

PROPRIETORS 'SQUEEZE' NOMINEES FOR COUNCIL ON FOUR ZONING ISSUES

First Vote In 25 Years May Result

For the first time in almost a quarter of a century Westmount is threatened with a civic election.

The threat comes from the Westmount Property Owners Association, who may decide to oppose nominees to council selected Tuesday by the Westmount Municipal Association.

The proprietors will decide after hearing the nominees at a meeting Monday at 8:30 p.m. in Victoria Hall's Oak room, they say.

Elphege Menard, president of the Property Owners Association, told **The Examiner** that the nominees for the Jan. 17 elections are all being invited to the meeting.

He said that a program favored by his association would be distributed in printed form to the municipal slate, who would be asked their opinions on the subject.

"Any of the nominees not in favor of our program will be opposed in the election," Mr. Menard promised.

Those named by the Municipal Association include J. A. DeLalanne, as mayor, and A. Turner Bone, T. W. Bassett, J. C. Cushing, A. Powis, Jr., and Gerald G. Ryan as aldermen.

The program they will be asked to ratify — or wage (Continued on Page 2)

Select J. A. DeLalanne For Mayor; Pick Five For Seats On Council

J. A. DeLalanne was nominated for mayor in the January 17 municipal elections Tuesday by the Westmount Municipal Association.

Other nominees on the association's slate for council are A. Turner Bone, T. W. Bassett, J. C. Cushing, A. Powis, Jr., and Gerald G. Ryan.

Only two — Mr. DeLalanne and Mr. Turner Bone — are on the present council of six members.

Of the other four, three are ineligible by law to run for office and one is retiring because of business reasons.

Mayor Roy L. Campbell and Aldermen J. E. S. Pemberton, H. L. Blachford, and R. Panet-Raymond are the council members not on the new slate.

Frank Gates, president of the Municipal Association, told the meeting that amendments to the Cities and Towns Act at last year's session of the Quebec Legislature made three council members ineligible to hold office.

The amendments made it illegal for a candidate to run for municipal office unless his property is registered in his own name. The property of the three council members is listed in the names of their wives.

Seek Change

The city has sent a private bill to the Legislature asking amendments to the charter which will make it legal for a man to hold office if his property is registered in his wife's name.

The association also nominated

Mrs. Michael Tucker and N. E. Kenrick as candidates for the Protestant School Commission of

an election fight over — consists of four main points as outlined to The Examiner by Mr. Menard:

- 1) New zoning laws for rooming houses.
- 2) Permission for clerical offices of all types on Sherbrooke street.
- 3) The free conversion of all houses into duplexes, if so desired.
- 4) The free conversion of all homes into so called two and a half room apartments, if so desired.

Three of the candidates when contacted by The Examiner preferred to issue no comment on the program, and all expressed an inability to be present at the meeting Monday.

Mr. De Lalanne said he would not be available Monday night, and added that opposition in the municipal race would cause him to "reconsider" his nomination.

For nearly 25 years there has not been an election in Westmount. Candidates, traditionally named by the association, have gone in by acclamation.

Mr. De Lalanne may have had this in mind when accepting the nomination. He said outside commitments might take more time than he would have available to properly contest an election.

Mr. Turner Bone and Mr. Powis also said they would not be available for the meeting.

Mr. Menard said all candidates who did not attend the meeting, and failed to notify the proprietors, would be

John E. L. Hollyer was named a candidate for city library trustee.

Discussion was lively during an open forum period on traffic and zoning. Committee chairmen gave short reports, and answered questions from members.

It was reported that the city's traffic lights take longer to change than lights in any other municipality on the island.

Longer Lights

The association said the amber lights take five seconds to change from green to red, while the average time for amber lights in Montreal is three seconds.

The question arose when some members complained the lights took too long and others said they changed too fast.

The association reported that the city has been asked to protest re-routing of the No. 4 bus route up Claremont avenue by the Montreal Transportation Commission.

Residents of the street have protested the change. The association reported that while representations can be made, the MTC will not be obliged to follow them.

The association reported that the city is considering turning Lansdowne avenue into a one way street and straightening the jog in it at The Boulevard.

Members also brought up the advisability of turning Victoria and Grosvenor avenues into one way streets starting at Sherbrooke street instead of Westmount avenue, as at present.

to participate in democratic government to share in informal discussion, and above all it challenges boys to Christian living," he said. "It is the hope of my government," he said to his capacity of "lieutenant governor" at the formal opening, "that each of you

will discover some of the strength and assurances that can come from Parliament experience, and will endeavour to carry it into your daily lives."

