# Stamp honoring Dumont rebel salutes historical event

This is not the column which was to appear this week but, due to a somewhat controversial stamp being issued by Canada Post next month, I felt, for what it's worth, that my two cents be added.

On May 6th, Gabriel Dumont will be depicted on a stamp commemorating the 1885 segment of the North West Rebellion, more commonly known as the Riel Rebellion.

Born in Manitoba in 1836, Dumont was a member of a prominent Metis family. His skill as a buffalo hunter and a rider, led to his being made the military leader of the Metis. These people did not fight against the entry into confederation but, rather the manner in which it was done. In 1885, the Metis still had no legal titles to the land which they occupied, nor were they consulted in the matter.

Dumont eventually had to flee to the United States after Batoche was taken by Middleton's forces. He returned in 1893 and died in 1906.

The controversy is in the fact that people in general know very little of the history of western Canada. It is claimed that rebels should not be commemorated on stamps. Some are saying

that the soldiers who died putting the rebellion down should be the ones commemorated. What is not understood, is the fact that it is the event more than the person that is commemorated. Dumont was the principal character, much as Riel was in the 1869 uprising. History is history, and, we can't change it, nor can we hide from it. For those who wish to broaden their outlook on the subject, I recommend the book, *The Birth of Western Canada* by George F.G. Stanley. It was published by Toronto University Press and, I'm sure it is still in print. This is about the most factual and unbiased account of the subject you will ever read. The stamp rounds out a nice

history of Manitoba. It starts with the Fort Garry Gate issue of June 15, 1948, Lord Selkirk and the Red River Settlement, issued May 3rd, 1962, Louis Riel, issued June 19, 1970 and now the Dumont issue.

# No great wines from 1984

Just a brief word of warning. If you intend on buying a little wine for laying down, do it now. With generally average to bad reports on the 1984 vintage from the big three (France, Italy and Germany), prices are bound to rise not only for the available good wine from 1984 but for previous years which will now be even more sought after.

In Italy, with the exception of Sicily and parts of Friuli, things have not been good this past year. Not only is production down from 1983, but quality, with few exceptions, is also not what we have come to expect from the land of the grape. There will be no 'great wines' from 1984 and individual growers such as Biondi-Santi, — famous for its Brunello di Montalcino — will either not produce their specialties or produce a non-vintage variety.

Region by region, it looks like this. Piedmont has been its production cut by 15 per cent and the quality rated at just average. Thus Barolo, Barbera and the famous Asti Spumante will either be rare or, as in the case of the former, probably not worth putting aside.

In Veneto, the home of Soave, Valpolicella and Bardolino, things were marginally better for the major DOC wines with the aforementioned threesome all of average or slightly better quality. Unfortunately the quantity

was well down and thus supply will not meet demand. This, as you are no doubt aware, will mean price hikes.

In Tuscany, Umbria, Abruzzi and The Marches, things were generally worse. With substantial reductions in the quantity of grapes harvested and a quality factor of mediocre to bad, lovers of such normal delights as Chianti Reserva, Verdicchio, Orvieto and Montepulciano d'Abruzzo are bound to be disappointed.

The story in France is none too pleasant either with quality being highly dependent upon the relative expertise of the producer. With generally fewer grapes and much of the harvest affected by low acidity, weak sugar, and in some cases rot, buyers will be seeking out what remains of the 1983 crop.

Champagne and the Loire Valley both had a problem this year with bad weather but the latter was at least saved the problem of

rot by wind and cold preceding the harvest. The same can't be said of Champagne however, where only very careful culling of the grapes saved a portion of the crop.

Beaujolais, according to most analysts, will lack color and character as will most Alsatian wines. While in Burgundy, only careful selection of the best grapes can alter the general result of poor quality and reduced quantity.

Bordeaux was perhaps the most favored of the regions of France with wines containing a large quantity of Cabernet Sauvignon being the best bet for quality-conscious shoppers. Saint-Emillion, Graves, Pomerol and the Medoc can also all be expected to produce acceptable wines.

Across the border in West Germany, the picture is not clear. Generally bad weather — a late spring and a poor summer — indicate that the wines will be inferior to other years. A reduced harvest will also add to the expected price increase with more and more buyers seeking out wines from 1983 and 1982 which have been in storage awaiting just such a contingency.

Quality will depend a great deal on the care of the individual producer with the best growers and bottlers still offering some very good wines.

Enough bad news. Cheers!

