JAPANESE DRIVE ON SHANGHAI FAILS

Armies Forced Back When Chinese Stage Surprise Offensive

Flames Across Northwestern Shanghai Lighted Path of Japanese Effort to Regain Territory Lost in Surprise Raids—Chinese Claim Counter-Offensive Has Pushed Japanese Armies Back to Very Banks of Yangtze and Whangpoo Rivers.

Shanghai, September 7.—Flames across all northwestern Shanghai lighted the path tonight of a fierce Japanese effort to batter down Chinese resistance that has brought their Shanghai offensive to a standstill.

Artillery roared in the Yangtzepoo, Chapei, Kiangwan and North Station districts, laying down blankets of shell fire in advance of Japanese sunset attacks on the Chinese lines.

Fires spread across the whole area. The Commercial Press building, rebuilt after the 1932 Sino-Japanese hostilities, was reduced to ashes again after it was struck by three Japanese bombs.

The Japanese attack began after the Chinese suddenly shifted from the defensive to a counter-offensive against the Japanese lines fringing the Yangtze and Whangpoo rivers in the northern fighting area of the city.

Mayor O. K. Yui, of Shanghai, said the sudden Chinese thrust had driven the Japanese from the Jukong wharf district midway between Shanghai and the confluence of the two rivers, splitting the Japanese front.

Twelve miles to the north, he declared, the Chinese had recaptured much of the lost ground around Woosung and Paoshan and were threatening the Japanese forces within Paoshan's ancient walls. Other reports from Chinese sources said Paoshan had fallen.

Japanese Warships Bombed

Still further up the Yangtze, two Japanese destroyers and a Japanese cruiser, guarding troop ships attempting to land reinforcements, were bombed before dawn by Chinese warplanes. Mayor Yui said one of the destroyers was in flames and one bomb had caused a terrific explosion aboard the cruiser.

Japanese army spokesmen admitted their advance was meeting pressure on all fronts with Chinese entrenched in pill-boxes and dugouts. The spokesman said neither Christian churches, Chinese temples, hospitals nor schools would be spared from Japanese artillery and air bombardment if the Chinese army continued to use them for troop concentrations and bases. He added that it did not matter to the Japanese whether these institutions were Chinese or owned by foreigners.

Because of the serious situation along the boundaries of the International Settlement, all British and United States members of the Shanghai Volunteer Corps who were demobilized ten days ago were ordered to return to immediate active duty along the barricades. Boundaries of the settlement were maintained by land and air.

Military experts of the United States forces here estimated Japan's position at Shanghai today as virtually unchanged from that of August 10 when she started operations by landing naval troops in the Yangtzepoo area. Japan has sixty thousand troops and half her navy operating against Shanghai and is reliably reported to have forty-nine troop ships with an additional sixty thousand men hovering off the mouth of the Yangtze ready to land if she can secure an adequate beach head. Opposed to these, China has fourteen full strength divisions totalling

Hitler Stressed Solidarity Of Germany, Italy And Japan

Also Made an Emphatic Reiteration of Germany's Demand for Return of Her War-Lost Colonies, and Termed Attitude of Other Powers Toward This Demand "Incomprehensible" in Annual Proclamation to Nazi Congress.

Nuremberg, Germany, Sept. 7.—Chancellor Hitler stressed Nazi Germany's solidarity with both Japan and Italy today—against "Communist Confusion" in east and west.

His annual proclamation, read to the Nazi Congress by Adolf Wagner, Bavarian Nazi leader, also made an emphatic reiteration of Germany's demand for return of her war-lost colonies, and called the attitude of other powers toward this demand "incomprehensible."

Both the Japanese and Italian ambassadors were in the crowd of 46,000 which heard Hitler's statement that Germany would stand by both Japan and Italy in a "defensive" fight against Communism.

It was as if they were hearing the Chancellor's own voice, because Wagner, who read the proclamation, often is called Hitler's "vocal double."

The Chinese ambassador also was present in red-and-gold draped Lutpold Hall.

Hitler listened to his own keynote speech from a platform seat. Several hundred bluebloods flanked him. The first few rows of the hall were reserved for the German cabinet, the Italian delegation and foreign diplomats. The rest of the assembly was a sea of brown and black uniforms, with one "island" reserved for female guests.

Hitler made it plain that Germany's anti-Communist agreement with Japan served the same purpose as the Italo-German "community of fate."

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UNITED STATES TREASURY BOOSTS INTEREST RATES

Washington, Sept. 7.—The Treasury recognized stiffening of interest rates throughout the United States today in offering to give investors new securities in exchange for \$817,000,000 in 3 1/4 per cent. government notes maturing September 15.

Treasury Secretary Morgenthau made public yesterday two exchange issues offering fifteen-month 1 1/4 per cent. notes and five-year two per cent. notes. The two per cent. rate is the highest for such obligations since 1934.

NEWS THAT SUN IS A "DWARF STAR" HAS SET THE ASTRONOMICAL WORLD AGOG

Cambridge, Mass., Sept. 7.—News that the sun is a "dwarf star" and distinctly under par from a standpoint of brilliance brought small comfort today to burned sunbathers—but set the astronomical world agog.

Research by the Harvard Observatory has disclosed that the sun is, relatively speaking, a weakling, giving only 7-10 the brilliance of other stars of its type.

These findings, reported by Dr. William A. Calder, rearrange many astronomical standards, since the luminosity of the sun is a measuring stick for brightness and luminosity of heavenly bodies.

Using a giant "electric eye," Dr. Calder discovered not only unsuspected weakness in the sun's power, but also that the moon is relatively brighter than astronomers have previously believed.

FEW PUPILS TO HEAR ONTARIO SCHOOL BELLS

Owen Sound Only City to Re-open Schools Today—Cooler Weather Over Week-End Causes Sharp Decrease in Paralysis Cases.

Toronto, Sept. 7.—Schools re-opened today in Owen Sound but in almost all other Ontario centres were still closed because of the outbreak of infantile paralysis, which has afflicted 1,780 persons and caused forty deaths in Ontario.

Owen Sound Board of Education decided to re-open schools on the scheduled date when it learned during the weekend that not a case has been reported there. Only pupils of the new Strathecona Public School remain out, because their new building has not been completed in time, and will take another two weeks.

