Radiographer Tells Rotary About His Classification

The man who has seen through more Pontiac people than anyone else here is 23 year old Pierre Bilodeau, radiographer at the Pontiac Community Hospital, who was the speaker at the Shawville Rotary Club dinner Monday night.

Pierre is a native Otawan who took a year of pre medical work at Ottawa University before his three year course in radiography at the Ottawa General Hospital. His wife, Monique teaches at the Maryland school.

In his talk to Rotary, Mr Bilodeau first defined the differences between radiology and radiography. The radiologist is a medical doctor who has taken further specialization in this particular field. His job is to interpret the X ray plates which are prepared by the radiographer. There has never been a radiologist at Pontiac Community Hospital and all plates must be sent to Ottawa for reading. One third of the cost of an X ray goes to the radiologist.

As a radiographer, Pierre Bilodeau uses an \$18,000 machine in a room with \$2000 worth of lead insulation in the walls, plumbing and developing tanks with the necessary dark room worth another \$2000. His 15

The writer Mr W Hodgins, states and I quote, "today Nov. 11, 1961, was much the same as other years at the 'park,' only a few faithful in attendance".

Why worry about the "few" so long as they were faithful—they shall have their reward. As for "the same as other years" — I would like to inform him that this park was established shortly after the war of 1914-1918, and was made possible by the people of Pontiac east, the War Veterans, the Women's Institutes and other groups, and was erected in memory of our soldiers who made the supreme sacrifice.

Through the years there have always been memorial services under supervision of the clergy of the District Ministerial Association and were well attended, unless weather condition were unfavourable. Perhaps this year was an exception. But sometimes it is not convenient for those whom one might expect, to be present.

With reference to the 'tending' of the park. There never was a paid caretaker. Work was freely given, and the park has always been very well cared for. Mr. Kenneth Hodgins a war veteran has through the years done much to improve the park, as had also the late Mr Wm Chisnell and Mr Walter Harris (in their life-time) and several other nearby citizens, and I might mention the work of the CGIT group with Mrs Donald Dods as leader, and of other local groups, so why belittle what has been done and in good spirit too. They say, "it is better to try and fail, than not to try at all."

Concluding, I would suggest to the writer of the article, that when springtime comes and he notes the Memorial Park seem to be beckoning for some one to do the task of this disrepair that he avail himself of a great opportunity — Take up the torch of freedom and carry on.

In your issue of Oct 26 there was a separate item asking about the name SHARRATT. Descendants of White Thomas Hodgins may know something of that name but I am one of the eldest of the grandchildren of White Tom living.

Apparently Mrs Sharratt was a Best The boys in the Best family, one or two died young, and there were apparently four girls. Mary Best was married to White Tom and they lived at Yarm. A sister, Jane married John Strutt, blacksmith and magistrate in Shawville; another sister, Hannah, single, lived with them on what was then Mill street. A fourth sister married a man named Sharratt, not a resident of that area, and she went with him to his own community, possibly Mattawa, and did not come back for many years. Then in 1892, she a widow, came to look up some relatives, but found only a few of her nieces and nephews. I remember her being at our home at Yarm, and with the help of my father, who had a yen forthwith of tracing relatives called her his Aunt Sharratt. My grandmother had died in Dec 1891.

Later, when I was working on the North Bay Tribune, at the request of my father, in July 1907, I located some of the Sharratt family in that town. If some one can give me more accurate information, it will be accepted with thanks.

Certainly the historic society is doing a wonderful piece of work, worthy of any help any one can give it. Since these interesting items of Pontiac family history have been published, I have been clipping them and making them into a scrap book. While I do like the name scrap book, it seems to be popular and surely means much more than the name implies. Certainly many of you people living in that area could give more history of your families than is being done.

Rev J E Gravelle, at Otter Lake, is doing a worthwhile job and should be heartily supported.

The name Nicholas Fahey, was mentioned recently, North Clarendon people should give you some information and the McDowells could tell you of the name Cline.

Reading and filing these items have brought to mind many names of people I knew as a child and in later years have forgotten.

Why are we so diligent in bringing to light items of ancestors.