He then summarized the legislation the boys will discuss and vote on.

Marler Sees All-Canada Seaway Impractical

Work Allocation Fair Between Canada, U.S. Says Transport Chief

An all-Canada Seaway is not practical now, Hon. George Marler, local Federal member and Canada's Transport Minister declared Monday night as he delivered the fourth annual David Jassby Memorial Lecture at Temple Emanu-El.

"The decision of the Canadian Government to consent to the building of the locks at Barnhart Island by the United States Government has been bitterly criticized," he said.

"It has been said that Canada should build the whole of the Seaway on its side of the boundary line. Naturally many Canadians would prefer that we should have a wholly Canadian deep waterway from ocean to lakehead, but geography seems to make this rather difficult.

"It may become a reality in our own lifetime, but it certainly is not practical at this time.

PLEADS FOR FRIENDSHIP

"Our long-standing friendship with the American people makes it essential for us to approach the subject of the development of this great waterway in a friendly spirit, and to find a method of carrying out the work that is mu-

tually satisfactory and acceptable."

The Transport Minister said he thinks the present allocation of work in the International Rapids section of the river is fair and equitable and that Canada's rights are fully safeguarded.

At present, the dam and power facilities at Barnhart Island, near Cornwall, will straddle the international boundary and be built by both the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission and the Power Authority of the State of New York. Locks will be built on the American side at Barnhart Island and on the Canadian side at Iroquois Island, this, despite a directive by the U.S. Congress that the locks there be built on the American side of the river.

INTENTION STATED

Mr. Marler states that, "We have made it perfectly clear to the United States Government in the most formal way that it is our intention, if and when conditions warrant, it, to build locks on the Canadian side at Barnhart Island and this to establish in the International Rapids section, facilities that will be 'wholly located in Canadian territory.'"

He said that while co-operating in every way with the U.S., Canada had not, as some critics had put it, "sold Canada down the river to the U.S."

Mr. Marler repeated statements made recently that it is seemingly not the intention of the Quebec Government to proceed with development of power potential in the Lachine section now.

HOPES FOR ACTION

He hoped growth in the Montreal district will be such that the Provincial Government "will see fit to go ahead with its development."

There is a possible 1,200,000 horsepower in the Lachine section of the Seaway but Premier Maurice Duplessis said recently that his government could not

**St. George's
 Masonic Lodge
 125 Years Old**

The 125th anniversary of St. George's Masonic Lodge No. 10, largest and most munificent fraternal organization in Montreal, was celebrated Tuesday with a banquet in the Mount Royal Hotel.

Leonard W. Brockington, CMG, QC, LL.D., rector of Queen's University, was the guest speaker.

A history of the lodge prepared by Dr. John Irwin Cooper, associate professor of history at McGill University to be ready by the weekend and the distribution of a \$25,000 appeal to a number of organizations will also mark the anniversary.

Beneficiaries of the appeal fund will be McGill University, Sir George Williams College, Royal Victoria Hospital, Radio Isotope Laboratory of the Jewish General Hospital, the Jewish Hospital of Hope, Montreal General Hospital and the Hebrew Old Peoples' Home.

Others will be St. Mary's, St. Justine's, Redy Memorial, Queen Elizabeth, Grace Dart, St. Jeanne d'Arc and Children's Memorial hospitals, the Montreal Neurological Institute, The Institute for the Blind, the Province of Quebec Society for Crippled Children, Baron Byng High School, and the Association for the Help of Mentally Retarded Children.

It was recalled that the birth of the lodge took place in the same year that saw the opening of McGill University. John Molson was the grand master at that time and later leaders included Judge William Badgley and Rev. John Bethune, acting principal of McGill University.

The first initiates included Scottish, English, Welsh and Hebrew names and Irish names soon followed. The long line of past masters includes many men who won distinction in the professional, commercial and industrial history of the city and province. The ministry, education, medicine and law were all represented.

The lodge's roll of honorary life members includes those of Dr. Charles L. Roman, past grand master for the province of Quebec; Louis Solomon, leading Hebrew layman; and Norman Holland, author and philanthropist.

Present membership includes clergy of the Hebrew and Christian faiths in the persons of Rabbi Charles Bender, district deputy grand chaplain, and Rev. Dr. Charles Este, minister of Union United Church.

