World News In Brief

New York, June 25.—(P)—Joe Louis and Joe Walcott got the good word from the weatherman late this morning.

The third man in the deal predicted afternoon showers but added that it will be followed by a fair evening. And that means the twice-postponed fight is on.

London, June 25.—(Reuters)—A British Overseas Airways Corporation Constellation, bound for Montreal, was recalled to London Airport last night after a telephone warning that a bomb was aboard. A search of the plane, carrying 21 passengers, yielded nothing.

Philadelphia, June 25.—(AP)—Col. Robert R. McCormick, publisher of the Chicago Tribune who opposed Thomas E. Dewey's nomination for President, commented last night when the Republicans nominated Dewey: "It might have been worse—it might have been Vandenberg."

Athens, June 25.—(P)—Twenty-six persons were reported executed here today. They had been convicted of treason, sabotage or murder.

Santiago, June 25.—(AP)—The Chilean Senate approved last night the government's proposal to outlaw the Communist party in Chile.

Littleton, N.H., June 25.—(P)—Two landslides roared a mile and a half down Mt. Lafayette in the picturesque White Mountain chain yesterday, burying sections of Franconia Notch highway under 20 feet of earth. Officials said early today that it had not been determined whether anyone had been trapped.

New York, June 25.—(AP)—The 44-man crew of a flame-swept Norwegian tanker has been picked up at sea, the master of one of the rescue vessels reported today. The 8,804-ton Fenris was abandoned 649 miles northwest of Brest, France, yesterday.

Ottawa, June 25.—(P)—The Dominion Government will make a \$5,000,000 grant to British Columbia for relief and rehabilitation in the flood-ravaged Fraser Valley, Prime Minister Mackenzie King told the Commons today.

C.C.F. Wins Saskatchewan Election But Majority Cut

Regina, June 25.—(P)—The C.C.F. Government of Premier T. C. Douglas was returned to office in Saskatchewan yesterday with its majority slashed by a strong Liberal comeback. The heaviest vote in the province's history poured into polling booths despite cloudy skies and an intermittent drizzle that mired many back-country roads. In 30 of the 30 seats, C.C.F. candidates were re-elected. The Liberals took 13 seats from the Government to elect 18 members while one of the four Liberal-Progressive Conservative candidates was elected.

On the basis of its trend-analysis of early returns, The Canadian Press indicated the return of the Government with a reduced majority two hours after the polls closed. There were an estimated 520,000 eligible voters in the election—10 per cent of them people between 18 and 21 voting for the first time in a Canadian election. With 2,925 of 39,206 polls reported, a Canadian Press compilation showed 459,618 people voted and the final total might hit 500,000.

Republican Nominee Dewey Is A Mild Internationalist

Governor Thomas E. Dewey, who for the second time is a Republican presidential nominee, is a mild internationalist. He is an advocate of the reciprocal trade agreement program initiated in the United States in 1934 and recently under fire by the Republican Congressional majority. Friendly towards Canada where he has relations, he is in favor of international development of the St. Lawrence seaway and power project.

The New York Governor first became prominent as a "racket buster" in New York city. His achievements there brought

his election as District Attorney of New York county in 1937. A year later he brought him the Republican nomination for Governor. That year Dewey came within 64,000 votes of unseating the veteran Governor Herbert Lehman. In 1942 he was successful in his campaign for the Governorship. He rolled up a 650,000 plurality over John J. Bennett. In 1946 he was re-elected by an even larger margin. Dewey was born in Owosso, Mich., March 24, 1902, the son of a newspaper publisher. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1923 and went to New York and received his law degree at Columbia law school in 1925. At the 1940 Republican convention, also at Philadelphia, Dewey led on the first three ballots but his strength ebbed as he withdrew in favor of the late Wendell L. Willkie.

The 1944 convention chose Dewey as its Presidential nominee. He was beaten by the late President Roosevelt but rolled up a popular vote of 22,066,278 to come within 3,596,227 of the victory. Dewey took the "licking philosophically but didn't care much for another four-year term as Governor. His party renominated him in 1946, however, and he was re-elected by a record majority of 687,000 over Senator James M. Mead, Democrat.

That victory placed Dewey in contention once more for the 1948 Presidential nomination. Again, the pre-convention primaries earlier this year followed the familiar pattern. After an initial victory in New Hampshire, Dewey lost in Wisconsin and Nebraska but at the convention, the New Yorker was never headed. Dewey stakes his claim to the White House on his record at Albany, which he contrasts to what he calls the "bungling" and "inefficient" administration of President Truman. Under Dewey's leadership, New York state has amassed a surplus of more than \$500,000,000, cut personal income and business taxes and provided a \$400,000,000 bonus for Second World War veterans. The state also has reduced its bonded debt, outlawed racial and religious discrimination in jobs and admittance to colleges, begun plans for a \$200,000,000 state university system, and banned strikes by public employees.

Philadelphia, June 25.—(AP) Governor Earl Warren of California was picked by Thomas E. Dewey as the man he wants for a vice-presidential running mate today.

Philadelphia, June 25.—(P)—For the second time in four years Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York, ex-choir singer and "racket buster," today started off his tenacious quest of the biggest plum in United States politics—the Presidency.

Last night the 46-year-old Dewey was given the unanimous nomination of the Republican national convention on a third ballot which was merely an opportunity for 1,094 delegates to make it unanimous.

Meantime, the word was out that rampant Deweyites—happy over wrecking a 90-year-old tradition of never having renominated a loser—were toying with the idea of making it double or nothing. The double—if this came to pass—would be Senator John W. Bricker of Ohio as the vice-presidential nominee. Bricker ran with Dewey in the 1944 Republican debate in which Franklin D. Roosevelt won his fourth term. The nothing would be a defeat in

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Rainbow Breaks From Storm As Dewey Chosen

Philadelphia, June 25.—(P)—Winds of near gale force, lightning, thunder and a torrential downpour swept huge Municipal Stadium yesterday where some 13,000 persons gathered to watch the Republican national convention nominate Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York as their Presidential candidate in 1948.

But, just about the time of the start of the landslide that clinched the Dewey victory, the skies broke and what appeared to be a huge rainbow arched over the city. The convention poster that brought Dewey unanimous nomination on the third ballot coincided almost exactly with the rainbow-like phenomenon. A different kind of drama was presented when Harlan W. Kelley, blind Wisconsin orator and friend and comrade of Gen. Douglas MacArthur, who nominated his chief at 4 a.m. Thursday, was led to the platform to put the slim, McArthur forces behind their chosen candidate.

Behind him on the platform two Philippine women delegates sat silently with tears running down their cheeks. Harold Stassen, former Governor of Minnesota whose frank campaign of nearly three years brought him only third place on the ballot, was perhaps the real hero of the evening. Stassen faced the music with a smile.

