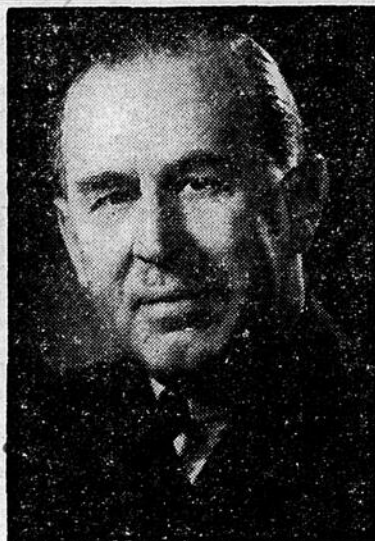
Westmount Council To Hold Inaugural Meeting Monday



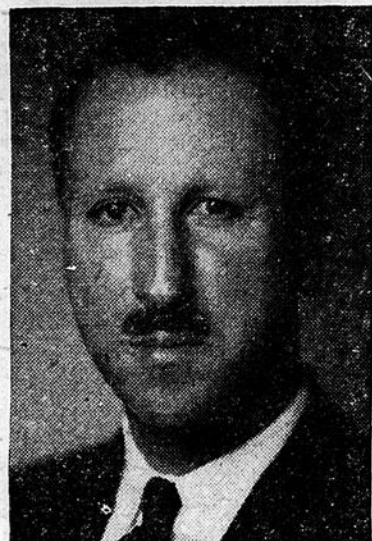
Mayor elect Roy L. Campbell who is a graduate of the University of Toronto, has resided in Westmount for twenty-three years and has served as chairman of the council of the Chartered Institute of Secretaries of Quebec. A member of the city council for the past four years he was commissioner of roads in the city in the previous council. He is the secretary of the Canadian International Paper Co.



A resident of Westmount for the past 30 years, Reginald H. Dean, retired from the council this year. He has served as Commissioner of Police and Fire on the Westmount City Council for the past four years. Mr. Dean saw military service in both wars and at the outbreak of World War II re-enlisted with the Grenadier Guards and retired with rank of Lieutenant-Colonel.



Real Panet Raymond, present deputy chairman of the Civil Defence Committee, is commissioner of parks and recreation on the city council. He is a special representative with the Canadian Industries Ltd. Mr. Raymond has been a resident of Westmount for the past 24 years and holds a degree of Bachelor of Arts from Laval University. He has served on several committees of the Westmount Municipal Association.



John S. B. Pemberton, another re-elected council member, is the present commissioner of finance. A resident of Westmount for 14 years, he holds the degree of Bachelor of Arts from McGill University. Mr. Pemberton is president and director of Niagara Lower Arch Bridge Company and Director of Sheraton Hotels Ltd. He has been with the Sun Life Assurance Company for 25 years and is now associate treasurer of the Company.

Two New Members Elected

The Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Westmount will be officially sworn into office Monday evening at the Inaugural Session of the City Council in the City Hall. The Inaugural meeting which will also be in the form of a Reception, will commence at 8.30 p.m.

Roy L. Campbell, a resident of the city of Westmount for 23 years and a former president of the Westmount Municipal Association, was elected Mayor of the City by acclamation Monday. He replaces J. S. Cameron who resigned the chief magistrate post.

Two New Members

Only two new members joined the new municipal slate this week. They are Allan Turner Bone and James A. DeLalanne, the retired director of the Westmount Civil Defence Committee.

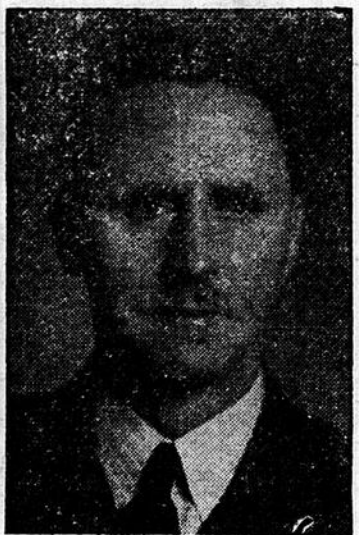
Re-elected, also by acclamation, were Henry Lloyd Blachford, Real Panet-Raymond and John S. B. Pemberton. Denny A. Hanson was elected as library trustee.

Mayor Campbell said that he welcomed this opportunity to serve the residents of Westmount and hoped that the administration he served would be as successful as the one which preceded him.

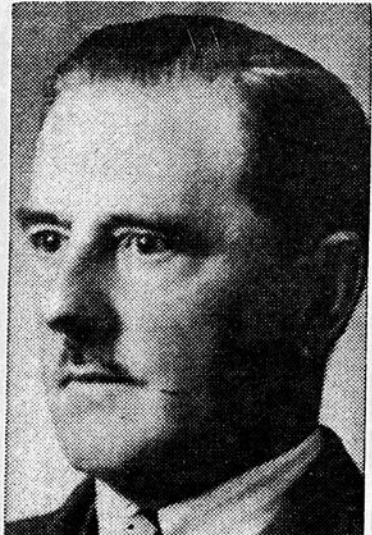
Ald. Lloyd Blachford has been commissioner of electric light health and public welfare in Westmount since his election to city council. A resident of Westmount for the past 31 years, he holds a B.Sc. Degree in Chemical Engineering at McGill University. Mr. Blachford served on the executive of the Westmount Municipal Association as chairman of Education and Library Committee.



