HON. MR. PERREAULT DISCUSSES FARM PROBLEM Soviets Claim Further Gains—Deny Carranza Ended Life

BOLSHEVISTS HAVE BEEN DRIVEN BACK OVER THE UPPER BERESINA BY POLES, WITH HEAVY LOSSES

The Poles Captured Over Four Hundred Prisoners in Their Counter-Attack Against the Enemy, According to Official Statement — Bolsheviks Attacking Along the Entire Northern Polish Front, but Have Been Checked Everywhere, it is Declared — Polish Government Will Later Enter into Negotiations with the Soviet Officials.

WARSAW, May 25.—Bolshevik troops which succeeded in crossing the upper Beresina in several places have been driven back across the river with heavy losses, including more than four hundred prisoners, according to an official statement issued here. The enemy is attacking along the entire northern Polish front, but have been checked everywhere, it is declared. Fighting continues along the whole front.

POLISH GOVERNMENT HAS ANNOUNCED ITS PROGRAMME

BERNE, May 25.—The Polish Government has just made known that so soon as the Polish army has obtained the military objectives assigned to it, the Government will declare itself ready to enter into political negotiations with the Bolshevik Government. The place of meeting will be designated later.

BOLSHEVISTS CLAIM CAPTURE OF SEVERAL VILLAGES

LONDON, May 25.—Russian Soviet forces have occupied a number of villages on the west bank of the Dnieper River, from fourteen to twenty-seven miles north of Kiev, according to an official statement issued in Moscow yesterday and received here by wireless.

PROTESTS AGAINST THE ACCUSATIONS MADE

(Associated Press Despatch)

PARIS, May 25.—The French Government is protesting against the accusations which have been made against the French colonial troops who took part in the recent occupation of certain Rhine cities. In a statement it says that of the 85,000 men comprising the army of occupation, only 25,400 were colonial troops and of these only 7,490 were negroes, the remainder being Algerians and Moroccans. It adds that excellent relations existed between the inhabitants of the Rhineland and the colonial troops.

CHINA FINALLY SENDS A REPLY TO JAPAN

(Associated Press Despatch)

PEKING, May 25.—The Chinese government on Saturday sent its long deferred reply to Japan on the subject of Shantung, says a despatch to the London Times. The reply expressed pleasure that Japan proposed to return Kiaochow and would withdraw the railway guards, but fails to see the necessity of formal negotiations. China, the reply states, is ready at any moment to take over the policing of the railway, which really was here when the city was a German possession.

PRESIDENT WILSON HAS ASKED FOR AUTHORITY

WASHINGTON, May 25.—President Wilson has asked authority from congress for the United States to accept a mandate over Armenia. The President told Congress he thought the wish of the United States people was that the United States should become the mandatory for Armenia.

ONE KILLED WHEN PLANE CRASHED TO GROUND

Mr. Beasley Was Killed and Major Baker Seriously Injured at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 25.—E. H. Beasley, managing director of the British Columbia Union Steamship Company, and one of the most prominent business men of this city, was instantly killed, and Major A. R. Baker, was seriously injured yesterday afternoon when an airplane in which they had taken a flight over the city crashed to the ground from a height of 2500 feet.

PRESIDENT OF FRANCE FELL FROM TRAIN

However, President Deschanel was Not Very Seriously Injured as Result of Accident.

(Associated Press Despatch)

PARIS, May 25.—President Deschanel, who was injured yesterday morning by a fall from a train near Montargis, spent a good night and his physicians issued a bulletin this morning saying his condition was as satisfactory as possible, although rest was necessary.

The bulletin added the president was suffering from "superficial wounds in the face and left leg and general prostration."

President Deschanel did not preside at today's cabinet meeting, as was expected, members of the ministry insisting that he obey his physician's orders, and rest.

President Deschanel fell from a window in train, which was travelling thirty kilometres an hour. After his fall, the President walked along the tracks until he met a workman to whom he told the accident. He was attempting to open a window which went up suddenly precipitating him on to the tracks.

After the cabinet session, Jules Steeg, the Minister of the Interior, announced that the president's condition was satisfactory, but that the executive would take a long rest at Rambouillet. The date of his departure, however, has not yet been fixed, the secretary said.

BOLD BANK ROBBERY AT FINLEYVILLE, PA.

Cashier Was Knocked Unconscious and Locked in Vault by the Robbers.

PITTSBURGH, May 25.—The First National Bank at Finleyville, Pa., near here was held up and robbed shortly after noon yesterday by six men, who escaped according to word received here by the police.

The bandits are said to have escaped with \$100,000 in bonds and securities and \$15,000 in cash. The assistant cashier, who was the only man in the bank at the time, reported to have been knocked unconscious and locked in the vault while the institution was rifled.

Reactionary Results From Death Of Carranza Is Taken Advantage Of By Prominent Mexican Officials

Expected that De Facto Government Faces Problem of Subduing Villa, the Rebel Leader — Adjustment between New Government Forces and Villa Have Not Been Affected — Agent Left Message at White House for President Wilson.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Official interest in the Mexican situation was intensified yesterday by reports of a widespread reaction resulting from the killing of former President Carranza, the deposed president.

These indications were accompanied by information that the de facto Government might have to face almost immediately the problem of reducing Villa, the long-time rebel leader, to submission, if not more important armed opposition. Reports received here were to the effect that men prominent in Mexican political affairs are suspected of preparing to take advantage of the indignation caused by Carranza's death to lead an avenging movement, as did Carranza himself when Madero was assassinated in 1913.

General Calles has failed to effect an adjustment between the new Government forces and Villa. Ignacio Enrique is said to have left Chihuahua Saturday with a strong force to co-operate with other troops in the pursuit of Villa.

Yesterday Luis N. Marones, a confidential agent sent to the United States by Obregon, called at the White House to leave for President Wilson a message signed by Obregon containing reassuring declarations as to the aims of the revolutionists. He expressed the belief that a strong and unopposed government would be established.

