Latest Reports of King's Condition Reverse of Reassuring, Indicating That His Illness Is of Grave and Most Serious Character

Unofficial Report States That His Majesty Has Already Developed Double Pneumonia and is Unconscious---Visitors to Palace This Morning Betray Their Fears---Royal Family Gathered at Bed-side Of Monarch---Queen Alexandra Worn Out With Watching Last Night---Messages of Sympathy Pouring in From All Parts of Civilized World, Expressing Hope For The Best.

London, May 6.—A bulletin issued this afternoon by the King's physicians says His Majesty's symptoms have become worse during the day, and that the King's condition is now critical.

London, May 6.—Canada's loyal millions will learn with profound sorrow that King Edward's condition is far more serious than previously reported. The latest report is that the King is unconscious.

The Canadian Associated Press has heard that a Cabinet Minister has expressed a fear that His Majesty may not survive.

"Very bad," said the Archbishop of Canterbury with a solemn shake of his head as he emerged from the Palace Gate this morning, and was questioned regarding His Majesty's condition.

The King's age and infirmity, and the well-known weakness of the heart, which has caused occasional attacks resembling vertigo during the past two or three years, attributed chiefly to the constant smoking of strong cigars, have served to weaken his power of resistance to disease.

Lord Knollys at 3 p.m. said there had been no change in the King's condition since the morning bulletin was issued. Owing to occasional spasmodic contraction of the throat, endangering the blood-vessels, it is considered necessary to have one of the physicians at the King's bedside constantly.

Queen Alexandra is completely worn out. She was slightly ill when she returned to London yesterday from her Mediterranean cruise. Despite the fact that she was greatly in need of rest, the Queen sat up the entire night with other members of the Royal Family. To-day she retired to her apartments, but not until the physicians had promised to call her in case the King's condition grew more alarming.

The Archbishop of Canterbury telegraphed to all the Bishops of England and Wales this afternoon as follows: "Prayers by the church and people of England are desired on behalf of His Majesty King Edward in his grave illness."

London, May 6.—As the news filters through from Buckingham Palace, alarm gives place to dismay. The eleven o'clock bulletin, signed by five

deemed advisable to call in further medical advice.

There was the nucleus of a crowd outside Buckingham Palace early in the morning patiently awaiting the posting of the official bulletin on the gates of the Palace. Few of them recognized Lord Francis Knollys, the King's secretary, when he drove up in a brougham about nine o'clock. Meanwhile the crowd which had been increasing in numbers every moment, was rewarded at 10 o'clock by seeing the Prince of Wales drive up. He was received with quiet demonstrations of sympathy. He proceeded direct to his father's apartments.

How deeply public interest was concerned over His Majesty's condition was made evident by the number of citizens who stopped at the Palace on their way to their offices in the city, all anxious to satisfy themselves, if possible, as to the latest news from the Royal sick room. They included all classes of people, who eagerly examined the gates to see if any fresh bulletins were expected.

It was a relief to all that the time honored custom of changing the guard was proceeded with as usual. The soldiers entered the Palace yard with their rifle and drum corps playing, which was taken to indicate that there had been no grave development. But that there had not been any improvement was proved when it became known that two additional doctors had been called in. They are Dr. Bertrand Dawson and Dr. St. Clair Thompson, whose names are appended to the latest bulletins.

FEAR HEART TROUBLE COMPLICATIONS NOW.

The Queen was the earliest inquirer as to the King's condition. Inquiries have been received at the Palace for the latest news of their august relative from other members of the Royal family. All five physicians in attendance upon the patient are remaining within call of the sick room.

A correspondent learned that the King's condition was fairly satisfactory during the early part of the night, but 'somehow' about midnight an alarming change occurred. What it was exactly has not transpired, but it is believed that bronchitis has now extended into the lungs, and it is feared that it may be complicated with heart trouble.

The correspondent had a brief interview with Lord Knollys about eleven o'clock this morning. The King's secretary, in reply to a question as to whether His Majesty was better, said: "No, I am very sorry to say, I cannot say that he is. There has been no improvement, and I myself am very anxious."

The Prince of Wales remained with his father barely ten minutes. He then returned with the physicians in order to consult with them regarding the terms of the bulletin.