Few new cases in the province were reported during the holiday week-end, and the advent of much cooler weather was credited with an apparent cessation in spread of the ailment. Only one death was reported yesterday, that of thirty-four year old Gordon Sinclair, London. Fifteen additional cases in Toronto brought the total in the capital to

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Britain To Press Parley Proposal To End Menace Of Underwater Pirates

Determined to Hold Nyon Conference Whether Italy Attends or Not—Believed to Have Three-Fold Proposals for Easing Critical Situation Aggravated by Formal Russian Protests Against Italian Submarine Activity.

London, September 7.—Great Britain plans to go ahead with the Nyon conference whether Italy attends or not. No replies have yet been received from the twelve powers to whom invitations were addressed. But, stung by the Russian note charging Italian guilt, the newspaper Messagero, of Rome, declares it is "absolutely senseless to imagine Italy can appear in the role of the accused."

In the British view action against underwater pirates in the Mediterranean cannot be delayed. Continuance of the present situation would be intolerable.

British proposals for the conference are understood to include:

- 1—Registration of submarines in the Mediterranean;
- 2—Measures whereby submarines of all powers shall be kept within defined zones;
- 3—An undertaking that the warships of all conferring powers shall defend each others shipping.

Foreign Secretary Eden will head the British delegation which intends to make a strong effort to secure collective action in defence of safety on the high seas.

But already doubt and fears hang over Nyon. If Italy either declines to attend as a result of the Russian note or imposes conditions on her attendance, Germany almost certainly will follow suit. Thus neither Italy nor Germany will be bound by any agreements reached at Nyon. Both charge Russia with torpedoing the conference.

Evasive Jap Answer Creates Unfavorable British Opinion

Strong Intimations Given Japan that Final Reply to Protest Against Airplane Attack on British Ambassador to China "Should Not Be Long Delayed"—Non-Committal Japanese Note Side-Steps British Charge.

SOVIET PRESS SOUNDS WARNING OF POSSIBLE "TERRIBLE CONSEQUENCES"

Moscow, Sept. 7.—The Soviet press warned today that Italian "Fascist aggressors" have begun a game in the Mediterranean "which may have terrible consequences."

Russia, which has protested directly to Italy against the sinking of Soviet freighters by "Italian" submarines was represented, however, as viewing these "aggressors" with "cool contempt."

It is awaiting action from the "Anti-piracy" conference of Mediterranean powers in Switzerland on Friday, the official Communist newspaper, Pravda, explained.

The Soviet Union, "conscious of its strength, can sneer with cool contempt at provocations of the Fascist adventurers, who are losing their heads," the paper said.

Other powers were criticized for failure to act.

AMERICANS IN CHINA DEMAND HOME SUPPORT

United States Chamber of Commerce in Shanghai Protests Roosevelt's Warning that Americans Remain in China at Their Own Risks.

Shanghai, Sept. 7.—The United States Chamber of Commerce of Shanghai today protested to State Secretary Hull, in Washington, against President Roosevelt's warning that American citizens remained in China at their own risk as seriously damaging to the prestige of the United States.

Speaking as the representative of the American business community, the Chamber of Commerce telegraphed the Secretary of State:

"The American Chamber of Commerce in Shanghai strongly deprecates any official statement which can be interpreted as indicating any withdrawal or abandonment of American business interests in China as seriously damaging to American prestige in China."

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CONVOY SYSTEM USED BY MERCHANT VESSELS

Gibraltar, Sept. 7.—The British destroyers Fury, Forester, Firedrake and Fortune, en route to Eastern Spain to reinforce British naval patrol units, arrived here today. It was learned that merchant vessels trading in the Mediterranean are being formed into groups, wherever possible, as a protection against submarine attacks. Yesterday four vessels passed together through the Straits towards the west.

RUSSIAN ACCUSATIONS AGGRAVATE DIFFICULTY

London, Sept. 7.—Great Britain and France moved today to save the Mediterranean "anti-piracy" conference from the stillbirth threatened by a sag in diplomatic relations between the Soviet and Italy.

Moscow's sharp protest to Rome, charging the Italian navy had sunk two Russian freighters, and Italy's brusque refusal to accept a severe blow to the prospects of the Conference.

Although it was now considered doubtful whether Italy would attend the meeting, called to stop torpedo terrorism against Mediterranean shipping, London and Paris immediately turned to consideration of ways to smooth over the Russo-Italian impasse.

The Friday conference of powers affected by a long list of submarine and other outrages against merchant ships was the latest Anglo-French scheme to keep the nearly fourteen-month-old Spanish war off the rest of Europe and the rest of Europe off Spain.

Great Britain met the tense diplomatic situation with a new incident on her hands—capture of the British steamship Burlington by a Spanish insurgent cruiser. The cruiser

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Prime Minister Refuses To Debate Veto Of Alberta Acts Any Further

Mackenzie King, in Letter to Premier Aberhart, Declares He Can Find Nothing on Which to Base Argument on Protests and "Challenges" Following Veto of Bank Acts.

Ottawa, Sept. 7.—Finding nothing upon which to base an argument in the protests and "challenges" Premier William Aberhart directed against the Federal Government following its disallowance of three Alberta statutes, Prime Minister Mackenzie King has replied briefly stating the Government's action will stand.

At the same time the Prime Minister has written Mr. Aberhart a reassuring letter in reply to the latter's criticism of the personnel and terms of reference of the Royal Commission on Economic Relations between the Provinces and the Dominion.

Both letters of the Prime Minister were made public here yesterday, although dispatched to Mr. Aberhart September 2. In a letter dated August 26, and following a telegram sent a few days earlier, Mr. Aberhart challenged the right of the Federal Government to disallow provincial legislation, and declared the

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MALNUTRITION STILL
WORLD-WIDE PROBLEMLeague of Nations Committee
Terms Malnutrition "Chal-
lenge to Constructive
Statesmanship and Inter-
national Co-operation"

London, Sept. 7. — Malnutrition, from which millions of people in all parts of the world are suffering, remains "an outstanding challenge to constructive statesmanship and international co-operation," according to a report on nutrition prepared by a League of Nations committee.

The report is the outcome of two years' work by an international group of agricultural and health experts, known as the mixed committee of the League of Nations on the relation of nutrition to health, agricultural and economic policy.

