

Impressive Rites Marked Funeral for D. L. Howard

The funeral of D. L. Howard, 331 Clarke Avenue, Westmount, and a resident of the district for many, many years was held from the Church of the Ascension of Our Lord, Westmount, last Saturday, morning.

At the time of his death on Wednesday, June 6th, Mr. Howard was President and General Manager of Canadian Overseas Telecommunications Corporation, a position he occupied on appointment by the Government when the Crown-owned Corporation was established early in 1950.

Requiem High Mass was sung by Rt. Rev. Wilfrid McDonagh, with Rev. Fr. D. J. Feron as Deacon and Rev. Fr. Lionel Stanford, S.J., as Sub-Deacon.

Former Resident, Died In London

On June 5, 1951, in London Ont., a former resident of Westmount passed away in the person of Capt. George A. Bell, who for many years in Montreal and later in London, Ont., was connected with the Gutta Percha and Rubber Co., and at the time of his death was with the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, London, Ont.

Capt. Bell was a veteran of World War I having been a member of the First Militia Unit in Canada to leave their headquarters fully equipped and at full war strength for the mobilization camp in August 1914. This was No. 5 Field Ambulance, C.A.M.C., Montreal.

While overseas his work with the Canadian Army Medical Corps was as strenuous and varied as it was outstanding and ranged all the way from driving and extricating heavy duty motor ambulances from deep and sticky mud to administrative duties in the larger active-service hospitals.

It was not mere coincidence that members of his unit always associated duties calling for exceptional energy and ability with Capt. Bell. He received his commission in France and before returning to Canada he married Nursing Sister Lee R. Thompson, C.A.M.C., who survives him with their three daughters and one son, who is a Group Captain in the Royal Air Force. A sister, Mrs. H. C. Shaw, resides at 148 Abbott Avenue, Westmount.

Baseball Was Topic At Weekly Rotary Luncheon

In modest fashion Walter Alston, manager of the Montreal Royals Baseball Club, told Westmount Rotarians that it would be silly to say his club was going to finish the season on top of the league.

This strapping six-footer who has made baseball his life career was introduced by "Shag" Shaughnessy, president of the International Baseball League, as the manager of the best and most colorful team to watch in the league.

Mr. Shaughnessy told the Rotarians that while the Rochester Red Wings had a better team on paper it was the Royals that provided the color and came through in the clinches.

"If I could put baseball uniforms on every one of you," Mr. Alston told the meeting, "and take you down to the clubhouse for a chat on the last game I would feel better at ease than standing here in front of you."

Speaking of interest in baseball on the part of Montrealers, he said that the enthusiasm of fans here had made him feel at home and want to never leave.

A lot of young boys wanted to get into the "base ball racket" and if they had anything on the ball they were given a chance. Players were picked by hundreds of scouts who relied on the tip-offs of lesser "bird dogs," guys who watched all the high school games for likely prospects.

He spoke of the training system carried on by the Royals' parent club, the Brooklyn Dodgers, saying the prospects were sent to camp for training and screening in the Spring.

"It used to be the young fellow starting out had a tough time of it. One mistake and he got hell and was sent home."

In the training camp the boys were given systematic training starting off in the morning with lectures, calisthenics then practice groups on the field. Afternoons were devoted to games where the boys were divided into teams playing with boys their own age and ability.

Before a boy got "thumbs

down" it had to be unanimous from all the trainers in the camp. If one person still had faith in his ability he would be carried on.

Mr. Alston spent a good part of his speech describing the intricate system of signals employed by managers with their players. He said each player had different signals.

With the Royals in first place now he stated there was plenty to be pessimistic about with Shuba in the hospital, Morgan in a batting slump, kinks in the base running, a pitcher lost to the Dodgers, other players with bad knees and hands.

"But we'll do the best we can and give Montrealers the kind of baseball they like."

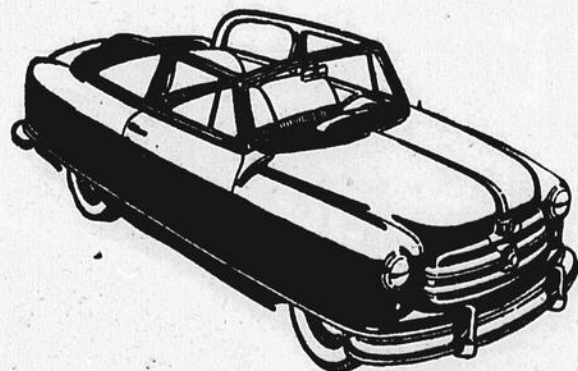

I Remember

A series of articles by a retired coach and physical director recalling great athletes and great teams. Mr. Smith was connected with Westmount High teams for 28 years and also at McGill.

The position I occupied at Westmount High was slightly different to the rule that applied in other schools on the Island.

At W.H.S. I was responsible for the coaching of the three teams, Juniors, Intermediates and Senior A's in all sports. While to some this might seem to have been a handicap, in my opinion it had its advantages, it permitted me to develop the boy from 14 years old up to graduation and to know his weakness and his strength.

