\$1100. BID FOR AYRSHIRE COW AT A. W. MONTGOMERIE SALE

39 Head of Cattle Sold in Two Hours Brings in \$11,035.
Bidding Quite Sharp And Good
Prices Obtained.

SALE WELL MANAGED BY GILBERT McMILLAN.

Many Buyers Present From Ontario And United States.
Quebec Breeders Purchase 21 Animals.

Yesterday afternoon a large turnout of farmers from this vicinity attended the sale of Imported Ayrshire cattle held in the Ormstown Show Arena. The sale came about in an unfortunate way, for a breeder in Ontario made the importation a year ago from Mr. A. W. Montgomery, Lessnessock, Scotland, and then was unable to pay for the importation. Mr. Montgomery deemed it advisable to hold a sale now, and take his losses which were heavy. The thirty-nine head of stock which were auctioned in two hours time by Auctioneer Franklin fetched the handsome sum of \$11,035.00.

The animals sold were representative from the following well known Scottish herds: Lessnessock, Low Milton, Douglas Hall, Netherhall, Garraugh, Thrieve, Craighrae, Great Cross and Slodahill.

The top price paid was for Douglas Hall Nascent, which is a six year old cow and went to Harry McGee for the T. Eaton Farms. This animal sold for \$1100, and it took auctioneer L. E. Franklin and Sales Manager McMILLAN but three minutes to make the sale. Bidding throughout the sale was quite keen.

\$900. was paid for the bull Lessnessock Gossamer and went to Mr. Baker of Buffalo. We have been told in a round about way that the buyer was willing to bid to \$1500, if obliged to do so. Under such circumstances we believe Mr. Baker will feel he got the prize package of the sale.

The farmers here will all be pleased to hear that Mr. Ralph McQuat purchased one of the young bulls that appears to have a great future before him in the name of Lessnessock Vandeyck, who is a 2 year old. The price paid was \$400.

Whist the prices listed below may be thought high one must consider the importation costs which are generally estimated at \$125. per animal, irrespective of age or size.

The three bulls sold averaged \$600.; 19 cows averaged \$344.; 6 bull calves averaged \$139.; and the 12 heifer calves averaged \$182. each.

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OTTAWA NOT FAVORABLE TO LACHINE BRIDGE

Bridge Project For Spanning of St. Lawrence Coldly Received.

QUEBEC SPONSOR PLAN

Province Ready to Pay Half Cost Estimated at \$1,750,000.

Effort of the provincial Government towards the building of a highway bridge across the St. Lawrence river to connect the Island of Montreal with the south shore counties has suffered a set-back. The bridge would run from Lachine to the Indian reservation at Caughnawaga. The federal Government is understood to be far from favorable to any idea of contributing towards the cost and upkeep of such a bridge, being built even without cost to the federal treasury.

Last session of the Quebec Legislature a bill was put through by Hon. Honore Mercier, Minister of Lands and Forests, who sits in the Assembly for Chateauguay county, to provide for the creation of a Commission of study in regard to the projected bridge. The plans for bringing the commission into being received a setback when the federal Government was informed of the project, contributing to the cost of the bridge. Since the structure would be over a navigable river the consent of the Ottawa Government is necessary to the erection, and it had further been hoped that Ottawa would be ready to contribute its share of the cost. The reverse has, however, been found to be the case, it being done for some time to come with the building of the Harbor bridge, of which cost Ottawa is bearing one-third, the province a third, and the city of Montreal the balance. It is claimed, further at Ottawa, that to build still another bridge would be detrimental to the revenue of the Victoria bridge, and would also be the province's contribution to the Harbor bridge becoming self-supporting within a comparatively short period.

The estimated cost of the proposed bridge, designed to eliminate the present ferry service from the province by guaranteeing half of the bond issue, and forming the final link in the Montreal to Malone highway, is \$1,750,000, though some engineering opinion has it that this amount would be very liable to be exceeded. Quebec is ready to bear half the burden by guaranteeing half of the bond issue, and paying half the cost of the upkeep, and let Ottawa take care of the other half. The provincial Government has not intimated to any of the interested counties, or Montreal, that they should contribute, though in the proposed commission of study there will be representatives of the counties and Montreal, and doubtless contributions would be accepted from the municipal bodies. On the 30-50 basis suggested by Quebec it would mean a sum of \$875,000 for the federal and provincial Governments each, this being on a calculation of 10 per cent on the cost of \$1,750,000 to care for interest and sinking fund on the bonds, plus maintenance, while against this expenditure there would be for each Government half the revenue derived from the tolls charged. What this revenue would reach yearly has not been taken into exact calculation, and the request to the federal authorities has been to provide \$87,500 a year.

Against this project of building a new bridge across the St. Lawrence there has been some years the question of building a driveway on the Canadian Pacific Railway Company bridge at Lachine, and the Montreal Board of Trade has suggested that it would be better to construct a double railway across the highway bridge. However, it develops that the C. P. R. estimate for such construction would be \$2,300,000, or considerably more than the estimated cost of a new bridge.

The legislature has not yet voted any money for the Lachine bridge project, and indications are that little advance can be made now until next session when the views of the interested members are declared.

