## Power Station Scheduled For King George Park \$250,000 Move Is Part Of Plan Acceleration

Decision of Westmount Council to step up considerably the million dollar improvement and extension to the city's power and light facilities took a more tangible form yesterday when at a meeting of officials concerned it was decided to go ahead with a \$250,000 substation in King George Park.

Originally it was believed that the work would be spread over a five year period, however a further evidence of the acceleration is to be seen in two amounts included in the list of capital works for which funds were approved at Monday's regular council session.

\* These included: \$100,000 to remodel the Glen road electric light substation switchboard and \$29,400 for feeder cubicles and circuit breakers and other work at the Olivier sub-station.

Further details on the King George substation move are lacking as the work is still in the planning stage, however it is known that improvements and extensions to the electrical plant of the city will be considerably advanced in the next few months. List of works approved Monday included:

Brickwork repairs for No. 2 fire station, \$6,000; interior alterations at No. 2 station, \$1,000, two oxygen masks, \$625; and two resuscitators \$1,200.

Police service truck, \$2,400; Stanton street police yard repairs, \$2,000; roads department truck with scraper, \$13,700; two garbage trucks, \$22,200; sand spreading truck, \$4,050; tandem road roller, \$7,000; city hall vacuum cleaner, \$425.

Asphalt resurfacing of Mount Pleasant avenue from Cedar avenue to The Boulevard, \$2,000; asphaltic concrete resurfacing of Forden avenue from Montrose to Westmount avenue, \$3,100; asphalt resurfacing of Belvedere road from The Boulevard to Sunnyside avenue, \$4,800; asphaltic concrete resurfacing of Edgehill road, \$8,425; sidewalk and road repairs at Bethune street entrance, \$3,300; paving of lane north of Unity Boys' Club, \$3,200.

Tower truck for light department, \$9,800; remodelling of the Glen road electric light sub-station switchboard, \$100,000; four feeder cubicles and circuit breaker; and other improvement at the Olivier avenue sub-station, \$29,400; building alteration at the Glen sub-station, \$5,725; new lamp standards on Claremont avenue from Sherbrooke street to Westmount avenue, \$4,500; distribution transformers, meters, poles and cables for the electric light system.

## Irish Sparkle Never To Fade Says Scotsman

Through all their troubles, the Irish people never have - and never will - lose the sparkle that makes them immortal, Robert A. Speirs, headmaster of Selwyn House School, said Wednesday.

They are people of a dream, he said, though when it comes true it is not always for the best, he told the weekly luncheon meeting of the Westmount Rotary Club.

Speaking on St. Patrick and the Spirit of Ireland, he labelled the Irish patron saint "one of the better non-liquid exports of Scotland," though he added that many countries claim him as a native son.

"The Irish are just about the only ones who don't say that St. Patrick was born there," Mr. Speirs said.

"We know, though, that he was stolen by pirates at 16, and escaped to France after six years. He was well prepared to bring Christianity to Ireland, for he had a full knowledge of the land and its people."

Mr. Speirs said that there was a blend of the supernatural with actual fact which made so many of the legends concerning St. Patrick loved and enjoyable.

He also noted that much of Ireland's literature is in Gaelic, not English, and that there is a great deal in their poetry which regrets the fall of Gael.

L. R. Newman introduced the speaker, and W. J. Taves thanked Mr. Speirs. President W. W. Allison presided.

## Man Is Distant Cousin Of Monkey Says Montagu

Man is at best "a very very distant cousin" to the monkey, Dr. Ashley Montagu, chairman of the department of anthropology at Rutgers University, said this week.

He is definitely not a descendant of the monkey, Dr. Montagu told an audience in the Temple Emanu-El, and no "qualified scientist has ever claimed the human being was a direct descendant of any monkey, gorilla, orang-outang or chimpanzee."

This popular belief, he said, was just another "man-made myth."

"Man is a myth-making creature," he said. "When he doesn't know the answer or the answer available to him isn't satisfactory, he creates a myth to supply his need. Frequently he makes the myth

stand for the reality."

Man has a long history of his own, he said. He is born completely free of the traits of all other "animals."

Another popular "myth", Dr. Montagu said, was the belief that children are naturally hostile and aggressive when they are born and have to be taught to be "good."