OFFER REWARD FOR VILLA

EL PASO, May 25.—The Government of Chihuahua has offered a reward of 100,000 pesos for the death or capture of Villa. Two thousand troops left Chihuahua Sunday to hunt down the rebel chieftain.

CARRIED CASES OF WHISKEY IN HIS AIRPLANE

Pilot Arrived at Des Moines and Sold His Whiskey at \$250 a Case.

DES MOINES, May 25.—Police today searched for an airplane pilot who was said to have landed at a flying field near here yesterday afternoon from Winnipeg, with eighteen cases of whiskey in his plane. He sold the whiskey for \$250 a case within two hours the police said.

The plane left Winnipeg at eight-thirty in the morning and made the 500-mile trip in between seven and eight hours, the police said, they learned. They did not reveal the hiding place of the plane.

IT IS THE DUTY OF EVERY ONE TO ENCOURAGE THE FARMER TO STAY ON LAND—HON. MR. PERREAULT

Minister of Colonization in the Quebec Government Tells of the Vast Lands to be Opened Up — Hon. Mr. Fisher, in Address, Sounds a Warning to People — "Canada is Rich Today. Our Industries are Most Prosperous, Our Trade is Increasing by Leaps and Bounds. Our Agriculture Alone is Not Keeping Pace with the Rest," Says Mr. Fisher.

LARGE and representative audience filled the dining hall of the Chateau Frontenac last night on the occasion of a banquet tendered to the Honorable Mr. Perreault, Minister of Colonization in the Gouin Government. Mr. Perreault had come to Sherbrooke in view of visiting the crown lands in Orford Township, where he went in the afternoon with Mr. J. H. Lemay, M. L. A. Mr. Perreault has granted monies to open thirteen miles of new roads and the building of a school in that area, which lies between St. Elie and Brompton Lake.

The banquet was held under the presidency of Mr. D. O. E. Denault, Mayor of Sherbrooke, and amongst the prominent men present were the Honorable Sydney E. Fisher, Hon. J. E. Perreault, Hon. W. G. Mitchell, Messrs. E. W. Tobin, M. P., J. E. Rheault, M. L. A., C. Desjardins, M. L. A., J. H. Lemay, M. L. A., Alderman Delorme, Alderman Brault, Mayor Clarke, of Lennoxville; Mayor Faith, of Orford; Mayor Nichols, of Assos; Mayor Vimont, of St. Elie; J. W. McKee, president of the Board of Trade; E. W. Farwell, president of the E. T. A. A. and many other Mayors and councillors from different municipalities in the townships.

After the toast to our beloved Sovereign the King, Mr. J. H. Lemay was called upon to present the toast to the guest of the evening. The last member referred to the brilliant career of Hon. Mr. Perreault, to the good work of the Quebec Government, and he thanked the minister for the generous grants given to help colonization in this county.

Young Men Needed on the Farms.

Hon. Mr. Perreault dealt with the problem actually facing our population. He deplored the exodus of the young men from the farm to the city. "It is a duty for every one to encourage the farmer to stay on the land, and the government of Quebec is ready to do its utmost with that end in view."

"A sum of \$5,000,000 was voted at the last session and will be spent to open new roads and help build schools in colonization districts."

"A great enterprise is before us. Quebec has still about 15,000,000 miles of good fertile land that only awaits the hand of the 'tiller' to turn into fine farms. The Gaspé Peninsula, the valley of the Metapédia, the Lake St. John district with the Abitibi and Temiscamingue regions are the domain where the energy of our lovers of the soil can be exercised."

Mr. Perreault spoke both in English and French and was enthusiastically received by all those present.

We Are Facing a Famine.

Mr. E. W. Tobin, M. P., for Richmond-Wolfe, in one of his witty speeches proposed the toast of our country, which was responded to by the Hon. S. E. Fisher.

Mr. Fisher spoke very plainly about the problem of reconstruction. "We are actually facing a distressing situation. The city people are spending lavishly and they do not seem to look ahead at the time when money will be powerless to buy food, because food will be too scarce."

"People should understand that there is no real wealth, but that which produces food."

"Canada is rich today. Our industries are most prosperous, our trade is increasing by leaps and bounds. Our agriculture alone is not keeping pace with the rest."

CLAIM CARRANZA ENDED HIS OWN LIFE—REMAINS LAID TO REST AS REQUESTED BY LATE PRESIDENT

Body of President Carranza, in Accordance with His Oft-Repeated Request9 was Buried in Delores Cemetery, where the Poorest of Mexicans Have for Many Years Found Their Last Resting Place — Report of Doctors Denied Suicide Story.

MEXICO CITY, May 25.—In accordance with his oft repeated request, President Carranza, slain last Thursday morning at Atlixcalangto, was buried late yesterday afternoon in Dolores Cemetery, where in the shadow of Chapultepec, the poorest of Mexicans have for many years found their last resting place.

As the funeral cortege left the home of the late chief executive, the extraordinary session of congress was being called to order to choose a president ad interim, to hold office until a new president, to be elected next September is inaugurated. Aldofo De La Huerta, governor of the state of Sonora, was named after congress had been in session for an hour and a half.

The body of the slain president arrived in Mexico at five thirty o'clock yesterday morning and was taken to a family home, being escorted by soldiers and a delegation from the diplomatic corps. Later the body lay in state until the hour of the funeral thousands passing before the casket to look upon the face of the man who was hurried from power by revolution and whose death occurred under circumstances that await explanation.

Colonel Herrero, leader of the revolutionary forces, on whom has been placed responsibility for the death of Carranza has telegraphed to army authorities here that the president committed suicide rather than surrender. He has offered to come to Mexico City to prove his assertion.

Provisional president Huerta will take the oath of office on June 1 according to present plans. General Enriquez is leading a strong column of troops into Southern Chihuahua where Francisco Villa who recently announced his opposition to the new government is operating. The government has prohibited the sale of liquors containing more than fourteen per cent. alcohol.

Juan Sanchez Ascona, in charge of the foreign office, has sent a note to all foreign diplomats here explaining the reason for the extraordinary session of congress which named the provision president. Virtually the only assertion made is the statement that President Carranza had "rebelled against the constitution."