Representatives of such counties as Laurier-Napierville, Chateauguay, Huntingdon, St. John's, Ierville and Beauharnois are keenly interested in having the project get under way, and representations have also been made to the Ottawa Government by the Chamber of Commerce of the district. The provincial Government when about to undertake the building of the Taschereau and Gallepauit bridge, connecting the Island of Montreal with the Perrot and the main land, north of the river, let Ottawa know that a contribution for those bridges would be welcomed, but there was no response except that the engineers of the department of railways and canals prepared the plans. (Gazette.)

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MAN AWARDED \$600. DAMAGES IN \$5,000. SUIT

Victim Killed by Impact of Piece of Rock Dislodged by Dynamite Blast.

COMPANY BLAMED.

Defendant Declared Negligent Through Not Protecting Lives of Employees.

Leo Leboeuf, 21-year-old son of Wilfrid Leboeuf, of Beauharnois, was killed instantly when a piece of flying rock, dislodged by a blast of dynamite, struck him on the head. His father sued the Montreal Cottons Co. in the Superior Court at Beauharnois, for \$5000. Had been awarded \$600 damages by Mr. Justice W. L. Bond, of the Superior Court.

On March 14, 1927, young Leboeuf was employed by the defendant company at Valleyfield. At the time of the accident he was working on a barge anchored in the tailrace of the company's works, where dredging operations were being carried on. On the barge there was a wooden shack covered with planks to shelter the employees and from which the charges of dynamite were set off. The stone, which struck and killed the young man, broke through the planks. It was the father's claim that he is poor and was receiving considerable assistance from his son.

For plea to the action the company alleged ignorance of the relationship between the plaintiff and the deceased. It admitted the accident but denied responsibility, alleging that the shack built on the barge was not intended to shelter the workmen from flying pieces of rock, but was simply there to protect them from the weather. The victim and his father were about 140 feet from the shore when the explosion occurred. It was alleged that the victim and five companions had been working all night drilling holes and filling them with dynamite. Prior to the discharge the barge was removed to a distance of about 140 feet from the scene of the explosion and from there the charge was set off. No one having authority, the court said, appeared to have been in charge of the gang and the members were left entirely to their own discretion.

"It has frequently been held," His Lordship commented, "that it is not sufficient for an employer to issue general instructions to his employees; he must take the necessary steps to see that those instructions are carried out. At it appears to the court there was serious negligence on the part of the defendant in failing to take the necessary steps to protect the lives of its employees and to avoid accidents of this nature, in failing to provide a capable foreman for this gang, and in leaving to the discretion of these laborers the task of determining how far the barge should be removed in order to ensure safety from flying debris resulting from the explosion of dynamite.

There was further negligence in not providing adequate shelter for these employees from such an obvious risk. I have no hesitation in arriving at the conclusion that the death of the plaintiff was caused by the fault and negligence of the defendant company in failing to take the necessary steps to protect the lives of its employees engaged in an occupation obviously presenting serious risks."

After discussing the expectations of the father, His Lordship awarded damages at \$600 and condemned the company to pay this amount.

Radio Broadcasting.

On Friday the House of Commons discussed the question of broadcasting and a somewhat prolonged, although interesting, discussion followed. The debate arose over the decision of the Marine Department not to renew a broadcasting license of a religious sect, which broadcast through a number of stations in Canada. The Minister of the Department, Mr. Cardin, laid down his policy.

"I do not believe the minister who has the responsibility in regard to these matters can occupy a more sound position than to take care first of all of the listeners-in, and to look after the interests of the broadcasting stations after that. After all the public at large, the listeners-in, are to be considered first; the welfare, the benefit and the enjoyment of the mass of the population which is composed of the listeners-in should be considered before anything else."

Few will disagree with this doctrine as it applies to the radio. The radio broadcaster has not clientele in the sense that a newspaper has, for the words are thrown in the air for any who may wish to catch them. There are no fees to be paid by the listeners, consequently the broadcasters must expect to get a return for their investment either through the advertising value of the broadcast to themselves, or to the clients who pay them to put messages in the air. Such being the case the broadcasting stations must be prepared to accept the rules that the administering body sees fit to make.

The Gazette's Birthday.

On the 3rd. of June 150 years ago the first issue of the Montreal Gazette was published and seventy years ago the White brothers acquired control of the newspaper. The Gazette does not rank with the Montreal Star in circulation, but it is held in high respect not only throughout the Montreal area, but wherever copies are sent. The fairness of its reports, and the general accuracy of its statements have been of great value to its readers, and undoubtedly has promoted a spirit of tolerance which might not otherwise have existed. Coloured reports of meetings, especially those of a contentious nature, tend to make discord and this is one of the great dangers a bi-lingual district must guard against. Fortunately a good spirit of harmony exists throughout the southern portions of Quebec, and no small share of the credit belongs to the Montreal Gazette.

A Dairy Pool.

On Saturday a meeting of dairymen of Russell county, Ontario, was held for the purpose of organizing a pool, somewhat along the lines of the wheat pools of the West. The promoters hope to see their organization extend to all counties in Eastern Ontario. The success of the venture will be watched with a great deal of interest, for the marketing of their products is one of the basic problems of the farmers. The pooling system requires one organization to sell all the dairy produce and to divide the money equally among all the members. This sometimes works to the disadvantage of the farmer who has an unusually high quality of goods to sell, but on the other hand it tends to equalize conditions throughout a section and give a better general solvency to the farming community.