A tendency towards better nutrition exists in the countries with which the report deals, but poverty and ignorance remain formidable obstacles to progress, the report says. It includes Canada, the United States, Great Britain, most European countries, Australia and New Zealand.

Extension of the movement towards improved nutrition should benefit national agricultural systems, the committee contends. It would call for an increase production of "protective" foods, such as fruit, vegetables and dairy produce, and an increased output of various cereals for fodder.

Americans In China
Demand Home Support

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The situation "untenable." Americans, both missionaries and business men, expressed keen resentment at what they considered the withdrawal of United States protection. Some business leaders drafted strong telegrams to their home offices asking that further protests be lodged with the State Department and the President.

They pointed out that the position of the United States in the Far East was largely the result of their years of labor. They said they were unable to understand the government's attitude and, meeting in informal groups, determined to maintain a steadfast policy to retain the United States' hard-won stake in China.

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almost 250,000 men. Six of these divisions are completely armed and equipped. They are in the front line while the others are in reserve, almost blanketing the Shanghai delta except for the narrow river margins held by the Japanese.

The Shanghai delta is formed by the confluence of the Yangtze river and its tributaries, the Whangpoo. Twelve miles south of their point of confluence, Shanghai, a commercial city of 3,500,000 persons, lies on the Whangpoo. Japan's first effort was to land troops along the Yangtze on a twenty-mile stretch from Wusung to Linho and then advance southward on the city.

Japs Forced to Change Strategy

Chinese resistance thwarted that plan and the Japanese army and navy hurriedly shifted their strategy. Sunday they attacked from the Whangpoo and tried to drive the Chinese directly westward. Their new plan obviously was a pivoting movement about the northeastern point of the International Settlement.

Throughout Sunday and Monday fighting progressed along the Whangpoo and on the Yangtze front with the Chinese bringing the Japanese attack to a standstill.

The Japanese effort to break Chinese resistance by a blockade of 2,000 miles with a blockade proclaimed against all Chinese shipping from the borders of Manchoukuo on the north to Indo-China on the south.

At the mouth of the Yangtze the Japanese navy was reported to have sunk two Chinese vessels, allegedly destroying the channel markers in the lower river. The blockade was extended at noon Sunday to cover the entire coast.

Hong Kong, the British Crown Colony in the south, was specifically exempted but British naval authorities there were transferring today on attacks made by Japanese warships within sight of the base.

Hitler Stressed Solidarity Of Germany, Italy and Japan

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Italy, Japan and Germany are bound together in a community of interest, he said, for all three are committed to "a defence of world civilization against the forces which break out today in Spain; tomorrow in the Orient; perhaps the day after tomorrow somewhere else."

He added:

"The natural community of interests between national Socialist Germany and Fascist Italy has a good deal to do with itself more and more an element in defence of Europe against chaotic imbecility."

"Our (anti-Communist) agreement with Japan serves the same fundamental mission—to stand together in defence of world civilization."

His speech was a review of the achievements of the regime since he came to power and an outline of the new objective of the coming year.

Hitler admitted frankly that Germany's chief worry was her food supply. He said:

"A German territory without colonies is too small to guarantee, unhampered, certain and continuous nutrition to our people."

He declared it "intolerable" that the Third Reich should be dependent year after year on the accident of a good or bad harvest. This situation, he said, is such an unanswerable argument for the return of German colonies that "the attitude of the other powers toward this demand is simply incomprehensible."

Despite these difficulties, Hitler said the national Socialist regime has accomplished these things:

- 1—"The Versailles Treaty is dead."
- 2—"Germany is free."
- 3—"Our military power guarantees our freedom."

THIRD NORTH CHINA PROVINCE INVADIED

Peiping, Sept. 7.—Japanese dispatches from the conquered city of Kalgan, capital of Chahar Province and one hundred miles north of here, reported today that the Japanese army had invaded northeastern

Shansi Province, capturing the walled city of Tientsien.

The dispatches said the city, first station in Shansi Province on the through railroad from Peiping to Suifu Province, was invaded after an attack from the air. No other details were given.

If the reports were correct, Japan had carried her campaign into a third North China province, after completing occupation of portions of Hopeh and Chahar, east of Chansi. Shansi has long been the virtually private domain of the aged and highly individualistic war lord, General Yen Hsi-Shan.

Tientsien is midway from Kalgan to Tatum, an important railroad junction point and the concentration centre for Chinese troops from both north and south.

NEW PLANE BASE UNDER
CONSTRUCTION BY JAPS

Hong Kong, Sept. 7.—Reliable British sources reported today that Japanese destroyers had seized nearby Pratt Shoals and Lintin Island, on the western fringe of the waters surrounding this British stronghold.

These sources said the islands were being converted into seaplane bases and great quantities of gasoline and other war supplies were being landed.

PREDICT EARLY END OF
DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS

Rome, Sept. 7.—A new approach to Spanish non-intervention, and Italo-Russian diplomatic relations hung by a slender thread today as a result of the presentation and immediate rejection of a Russian demand for redress for the sinking of two vessels in guerrilla submarine warfare.

The Soviet Union blamed Italy for the attacks.

Various Italian Fascist mouthpieces asserted Italy had been about to participate in the new non-intervention talks, aimed at ridding the Mediterranean of pirate submarines, but now would reconsider the situation in the light of the Russian move.

The belief circulated in many Fascist quarters that the already weak relations of the two powers scarcely could withstand this new blow.

Relations have not been more than a formality between the Fascist and Communist states but it appeared that even the semblance of diplomatic intercourse might vanish as a result of the note handed to Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano by the Russian charge d'affaires in Rome.

Italian newspapers published attacks accusing Russia of "torpedoing" not only the "anti-piracy" conference, scheduled for Friday, but also European peace. The controlled Italian press declared the Russian note would force Italy to draw back on the threshold of the conference.

An editorial for this morning's editions of Il Popolo di Roma said "one thing appears clear, upon Russia falls the responsibility for this attempt to upset European peace."

A suggestion that Britain and France, authors of the "anti-piracy" conference plan, make the next move to save the conference was voiced by Il Messaggero.

"It is senseless to imagine that Italy could present herself before the Mediterranean conference in the role of the accused," Il Messaggero said.