My system of coaching calls for special emphasis on teaching of fundamentals and the elimination of faults and allow the boy to develop his strength and skill in a natural way. As an example of this, take

Lewis, president of the board, accompanied by his wife and H. C. Nourse. Those attending from the staff will be N. A. Millington, executive secretary of the Branch, and C. A. Buckley, physical director.

Prominent Speakers

Seven great plenary sessions will be addressed by outstanding North American leaders. Reading like a page from "Who's Who" is the list of convention speakers: The President of the United States; the Prime Minister of Canada; Dr. Ralph W. Sockman, prominent minister and radio preacher; Paul Douglas, the outstanding U. S. Senator from Illinois; Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, Executive Director, Department of Trusteeship, United Nations; Paul G. Hoffman, Executive Director of the Ford Foundation; Dr. John Oliver Nelson, Yale Divinity School; Dr. Clarence W. Cranford, Minister, Calvary Baptist Church, Washington, D.C.; Dr. John R. Under the captaincy of Jim Peters with John Porter, Big Doug Heron, chunky Bill Nickolson, Lyle Prescott, Tom Finical and our colored whiz, Bob Lord, alternating on the half line, with cagy Ross Curtis calling the signals at 9. And what a line, Vern Murray, Snap, flanked by Bill Read, Bruce Chisholm, Greg Harrison, Bob Tilden while hard driving Donny Drennan and Corny Strachan played the outsides. Alternating with the above, Ross Common, Shorty Fairhead, Bill Frass, Doug Philips and others.

An incident showing the spirit of this team in the only game we lost that season. M.H.S. being on the long end of the score. Bruce Chisholm dislocated his left shoulder and after I had given him first aid and reduced the injury, we had to almost tie him down to keep him from getting back in the game.

That loss was a God-send as the boys realized you needed more than a purple and white sweater to win games and they settled down and didn't lose a game after.

After graduation practically every member of that team joined some branch of the armed services. On their return to civilian life a large number starred on the McGill Varsity teams. In football and hockey, John Porter, Doug Heron, and Shorty Fairhead, Bill Read, to mention a few.

In my first article I stressed the type of opposition we were up against in meeting L.C.C. with Boo Anderson, Flin Flanagan, etc., on the opposing team.

In the thirties a new rivalry sprung up, one that lasted and is still as keen as ever. W.H.H. School under the smart coaching of Roy Chesley turned out some powerful teams and every time we met there was no quarter asked or given. Every game was a battle, with players like big Frank Murphy, Gordy Noseworthy, Allan Hall, Doug Harvey, Murray Hayes, Bill Smythe, Bob McFarlane, Don Loney and other fine players. It is easy to understand why the competition became so keen.

M.H. School had a very good team in 1941 with Ray Howard, a remarkably good athlete and backed up by the Riddell Brothers, Rudell and Bill Cagney, the latter in later years acted as one of Vic Obeck's assistant coaches at McGill. D.A. McCrae was the M.A.S. coach in 1941 and for many years previous Mac and I had opposed each other. If my memory serves me right, Mac was given other duties and a new group took over. 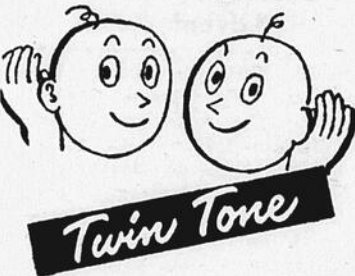

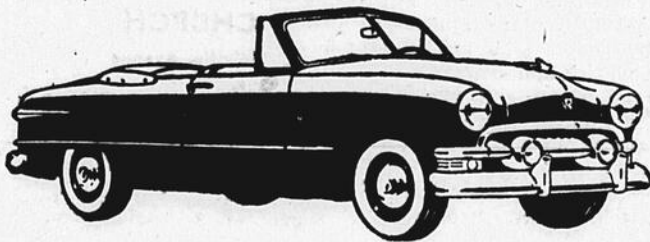

MORE INFLATION

Serious Threat to Pensioners — What Will Future Payments be Worth?

The mere suggestion that the pension plan should be financed by a system of payroll deductions has already drawn the expected response from at least one leader of organized labor, to the effect that workers will then demand higher wages to cover their pension premiums. In other words, collections of premiums for pensions would be immediately inflationary, to say nothing of the effect of beginning to pay out \$40 a month to every Canadian of seventy years or more.

The promise of more inflation is a serious threat to those already living on pensions or savings. The sum of \$40 a month is admittedly inadequate now for the support

of anyone, since the dollar is worth only about 56 cents in terms of 1939 currency. Will anyone risk a guess about what the real value of a Canadian dollar will be ten years hence, if inflationary government spending is not checked? Readers in their twenties, who expect to live long enough to collect pensions at seventy, may try to estimate what purchasing power 40 dollars a month may have forty or fifty years from now.

Cost is Higher, Deliveries Slower, System Less Efficient

Higher charges, slower service, bureaucratic arrogance. This is the post office today. Once upon a time it was the efficient branch of the government service. Now it competes with other departments for the inefficiency medal.

