the students," continued Dr. Healy, whom Deane had nicknamed "the Pied Piper of Hamelin".

"Knowledge should be adaptable, changeable and highly personal. There are an awful lot of people here who know a hell of a lot about a hell of a lot of subjects."

"What Philip and I feel about you goes deeper than friendship," he concluded.

Dean Deane, introduced by Dr. Healy as "my kind of man — he works", said that 80 per cent of the new arts students who responded to his request for letters claimed to have loathed their education thus far. They felt they were treated as nothing but numbers to be labelled and processed in the giant factory of today's educational system, and that getting a job was implied as the only reason for having to undergo this mass processing.

"Getting a job should be the least reason for getting an education," Deane retorted.

QUALITY NOT QUANTITY

As one approaches the Berkeley campus of the University of California, there is a huge sign which proclaims in huge letters that over 2500 courses are offered.

"To me, this is an obscenity," Deane said, wondering why large universities were so concerned with multiplicity of courses. "Giving a new student a huge calendar full of courses is like giving an aborigine a copy of the Sears-Roebuck catalog."

The dean felt that only small universities such as Bishop's can successfully serve the individual student.

STRUCTURAL REORGANIZATION

After having read the past year's minutes of four committees of the faculty of arts, Deane told the students, he realized that the same issue was

being discussed four times over in every case. The 19 professors on the committees had each spent 64 hours at committee meetings, thus making a total of 1216 hours which could have been spent with students. It was for this reason that the dean recommended that three of the four committees be merged into one.

DISCUSSION PERIOD

After both the dean and the principal had finished speaking, they invited the assembled students to express their opinions on the matters that had been discussed, or to ask questions.

In answer to one student's objection to the proposal that the number of courses in some fields be cut down, Deane answered that he would rather a professor prepared two courses, thoroughly, than five, sloppily.

"We're custom-tailored. We don't sell you hand-me-downs, we're Savile Row," he explained.

The thorny question of tenure was brought up by another student, getting Dr. Healy to admit that "perhaps the academic profession has been too concerned with money, security, with lots of things."

The validity of exams was also questioned, and the principal agreed that exams "may be the poorest weapon in the arsenal."

Also discussed was the age-old question of academic dress. Dr. Healy's stand on this issue was clear; academic dress as outlined in the rules, orders and regulations will be enforced until

such time as the students recommend to senate that the regulation be changed or dropped.

To this end, referendum has been called for next Wednesday, at which time the whole student body will vote either to keep academic dress, or to "down the gown".

Says stole paintings to finance party

QUEBEC (CP) — The theft and sale of 28 paintings and historic coins from the Quebec Provincial Museum was intended to finance the Nationalist Christian party, Etienne Blanchet, a Crown witness, testified Thursday.

Leo Tremblay, former leader of the now-defunct party, is charged with theft of the paint-

ings, part of a collection owned by former Quebec premier Maurice Duplessis.

A museum employee has testified that the paintings, valued at about \$150,000 in 1965, are worth almost \$2 million.

Mr. Blanchet said the funds were intended to aid in establishing the party and to help pay the cost of television broadcasts by Tremblay, the party founder.

Mr. Blanchet testified that Tremblay had confided to him that the Sovereign Council of "La Phalange"—a secret nationalist society to whom the destruction of certain Quebec monuments, including a statue of Queen Victoria, is attributed—had delegated him to steal the paintings.

Issues must be faced

The decision of Perry Ryan, elected as Liberal Member of Parliament for Spadina riding in Toronto, to throw in his lot with Robert Stanfield's Conservatives in itself means little to either the Trudeau Government or the Official Opposition in the House of Commons. The Government will continue to enjoy an overwhelming majority and the Opposition will still be a poor second in the party standings with barely half the number of seats held by the Liberals.

And the changeover by Mr. Ryan is hardly world-shaking, as the MP had already left the Liberal party to sit as an independent. Probably he found, as so many other independents have experienced before him, that sitting without party affiliation is a rather lonely existence, especially when the time for re-nomination approaches.

But the move by Mr. Ryan is significant for one reason. It is a warning to the Government, if the latter wants to heed it, that an issue of importance cannot be removed from the public mind merely by sweeping it under the carpet or by issuing windy statements veiled in official jargon.