A typewritten communique of the Press Ministry late yesterday afternoon carried the disclosure of the Russian protest and Italy's reply. The torpedoed Russian ships were not named but the Timiryazov and the Blagov were the most recent.

Italy, Japan and Germany are bound together in a community of interest, he said, for all three are committed to "a defence of world civilization against the forces which break out today in Spain; tomorrow in the Orient; perhaps the day after tomorrow somewhere else."

He added:

"The natural community of interests between national Socialist Germany and Fascist Italy has a good deal to do with itself more and more an element in defence of Europe against chaotic imbecility."

"Our (anti-Communist) agreement with Japan serves the same fundamental mission—to stand together in defence of world civilization."

His speech was a review of the achievements of the regime since he came to power and an outline of the new objective of the coming year.

Hitler admitted frankly that Germany's chief worry was her food supply. He said:

"A German territory without colonies is too small to guarantee, unhampered, certain and continuous nutrition to our people."

He declared it "intolerable" that the Third Reich should be dependent year after year on the accident of a good or bad harvest. This situation, he said, is such an unanswerable argument for the return of German colonies that "the attitude of the other powers toward this demand is simply incomprehensible."

Despite these difficulties, Hitler said the national Socialist regime has accomplished these things:

- 1—"The Versailles Treaty is dead."
- 2—"Germany is free."
- 3—"Our military power guarantees our freedom."

NEW PLANE BASE UNDER
CONSTRUCTION BY JAPS

Auto Accidents Injured Many Over Week-End

Five Magog People, Three of Whom Are Today Confined to Hospital, Hurt in Automobile Collision Near Waterloo Yesterday Afternoon—Local Girl Knocked Down by Car—Eustis Scene of Accident.

A score of persons were injured in highway accidents that occurred in the Eastern Townships over the holiday week-end. No fatalities, however, were reported.

The worst mishap occurred late yesterday afternoon on the Sherbrooke-Montreal highway three miles east of Waterloo when a car containing six Magog people collided with another automobile. Three of the Magog victims were confined to the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital today. They are Achille Carrière, twenty-three years old, who is suffering from a fractured jaw and a gash to the scalp; Antoine Carrière, his brother, sixteen years of age, who has a bad scalp wound, a fractured left wrist and a fractured left foot; and Joseph Labonte, twenty-one years old, who received a fractured lower jaw, broken teeth and severe bruises and cuts to the head.

These three injured, together with Omer St. Laurent and Maurice Lamontagne, also of Magog, were treated by Dr. M. D. Moysse and Dr. E. A. Blake. St. Laurent and Lamontagne were not removed to hospital. Six year old Bernadette Lacroix, daughter of Arthur Lacroix, 15 Arthur Lane, sustained a severe scalp injury and a badly lacerated ear when she was struck by an automobile on King street west, near Victoria street, at 2:25 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The car was driven by Alex G. Stalker, of Windsor Mills, who claims that the child ran into his path as he was proceeding at a slow speed along the street. The girl was taken to the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital.

Miss Maude Roberts, twenty-five years old, Capetown, suffered a severely lacerated left leg at 8:30 o'clock this morning when she was struck by a car driven by F. W. Snow, manager of the Consolidated Copper and Sulphur Mine at Eustis, when Mr. Snow was backing out of his garage.

Miss Roberts' leg was crushed between the wall of Mr. Snow's house and the car. She was taken by ambulance to the Sherbrooke Hospital. Injured when the car in which she was a passenger crashed into a stone-boat that was being hauled along King street west at 4:45 o'clock yesterday morning, a young girl from East Avenue was removed by ambulance to the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital suffering from a

fractured right thigh. Three other persons injured in the same mishap were taken to hospital, treated and allowed to return to their homes. The stone-boat was being hauled behind a truck driven by Alphonse Laroche, of Montreal. It was being taken to the Provincial Road Department at Lennoxville.

Granby was the scene of a serious mishap Saturday afternoon when the four year old son of Omer Gagne was run over by his father's automobile. The lad was standing behind his father's car when it started suddenly and knocked him down. He was severely cut about the head.

TEN PERSONS KILLED IN ONTARIO MISHAPS

Toronto, Sept. 7.—Ten persons met accidental deaths in Ontario during the long holiday week-end with highway mishaps taking the largest toll. Labor Day, despite crowded highways, was comparatively free of fatal crashes.

The week-end's most serious motor accident occurred early Sunday on the Capreol highway, nine miles north of Sudbury, when four persons died. Two trucks sideswiped and plunged into the ditch.

Victims were: Miss Cecile Quenel, sixteen; Fernand Lepage, twenty-two; David Chevrete, thirty-nine; and Dennis Pitre, nineteen, all of Capreol. Six other persons were injured and are in hospital at Sudbury.

When a light car struck the rear of a sedan near Goderich last night Mrs. William Doherty, twenty-five, Goderich, was killed. Her sister, Mary Lightly, suffered serious injuries. Harold Livermore, twenty-five, Clinton, driver of the light car, was hurt slightly.

Frank A. Pohjankukka, of Toronto, died at Lindsay from injuries suffered when struck by a truck and Joseph MacDonald sixty-nine Toronto, was killed when they were hit by a radial car at Hoge's Hollow, near Toronto. Roger Langevin, twelve, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Langevin, of Sudbury, died from injuries received when struck by a truck.

At St. Catharines, John Lawlor, forty, died from a fractured skull received in a thirty-foot fall while working at McKinnon Industries Ltd. plant, Ralph Armstrong, young son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Armstrong, of Hamilton, died at Hamilton after falling fifty feet from a ladder at the city asphalt plant.