**Camp Is Credited
 With Extra Value**

The camp for pupils of the School for Crippled Children on Lake Massawippi was credited with building hearts and souls, aside from mending bodies, by school principal Dr. L. P. Patterson Tuesday.

Addressing the Canadian Progress Club in the Mount Royal Hotel, he traced the development of the camp since the purchase of the original 15 acres, and paid tribute to service clubs and others who supported the venture.

Today, he noted, the camp has two large dormitories, a staff house, a dining hall for 200, two smaller cabins, handicraft shop, infirmary, eight other buildings and a large playing field.

Accompanying Dr. Patterson were the school nurse, Miss Ellen Peron, and six pupils — Claude Marcel Brouillette, Sheila Burke, Carol Driscoll, Danny Moores and Ellen O'Neill, who illustrated some of the 30 types of physical disablements suffered by children attending the school.

B. K. Sandwell, Famous Editor, Dies Aged 78

Bernard Keble Sandwell, 78, a former resident of Westmount, and editorial columnist of the Financial Post since 1953, died Tuesday. A generation of Canadians knew him as editor-in-chief of Saturday Night.

His last Financial Post column—Sandwell Here—appeared Nov. 20—a characteristically vigorous and witty commentary on a variety of topics.

He joined the Financial Post a year ago.

Mr. Sandwell retired as editor-in-chief of Saturday Night which he had directed for more than 19 years, in 1951. As editor emeritus he continued to contribute editorials and other articles until he joined the Maclean-Hunter publication.

He is survived by his wife, the former Marion K. Street of Albany, N.Y., a descendant of one of the signers of the American constitution. They had no children.

Other survivors include Mrs. E. Watson Shields, of London, England, a sister, Mrs. Richard Haviland, wife of the city editor of the Montreal Star, a niece, and Bernard Sandwell of the MacMillan Company of Canada, Toronto, a nephew.

A brother, A. H. Sandwell, predeceased him, and Helen B. Sandwell, the latter's widow, is women's editor of the Guardian, an Examiner affiliate.

He Polished Up The Handle

Sparks crackled from the horses' flying hoofs, as the W. H. Smith's newspaper 'transport' tore along the twisting English lanes. His slogan "Your newspaper on the breakfast table" was new and startling in those pre-railway days more than 150 years ago.

Old letters of the firm give us vivid accounts of horses secured where they could be found at inns along the route as Smith's newspapers were 'galloped' from one end of Britain to the other. When King George IV died Smith, chartering a special boat delivered the news in Dublin a full twenty-four hours ahead even of the royal messenger. Nearly ninety years later, when General Allenby entered Jerusalem at the head of his victorious army, it was a Smith's boy who first carried the news to Lord Allenby's mother.

Recently Smith's bought out Burton's Ltd. on St. Catherine Street. They will take over in March 1955.

For nearly a century and a half Smith's have been making history. They were pioneers in many things which we take for granted to-day. In 1792, Henry Walton Smith died leaving his widow to support two sons and carry on as best she could the little paper shop in Grosvenor street, London. William Henry, youngest of the two boys, was born a few weeks before his father's death.

As he grew older he was apprenticed to a goldsmith where he showed outstanding creative ability. Regretfully, at his mother's request, he abandoned his chosen avocation in order to rescue what was left of his father's business. It was hard going. Smith and his young son William Henry II was up at four a.m. for the long drive from Kilburn (then a suburb of London) to his shop in the Strand, where he rolled up his sleeves and buckled down to work side by side with the men at the long tables where the newspapers were parcelled and abelled. Newspapers struggled against enormous odds in those early days. Printing wasn't the modern miracle we know. The pages had to be printed, then left to dry, before they could be turned and printed on the other side. Though the 'boss' and his men worked at top speed, papers were often late getting off the presses and the coaches had left by the time Smith's men arrived with their load. Then it would be a race down the turnpike road to try and catch the Post-coach at the first stop.

The coming of the railways delighted W. H. Smith. While hunting parsons and country squires were protesting that these 'puffing juggernauts' would not only ruin the hunting but would also cause cows to slip their calves, Smith employed nine special engines to get his papers delivered in the big cities of the North.