There is of course a difference between theory and practice, and most organizations in the past which have been formed for similar purposes have failed because they have been unable to hold the farmers together. The farmer works alone most of his life and is an individualist in viewpoint. Consequently, if the new scheme is a success it will point the way to improved co-operative policies among the Eastern farmers. Out in the West where the farmers have more leisure, and most of them young men, new ideas have taken root more quickly, with the result that they have outdistanced the East in many ways, but we have a sounder farming policy then they have, and group for group, the major benefits fall to the Eastern farmer.

What Tourists Spend.

Recently the United States government made an estimate of the expenditures of tourists to Europe, and the findings of the survey are interesting. To arrive at conclusions the Department made a list from the names of those who asked for passports, and then sent them a series of questions to answer. No particular selection of names was made, and the results showed that the list was sufficiently wide for their purposes, as it covered tourists who travelled by private yacht, first class, cabin, tourist and steerage. It was found that some spent from \$50. to \$150. a day in Europe, but the greater number averaged well under those figures. The average first-class passenger spent about \$2,000 on his trip, the cabin passenger a few hundreds less, while those who travelled tourist, and this is now the most popular method of travel, spent around \$900., while the steerage passengers spent between \$400. and \$600. The tourist outlays do not vary much from the expenditures of like travellers from Canada, thus showing that the charge of extravagance and display so often charged against Americans is largely due to the few who travel de luxe.

The King's Birthday.

Most of us still think of King Edward as being only a few years dead, but the King's birthday on Sunday came as a reminder that King George ascended to the throne on the 9th. of May, 1910, although he was not crowned until June 22nd. of the following year. That is now 18 years ago. Perhaps when the records of history are written no King of England will loom greater in constitutional development than our King, who has brought a spirit of service to his task, which blends well with the present day beliefs of his people.

CHATEAUGUAY BASIN

The anniversary services of St. Andrew's United Church were held on Sunday. The services were largely attended. The edifice was gorgeously decorated with flowers by Mr. and Mrs. Peter Reid. The special preacher for the occasion was the Rev. D. L. Ritchie, D.D., of Montreal. In the morning the choir rendered the beautiful anthem, Sing Praises unto the Lord (Gounod) and Handel's Elijah. In the evening, a Mr. E. Tooth, baritone soloist, sang with great feeling, It Is Enough, quartette was given, The Lord Is Night, Stamer, by Mesdames Fildborough, Dickenson, Messrs. Waterhouse and Dickenson, and the choir rendered the anthem, Send Out Thy Light (Gounod).

On Monday a social evening was enjoyed in the Lecture Room. At 8.30 the Rev. W. T. Frittle called the gathering to order. A varied programme of songs and recitations were rendered by friends from Montreal, Mr. Percy Hall, baritone, sang Friend O Mine, Tommy Lad and Captain Mack. TYPHOID FEVER

Typhoid Fever is usually caused by using contaminated water or milk. The most effective and practical way to prevent Typhoid Fever is, therefore, to safeguard water and milk supplies. To do this is, without question, the responsibility of every municipal government. To do this is also the common-sense procedure of the families who have their own water and milk supply.

If this care is taken, there is but little danger of contracting typhoid fever as long as no other water and milk is used. During the summer many go out into the country on short and long trips. It is at such times that water and milk, which are not safeguarded as to their safety, are frequently used.

Amongst those recovering from typhoid fever are some cases who continue to pass out the germs of the disease. Such persons are known as "disease carriers." As to whether or not these carriers are dangerous depends largely on their occupation. Carriers should not be employed in the preparation, serving or handling of food.

It was demonstrated beyond question during the Great War, amongst Canadian soldiers and those of other countries, that the use of typhoid vaccine gives practically a sure protection against this disease.

Because of these facts we advise inoculation against typhoid fever for anyone who is at all likely to use water and milk from sources he does not know, and who is not prepared to boil or otherwise make safe the water or milk before using.