The basic reason for Mr. Ryan's resignation from the Liberal caucus was his disenchantment with the Prime Minister's NATO policy.

Admittedly he has found many other reasons for criticizing the Government since he crossed the floor but there is no challenging his sincerity on the original issue.

The ethnic nature of his riding of Spadina may have an important bearing on his dramatic decision. The constituency contains many thousand immigrants from Europe who believe in good faith that Canada must continue its contributions to the protection of Europe if democracy is to be preserved.

Another big boondoggle

Perhaps distance lends enchantment to the view — or advancing years make the joys of our childhood seem greater than they actually were at the time we went to school. But we do not remember that the slides, swings, see-saws and jungle gyms were "dull, dangerous, non-durable and of limited use to young children." In our day we were lucky to have any of these devices at all, unless we aided the school janitor in constructing some such equipment for the school yard.

But the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development apparently is worried about these "dull, dangerous, non-durable" playground items and as a result has given over a quarter-of-a-million tax dollars to a "non-profit" foundation in Colorado "to study, design and test playground equipment for pre-school children."

According to HUD, the project will demonstrate how to build playgrounds "contributing to the physical and mental development of small children." HUD might better put its efforts to studying the "mental development" of the official who came up with this childish waste of the taxpayer's money.



Women's Lib-time bomb for church

They may be parading down Fifth Avenue with banners and music but the real encounter for the Women's Liberation Movement has yet to begin. We are not referring to government or business but the Church. For here you have the tradition of women being completely subject to the ethics, theology and authority of men. For centuries. Forever? Not if the reports we are receiving are true.

Dr. Laile E. Bartlett recently reported her findings on the new self-image of women in the church. This California sociologist was quoted in the Religious News Service as saying:

"Up to now the situation has been that of 'Mother Church' but 'Father Image.' As any sociologist can tell you, women have predominated in church membership, attendance, support, interest and loyalty, but men have wielded the power.

"But now even the mildest, contemplative nuns are beginning to see their place in the church in more active and positive terms."

In the Roman Catholic Church in America there are about 60,000 priests and 200,000 nuns. As the liberation movement starts finding its roots in the lives of these women, who can guess what changes and directions will come to pass?

The Protestant Church has no room for chuckles at this juncture. It, too, is supported, attended and patched together by the efforts and energy of millions of women. Yet there are only about 100 women ministers in the ranks

of 250,000 ordained clergymen. No bishops, and very few seminary professors, are women.

When the United Presbyterian Women gathered some 4,500 delegates to a five-day meeting at Purdue this summer, they spelled out rather fully their convictions on abortion.

The resolution voted called for modification or repeal of laws that existed so that "women and physicians and pastors and other counselors may be able to exercise their individual best judgment for or against abortion without any legal encumbrance."

The conference went on to urge that physicians who performed abortions should be subject only to the "general laws regulating medical licensure and practice and not to special criminal penalties." In other words, a general national abortion law and "available to all women regardless of economic status."

In other areas of church life, economics will come into focus. The slavery salaries paid so many professional women employed by religious institutions can no longer be tolerated. Costs will go up and the church workers in hospitals, seminaries, schools and clinics will seek a just return for their time and effort. Young nuns in Orders expect something more than carfare and older nuns at the point of retirement have suddenly discovered they want to travel, to attend concerts and plays and not be restricted to some mid-continent rest home. It's happening, Women's Liberation, and most especially in the Church.

Militant moderate wants Indians off reserve

CALGARY (CP) — William Yvan Clarke Wuttunee, first full-blooded Indian admitted to the Alberta Law Society, has a penchant for mod suits, fast cars, and fights he almost always loses.

Mr. Wuttunee, one-time president of the now-defunct National Indian Council of Canada, is a rare commodity — a hell-raising moderate in an era of quietly understated militancy among the nation's 250,000 Indians.

A 42-year-old Cree from Saskatchewan's poverty-stricken Red Pheasant reserve, Mr. Wuttunee runs a highly successful law practice from fashionable offices in the downtown Calgary Herald building.

When he talks about Indians he invariably says "they" instead of "we." Perhaps this is because he is a smashing success as a functional part of white society, something that few of Alberta's 27,000 other Indians have in common with him.