428 VIOLENT DEATHS IN UNITED STATES

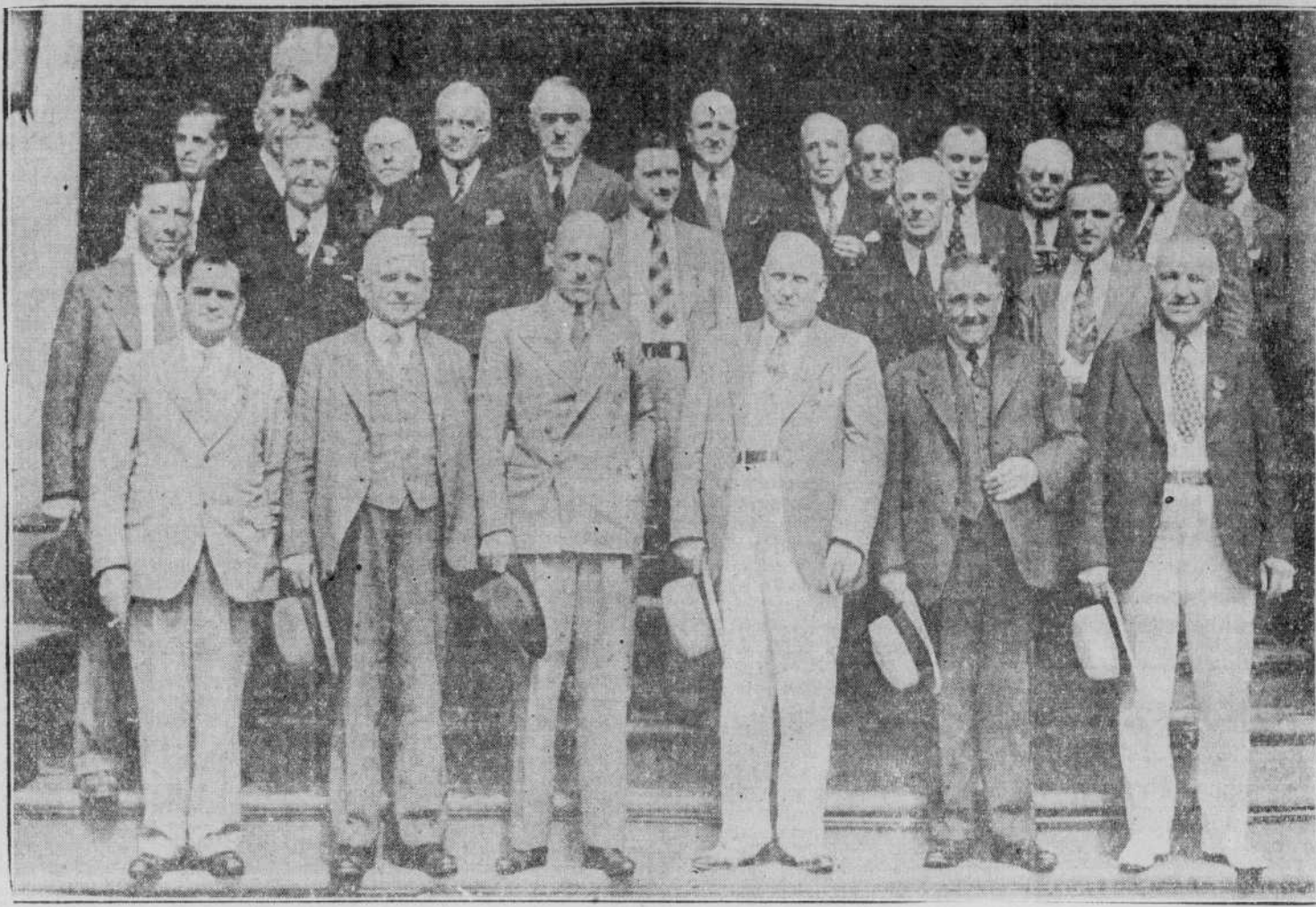
Chicago, Sept. 7.—At least 428 persons died violently in the United States during the Labor Day week-end.

As in previous years, motor traffic again was the chief cause of accidental deaths. Fair weather and the double holiday drew motorists to the highways by the tens of thousands.

A survey by the Associated Press showed 302 auto traffic deaths in forty-four states. There were 271 during the corresponding period last year.

Fifty-five drownings were reported, and seventy-one persons died in various other accidents. Airplane crashes caused six deaths.

BROMPTON LAKE VICTIM'S NAME STILL MYSTERY

Probability Exists, However, Body May Be that of Dr. Joseph Bellano, of Providence, R.I., Who Drowned in Brompton Lake 10 Years Ago.

Unable to definitely establish the identity of the man whose decomposed body was found in Brompton Lake last week, a coroner's jury under J. A. Allard decided over the week-end that the remains were those of "an unknown presumed to have met his death by drowning."

The probability still existed, however, that the body might be that of Dr. Joseph Bellano, of Providence, R.I., who drowned in Brompton Lake in August, 1927, while on a fishing excursion with two companions.

Subpoenae were forwarded to the bailiff at Valcourt, Que., Saturday to be served upon Henri Cousineau and Jack Allard, the two men who were with Dr. Bellano when he met his tragic death ten years ago, but Dr. Allard was advised that they could not be located.

Information received from Dr. Bellano's relatives in Providence, tended to discount the theory that the body might be that of the American dentist, the coroner stated today. The remains will not be interred until Wednesday, in the event that someone appears to attempt identification. Burial will take place in the St. Denis de Brompton Cemetery.

NORMALCY HAS RETURNED TO CIVIC CIRCLE

City Fathers, Meeting this Evening for First Night Session Since Last June, Will Probably Discuss Keeping Electrical Decorations for Yuletide Season.

The five-week festivities are over and normalcy is returning to municipal circles.

Tonight the City Fathers will hold their first evening session since last June to discuss routine matters and ratify plans made during the past few months.

The proposal to keep Sherbrooke's elaborate electrical decorations until the end of the present month and during the Christmas season is also expected to be discussed at tonight's meeting. Reliable sources state that the aldermen, as well as Mayor Emile Rioux, are in favor of keeping the electrical installation up until December.

At the end of September, the power would be shut off, to be turned on again when the Christmas season approaches. The glow of the multi-colored lights against the background of snow-covered streets and buildings would be a pretty sight, and it is confidently felt, a great attraction for Yuletide tourist trade.

The matter has already been privately discussed between Mayor Rioux and the aldermen, and it is very probable that it will be brought up at tonight's public meeting.

The large amount of construction work that has been carried on during the summer months will necessitate the installation of sewer systems in various sections of the city, and municipal engineers are at present working upon tentative plans that would entail an expenditure of about \$100,000.

The city has expanded particularly on Cummings street in the West Ward and 7th Avenue in the East Ward. Many private dwellings have gone up in these two sections and the installation of sewerage systems has become a necessity.

Development of the Terrill Brook project in the East Ward may also go ahead in the near future.