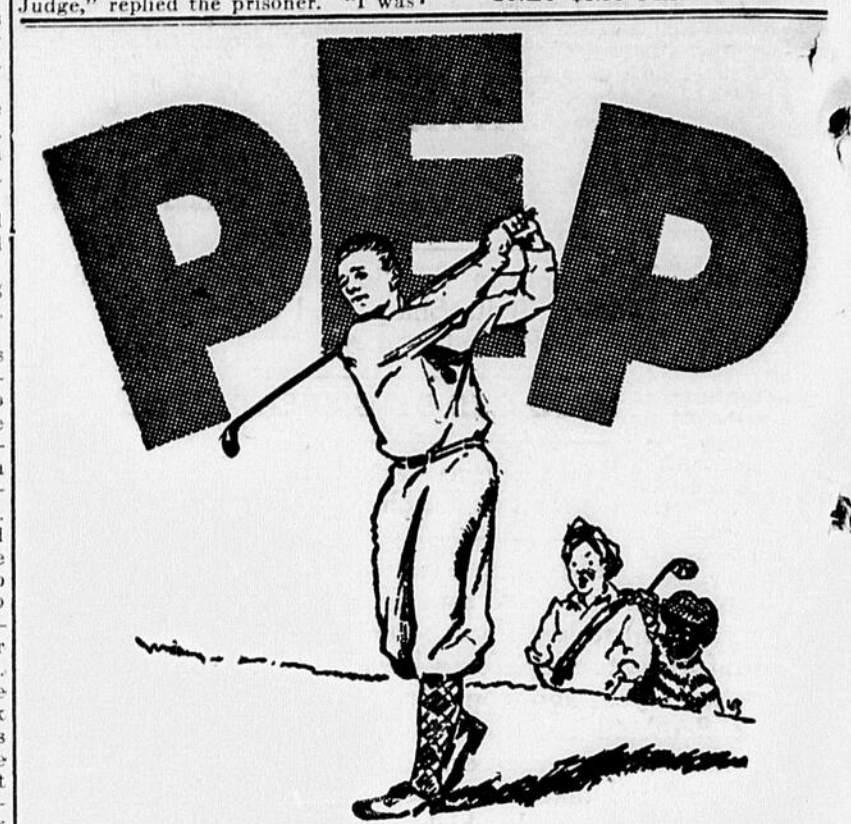

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The Week At Ottawa

Specially Written for the Huntingdon Gleaner.

All last week the members of the House of Commons wondered if it would be possible to get through the session early in June. The eleven o'clock rule is what worried them, for this year the House automatically adjourns at 11 p.m., and past experience has gone to show that more progress can be made with bills between eleven and one at night, than at any other time of the day. By the time midnight arrives, the average member is played out and wants to go home, so he curbs his desk-mates who talk simply for the fun of talking, either to obstruct, or because they think the people back home might look more friendly on him were he to load Hansard with an extra thousand words.

The Government and Rain.
Another difference this session is that the Commons are not rushing the Senate with legislation. As a rule the Senate is called upon to deal with legislation at a tremendous speed the last few days of the session, but this year practically all the bills were passed before the estimates were considered, with the result that the Senate has now little to do. The other day Senator Laird of Regina decided to enliven the proceedings of the Red Chamber, so got up and said, "I wish to read a portion of a letter received by me to-day from the Province of Saskatchewan. It is dated at Regina, May 26, and is as follows:

"We have had a wonderful seeding time, and everything is now in the ground in good shape. I wish you would draw the attention of the Prime Minister to the desirability of arranging for a copious supply of rain once each week for the next three weeks, and we will guarantee to deliver the greatest crop Western Canada has ever produced."

Knowing the supernatural powers claimed by the present Government, I trust the honourable Leader of the House will intercede with the Prime Minister to wave his magic wand so that this supply of rain may be delivered strictly on time and in ample quantity.

Hon. Mr. Dandurand: It may be somewhat difficult for the Prime Minister and his colleagues to bring about that state of things, because they are smiling rather than weeping.

This type of humour appealed to Senator McMeans, and the following day he solemnly asked: "I suppose the honourable gentleman has heard that there has been a beneficial rain in the West since yesterday?"

Hon. Mr. Dandurand: I do not see the honourable gentleman from Regina (Hon. Mr. Laird) in his seat, but I presume he has learned that the prayers of the Government have been answered, and that since yesterday rain has fallen in Saskatchewan.

Customs Estimates.
For some reason or other the boats of the Customs Department are always in hot water when their expense accounts attempt to sail through the House of Commons. This year it was the Vigilant which came under scrutiny. This boat was built in 1904 and in 1921 she was sold. The Vigilant was purchased by a Mr. Chew, who on the 6th of December of that year had been elected as Liberal member for one of the Simcoe ridings in Ontario. The present Member, Mr. Thompson, thought there was something decidedly fishy about the whole proceedings pointing out: "I find that the steamship Vigilant formerly belonged to the government; almost their first official act after coming into power in December, 1921, was to sell this boat to a then Liberal member of parliament for \$18,000. Last year, after six years of wear and tear and depreciation, I find that the Department of National Revenue

chartered this boat for seven months; it is chartered for nine months in 1928, and for nine months in 1929, and though the boat was sold for \$18,000 they are paying for it \$2,250 per month. In other words, in the twenty-five months during which this boat will be in their possession the fortunate owner will receive \$56,250. For the last ten or twelve years this boat has been up in the Georgian bay, lying tied up to the dock for the greater part of the time, but in 1927 she was sent down to the coast of Nova Scotia. Still more remarkable is the fact that in spite of this high rental, in 1927 the department also expended \$1,565.18 for repairs; what they spent this year and next year no one knows. I suppose the fact that the present owner of the boat is the chief Liberal worker in my riding did not stand against him in any way when he came to make this good bargain for the charter of his boat."

He was followed by Mr. Boys from the same district, and as Mr. Boys is a former Conservative whip, he had little doubt about the deal: "One of the reasons is that it was sold a little too cheap, and sold to a supporter of the government at the time, which in itself invites criticism. The hon. member for East Simcoe has gone so far as to suggest that the whole transaction savours of graft."

After Mr. Boys finished the Hon. Mr. Black, who was Minister of Railways in the Meighen government in 1926 said: "That transaction savours of graft and wrongdoing and someone has put money in his pocket. I do not hesitate to say it."

Hon. Mr. Bennett was in the West at the time, so the Hon. Mr. Guthrie was acting as leader of the Opposition, and he demanded that the item stand until the Minister should table all documents in connection with the sale of the boat. This was agreed to.