Mr. Wuttunee hasn't lived on a reserve for 27 years and speaks contemptuously of those who do. He has even less patience with contemporary leaders.

'JUMP IN RIVER'
"Tell them to go to hell like I do," Mr. Wuttunee advises whites faced with rising demands from leaders such as Harold Cardinal, an arch-enemy who is president of the Indian Association of Alberta.

"They're all a headache. Tell them to go jump in the river. These leaders are exploiting Indian people worse than anyone ever has. They are like a pack of wolves feeding on the carrion of a bygone age."

It was verbal cannonades such as this that earned the silver-haired soliloquist the epithet "Uncle Tomahawk" and formal banishment from the Red Pheasant reserve this spring.

Wuttunee is associated by his nephew Gerald Wuttunee, who said:

"He is a paid-off tool of the Alberta Establishment. It is

hard for me to say this, but my uncle has been bought out."

When Mr. Wuttunee told reporters he would challenge the banishment by returning to the reserve, the Red Pheasant band council ordered road blocks and increased police patrols.

Discretion proved to be the better part of valor and the band council decree went unchallenged. Mr. Wuttunee later partially recanted his hard line on Indian rights, but the ban is still in effect.

Mr. Wuttunee is a strange blend of quasi-mystical Indian beliefs and hard-headed white business sense. A literate, urbane man, he proudly boasts that his 14-year-old daughter Wanda lends money to her younger brothers and sisters and charges them interest.

CUTS DASHING FIGURE

He cuts a dashing figure in expensive bell-bottomed suits, gunning around Calgary in a cream-colored fastback sports car. Endowed with strongly handsome Indian features, Mr. Wuttunee could well have stepped from the set of a typically Hollywood remake of Geronimo.

He credits his success in breaking out of the reserve poverty cycle to his father, "who had the brains to leave the reserve with the family in 1943, move to the city and get a job."

"I was raised in white society, we had no problems in integrating into it. I finished high school and won a scholarship to university."

After studies at McGill University in Montreal Mr. Wuttunee returned to the University of Saskatchewan and earned a law degree in 1954. He subsequently moved to Alberta and was admitted to the bar here in 1962.

During this period Mr. Wuttunee evolved into an outspoken advocate of Indian rights and a harsh critic of the federal government's Indian policy in a time when few others were speaking out.

At one point he even dared attack the sacrosanct Calgary

Stampede for "showing life among the Indians as it was in 1905 despite our many cultural advances."

OUTLOOK CHANGED

Indian leaders across the country, working to form the National Indian Council of Canada, took notice of the voice in the wilderness and tapped him to head the new organization.

Half way through his term as NICC president Mr. Wuttunee's outlook on the Indian problem changed. He credited this to a conference he attended sponsored by the Moral Re-Armament movement, often linked to the political and philosophical far right.

"After attending that conference I realized I had to overcome my bitterness. The National Indian Council had been formed to unite the Indians in bitterness. . . we had decided to separate from the white man if necessary."

"I apologized for leading my friends astray."

With the change in Mr. Wuttunee's outlook the fortunes of the NICC took a nosedive. The organization itself was an unwieldy amalgam of treaty Indians, non-treaty Indians and Metis. All three groups had differing priorities and methods.

The other factor was a strikingly beautiful Mohawk fashion model named Kahn-Tineta Horn, leader of the militant faction of the NICC. Miss Horn's battles with Mr. Wuttunee blew the organization apart.

Miss Horn called Mr. Wuttunee a "traitor to his people." Mr. Wuttunee responded by taking back her title of "National Indian Princess," as well as bouncing her off the NICC's Indian centennial committee, which was then drafting pavilion plans for Expo 67.

RETREATED TO LAW

By the time Centennial Year rolled around the NICC was finished and Mr. Wuttunee retreated to Calgary and his law practice.

A truce was arranged on all fronts by the Indian-Eskimo

Association of Canada, a predominantly white group. Those NICC leaders that were still talking to one another agreed to split into two separate bodies — the National Indian Brotherhood and the Metis Society of Canada.

The militants, many of whom got their combat experience in the NICC, continued in the ascendancy but Mr. Wuttunee

steered clear of the kinetic world of Indian politics.

He jumped back into the fight in June, 1969, when Indian Affairs Minister Jean Chretien issued his long-awaited white paper on the native population.