He was the first of the candidates—and in fact the only one with a real chance to be nominated—who walked to the rostrum and told his followers that he would no longer hold them to their pledges. He went further. He urged them to vote for Dewey, and in the coming campaign, to work for Dewey. Governor Dewey solemnly set a goal of freedom for men everywhere in accepting the Presidential nomination.

"As long as the world is half free, we must peacefully labor to help men everywhere achieve liberty," he told the cheering convention delegates. "Above all other purposes," he said, "we must labor by every peaceful means to build a world order founded upon justice and righteousness. That kind of a world will have peace. That kind of peace will be worth having."

World freedom and an appeal for unity to help achieve it were the two central themes of the New York Governor's 15-minute acceptance speech. "We are a united party," he told the Republicans, but "our nation stands tragically in need of that same unity."

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Blockade Leaves Air Routes Only Way To Get Food Into Sector Housing 2,000,000

British and American Authorities Say Present Food Stocks Will Last One Month.

Berlin, June 25.—(AP)—The Russians today ordered that no more food from their zone be sent into the western-occupied sectors of Berlin.

They stopped traffic yesterday on the single railroad line supplying those sectors with food from the western occupation zones.

The blockade left the air the only way to get food in to the 2,000,000 inhabitants of the British, American, and French sectors. Allied experts said that would prove unworkable in the long run.

British and American authorities said a month's food stocks are on hand in the western sectors and nobody will starve. The people remained outwardly calm in the face of efforts of the Soviet-controlled press to spread fear of hunger and unemployment and a Russian threat to keep the rail freight tieup indefinitely.

L. J. Steck, American military government food chief, said the Russian food embargo order was delivered to the central food board of the German municipal government.

He said one immediate effect would be to deprive the children of western Berlin of fresh milk. Powdered milk is being distributed. By their action the Russians withdrew from the four-power food pool which for nearly three years has been feeding Berlin.

Each occupying power has been contributing to this pool, administered by the Allied Kommandatura and the city government.

Dismissing the pool means splitting Berlin down the middle from the standpoint of food supply. The Russians can feed the 1,000,000 Germans in their sector from their surrounding occupation zone. The western supplies have to come in from the western occupation zones. They can't come in so long as the rail line is blocked.

In the British, American and French sectors, Germans began trading their money for the new deutsche mark, which was put in competition here with the eastern German money the Russians introduced yesterday.

Long lines stood before exchange offices. American armored cars and machine-gun-bearing jeeps patrolled streets of the United States sector on guard against disturbances. Another form of Russian pressure continued. Electric current was interrupted again in western sectors of the city. Half such current is supplied from Russian-occupied territory.

London, June 25.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Bevin told the Commons today that a "delicate state of affairs" exists in Russian-blockaded Berlin.

He said the Russian embargo on road and rail shipments from the west, and interrupted power service in the city, have resulted in a serious situation. But, he added, Berlin inhabitants are displaying calmness, showing no sign of being intimidated. He said the British commander in Berlin reported sufficient food stocks on hand to "render any immediate anxiety unnecessary."

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Jews Charge That Arabs Broke Truce

Israel Says Egyptian Army Bombed Two Jewish Settlements.

Tel Aviv, Israel, June 25.—(AP)—Israel today charged the Egyptian army with breaking the United Nations truce by bombing two Jewish settlements and halting a food convoy to the southern Negeb.

Unofficial advisers said three Irgun Zvai Leumi fighters and perhaps some Israeli troops were killed in clashes that developed as Irgun withdrew from Israeli front lines. The Israeli government was standing firm against the challenge by Irgun, a dissident underground group.

The Rhodes headquarters of Count Folke Bernadotte, U.N. mediator, said Egyptian fighter aircraft had attacked a United Nations plane in Palestine.

King Abdullah of Trans-Jordan returned to Amman after conferences in Cairo with King Farouk. He said the Arab states headed by Egypt were resolved to continue fighting until the Jewish state is wiped out. Abdullah plans to leave tomorrow for Saudi Arabia to visit King Ibn Saud.

The Israeli government said the Egyptian planes bombed Beer Tuva and Kfar Warburg near the coast midway between Tel Aviv and Gaza. A United Nations observer returning from the southern front said the Egyptians refused to permit a Jewish food and replacement convoy to pass Arab positions commanding the road near Beit Daras, but no shooting occurred. The observers said he had no report that Jewish settlements were bombed.

Irgun disappeared from the mid-city building in Tel Aviv which has been its headquarters. Blue and white armbands which publicly denoted Irgun members disappeared as the organization returned to its underground status.

Raid on Irgun gathering places were continued by the Israeli army. More than 40 new arrests were reported at Haifa.

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Quebec Flag Is Called A Symbol

Premier Duplessis Says It Represents the "Rights and Liberties" of People of Province.

Montreal, Que., June 25.—(AP)—Premier Duplessis told an election rally in this St. Lawrence south-shore town last night that voters on election day should mark their ballot "with a cross that won't represent the crucifixion of a people."

He reminded a crowd gathered in Rimouski arena on the feast of St. Jean Baptiste, patron saint of Quebec, that it was the first time they were able to celebrate the occasion with a distinct provincial flag.

He described the new provincial banner with its white cross and corner Fleur de Lys as the symbol of the "rights and liberties" of the people of Quebec.

"The legitimate aspirations of a people cannot be choked," Premier Duplessis said.

The Union Nationale leader called Liberal chief Adolphe Godbout "the servant of his leaders at Ottawa."

He said the question at issue in the campaign for provincial elections July 28 was whether the people of Quebec want a government which is a "trailer of the Federal government."

Premier Duplessis said the Union Nationale offered Quebec the alternative of a government that was the "servant of the people and independent of all political parties."

"This is not an ordinary fight," Premier Duplessis said, "it is a question of knowing if the people of Quebec are to be masters at home and if the Quebec Legislature is to be a fortress of provincial right or their graveyard."

Premier Duplessis attacked the Liberal party program as being "made up of paper promises."

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Claxton Stresses Need For Strong Canadian Defences

Ottawa, Ont., June 25.—Defence Minister Claxton told the Commons yesterday that Canada must keep her defences alert because of Russia's aggressiveness. He predicted, however, that should the Soviet attempt a large scale attack on this country it would be destroyed "within a short time."

"The probability . . . of any such attack is so slight at present that it is something that hardly needs being counted in the realm of active possibility," said Mr. Claxton who left hospital to return to the Commons and make the annual statement on the country's defence problems.

Despite the unlikelihood of any such Russian attack, Canadian defence authorities are studying "possibilities, probabilities and plans" on the "assumption that war might take place at dates ranging from the present time on into the indefinite future."