The following evening the estimates of the Department came up once more and Mr. Euler had the necessary papers with him. The records showed that the boat was first advertised for sale in March of 1920. The highest tender was \$10,500 and the lowest \$5,000. These were rejected. In November of 1920 a gentleman in Montreal offered \$25,000, 10% to be paid in cash. This offer was accepted but the purchaser backed away from the bargain in March of 1921. She was again put on the block and the lowest tender was \$4,100 and the highest \$24,200. This offer was accepted, but again the bidder decided to drop out. On the 13th of June of the same year the Montreal man again made an offer, this time for \$18,000, and of this amount \$100 was to be in cash. This was refused, and a month later the same gentleman offered \$18,000 with \$200 in cash. This was turned down, but in September he offered \$18,000 in cash and this was accepted, but he did not complete the purchase. In November of 1921 Mr. Chew offered \$18,000 of which \$5,000 was in cash and the Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, then Minister of Marine and Fisheries, recommended to the Meighen cabinet that the offer be accepted and on the last day that the Meighen cabinet was in power the offer was accepted by Council and the report signed by Sir James Loughheed. Mr. Euler continued: "This transaction described by the hon. member for East Simcoe and the hon. member for Halifax—perhaps I should leave out the hon. member for East Simcoe—but described by the hon. member for Halifax and implied by the hon. member for North Simcoe as savouring of graft was completed by the Meighen government just one day before they went out of office. That is the fact. I do not believe for a moment that there was graft, even though the sale was made by the Conservative government, but I say if there was graft then my hon. friends opposite are condemned out of their own mouths. I have not very much fault to find with the remarks made last night by the acting leader of the opposition, but he did say that little or no business was done by the Meighen government after the election. I think that is an entirely proper attitude to take. But I think it is also in point to consider whether it was proper to make contracts of this kind three weeks after the defeat of the government."

"I said a moment ago that I do not believe for one moment that there was any graft at all in connection with the transaction. There was no graft, although the hon. member for North Simcoe said that the vessel was sold for a price that was too low. I would not have spoken at this length—and I am almost through—but for the fact that I very strongly resent the remarks made by the hon. member for Halifax and the hon. member for East Simcoe with regard to graft and wrongdoing. I suppose perhaps one should have more sympathy than censure for men who are so unfortunate as to suspect their fellow men without cause. I hesitate to give advice to my friend from Halifax, who has lived in this world a little longer than I have, but I would say to him and to his colleague from East Simcoe that I think they would be happier men if they would just try to believe that other men are as honest as they are. I believe that in the parliament of Canada we should observe the decencies and amenities at all times."

That side having been dealt with the question of the charter rate was cleared up, the Minister explaining: "The cost of the boat to Mr. Chew when sold by the government was, as I stated last night, \$18,000. Mr. Chew himself informed me—and I have no reason to doubt what he says—that he spent some ten or twelve thousand dollars after he purchased her. Mr. Payette, before we would take the boat over, expended another \$30,000. As a further indication of value, she is insured now for \$70,000. Last night I stated, from information given to me by the chief of the preventive service, that she was insured for \$75,000. I made a slight error; the figure is \$70,000. As my hon. friend from Halifax remarked last night, that indicates a probable value of at least \$100,000."

"Now, to get some idea of whether or not we are paying too much for the boat, it is fair to consider just what advantage the lesser can obtain. He pays an insurance premium on the boat of \$3,850 a year. I am informed there is a depreciation—perhaps my friend from Picton (Mr. Cantley) knows more about this than I do—of ten per cent per annum. That, I suppose, would indicate a depreciation of eight or ten thousand dollars a year. The boat was constructed for lake patrol service. She cannot carry cargo to any extent, and she is not equipped for passengers. In the opinion of those who know, the owner will have very little opportunity of getting the money that he expended on this boat after the charter with us expires. We obtained the opinions of various gentlemen with regard to the proper price to pay Commander Phillips, of the naval department, and others expressed the opinion that \$2,250 a month was a very fair price. In some quarters I am informed it is a low price. I say frankly that we have ourselves for a very short period paid in excess of that for a boat which is not worth any more than the Vigilant. For the steamer Hochelaga, when it was very urgent that we should have a boat on the Nova Scotia coast, where rum-runners were particularly busy, we paid at the rate of \$4,500 a month for the limited period of six weeks."

Mr. Black: (Halifax): If that boat were for charter to-day I would defy the owner anywhere to get \$1,000 a month for her on the terms of the charter under which she is at present employed. That is an excessive amount for the boat. I believe \$750 would be a much more equitable and fair arrangement."

Mr. Euler: I want to ask a fair question. Could the hon. gentleman give me information—knowing about ships as he does—where in Halifax or anywhere else we can get two boats at \$1,000 a month—boats similar to this? If we can get them and they are seaworthy we will take them at \$1,000.

Mr. Black: I cannot at the moment, offhand. There are not many such boats about. She was built for a yacht.

Mr. Euler: She was built by the government of Canada for patrol on the lakes.

Professor Percy Ellwood Corbett,

M. C. Gale professor of Roman Law

has been appointed Dean of the

Faculty of Law of McGill Univer-

sity, in succession to Mr. Justice R.

A. E. Greenfields who has retired.

Professor Corbett's academic and

pedagogical career has been marked

by many distinctions.