A new member of the council, Allan Turner Bone, is a graduate engineer from McGill. He is president of the J. L. E. Price & Co. Ltd., and has carried out many large peacetime and wartime contracts for a number of Canadian organizations. He was also on the Board of Assessors of the City of Westmount during the years 1941 to 1945. Mr. Bone has been a resident of Westmount for twenty five years.



Alderman James DeLalanne, M.C., is a retired brigadier who has served in the forces in both world wars. He is a McGill graduate and holds, in addition to his MC and OBE the Order of the White Lion from the Czechoslovak Republic. Brig. DeLalanne is a member of the Westmount Municipal Association and a former chairman of the Westmount Board of School Commissioners.



Mayor J. S. Cameron has resided in Westmount for the past 24 years and has served as Mayor of Westmount from 1949 to 1953. Mayor Cameron served as Alderman in Westmount from 1947 to 1949. He is vice-president of Manufacture for the Northern Electric Company in Montreal. Mayor Cameron received his B.Sc. and P. Eng. from Pictou Academy in Pictou, N.S. and his M.E.I.C. and M.I.E.E. from McGill University.

Kathleen Jenkins Issues Annual Library Report

An increased interest in literary material on Canada and books written by Canadians was prominent among Westmounters during 1952, Westmount Public Librarian, Miss Kathleen Jenkins, noted in her annual report.

The report pointed out that the library had just over 50,000 volumes at the end of 1952 and that the year's circulation showed an increase of 23,843, standing at 194,431.

Membership stood at 6,895 at the year's end with the reference

and reading room used by nearly 34,000 people during the year.

Readers sought information on many varied subjects, Miss Jenkins reported, including the Coronation ceremonies, the Colombo Plan, the family tree of the Duke of Edinburgh, the Order of the Garter and the race question in South Africa.

Among the Canadian Books that were especially popular Miss Jenkins named "Colony to Nation" and "Canada, Nation and Neighbor" by A. R. M. Lower, "Incred-

ible Canadian, Mackenzie King" by Bruce Hutchison and Farley Mowat's "People of the Deer."

Biographies were popular in 1952 with "A Man Called Peter," "A Many-Splendoured Thing," "King George V," "The Youthful Queen Victoria," "Rumour and Reflection" and "Arrow in the Blue."

The library staff provided material "on the value of truth telling, on Communism and religion, and on yodelling, and gave a receipt for pot-pourri," Miss Jenkins reported.

"We have been greatly pleased at the number of parents who have visited the library, sharing with their children the fun of choosing their reading," she noted.

On the problem of guiding children into more mature reading, Miss Jenkins reported: "When Constance Woodham Smith writes of Florence Nightingale in The Lonely Crusader, the girls will read her and when true adventure is presented as in The Kon-tiki Expedition and the Great Escape, the

National Motor Shows

Exhibitions to Be Held in Montreal and Toronto in February

The National Motor Shows, missing in Canada since 1939, will be revived next month with a pair of exhibitions in Montreal and Toronto. The Toronto show will run between Feb. 13 and 21 and the Montreal exhibition, at the Show-Mart, between Friday, Feb. 27, and Sunday, March 8.

The exhibition will reflect the tremendous growth of the motoring public in the 14 years since the show was held in Toronto. Passenger car registrations in Canada today are estimated by the Canadian Automobile Chamber of Commerce at 2,330,000, or an increase of almost 100 per cent over the 1939 figures.

The two exhibitions will feature displays of 1953 passenger cars, and the Toronto

showing will also exhibit commercial vehicles.

It's always good to welcome an old friend back—and that's what the National Motor Shows are. They've been away too long. Let's hope they become an annual event now.

An Excellent Report

Royal of Canada's Total Assets Set New High in Last Year

Highest total assets in the history of any Canadian bank were reported for the Royal Bank of Canada by T. H. Atkinson, general manager, in his annual report this week.

The assets of \$2,691,456,873 are an increase of \$175,811,665 over last year's figures, the previous record.

Profits for the year increased by \$1,762,382 over the previous year after full provision for all debts regarded as doubtful of collection.

The position of the Royal Bank in foreign countries is now less important than when it first established abroad. However, the overseas chain is still an important complement to the domestic bank, Mr. Atkinson said.

It is indeed gratifying that a Canadian bank is in such a secure position in the insecure and unsettled world of today. It is such institutions as the Royal Bank of Canada that make this country the most financially stable in the world.

This Is The True Light

It is St. John who quotes our Lord's words, "I am the light of the world," and then goes on in his Epistle to say, "God is light." But we think of light as being for a purpose, and the Church in its ancient system of Sunday lessons presents us with various points on which our Lord sheds His Light.