Callers this morning were very numerous. They included the Archbishop of Canterbury and Princess Christian. The latter went direct to the apartments of Princess Victoria, where she awaited the physicians' report.

KING DID NOT SPEAK WHEN GIVING AUDIENCE.

A special police force has been called out to regulate the increasing crowds in front of Buckingham Palace. There was such a crush of visitors at the regular visitors' door that callers who were anxious to sign the call-book were also received at the so-called diplomats' entrance. Camera fiends commandeered passing carriages in order to secure snap-shots of distinguished callers.

The summoning of Dr. St. Clair Thompson, professor of laryngology

and physician for diseases of the nose and throat in King's College Hospital, is regarded as significant.

The Princess of Wales arrived at the Palace at 1.30 this afternoon and Princess Christian left at about the same time. A correspondent who was watching at the Palace gates and noticing the stream of automobiles and carriages driving up saw the Princess Christian slip through the crush and unnoticed. It was also learned that Sir Edward Cassel, the King's financial adviser, paid a visit of half an hour's duration to the Palace. The Prince of Wales is still inside the Palace.

When Lord Islington yesterday went to kiss His Majesty's hands in farewell on his way to fill his appointment as Governor of New Zealand, he found the King sitting up in a chair covered with wraps. His Majesty did not speak. He had refused to remain in bed and, contrary to the doctors' orders, he determined to carry out his day's appointments. All those who saw Lord Islington cautioned him not to speak to the King, and he did not say a word.

BUSINESS MEN SEND SYMPATHY TO QUEEN.

The next bulletin will be issued at 6.30 this evening. The members of the Royal family at the Palace include Queen Alexandra, the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of Fife, and Princess Victoria. Callers this morning include Mr. Reid, the American Ambassador, the Earl and Countess of Granard, Rufus Isaacs, Solicitor-General, and the Lord Mayor of London, Sir John Knill.

The ordinary congestion outside the Mansion House was intensified by the crowd of city men who were constantly assembling to scan the official bulletin. The Lord Mayor telegraphed Lord Knollys, expressing the concern of the city and requesting that the sympathy of business men be conveyed to the Queen.

RUMORED DOUBLE PNEUMONIA DEVELOPED.

London, May 6.—There is the highest unofficial authority for the statement that the King's illness has already developed into double pneumonia. The Stock Market showed further weakness when this bulletin was issued. The Prince of Wales has not left the Palace during the day. Among the visitors at the Palace this afternoon were Lords Denman, Kitchener, and Strathcona. Notwithstanding the longstanding friendship between these men and the King, they were not admitted to the sick room.

The real seriousness of the situation was indicated this afternoon when a rumor credited to a news agency was set on foot that the King was dead.

There was no confirmation obtainable, and the report was discredited, but it served to startle the city.

VISITORS TO PALACE BETRAY THEIR FEARS.

London, May 6.—An atmosphere of great depression surrounds Buckingham Palace to-day. The bulletin describing the King's condition and which five eminent physicians now in attendance issued shortly before noon, while vague in terms, inspired profound gloom throughout the city. It was generally construed to mean that the outlook is not at all favorable. The suddenness of the transition from yesterday morning, when the King was receiving presentations, to the present when it is believed he is critically ill, has shocked the country. For the moment business and politics are at a standstill.

The first unofficial news given out early to-day indicated an improvement, those with the King having been deceived by the fact that he had rested quietly through the night. The news was received with cheers by anxious crowds gathered throughout the city. This bulletin stated that His Majesty's condition remained much the same, that the patient's examination developed instead of being in better condition, were more seriously affected after the night's sleep than they were yesterday.

Thereupon a bulletin was issued saying: "The King passed a comparatively quiet night, but the symptoms have not improved and His Majesty's condition gives rise to grave anxiety." The day was bright and sunny. Only officials were admitted to the Palace precincts. Early in the afternoon the members of the diplomatic corps called and signed the visitor's book, as did many other prominent personages. All left the Palace betraying by their expressions the fears entertained.

ILLNESS COMES AT DISASTROUS PERIOD.

The prospect of the death or long illness of the Sovereign confronts the country at the worst possible time in years. From a political and other points of view such an outcome would be decidedly disastrous. The greatest constitutional crisis in generations hangs over Great Britain. King Edward is familiar with all features of the situation which would be particularly trying to his successor, who, upon the threshold of his reign, would be called on to deal with the question of enjoining the authority of the Crown to curb the powers of the Feers.