On the contrary, he said, scientists through exhaustive studies have arrived at the "inescapable conclusion" that children are "born to be good not bad."

Dr. Montagu claimed that "the world does not make human beings but rather that humans make the world."

"Therefore, if we wish to change the world for the better we must first learn to change and discipline ourselves," he said.

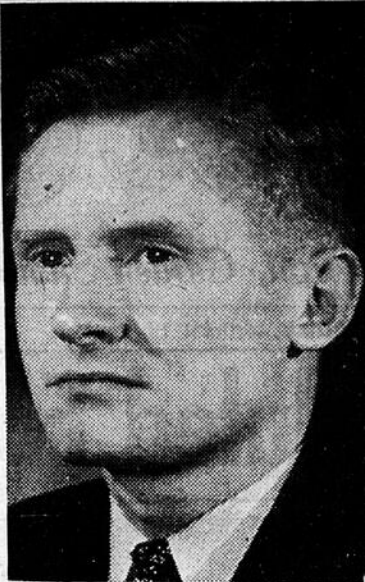
Maybe Jack (John S.) England doesn't know it yet, but he is going to be in for some

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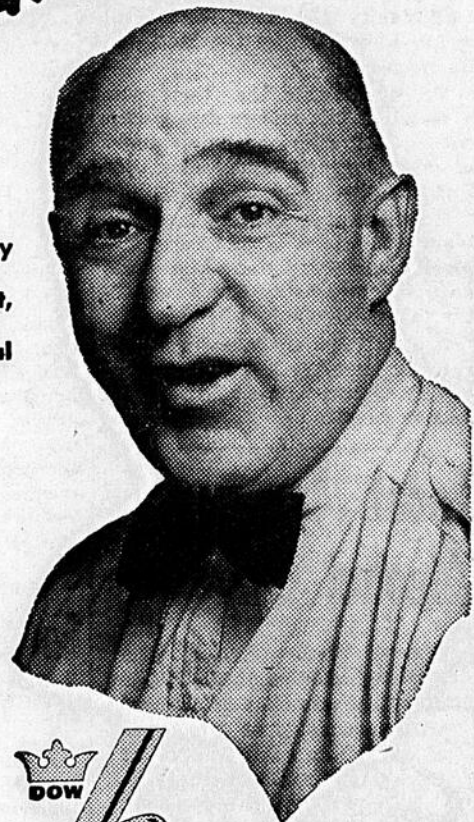

## College System Of Admissions Said Outdated

The system of university admissions is out of date, if they are having to omany failures among their students, C. H. Savage, superintendent of Westmount schools said Friday.

Students who obtain 75 per cent in high school leaving marks have little trouble in university studies, he said, but those who obtain between 65 and 75 per cent find difficulties.

Mr. Savage was one of four speakers at a panel discussion Friday in Westmount Junior High School, held under the joint auspices of the Provincial Association of Protestant Teachers and the Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations.

The subject — What Is The School's Job?—was also discussed by Prof. H. D. Woods of McGill University, Dr. Douglas J. Wilson, of the Montreal Star and W. H. Bradley, QC, of Sherbrooke, vice president of the Provincial Association of Protestant School Boards.

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## Spectator Participation Seen Threat To Culture Of Canada

The tendency of more and more people to seek recreation through looking at things instead of doing things is a real danger to our culture, Claude Robillard, director of recreation for the City of Montreal, said at a meeting of the group work and recreation section of the Montreal Council of Social Agencies held at the Unity Boys' Club recently.

Mr. Robillard was one of a panel of three who took part in a dis-

ussion of commercial recreation versus community recreation. Other participants were Dr. Sydney Barza of the Mental Hygiene Institute and Roy Locke, boys' program secretary of the Metropolitan Y.M.C.A. Dr. Frederic Elkin of the department of sociology, McGill University, was moderator.

"Culturally, people are advanced insofar as what they can do with their hands, their heads, and their hearts. If we don't do things ourselves we either forget how or never learn how to do them," Mr. Robillard said. "Recreation must ultimately be creative — it must require some giving by the individual himself."

He said that recreation agencies are developing more facilities every year for programs of games, handicrafts, arts and all the other activities which help make up a whole individual "Recreation means creating again and again. I believe that society has to choose between two things: to do, or to be done for," he commented.