BELIEVE CARRANZA WAS ASSASSINATED.

(Associated Press Despatch)

VERA CRUZ, May 25.—Reports of an autopsy performed on the body of President Carranza at Atlixcalangto fail to agree with the claim of Colonel Herrero that the president committed suicide rather than be taken captive, it is asserted in official quarters here.

Surgeons who conducted the autopsy, it is declared, found Carranza had been struck by two rifle bullets, one of which penetrated his breast and the other his abdomen. The bullets entered from in front and it was the conclusion of those who witnessed the autopsy.

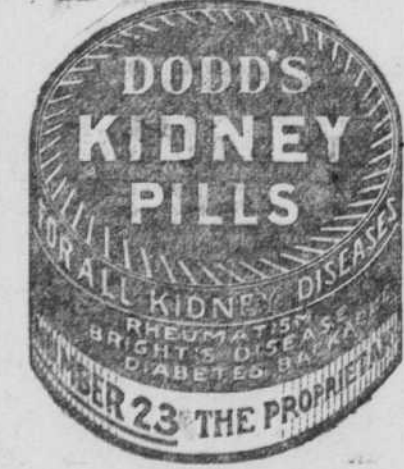

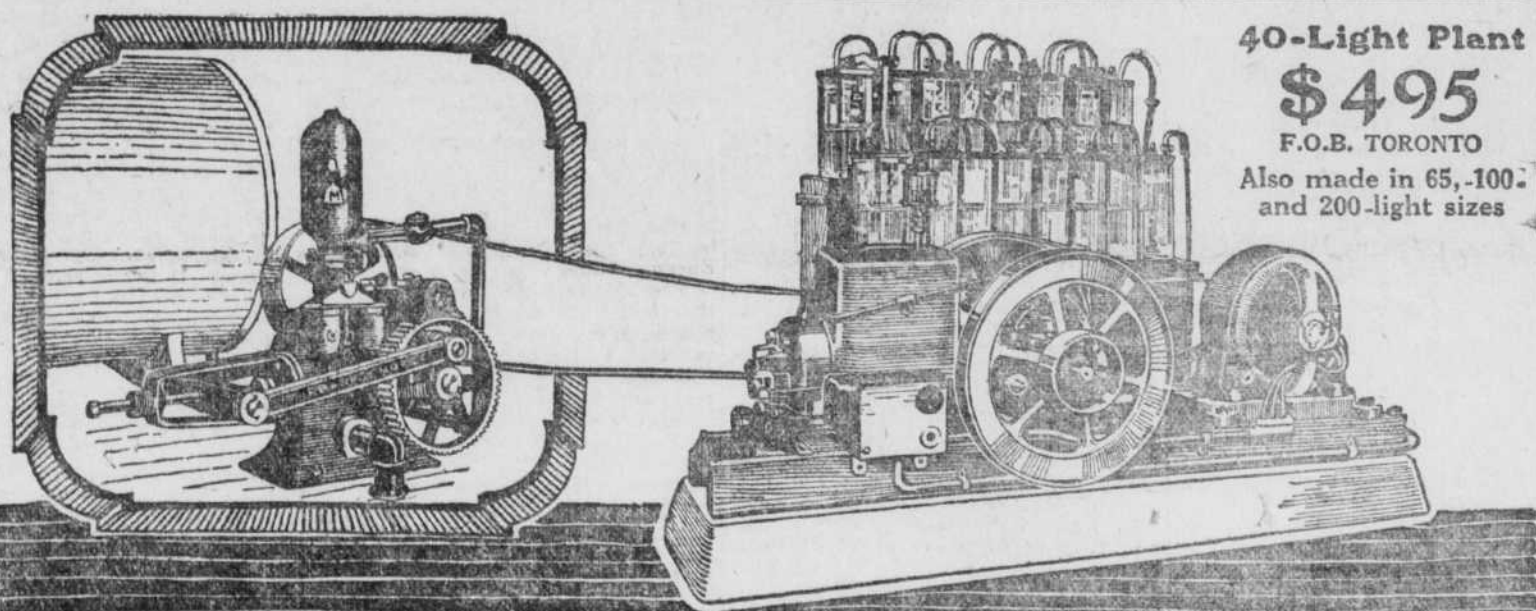

Just think how many happy thoughts would come from the planning of trips to the flower-world, and how many sad faces would brighten at the sight of gift of flowers no matter how simple. How many flower clubs are going to be organized this summer?

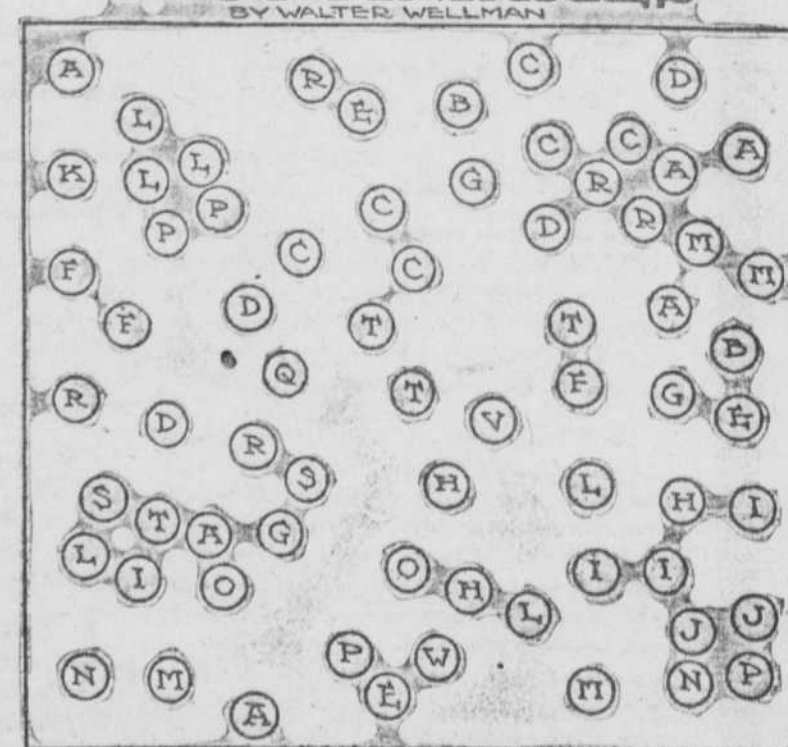

OTTAWA, May 25.—Four of the six wage schedules in dispute between the employers and men in the building trades were awarded at the rates originally asked by the men, in the report of the Board of Conciliation dealing with the dispute, which was returned to the Department of Labor.
The carpenters are awarded eighty-five cents; journeymen electricians eighty cents, five cents less than they demanded; electrician improvers fifty-five cents; roofers seventy cents and roofers' laborers fifty-five cents.

