## Kerrigan plans rally; Drury, Hushley tap doors

Ringing bells, knocking on doors and a proposed mass rally in Westmount Park is all part and parcel of an enlivening campaign seeping into staid the quiet St. Antoine-Westmount riding to be taken advantage of by four enthusiastic candidates as election day draws near.

As nomination day approaches the tempo of activities will increase and is expected to be in full bloom by 2 p.m. next Monday the deadline for nominations when all candidates will be on their own.

### DRUMS BEAT, ECHO REVERBERATES

Supporters of Progressive-Conservative candidate Peter Kerrigan have been thumping their drums to the echo which will rise to a crescendo at the proposed outdoor political rally to be held next Thursday in Westmount Park when at least 5,000 people are expected to attend. Defence Minister Harkness will be on hand to support the PC candidate.

On that date the honorable minister and the candidate will parade in an open car to the park accompanied by dancing majorettes and bands.

### 'BUD' SPREADING HIS APPEAL

Liberal candidate C. M. (Bud) Drury, through his followers, has been contacting his supporters and spreading his appeal for votes through personal contact with prospective voters. Hundreds of homes have been visited.

Earlier in the week the Liberal contender held informal meetings and had some heart-to-heart talks with many voters in the area. He addressed a gathering at the Catholic Men's Hostel on St. Antoine street as

## Criminal negligence charge follows crash; two injured

A resident of North Bay, charged with criminal negligence in driving a car on the streets of Westmount after he became involved in an accident, was released on \$200 cash bail pending the recovery of two persons seriously injured in the car crash.

According to Westmount police, the man being held was charged with criminal negligence in operating an automobile following the

crash.

All names were withheld at the request of the police.

The accident occurred at 10 p.m. last Monday when the speeding car collided with another at the corner of Prince Albert and Western avenues.

Two passengers, both residents of Westmount, were in the vehicle which was struck. Both were seriously injured and are now in hospital.

The speeding car, which struck the second one, careened off at an angle, knocking down a street sign at the corner and tearing up the lawn on the opposite side before it came to a halt. In doing so it struck another parked car and damaged it.

In Municipal Court, the accused was released on bail pending the recovery of the injured persons, trial being postponed for a month.

The group of jazz instrumenta-  
lists comprising chiefly, alto sax,  
guitar, bass violins and cello,  
presents four compositions lead-  
ing off with 'Abstractions' which  
is just about that, its first half  
sounding like a disorganized jazz  
band rehearsal, dominated by  
Ornette Coleman on sax, warm-  
ing up to the final section in  
something more of a definitive  
pattern.

Jim Hall's 'Piece For Guitar  
and Strings' is tuneful and melo-  
dic with a background beat more  
in the modern sophisticated jazz  
style we are accustomed to.

This mood follows through in  
Gunter Schuller's three 'Variants  
On A Theme Of John Lewis  
(Django)' with some excellent  
parts on guitar and by the string  
quartet. Side two feature Gun-  
ter's four 'Variants On A Theme  
Of Thelonius Monk (Criss-Cross)',  
and here one gets the real jazz  
feel with fine sax leads by Or-  
nette, Eddie Costa on vibes and  
lively background bass and  
drums.

Detailed jacket notes by the  
composer add to this venture-  
some disc, the whole being a  
highly interesting experience for  
the diehard jazz buff.

There are three new 'twist'  
titles, oldies such as 'South Of  
The Border,' 'Don't Deceive Me,'  
'The Girl I Love' etc., some as  
straight instrumentals, and the  
rest featuring Fats' plaintive vo-  
cal.



## Jack Hutton's teens

### Special teenage rights under Canadian law



Can Canadian teenagers be sued in our courts?  
Or is the law a rather remote institution reserved for  
adults?

How many teenagers, I wonder, realize that they  
have special rights under Canadian law — as well as  
responsibilities?

For example, the following questions have come  
to this column over a period of time. And we'll try to  
answer them and a few other related ones at the same  
time.

1. At what age can teen-  
agers marry without their  
parents' consen-t? Let's hope  
none of you are considering  
this drastic step, but a mar-  
riage can be annulled if you  
are under 18.

2. Can the courts sue a  
teen-ager to collect money  
owed? This is a neat legal  
point and needs some explana-  
tion. First, the firm will al-  
ways want to know whether  
you are 21 before giving  
credit on an expensive item.