He said Canada's three regular forces will be recruited beyond the current target of 42,000. The Minister's statement brought immediate opposition reaction and among participants in the debate were Maj.-Gen. G. R. Pearkes V.C. (PC-Nanaimo) and Clarke V.C. (CCF-Cape Breton South).

Gen. Pearkes, a veteran of the two world wars, said Canada's forces would be "impotent" if they are called to defend the country against a "sudden" attack. He stressed the need for training of civilians and for an up-to-date air force.

Time to go to bed, kiddies, Sun's coming up and the waiters are sweeping out the joint. But before the doorman tucks you into your taxicab, Uncle Willie would like to spin a Broadway bedtime story about a pug, a profile and a pony.

The pug is a chorus girl at one of the jazz-and-junior joints I used to run back in the '30's. Her name was Corabelle, and she was long of stem and lavish of bosom.

The profile was a wolf in Brooks Brothers clothing. His name was Percy Forrester, and to hear headwaiters tell it, he was as opulent as he is ornamental.

The pug in our story was really in ex-pug. He was known as 'Bulby' Waters, and his face was as lumpy as the mashed potatoes at a drugstore counter. His career

as a fighter had ended the night it ran into the fists of Stonewall Jack at Madison Square Garden.

At the time our sunrise saga begins, Bulby was running one of those health clubs where playboys go to punch off their paunches. Yanks Close Gap With Cleveland As They Take Important Series; Jackie Robinson Stars For Bums

Are Cleveland Indians ready to be scalped? Manager Lou Boudreau's American League pace-setters have lost their first crucial series of the year and pitcher Bob Feller shows no signs of returning to form.

These two factors have cast a cloud over a once rosy outlook. Now only 1½ games separates the Indians from the pursuing World Champion New York Yankees.

The Yankees came into Cleveland Monday night 3½ games off the pace. They knocked off southern ace Gene Bearden, lost a 5-2 decision to Sam Zoladak Tuesday, beat Don Black in 11 innings Wednesday and yesterday thrashed Feller 4-0.

Feller allowed the Yanks only five hits yesterday but three of them were home runs and resulted in all of the Yankee runs, the loss was Rapid Robert's eighth as against only six victories.

George McQuinn, Johnny Lindell and Joe DiMaggio rifled Feller pitches out of the park. DiMaggio's blow was his 17th to him with Cleveland's Ken Keltner for the circuit lead.

Vic Raschi stopped the Indians with six hits to post his ninth straight triumph and fourth shut-out.

Philadelphia's third-place Athletics pulled to within two games of the Indians by noosing out the Browns, 6-5 in a night game at St. Louis.

A four-run eighth inning rally, highlighted by Ferris Fain's triple and Barney McCosky's two-bagger, enabled the A's to win. The Browns culled only three hits off three Athletics pitchers but 13 bases on balls kept them in the game.

Starter Phil Marchildon allowed only one hit in 4 2/3 innings he worked but he experienced terri-

fic spells of wildness, walking 10 and throwing two wild pitches. Earl Harris, who relieved him and pitched hitless ball for 2 1/3 innings before Bob Savage took over in the eighth inning, received credit for the victory.

The up-and-coming Boston Red Sox divided a doubleheader with White Sox in Chicago, winning the second game, 2-5 after Bill Wright pitched the White Sox to a 3-1 victory in the opener.

Ted Williams smashed his 14th and 15th homers of the year and drove in four runs to spark the Red Sox's nightcap triumph.

St. Louis Cardinals stormed to within a half game of the first-place Boston Braves in the National League pennant race by trouncing the Braves, 11-2 in a night game at Boston.

Red Schoendienst led the Cards' 11-hit bombardment against three Braves pitchers with a homer, double and two singles.

Brooklyn Dodgers dumped Pittsburgh Pirates twice, 6-2 and 8-6 at Brooklyn. The second game was halted after the Pirates' half of the eighth inning because of darkness.

Jackie Robinson tagged Pirate pitching for seven hits including a grand slam homer which broke up the first game. He belted two doubles and two singles in the second. His homer came in the ninth with two out and snapped a 2-2 tie. The twin setbacks dropped the Pirates from second to third place and moved the Dodgers from sixth to fifth.

At New York, Chicago Cubs and the Giants divided a twin bill, the Giants winning the first game, 3-2 and the Cubs the second, 11-2.

A scheduled day game between Washington and Detroit and a night game between Cincinnati and Philadelphia were postponed because of rain.

Nova Scotia Golf Championship To Open Sunday At Dartmouth N.S.

Dartmouth, N.S., June 25.—(C) Slopes of the Brightwood Golf and Country Club here are being groomed for the four-day Nova Scotia championship tournament which opens here Sunday.

Nearly 130 of Nova Scotia's best senior, junior and amateur shot-makers are expected to compete along with the pros in the Open championship. There are also three entries from New Brunswick—W. B. Isnor, Ralph Harley and Bill Armstrong, all of Moncton.

Veteran Nip Ross, now pro at the Langan Club, Sydney, will head a delegation of 15 Cape Breton golfers. There are also entries from Halifax, Middleton, Amherst, Truro, Yarmouth, New Glasgow, Bridgewater, Digby and Kentville. It is the second official tournament since 1939 and play will be

over the 54-hole route. Last year there was a record entry of 139 golfers in the tourney, held over the Halifax Golf and Country Club course at suburban Ashburn across the harbor.

Very few golfers have equalled par 68 for the 18-hole, 5,687-yard layout. The course record is held by Kas Zabowski, Ashburn club professional and holder of the Nova Scotia Open crown.

Another Ashburn ace and provincial champion last year, Eddie Crowell beat par by a single stroke last year. Brightwood's stary Rox Joudrey, the favorite for this year, has only been able to shoot several tuneup rounds in the high 70's—the average score of best golfers for the course.

More than 24 juniors will compete for the junior title left vacant with the departure of Ashburn's Peter Doig. A teen-aged wonder, Doig won the crown last year and was runner-up to clubmate Eddie Crowell for the Amateur championship.

Former Ashburn pro, Reg Babcock has indicated he will defend the senior amateur title he won at Ashburn last July. Golfers 50 years and over are eligible.

Three major trophies and individual prizes for the best gross and net team scores will be awarded. In addition, Nova Scotia's Willingdon Cup team for national play will be selected from club team matches.

E.A. Barker's Committee Have Job Of Getting Equipment For Olympics

London, June 25. — (C) — Expect

fencing judging machines from France. ... Diving springboards from the United States. ... Javelins from Finland and Sweden. ... Bamboo poles for the vaulting from Japan. ... Telephones and pencils. ... Sandbags and guarding gates on the bicycle-racing course. ... Teleprinters and whistles. ... Multiply this list by 50 and you will get a hint of the equipment needed to stage this year's Olympic Games. It is the province of a technical committee headed by E. A. Barker whose work is referred to as "Barker's Plan."

