HOUSE OF COMMONS, MAY 22.

FOREIGN TIMBER.—The House went into a Committee on foreign timber, when Mr. Rose proposed a resolution to increase the duty on the importation of foreign timber, by which he meant to encourage the growth of timber in our colonies, and enable the merchant ships to take out home manufactures in exchange for timber of the growth of these colonies, as from the present state of the timber trade with the north of Europe, the shipping was obliged to leave the ports of this kingdom in ballast, instead of taking out British manufactures in exchange, as they had formerly done. He stated that no less a sum than from two to three millions had been paid for foreign timber imported from the north within the last year; and that by the present system this country was under the necessity of employing a great number of neutral vessels in that trade. That this evil was increasing, and must continue to do so, unless some measure should be adopted. He therefore proposed to double the duty upon all foreign timber imported from the north of Europe, with a view to obviate this evil, and to encourage the growth and improvement of timber in our colonies.

Sir W. Lemon highly approved of the measure, as tending to give employment to our merchant ships, and reduce the necessity of employing neutrals.

Mr. Horner called the particular attention of the Committee to the immense increase of foreign ships engaged in the trade of Great Britain, as a circumstance of the utmost importance, and of the most alarming nature, not only as it affected our commercial interests as relating to foreign trade, but with regard to the impolicy and inexpediency of the system itself. The extent of the foreign shipping engaged in the trade of this country was much beyond what the Committee could imagine, and tended to give the greatest advantages to the enemy over this country. That this was a new and growing evil could not be denied, increasing every day to a most alarming extent; the whole of which, in his judgment, arose from the impolicy and ignorance of his Majesty's present Ministers; and by which Buonaparte was, while apparently inactive upon this subject, taking the most effectual mode for laying the foundation of a mighty navy, by contriving to have his ships employed in the British trade.

Mr. Rose, in explanation, said the evil did not arise either from the impolicy or the ignorance of his Majesty's Ministers, but from the Commercial Decrees of the French Emperor, which shut out British ships from the northern parts of Europe, and compelled us to employ neutral vessels in that trade.

Mr. D. Giddy supported the measure, as tending to the encouragement of our colonies.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer wished to remove the melancholy apprehensions of the Hon. Gentlemen opposite, as to the state of our shipping. If the tonnage employed in the Baltic trade had fallen off, we had great source of consolation from other quarters, for almost the whole trade to South America, formerly enjoyed by the Americans, was now carried on in British ships; so that our tonnage had greatly increased in that quarter. From a paper on the table of the House, it appeared, that since 1807 there had been an increase of British vessels cleared inwards, to the amount of 1,583; of foreign ditto, 983. The increase of British ships cleared outwards was, in the same period, 1,011, and of foreign 740. This afforded a satisfactory proof of the increase of our shipping and navigation.

General Taiton confirmed the great increase of our foreign trade, as far as respected the port of Liverpool.

Sir J. Newport asked if the measure was meant to be extended to Ireland?

Mr. Ross said, he meant it only to extend to Great Britain. Mr. Baring said, he well recollected the strong prejudices and strong outcry that were some years ago raised against the Americans, for having engaged largely in the carrying trade; but now it seems the northern neutrals were to be substituted, and to our great disadvantage, for thus we were actually raising a navy for our enemy, and enriching that part of the world which we had the least interest to do.

After a few words from Mr. Parnell and Mr. Tremayne, the Resolutions for taking away the old duties, and imposing an additional one, were put and carried.

LONDON, May 24.

An intention was entertained of sending the Duke D'Angoulême, the husband of the interesting daughter of Louis XVI. to Spain. His Royal Highness had actually set out for Plymouth, when a Messenger from Government was sent after him, requesting him to return to London.

A Lady of Fashion went to the Countess of Buckinghamshire's Venetian dijon on Tuesday morning, in the character of a governess; but she wore so little more than the Girdle, and appeared so near a perfect Nide, that the populace set up a shout of derision when she went to alight that her Ladyship should look back into her landauet, and ordered her servants to drive her home!