From a social and business standpoint, the monarch's demise would be equally unfortunate. The social season when families are flocking from the country to London and the merchants counting upon a big business, is just beginning, and was expected this year to be the most brilliant of many seasons. The King's death

would throw the court and country into mourning, and end the social activities.

CONSTANT PRESENCE OF PHYSICIAN NEEDED.

As the day wore on, the crowds around the Palace assumed huge proportions, and the police had difficulty in keeping the approaches clear for those having official business. Even the announcement that no more official bulletins would be issued before evening failed to diminish the number of anxious ones who waited for further news.

It was learned at one o'clock that although some of the attending physicians remained close by, their presence had not been required in the sick chamber for some time. This indicated at least that there had been no relapse. What the physicians apparently fear is that they will find some growth on the bronchial tubes necessitating an operation.

It is also known that when the King's throat became affected previously, he was subject to spasmodic contractions of the vocal chords which were rather alarming. In His Majesty's present condition a sudden strain of such spasms on the blood vessels would require likely instantaneous relief. Hence the constant presence of Dr. Thompson, the throat specialist, was called into the case this morning.

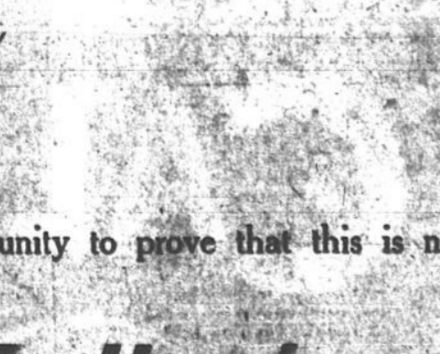

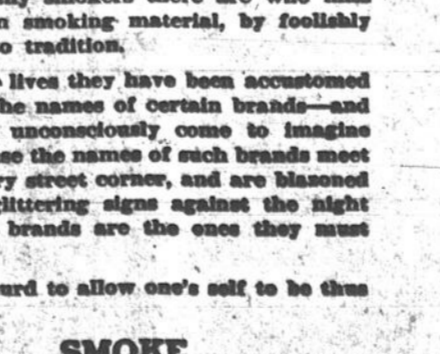

PROROGATION IN THREE WEEKS IS GOVERNMENT PLAN

Much Important Legislation Remains to Be Dealt With Before Legislature Closes.

Special Staff Correspondence.

Quebec, May 6.—Fears are being expressed by many members of the Legislature that owing to the tendency to rush the present session to an early close, some of the most important measures introduced in the House may not be adopted in time for prorogation. On every side there are signs of rush orders to dispose of legislation as soon as possible. Saturday morning sittings of the House will commence to-morrow, and there will be three sittings every day just as soon as the members of the Private Bills Committee have finished their work.

But with all possible haste, it is likely that the session will last about three weeks longer owing to the number of public bills that have yet to be discussed in detail.

The Montreal Bill.

The Montreal Bill alone will occupy about two weeks more before it passes the final stage in the Upper House. It will take several days to reprint it owing to the multitude of long amendments that have been incorporated in it before the Private Bills Committee. City Attorney Ethier, of Montreal says he will remain in Quebec to-morrow and Monday to superintend the reprinting himself, and he promises to have the revised bill ready for the House by next Wednesday. Long speeches and discussion over the bill will then commence.

Dual Language Bill.

Important measures will be discussed in the Upper House during the balance of the session. For several weeks the councillors have had Mr. Lavergne's dual language bill before them, but they have shown no tendency to approach it. The Nationalists are becoming alarmed over this and threaten all kinds of criticism if the bill meets a fate similar to last session, when it was squeezed out of prorogation night.