CAC President Lays Much Blame For High Costs On Rural Exodus

The annual meeting of the Provincial English Branch of the Canadian Association of Consumers, held Friday in the Y.W.C.A., heard the president, Mrs. H. E. Vautelet, C.B.E., sound a grave warning to the women of Canada. In her address, Mrs. Vautelet pointed out that "today there is far more the matter with prices than the errors and greeds... of one group or another in Canada. There are causes lying behind our slipping standards of living that cannot be cured with a sip of some patent medicine or other, called price control or any other kind of control. Today we are dangerously like puppets, dangling from invisible strings that reach to sources of supply that we cannot control. We have paid for our higher standards of living by an almost complete helplessness, as individuals, to control the behaviours of our necessities of life, and it is only as a group or groups that we can recapture this power to influence what happens to us.

Speaking of the alarming "drift from the farm" and the part which this played in our rising food costs, Mrs. Vautelet said "when my mother paid 10 cents a pound for steak, 65% of Quebec's people lived on the farm, producing food for the 35% who lived in cities. Today only 25% of our people are still rural dwellers and they must feed the 75% who are busy producing "things". "We have done this to ourselves", she continued, "in ignorance, we have chosen, as consumers, to reward the man who made our gadgets at a higher rate per hour of work, than the man who produced our food... actually, again without knowing it, we have set the accent on the refrigerator instead of what goes into it. Likening Canada's resources to capital upon which we are living, Mrs. Vautelet voiced a fear that the dwindling fertility of farms, erosion, and the destruction of forests and fisheries would bring about still greater food problems in the future. "Today's high prices are merely the first hints of the lowering incomes we are getting from our diminishing capital."

Re: Rental Laws

Delegates were present from 21 of the 27 Branches now organized in the Prov. of Quebec. Mrs. W. V. George, Recording Secretary, outlined the representations which the Provincial Branch of the C.A.C. had made to the Prov. Government concerning the new Rental Laws, the proposed Bill to incorporate the Baking Industry and the proposed amendment to the B.N.A. Act which was to make possible the new "Turnover Tax".

Regarding the Rental Laws, C.A.C. had proposed a temporary freezing period on rents and the setting up of Appeal Boards to hear Landlord-Tenant cases. The Rental Laws when enacted con-

tained these provisions. C.A.C.'s stand on the proposed bill to incorporate the Baking Industry had been that the Bill might create a monopoly and leave the consumer at the mercy of possible price fixing. This Bill had been rejected by the Provincial Government. C.A.C. had also made strong protests against allowing

After donning, over her usual foundation garments, the special protective undergarment provided by Singer, careful measurements of the model were taken for use in checking the accuracy of the fin-

ished form. Then the heated plastic material was molded to the model to follow every line and curve of the body. Soap and water was applied to speed the cooling and hardening of the form.

The form was then removed from the model, stapled and sent to the finishing department where it was fused, jointed, and covered

with a protective shirting. The finished "sewing self" is mounted on a stand adjustable to height, and light enough to be carried from room to room.

At the close of the demonstration, the ladies gathered about the platform, where Mrs. Whalen showed them several shortcuts to better dressmaking, and answered their questions.

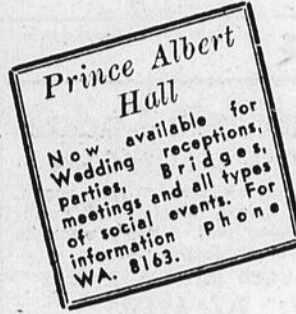

amendment of the B.N.A. Act to permit provinces to impose indirect taxes. The Gov. of the Prov. of Quebec, by its action in refusing to agree at this time, had prevented passage of the amendment. Mrs. George's report stated that six new branches of C.A.C. had been formed and that present membership in the province was 1800.

The Consumer Research Report, presented by Mrs. C. K. Lally, who heads this new Committee gave the results of a lengthy study of the milk situation in the Province. The Committee found a unanimous stand against margarine in the rural district and a growing demand for it in urban areas. This Committee also made a study of meat prices and of the present desirability of price controls, which it was felt could not work at this time.

Urgent Dairy Problem

A resolution was presented to the delegates upon recommendation of the Executive asking for the immediate appointment of two housewife representatives to the Dairy Industry Commission. This resolution, unanimously approved, recognized the serious problems confronting both the dairy producers and the consumer, and urged the immediate appointment of a

rural woman to "speak for and represent the rural consumer who is also frequently a producer with a needed and special point of view on dairy producing problems; and one to represent the urban consumer, whose interests are so vitally at stake in all issues concerning dairy production." It also called upon all women's organizations, affiliated or co-operating with C.A.C. to lend their support in pressing such appointments.

At the close of the meetings a resolution was passed providing that a letter of thanks be sent to the Hon. Maurice Duplessis, Prime Minister of the Province and to the Provincial Government for the decision to provide legal advice to landlords and tenants appealing to the Rental Boards and for the action taken in which the Provincial Government declined to participate at this time in the passage of the amendment to the B.N.A. Act which would have made the new "Turnover Tax" possible.