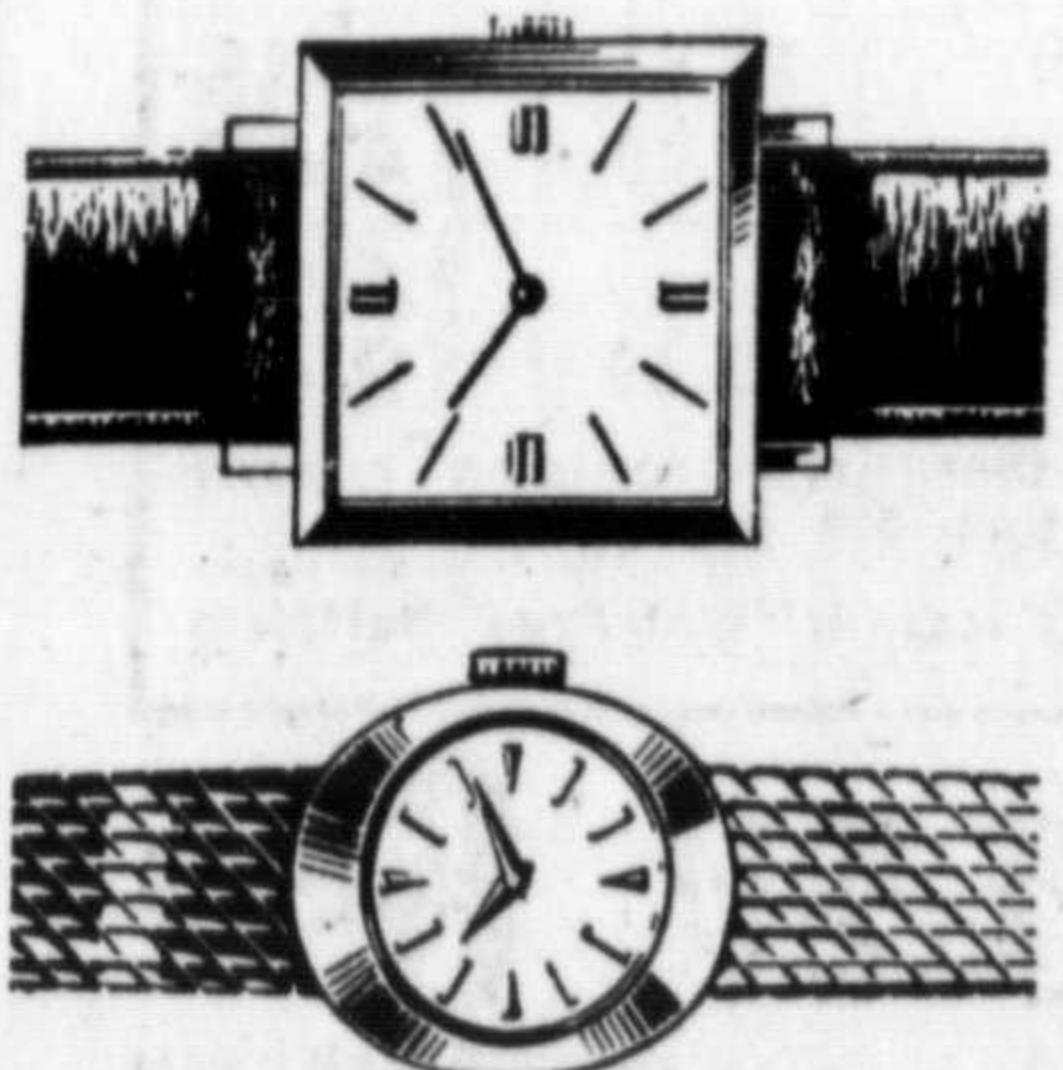

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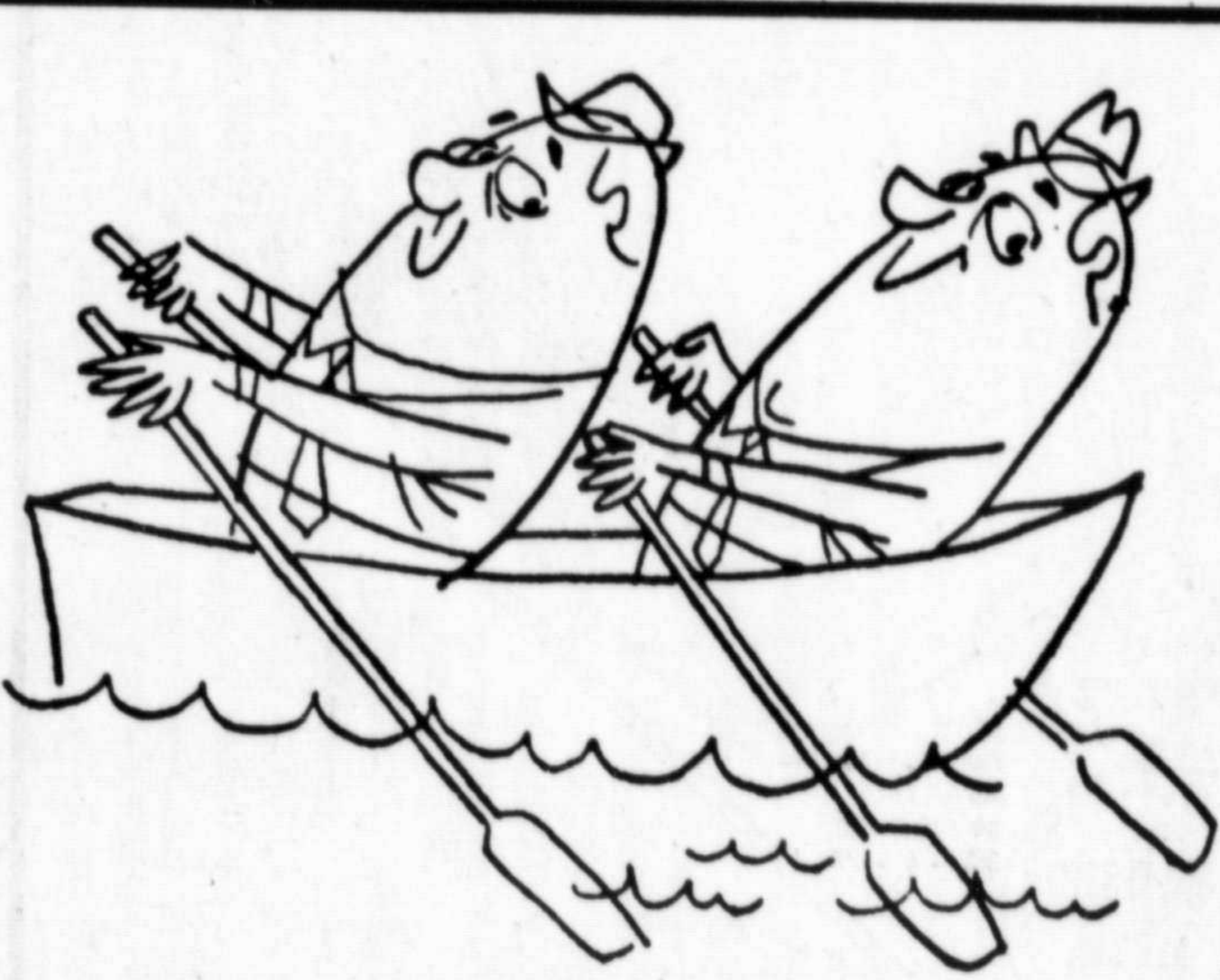

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Historical Notes

Municipal Organization And Administration

By Fred Coyne

The Family is the primary social unit of a nation. Families organize municipalities. When our first families came to settle here during early years of the last century it was the District of Sydenham. While it was yet a district the families of settlers organized the municipalities of Bristol, Clarendon, Litchfield, Calumet Island, Allumette Island.

In 1847 these five municipalities comprised Division No. 3 of the Ottawa County Municipality whose Registry Office was at Aylmer. For Division No. 3 each of the five municipalities elected two Councillors. These formed the County Council of Division No. 3 of the County of Ottawa. Their first meeting was on the 30th of

September 1847 at the home of Samuel Moorhead in Litchfield. It was convened by Walter Smith J.P. senior magistrate of the district who lived in Litchfield Township. The purpose of this meeting was to prepare as well as possible for official County Administration to begin at the First Quarterly Meeting on Monday the 13th day of December 1847.

