GREAT BRITAIN.

London, Jan. 28.—The Daily News in view of Bismarck's speech on African questions, wants to know what is the price of Bismarck's friendship, and in regard to Samoa, what further sacrifice of national dignity is to be made.

The Times says: Englishmen will be curious to know the exact value of Bismarck's ascription that Germany is absolutely satisfied with England in regard to the Samoan difficulty. It is difficult to believe that England has given any kind of approval to the deportation of Mafeso, or to German intervention between Tamasoa and Malaita's partisans, without discussing how far the warmth of Bismarck's professions is intended as an ostensible honor for the Kaiser.

The Standard is entirely satisfied with Bismarck's speech.

Hon. J. A. Chaplain is still in Paris and his health is very favorable. He goes out every day and attends to his duties as usual. The report of his sailing is uncertain, but will probably leave Havre on the "Retrograde" on February 10th with Mgr. Fabre, Archbishop of Montreal.

The decision of the Pope in the Jesuit question, regarding the distribution of the amount granted between the Jesuits and Laval University is expected to-day.

The Grand Trunk directors were to-day sending to proprietors for signature a long petition to the Dominion Government protesting against the Government's proposal of selling by public auction the right of way of the Grand Trunk, and to compete with existing lines in other Canada.

The Rev. H. Spurgeon, who has been ill for some time, has been declared to be better. He hopes to resume his duties by the middle of February.