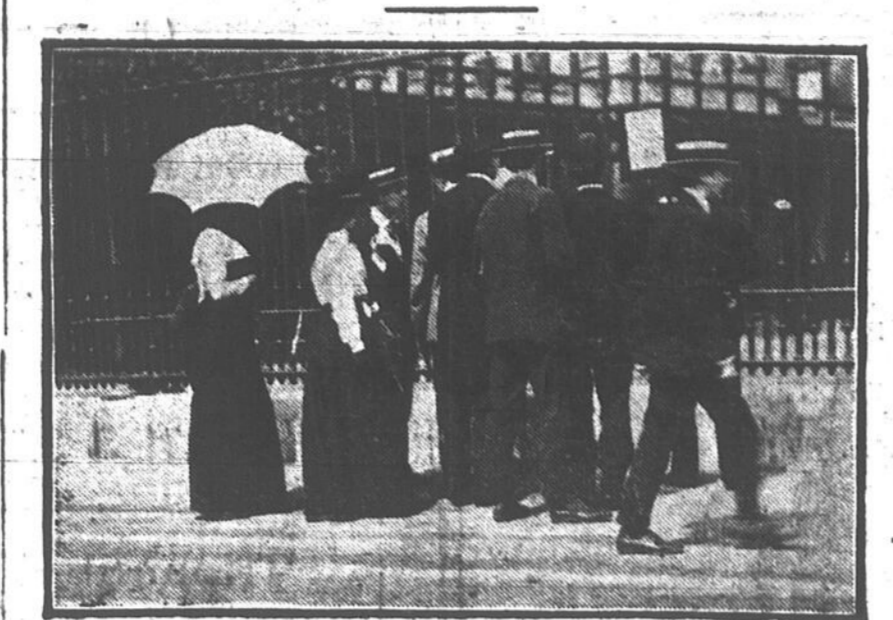

CARTAGO WAS DESTROYED BY EARTHQUAKE

At Least Five Hundred Lost Their Lives in Their Ruined Homes

Other Central American Towns Were Shaken, But Escaped With Little Damage.

Special to The Montreal Star. New York, May 6.—A cable to the Herald from Managua, Nicaragua, says:

Cartago the picturesque and ancient capital of Costa Rica was destroyed by an earthquake Wednesday night. Two hours after the first shock was felt an immense meteor passed over the Costa Rican-Nicaragua frontier, leaving a luminous track for about ten seconds. This phenomenon caused great fear among the residents of the where news of the earthquake probably will not be received for weeks because of inadequate telegraphic facilities.

Reports have been received from various cities in the five Central American republics that earthquake shocks were felt at about the same hour. Cartago was destroyed. At Greytown, Nicaragua, the shock lasted for more than ten seconds, and was rather severe, although no damage is reported. Several towns along the San Juan River reported that windows were broken by the shocks.

Panic reigns in Cartago, but the search for those buried beneath the ruined buildings continues. Refugees who have reached San Jose are clamoring for help from the Government and municipality.

Cartago's population is estimated at about 12,000 and of this number, it is believed from despatches received here, that fully six thousand are dead, wounded, or homeless. It is impossible with the articles at hand, to attempt to give any estimate of the damage to property, but it is known that the loss will reach several million dollars. Earthquake shocks on April 29th last, caused terror in San Jose and Cartago. Although these shocks caused considerable damage to property, no lives were lost, however.

Efforts are now being made to restore telegraphic communication, with the stricken city, and until this is done more complete details of the earthquake cannot be obtained.

It is known, however, that the earthquake has been the most disastrous, both as to the number of lives lost, and property destroyed, that has been experienced in Central America in years.

DAMAGE AT SAN JOSE SLIGHT.

That the effects of seismic movement were felt in San Jose, capital of Costa Rica, are the latest advices received in Managua. Damage there, however, is thought to have been slight. Some buildings were damaged, but no deaths are reported in that city. It is reported that a few persons were slightly injured.

Refugees from Cartago continue to pour into San Jose. Scores of foot-sore men, women and children reached the capital late last night. Many carried in packs upon their backs all their worldly possessions. Their homes and all their property had tumbled into ruins, and they had barely escaped with their lives. All reports of disaster which have been received in San Jose have been brought by refugees, and because of these meagre reports the greatest alarm prevails in the streets of the capital.

The Cartago refugees arriving here from San Jose say, the shock came without warning, just at the hour when practically all residents of the city were gathered at their homes after the day's work.

Three Hundred Bodies Recovered.

San Juan del Sur, Nicaragua, May 6.—Reports received from San Jose, Costa Rica, today, state that no habitable houses remain in Cartago. Three hundred and fifty bodies have been recovered from the ruins.