Mr. D. Saturday's Gazette contains his Majesty's permission to Sir John Stuart, Count of Maida, that he and his descendants may bear in their armorial ensigns the augmentation of a bend charged with a sword; representing the sword, richly ornamented, in allusion to the brilliant victory on the plains of Maida, on the 4th day of July, 1806, which was presented to Sir John by Ferdinand, King of the Two Sicilies.

May 29.—A letter from France says, "No foreign newspapers are permitted or seen in France, and of course the people know nothing but what the Government choose to tell them, and what is told them they do not believe. Nothing struck me with so much surprise as the complete alteration there is in many parts of the French character. Formerly, however volatile they were, they felt an interest in public measures; now not the least; and a Frenchman scarcely ever takes a newspaper in hand, but to read the feuilleton, or criticisms upon plays and fashions. The government and the nation are two distinct parties. The Emperor is not in the least beloved by the people, but he little regards that."

Yesterday as a gentleman was riding a spirited horse in Blackfriars-road, a fine girl, about three years old, was crossing at the time, and was knocked down, when the hind foot of the horse entered the abdomen of the child and killed it on the spot.

May 30.—Yesterday Mr. Arthur Young's 4th Scientific Lecture, on the Quality and Application of Manures, was read to a numerous Board of Agriculture. The Persian Ambassador was previously introduced to the President and Members of the Board, accompanied by Sir George Ouseley; after which his Excellency was unanimously elected an honorary foreign Member of the Board, and Sir G. Ouseley was afterwards balloted for, and elected an Honorary Member also. He inspected the models of Instruments with the Board, and was particularly struck with one of a Thrashing Mill, a fac-simile of which was ordered to be made for him. His Excellency expressed himself highly pleased with the attention thus paid to him, and informed the President, through Sir George Ouseley, that it would give him the greatest pleasure to transmit from Persia any seeds or plants that the Board might deem worthy of their acceptance. Before the rising of the Board, the President presented the Gold Medals that were voted to Sir Charles Burrell, Bart. M. P. and Mr. Duncomb, M. P. to the former for his detailed account of the advantages of Soiling Cattle, and to the latter for his Memoir on the Improvement of Wastes.

Considerable quantities of poppy seeds have been brought up in different parts of the Country, and the expressed oil from them sold at the price of Florence oil.

Camphor is contained in considerable proportion in the seeds of caraway—one pound weight of seed yielding about four ounces of oil and half an ounce of camphor.

SOCIETY OF ARTS, MANUFACTURES, AND COMMERCE. Yesterday the rewards conferred by this Society to the respective candidates were presented by his Grace the Duke of Norfolk, who is President of this noble Association.

To E. Smith, Esq. of Brentwood, Essex, for preparing from the fibres of the common Nettle, Thread, and articles resembling Flax, Hemp, Tow, and Cotton, the Silver Medal.

To H. B. Way, Esq. of Bridport Harbour, Dorsetshire, for his method of extracting Turpentine from Pines of English Growth, the Silver Medal.

JUNE 2.—THE ARMY.—The Commander in Chief has ordered that the following clause in the Mutiny Act shall be circulated throughout the army, and has requested that the Commanding Officers of each regiment will communicate the same to their respective corps:—Whereas divers wicked and evil disposed persons, by the publication of written or printed papers, and by malicious and advised speaking, have of late industriously endeavoured to seduce persons serving in

his Majesty's forces by sea and land from their duty and allegiance to his Majesty, and to incite them to mutiny and disobedience of orders.—Be it enacted, That if any person who shall maliciously and advisedly endeavour to seduce any person serving in his Majesty's forces by sea or land from his duty and allegiance to his Majesty, or incite or stir up any act of mutiny, or make any endeavour to make any mutinous practice whatsoever, shall, on being legally convicted of such offence, be adjudged guilty of felony, and shall suffer death, as in cases of felony, without benefit of clergy."

JUNE 13.—Yesterday Paris papers reached us to the 6th instant. The celebrated Fouché, Chief Minister of Police, who has been so long supposed to have possessed an irresistible influence over Buonaparte, is in disgrace. Stripped of his official situation, he has, however, been treated rather mildly, as the government of the city of Rome has been conferred upon him. This appointment is in reality a sentence of banishment merely preparatory to his ultimate ruin. He is succeeded by the Duke of Rovigo (SAVARY) who was Minister of France to St. Petersburg at the conclusion of the peace of Tilsit.