The white paper, damned virtually unanimously by Indian leaders across the country, advocated dissolution of the

Indian affairs department in five years, surrendering of jurisdiction to the provinces and taxation of reserve lands.

Mr. Wuttunee sided with Mr. Chretien and tore into the critics of the white paper with as slashing rhetoric that stunned and infuriated Indian leaders across the prairies, culminating in the Red Pheasant reserve ban.

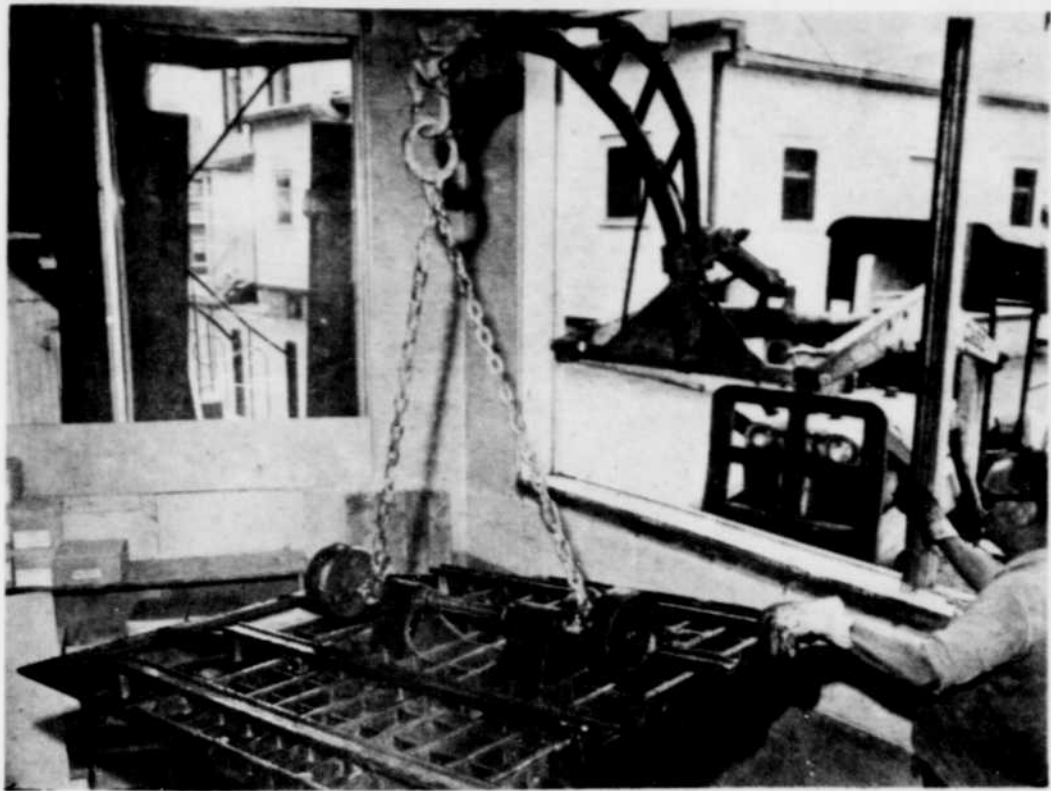

Le Progres-Chronique de Magog, like the Sherbrooke Record and many other newspapers with less than 50,000 circulation, has switched to offset because of efficiency in printing, clarity of reproduction and a number of other advantages.

Jordanian tanks hit guerrillas

BEIRUT, Lebanon (CP) — King Hussein's army threw armored might at Arab Palestinian guerrillas across Jordan Thursday in a move to crush an uprising against the desert nation's new military regime. By nightfall, the army said it had broken guerrilla resistance in Amman and the guerrilla stronghold of Zarqa, 15 miles northeast of the capital. But troops continued to battle guerrillas house to house. An indefinite curfew was imposed in Amman, and government broadcasts warned the city's 600,000 people that anyone on the street would be shot on sight. Many casualties were reported on both sides and guerrilla officials in Beirut spoke of "hundreds of martyrs." Numerous civilians were killed in the cross-fire between army troops and Palestinians. Army communiques said Jordanian troops controlled 16 dis-

trict in Amman and were mopping up guerrilla pockets of resistance. Elsewhere, they said, the army was moving with success to re-establish order. They also reported guerrilla defections. But a guerrilla broadcast from Damascus, Syria, denied the claims and said the Palestinians held the northern third of Jordan from Jerash, 25 miles north of Amman, to the Syrian border. It added that the reported defectors were only "wounded men who have been captured."