Martial law has been declared in the stricken town to prevent disorders and looting. The authorities are making every effort toward the relief of the injured and destitute. The victims who survived their in-

MORE POWERS NOT NOW TO BE EXPECTED, SAY CONTROLLERS

Influences at Quebec Too Powerful for Them—Real Estate Tax Must Be Increased.

From statements made by the Controllers today it would appear there is but little likelihood that the Board of Control will be given much greater powers than they now possess. "I must admit," said Controller Wanklyn, "that a majority of the legislators at Quebec seem against demands that the Board of Control should be able to get an amendment passed making it incumbent on the City Council to get a two-thirds vote before amending reports of the Controller; but this was voted down at Quebec. This was done despite the fact that the Legislature felt that public opinion in Montreal is strongly with the Controller. I am sure the Board of Control did not desire any powers but what were deemed in the public interest."

MORE TAXATION. Controller Wanklyn also said—"There will be no outcome of all these new annexations which have been ordered, and that is the tax on real estate will have to be increased. This will not be a popular move, but it cannot be shirked any longer. By annexing all these new places the city is adding enormously to its debt. The present income of the city will not meet the new obligations."

PRaises for Premier Gouin. Controller Alney, who has returned from Quebec, said he had nothing but praise for Premier Gouin for the way he had fought to get the Controllers increased powers. There was still a chance that the Controllers might win before the Upper House. He was of the opinion that the Premier was making a mistake in not giving the Controllers power in regard to the two-thirds vote.

THE ALDERMANIC POINT OF VIEW.

Ald. Tetreau, who has also been at Quebec, had some light to throw on the subject as to why the legislators were against the Controllers. He was of the opinion that the Controllers feel that the present City Council should be given one year's time to show that they mean well. I should like to see the Controller's report on this matter. The Controller is willing to say that a two-thirds vote of the members present should be necessary in order to amend reports of the Controller; but the Controller would not accept this; they wanted the two-thirds vote to be of the entire Council. To this demand the aldermen would not consent. The aldermen are anxious to prove that if they are not bereft of important privileges they will not abuse them. This will be proven in the very near future.

Megantic Centenarian's Birthday.

Special to The Montreal Star. Sherbrooke, Que., May 6.—Mr. Peter Hamilton, of Ardery, Megantic Co., celebrated his one hundredth birthday yesterday. He is still hale and hearty.

Juries are being removed to San Jose, 14 miles distant. Dr. Juan Ulloa, consul of Costa Rica to the United States, received the following cablegram from the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Signor Ricardo Ferdinand, at San Jose:

"Earthquake last night destroyed Cartago. There are several victims. Other nearby cities have escaped without loss of life."

Cartago, capital of Cartago province, lies at the foot of Irazu volcano, about 14 miles from San Jose. It has an estimated population of 10,000, and is the seat of the Central American Peace Court. Cartago frequently has suffered from earthquakes, and was partially or in great part destroyed in 1723, 1803, 1825, 1841, 1851 and 1854.

SAILORS USE KNIVES ON ONE OF THEIR MATES

One Unarmed Fought for Life Against Three Armed.

John Robinson, of the Ionian, Wharfed Four Times at Donaldson Street, and May Not Live.

In the fore-castle of the Allan Line steamship Ionian, Able Seaman John Robinson lies dangerously wounded as a result of a stabbing affray in the vessel's lower hold. He received three knife thrusts in the back and one just below the heart. His assailants, three ordinary seamen, have the ship and are now being hunted by the local police, and an Allan Line detective.

Shortly before twelve o'clock last night the Ionian was bound for a run on deck, he saw Robinson lying on the deck with blood flowing freely, and at the same time three shadowy figures darted down the forward gangway and disappeared into the hold. Ship's Doctor Sinclair was summoned immediately. He dressed the wounds, and Robinson was laid in his bunk. Then a general search was organized for the ordinary seamen, Crawford, Rose and McKearney, who, Robinson said, were his assailants. The latter had a quarrel yesterday with Robinson.

Although practically the whole deck crew took part in the hunt around the sheds for the escaped seamen, nothing was seen of them. This morning the Allan Line detective and the local police were notified.

Wounded Man's Story.