PAGEANT WILL BE ADDED FEATURE OF EXHIBITION

Specialist from Columbus University Was Here Arranging for Grand Historic Pageant, in Which One Thousand Children Will Take Part.

Mr. J. C. Sullivan, Director of Pageantry of the University of Columbus, Columbus, Ohio, was in the city recently making arrangements for a grand historic pageant to be given in connection with the Eastern Townships Exhibition this year. Mr. Sullivan is a noted specialist in this line of work, and has been employed by the American Government to take charge of the many pageants held during the war, including those of the Thrift Stamp and Victory Loan campaigns. Last fall, Mr. Sullivan gave an address to the secretaries of many of the Exhibitions in Canada and the United States on the value of these as an attraction and means of education.

During his visit here, Mr. Sullivan discussed the details of the pageant to be given here. It will, it is stated, take the form of a historical outline of the development of the Eastern Townships from the time of the first United Empire Loyalist settlers to the present time, and one thousand children will take part.

Mr. Sullivan visited the High School and the Notre Dame Convent, and explained the work to the teachers and pupils, receiving hearty support from all. It is proposed to send a trained director from Columbus about six weeks previous to the Exhibition, who will take charge of the work and train the children. Mrs. Sullivan, who assists her husband in the capacity of art and color specialist, will design the costumes. Mrs. LeBaron-Adams has graciously consented to give her assistance to the project.

This will be the first pageant, outside of Quebec Tercentenary, to be held in this province, and a big feature of the Exhibition. A full band of one hundred pieces will be secured for the occasion.

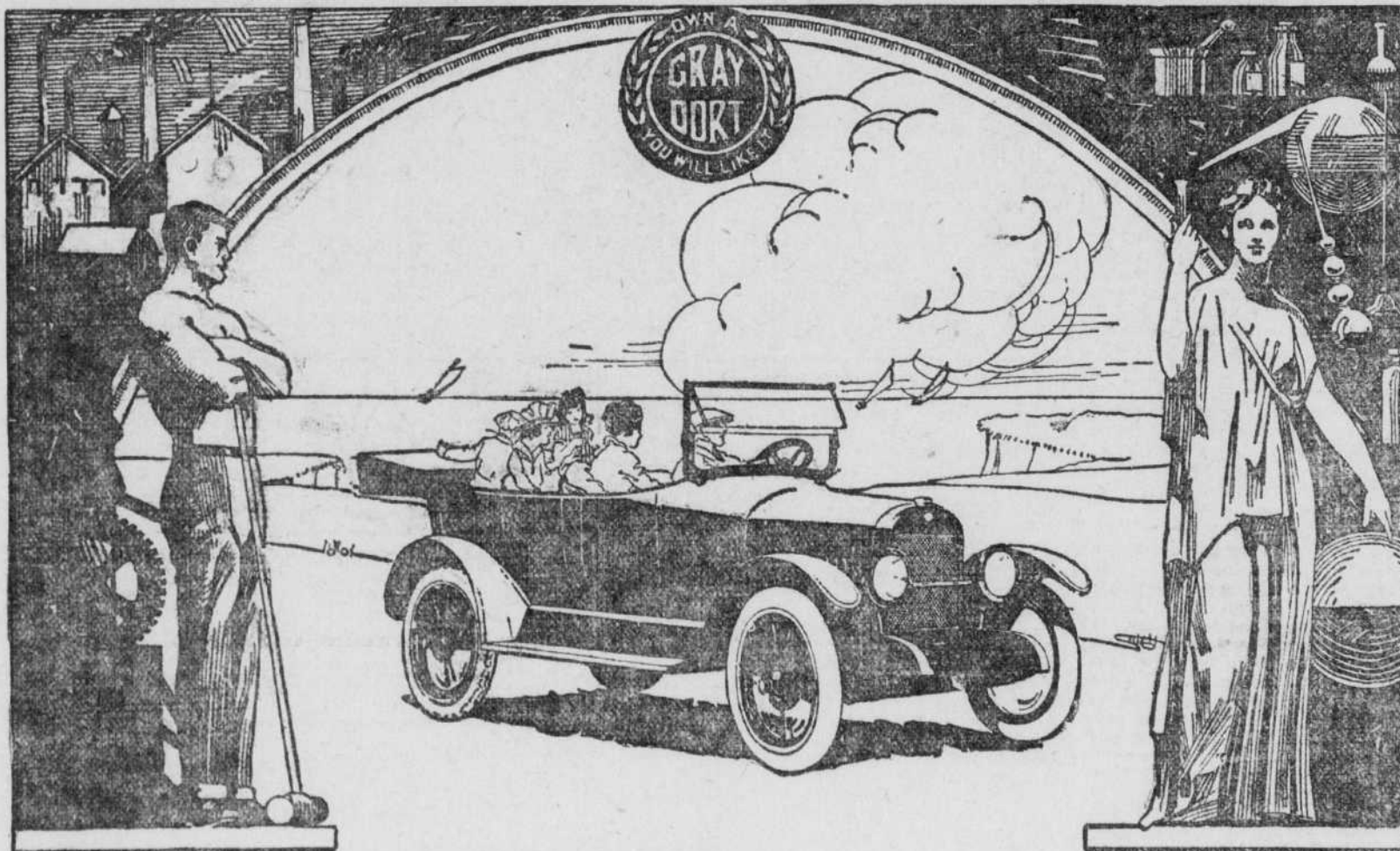

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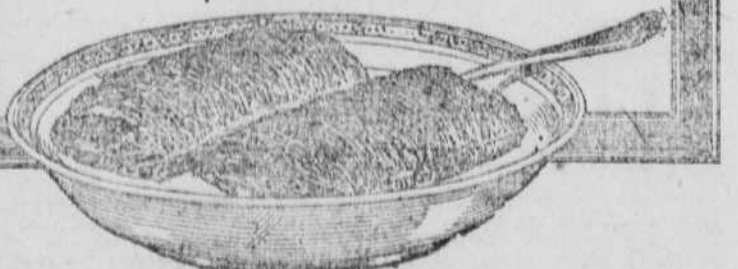