A short (five-foot-six) man who two years ago could hardly tell the difference between a weight-lifter and wrestler, Barker now knows exactly what track and field, equestrian, fencing and rowing athletes need. He has supplied equipment—on advice of the various international sports federations—for each of the 17 sports and 136 events on the 17-day program.

Barker took over the job in October, 1946, and for months could be seen walking briskly around Olympic offices clutching a sheaf of papers detailing items he was called upon to supply.

There was no trouble getting sports goods — "manufacturers came to us, apparently with the idea it would be good advertising to let it be known they had supplied the Olympic Committee" — but there were many headaches.

The boxing and wrestling federations were satisfied with British weighing machines but the weight-lifters turned a thumbs-down on them. The reason: They didn't show weights in kilos.

He has arranged that competitors may bring equipment into the country without paying customs. Among items overseas competitors will bring are 200 horses, 100 rowing boats, 50 yachts, hundreds of fencing foils and 400 bicycles. Each competitor is allowed 25 pounds of food.

With the selection of H. Latulippe in Frontenac and Ovide Cote in Megantic, the Union des Electeurs has filled its ranks insofar as the Eastern Townships is concerned, having candidates in all twelve ridings.

With official nominations still a month away, three-cornered contests appear probable in all constituencies with Sherbrooke having the doubtful honor of a four-way fight. In addition to Hon. J. S. Bourque, Minister of Lands and Forests and of Hydraulic Resources, who is seeking re-election as Government candidate, and Donat Jacques, official Opposition standards bearer, the Social Credit have entered Romeo Gauthier and Marcel Bergeron in the lists for the C.C.F.

Megantic County is the only riding which is so far privileged with a straight fight, Ovide Cote, Union des Electeurs, being the only opponent so far sighted for Hon. Tancred Labbe, Minister without Portfolio.

In Arthabaska, the Liberal member, Pierre H. Plourde, is being opposed by Wilfrid Labbe, Union Nationale and J. F. Ouellet, Social Credit.

Mines Minister Robinson in Brome has two opponents, Bruce Bailey, Liberal, and Arthur Raymond, Social Credit. In Compton the fight so far is between the sitting Union Nationale Member, Charles D. French, Waymar Labaree, Liberal, and L. P. Groleau, Social Credit.

Robert Bernard is seeking re-election in Drummond for Union Nationale and has double opposition, Paul Theroux, as a Liberal and Edmond Major as Union des Electeurs.

Hon. Patrice Tardif is again running in Frontenac with L. P. Cliche as his Liberal and H. Latulippe as his Union des Electeurs opponent.

The three candidates so far named in Sherbrooke are retiring M.L.A., Hector Chiquette, Union Nationale, Jeremia Duhamel, Liberal, and Roland Corbett, Social Credit.

Stanstead, formerly held by Ovide Bergeron, of the defunct Bloc Populaire, has already nominated Denise Gerin as Union Nationale, Maurice Theroux as Liberal and Edouard Lemelin as Union des Electeurs.

The Liberal M.L.A. for Missisquoi, Henri Gosselin, is being opposed for re-election by J. J. Bertrand, Union Nationale, and Georges Chevalier, Union des Electeurs.

In Richmond, Albert Gaudreau, Union Nationale, is seeking another mandate and finds as his opponents, A. Paquette, Liberal, and R. Pelletier, Union des Electeurs. In Wolfe, the retiring member, Henri Vachon, is again in the field together with Ernest Gingras, Liberal, and Henri L. Lapierre, Union des Electeurs.

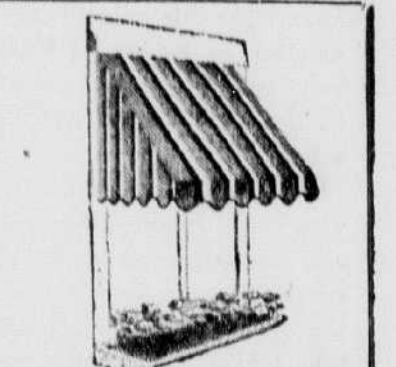

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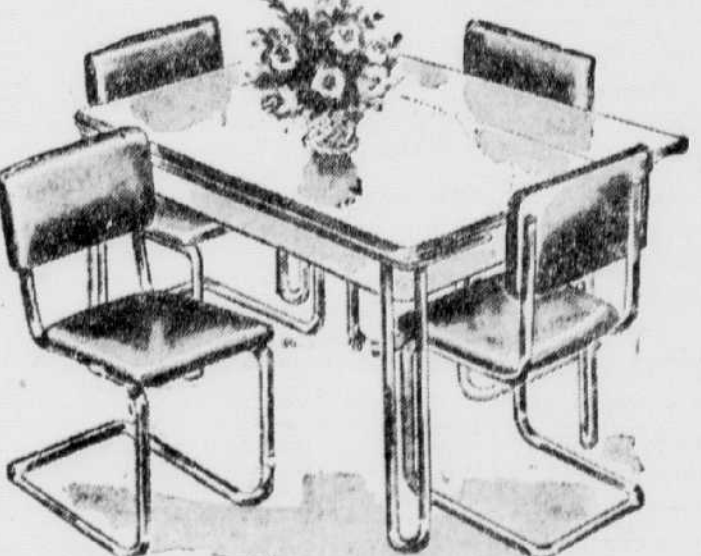

Communist Scheme Is Backfiring

Out of the fire comes the steel; out of the trials and dangers imposed by the Bolshevik drive to conquer the globe there undoubtedly is emerging a new unity among countries.

By treachery, trickery and aggression the Reds enslaved eastern Europe before a trusting world as a whole was awake to this threat from one of the major allies. However, with the full awakening the democratic countries are solidifying in a manner which couldn't have been foreseen. The Communist scheme of breeding division and discord is backfiring.

We see in this the fact that while idealists strove for generations to form a United States of Europe, the Muscovites unwittingly and unwillingly have set such a union well on its way in western Europe in the brief period since the war. Moreover that's only half the story, for the

Soviet policy of aggression has driven western Europe and the United States together in a manner which couldn't have been foreseen by any stretch of imagination.

The nucleus of a possible United States of Europe is the recently formed western European union. This comprises Britain, France, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg. The alliance is economic, military and political. Other countries of west Europe are debating affiliation.

Today Washington is hard at work on ways and means of associating the United States with this new European bloc which gives real promise of expanding. Conversations between the union and the State Department are expected to take place soon. Meantime the Marshall Plan is swinging into action and is further drawing the countries of western Europe together for mutual advantage.

Convention Of Mayors Comes To End

Delegates Hear Pleas for Better Housing Facilities.