A Rhodes scholar from McGill for

1915, he had the distinguished honor

conferred upon him in 1925, in suc-

cession as fellow of All Souls' College,

Oxford.

A native of Qu'Appelle, Sask., he

received his higher education at

and after matriculation entered

McGill in 1909. In 1913 he received

classical and modern languages. He

obtained two scholarships, one in the

He then proceeded towards a Mas-

ter's degree, and received it in 1915

when he was also selected Rhodes

Scholar for Quebec.

In the spring of 1915, after the

close of the session, he entered upon

an intensive military training and ob-

tained a commission in the 73rd Bat-

talion, Royal Highlanders of Canada.

He did not go overseas with this bat-

talion, but went over later and joined

the 13th Battalion. While he was

with this unit he was recommended

for the Military Cross on account of

distinguished service in the battle of

the Somme. After two years of ac-

tive service he was severely wounded

in February, 1918, and on partial re-

covery from the wound, which incapac-

itated one arm for some time, he

returned to Canada in the summer

of 1918.

In the autumn of that year he finally

entered Oxford on his scholarship,

and he was elected a fellow of All

at the university, an extremely high

honor, which, coming before the end

ard of work there. On his return he

was appointed to the staff at McGill

GOOD MILK

Facts Which Every Milk Producer And Dairyman Should Know.

Much has been said and written about "good milk," but probably few producers or dairymen fully appreciate or understand the few essential facts regarding:

- (a) What "good milk" really is.
- (b) How "good milk" may be produced.

(c) What the "bacterial count" reported by the laboratory signifies, and why it is used to determine the sanitary quality of milk.

But a knowledge of these facts is of the utmost importance to the producer or dairyman who has to meet competition with other perhaps better informed or better equipped producers or dairymen. He should know which are the most important factors in the production of "good milk"; that it requires no elaborate equipment to produce "good milk"; but that some very simple precautions are of extreme importance in producing "good milk". He should know also just what the bacterial count reported by the laboratory means, so that he can use these reports to detect errors in his methods of production.

The purpose of the present article is to give the producer or dairyman these essential facts in a brief and concise form. What is said here regarding milk applies likewise to cream.

Bacteria

We may think of bacteria as very small plants. They vary in size; under a microscope which will magnify about 600 times the majority of the bacteria found in milk will look like a pencil dot or like the printed "e". Some will be longer or some will be thicker than this.

As a rule the bacteria increase in numbers by dividing into two parts, just as a match may be broken into two parts. Each of these parts is now another bacterium which may again divide, and this process may continue without end. Under favorable conditions a bacterium may grow and divide every 20 or 30 minutes, so that in 4 or 5 hours the number of bacteria may increase 500 times.

Milk constitutes an excellent food for most bacteria because it contains everything that they require. Therefore the bacteria which are practically always present in milk will grow and increase very rapidly if they are given an opportunity to do so. One of the principle problems of the milk producer and dairyman is to prevent this growth.

Disease Bacteria

The disease bacteria are those which cause the various infectious diseases in man and animals. They do not occur in good milk; but if a cow is diseased or if a person handling the milk is infected by some of these bacteria, disease may enter the milk and the bacteria usually present in these discharges may thus be carried into the milk, where they may multiply and cause disease in the person who drinks this milk.

Other Bacteria

Many kinds of bacteria occur normally in milk which do not cause disease. These may occur in the teats of the cow, in the dust and dirt of the cowshed, in the traces of milk left in utensils and bottles.

These bacteria produce changes in the milk. Some change the milk sugar to an acid and so cause the milk to sour. Some change certain parts of the milk to putrid, foul-smelling substances—these are the bacteria which are at work in milk cans which have a bad odour—the can was poorly cleaned and the bacteria have changed the traces of milk left in the can to substances which have a very foul odour.

The Problem of the Producer or Dairyman
This problem may now be readily stated as follows:

1. To keep disease bacteria out of the milk.
2. To other bacteria out of the milk as far as possible.
3. To prevent the growth of the bacteria which are in the milk.

Disease bacteria must be kept out of the milk so that the consumer will not be infected. Other bacteria must be kept out of the milk so that the milk will not be quickly soured or rendered putrid by the presence and growth of large numbers of bacteria.

Since, in spite of all precautions, some bacteria will be left in the milk, they must be prevented from growing, for growth will always be accompanied by changes in the milk.

What is Good Milk?

Good milk is therefore—

1. Milk from healthy cows.
2. Milk handled by healthy persons.
3. Milk which has been produced under clean conditions and handled with clean, sterilized utensils, so that no large numbers of bacteria have been added to the milk. The milk has suffered little change and will keep well.
4. Milk which has been kept cool, so that no considerable

growth of the contained bacteria has occurred. The milk has suffered little change and will keep well.

How can we tell whether or not milk is good?

Consider the following facts—

1. Milk carefully drawn from healthy cows will usually contain less than 1500 bacteria in each cubic centimeter (about 20 drops of milk).
2. Milk drawn from cows suffering from Garget or Mastitis of the udder will usually contain large numbers of bacteria. These will often number over 1,000,000 (one cubic centimeter).
3. Milk which is not quickly cooled will, after a few hours, contain very large numbers of bacteria, because the bacteria originally present have multiplied rapidly.
4. Milk which has been kept fairly cool but kept for a long time will contain large numbers of bacteria, because even at fairly low temperature some growth will occur.
5. Milk which has been handled in poorly cleaned or poorly sterilized utensils (pails, cans, etc.) will contain many of the bacteria which have grown in the traces of milk left in these utensils.