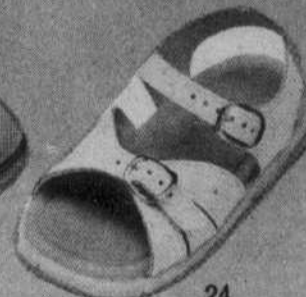

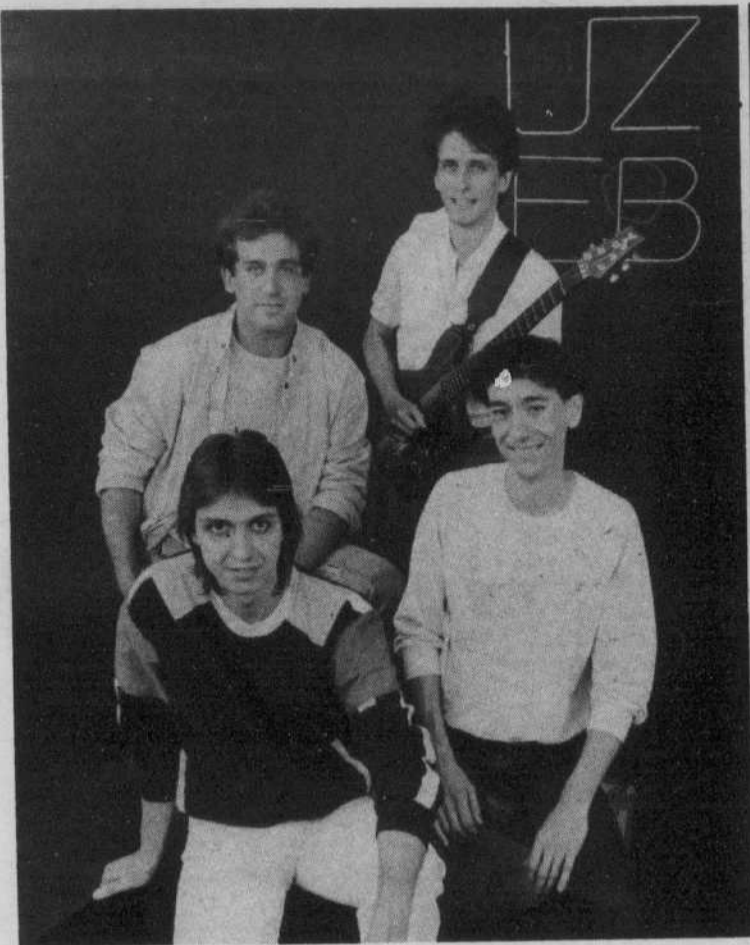

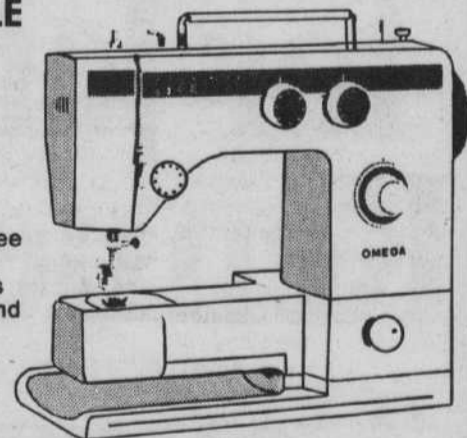

# New songs add to quality of USA for Africa album

**BOOK REVIEWS:**

**Penance For Jerry Kennedy** by George V. Higgins (KNOPF-RANDOM HOUSE): \$23.00, 321 pp.

Jerry Kennedy, who has appeared in Boston writer/journalist George V. Higgins's earlier novels such as *Kennedy For the Defense* (1980), is a man beset by problems both professional and personal. As the "classiest sleazy lawyer" in the Hub City of New England he attracts a rather colorful clientele. When he is not being discouraged by the criminal actions of his eccentric clients, Kennedy is locked into domestic disputes with his real-estate saleswoman wife Mack, or dealing with long distance telephone calls to and from his daughter Heather, who is a student at Dartmouth.

One of Kennedy's memorable clients is Teddy, a glib low-life sort whose expertise, and provision for much of the lawyer's regular fees, is custom theft of Cadillacs. Teddy is adamant about his exclusivity with the big G.M. boats too—"I am not involved with those German sleds. None of it is what I do. None of it Jerry. BMW's, Mercedes, Porsches, and that shit. I have not touched one of those things since I was a teenager.... I do Cadillacs". As the defence counsel weaves in

and out of the various jurisdictional courts of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, author Higgins provides the kind of witty, precisely transcribed dialogue that can only be heard in the Birthplace of the Revolution.

With controversy bubbling up all around him, lawyer Kennedy is embroiled in a dispute involving his disapproval of the appointment of a very poor judge to a higher court post; the television commentators pick up on Kennedy's signing of a petition against Judge Luther Dawes, turning the governor's refusal to appoint Dawes into a case a Kennedy spearheading a conspiracy against the judge, all of which may spell disaster for Kennedy's next appearance in Dawes's court.

Kennedy's best friend and tax accountant has just been the victim of a losing defense and is serving a prison sentence--which does not make either of them very happy. A consequence of this small reversal is that the Internal Revenue Service has begun a concentrated crusade to investi-

gate Kennedy and all of his affairs under the suspicion that he is guilty of tax withholdings.