Halifax, June 25.—With a plea for better housing, the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities ended its 11th annual meeting here yesterday.

The 350 delegates from Gloucester, N.S., to Victoria covered a wide range of subjects and finished business one day earlier than scheduled. Site of the next meeting was selected as Quebec and Mayor Lucien Borne of that city was elected president to succeed Mayor R. T. Forbes of Fredericton.

The meetings, sponsored by the Maritime cities of Halifax, Moncton, Fredericton, Saint John and Charlottetown, were preoccupied throughout with housing and adopted a resolution calling for a Dominion-Provincial-Municipal conference on the problem.

George W. Welsh, president of the United States Conference of Mayors and Chief Magistrate of Grand Rapids, Mich., asked for closer co-operation between Canada and the United States.

On the instigation of Mayor Rev. H. Lloyd Henderson of Portage la Prairie, Man., the conference resolved that the only permanent solution to the housing problem is to raise the income of low-wage brackets.

A report by J. O. Aeselin, head of the Federation's housing committee, called for Federal rental subsidizing as a temporary solution to the housing crisis.

Aeselin, president of the Montreal Metropolitan Commission, said "nearly half of the Canadian population is unable to provide itself with shelter" under present construction costs.

Soviet Seeks All-German Government

Warsaw, June 25.—(AP)—Russia and seven European satellites today urged that a "provisional democratic, peace-loving, all-German government" be set up.

They did so in a communique by their Foreign Ministers, who ended a two-day conference at midnight in Wilanow palace, eight miles east of here.

The communique as broadcast by the Moscow radio and distributed in London by Tass, Russian news agency, said an all-German government should be created by big-four agreement.

As Roethorn, Mr. Tucker said the vote showed that the Social Credit candidates might have succeeded in "breaking up the anti-Soviet vote to save the Government by the skin of its teeth."

The Foreign Ministers, including V. M. Molotov of Russia, said the government in Germany should be made up of representatives of democratic parties and organizations and should guarantee against any more German aggression.

In the conference with Russia were Albania, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland, Romania and Yugoslavia. Russia and Poland called the meeting.

Delegates talked over a recent London conference when six western powers agreed to set up a federal government in western Germany.

Well-informed sources said some in the Warsaw meeting wanted to counter this with an eastern German state but the conference finally agreed upon one more try for German unity. They said if this failed the Russian bloc would create a separate east-German government.

Lakes Strike Mediation Is Stalled

Company Refuses to Deal With Trades and Labor Congress of Canada.

Ottawa, June 25.—(AP)—A Government attempt at mediation in the Great Lakes ship labor war was stalled today by company refusal to deal with the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada.

At the same time, the Congress made clear it was throwing the full strength of its 350,000-man organization behind the efforts of its affiliated Canadian Seamen's Union to gain its members berths aboard a group of lake steamship companies.

J. W. Buckley, Congress secretary-treasurer, announced this hardened attitude last night after his organization had been rebuffed by Canada Steamship Lines in a Government-sponsored attempt to re-open negotiations with that firm.

That company and others has refused to deal with the C.S.U. on the claim that it is Communist-dominated. The Congress and the union have agreed that a T.L.C. committee should negotiate on behalf of C.S.U. crews.

The company counsel told the T.L.C. his firm had a contract with J. A. (Pat) Sullivan's new Canadian Lake Seamen's Union. But Mr. Buckley said this could not be valid, since the C.S.U. was not the recognized bargaining agent for the seamen.

The C.S.U. lawyer raised the Communist issue in his reply, but Mr. Buckley said there was no question of there being any Communists on the Congress negotiating committee.

"The battle," he said, "now is between the shipping companies and the entire trades and labor congress and its affiliates."

estimates, Labor Minister Mitchell said that 700,000 persons passed through national employment service offices last year. Mr. Gillis said the Government would have to return to its wartime policy of directing labor to certain industries and certain parts of the country.

Mr. Mitchell discounted such a possibility.

In the defence debate, Mr. Claxton said the Government adheres to a "flexible" defence policy that visualizes the chance of war at any time, but does not anticipate any push-button conflict or any direct or heavy attack on Canada in the near future.

He said: "We shall continue to recruit above the announced target figures, using the additional men to activate more ships, bring the army brigade group nearer to strength and to reactivate several air forces stations."

Doctors Discuss Arctic Medicine

Toronto, June 25.—(AP)—Arctic warfare medical problems will hold the spotlight today in the final sessions of the Canadian Medical Association's 1948 convention.

A C.M.A. panel of armed services' and civilian doctors was also to discuss atomic and bacteriological warfare and the organization of medical research for Canada's defence.

Dr. R. O. Jones of Halifax said yesterday at a psychiatric meeting that persons who complain "I feel sick all over" should see a psychiatrist, not the family doctor. They likely suffered from a mental ailment called depressive reaction.

Old age, from a psychiatric viewpoint, is becoming an all-important Canadian problem, said Dr. A. S. Stokes of Toronto.

To keep from becoming mentally senile, elderly people need "invigorating experiences," material security and a sense of belonging to a group, he said.

It was up to Dewey to decide whether he wished to duplicate that ticket. The Dewey strategists didn't clearly indicate their intentions beyond the belief they want everything settled on one ballot when the convention meets for its final session today.

Representative Charles A. Halleck of Indiana was one of those mentioned as a Dewey running mate.

But his name was only one of several. Others included Governor Dwight Green of Illinois and Harold E. Stassen.

Halleck tossed Indiana's 29 votes into the Dewey pot yesterday when a lot of delegates weren't quite sure that the New York Governor could make the 548-vote grade for the nomination.

The final break for Dewey apparently came after the sweating convention had recessed following a second ballot which showed these important results:

Dewey, 515, only 33 short of the nomination.

Senator Taft, the nearest contender, 274.

Stassen, 149.

Almost everybody in the closely-packed hall knew it was all over.

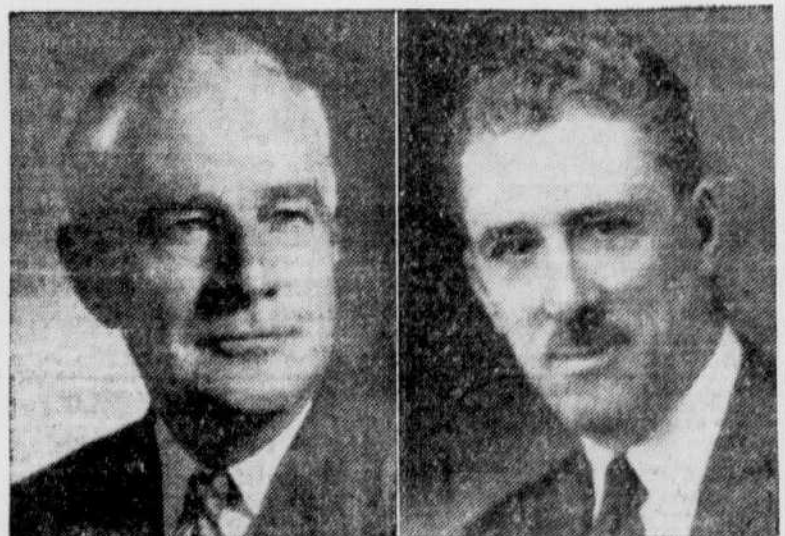
In a dramatic surrender by his six opponents the Dewey nomination was made unanimous after the second ballot.