JUNE 22.—A General Court Martial has lately been held at Vico, on Thomas RICHARDSON, clerk in the Commissariat department, on a charge of embezzling the public money, by fraudulently receiving 2l. per cent. out of payments made by him, at different times, at Madrid. Upon which charge the Court sentenced the prisoner to be committed to goal for three months, and also to refund the sum of 1611. 8s. 6d. being the amount received by him in a fraudulent manner; and it adjudged that the prisoner is incapable and unworthy of again serving his Majesty in any situation of trust, civil or military; which sentence has been confirmed by his Majesty.

JUNE 23.—Private letters from Holland have been received in town to the 19th inst. They are filled with delecting statements of the miserable condition of the inhabitants of that country, owing to the tyranny, insolence, and rapacity of the French; but their complaints are now smothered by the strong arm of power; and the whole of that territory, formerly the scene of industry and commerce, is converted into a military encampment.

JUNE 25.—The hopes that lately prevailed at St. Petersburg, of an accommodation with this country, were extinguished by semi-official assurances that no negotiation to that effect was either on foot or in contemplation. The exchange in consequence began to look downwards again.

The German Journalists remark with regret, that their great annual fair the exhibition of new works of solid information, on moral and political topics, has been rapidly diminishing for a series of years; and that at the late Leipzig fair scarcely anything was produced but novels, and other productions of a light and frivolous cast. But while all of them lament the effect, not one dares to assign the cause; the oppressive tyranny exercised by the French Government over the press of the Continent.

JUNE 26.—The person that accompanied Baron De Kull to Quiberon, to rescue Ferdinand VII. returned to Plymouth in the Implacable. The above Gentleman states, that General Dupont had not been shot, but that he is now residing within a few leagues of Paris.

JUNE 27.—Kotzebue has publicly announced the exit of his journal, *The Bee*, in these terms:—"As several of the articles in my journal have given rise to different interpretations, in which I cannot acquiesce, I have put an end to that periodical publication; and I return thanks to my numerous readers for the interest they have manifested for me."

LONDON, July 16.—THE SECRET SERVICE which Sir Richard Strachan is going upon, has been explicitly stated in some of the papers, to be the Mauritius. Sir Richard, we believe, will take very few ships from this country. Frigates and sloops will be principally employed, and they will proceed to the Cape of Good Hope as fast as they can be got ready. The African and Nonsu have lately sailed; the Hamadryad, Phoebe, Racehorse and Acteon, will proceed shortly. The 7th and 8th regiments, which are at Halifax, and three of the regiments at the Cape are the troops to be employed.

JULY 20.—The Minister of Holland gives a flourishing account of the entrance of Le Brun into Amsterdam. To heap insult upon injustice, this temporary prefect of Holland is called the Stadholder for Bonaparte.

JULY 21.—We have the satisfaction to announce, that notwithstanding the restraints attempted to be imposed on the trade of the Baltic, a fleet of 240 sail has arrived from that sea.

The corn crops, we are very happy to state, speaking generally, are of great promise and no apprehensions need now be entertained of a scarcity.

The strong symptoms of dissatisfaction which have been manifested throughout the Papal States, and which the dignified Clergy are suspected of promoting, has rendered it necessary for the Governor to collect in the vicinity of Rome an armed force of 26,000 men. Many of the French troops were, until lately, quartered upon the inhabitants, but, in consequence of the numerous assassinations which this dispersion occasioned, it was abandoned, and the Cathedral, and other public buildings have been converted into barracks for their use.

LONDON, July 26.—The reinforcements going out to Lord Wellington, we understand, amount to 10,000 men. It is thought that in the event of the British army being obliged to evacuate Portugal, it will not return to England, but be landed upon some other part of the peninsula.

LONDON, July 26.—The Emperor Napoleon has refused the resignation of his brother Louis in favour of his Nephew Napoleon Lewis; the latter, he says, being already Duke of Berg and Cleves is provided for.