A vote was taken on two meetings previous as to whether a beer canteen should be installed or not, and the result was a unanimous vote against the Association opening this canteen.

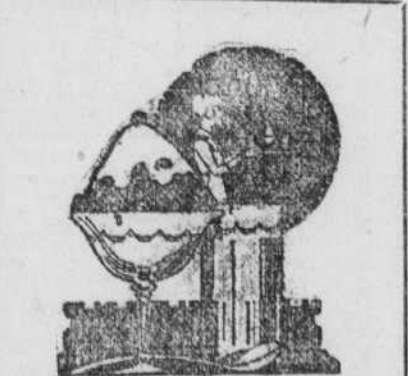
It was arranged to have a theatre benefit night, which takes place this evening, also the drawing of the Victory Bond.

FINES IMPOSED BY MAGISTRATE IN LOCAL COURT

Argument Which Took Place on Street Car is Aired in Court.

Several cases were heard before Judge Mulvany in the Magistrate's Court and fines were imposed in three instances. Probably that of greatest public interest was the charge laid by Mr. George Armitage against Motorman Page. Page admitted that he put Mr. Armitage off the street car, claiming that he was of the opinion at the time that Mr. Armitage had not put in the required tickets and that Mr. Armitage had refused to place another ticket in the fare box when requested to do so.

The defendant pleaded guilty and the court imposed a nominal fine of \$2.00 and costs, on the ground that the assault was only a technical or constructive one and not an ordinary assault, and that the defendant had acted in good faith, and further that the complainant should have taken the precaution of exhibiting his tickets to the conductor and thereby avoiding any misunderstanding.

In the case of P. A. Bissonnet, collector of Provincial Revenue against Silver Spring Brewery, for violation of the Motor Act, defendant pleaded guilty and was fined ten dollars and costs.

In the case of Hilma Tengerstron against George Mahon for assault and battery, the defendant pleaded guilty and was fined \$5.00 and costs or fifteen days in jail.

Frank Shiron laid a complaint against Alexandre Roberge for theft. The complaint was dismissed for want of proof.

Sunday afternoon at St. Peter's Church, during the Children's Service, being the dedication of a memorial tablet to Lieut. Frank Younger, who gave up his life for his country.

The short service was conducted by Rev. E. C. Russell, the lesson read by Mr. C. Hall, and the hymn "Soldiers of Christ" sung, Miss Wiggitt being at the organ.

The choir boys, in their surplices, and carrying their banner, then marched down the centre aisle in procession, followed by the Sunday School children, Rev. Mr. Russell, and several of the teachers, to the lower part of the edifice, the tablet being placed in position on the left wall, near the font. The dedication prayers were said by Rev. H. Reginald Biggs, and the unveiling performed by Mr. W. W. Shaw.

The Rector spoke a few words to the children, in order to impress them with the meaning, and beauty of their service, and bade them to repeat after him the words, "I am to remember that every soldier who fell on the battlefield in France, who died of wounds, or of sickness after coming home, died to save me, and to give me freedom." "Brief life is here our portion," and other hymns were sung, concluding with, "Now the day is over."

The tablet, which is of large size, is of white marble, mounted on an oak base, and being the inscribed of the 5th C. M. R. The inscription in black lettering, reads as follows: "In cherished memory of Lieutenant P. L. Younger, of the Fifth Canadian Mounted Rifles, who died at Sherbrooke, November 30, at the age of twenty-three years and six months. Recorded for valor and his great services in France."

ARREST YOUNG MAN CHARGED WITH MURDER

Faces Charge of Attempting to Murder His Two Uncles in Montreal.

(Associated Press Despatch)
MONTREAL, May 25.—Charged with the attempted murder of his two uncles on the night of April 2 last, and having been at large since that day, Dominico, alias Tommaso Lepore, 17 years old, was arrested here.

Lepore, being accused by his father with the theft of a watch, had fired at him with a revolver and his two uncles, attempting to pacify him, had been shot, one of them dangerously. Altogether it is stated that fifteen shots had been fired, of which three took effect.

The father, who is wanted as a material witness in the affair, is still missing.

THE SINGING IN MONTREAL HEARD AT THE CAPITAL

Audience Heard Singer Many Miles Away by Use of Wireless Telephony.

(Associated Press Despatch)
OTTAWA, May 25.—A large audience at the Chateau Laurier Assembly hall here heard quite distinctly a gramophone played in Montreal and also Miss Hutton singing in that city, over a hundred miles away, by means of wireless telephony. The demonstration was arranged by Dr. A. E. Eve, in connection with an address on "Some Great War Inventions" before the Royal Society of Canada.

The experiment took place at 9.30, and by means of a magna vox the voice of the distant singer was quite distinctly heard in all parts of the hall. The magna vox, however, not only accentuates the sounds coming from the telephone receiver, but also the ordinary noises of a city, and for that reason at times the singing was slightly interrupted. Dr. Eve explained that scientists were endeavoring to so develop the instrument that only the sounds coming from the wire would be heard. Another test was made from a gramophone half a mile away, and that was very distinct. Several members of the audience wore receivers similar to those used by "centrals" at the regular telephone exchange, and they heard the singing from Montreal with absolute accuracy.