GUERRILLAS SPLINTERED Hussein's army totals about 55,000 men while the guerrillas' rolls list 32,000. But the latter are scattered and their organization is splintered and disordered. The Jordanian trouble reverberated in other Arab capitals. In Beirut, Baghdad, Damascus and Algiers, Jordanian students, including many of Palestinian originals, forced their way past police guards and occupied Jordanian embassies. They announced the occupations would last until the new military regime was overthrown. Late Thursday afternoon, after daylong fighting that sent balls of black and gray smoke swirling over Amman, the military government urged the guerrillas to evacuate the capital and move up to the ceasefire line with Israel "while the chance is still open to you."

"Save your lives and the lives of civilians," the army broadcast said. "We shall facilitate your transfer to the front." The guerrillas, who proclaimed earlier that it was "a fight to the finish," rejected the proposal and called on their forces to seal off Amman with roadblocks and mines. When Field Marshal Habis Majali offered the guerrillas safe conduct out of Jordan's cities and towns, they hurled the challenge back at him.

Arab leaders plan Tripoli summit

Cairo (Reuters) — President Gamal Abdel Nasser of Egypt and Libyan leader Muammar el Gaddafi held urgent talks on the Jordan crisis Thursday and the Egyptian Middle East News Agency later said Arab leaders would hold a summit meeting in Tripoli in the next few days. The report said the talks would be devoted to hammering out a settlement between King Hussein's newly appointed military government and Arab commanders. No further details of the projected summit were available here but observers assumed it was a direct outcome of the talks Thursday in Mersa Matruh, near the Egyptian-Libyan border. A Middle East News Agency report from Tripoli Thursday night quoted an official announcement saying Nasser, Gaddafi and Sudan's Maj-Gen. Jaafar el-Imeiri would hold an important meeting in the Libyan capital in the next few days. The news agency later issued a correction saying the meeting would be between Arab presidents, deleting all references to names without explanation.

WASHINGTON (Reuters) — President Nixon will make an urgent appeal to Premier Golda Meir today that Israel resume the Middle East peace talks, United States officials report. Nixon is expected to link his plea with pledges of further U.S. military and economic aid to Israel to prevent the military balance from swinging toward the Arabs. Mrs. Meir, who spent Thursday in New York City, was reported determined to express dismay over the failure of the U.S. to win rectification of alleged Egyptian ceasefire violations and to demand a rolling-back of Russian missiles as the price of Israel's agreement to resume the peace talks. But she faces strong pressure to accept Nixon's view that the reported violations, while serious and a breach of faith by Egypt and Russia, have not jeopardized Israeli security and that the overriding problem is to get the Middle East situation back on the diplomatic track.

WORLD REPORT

How to find a monster

BELMONT, Mass. (AP) — Four Americans have come up with a scheme to coax Scotland's legendary Loch Ness monster out of hiding with strobe lights, sonar devices and sex stimulants. "We're going to use attractants," said Robert Rines, one of the four, in a telephone interview prior to his departure for Scotland Thursday night. "We're going after all the known senses the creature may have—sex, smell, taste, sound." Rines, a lawyer and lecturer in patent law at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, said his four-man group, all members of the Academy of Applied Sciences, will be joining several teams from various universities that already have begun searching the 20-mile-long lake in northern Scotland. Rines is president of the academy which he says is made up of "interdisciplinary scientists," persons from non-scientific backgrounds working on nontechnical aspects of a scientific problem. The academy's headquarters are in Belmont.

Chavez boycotts lettuce

SALINAS, Calif. (Reuters) — Farm union organizer Cesar Chavez declared a nationwide boycott Thursday on all lettuce that does not carry the label of his union. Chavez called for the consumer and market boycott to force lettuce growers in the Salinas Valley and elsewhere to sign up with his United Farm Workers organizing committee. Local lettuce growers, who produce the bulk of the U.S. lettuce crop, recently signed contracts with the Teamsters Union. With a few exceptions, they have refused to cancel those pacts in favor of dealing with Chavez.