Councillors for Bristol: William Craig and Patrick Kehoe. For Clarendon: Thomas Corrigan and Thomas Wilson. For Litchfield: Alfred Lancaster and Samuel Moorhead. For Calumet Island: Francois X. Bastien and Thomas McVeigh; For Allumette Island: Andrew Whalen and Donald McNeill.

They elected Alfred Lancaster "to the Mayoralty of this

Council"; John Morton "to the Secretary Treasurership"; Robert Pitt "to the Deputy Grand Voyership". Then they proceeded to appoint Municipal Assessors: For Bristol, John Walker, Archibald Stewart, Wm. Lothian, James McJanet; For Clarendon, Henry McDowall, Archibald Muir, John Armstrong; For Litchfield, Edward Flood, George Stubbs, Patrick Rogers; For Calumet, Louis Brizard, John Ryan, Martin Griffin; For Allumette, James Carney, Wm. Whitmore Jr., John Conolly.

Justices of the Peace in that period as listed: Walter Smith, D.F. McLaren, FX Bastien, Wm King, Archibald Muir. These were responsible for law and order years before the introduction of Commissioners Courts or Circuit Courts here.

The Ottawa River was of course the grand highway of travel and commerce. Next in importance were the "Government Roads", so-called, for colonization and for bypassing turbulent stretches of the great river. Of these perhaps the oldest were the Calumet Road which began at Julien's Landing in Pontiac Bay and extended through the townships of Onslow, Bristol, Clarendon (the Main Street of Shawville was part of it) and Litchfield; also the Chenaux Road which began at Elliott's Landing on Chats Lake and came west to Bentley's Landing in Litchfield where passengers and mail were transferred by rowboat to McLaren's Landing of Ross Township in Upper Canada.

So the County Council's important duty was to survey and open roads along concessions for settlement. They appointed Road Surveyors. For Bristol, William Lucas, senior, Robert Trelford, Lewis Cuthbertson; For Clarendon: Isaac Morrison (withdrew for James Shaw), "Yankee" George Hodgins, "Long" Robert Ralph; For Litchfield, Daniel McLean, Roderrick McCaution (sic), Henry McGee; For Calumet, Baptiste Deroin, Thomas Cahill, George Letts; For Allumette, Matthew Kelly, Bishop Warren, John Kennedy, John Kelly.

There would be disputes about road surveys; about prior rights to location of roads; about compensation for land taken for roads, etc. Such disputes would be referred to the Deputy Grand Voyer for settlement or, in the last analysis, to the County Council itself.

Under each township's Road Surveyors served adequate numbers of Road Overseers. County Council appointed these. For Bristol, Dan McKillop, Dan Ross, James McBlaine Henry Olmsted, Thomas Black, Geo. Lothian, John Farrell, ID Campline, Alex Hazle, Neil McKillop, Joseph Dodds, John Black, P. Kilroy, James Clark Jr., Francois Dumois, Robert Angus, Hugh Gibson, John Fitzgerald, Alex Reid, William Sharp.

For Clarendon: Daniel Cowley, Charles Thomas, Andrew Cote, Patrick Connors, Wm. Stark, James Hart, Louis Obrey John Hodgins, Henry Knox, "Beaver Meadow", John Hodgins, Wm. Dale, Edward Hodgins John Brownlee, William Minet, Wm. Hodgins, Geo. Stanley, James Smith, John McNicoll, James Ralph Jr., John McDowall, Robert Armstrong, Thomas Ralph, Samuel McDonell.

For Litchfield: J. Wm. Boquet Ford, Angus McLellan, Hamilton McLean, Arch. Stevenson, John McDiarmid, Jas. Gilchrist, Mark Mason, Pierre Pepin, Wm. McDonnell, M. M. Drew.

By the 1st day of February 1848 County Secretary John

Morton was able to report to the County Councillor convened in Special Session at the home of Samuel Moorhead on that date that all Assessment Rolls had been received from the Assessors. Council then proceeded to name Collectors. For Bristol: John Cameron; for Clarendon: John Dale; for Litchfield: Thomas Somerville; for Calumet: Thomas Francher; for Allumette: William Fitzpatrick.