#### Sue for payment

Stores can sue for payment  
on what the law calls "neces-  
saries". But they cannot sue  
a teen-ager for non-necessi-  
ties, and you will find that  
any store will keep this very  
carefully in mind when ex-  
tending credit.

For example, an 18-year-  
old fellow who has taken a  
job in an office needs a suit  
to keep his position. But the  
courts would look at any  
legal action differently if he  
went out on a spree and  
bought 20 suits from one  
store.

3. Can a teen-ager be asked  
to testify in court about an  
accident he or she witnessed?  
YES. Even very young chil-  
dren can be asked to add  
their testimony in court.

4. Do a teen-ager's earn-  
ings belong to his or her  
father? Theoretically, your  
parents can demand at least  
a portion of your part-time  
earnings because they could  
legally ask for room and  
board.

5. What about car accidents  
involving your automobile? Is  
a teenager legally respon-  
sible? You bet your bottom  
dollar you're responsible,  
whether you're over 21 or  
not.

If you've loaned the car to  
a friend careless enough to  
get involved in an accident,  
you're still responsible. The  
other driver can sue both of  
you — but will probably  
single you out.

You are not liable, by the  
way, if your car is borrowed  
without your permission. And  
you are also not liable if a  
thief steals your car and be-  
comes involved in an acci-  
dent.

6. Does a teen-ager ever  
have to pay income tax? Yes,  
this is something common to  
anyone who earns more than  
minimum \$1,000 of taxable  
income in Canada. Age has  
nothing to do with it.

I might add that the fede-  
ral income tax department  
counts everything that you  
earn in that sum — baby-  
sitting charges, snow-shovel-  
ling, gardening services and  
so on. However, few teen-  
agers have to worry about  
the problems of income tax.

One final piece of advice  
from a lawyer friend: "Teen-  
agers should be careful to ob-  
serve the same rule so many

adults overlook: read every-  
thing carefully before sign-  
ing it. And consult a lawyer  
if you're not sure about any-  
thing."

I just hope that most of  
you find out about mort-  
gages, contracts (including  
marriage) before you find  
you've made a mistake early  
in adult life. A lot of adults  
you and I both know wish they  
had.

Speaking of teen-agers and  
marriage, I was more than  
surprised to find the other  
day that the average age at  
which Canadian girls marry  
is still around 18.

What are the chances of a  
successful marriage? Ameri-  
can surveys figure that if you  
get married between 18 and  
21 there is only a 40 percent  
chance that the marriage will  
last.

If you are between 21 and  
23 the odds go up to at least  
50 percent. And if both part-  
ners are more than 25 the  
experts claim that there is a  
70 percent chance of a suc-  
cessful marriage.

Quite a problem, isn't it? I  
can only assure you (having  
been married myself for the  
grand length of time of two  
weeks now) that statistics  
mean little if you're sure  
you've found the right per-  
son.

## Three men plead guilty

Three individuals, all with criminal records, pleaded guilty in Montreal Court to charges laid by Westmount police and will be sentenced later, according to police officials.

The three are James R. Morse, 29, of 2066 Westmore avenue; Joseph N. Christie, 42, of 2032 Oxford avenue; and Cecil James Murray, 40, of 324 Selby street.

The trio were arrested on February 8, of this year by Westmount police after they had attempted to gain entrance to a house on Lewis

avenue below St. Catherine street.

The three attempted to force their way into the home of Miss A. Boisvert, 57, of 117 Lewis street, but before they could do so were interrupted by Westmount police officers who answered a call from neighbors concerning their suspicious that something was amiss at their neighbor's house.

In forcing their way into the house the trio broke through a safety chain which kept the door slightly ajar.

According to police William Kacanagh and Constable W. Kerr who answered the call for a "holdup," one of the trio was wearing a mask over his face, a second claimed he was an inspector and the third said he had come to look after the furnace.

Three separate charges were laid. One was charged with carrying an air pistol, a second with representing a public official and the third with wearing a mask.

The speed with which the arrests were made was attributed with the alertness of neighbors who called the police when they noticed something was wrong.

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# By Pierre Berton SVEFNAP spring list includes N.D.G. candidate



IN ITS LONG AND DISTINGUISHED history, SVEFNAP — the Society for the Verification and Employment of Fascinating Names of Actual People — has never had a more tumultuous meeting than its recently concluded Spring Nominating Session. I regret to report that owing to bitter factional disputes the Selection Committee was unable to come up with an award winner.