At present a trunk conduit leads from St. Henri street to Park avenue, and a smaller sewerage pipe from Park to St. Francis River, with the result that there is often an overflow in Terrill Brook. Residents in that district have complained of this on numerous occasions and are anxious that the municipal officials complete the project that was first considered last summer.

Eye For Eye Justice.

An old paradox of "justice" bobbed up again when Boston police surgeons labored to save a wounded man's life so that he could be placed in jeopardy later in court as an accused slayer.

The situation poses the ancient puzzle of who has the right to kill a man, and whether the law is overstepping Biblical injunction when it executes a duly tried and convicted prisoner.

Offhand, it is too complex a problem to be solved by a Solomon's wave of the hand. The answer, perhaps, can come only from the mature judgment of perfected civilization. But that answer deserves more immediate thought than it is getting. For even at this early stage of man's progress, the policy of an eye for an eye has little to recommend it except that it's just the easiest way out.

Mexican Horse Trading.

One danger in dishing out a new deal at home is that a good neighbor may come calling for his borrowed pots and pans before the feast is over. At least that is the impression given by Mexico's threatened retaliation after Boulder dam blocked water hitherto received by Mexico.

Mexican officials say that soon they will be in position to cut off two lower tributaries of the Rio Grande river, thus drying up the Texas water supply for one hundred miles in the region southeast of Brownsville.

So far, Mexico hasn't definitely decided to take this action. It is being held back as a bargaining point, somewhat after the David Harum barter fashion. It's probable that Mexico would withdraw the threat in exchange for some of the Colorado river water withheld by Boulder dam.

Texas, for one, could hardly appreciate one hundred miles of dry border. It seems that Mexico has whittled Uncle Sam down to some pretty sharp horse trading.

Mental Measurements Of College Freshmen.

So stealthily is the burden of civilization shifted from the aging generation onto the backs of its children that the change rarely is perceptible. Fortunately, there are a few distinct mileposts along the road to the future, and one of them—the opening of colleges and universities for fall terms—is directly at hand for close observation.

If every adult properly fulfilled his duty to posterity, he would interest himself in the processes by which thousands of high school graduates are permitted to proceed with higher courses of training for service as leaders in the arts, professions, trades and sciences.

Along with the thrilling experience of actually seeing the wheel of time and circumstance start a new revolution, the observer would get an eyeful of just how much progress we are not making in teaching boys and girls how to live and make a living.

There is, for instance, the report of an eastern college after its study of about five hundred applications for admission. The 1937 model male freshman, the report says, will be eighteen years and six months old, five feet ten inches tall, and will weigh about 152 pounds.

These figures, showing an increase in physical proportions over freshmen of previous years, will be great news for the athletic coaching staff. But their significance for the rest of the faculty, for the student himself, and for civilization in general is negligible.

Beyond listing the physical measurements and seeing that high school grades meet certain standards, the registrar's figures usually leave the freshman an unknown quantity as far as his affinity for building bridges, researching in botany or mastering constitutional law is concerned.

And the likelihood is that he will remain an unknown quantity until he muddles through one or more years of his course, or until he blunders onto his "chosen" field or is led to it by the rare teacher who regards his job as somewhat more than a daily fifty-minute lecture to each class.

The college performs a great service in spreading its graining table of intellectual fare before the freshman. And the eighteen-year-old contributes his part, in most cases, with ambition and determination to make good at something or other.

Failure to pin down that "something or other"

is the gap on the production line in mass education. The job is only half done when the physician's staff weighs and measures the newcomer and the college prexy welcomes him at the orientation assembly.

The wheel of progress will turn ever more swiftly and more efficiently when institutions of higher education seriously attempt to learn what's above a prospective freshman's neck as well as what's below it.

Fewer Births In Canada.

Canada's Annual Report of Vital Statistics for 1936 shows another decline in the Canadian birth rate, a decline similar to that shown by the official reports of the governments of western Europe, the United States and the British Dominions.

There was a slight increase in deaths but only that which would be explained by a slight increase in population. The rate was the same. Live births numbered 219,894 in 1936, as compared with 221,431 in 1935, and the rate was 20.0 per thousand as against 20.3. The difference between 20.0 and 20.3 is small, but if the old rate had been maintained there would be three thousand more Canadians, enough to make a respectable sized town. Moreover, the 1935 rate before 1936 was the record low.

ANOTHER QUESTION

(Christian Science Monitor)
To answer the question of a New Jersey farm girl, Fred W. Now if the young lady wishes to do Mr. Jackson a good turn perhaps she will find out, by observing her schoolmates, whether in braiding little girls' pig tails a majority of mothers begin by laying the left strand over the right or the right over the left. That should indicate something or other.

PROVINCIAL RIGHTS IN '96

(Woodstock Sentinel-Review)
In discussion of the Alberta banking legislation, the assertion was made in these columns a few days ago that it is undoubtedly within the powers of the Dominion government to disallow provincial enactments detrimental to the interests of the country in general or an encroachment on federal jurisdiction. Mention was made of Manitoba school law, and a friend in Toronto has written to point out that there was no disallowance in that case, but an attempt to pass the right to override the Manitoba legislation was expressly declared by the Imperial Privy Council to be within the power of the Dominion authorities. It is doubtful if the Conservative government of the day was grateful for the judgment, which reversed that of the Supreme Court of Canada. However, it presented the bill to the House of Commons, in which it had, of course, a majority. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, upholding the doctrine of Provincial rights, notwithstanding the separate schools issue involved, moved the "six months' hold" and sanctioned, if he did not direct, the obstruction which prevented adoption of the measure before the legal life of Parliament expired.

But Sir Wilfrid, as Sir John Wilson wrote years afterward, never suggested that he would not apply federal pressure if the province should refuse adequate concessions to the Roman Catholic minority, and he never admitted that there was not a constitutional right of federal intervention. His idea was that in the situation of 1896 compulsion was impracticable and that greater concessions could be obtained for the minority in Manitoba by compromise and conciliation than by any legislation which must be imposed upon the province by federal authority. A remarkable feature of the controversy, as one looks back, is that the party ranged behind the Remedial Bill commanding restoration of separate schools in Manitoba was led by the statesman (Tupper) who had abolished separate schools in Nova Scotia while the leader of the forces opposed to the coercion of Manitoba was the statesman who nine years later guaranteed separate schools in the new provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan.