The phenomenal growth of the business, forced W. H. Smith I to take a partner. His son, W. H. II was about to study for Holy Orders. Regretfully, as his father had done before him, he gave up his chosen profession and became the junior partner in the firm. We are told it was W. H. II, even more than his father, "who stamped the firm with those essentially British characteristics—sobriety, honesty and granite integrity." His nickname in political life was 'Old Morality.' Barely 21 years of age, W. H. II made the firm even more famous by his idea of buying the bookstall at Euston station in London. That was before the days of general education and the literary ideas of the book-stall keepers were limited. A little later a contract was signed with the Midland Railways giving W. H. Smith their station bookstalls too. Father and son promptly made a clean sweep of the rubbish that cluttered them. The firm was hailed as public benefactors and Smiths became synonymous with

bookstall, on practically every railway (and later ocean steamships) in the United Kingdom.

In 1857 the elder Smith retired. He did not live to see his son become a Cabinet minister "The Ruler of the Queen's Nave" referred to in Gilbert and Sullivan's opera "Pinafore," in the song which tells of the man who carried out his duties so "faithful" and polished up the handle of the big front door" of the shop in the Strand.

No equally picturesque figure has arisen in the firm of W. H. Smith, but he left behind him something that was even greater than personality—a living heritage: "an organization welded together by the love of a great tradition, and stimulated by the greatest of all ideals, service."

In 1905 the leases for railway bookstalls came up for re-consideration. The various railways now asked a figure which W. H. Smith considered too high for profitable working. Instead of allowing the contract to lapse, as most men would have done, Smiths looked at the problem from the angle of their employees who would be thrown out of work, and also of their customers who had come to depend on Smith's for over half a century. A staff meeting was called, to discuss the matter. Finally it was decided, that if the work of paper and book distribution could not be carried on any longer from the stalls, it must be carried from other centers. A super-active ten weeks was all the time there was before the change was made. Leases were bought, and sometimes whole businesses were bought outright. An army of workmen descended on shops all over England, refitting them to the new design of Smiths. Before World War II there were 357 Smiths bookshops, 1,047 bookstalls and 64 wholesale depots in the provinces. Of course they outgrew the shop in the Strand and to-day they have stepped across the ocean to open business in Montreal.

PRIVATE LIVES OF DINOSAURS

Scientists, prying into the lives of dinosaurs and Stone Age man, have discovered that these early citizens suffered from many of our complaints and ills. Arthritis, for instance, crippled some of our early ancestors and the dinosaur, who had an awful lot of territory

to ache, has also left evidence of his suffering in the remains found. Medical science has still not found the complete cure for the disease, but means of diagnosing the many varieties of the disease have been discovered and methods of treatment developed. As a result, in many cases it is possible to control it, providing it is discovered in time.

Mrs. Holtz will be remembered by Montrealers for her interpretation of the role of Mrs. Coffman in Rupert Caplan's production last May of "Come Back, Little Sheba," and has also been heard in CBC radio plays. Under her guidance, the group is working towards the goal of professional acting. Following the presentation of "Miss Julie" the studio will be formally organized.

Since the studio's inception, Mrs. Holtz has obtained the assistance of Miss Dorothy Danford, Madame Jean-Louis Audet, Bryden Paige, and Bob Vereniks, who instruct the students in voice and diction, French diction, ballet and Stanislavsky methods respectively.

The group has designed and constructed its own portable stage, on which all its presentations will be performed. A repertoire is now being built up for presentation to invited audiences, and in the near future it is hoped that performances will be opened to the general public.

G. Robley Mackay Re-Named By Scouts

G. Robley MacKay, 247 Ballantyne avenue north, Montreal West was re-elected commissioner of the Quebec Provincial Council of the Boy Scouts Association at the annual meeting Saturday.

The new council is unchanged

except for the addition of Roy Wilson of St. Johns as a vice president. B. W. Roberts, CBE, is president.

Other officers are M. T. Bancroft, Carl D. Dennis, R. Cameron McCutcheon and Mr. Wilson, vice presidents; Allan T. Corner, honorary treasurer; Earle T. Moore, Montreal regional president; and D. W. Ferrier, member at large.

Some 70 scout leaders from as far as Gaspé attended the 44th annual meeting, including 20 special trainers, who were adorned with 'the beads' by deputy chief scout of Canada Jackson Dodds.

In an address at a luncheon meeting, Fred J. Findlay, of Ottawa, chief executive boy scout commissioner for Canada, said scouting is not only a partnership in itself, but is in a partnership with the church, school and home.

He said the home was still the bedrock of a boy's training, and scouting was essentially a religious or moral training supplementing that given in the church and the school.