In the fore-castle, surrounded by his mates, who were present against the doctor's wishes, because Robinson is very weak, the wounded man told the story. He said the result of the attack on him lay in a quarrel that took place near the galley yesterday morning, where he was working with McKearney. Words, hot and angry, were exchanged between the two men over a difference as to how washing should be done, and Robinson relates that McKearney made a motion as if to strike him with a bottle. He turned over him, in protection, so he asserts, he turned the hose on the irate seaman.

Robinson declared this morning that he promptly forgot all about the matter. In the evening he donned his shore clothes and decided to fly by the forecastle of the Salacia, which sails from Glasgow, the home port of the Ionian.

He was before twelve he returned. He was walking up the extreme forward gangway when suddenly, he claims, Crawford appeared, and struck him with his big jack-knife. At the same time the other two seamen, Rose and McKearney, were thrust between his back and blades were thrust between his shoulders. Fighting desperately for his life Robinson with a big effort threw the controller struck out, and made a blow at the man in front.

"If they find Crawford you will discover he has the mark of my fist on the forehead," Robinson said. "After I hit him, I shouted loudly for my mates, and the three men ran away." Almost Overboard.

The able seaman then said that in the darkness he nearly fell between the ship and the dock side. Creeping up the gangway, momentarily getting weaker, he gained the deck, and sent up another feeble cry for help, which reached the ears of the doctor, and brought immediate succor.

Officers this morning searched all the sailors' haunts without discovering the controller. It is thought they will attempt to gain passage to the upper lakes and a close watch is being kept on all vessels bound west. When word reaches the police this morning that two arrests were made, and the men in jail, it was thought they were part of the gang concerned in the robbery at the dock side. Robinson, but John Graham and Geo. Roberts, late of the Ionian, were merely hauled up on charges of desertion by Harbor Detective Espar.

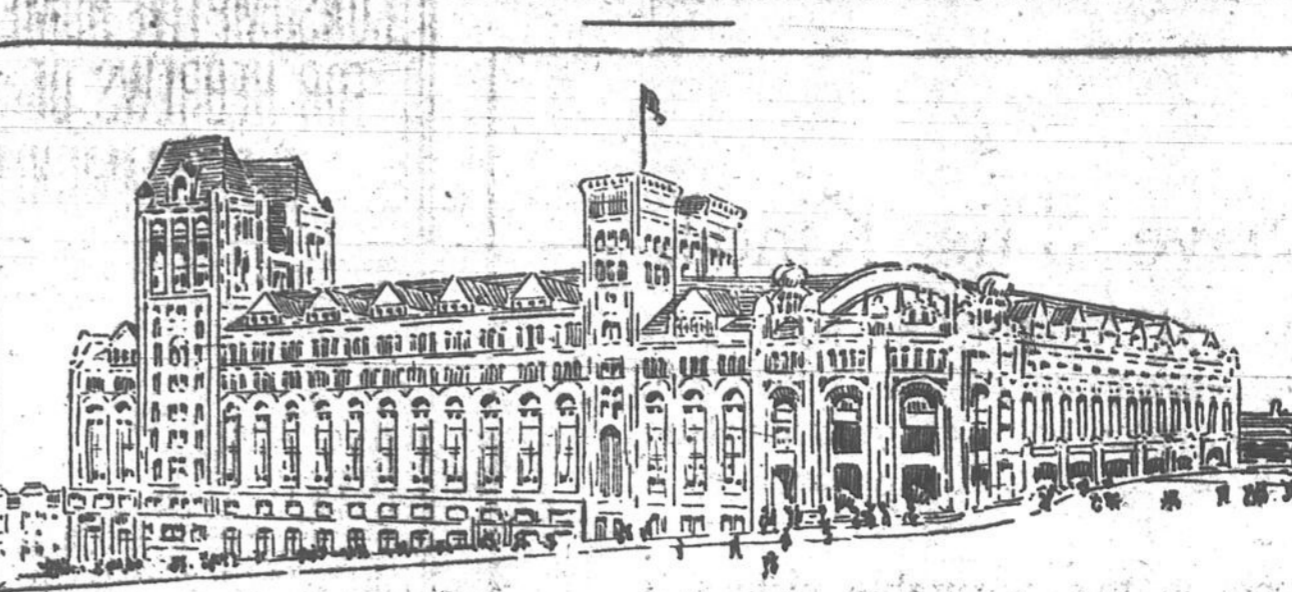

THE NEW WINDSOR STATION.