Comedian charged with perjury

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Comedian Phil Foster was indicted Thursday on charges of committing perjury before a federal grand jury investigating organized crime and official corruption in New Jersey. Foster was indicted in connection with an investigation by a justice department strike force into activities of reputed Cosa Nostra underboss Thomas (Tommy Ryan) Eboli, of Fort Lee, N.J., where Foster also lives. The five-count indictment charges that Foster, 57-year-old television and night-club comic perjured himself in testimony to a federal grand jury sitting in Newark June 25 this year. An official said Foster's testimony concerned statements he had made earlier to Internal Revenue Service agents investigating Eboli's income-tax returns.

Ask layman share in clergy choice

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — A congress of leading Roman Catholic theologians called on the church Thursday to let laymen share in the choice of a pope, a bishop or a priest. This guideline was approved by a vote of 149 to 20, with seven abstentions and two invalid ballots. A total of 230 theologians, nearly all of them priests and from many countries, took part in the six-day meeting on the future of the church. They also said churches must fight for freedom and look carefully for any possible link between themselves and "the powers of oppression." Christian communities, they added, must seek actively to free the oppressed, whether victims of racial discrimination, industrial societies totalitarian regimes. The vote on this point was 156 to 19, with three abstentions. A two-thirds majority was needed to carry.

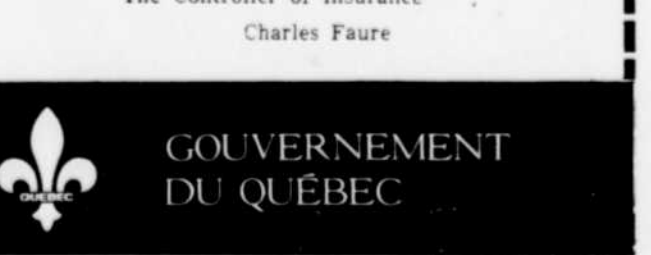

Hunting and fishing in the E.T.

This week I was browsing around in some of the old editions of the Record. And in 1904 there were some comments and stories regarding the deer situation as it existed at that time.

There was a story telling of the slaughter of deer in the areas of the E.T. and the north of Montreal. The writer noted that deer were piled up at the Union station in Montreal like cordwood awaiting the owners to claim them. It was evident at that time from other stories that controls on deer would soon be required. In fact, at that time the protection service was an infant and hunting regulations just a thought in the minds of many.

Later editions told of violators of the game laws who were prosecuted only for shipping deer illegally. A conservationist told an interested group at a Montreal meeting that if the slaughter continued the deer population of the Province would become almost extinct within the next forty to fifty years.

Well, as we see, this might just be the case. However, I do feel that now a genuine effort is being made by the Wildlife Service and Protection Service along with the general public to maintain and bring the deer population back. I mention this only to remind some hunters that the problem isn't one of a new origin but that it has been kicked around now for over sixty years and that talk and argument over the pros and cons of the subject must give way to sound management and controls if the situation is to improve.

MIGRATORY BIRD hunters: Reliable sources report that this year the provincial conservation officers (Game Wardens) will be checking for the "Federal Duck Stamps". Previously they didn't enforce this part of the law; it was left to the R.C.M.P.