Dr. Barza, speaking on the effect of recreation on the individual, said that the tension of today's way of life give recreation an important role as a safety-valve, "an indispensable mechanism for the preservation of mental health."

Recreation where the individual does not participate, where there is no creative outlet, is merely a past-time and of little value, he said. The relaxing and beneficial effect is minimal and short-lived. On the other hand, when there is highly competitive participation and winning becomes the goal — as sometimes happens in golf or bridge — it can very often precipitate a mental breakdown, Dr. Barza said.

## Westmount Junior Stamp Club Is Celebrating Seventh Year

The Westmount Junior Stamp Club - largest in Canada - this month celebrates its seventh anniversary. It began seven years ago when a group of west end boys got together and met regularly during meetings of the Westmount Stamp Club.

In 1949 the club achieved full recognition when the City of Westmount allowed them the use of a room for an hour before the start of the senior meeting.

From this modest beginning the Westmount Junior Stamp Club has grown to be the largest junior organization in Canada, and boasts a membership of over 125, coming from throughout the west end.

An election for the position of Membership Whip was held recently with Michael Laverty winning by a majority of two votes. This election was unique because five members were nominated to run for this position.

On April 8, a skit entitled "Jimmy's First Stamp Collection" will be presented by members of the executive. It deals with a boy who starts to collect stamps in a rather destructive way, but before long he is warned by another collector and is shown the correct way to collect stamps. All members and friends are invited to attend.

announced that an auction with proceeds going to the Red Cross will be held on March 18. This is to coincide with a similar auction to be held by the Senior Club.

All stamp collectors between the ages of eight and 15 are cordially invited to attend the meetings every Thursday in Victoria Hall from 7 to 8 p.m. No fees are charged.

## No Need to Panic

**Unemployment Situation Here Nowhere Near Critical**

There is a good deal of talk of unemployment as if it had reached proportions that called for desperate remedies. In fact it is relatively little beyond the normal, seasonal record. As of November last it stood at 151,000. That was about 3 per cent of the civilian labor force where the seasonal average for the years 1946-52 was 2 per cent.

Admittedly this is not a happy situation but, equally, it is not one that calls for elaborate and costly make-work plans by government. This is especially true when, as in the present case, much of the unemployment might easily be met by other remedies.

A number of factors in addition to the seasonal have their part in this upturn. A sizeable part of the increase would be represented by increase would be represented by those who, of their own decision, are out of work, or have returned to work too late to

be counted out of those unemployment figures.

It can hardly be asked that Ottawa should provide employment for those who have voluntarily gone on strike in the hope of securing advantage for themselves.

There is also considerable unemployment in industries that have been depressed by the government's import policy. There would certainly be more ground for asking government action here, as it is largely other government action that has resulted in the condition.

Yet it would be more advisable to remove the cause of unemployment, and let these unemployed get back to work, for the general benefit of all, rather than to inaugurate compensating policies that must result in further expense.

There is another factor that we are reluctant to face. Both employed and unemployed workers are slow to accept the explanation that reiterated demands for more and more in wages and benefits must price men out of jobs as surely as they price the commodities they produce out of markets.

Take the building trades as an instance. There has been a substantial increase in the number of members of the various industries involved who have applied for unemployment insurance benefits. No one is likely to argue that this is because of a lessening need for homes. It is because the increasing costs of products and services have priced homes beyond the average citizen's reach.

One way to meet unemployment is to look at the causes and assess them honestly. — J.L.R.

A. Janelle, who runs the B-A Station at Victoria and Western avenues, has volunteered the money he makes on gas sales the entire day towards the Kinsmen Club's campaign for \$150,000.

The drive is taking the form of a 19-hour television marathon starting at 5 p.m. Friday (March 19) and produced "live" from the stage of the St. Denis Theatre. Already scheduled to appear on the telethon, which will be bilingual, and which will be viewed partially also in Toronto and Ottawa, are Johnny Desmond, the popular singing star of Don McNeill's "Breakfast Club," Mary Farenga, "the Singing Sweetheart of Cerebral Palsy," who has been afflicted by the malady but triumphed over it; the Fletcher Peck Trio, who won recognition through Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scout show; Roberta Quinlan, the pretty, blonde songstress who was the first American to appear on BBC-TV. Other big-name stars are also expected to appear, along with sports celebrities and political and religious leaders.