DROVE THEM WITH A GUN.

(Montreal Star)
President Roosevelt has always led the practical professionals in his party with a drawn revolver in his hand. They have never wanted to follow him, but political profit—not to say political salvation—whipped them into line. When Roosevelt carried the country in 1902, the Democrats had been out of office since 1900—and were very discouraged and hungry. They were in favor of almost anybody who could put them next the food-trough.

The entire nation was in a panic over the Depression, and the President's emergency measures looked good to practically anybody. The professionals probably did not understand them but they gathered votes and that was the great desideratum. 1934 proved it. Before 1936, quite a few Bourbon Democrats had kicked over the traces, however. This was not Democracy as they knew it. But the people soon kicked them back again. Roosevelt was far more popular at the polls than he was in Congress.

But at no time was the Democratic party as represented in Congress content with Rooseveltism.

AT A LONG DISTANCE

(Windsor Star)
Major Douglas, viewing Alberta Social Credit efforts from far off London, England, says Prime Minister King has made a great mistake in disallowing Mr. Aberhart's banking legislation. Major Douglas had better demonstrate the ability to make Social Credit workable in Alberta, before handing out advice to the Federal authorities on how to conduct Canada's affairs.

BRITAIN'S SOCIAL SERVICES

(St. Thomas Times-Journal)
Canada and the United States have been exploring the field of social services during the past few years. Both have been lacking in these respects, partly because it has not been until comparatively recent times that such a period of depression set in as to make the want of them felt, and partly because of a spirit of independence which causes the people of the Western world to look askance at anything that savors of state patrimony. It was that need which moved the then Premier R. B. Bennett to bring in a comprehensive programme of social legislation, but it suffered severely at the hands of the Supreme Court, which found that a good deal of the services were obligations of the provincial authorities. Nevertheless, the necessity for that legislation continues. For example, the Ontario Government is instituting an inquiry into wages and conditions in the textile industry. Had Mr. Bennett's proposals been allowed, the probability is that strikes at Peterborough, Cornwall, Brockville and other places might have been avoided, for one of his measures dealt with these very things. CANADIAN FOLKLORE

(La Presse, Montreal)

For several years several friends of Canadian folklore have been busy collecting the songs and tales that trace to a large extent the course of life of our ancestors.

The material is not lacking. It is a matter of choosing it and adapting it according to needs and circumstances. Who will take the initiative? When above all, will it inspire our young people and workers to cultivate the songs and the dances once in vogue in Canada?

Popular recreation cannot take a more pleasant form, because it is accessible to the great mass of people, and it still strengthens the ties which bind the present generations with those of the past.

Let us put the precious treasure of our folklore to use; it is waiting only for people with initiative and goodwill.

CRITICAL OF MONTREAL POLICE FORCE

(Le Canada, Montreal)

The municipal detective force persists in carrying on its investigations in the way that it did fifteen and even twenty years ago. True, in certain cases it can still succeed, but in the greater part, when it is dealing with premeditated and well-worked-out crimes, its work is destined to failure from the beginning. . . . There should be in Montreal, as in nearly all the great cities of the world, a technical school of criminal investigation where the detectives would learn the elements of law, of scientific inquiry, and of the methods used by wrong-doers. . . . One thing certain is that the establishment of such a school would not cost too much money and could do no harm. Frankly, our detective force sometimes is an object for pity.

SANITARY HOUSING

(La Patrie, Montreal)

The problem of sanitary housing is one which has attracted public attention in practically all countries since the beginning of the depression in 1929. It is particularly acute in the United States as no less than one-third of the American population is said to have been affected by it.

The United States Government, up till now, has been primarily interested in regulating instead of stimulating construction. The majority of projects aiming to solve this pressing problem, built by philanthropists, labor syndicates and co-operatives, have failed because of failures because the rents charged—even at monthly rates of \$6 per room—proved to still be too high for the purpose aimed at.

Europe seems to have progressed far more than the United States in this important domain. England has placed at the disposal of its workers homes with rental of from \$2 to \$4 per room. In Germany, 2,000,000 families have found homes where the average rental does not exceed \$4 per room per month. Similar conditions exist in France and in other important European countries.

Main reason for all this, apparently, is that construction costs far less in Europe than in North America.

TOURIST REVENUE

(Le Nouvelliste, Three Rivers)

Tourist is an indication of prosperity on the part of those who travel, and at the same time it contributes to ours. In its last monthly letter, the Canadian Bank of Commerce, making a review of the tourist season and its results at the present time, estimates a noticeable progress since last year.

The tourist season will last another month in Canada, it says, but already it shows that the expenditures of tourists in the Dominion will surpass those of last year. First figures indicate a fifteen per cent. increase in the Dominion, figures in the West and Ontario probably surpassing this average, while in Que-

(Le Progrès du Golfe, Rimouski)

Pursuing its campaign of colonization, the Quebec Government is undertaking important projects in the County of Rimouski. Through the efforts of its M.L.A., Alfred Dube, a thirty-mile road through the forest is to unite Rimouski to the township of Chatham, Laroche and others, some hundreds of families will be able to establish their children.

This is the first time that such a project has been put into practice there. Some years ago, in that part of the country, a bridge was built, at a cost of several thousand dollars, but no road to approach it was made, nor any other mode of approach, leaving the construction a monument to a civilization past, which will not recur, we hope, the age of bridges without roads and roads without bridges.

Thousands of dollars have been spent, we might say, to unite Rimouski to the southern part of its county.

Talk to little daughter about posture, keeping her clothes neat, clean and pressed, wearing fresh stockings each morning, taking a daily bath, scrubbing her elbows with a brush and using cream on her

face after skiing, skating or winter hiking party.

Lipstick is most attractive when smoothed on dry lips, then blotted with cleansing tissue. The blotting sets the color and eliminates a caked, messy look. Mascara and eyeshadow are not in order. These and other types of eye makeup are not for young girls.

NOW BREAD CRUSTS TURN INTO DELECTABLE COOKIES WITH MAGICAL SPEED

The modern youngster won't believe you if you say that crusts make the hair curl. But the modern mother gets rid of heads of bread just the same. She rolls them into crumbs, combines them with sweetened condensed milk, and in less than 15 minutes, has a part of such delectable cookies that the children gobble them up as fast as they can get them. Crusts, or any other dry bread, for that matter, should be crushed with a rolling pin or put through a food grinder to make crumbs, and kept in a covered jar until needed.