The Gospel for last Sunday, for example, tells the story of our Lord's childhood, following up the whole story of the Incarnation. The story of Christmas in itself is a commentary on childhood. Except among the Hebrews, children as such were of little account in the ancient world; but the fact that God sent His own Son into the world as a little child, transformed the estimation of children.

The change of attitude came slowly but surely, till now there is no doubt in our minds that children are our most precious possession. But that fact does not tell us the whole truth about them. We can ruin our heritage of children as we can ruin anything else by misuse.

So the Gospel for the first Sunday after Epiphany reminds us of three facts. The first is that God has a claim on the child. So Mary and Joseph brought the Child Jesus to Jerusalem when He was twelve years old to complete His membership in the Jewish Church and to make Him a Son of the Law. No loyal Jew would do otherwise, and Jesus accepted and sanctified the custom.

In the second place the Child was old enough, and well trained enough, to realize the importance of the occasion. It was no haphazard affair. Years of home life and school training and Synagogue worship had prepared Him for the event. He was stirred and He wanted to know more. So when His mother set out on the homeward way with Joseph, Jesus remained behind to ask questions of those who were supposed to be better able to answer than the village schoolmaster or the local rabbi. He was not trying to puzzle the professors, but to learn from them; and it was definitely His Father's business that He was

concerned in. We are reminded that there can be a very deep sense of the Presence of God in childhood.

In the third place, when Mary and Joseph found Him, there was not the slightest attempt to trade on this spiritual experience and try to lengthen it out. He went back to Nazareth with them and "He was subject to them." There is something that transcends extraordinary spiritual experience, and that is the ordinary spiritual experience of everyday life in the home. And the natural response to that life of obedience followed: "Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favour with God and men."

Tenants Advised To Apply For Rent Reductions

Clarence Rosenhek, 4800 Wilson avenue, who is legal adviser for the Montreal Tenants' Association has announced that although tenants have a right to apply for a reduction of rent, very few of them realize this.

Mr. Rosenhek pointed out that landlords will press for further rent increases during the next three months.

"Because rents are now at a record high, further hikes should be resisted. The landlord can't compel a tenant to pay more rent. All he can do is force that tenant to apply to the rentals administrator for an extension of a lease which will be granted automatically.

"However, if the tenant is obliged to apply for prolongation of lease then he should, as he has the right, to ask for a rent reduction. Tenants are entitled to ask for rent reductions where the premises have deteriorated or services or facilities have been curtailed."

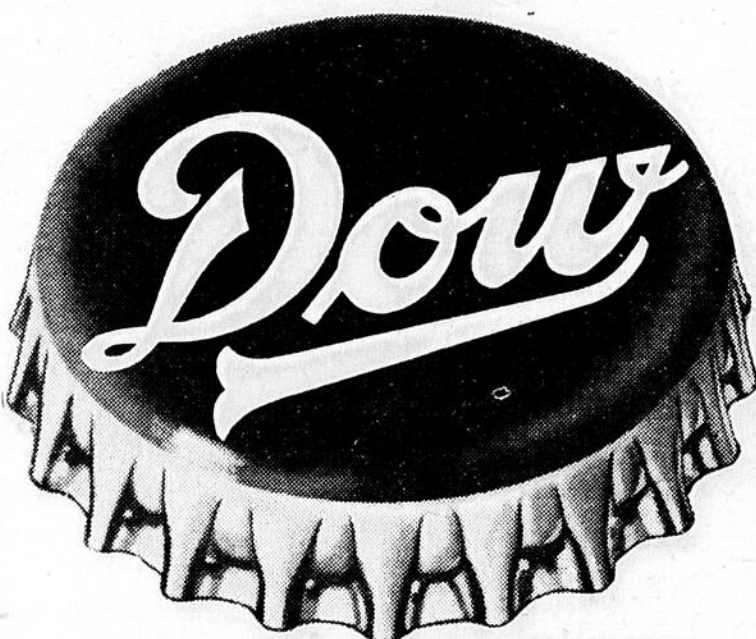

This week end will see double headers on Saturday and Sunday afternoons in this league.



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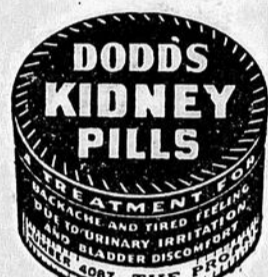


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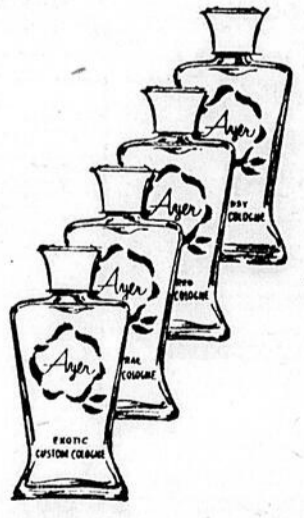
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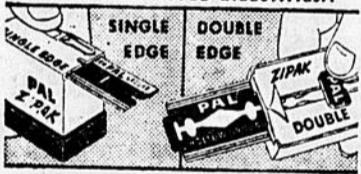
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