**Larger Homes Advocated By Woman Arch. For Pleasant Canadian Living Conditions**

The present day small home is not an efficient machine for living. So claims Mrs. Gordon Allison, MRAIG, of Valois, P.Q. A graduate in Architecture of the University of Toronto and the designer of dwellings in Central and West Coast Canada, the former Miss Alice Ayer says that the average modern home is just not big enough.

If Canadians were to build rooms with the high ceilings preferred by French and Swiss architects, they would be spared the noise and smoke attendant on most evening parties in Canadian homes. Modern Swiss rooms run up to 10 feet in height and the older house where the Allisons formerly lived in Geneva had ceilings more than 15 feet high. As this woman architect is five feet eight and her husband, a professional engineer, is six feet two, they were especially appreciative of the head room.

Noting that Western European as well as Canadian architects are eligible to take part in the International Calvert House Competition, sponsored by the McGill University School of Architecture, Mrs. Allison suggests that her professional colleagues overseas may have much to contribute towards designing the Canadian House of Tomorrow. The competition offers \$12,000 in prizes and three Calvert Awards.

Another feature of Swiss housing design favored by Mrs. Allison is that of some apartment houses. With no long entrance corridors, only two apartments per floor open onto the stair landing and elevator shaft. Still another European plan which might be adopted in Canada is where housing developments are built about a park in the centre of the block, the houses with their backs to it, and the street in front. This gives children greater protection from traffic as they are able to go direct from home to park without crossing a street.

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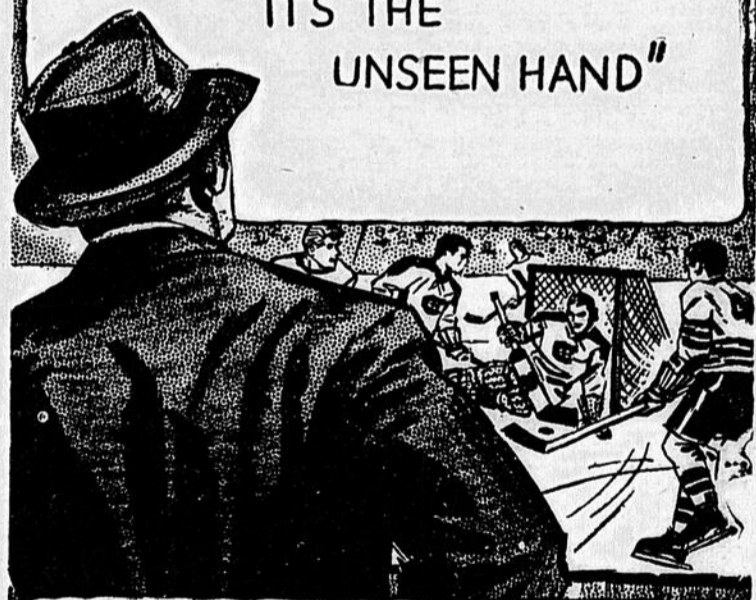
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# Unity Wins Loop Title, Is Edged By Navy 52-51

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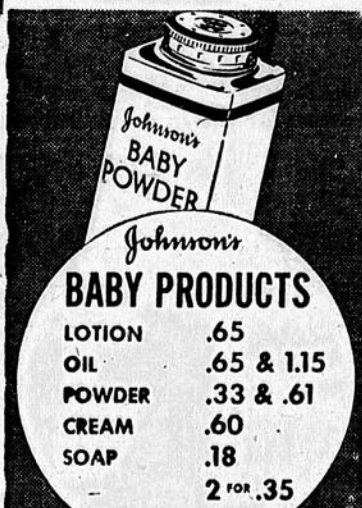


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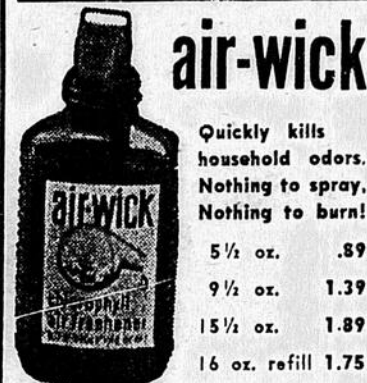
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