The climax — or anti-climax — came close on the heels of a series of confident reports that opponents were engineering a coup to keep him out of the running.

After the second ballot Senator Raymond A. Baldwin, of Connecticut, sensed the imminent Dewey sweep.

Baldwin—sitting a row ahead of Herbert E. Brownell, Dewey's campaign manager—had been under a lot of pressure as a favorite son who still was holding on to Connecticut's 19 votes.

They weren't enough to put Dewey over, so Baldwin went hunting for others who might feel as

DEMOCRATS UNRUFFLED

New York, June 25.—(AP)—Governor Thomas E. Dewey's unanimous nomination as the Republican Presidential candidate, brought this equally unanimous reaction today from Democratic leaders—"we'll lick him."

While there was no comment from President Truman, Senator J. Howard McGrath, national Democratic chairman, said:

"This nomination comes as sort of an encore for Governor Dewey on his unsuccessful 'me too' campaign in 1944. The American people also will play an encore in November."

During a recess after the second ballot, the Connecticut delegation met in a hotel caucus. Nobody said publicly what happened.

But in a hotel room a few blocks away Governor Warren signed a letter to the California delegation releasing their pledge to him.

Knowland, who had beaten the bushes in a futile effort to get the nomination for Warren, thus became a possibility for the vice-presidential nomination.

Baldwin, the man who may have turned the trick, was delegated to the sidelines. So were the rest of the easterners who backed Dewey's stretch drive—Governor Alfred Driscoll, of New Jersey, Governor Robert F. Bradford, of Massachusetts, and others.

Taft, making his second unsuccessful bid for the nomination (he tried first in 1940—coming resigned himself to a life as a legislator. "Of course, it was a disappointment," the Ohio Senator told his delegates, "but I am probably better off personally."

In any event, Dewey knew that if he is elected President he may have to deal in Congress primarily with four men who were candidates of one sort or another for the nomination he got, Taft, Vandenberg, Halleck and Joseph W. Martin, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

He had a ready-made Secretary of State, however, in John Foster Dulles of New York. Dulles was one of the back-stage architects of the United Nations charter.

Long, a foreign affairs adviser to Dewey, he and Vandenberg see eye to eye on bi-partisan foreign policy.

After the third ballot had sealed the issue, Dewey strode into the convention accompanied by his pretty wife.

Surrounded by a tight cordon of long-time helpers the New York Governor grinned widely as he mounted the dais.

Dewey struck a peace chord in his 15-minute talk, to be followed some time later by a former campaign opening speech.

"As long as the world is half free," he told the vigorously-fanning delegates, "we must peacefully by labor to help men everywhere achieve liberty."

Then, of the choice of a running mate still ahead, Dewey said: "I come to you unfettered by a single obligation or promise to any living person, free to join with you in selecting to serve our nation the finest men and women in the nation, free to unite our party and our country in meeting the grave challenge of our time."

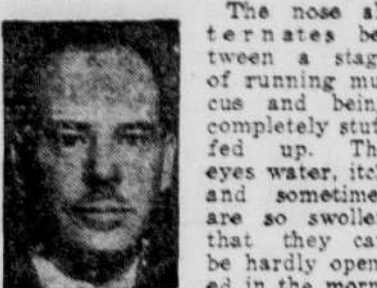

The Doctor Says

BEING DESENSITIZED IS BEST
TREATMENT FOR HAY FEVER

By Edwin P. Jordan, M.D.

Ten to twelve million people are
believed to suffer from ragweed
hay fever. Their "season" usually
begins about August 15 when rag-
weed pollen appears in the air in
quantity.



The nose al-
ternates be-
tween a stage
of running mu-
cus and being
completely stu-
ffed up. The
eyes water, itch
and sometimes
are so swollen
that they can
be hardly open-
ed in the morn-
ing.

Probably the best treatment for
ragweed fever is to try to be de-
sensitized, that is, to have the sen-
sitivity to the pollen decreased by
injections or "shots" of pollen
extracts. These are best given
either all the year round or for
several months before the season
starts.

Many hay fever victims are par-
tially and temporarily relieved by
air conditioning. Others plan their
vacations during the hay fever sea-
son and go to place where the pol-
len is either absent or very slight.
Now, too, some drugs which can
be taken by mouth are useful for
bringing temporary relief.

Q—Should cigarettes and cof-
fee be limited or omitted entirely
by a person with hardening of the
arteries?

A—In certain kinds of harden-
ing of the arteries, smoking should
be eliminated entirely. In other
cases some experts allow smoking
in moderation. Coffee does not ap-
pear to be harmful in such cases
if not drunk to excess.

Executive Changes Announced In Canadian Naval Commands

Ottawa, June 25.—Changes in the Navy's top executive posts in the coastal commands are included in appointments announced today by Defence Minister Claxton.

Rear Admiral E. R. Mainguy, 47, of Duncan, B.C., flag officer Pacific Coast, will become flag officer Atlantic Coast Oct. 1 succeeding Rear Admiral C. R. H. Taylor of Weymouth, N.S., who will proceed on retirement leave.

Commodore H. G. DeWolf, 45, of Bedford, N.S., commanding officer of the aircraft carrier Magnificent, will become flag officer Pacific Coast Sept. 8.

Command of the magnificent goes to Commodore G. R. Miles, 46, of St. John's, N.B., at present chief of Navy personnel. His place will be taken by Capt. W. B. Creery, 33, of Vancouver, now commanding officer of H.M.C.S. Royal Roads, the Canadian services college at Victoria.

Capt. H. S. Rayner of Bedford, N.S., in command of the R.C.N. air section at Dartmouth, N.S., will take over at Royal Roads, Lt.-Comdr. A. B. Fraser-Harris, 32, of Halifax, whose present appointment is commander (air) of the Dartmouth section, will assume Capt. Rayner's duties there.

Rear Admiral Mainguy was commanding officer of the cruiser Uganda in the Pacific during the last days of the Second World War. He commanded the same warship on the R.C.N.'s longest peacetime cruise—around Cape Horn.

Commodore DeWolf, assistant chief of staff before taking command of the aircraft carrier Warrior, predecessor to Magnificent, is best known as skipper of Canada's most famous wartime Tribal destroyer, Haida.