Another source of revenue to the County Council was from License fees collected annually from store keepers and tavern keepers. Thus the County Council imposed sums for period July 1, 1847 to July 1, 1848. The resolution reads: "for Licence and Augmentation of Licence". On Bristol: Store keeper William King and tavern keepers Mrs R Walker, Edmund Edy, Patrick O'Brien. On Clarendon: Store keepers

James Trelford, James Macfarlane, Robert Kerr, Thomas and George Grimes. Tavern keepers Robert McDowell, Carmichael. On Litchfield: Store keepers Jason Gould, Hiram Colton, JWB Ford, Alfred Lancaster, Patrick Fox, Ferry operator Thomas Sommerville. Tavern keepers Tiberius Colton, George Stubbs, John Cobb, Robert Dunn, JB Bernard. (Continued on Page Seven)

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

structed to communicate "with WC Crofton, Esq re, Secretary to the Board of Statistics, respecting the taking of the census".

At the same meeting there is a resolution: "Moved by Mr Moorhead seconded by Mr Kehoe that the Line of Road established and homologated by the former Council of the Inferior District of Sydenham of 10 June 1843, beginning at and leading from Lot No. 1 Range 2 and continuing to Lot No. 10 on the 1st Range of the Township of Litchfield be rescinded and altered and that the said road be run as recommended by Road Surveyor Roderick McCaution. The width of the road to be 30 feet between the ditches. The persons required to work on said road are: Angus McLellan or Captain Radford, Captain Fletcher or John

Stevenson, Roderick McCaution, Samuel Moorhead, Walter Smith, Robert Pitt, Francois Mousseau or John Egan MPP, Messrs Gilmour & Co., Archibald Stevenson, Edward Flood, John Heffron (who had been Secretary Treasurer of the former Council of the independent Township of Litchfield) and Donald Campbell.

This is a brief outline of the organization work which led to our County Administration as we know it today. It was tough work that required the services of citizens devoted to the ideal of responsible and fair government. Its full story is a dramatic epic which must arouse our interest, our admiration and, sometimes, our sympathy.

Let us now glance at the sequence of elected County Councillors until the last session as Division No. 3 of the County of Ottawa on the 11th of June 1855 at the home of Samuel Moorhead in Litchfield, 1847-48. for Bristol: Wm Craig and Pat Kehoe; for Clarendon, Thomas Corrigan and Thomas Wilson; for Litchfield, Alfred Lancaster (Mayor) and Samuel Moorhead; for Calumet, Francis X. In July 1855 the County of Pontiac had, by Proclamation, been erected and Municipal Elections were for Councillors of County Council of the County of Pontiac.

On September 19, 1855, the first General Session of this County Council convened at 10 am in Portage du Fort. Mention is made later about compensation to John Gordon for accommodations; so that may have been the meeting place.

The Quebec Historical Monuments Commission, Quebec, have stated that they will place a plaque in Durham, Que., to commemorate the first Women's Institute formed in the Province of Quebec.

On January 27, 1911, Mrs. George Beach, Cowansville, called a meeting of interested women in Best's Hall, Durham and, with the assistance of Mrs Jean Muldrew of Macdonald College, organized the first Women's Institute in the Province.

A plaque was unveiled in Stoney Creek, Ont., where the first Institute in the world was organized in 1897. The birthplace of the founder, Adelaide Hoodless, has been named an historic site and the house has been furnished and the grounds planted to conform to that period in history.

