A Call of the Members of the House of Assembly is ordered for Monday the 23d inst.

The following Message from His Grace the Governor in Chief was laid before the two Houses of the Legislature on Monday last.
RICHMOND, LENNOX and AUBIGNY,
GOVERNOR IN CHIEF.

The Governor in Chief acquaints the House of Assembly, that he has received the Instructions of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, as to the manner in which His Royal Highness's commands respecting the proceedings of the Assembly against Mr. Justice Foucher, which were communicated to the Assembly by message upon the second day of March last, are to be carried into execution.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent considers it most advisable, and has accordingly been pleased to direct that the Assembly, previous to any ulterior proceedings, do adduce without delay, and deliver to His Grace the Governor in Chief, such documentary evidence as they may consider adequate to support the charges which they have brought against Mr. Justice Foucher, and that copies of such charges, of such documentary evidence, and of the examinations already taken and annexed to the charges, be then transmitted by His Grace the Governor in Chief, to Mr. Justice Foucher, for his answer and defence.

And His Royal Highness has been further pleased to direct that the answer and defence of Mr. Justice Foucher, be, by His Grace the Governor in Chief, communicated to the Assembly, for their reply, and that the whole of the documents, as soon as the reply of the Assembly shall be received, shall be by him transmitted to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, for such further course as the case may require.

PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT OF LOWER CANADA.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY,

TUESDAY, Feb. 2.—The Report from the special committee to whom was referred the petition of Jos. Benoit, was received.

Ordered, that Mr. Blanchette have leave to bring in a bill to authorize Jos. Benoit to erect a Draw bridge over the River Richelieu, which was presented accordingly, and read for the first time, and ordered to be read a second time on Friday next.

A petition of Jean Barbeau, of the Parish of Saint Hyacinthe, praying for a privilege to build a Toll Bridge over the River St. Hyacinthe, and to establish a Turnpike Road from St. Hyacinthe to St. Charles, was received and referred to a special committee.

Mr. Blanchet had leave and presented a Bill to partition the Common of the Seigniorie of Baucherville, among the persons having Commonage on the said common, which was read the first time, and the second reading ordered for Tuesday next.

The Report was received from the Special Committee, to whom was referred the Petition of certain Inhabitants of the City of Montreal, praying for an incorporation to open a Canal in the Neighbourhood of said City, to Lachine, which Report was referred to the Committee of the whole appointed to consider the expediency to amend and repeal in part, an Act, to grant an aid to His Majesty to assist in opening a Canal from Montreal to Lachine &c.

A petition from divers inhabitants of the parish of Beauport, disapproving of the Turnpike Road proposed by Thos. Lee, Esq. was referred to a special committee.

The House in Committee to consider the expediency to amend and repeal the Lachine Canal, made some progress and obtained leave to sit again on Monday Adjourned.

WEDNESDAY, 3d Feby. The report of the Quebec Agricultural Society was received and read.

A Message was received from His Grace the Governor in Chief, with the Public Accounts which were referred to a Special committee.

Ordered, that the public accounts of the years 1815, 1816, and 1817, be referred to the said committee.

A petition of the Curate and Church-Wardens of the Parish of Notre-Dame de Quebec, respecting the market place of the Lower-Town of Quebec.

A petition of Michael Dubord, Esq. Physician, for the privilege of erecting a Toll-bridge over the river Champlain.

A petition of divers inhabitants of the Eastern Townships, praying for a new division of Counties, &c.

A petition of the Members of the Quebec Fire Insurance Company, praying for an Act of incorporation.

A petition of the Members of the Quebec Dispensary, praying for pecuniary aid.

A petition of John Goudie, Esq. and others, praying for a privilege to navigate Steam-boats on Lake Champlain.

A petition of divers inhabitants of Chaleurs Bay, praying support in the right to cut Hay in the Common of R. Rigouche.

UNHAPPY ACCIDENT.—It is with pain we relate the following unfortunate accident which occurred in this city, on Friday last, about five o'clock afternoon:—Mrs. WRECK, House keeper to Mr. ANDREW SWAN, being alone in the kitchen and preparing dinner, was suddenly seized with a giddiness to which, it is said, she was sometimes subject, and fell into the fire; her screams in a few minutes alarmed the family, and brought assistance to draw her from her distressful situation, having been entangled by the dog irons; but alas! she was so much scalded and burnt from the waist upwards that she expired about five hours after.—She was a widow a native of Ireland, about fifty years of age, and bore a most excellent character; she is therefore much regretted by the family with which she lived, and by all who knew her.—It is said, she had, for some weeks past a certain presentiment that she had not long to live.—She has left a son and a daughter, one studies the Law with Mr. STUART, the other is a Nun at the Hotel Dieu, who are almost inconsolable for the melancholy manner of their mother's death.