Commodore Miles, who served almost 20 years in Royal Navy battleships, commanded the destroyers Saguenay and Athabaskan during the Second World War. He was cited for his work in bringing both ships safely to port after they

had been severely damaged by enemy action.

Capt. Creery was commanding officer of H.M.C.S. Prince Robert until his appointment to Royal Roads early in 1946. He was skipper of the destroyer Fraser from 1938 until she was sunk in 1940 in a collision off Bordeaux, France.

Capt. Rayner is a former commanding officer of the destroyers St. Laurent, Huron and Nootka.

Lt.-Comdr. Fraser-Harris, a native of Halifax, served as a Royal Navy pilot for 16 years before transferring to the R.C.N. in 1946. He was shot down during the Norwegian operations in 1940, escaped and returned to Britain. In the North African invasion, he was again shot down, captured and imprisoned. A few days later he was rescued by United States forces. In 1944 he was commanding officer of the R.N. air station at Capetown, South Africa.

Married To Miser

Good Wife Rates Taken Of Remembrance
From Husband Now And Then

Dear Dorothy Dix: I have a perfectly wonderful husband who is almost the answer to a maiden's prayer, except for one thing. That is that he never makes me any sort of a present, not even the smallest. He feeds me, clothes me, pays the doctors' bills when I am sick, but he always does all the buying. He has never given me a Christmas, birthday, or any other kind of a present. I thought that after our beautiful baby daughter was born that maybe he would give me a bar of candy for Mother's Day, but nothing happened.



I would just love to have had the present of a handkerchief, or even a chocolate bar would be loved by me if it came from him. It is just being overlooked, when other men are giving their wives some token of remembrance, that hurts me. And it isn't because he can't afford it.

Answer: You have evidently married the champion of the Tightwad Crew, and I greatly fear that there is no way of loosening his grip on his pocketbook for that kind of stinginess is not incidental, as they say in the movies. It is something that is born in a person. Not an acquired talent.

PINCH-PENNY SYSTEM

It would be interesting, however, to know how your husband carries out his pinch-penny system. He certainly must have to trust you with a quarter, now and then, for incidental expenses, even when he does all the marketing himself and so doesn't run the risk of having you waste a dime on a candy bar.

Your father makes a mistake when he thinks that by keeping you from having any dates until you are 21 years old you will know how to conduct yourself properly. The reverse is exactly the case, because if a young girl never steps out with boys or has any dates it makes her self-conscious and stiff and awkward in dealing with them. In a word, she doesn't know how to handle boys, and she is far more likely to make blunders than she is if she has just grown up with lads. Also, it cuts down her chances of marriage. Tell papa to come up-to-date.

Dear Miss Dix: I am a boy of 18. A girl of 20 is madly in love with me. I like her company very much, but I don't love her. She has a lot of money, but my father says that money is the root of all evil. Also, my father is against marriage for me before I am 21. When does a boy know he is in love? What are the symptoms?

Answer: A girl of 20 is at least four or five years older than a boy of 18, because girls mature much younger than boys do. So I think that puts this girl out of your class entirely, no matter if she does say she is madly in love with you. The important point is that you are not in love with her, and if you married her you would like her less and less all the time and be more and more attracted to girls of your own age.

Your father must be a wise man for he gives you two pieces of good advice—not to marry for money, and not to marry until you are 21 years old. As for knowing when you are in love, that is a conundrum that nobody can answer for sure. So often a boy thinks he is in love when he isn't, so go slow. Take it easy. Don't be misled by false symptoms.

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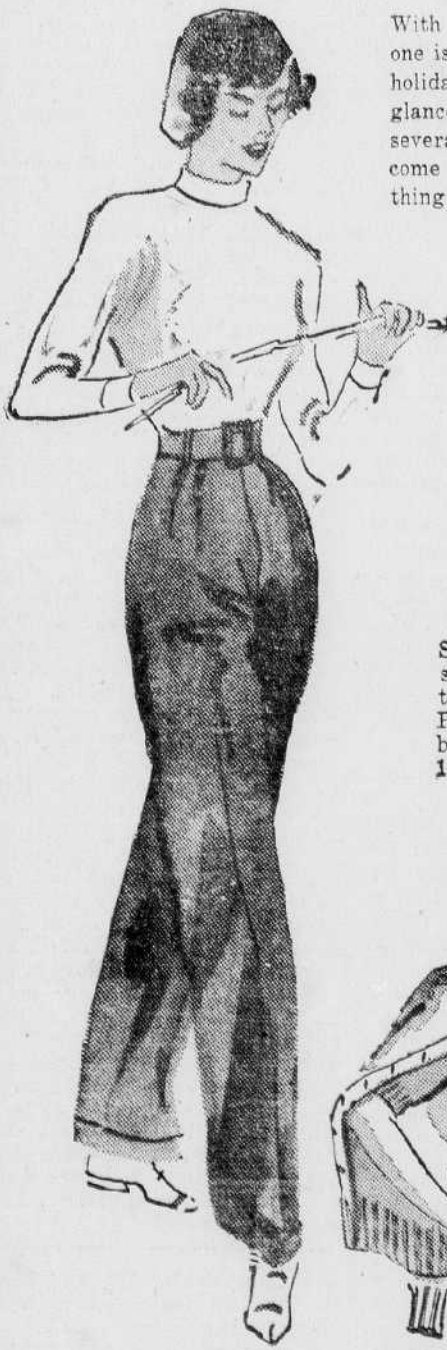
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Boundary Rotary Club Hears About Vermont Symphony

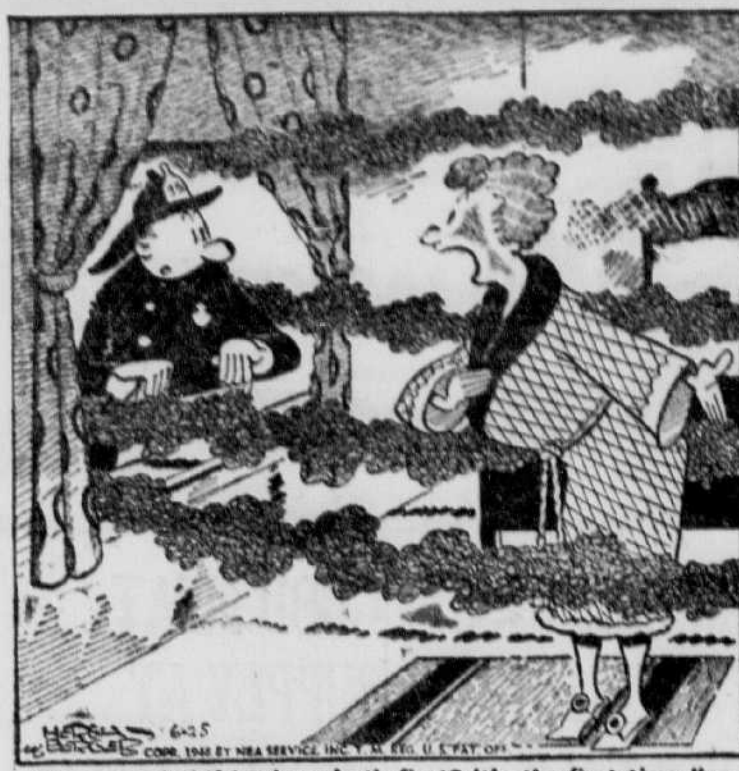

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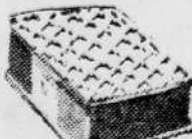
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Bearden Makes It Three, And Indians Look For Help From Bob Muncrief And Steve Gromek