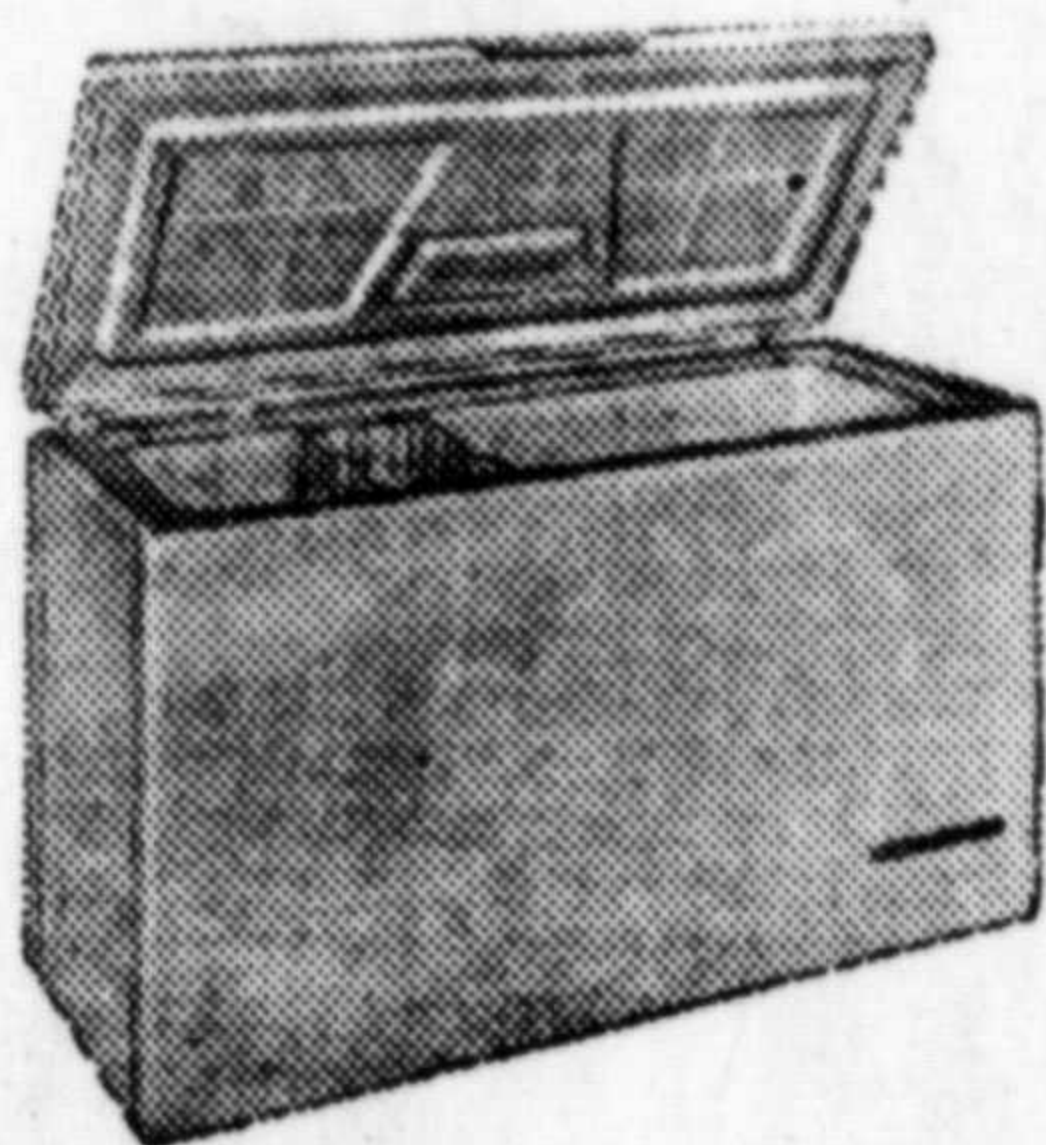

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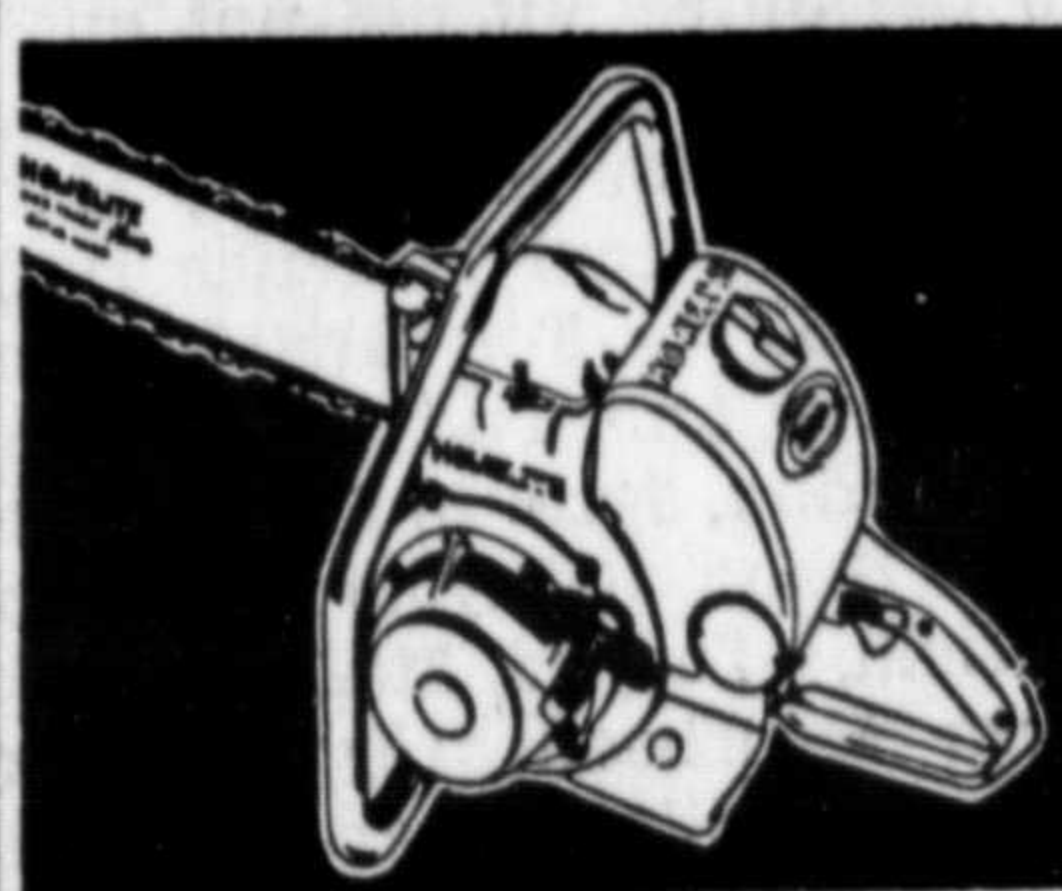
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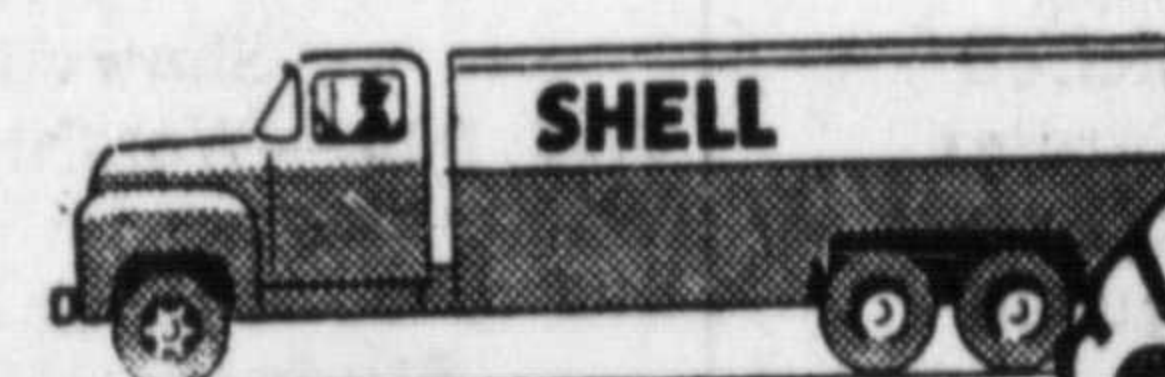

The Early History of Pontiac Families

THE HODGINS (Cont.) No. 2

In our last article we gave a list of early Hodgins families residing in the Township of Clarendon when the early census was taken, and we found that they were all descendants of George Hodgins and Mary Williams, six sons and two daughters.

Let us sum up the earlier history of the Hodgins and see where the other families settled, starting back in the year 1700.

We find ROBERT HODGINS and his wife MARY GLASS living in TIPPERARY, Ireland. They had three sons: JAMES (his wife's name unknown), WILLIAM who married JANE BLACKWELL and ROBERT who married MARY GUESS.

1. James' son JOHN married MARY PRETTIE in 1795 and went into Ontario, with his son Thomas going to Carp, John going to Carp and Huntley, and Adam and James going to Lucan in Middlesex County.
2. William's grandson RICHARD went to Lissenhall in 1850

and his great grand son William to Goulbourn in 1870.