He said that scouting should not supplant the home in the basic training of youth, but rather complement it.

"We must work in co-operation

with the home and the church if our efforts are to be successful," he said. "It is our job to make a good citizen out of a boy who joins the boy scout movement for fun and adventure."

Mr. Findlay said that boys don't join the scouts with the idea of training. "They join for the fun of it, and it is our job to channel their enthusiasm into the lanes that make them good leaders."

The chief executive commissioner said scouting was a game for boys but a work for men and he added "we only want people who are willing to work in this movement. The fact that there are six million boy scouts in the world is testimony to this. You have to sell scouting to men and show them the vital need for it."

The scouts are a partnership in that they need co-operation between the various branches, such as the ladies auxiliary, group committees, and others.

He praised the Montreal Ladies Auxiliary, and stressed the importance of their work.

"Canada could have all the natural resources in the world, but they would be practically useless without properly trained youth geared for leadership."

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 9. — News of Marlon Brando's matrimonial involvement with the daughter of a French fisherman has catapulted the unpredictable actor back onto the front pages. way. Two such instances come to mind.

A few months back the actor was visited in his dressing room by Hedda Hopper, the arbiter of what is politically right or wrong, patriotic or treasonable in Hollywood. Hedda, who can be downright pleasant when she wants to and who is no slouch at digging up news, tossed questions at him for thirty minutes with no results. He just sat, head slumped in his hands, didn't say a word.

Finally Brando stooped up, eyed Hopper sharply, and said: "Why don't you go jump!"

With which he walked out of the room.

His treatment of Sheilah Graham, another syndicated femme gossip, was even shabbier. During the run of "A Streetcar Named Desire" Brando walked into a backstage dressing room to find Miss Graham, who is in her forties, unexpectedly there awaiting him. Brando eyed her briefly as though they had never met before, then turned to a middle-aged performer who was present and asked:

"Oh, is this your mother, Sam?" Miss Graham's husband, a 250-pound ex-football star, still swears he'll get even with the actor some day.

TICKETAPE — Pat Morgan, who rates something better, recently completed an engagement at the Show Bar in Montreal. Not that there's anything wrong with the Show Bar, but the Canadian singer is as good as Perry Como and other top recording aces and it's time he got a break in the States . . . You'll recall Pat dubbed the singing voice of Ralph Meeker with Betty Hutton in "Somebody Loves Me" two years ago . . . The Marion Davies Clinic in Los Angeles takes care of 1,500 sick children a month free of charge . . . Have you seen the new chlorophyll insoles for shoes? 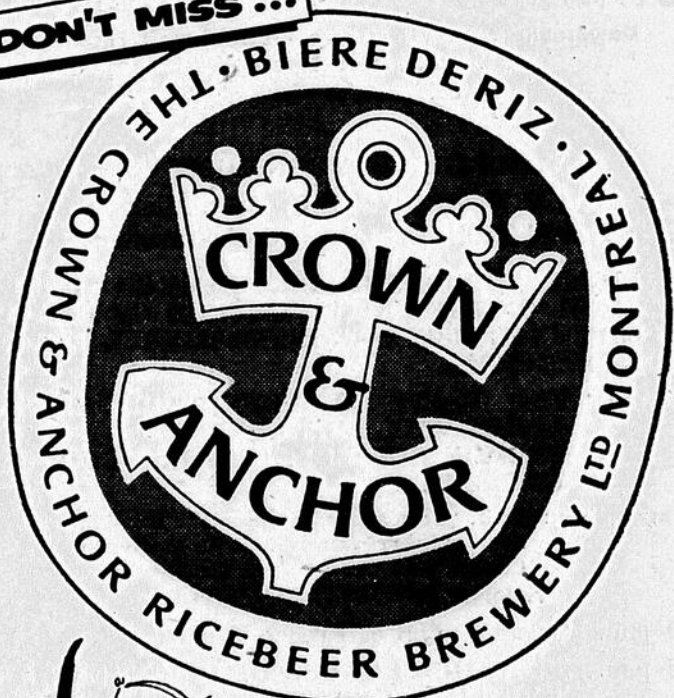

The Late B. K. Sandwell Canada Loses One Of Its Most Brilliant Citizens

Hundreds of friends in Montreal and vicinity will mourn the death of Bernard K. Sandwell, who passed away in Toronto Tuesday night. One of Canada's leading scholars and journalists, the late Mr. Sandwell had personal friends in all walks of life here where he started the brilliant career that brought him national and international recognition.