Magic Chocolate Crumb Cookies

2 squares unsweetened chocolate
1½ cup (1 can) sweetened condensed milk
1 cup dry bread crumbs
Few grains salt
¼ cup walnut or pecan nut meats
24 walnut or pecan halves (optional)
Melt chocolate in top of double boiler.
Add sweetened condensed milk and stir over boiling water 5 minutes or until mixture thickens. Add toasted bread crumbs, salt and nut meats which have been chopped. Blend thoroughly. Drop by spoonfuls on buttered baking sheet. Press half a nut meat into each cookie if desired. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 10 minutes, or until brown. Remove from pan at once. Makes about 24.

Nut Strudels

1 cup nut meats
1½ cups (1 can) sweetened condensed milk
1 cup dry bread crumbs
¼ teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon cinnamon
Pie crust dough
Force nut meats through food chopper. Blend with sweetened condensed milk, bread crumbs, salt and cinnamon. Roll crust out in oblong sheet as thin as possible. Spread with prepared mixture. Roll up as for jelly roll. Cut in half inch slices and place on buttered baking sheet. Brush top with sweetened condensed milk. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 10 minutes or until brown. Makes about 18.

When buying grapefruit, pick one that feels heavy for its size—the weight usually indicates juiciness. See that skin is thin, fine-grained and clear. Skin spots often indicate decay or improper refrigeration.

ESTIMATES WORLD POPULATION AT 2,000,000,000

Nottingham, Eng. Sept. 7.—The number people on this earth had quadrupled since the beginning of the eighteenth century, Professor C. B. Fawcett said in an address to the British Association for the Advancement of Science. Prof. Fawcett is president of the geography section.

In 1700, the population of the world probably did not number 500,000,000, he said. But the present population is 2,000,000,000.

The European peoples have multiplied at least sixfold in the last 235 years, and there is no reason to believe that the Chinese and the people of India have at least trebled their numbers in the same period.

GREAT SUCCESS MEETING FIGHT AGAINST NOISE

Modern Developments Have Aggravated Question of Needless Noise However, British Association for Advancement of Science Told.

Nottingham, England, Sept. 7.—Considerable success has been achieved in the war against unnecessary noise, but much remains to be done, declared Prof. G. W. C. Kaye in his presidential address to the Mathematical and Physical Sciences section of the British Association for the Advancement of Science in session here.

Simultaneously with the telephone, radio and talking picture developments in applied acoustics have gradually developed a public consciousness of the insidious growth of the social evil of needless noise, which he called a pernicious by-product attributable in great part to the increasing mechanization of civilization.

"With this growing realization the nation is beginning to demand and to receive protection against the nuisance of outrageous noise, whether generated by public or private bodies," he said.

On the question of what constitutes a "noise" it was difficult to generalize. Prof. Kaye remarked the countryside votes the noises of the city distributing to a high degree, but the townsman does not necessarily find a lullaby in the noises peculiar to the countryside.

THYROID TESTS INVOLVE WHALE OF HUDSON BAY

Land and Sea Around Churchill Prove Happy Hunting Ground for Scientific Parties Studying Wild Life.

Churchill, Man., Sept. 7.—A robin that fishes is intriguing to scientists studying bird and insect life in this district. They claim it is the first time on record that a robin has been found muscling in on waterfowl. However, in this north country food isn't always plentiful and the birds can be too ethical.

Water drips from Churchill's reservoir, forming a pool which runs into a nearby creek. Small fish from the creek work their way up to the pool where the robin stands by the hour at the edge of the water and from time to time grabs with its bill the minnows that venture too close to it.

Churchill has proven an interesting rendez-vous for scientists this summer. The most important party is that headed by George F. Cline, famous surgeon of Cleveland, Ohio, who has with him Dr. D. P. Quiring of Western Reserve University and Arthur G. Fuller, manager of the Cleveland Museum of Natural History. Their study is being made in connection with a thyroid gland investigation. They have examined great numbers of fish and land animals including six white whales. Many specimens have been sent to Cleveland.

"It is too early to arrive at any definite conclusions in our comparisons of animals living in cold climates and the same species we have previously examined living in warm climates," Dr. Cline stated. "But the tests here have been highly satisfactory."

Mr. Cline and his party went to Chesterfield Inlet on the Steamer Nasopack and plan to remain in the area until late in the season. While there, they hope to perform metabolism tests on native Eskimos.

Scientists studying insect life have included R. H. Daggy and D. G. Denning of the division of entomology, University Farm, Miss. W. J. D. Bagkov, an entomologist from department of agriculture, Ottawa and Frank Farley, Camrose, Alta. N. Rollin, an ornithologist from England, was also here.

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

TNT BIDDING REACHES SLAM
Opens With No Trump, Even Though He Has Two Suits, and Result is the Same as One-Over-One

By Wm. E. McKenney, Secretary, American Bridge League.

This is the last of a series of six articles explaining the TNT system of bidding, used in the New England states and originated by Edgar F. Tierney, of Springfield, Mass.

Users of the one over one system of bidding may be sometimes shocked when they hear bridge players, using the TNT system, open the bidding with one no trump while holding good two suits. However, users of the Tierney system claim that this proves no drawback whatever in reaching the correct final contract, even though they delay showing their bidding suits until the second or third round of bidding.

Of course, "one-over-one" users would open the South hand with one heart, and North's response

would not be a forcing takeout, as he does not hold a good enough fit. However, in the TNT system the jump bid is used to show honor strength, in order that the opening bidder, who remains captain of the hand, may measure the combined strength and thus be guided in his future bidding. After South had shown his second biddable suit, reaching the small slam is an easy matter.

In the one-over-one as used by most players the same final contract would be reached. The bidding would not start so high nor jump so quickly.

In the play seven was made, as South was able to ruff out two club losers and discard two on the high cards in the North hand before taking the trump finesse and picking up the doubleton king in the East hand.

HARD ON DOCTORS

Birmingham, England, Sept. 7.—Modern life—with sunless days and ill-ventilated amusement spots at night—are making doctors' tasks difficult, said Sir Arthur Macnalty, ministry of health's chief medical officer.