TWO OF THE MEN WANTED MADE THEIR ESCAPE

Two of Party of Three Jumped from Window of Hotel at Quebec.

(Associated Press Despatch)
QUEBEC, May 25.—A sensational arrest was made here when at the Clarendon Hotel, just opposite the Central Police station, when Joseph Thabit, of B. auge, led detective Laureau Lacasse to one of the rooms and directed him to arrest Frank Godin, alias Ernest Cyr, on the charge of having robbed him of \$5,000.

While the detective was taking Godin in charge, Lucien Dufour, alias Ludger Quinn, and M. Julien, alias Joseph Groulx, who were in an adjoining room, jumped from the window into the yard and escaped through the adjoining building and disappeared. Warrants had been issued in Montreal recently for the arrest of three men on a complaint lodged against them by Thabit, who alleged that they had robbed him of \$5,000 at the point of a revolver after an exciting card game in which he had won everything.

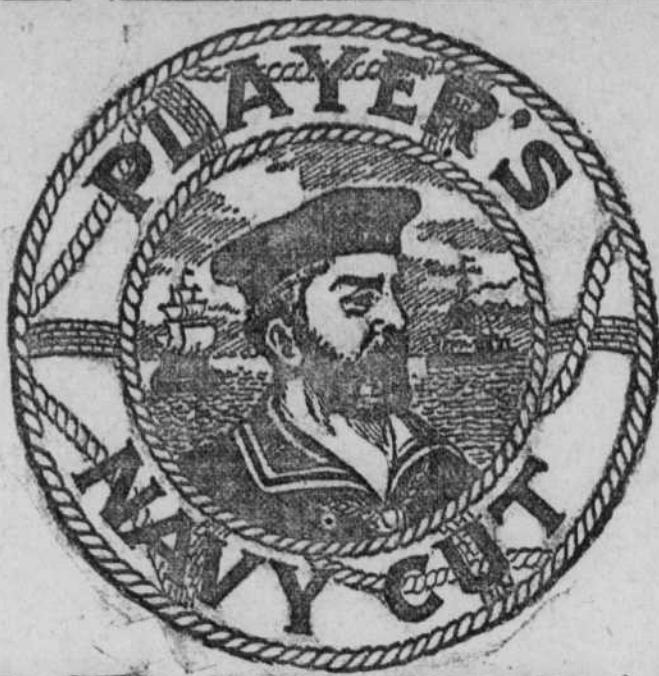
GOLD MEDAL FOR MEMBER FROM ADAMSVILLE

ASSYRIA STILL WORKING FOR HER INDEPENDENCE

Assyrian Archbishop Went to London to Plead for Assistance in Freeing His Country.

LONDON, England.—The Assyrian Archbishop, Seivous Apherom Barsom, was recently in London representing the ancient Assyrian Nation. He came to plead for the independence of his country and the safeguarding of the Christians through Asia during the present political upheaval.

Writing to his Assyrian associates he said: "Now the time has come to meet the most influential men in England. It is difficult to obtain these demands but our efforts shall not cease. I have visited the Houses of Parliament and have become acquainted with those members who really want to free the Christians from the hands of Turkey. The assurance of our growing and we are worthy

to assist us. They are doing their duty nobly. Our hopes of centuries are transforming into the reality that Assyria must be free."

"The following day Bishop Gore visited me. I told him of our desire and need of independence. He also was sorry because of our conditions."

"When I left Paris I did not have much hope about London. But now I am so pleased here with the general situation that I shall not leave until I am certain that matters are fully developed. I want you all to know that we are calling upon our real friends

to assist us. They are doing their duty nobly. Our hopes of centuries are transforming into the reality that Assyria must be free."

GRASSHOPPERS ARE BIG MENACE TO WESTERNERS

Government is Making Move to Fight These Pests on Western Farms.

(Associated Press Despatch)

WINNIPEG, May 25.—The governments of Manitoba and Saskatchewan are fully alive to the danger of the grasshopper menace to the western crops. In Saskatchewan last fall grasshoppers laid eggs in from forty to fifty rural municipalities. The eggs have been examined carefully during the last two weeks by the provincial field experts and a large percentage survived the winter and from three places, messages say the young nymphs are beginning to emerge. The campaign against the pest has been well organized in almost military fashion, even the school teachers and pupils joining in the work with bankers, merchants and volunteers.

The Saskatchewan Government, Department of Agriculture has purchased fifty thousand gallons of molasses, ninety tons of arsenic, one thousand tons of bran and two carloads of lemons, most of which have reached Regina.

Large quantities have already been transported to the needy spots and the cost is being born largely by the municipalities and the Saskatchewan Government in equal shares.

In a case where a municipality refuses to use the bait, there is legislation already passed to employ others to poison the locusts and the cost is charged to the local account.

Unless a good battle is fought, it is probable that in two weeks time 13 varieties of the pest most dangerous may get ahead, these are red legged locust and the clear winged locust now beginning to be hatched.

In Manitoba, the locusts are reported in the Melita district in millions. The few hot days of the past week have caused concern, but there is no need for panic and the hungry state of the hoppers leads the government to think that, as in the State of Kansas, early vigilance will defeat the danger.

SAYS CANON SCOTT WAS ORDERED OUT OF WINNIPEG.

MONTREAL, May 25.—Alderman Heaps, acquitted Winnipeg strike leader, declared in an address here stated that Canon Scott, of Quebec, was ordered out of Winnipeg and put on a train by the authorities during the course of the Winnipeg strike.