Now, in consideration of the above facts, it is evident that an estimate of the number of bacteria in a milk sample provides a fair estimate of the sanitary quality of the milk.

If the number of bacteria in a milk is large, we know that something is wrong, either some of the milk came from diseased cows, or the milk was not properly drawn or handled or cooled. And if a producer or dairyman is ignorant or careless in any of these particulars, we cannot expect him to be careful regarding infection of the milk by persons suffering from infectious diseases.

Therefore, the number of bacteria in milk provides a means of judging the sanitary condition of the milk. For if the milk came from healthy cows, the bacteria in excess of 1500 per c.c. have been added by the producer or dairyman in his handling of the milk. If the bacterial count is very high, we know that either the producer or dairyman was very careless or ignorant, or that he is selling milk from diseased animals, or either case the milk is not only in poor condition, but it may be dangerous.

When it is considered that it is a simple matter to produce and deliver milk containing less than 20,000 bacteria per c.c., what shall we say of milk containing 300,000 bacteria per c.c. offered for sale as clean, fresh milk?

How can good milk be produced?

1. Healthy cows are essential. Do not spoil your milk by including milk from cows with diseased udders. Do not sell milk from tuberculous cows, for such milk is dangerous. Remove all diseased animals from your herd.
2. Healthy persons are essential. Do not allow anyone who may be infected to come in contact with the milk or handle it in any way. If a case of infectious disease occurs in your family, have someone entirely outside your household look after your milk business until the disease is cured. Remember that people may be infected and yet show no signs of the illness for several days. So, to save your business, take no chances, but have your neighbour continue to take care of your milk production until you are all danger has ceased to exist.
3. Milking—Never milk the cows during feeding time, for the dust raised from the feed will surely increase the number of bacteria entering the milk.
4. Keep the cowshed clean. And keep the cows clean so that manure and dirt together with the bacteria contained in such material, will not fall into the milk.
5. Wash the udder before milking, or if this is not practicable, at least wipe the udder with a clean, damp cloth and dry it with a clean, dry cloth before starting to milk.
6. Always milk with dry hands. Do not stir up dust, while milking, by rubbing the dirty udder with a dry cloth or between the hands, by slapping the flanks of the cow, by kicking up the straw, etc., just before or during the milking.
7. The use of a pail with a small mouth is advisable, to keep out as much dirt and dust as possible.
8. In a word, use every reasonable means to keep dirt out of the milk, for with the dirt there are always bacteria.
9. Utensils—By using unclean or unsterilized pails, cans, strainers and other utensils and apparatus, many producers and dairymen are constantly endangering the quality of their milk. Such utensils and apparatus are the most common source of large numbers of bacteria in milk.
10. Utensils and apparatus must be cleaned and sterilized. Cleaning will not take the place of sterilization. The purpose of cleaning is to remove as much of the milk as possible. But even

the best cleaning will leave a trace of milk in the pail or can or other apparatus, and this trace of milk will permit the bacteria in it to increase to enormous numbers.

Consequently the bacteria in this trace of milk must be killed by steaming or by thorough rinsing with boiling water.

Even after a thorough cleaning and good sterilization some bacteria in the traces of milk left in the can may have escaped the treatment, for it is surprising how much heat is necessary to kill some bacteria. The only simple way to stop growth of these few bacteria is to dry the utensils, for the bacteria cannot use the dried traces of milk. This step is a very important one.

The complete treatment, then is as follows—

1. Clean all pails, cans, metal strainers and other apparatus thoroughly with lukewarm (not hot) water and washing compound or alkali, using a brush to get into the seams, corner etc. Rinse thoroughly with clean water.
2. Steam or scald with hot water; this sterilization must be very thorough. Many bacteria can stand considerable heat.
3. Dry the utensils as quickly as possible. A can or pail, still hot from the steaming or scalding, turned upside down on a clean rack or table, will soon dry if the cover of the can or pail is removed.
4. Dairymen often return milk cans to the producer which are insufficiently sterilized and not dried. The dairyman should apply such heat to the can that it will quickly dry. After drying the cover may be replaced and the can given back to the producer. In some places this change in operation has been found to greatly improve the quality of the milk coming back in the cans.

Note on Strainers

Cloth strainers are very difficult to clean. They should be thoroughly washed and boiled and dried after use. And it is a good plan to boil them again just before using.

Straining the milk will not take out many of the bacteria, for they are so small that they will pass through any material used for straining milk.

If care is used in milking, no straining should be necessary.

Note on Milking Machines

Milking machines require special attention. The directions furnished by the manufacturer should be followed very carefully, for if such apparatus is not thoroughly cleaned and thoroughly sterilized it will add large numbers of bacteria to the milk.

5. Cooling—As soon as drawn, the milk should be cooled to at least 50 degrees Fahr. If in cans, the milk should be mixed, by rotating or shaking the can occasionally, to hasten the cooling. Cooling quickly is extremely important for the bacteria in the milk will increase surprisingly fast if the milk is not cold.

