The Queen and Royal Family.

THE QUEEN.—VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, &c., Queen, Defender of the Faith. Her Majesty was born at Kensington Palace, May 24, 1819; succeeded to the throne June 20, 1837, on the death of her uncle King William IV.; was crowned June 28, 1838; and married, Feb. 10, 1840, to his Royal Highness Prince Albert. Her Majesty is the only child of his late Royal Highness Edward, Duke of Kent, son of King George III. The children of Her Majesty are:

Her Royal Highness Victoria Adelaid Mary Louisa, Prince Royal of England and Prussia, born Nov. 21, 1840, and married to his Royal Highness William, the Crown Prince of Germany, Jan. 25, 1858, and has had issue, three sons and four daughters.

His Royal Highness Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, born Nov. 9, 1841; married, March 10, 1863, Alexandra of Denmark, (Prince of Wales), born Dec. 1, 1844, and has issue, Prince Albert Victor, born Jan. 8, 1864, George Frederick Ernest Albert, born June 3, 1865; Louisa Victoria Alexandra Dagmar, born Feb. 20, 1867; Victoria Alexandra Olga Mary, born July 6, 1868; and Maud Charlotte Mary Victoria, born Nov. 26, 1869.

Her Royal Highness Alice Maud Mary, born April 25, 1843; married to H. R. H. Prince Frederick Louis of Hess, July 1, 1862, and has issue four daughters and one son: second son killed by accident, May, 1873.

His Royal Highness Alfred Ernest Albert, Duke of Edinburgh, born Aug. 6, 1844; married the Grand Duchess Marie of Russia, Jan. 23, 1874, and has issue a son, born Oct. 12, 1874.

Her Royal Highness Helena Augusta Victoria, born May 25, 1846; married to his Royal Highness Prince Frederick Christian Charles Augustus of Schleswig-Holstein-Sonderburg-Augustenburg, July 5, 1866, and has issue two sons and three daughters.

Her Royal Highness Louisa Carolina Alberta, born March 18, 1848; married to the Marquis of Lorne, eldest son of the Duke of Argyll, March, 1871.

His Royal Highness Arthur William Patrick Albert, Duke of Connaught, born May 1, 1850.

His Royal Highness Leopold George Duncan Albert, born April 7, 1853.

Her Royal Highness Beatrice Mary Victoria Feodore, born April 14, 1857.

George Frederick Alexander Charles Ernest Augustus, K. G., Duke of Cumberland, cousin to Her Majesty, born May 27, 1819, married Princess Frederica of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, and has issue a son and two daughters. George Frederick William Charles, K. G., Duke of

Cambridge, cousin to Her Majesty, born March 26, 1819. Augusta Wilhelmina Louisa, Duchess of Cambridge, niece of the Landgrave of Hesse and aunt to Her Majesty, born July 25, 1795; married, May 7, 1818, the late Duke of Cambridge. Augusta Caroline Charlotte Elizabeth Mary Sophia Louis, daughter of the late Duke of Cambridge and cousin to her Majesty, born July 19, 1822, married, June 28, 1843, to Frederick, Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, and has issued a son. Mary Adelaide Wilhelmina Elizabeth, daughter of the late Duke of Cambridge and cousin to Her Majesty, born November 27, 1833, married Prince Teck, June 7, 1866, has issued two sons and two daughters.

For loading, carriage and unloading of every load called a common or ordinary load for one of the distances mentioned in the above Schedule, or for any proportional or other distance not otherwise described, seven pence half-penny—so increase two pence half-penny per load when carried further than the distance between the two stations, and so on increasing two pence half penny every additional distance.

In 1663 was founded the Quebec Seminary, which afterwards became a regular College, and it had, by successive addition, acquired a high degree of importance, when it was erected, by Her Majesty's Royal Charter, into a University, under the style and name of *The Laval University*. By this charter, which bears date December 8th, 1852, no change was effected in the constitution of the Seminary itself; but a council composed of the directors of the institution, and the three senior profes-

sors of the several faculties was empowered to possess and enjoy all the privileges granted to the Universities of the United Kingdom, and especially that of conferring degrees in the Faculties of Divinity, Law, Medicine and Arts. His Grace the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Quebec is, by virtue of his Office, Visitor of the University. The Superior of the Seminary, for the time being, holds the office of Rector.

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

Previous to 1828, there were used in Great Britain as legal standards, the Ale Gallon,

Wine Gallon and Corn Gallon, of all different capacities; also the Winchester Bushel for dry measure, besides Heaped Measure; all of these are now abolished, and but one standard Bushel and Gallon for all measures, both dry and liquid, is used, called the Imperial Bushel, one eight of which is the Imperial Gallon.

The change from the old wine to the Imperial is not compulsory till 1880, up to that time the old wine gallon may be used by those who desire to do so, upon the condition that all bargains effected by it shall be specially mentioned.

The Imperial Bushel is an upright cylinder, whose internal diameter, is 18,789 inches and depth 8 inches. The Imperial Gallon is one-eighth of this, and cubical contents equal to 10 lbs water. We may quote from this, as Imperial Measure, "a pint of water a pound and a quarter;" and from the weight of water given below corresponding to the different measures, it follows, that if measures were lost, we could find their equivalents by weight of water, and if weights were lost we could find their equivalents by cubical contents of water.