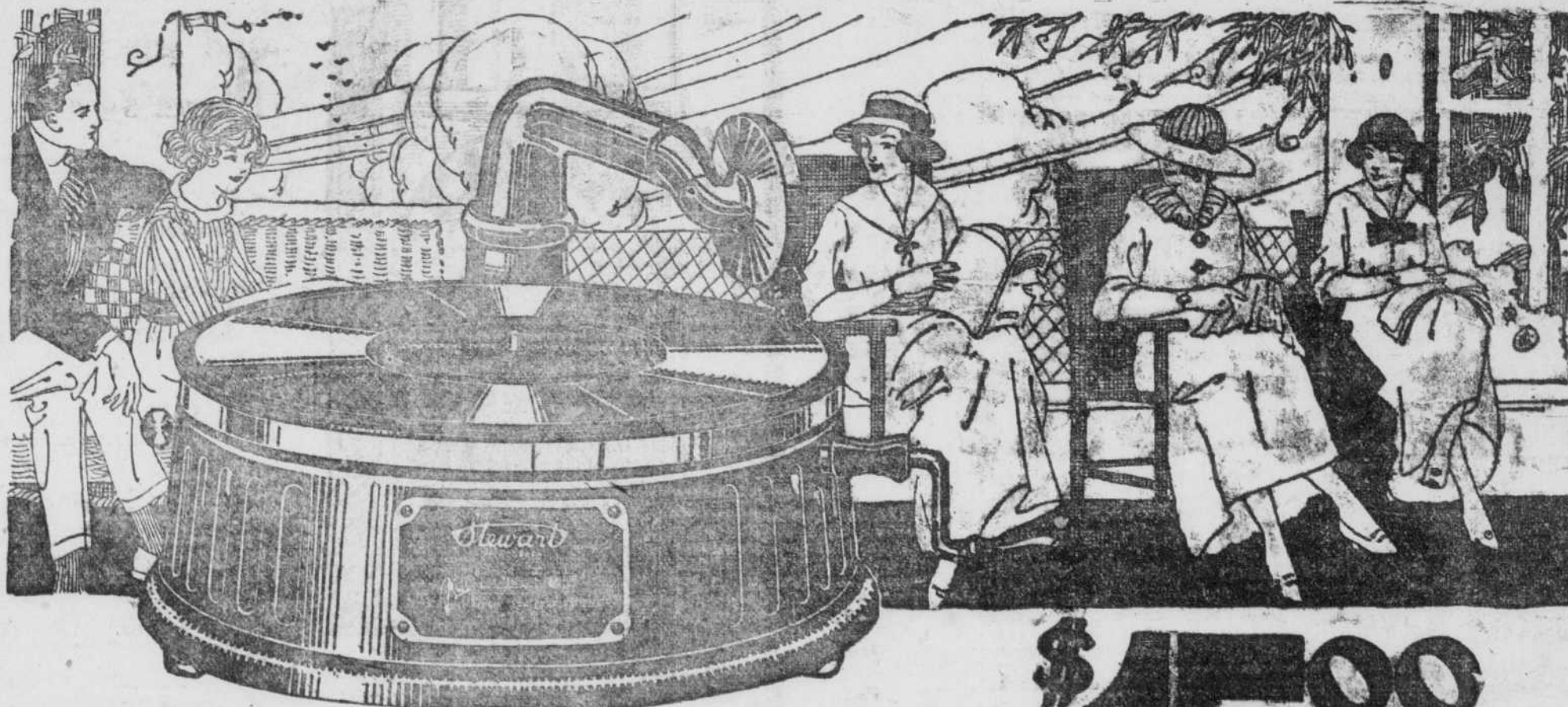

FELSCH ENTERS THE HOME RUN COMPETITION

Johnston, of Cleveland, is Leading the Batters in the American League.

(Associated Press Despatch)

CHICAGO, May 25.—"Happy" Felsch, Chicago outfielder, has entered into competition with "Babe" Ruth, of New York, for the honor of leading in circuit drives in the American League. "Happy" cracked out his fifth homer in the game against Boston on Wednesday, giving him two in two days, and placing him in a tie with the New York slugger. Each has made five homers, according to averages released today and including Wednesday's games. Most of Ruth's home runs were made on the Polo Grounds, where the field is short. Those of the Chicago catcher were long, clean drives.

There is a merry race in the Washington Club between Roth and Rice for the honor of being the leading base stealer. Rice has pilfered eleven bases and Roth ten. "Dy" Cobb, the Detroit star, is gradually finding his batting eye and has boosted his average to .277. Ruth is batting .260.

Johnston, of Cleveland, widened the gap between himself and Jackson, of Chicago, among the batters who have participated in ten or more games. Johnston added a few points to his average of last week, while Jackson dropped a few points. Johnston is topping the list with an average of .417, while Jackson is hitting .380. Other leading batters: Kinney, Philadelphia .364; Gedeon, St. Louis, .364; Gerber, St. Louis, .358; Felsch, Chicago, .352; Hendry, Boston, .349; Jacobson, St. Louis, .348; Sisler, St. Louis, .343; Weaver, Chicago, .343; Dugan, Philadelphia, .337; Beckinbaugh, New York, .328; Spiker, Cleveland, .319.

St. Louis National League Club is in third place in team batting with an average of .260, and is ranked in last place in the percentage of games won and lost, according to averages published today and which include Wednesday's games. Only one member of the club is hitting in the .300 class, and this is Rogers Hornsby, the star keystone sacker, who is the runner up to Nicholson, of Pittsburgh.

Nicholson is leading the regulars with an average of .462, acquired in twenty-four games. Hornsby, in twenty-five games in which he has been at bat 191 times, has cracked out forty-two hits for a total of fifty-seven bases, which include eight doubles, two triples, and a homer or an average of .418. He is being pushed by Heinie Groh, captain of the Cincinnati world champions, who is trailing with .408.

Dode Paskett, the veteran outfielder of the Chicago Cubs, has joined his team mate, Robertson, and Guy Williams, of Philadelphia, for home run honors. The trio is tied with three apiece.

Max Carey, the fleet-footed outfielder of Pittsburgh, is showing the way to the base stealers with nine thefts. His nearest rival is a team mate, Southworth, who has stolen seven.

the operation, that the president had been assassinated, it is said. The text of Colonel Herrero's report to Mexico City was received here last night. The part relative to the attack on Carranza and the latter's death follows: "With the object of arresting Carranza, and the principal officials who were with him, I attacked his camp at three o'clock in the morning, having eighty men with me. He had reached Tlaxcalantongo in the district of Huachinango, where there is a pass leading northward to a park of the Republic, where he had planned to establish his seat of government. The president was under escort of troops commanded by General Murguía.