The Ex-King Louis is with his brother Jerome in Westphalia.—The Ex-Queen of Holland—the daughter of the Empress Josephine, and recently the favorite of Napoleon, is very sick at Pionniers. Since the marriage alliance with the Austrian Princess, poor Hortense Eugenie is out of favour with Napoleon; and it is strongly suspected that the heart-ache is not the only malady he has by proxy administered to her. [It is reported from Heligoland that she is since dead.]

LONDON, July 27.—Some letters from the French coasts to the 24th inst. reached town yesterday. They mention the receipt of Paris news to the 22d, and of a vague rumour that prevailed there respecting a battle on the frontiers of Portugal, in which Massena was said to have gained a victory. The report however, it is stated, received no countenance in the Government offices, and met with little credit. It was also rumoured, that some further restrictions on the trade were agreed to in the Council of Commerce, held on the 18th, and at which Buonaparte presided.

A seizure of nine thousand guineas intended for exportation, was yesterday made in the River. The specie was discovered on board a small vessel which had cleared out in ballast.

JULY 28.—Government have received the following intelligence. Captain Maurice, of the Arethusa, having on the 25th ult. had a communication with the Junta of Galicia and Asturias, took on board his ship and other vessels, 500 Spaniards, under a Spanish general, and scoured the whole coast of Spain from Bayona to Cape Ortegal. He destroyed 200 Frenchmen, spiked 100 pieces of cannon, and took Contorno, but was unable to make himself master of Castro. All this was effected without the loss of a man. The Spanish force we took on board was increased by 200 Spaniards who were rescued from the enemy during the fishing expedition.

Letters of an English Gentleman.—A letter from Vice-Admiral Douglas, dated Ye 26th, July 26th, to the Admiralty Office, gives an account of the capture of a fleet of merchantmen of 42 sail, off the North of Norway, by 5 Danish brigs and 2 schooners. The fleet was conveyed by the Forward gun-brig.

Extract of a letter from Rotterdam, July 23.—"All the young men in Rotterdam are going for soldiers. The Department for Foreign Affairs will be done away; and the Naval Department receive that name. All the new officers of state are to be French."

COX, July 20.—The present melancholy condition of business, and the utter want of employment for the manufacturing poor, casts upon the better orders of society at this juncture a very necessary and imperative duty.

VIENNA, May 2.—His Royal Highness the Archduke Charles has again accepted the title and office of Generalissimo; he has, as before, the chief command of every thing relative to war. The Baron Von Grand attends his Royal Highness in quality of Privy Counsellor. Almost all the German papers have related, that the Empress Maria Louisa received, on the road from Vienna to Paris, a plain gold box, as a present from the Emperor Napoleon, in which she found an acquaintance in full for the 25 millions remaining still due of the contributions of Austria to France. The Court Gazette of this day observes, that nothing is wanting to this anecdote except that it should be true.

VIENNA, June 9.—His Excellency Count Metterich is expected here on the 20th inst. A treaty of defensive alliance is said to have been concluded between his Majesty the

Emperor Napoleon and our Court, by which the House of Austria is bound, on certain conditions stipulated in the said treaty, to assist France with an army of 150,000 men."

VIENNA, June 30.—A decisive battle has been fought between the Russians and Furks on the right bank of the Danube. The Grand Vizier, beaten, had retired to Adrianople, and Sihiaria had capitulated. To obtain peace the Turk must cede Moldavia and Wallachia.

TINISTE, July, 1.—According to accounts from Zara, a very severe conflict took place on the 20th ult. off the Isle of Pantadura, between an Italian flotilla and two English frigates of 44 guns. The flotilla made a very vigorous resistance, but were at length obliged, after having sunk four of the enemy's launches, considerably damaged the frigates, and spent all their ammunition, to run ashore, where all the vessels were burnt by the seamen, in order to prevent their falling into the hands of the English.