The standard of the United States consists of two measures, namely the Winchester Bushel for dry measure and the old English Wine Gallon for liquid measure. The Winchester Bushel, so called because the standard measure was formerly kept at Winchester, England, is an upright cylinder, whose internal diameter is 18½ inches, and its contents equal to 2150 2-5 cubic inches and equal to 77,627 lb. of pure or distilled water at a temperature of 62 and barometer at 30.

The proportion between the Imperial measure and that of the United States is very simple and convenient for reduction, being nearly 5 to 6. Thus 5 Imperial Gallons are equal to 6 Gallons United States Standard. The Imperial Bushel is about 1,32 part more than the Winchester, 31 Bushel Imperial being equal to 32 Winchester.

There are still used in the United States, the old Beer or Ale Gallon of 282 cubic inches, equal to 10. 18 lbs. of water and a New York State Bushel of 2211-84 cubic inches, and gallon of 221-184 cubic inches, or 8 lbs. water. All transactions involving the measuring or purchasing of liquids, &c., should state the measures understood. By an Act of a Canadian Parliament, the following are the legal weights per bushel of the different kinds of grain: but when bought or sold by weight shall be specified by the cental (100 lbs) and parts of a cental.

EXCHANGE CALCULATIONS

In the absence of tables, the following calculations will be found useful; and as there are various modes of calculating Exchange, we choose the following as being the most easily understood. As before stated, such are made upon the old base or par, rendering it necessary to convert all sums to that standard, to enable us to find the required result. Four shillings and six pence sterling and one dollar at old par are equivalents; and as that relative value has been altered, but still retained as a base of calculation, it follows that 9, 9½ or 10 cent, premium quoted, means, 9, 9½ or 10 cents on the dollar, or dollars, on the hundred, or pounds, &c., in addition to the old par value; and as in these calculations we shall use the dollar as basis, quotations as above will read as \$1.09, \$1.095, or \$1.09½ and \$1.10; and the sums are to be multiplied or divided by the required premiums, written in a similar manner.

Sterling into Dollars and Cents.—At any premium. Multiply the pounds by 40, and divide by 9; this result gives the sum in dollars at old par; then multiply this result by the quoted premium, expressed as before stated.

Example.—What must I pay for a Bill of Exchange for £300 sterling, the quotest rate being 8 per cent, or \$1.08?

Solution.—£300 multiplied by 40 and divided by 9, gives £1,333.33 at old par; then 8 per cent, added to this, or multiplied by \$1.08 gives the answer, \$1,440.00.

Dollars and Cents into Sterling.—At any premium; (this operation is the reverse of the preceding). Multiply the dollars by 9, and divide by 40; this sum will be dollars into sterling at old par, which divided by the quoted premium, gives the required result.

Example.—What amount of Exchange on London can I buy for \$1,440.00, the quoted rate being 8 per cent, or \$1.08?

Solution.—\$1440, multiplied by 9, and divided by 40, produce pounds at old par, this sum, being divided by \$1.08, gives the answer, £300 sterling. **Note.**—When shillings and pence are in the sterling amounts to be operated on, it will be necessary to reduce them to the decimals of pound. A very little practice will soon familiarize one to the easiest method;

say for 17 shillings and six pence, then 10 is £5, then say 5s half of that or £125; these added, give £175, the required decimal. This mode will expedite all calculations in other denominations, especially where there are fractional quantities.

EXCHANGE WITH FRANCE.

London and Paris par of Exchange, one pound sterling equal to 25 francs 57 centimes. United States and Paris.—20 francs Louis Napoleon equal to \$3.84 or one dollar in gold, 5 francs 21 centimes. The real value of the francs is about 9½d sterling and the real value of the pound sterling is 25 francs and 26 centimes in gold, and 25 francs and 26 centimes in silver.

CANADA AND FRANCE.

One franc=18½ cents. Five francs=93½ cents or 4s 8d. Canadian One dollar.=5 35-100 francs. French invoice are reduced to dollars and cents for Canadian Custom Entry at the rate of 18½ cents per franc, or decimally expressed. 186.

Francs, into Dollars at Par.

Multiply the amount by the decimal, 1866, Dollars into Francs at Par.

Divide the amount by the decimal. 1866.

Bank Exchange here with Paris assumes a par of 25 francs to £1 sterling governed by quotations of sterling Exchange, with ½ per cent, additional for difference between Paris and London; thus, if sterling Exchange be 10½ our Bill must be based on 11.

Question.—I have a Bill from Paris to pay, amounting to 216, 05, sterling Exchange being 10½ per cent; what must I pay here in dollars and cents?

Solution.—216.05 francs divided by 25 produce £8 12s. 10d sterling and this amount into dollars and cents at 11 per cent. (½ par more than the quoted rate), produces \$42.63, which I have to pay, to settle my account with Paris.

Canadian Pounds into Sterling at 9½ or New par of £1 4s. 4d. to the pound sterling.

Multiply by 60 and divide by 73.

Sterling into Pounds Canadian at 9½ or New par

Reverse the preceding rule or to the sterling add 1-5 and 1-12 of that fifth, equal to 21-2-3 per cent, of the whole amount.

Sterling into Dollars, at 9½ or New par

Multiply the sterling by \$4.866, or divide by the decimal 2055.

Dollars into Sterling at 9½ or New par

Divide the dollars and cents by \$4.866, or multiply the amount by the decimal. 2055; the result will be pounds and decimals of a pound.