"When he realized that escape was impossible Carranza committed suicide by shooting himself in the breast with his pistol, which he always carried. So close was the muzzle of the weapon to his breast that blood splattered upon it and the barrel of the pistol still bears blood stains.

"The body was recovered and taken to Villa Juarez. Three of my men were killed and one wounded. (Signed) 'Rodolfo Herrero.'"

REAL CHRISTIAN EFFORTS ARE NOW NEEDED

General Odium, of Vancouver, Makes Statement on His Arrival at Montreal.

MONTREAL, May 25.—Commenting on a despatch from Quebec in which he was stated as saying that there would be another world war within the next decade, General Victor Odium, of Vancouver, interviewed here last night, conveyed the impression that this belief was embodied in a conversation of which it was more the text than the conclusion. He pointed out that the sentiment conveyed in the despatch was intended to give emphasis to the feeling that there was nowdays all the more need for the employment of real christian efforts towards the removal of the hatreds and bitterness engendered by the war.

Cumstances attending the death of Carranza, have reported that in view of the data they have secured and the manner in which the president was killed, they consider it unnecessary to go to Tlaxcalantongo.

I.O.D.E. ANNUAL CONVENTION AT CALGARY OPENS

Proposed Educational Memorial Was Taken Up by Committee at a Private Session.

(Associated Press Despatch)
CALGARY, May 25.—With over one hundred delegates in attendance from all over Canada, as far north as Dawson City, and as far east as Prince Edward Island, the National Convention of the I.O.D.E. opened here yesterday under the chairmanship of Mrs. John Bruce, of Toronto.

The day was spent in addresses of welcome and in formal conference on the work of the Order. The afternoon was entirely occupied with a meeting of the war memorial committee, which was not open to the press.

It was stated afterwards that the committee thoroughly discussed one proposed educational memorial and a full report will be presented later on in the convention.

STATES THAT THE SALMON CATCH HAS DIED DOWN

Predicts Total Destruction of Salmon Fisheries Along British Columbia Coast.

MONTREAL, May 25.—John McMillan, of the Cassiar Cannery, on the Skeena River, B. C., who is now in Montreal, states that the catch of salmon on the Fraser River has died from an annual product of about a million cases, representing from four to eight million dollars; to a product of less than forty thousand cases, representing a few hundred thousand dollars yearly.

With the regulations going into effect next June under which unlimited fishing is to be allowed, Mr. McMillan thinks that there is promise of the total destruction to the salmon fisheries of all the other rivers along the British Columbia Coast.

FRANCE FACING GREAT SHORTAGE OF WORKMEN

Germany May Send Unemployed Men to France, it is Stated.

(Associated Press Despatch)
PARIS, May 25.—Four to five hundred thousand imported laborers are needed urgently in France for the devastated regions, according to the newly created superior council of materials and labor appointed by Jean Ogier, Minister of the Liberated Regions. It is calculated that France's pre-war forces of 1,100,000 builders have been reduced by heavy war casualties, and the adoption of the eight-hour law to the equivalent of about 650,000, which is inadequate. The number commission, which has been functioning unofficially for several weeks, has drawn up a programme to speed work. Reclaimed materials from wreckage will be utilized first, and then material capable of being manufactured on the spot, where it is needed, before bringing in products of other regions, or importing them. The departure of more than 200,000 Germans and the return home of some Chinese laborers have made the shortage of workers more acute. The recent arrival of thousands of Polish laborers brought small relief, and it is considered probable some arrangement will be effected soon by which Germany will send unemployed men to France.

WHITSUNDAY OBSERVED BY ROMAN CATHOLIC AND ANGLICAN CHURCHES

Special Services Were Held at St. Peter's Yesterday.

Whit Sunday, on the day of Pentecost, one of the most important festivals of the year, was observed by the Anglican and Roman Churches in this city, as well as elsewhere, throughout the world. At St. Patrick's Church Holy Communion was celebrated at 8 o'clock and a second celebration at eleven. Morning service was conducted by Rev. H. Reginald Bigg, the Psalms, Collect, and lessons were special, and the "Veni Creator" a hymn which has come down through the ages, with others equally appropriate to the day. The Epistle told the wonderful story of the day of Pentecost, when, as the apostles were assembled "in one place," the humble room where they gathered to worship, "there was heard the sound of a rushing mighty wind, cloven tongues as of fire sat upon each of them, and they began to speak with other tongues as the spirit gave them utterance." The thousands of strangers gathered in Jerusalem heard, each in his own language, from these unlearned, ignorant men of their wonder works of God.

The sermon was preached by Rev. E. C. Russell, on the text from St. John's Gospel, "And I will pray the Father, and He will send for another comforter, and He will abide with you forever."

The discouraged band of men who had followed Jesus Christ in his earthly life were broken hearted at his departure, and scarcely knew what to do, but they believed his promise, and on the day of Pentecost that promise was kept. The Holy Spirit, the comforter came, in tangible form, to abide with them, and with all the members of Christ's Church, forever. They went forth gladly to preach the good tidings of salvation, and even as an earnest and eloquent sermon was given on the meaning

DEMAND BRITAIN WITHDRAW MEN FROM IRELAND

Central Federated Union of New York Passes Resolutions Regarding Ireland.

(Associated Press Despatch)
NEW YORK, May 25.—Resolutions urging the workers of England, Scotland and Wales to exert their political and economic power to the end that their government "withdraw the army of occupation from Ireland and permit its people to peacefully pursue their lives under the form of government which they have lawfully chosen" were adopted at a mass meeting held here last night, under the auspices of the Central Federated Union of New York.

"The world of labor looks with eyes of fixed horror," the resolutions state, "upon the sinister preparations now being made for a supreme massacre in Ireland as evidenced by the despatch of men, provisions and all the horrible implements of murder from England to that unarmed and helpless country. This monstrous crime cannot be consummated unless we become its guilty participant."

Copies of the resolutions will be mailed to representatives of the British labor party and mailed to every international, state and local labor union in the United States and Canada.