"B. K.", as he was known, was an Englishman by birth, but came to Canada as a boy and obtained his education at Upper Canada College and University of Toronto.

His writing career began in the '90's with the Montreal Herald, where he was a con-

temporary of some of the greatest of Canadian journalists. He quickly won a reputation as a drama critic, and his column became one of the best read in the country. In 1911 he moved to the field of financial journalism, as editor of the Financial Times, a position he held with brilliance until 1919 when he moved to McGill as Assistant Professor of Economics. Four years later he was appointed to the chair of English at Queen's, but in 1932 moved back to his first love, journalism, as editor of Toronto's Saturday night. His articles and editorials during a twenty-year span with Saturday Night were widely read and quoted. Failing health finally compelled him to relinquish this work in 1951, but from that time until his death he was a contributor, and author of a column in The Financial Post.

During his distinguished career, many honours were bestowed upon him. He succeeded the Earl of Athlone as Rector of Queen's University, was the recipient of two LL.D. degrees and a fellowship in the Royal Society of Canada—among other honours. He served on the Board of Governors of the CBC, and was Ontario representative on the Federal District Commission charged with making the plans for the beautifying of the City of Ottawa and surrounding area.

He was one of our most brilliant citizens.

VOCATION

One of the extraordinary things about the relationship of God and man is the way in which God uses people for His purposes. He used spiritual, angelic messengers at times, but the great work of revelation was done through men and women. Sometimes there was a willing co-operation on man's part; sometimes it was very reluctant. Moses felt himself inadequate for the task and said so, but was overruled. Jeremiah protested that he was too young to carry so hard a message and so bitter a burden, but he was told that the Lord would be with him to deliver him from the people who he would offend by his message. Jonah tried to escape from his obligations and God brought him back to it by hard methods. But in one way and another God used His human messengers to make His character and His will known to His people—here a little, there a little, line upon line, precept upon precept. It was not only the Prophets who were called to bear this witness. The Priests also had their place, for to them was delivered the law with its teaching and its interpretation. In fact, they had a great deal to do with conserving the teaching of the Prophets as well.

Then came the time for a new kind of revelation and God sent His own Son. But still He made use of people: first the preparation through Zacharias and Elizabeth; then the Annunciation to the Virgin Mary, and her acceptance of task; then the announcement to Joseph and his acceptance; then the Shepherds and the Wise Men, the Innocents who suffered in the place of the Child; Anna and Simeon who bore their witness.

In the Ministry of our Lord there were many who carried for-

ward God's work, not by their steady continuance with Jesus but by their readiness to receive Him when He came their way. Doing God's will takes many forms.

Even today ministering to our Lord takes many forms, from the cup of cold water, or the kindly word, in the name of Christ, to the administration of the affairs of the Body of Christ in that part of it to which we are called.

Just as last Sunday is called Bible Sunday, so next Sunday might be called Ministry Sunday. Its teaching carries us back to the days of the Prophets and to John the Baptist and to the Apostles—those men who were called officially to the ministry of Priesthood or Prophecy.

The call still goes out, and the work of ministering in Prophecy and Priesthood in the church still goes on. And, as any Prophet or Priest will testify, there is no greater task to which a man can be called. It is not the only call. A man is called to serve God and his fellows in Medicine, in Engineering, in Law, in Industry, in Street Cleaning in Teaching, but the call to Ministry is in a class by itself, for in the Ministry a man becomes a steward of the mysteries of God. Such a call can only be refused at our own risk.

Reusing mentioned that Mme St-Just was very flattered to receive a letter of congratulation on her appointment from no less a personage than Mayor Charlotte Whitton of Ottawa.

Mrs. Philip Caplan, who has retired from the presidency of the Cancer Research Society, was also introduced to the meeting, and Mrs. Reusing congratulated her for the wonderful work she has done in this field.

Your luggage will last from five to ten years longer if you give it the care it deserves. When you get home from a trip, clean your bags with a damp cloth and mild soap lather. Buff them with a dry, soft-nap cloth and apply a light coating of saddle soap. This protects the leather.

Never oil the locks because the oily may stain the lining or leather.

In storing your luggage, make sure to avoid any place of extreme temperature or of dampness. Heat will absorb the natural oils of leather, and dampness encourages mould, mildew and warping.

And never put your bags away partly opened. They may lose their shape or the hinges may be knocked out of line.