The finalists were narrowed down to four superior choices, but the necessary two-thirds vote needed for a SVEFNAP award was not forthcoming as directors, wielding proxies, battled for their favorite. Here they are:

● **Cuthbert Guthberg Gifford**, NDP candidate, N.D.G., submitted by D'Arcy O'Donnell of Canadian Press.

● **Mossman R. Dudgeon**, Toronto YMCA physical director, submitted by Manny E. Bowen.

● **Freelove Outhouse**, taken from a Toronto insurance list by J. E. Belliveau.

● **Sir - Ranulph Twistleton - Wykeham-Fiennes**, taken from an English almanac by Irma Coucill.

What might loosely be described as the Gifford-Dudgeon group held that the sheer onomatopoeia of the two leading names gave them precedence under the SVEFNAP rules. They argued eloquently against the Outhouse coterie which tends to hold that names should have a literal meaning as well. This group firmly believed that the sheer incongruity of their candidate's name stamped it for immortality.

Both factions were opposed to the representations made in favor of the British hyphenated name on the grounds that all titled Britishers have fascinating names, and to choose one from Mrs. Coucill's enviable list would be just too easy. However, it was felt that Mrs. Coucill should be given the coveted Kagool Award for industry since she submitted the

names of 82 Englishmen, almost all titled and hyphenated.

Protection needed for our landscapes

WITH Spring's arrival we city types will be making more and more junkets into the countryside.

We'll gleefully exchange fresh, pure air for the smoke, fumes and depressing odors of our winter in town.

And we'll just as gladly rest our eyes on clean, white melting snow and green fields peeking through instead of the underfoot gunk, the blackened snow heaps on lawns, and the debris of winter which soon will be blowing around here.

The long, cooped-up winter can put a rosey-spectacled picture of the countryside in our mind's eye.

So it comes as a bit of a shock, on a pre-spring drive, to find that forgotten evidences of man's inhumanity to man's first heritage, the land, are still here. Here and there, more outrages have been added.

One stretch of good highway, beyond the suburbs and truly rural, we shall describe — without identifying, because it is an example which can be found, alas, all over La Belle Province.

The road meanders beside a pretty, gentle river — but you can't see much of the river because of an almost unbroken half-mile of shanty restaurants plastered with soft drink signs and run-down cabins, garages and sheds. Just beyond, there is a once-proud

farmyard, now littered to the road's edge with up-turned, burned-out, rusted, crushed automobiles and trucks — a roadside shrine to planned obsolescence. The next farm boasts a collapsed barn — it's been that way for a couple of years.

These things are an assault on the sense of beauty which we all, to greater or lesser degree, possess.

There, truly, "ought to be a law."

Private property rights? Do with your land as you please? Can't legislate?

Phooey! We have laws against undue noise. We have laws against some forms of pollution of air and water.

If we can make it illegal to offend the senses of hearing, smell and taste, we can just as surely outlaw making people uncomfortable through their sense of sight.

We city folks, exposed to ugliness on all sides in our workaday lives, claim the beauty of the countryside is as much ours as anyone's — indeed, we can appreciate it more.

We look to our Legislature or our Parliament to enact "ground rules" which will guarantee all our right to enjoy the Quebec and the Canadian landscape, unspoiled by the depredations of the wanton, the avaricious, the lazy and the uncouth.

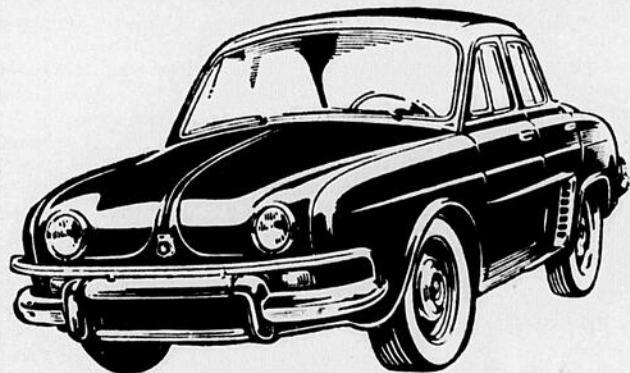
## Young Hebrews plan tag day

## MMC amends law

By a vote of 13 to six, the Montreal Metropolitan Corporation has amended its bylaw governing closing hours of stores on Montreal island so as to permit shopping until 7 p.m. instead of the present 6 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays.