Summary

1. Keep only healthy cows.
2. Employ only healthy milkers and handlers.
3. Clean all utensils and apparatus thoroughly.
4. Sterilize all utensils and apparatus thoroughly.
5. Dry utensils and apparatus immediately after sterilizing.
6. Keep dirt and manure out of the milk.
7. Cool milk quickly to at least 50 degrees F.
8. Do not hold the cold milk too long before delivery to the consumer or dairy. In other words, do not sell old milk.

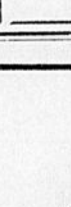

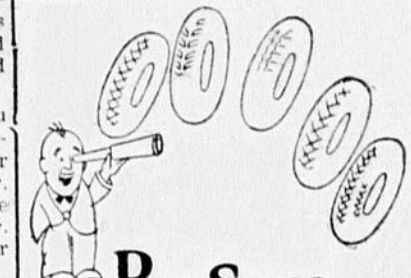

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VALLEYFIELD MEDICAL MEN

In his splendid volume "The Doctor Looks at Biography," Dr. Joseph Collins, the eminent American neurologist gives Thomas Fuller's definition of the art of biography—"To hand down to a future age, the history of individual men or women, to transmit their exploits and characteristics." There is no life, whose life is more filled with sacrifices, whose activities are more in accord with the teachings of the Great Physician, than that of the doctor who adopts unreservedly the precepts and traditions of his profession as a way of life. The history of any community is not complete without recounting the influence of its physicians who officiate at the dawn of life, who give their care and counsel during the short days of existence and who finally are present when the night of death descends.

In a short space, it would be difficult indeed to calculate the influences exerted by this small group of men who ministered to the English speaking minority of Valleyfield. The most that one can do is name them and associate them with the phase which their teaching represented. For the past sixty or seventy years Valleyfield has had physicians who exemplified the teachings of Hippocrates in a manner that gives their names a halo of sanctity and surrounds their deeds with an aroma of sacrifices. They have been counsellors, peace-makers, friends and healers of every physical and mental anguish. The lives of Valleyfield have been made better by their sojourn.

In another paragraph, Dr. Collins says "From a biography man gets moral, physical, mental and emotional assistance; he sees where others have failed and why; he recognizes avoidable obstacles and handicaps; he learns the value of health and its relation to happiness; and he is made to realize that material prosperity does not always spell spiritual welfare. He appreciates the meaning of culture and its influence on the individual and his time; he runs the gamut of emotions that are aroused by all good biographies; he suffers vicariously or enjoys objectively with the subject. His own life therefore becomes happier and more complete because of his intimate sojourn with a successful predecessor." There could be no more striking summing up of the lesson taught by these disciples of Aesculapius. The inheritors of the examples set by Dr. Sutherland and Dr. Groulx have had their lives ennobled by heroic men who gave their lives for the good of Valleyfield. No tribute to them and to their work can be sufficiently glowing to give an adequate picture of their value to Valleyfield; their deeds are inscribed in the Golden Book of Achievement, enduring and shining with the light of service well and faithfully done.

Dr. Loy came to Valleyfield and its environs about four score years ago when transportation was not rapid or easy—there were no roads, no bridges, no means of travel save the ox-cart and on horseback. Dr. Loy's day was before the Victorian era. He was to usher in the use of antiseptics and their blessings. In fact, the medical profession scorned the idea of bacilli and germs which were fast beginning to be talked about by small bodies of men who were thought to be mad. If operation was to be done, there were no anaesthetics that gave merciful release from pain. In this section there was not even the thought of a hospital—the nearest one was in Montreal. The kitchen table, a few strong men—and they often faint—held the patient and the doctor who washed his hands and rolled back his sleeves and went to work amidst the groans and grinding of the teeth of the unhappy and restrained person on the table. The medicines given largely at this period consisted of rhubarb, ipecac, jalap and calomel. Bloodletting was the procedure of choice for many ailments. To be a physician of those days required fortitude and patience and physical stamina of the highest order. As one looks back, the wonder is how these heroes accomplished so much—the light of present knowledge, their methods were crude but they did what they could. It was in this time that Dr. Loy went back and forth, in fine weather and in storm, meeting each emergency to the best of his ability. He died full of years, in spite of his arduous life and exacting profession and his name is honourably perpetuated by his descendants who are well-known throughout the district.

Walter Sutherland came to the altar of medicine through the door of the teaching profession, which so often becomes the great callings of life—the ministrations of the bar and medicine. To be a teacher gives a poise, a judgment and a knowledge of human nature that is particularly a splendid preparation for medicine. A large percentage of professional men owe their early training to the fact that they taught school at one time in their careers.

Walter Sutherland taught school in Ormstown and his interest was directed to the ideal of being a healer of men. He finished the prescribed course which was then beginning to emerge from the mists of dispute and misunderstanding. The Listerian age had begun and physicians had some conception of the science of medicine which heretofore had been practised as an art. Science was putting in some of its claims and Pasteur, "the most perfect man who ever entered the Kingdom of Science," was patiently laying the broad foundations upon which were to rest the pillars of modern scientific medicine. With strange stirrings in his breast Dr. Sutherland came to Valleyfield to practice medicine but left and never back to Ormstown, possibly because he was imbued with the