PARIS, July 2.—Yesterday the Austrian Ambassador, Prince Schwarzenburg gave a grand fête, at which the Emperor, Empress, and all the imperial and royal personages were invited. Twelve hundred assembled to accommodate whom, the prince caused a temporary ball room to be erected in his garden, which was covered with gauze, muslin, and other light stuffs. During the dancing of a Scotch reel when the Emperor and Empress were at different parts of the saloon, the drapery of a window curtain near the Emperor took fire from a candle. Many of the attending officers endeavoured to tear off the curtain but the flames ascended so rapidly as to be instantly out of reach. The Emperor immediately went to the Empress who was in her chair, where they were surrounded with the Austrian and other Ambassadors, &c. acquainted of their danger, and requested to retire; which the Emperor did slowly recommending calmness to prevent disorder. The fire spread like lightning; but the avenues were numerous, and the company easily escaped into the garden. The separation however, of mothers from their daughters, who were dancing, occasioned a scene of great distress and inquiry. The fire was so rapid, that the Queen of Naples having fallen, was only saved by the presence of mind of the Grand Duke of Wurtzburg. The Queen of Westphalia was carried from the saloon by the King and Count Metterich.—The Viceroy of Italy, with the Vice-queen, perceiving the fall of the lustres and ceilings, escaped by a back door into the hotel. The Prince Kurakin, the Russian Minister, the Ladies of the Russian Consul, Baron Tausard, and the prefect of Isria, were injured by falls.

The princess Paulina Schwarzenburg, (sister-in-law to the Austrian Ambassador) lost her life. She was among the last remaining in the ball room, and was leading one of her daughters out, when a piece of burning wood fell on her daughter, which a man took up and threw away. In the confusion, the princess was hurried into the garden; missing her daughter, she flew in search of her, and heroically entered the burning saloon, where she perished; and was found the next morning greatly disfigured, being known by her diamonds and the medalion of her children, which she wore on her neck. Her husband had been in search of her all night. She was a French woman, daughter of the Senator Arenberg, the mother of eight children, and four months advanced in pregnancy.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 13.—Yesterday the course of exchange was somewhat better, which is to be attributed to the great purchases of Russian products to freight neutral vessels.

YESTERDAY'S BURLINGTON MAIL.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 1.—Capt. Stewart, of the three masted Sch. Transit, arrived this morning in 31 days from the Guadalupe, states that information had been received at Ayamonte on the 27th July, that Massena, at the head of 50,000 French troops, had advanced against Ciudad Rodrigo. Lord Wellington's head quarters were at Elvas; and his army, consisting of 30,000 British and 40,000 Portuguese, occupied a very strong position on the frontiers of Portugal, and severe fighting was daily expected.

Captain S. repeats the intelligence heretofore received of gen. Crawford, commanding an advanced division, having been forced to cut his way through a superior body of French, with considerable loss.

The communication between Seville and the interior, even in the plains of La Mancha, was intercepted by the Spanish detachments, and the couriers and small parties of the French were daily cut off.

King Joseph had been at Seville, in the beginning of July, whence it was supposed he had gone towards Grenada.

CADIZ, July, 27.—In consequence of the dullness of American produce, we have concluded to go to Gibraltar with a part of our cargo, for which place we shall sail in a few days.

The French are said to be but 1000 yards from the Spanish and English land force, which consists of 30,000 Spaniards, and between 8 and 10,000 English. The French are but 15,000 men—a constant bombardment is kept up between them.

NEW-YORK, Sept. 1.—The Steam Boat arrived yesterday afternoon from Albany, with upwards of 80 passengers, among whom was the Hon. Francis James Jackson, and suite.

BOSTON, September 5.

Lisbon accounts to the 25th July, received via Madeira; and Cadiz letters to the 28th of that month, make no mention of any war event in Portugal.

SEPTEMBER 7.

Intelligence direct from Lisbon and Cadiz is to the latter part of July, and furnishes no important news—Therefore the London reports of a decisive battle previous to the 15th of July were unfounded. We do not even hear of the surrender of Ciudad Rodrigo, which was considered nearly reduced the latter part of June.

The remainder of the Baltic homeward bound convoy, about 200 sail, was off the Robs Shoet, July 21, with a fair wind, then under the protection of 9 British men of war.

The last French Decree upon the subject of grain, dated the 2d July, prohibits its exportation to England entirely from the Island of Schowen to L'Orient, south; but from this port to Bourdeaux, it may be exported in French Ships, with one half wine or brandy.