The completed plans of the remodelled and greatly extended station and headquarters of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Windsor Street have at last received the approval of the executive, and with the foundation work now completed are to be called for with a view to putting the work in hand immediately.

Since the first plan of the new building was published in the Star some months ago considerable and important alterations have been made in the details, and the picture published in to-day's Star represents the final plan approved by the executive.

It will be noticed that while the general style of architecture of the present building will be preserved, the building itself will be remodelled almost out of recognition. A new and most imposing entrance will be built at the corner of Windsor and Osborne streets, and as this will face immediately upon Dominion Square, it will conform much more to the general decorative scheme of the neighborhood than the present entrance facing upon Osborne st. et. Another imposing entrance will be provided at the corner of the station and St. Antoine streets.

One of the great features of the new building will be the twin towers near the St. Antoine street end. It will be noticed from the picture that while these towers will not have a much greater altitude than those on the upper end, they will be taking advantage of the big dip in the hill, actually form by far the highest skyscraper building in the city, no fewer than fifteen stories being shown on the plans. These two towers alone would form a magnificent office building, for office accommodation in them has been as much a consideration as decorative effect.

The whole scheme, with its attendant viaduct now in process of construction, will cost at least \$4,000,000.

ALARM CLOCKS AT PREMIUM AT C.P.R.

Daylight Saving Scheme of 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Instead of 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. is in Effect.

It was to-day definitely decided to put the proposed daylight saving plan in force in two of the largest departments in the Canadian Pacific headquarters. In the freight-traffic department, which is under Mr. G. M. Howarth, an order will accordingly be issued that all members of the staff start work at eight o'clock in the morning instead of nine leaving at five instead of six in the evening, and at twelve o'clock instead of one on Saturday.

In the accounting department, Mr. I. G. Ogden has given orders that the staff start work at eight o'clock in the morning instead of nine leaving at five instead of six in the evening, and at twelve o'clock instead of one on Saturday.

Although the employees have enthusiastically advocated such a change, there is considerable apprehension among them now that the change has actually been decided on. CONSUMPTIVE HOME FOR HEBREWS OF THE COMMUNITY

Two Hundred Acre Farm Purchased Yesterday at Ste. Agathe—Temporary Home to Open.

A Hebrew Consumptive Hospital, to cost \$30,000, is to be erected at Ste. Agathe des Monts, active work beginning in a few weeks.

Seven prominent Hebrews, knowing the dire want of suitable quarters for consumptives of their own race, have subscribed the \$30,000 required to build the institution in which the patients can be treated satisfactorily. These gentlemen are Messrs. Mark Workman, Mortimer B. Davis, J. A. Jacobs, N. Vineberg, A. Pierce, A. Mendelsohn, and Mrs. Woolsey, widow of Mr. Samuel Woolsey. It is the intention of these gentlemen when the hospital is completed, furnished and in full running order, to present it to responsible members of the Hebrew community to operate it. It is to be sustained by the community at large.

There are at present sixteen consumptives at Ste. Agathe, but as they are lodged in all sorts of quarters, wherever spare space could be obtained, the majority are as badly off as if they were in the city. They are shut up and cannot get the air. It is to give air and pure, wholesome food that the hospital is being undertaken. Besides the patients at Ste. Agathe there are others in the city who are unable to get proper treatment on account of the lack of accommodation. Mr. A. Pierce, who is one of the gentlemen taking active part in the work of inaugurating the institution, said to a representative of The Star to-day that work will be pushed ahead as rapidly as possible.

The site for the hospital was bought yesterday. It is one and a half miles east of St. Agathe at Prefontaine Mills. The site is attractive and is on an elevation, commanding a good view of the surrounding country. The ground comprises 200 acres, and on it is a frame house of eight rooms and another of six rooms.

These premises are being converted into quarters to accommodate patients for the time being. The buildings are being rapidly renovated and painted, and to-day a car load of beds, mattresses, bed-room suites for nurses, and also cows and chickens, have been conveyed to the temporary quarters. The place will be inhabitable by Tuesday at the latest. Mr. Pierce said that the temporary home will accommodate at least twenty-five patients, and as soon as they get the beds set up the patients will be allowed to take possession.