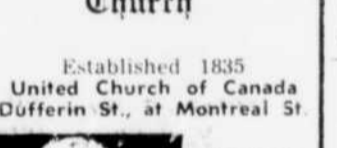

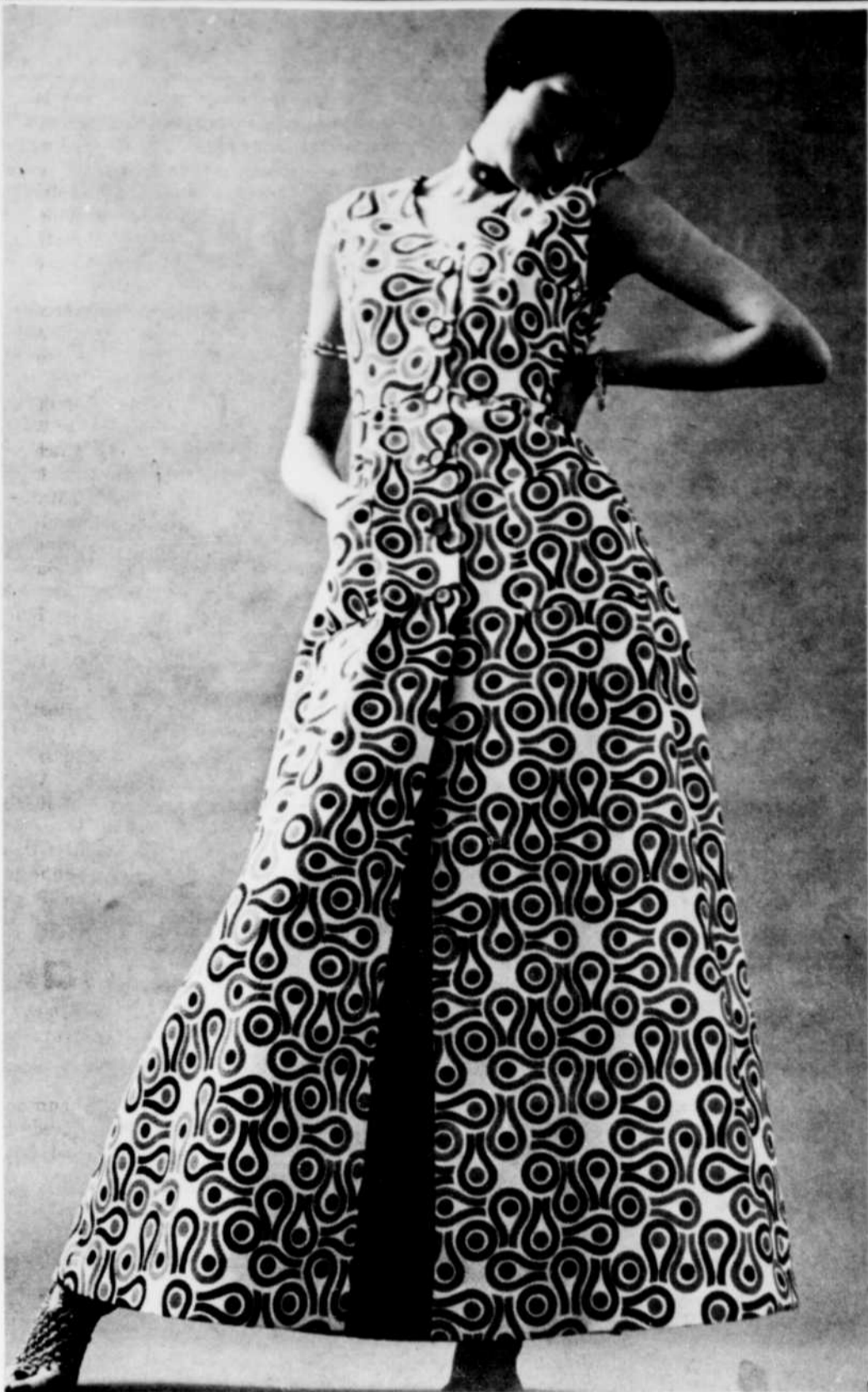

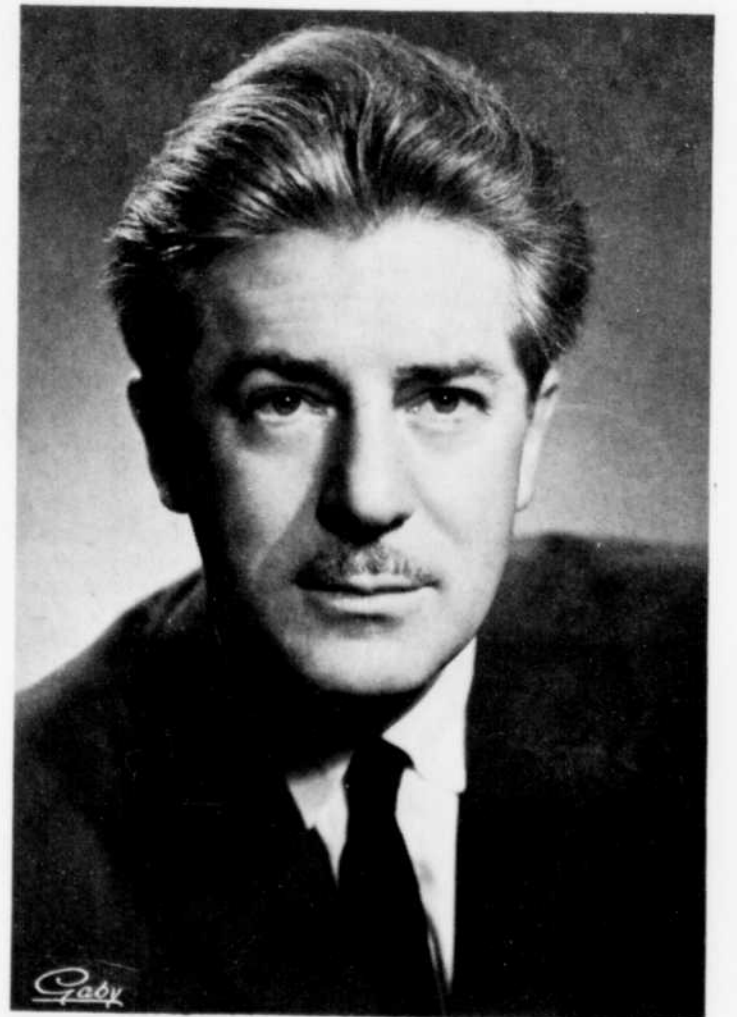

Quebec Chambers of Commerce to gather in Sherbrooke

By GERRY FLAHERTY

SHERBROOKE — The 35th annual meeting of the Chambers of Commerce of Quebec will be held here Sept. 17-19, according to Thomas W. Leonard, president, Sherbrooke Chamber of Commerce. More than 500 delegates from every sector of the province are expected to attend, he said. The announcement was made at a press conference yesterday, with Mr. Claude Genest, president, Provincial Chamber of Commerce, and Mr. Roger Lague, president, Eastern Townships Regional Chamber of Commerce, in attendance. The theme of the event will be "economic priorities".

Local members of the Chamber of Commerce have been meeting weekly for three months in preparation for the event, Mr. Leonard said, and city council has already voted in favor of a civic vin d'honneur for delegates.

As well, delegates and their wives will be feted at a buffet dinner and cocktail party to be held in the new cafeteria of the University of Sherbrooke. Providing the entertainment at the opening night festivities will be television personality Jean Malo, a choir, and the Eastern Townships Pipe Band.

President Claude Genest said an important function of the meeting will be to expose the general population and especially the young to economic matters, through the print and the broadcast media.

The program of the annual meeting will include debate on the many resolutions submitted by the member-chambers of the provincial federation, Mr. Genest said. Several distinguished persons will take part in the discussions, including Jean Marchand, federal minister of regional economic expansion,