Well, towering Gene Bearden came along nicely to ease the problem, not only by giving the front-running Indians a third starter, and a left-handed one at that. The huge Los Angeles, who screened severe war injuries to get his chance in the majors, won six of his first seven. There is no better way to remain on a baseball payroll.

It has been fairly well established that the Yankees and Red Sox are not going to run away and hide, which was so generally predicted. Lou Boudreau believes another starting pitcher would give the Indians a grand chance to take it all.

While the Tribe is in the market for one, as what outfit isn't,

Manager Boudreau is looking straight at Bob Muncrief, Steve Gromek and Don Black, currently sidelined with a split toe incurred in batting practice.

Muncrief was a corking right-hander with the Browns for a stretch.

Gromek has been disappointing since he bagged 19 while losing 9 with an earned-run average of 2.55 in 1945, but has been highly satisfactory in his more recent outings.

Black has had good days. Like those of all big league clubs, the Indian pitchers have been impeded by the weather and the consequent lack of work.

It is to this that Boudreau attributes the fact that the great Feller did no better than break even in his first 10 attempts. He is least concerned about the Iowa Farm Boy.

While Boudreau professes to believe that the Cleveland outfield is considerably more than adequate,

other members of the party point to the few long balls swatted by men in that department and point out defensive flaws.

But Boudreau has outfielders in quantity, if not all quality, in the left-hand hitting Judnich, Tucker, Edwards, Mitchell, Peck and Doby and the right-hand batting Kennedy and Clark.

Bespectacled Thurman Tucker, who had center field locked up until he broke a finger, Judnich and Bob Kennedy, obtained from the White Sox for Seery and Gettel, are the more accomplished players in the group.

The infielders—Boudreau, Keltner, Robinson and Gordon—have been the Indians' home run hitters and most-batted-in manufacturers.

A little help from the outfield, and they could take this Cleveland club a long way.

New York, June 25.—(AP)—Last night's raindrops dealt a harder psychological blow to Joe Louis than Joe Walcott's.

For Louis is the type who would suffer more from the enforced postponement. Walcott's greater sense of humor would help him survive it.

Louis is a more sensitive person, and more vain. He's more inclined to be annoyed and irritated than Walcott. Jersey Joe has had to develop a lot of patience in his lifetime, or else he wouldn't still be the champion.

Fighters and fans alike are undergoing a feeling of anti-climax, it's like a hangover feeling without having had the alcohol. It's mentally painful to wait for someone with whom you have a date, and then not have the person show up. Physical and mental fatigue are the outcome.

Fighting men like this require training to a maximum degree of readiness. A postponement which goes on for a few days is bound to affect their readiness. It may reduce their savagery and produce a feeling of wanting to get it over with.

Louis is the prima donna, and he may feel that everything seems to work for Walcott, that even the rain hinders him from knocking Walcott out.

Scores Gilles Dube With Winning Run In Tenth In Close Battle; Saints Here Tomorrow Night At 7.15

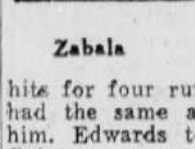

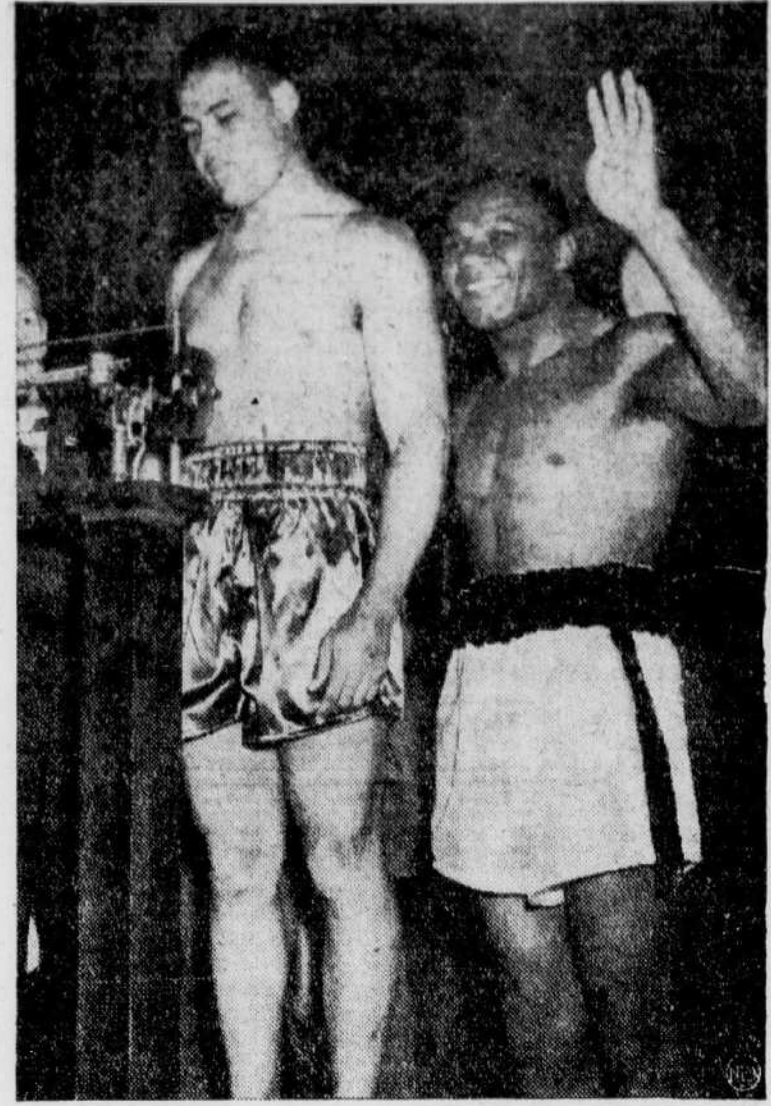