In regard to the permanent hospital plans and specifications are being prepared. The first part of the work is in the hands of Mr. Mortimer Davis, Mr. J. A. Jacobs and Mr. Mark Workman. They expect to have everything prepared within a couple of weeks or more, for they are anxious to have active building operations begun by the first of June. At all costs the building is to be completed by the fall of the year. The style of the new home will be after the institution for Hebrew consumptives at Denver, Colorado. This institution cost one million and a half dollars. This style will be copied on a smaller scale to come within the bounds of the subscribed \$30,000.

TWO HUNDRED MEN PERISHED IN COAL MINE

Half of Male Population of Palois, Alabama is Entombed

Little Hope Entertained by Rescuers Owing to Density of Black Damp.

Palois, Ala., May 6.—Forty-five white miners and 150 negroes were entombed in Mine No. 2, owned by the Palois Coal and Coke Company, last night as the result of a terrific explosion.

The flames from the explosion shot 200 feet into the air and the shock was felt for miles. Timbers were hurled several hundred feet from the mouth of the mine. Rocks from the roof caved in and made access difficult.

The little mining village of Palois is in mourning to-day, for more than half of its population is believed to have perished as the result of the explosion.

About 200 men, 45 white, and 150 negroes are thought to have been killed. Eleven bodies have been found. In the 200-foot level, the greatest number of men were working and there it is expected most of the bodies will be found.

Coming so soon after the disaster in the mine at Julga, Ala., where forty-one men lost their lives last month, the disaster has spread consternation in the mining villages in this section. Many miners who escaped the first district had come here to work and several of them lost their lives yesterday.

The black damp which filled the mine soon after the explosion, and from which it is thought that those who escaped death by explosion died, is being rapidly dispelled, and as the rescue parties are equipped with oxygen helmets and other paraphernalia necessary for entering a gaseous mine, it is hoped that all of the bodies will be brought to the surface to-day.

Numerous cave-ins in the mine were caused by the explosion, and the families of the entombed men are hoping that some may have found refuge from the deadly after gas, behind these. Mine experts here hold out no such hope, saying that it is impossible that there are any alive.

The cause of the explosion has not been definitely determined, but it is supposed to have been due to a miner entering a gas pocket with a lighted lamp.

Daybreak found scores of women and children in the mouth of the mine, waiting anxiously for news from those below. All night they kept up their vigil in hopes that some of the miners might be found alive.

C.P.R.'S RAIL SYSTEM IN OTTAWA TO BE LIKE WASHINGTON'S

Means a Saving of Twenty Minutes by All Trains Between Montreal and the West.

The present plans of the Central Station at Ottawa will not be in any way interfered or encroached upon by the scheme announced in yesterday's Star by which the Canadian Pacific Railway will revolutionize its rail system in that city.

This, at any rate, is the statement made by Mr. D. McNeill, the vice-president, who says that the tunnel which the company proposes to construct, 49 feet below the ground from the Central Station to the Union Station will add to the importance of the Central Station rather than detract from it.

It has been no secret that for a long time past the company has been dissatisfied with the entrance and passage through Ottawa. Indeed, the inconveniences have been such that the company has seriously considered running some of its trains between Montreal and Western Canada via Smith's Falls, thus avoiding Ottawa altogether.

The present route through the Capital involves the use of another railway, a long detour through Hull; an inconvenient location for changing engines, and a forward and backward movement at Union Station.

By the new plan all these inconveniences, Mr. McNeill states, will be done away with, and twenty minutes will be saved by all through trains—a highly important factor in view of the immense importance of the company's transcontinental traffic, a good deal of which is connected with steamships on the two oceans.

Rearrangement of the company's system in Ottawa to that recently completed in Washington, where all the local trains run into a station on the high level, while alongside are depressed tracks on which all through trains, after stopping at the station, proceed underneath the city to the station on the low level. Mr. B. proposes to do at Ottawa, by running its trains along a section of the bed of what is now the Rideau Canal, and thence through a tunnel across the city. This arrangement does away entirely with the level crossing feature. Further, under this scheme all trains will use both stations. The scheme, it need hardly be said, will be a costly one; Mr. McNeill says the tunnel alone, which is through rock, will cost a million dollars.