and Herve Belzile, president, Canadian Life Insurance Assn. The most important session will focus attention on economic priorities, Mr. Genest said. Under the chairmanship of Philippe de Gaspé-Beaubien, it will serve as a platform for recognized experts to submit their observations and conclusions for the critical consideration of the businessmen. Newsmen took advantage of the press conference to quiz Mr. Leonard, a Sherbrooke notary, on local developments of an economic nature.

The Chamber of Commerce is continuing negotiations with liquidators regarding James United Steel Ltd., he said, but the Chamber's committee has not made a final decision regarding the question.

As to relations between the Chamber and city council, Mr. Leonard said the two bodies have their differences of opinion from time to time, but no major problems exist between them at the present time.

Regarding the recent Sherbrooke valuation roll, he said the Chamber agrees in principle with the need for a 100 per cent valuation. "It is the only equitable way of proceeding," he said. Member firms will shortly be advised in a newsletter, however, as to the correct procedure to be followed if specific valuations are questioned. City Clerk Henri-Paul Emond must be advised by registered letter before Sept. 14.

Mr. Leonard refused comment concerning Ald. Gerard Deziel's comment to council Monday night regarding the industrial park. Ald. Deziel had said IBM Canada Ltd. would have built its computer components plant in Sherbrooke rather than in Bromont, had the local industrial park been operational earlier. Mr. Leonard did say that Sherbrooke should have had its industrial park long ago.