Extract of a letter from a British Officer in Portugal. Alverche, July 4, 1810, 3 leagues in front of Celerico. The French are in great force. They have an army before Badjoe, which is observed by Romana's people, and 9000 men (3000 of which are English) under General Hill. They have also a force in the neighbourhood of Placentia. The chief military force is under Massena, at Ciudad Rodrigo. The English army is in five divisions, and consists of the 43d, 52d, 95th, and two regiments of the Portuguese Cavalry (marksmen.) Each division has attached to it some Portuguese regiment.

The first division, under General Spencer, is in Celerico and in its neighbourhood; the second with General Hill, at Portalegre; the third with General Cole, stationed at Guarda and the adjacent villages; the fourth is at Penhel, under Picton; the 5th or light division is perilously advanced and close to the enormous French force before Ciudad Rodrigo, whose gradual fall and brave defence it hourly witnesses. This division is under the command of General Crawford, and is in admirable condition, notwithstanding half the troops are daily on picket, and the remainder marches out at day-break every morning, and is turned out by false alarms two or three times a day.

P. S. General Crawford has his piqueets still on the Agueda, but has retired his division to Lameida, (Almeida) a league from Olegos. To fight with such a retreat, and such difficult and distant defiles in the rear, appears impolitic and would be hazardous so distant from Lisbon, and against such a host of foes in an open country, so favorable to the service of their numerous cavalry. I was at Gallegos, five days since, for a few hours, and plainly saw the breach at Ciudad Rodrigo. It appeared of much extent, but, I understand, the French can not see sufficiently low over the glacis to batter the wall. It cannot however hold out much longer, and on its fall depends our subsequent movements." Lon. Pap.

Extract of a letter from Liverpool, dated LIVERPOOL, July 25, 1810. Allow us to refer you to our price current of 27th ultimo, and again to renew the same, with a few remarks applicable to the present state of this market.

For wheat it has been a very heavy and drooping one: the arrivals of old crushed ashes have been great, and having been pushed off immediately at any prices they would command, have engaged almost exclusively the attention of the consumers; besides, we are without any export vent, as heretofore, and prices in consequence are not likely to improve at present.

Grain and Flour have continued in steady demand at nearly

our preceding quotations, and we don't look far for prices lower than at present. Rice also sells readily, and fully supports its former currency. Clover Seed is eagerly bought up by the speculators, and we look for no decline in price. Flax Seed has also been demanded of late, but nothing above 6s. per hhd. has been obtained. Bark still continues uncertain.

The supplies of Timber hitherto have been much beyond expectation, and very considerable additional ones from Sweden, Norway, and the Baltic, over and above the regular imports, are expected; the consequence has been a decline in prices beyond what was calculated, and we don't now look for any speedy improvement, but confidently expect no further depreciations will occur. The market is overloaded with Staves, which are unsaleable expecting at a currency little exceeding first cost and duties.

MONTEAL, September 17.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman at New-York, partner in a very respectable Liverpool house, to his correspondent in this city, dated 8th September.

"Since writing you last week, we have had numerous arrivals from different parts of England, with dates to the 30th July; at which time ashes were quoted at 46s. 4ds, and wheat 15s. a 16s. 3d. New-York superfine flour was offering at 6s. by which it appears each of these articles had experienced a considerable decline in prices."

London dates to the 30th July have been received in the United States.

There were, about that time, reports of a battle in Portugal between the British and French armies; but this seems to be contradicted by accounts direct from Cadiz, to the 25th July and from Lisbon to the 25th when no intelligence of any battle had reached those places.

We are happy to find that at the latest date, the price of grain was falling in England, and that the ensuing Harvest promised to be more plentiful than was to be expected from earlier appearances.

Yesterday two Soldiers belonging to this garrison viz. Dominick Hannan of the 8th Regt. and David Jones of the Canadian Fencibles, were shot outside of the works on the Cape, for desertion.

Last week a Soldier of the 10th Royal Veteran Battalion, late a draft from the 98th, named Joseph Leahy, received 450 lashes out of 500 to which he was sentenced for the same offence; he was afterwards sent to the hospital till he is able to undergo the remainder of his punishment, when he is to be drummed out, as unworthy of serving in the Veterans.