The MMC also adopted by a vote of 16 to three another amendment to the by-law authorizing stores to remain open until 10 p.m. the week preceding Easter Sunday, and the day before the eve of the Jewish holidays — first day of the year, Atonement Day, Passover Day, the Feast of the Tabernacles, and the Feast of the Pentecost. Both amendments are subject

to ratification by the Quebec minister of municipal affairs. Any objections may be addressed to him by the municipalities on the island.

It already permits late shopping until 10 p.m. on Thursdays and Fridays, and on all weekdays between December 1 and 31 inclusively.

### Names for name's sake

There is a hard core of SVEFNAP regulars, of whom I count myself one, which holds that a really fascinating name should be fascinating entirely for its own sake and not by reason of any external allusions. We are abstractionists pure and simple and we make no bones about it.

For this reason we can admire names like C. Mariner Shipp (retired New Brunswick captain, submitted by J. E. Belliveau) but we cannot grant it award status. It is also intriguing to note that there is a Lovelace Outhouse on the same insurance list that carries Freeloze; that Welcome Restored is a retired Toronto schoolteacher (submitted by Mrs. Donna M. Moores); that Berkeley Square appeared recently in the Belleflair Light Opera Company's production of Ruddigore (courtesy G. R. Chater); that Edward Sweet-applebrowne was a clerk in a Brantford drug store back in 1930 in George Creasser's memory; and that the Harbinger J. Spring, who wrote a letter recently to the Hamilton newspaper is an actual person (as verified by James Cooper).

All of the directors, incidentally, are agreed on one point, and that is that a name to be really fascinating must be fascinating in all languages. We can't always be sure of foreign names, of course, so often give them the benefit of the doubt. ## I take issue by PETER KERRIGAN

● THE ABOVE IS WHAT I SAID at the Progressive Conservative Nominating Convention held a month ago — the Convention which chose me to run in St. Antoine-Westmount.

Since that convention, I have spent many hours meeting people in the riding, from St. James St. to Ridgewood, from Atwater to Claremont. One of my principal impressions during this time has been the frankness of people at their doors and men coming to or from their work at the factories. They have been forthright and honest, they have told me what they really think and what they want in government. I have also been approached by many of my friends who have asked me, "Why, Peter, would a man like you, with a secure and respected position in business and society, wish to get mixed up with the often rough-and-tumble world of politics?"

There are other reasons, of course, why some candidates run for election: they may be seeking power; others want to add to their prestige; and still others desire monetary return. We must reject all of these reasons.

● THE POWER MOTIVE is very much in the forefront in this election. The word 'power' is used in various ways. Both major parties in this election are seeking power or control of the government, to rule the country for the next four years. This is the use of overall power in its proper perspective.

But there are many individuals who seek election to attain power themselves and to exert power on others. In the last two elections, 1957, 1958, the Canadian people and the people of St. Antoine-Westmount voted against this type of power exerted by the former Liberal government.

Here we are in 1962, five years later. Now the Liberal Party is offering a so-called team — the Pearson team. Of the six prominent members of the team — five of them held positions of power in the former Liberal Government and during the Liberal regime. Nothing has changed.

● DO WE WANT THE SAME LIBERALS who were in power for 22 long years — the same people who were rejected by the country in 1957 and then again in 1958? Canadians discovered that these Liberals had misused their power.

In this election, there is little difference between the Liberals of 1957 and the Liberals of today. They are the same power team back for another try. This issue comes clearly to the forefront in this riding of St. Antoine-Westmount.