3. Robert's son William who married a Miss Morgan and his second son, whose name is unknown, have left us no records of where they went. But the third son GEORGE, who married MARY WILLIAMS, is the ancestor of all the Clarendon HODGINS. This GEORGE and MARY are the THIRD GENERATION. The children of George, the FOURTH GENERATION, was given in last article. Now THE GRAND CHILDREN OF GEORGE and MARY WILLIAMS.

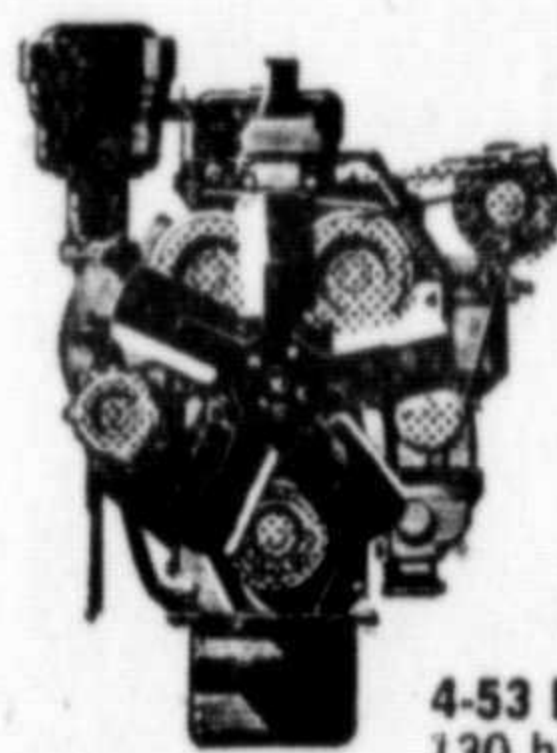

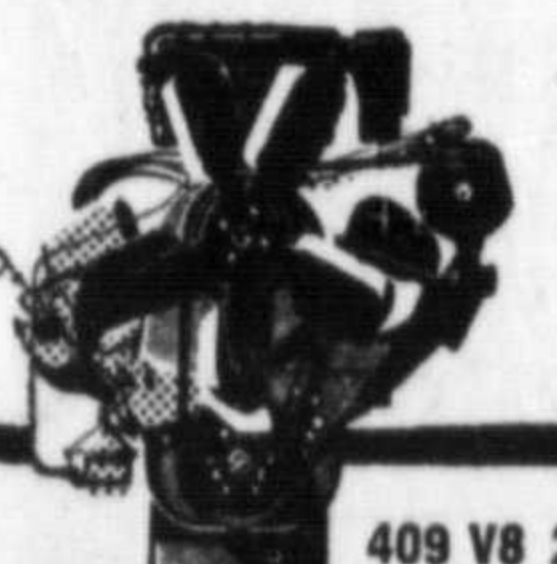

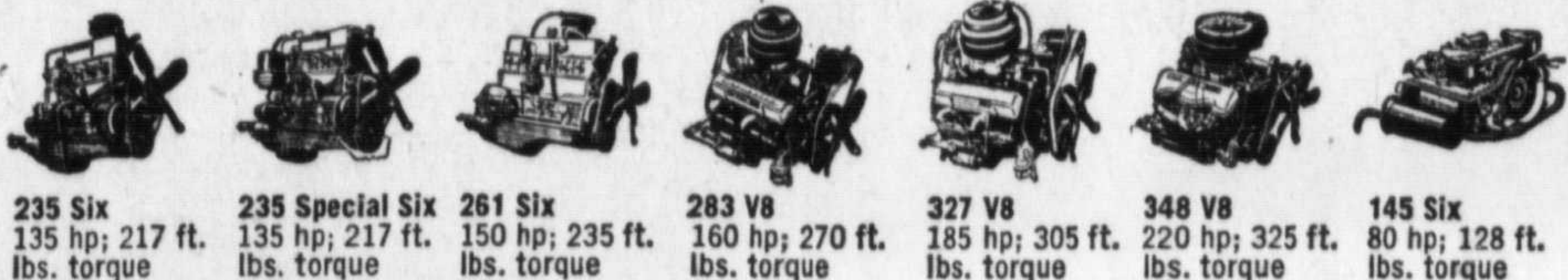