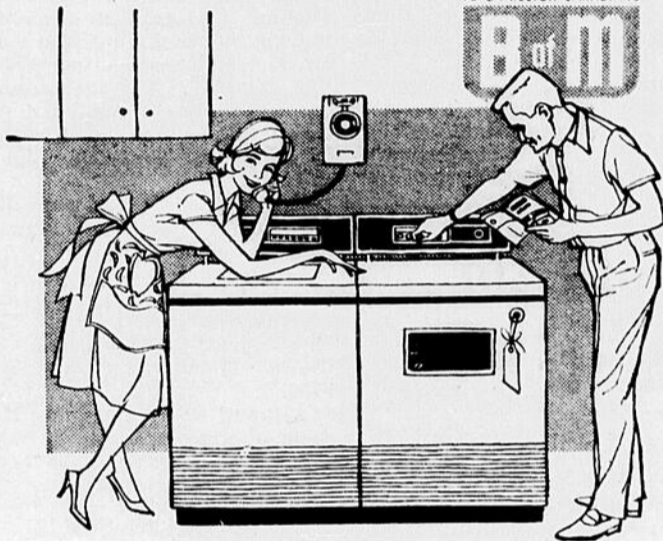

In 1945 she resigned her position as chairman of the Arts Department of Northern High School in Flint to devote her full time to the public practice of Christian Science healing.

come when the English theatre needed all the support it could get.

French theatre in Montreal was established and a going concern, he said. As many as 12 units are functioning successfully with four doing very well and in comparison the English theatre is in a slough of despondency.

In his plea for support he said that English theatre in this area was sick but was by no means dead as there was at the present time a resurrection apparent because of little groups still working hard to revive interest.

There was plenty room for English theatre in Montreal, he said, but the standards must be high and their efforts to be successful must portray a complete cross-section of the population as the theatre is the reflection of our times and it would be a tragedy if we were to allow it to die.

Mr. Caplan reminisced on the successes the English theatre enjoyed during his earlier years on the stage. He recalled the popularity of the group of community players who kept the old Empire

theatre on Stanley street alive as well as others of an earlier generation.

He gave full credit to the famed Stratford players but reminded his listeners that the majority of them had received their early training in Montreal. The Ottawa theatre which became popular also drew its talent from Montreal.

### RECOGNITION NOTED ABROAD

In his remarks of the renaissance of the arts as far as Canada was concerned, he reminded his listeners that recognition is also being achieved by Canadians abroad. He recalled the great ovation the Montreal Symphony Orchestra received in Russia but was at a loss to understand their failure to make an impression in France. The reception in Russia of this group was made all the more important when it is noted that they received 12 curtain calls.

On the question of artists leaving here for greener fields and recognition abroad, he thought it was a good thing. Recently there was a mass migration to Toronto and New York and on to London and Hollywood but it must not be forgotten that these same people had their origin here.

He praised the work of Sir Tyrone Guthrie with whom he had worked in Montreal and it was from him he had taken over his present duties following the chal-

lenging series known as "The Romance of Canada" which had been so well received.

Although he had had many offers to leave the local scene, Mr. Caplan emphasized his love for the theatre here and he hoped that his listeners would support the arts in Canada and at least allow it to enter into a small portion of our lives in spite of the strain of everyday business.

**Wanted—1898-1909 patterns and Victorian mode clothes**

I HAVE AN URGENT request from Mr. Russell Hammond of Westmount, Diocesan Layreader, and vice-president of the Fellowship of the West, to appeal through this medium for patterns dating from 1898-1909 or clothes, women's, men's and children's from that same era.

An unusual request — but it all has to do with The Dawson City Gold Rush Festival taking place this summer from July 1 to August 17, with the theme "relive the fabulous days of the '98 in the place where it happened." The festival is sponsored by the Governor General of Canada and will be run like Stratford Festival by Tom Patterson.

MR. HAMMOND has a great interest in the Yukon, having served Anglican Churches there a short time ago. A letter he received from Mrs. Foth of Dawson City reads in part: "Everyone in Dawson City, is clothes conscious for this summer, their ambition is to obtain patterns from 1898 to 1909 — of women's and children's clothes — high collar blouses with leg of mutton sleeves, etc." "And clothes, men's frilly shirts, fancy vests, large ostrich feathers, parasols — or anything from that era which one might have stored away in the attic."

The folder announcing the Dawson City Festival is fascinating, showing pictures taken from the Public Archives of Canada — one showing Front street in 1904, taken at midnight and it is bright sunshine — another of Robert Service's cabin, the birthplace of "Dangerous Dan McGrew" — the Occidental Hotel, in the early days, still in use, this hotel on Third avenue, has all the atmosphere of the early "Gold Rush Days." Anyone desiring to take this trip will be well entertained, everything is planned and arrangements made to visit all the historic spots — go white whale hunting or learn to do the Eskimo version of the "twist."