Higgins has been a master of the board Havad Yad accents since his first work, *The Friends of Eddie Coyle* (1972), and *Penance For Jerry Kennedy* is a further refinement of his deftness with the accents that make many of this characters sound like educated Archie Bunkers. Even Kennedy's animated conversation with his ambitious wife Mack, who has bought into a precariously located condominium scheme on Buzzard's Bay, "down the Cape", reveals the sentence fragmentation and peculiar locations that characterize the New England speech patterns.

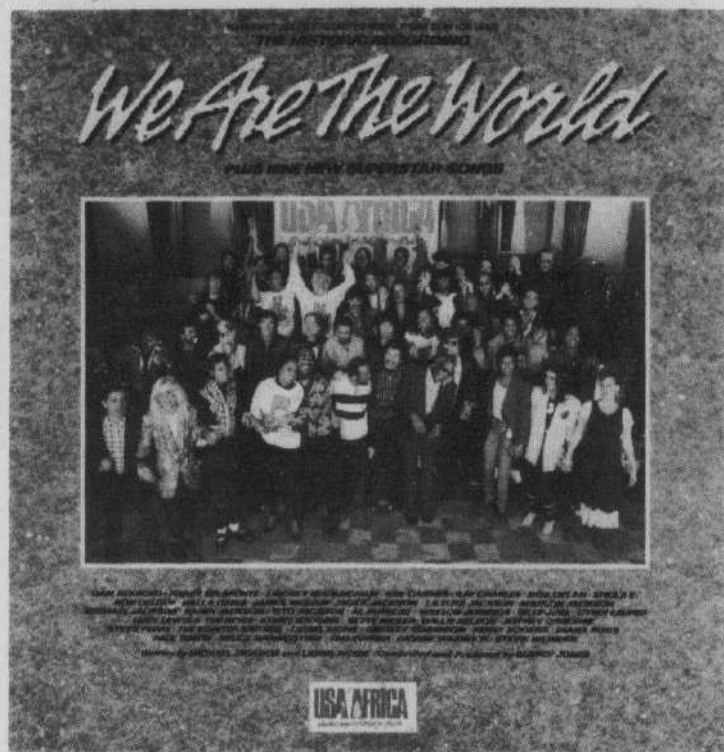
Through all of the occupational and homelife trauma that Jerry Kennedy endures, the spirit of the basic characterization never fails--Higgins is cleverly adept at using Kennedy's daily problems to bring out the essence of the man. There is a no-nonsense, essential honesty about Jerry Kennedy that is evocative of the New England traditional of perseverance--but it is also tempered by that droll sense of humour that makes every page of *Penance For Jerry Kennedy* worth reading.

**RECORD REVIEWS**

**We are the World--U.S.A. for Africa/The Album**(COLUMBIA)

The combined rock talents of the U.S.A. and Canada can be purchased on this fund-raising album for African famine relief. Not only are the two star-studded tracks found here--U.S.A for Africa's "We Are The World", and the Canadian industry's Northern Lights with "Tears Are Not Enough" --but 8 bonus songs make this a good buy from a musical standpoint as well. The unreleased songs come from a cross-section of the veritable giants in the industry today. Chicago's "Good For Nothing", with Grammy winning David Foster producing & writing, is the premier rock confection, played with the kind of commitment to this band's striving for perfection heard on SEVENTEEN. This track could well have been on that record--no filler here. The same could not be said for the Steve Perry song, the Pointer Sisters' "Just A Little Closer", or Prince & the Revolution's puzzling contribution, "4 The Tears In Your Eyes".

A pleasant surprize is the Kenny Rogers offering, "A Little More Love", which sees the grizzled country smoothie returning to the familiar territory he staked out with the First Edition--even the presence of Terry Williams and old pal Kin Vassy on harmony vocals, recalls the rockier side of the Gambler. Hughie Lewis &



the News, and the Boss, Bruce Springsteen kick in with selections that were recorded in recent concerts. Springsteen revives a Jimmy Cliff song, "Trapped", while Lewis's "Trouble In Paradise" was captured February 21, 1985 in San Francisco. Tina Turner's "Total Control" is a sultry track that the latest first lady of rock belts out on this ten song collaboration. Wisely, the producers of the African relief effort did not call for compositions with lyrics dealing with the food crisis or famine, as tragic as it may be. Instead, the rockers do what they do best--they sing and play with an intensity that should push this album into the realm of multi-platinum sales that will bring a small measure of relief to a troubled area of the world. Who says rock stars are all egocentric joy-trippers with no social conscience?

**Alcatrazz DISTURBING THE PEACE** (CAPITOL-EMI)

A new heavy rock outfit with homage to the classical rock styles of Yes, with just enough of the elements that make Rush and Sabbath popular, Alcatrazz adds a further chapter to the ever-

expanding book on heavy metal. An indication of the kind of band here is the evidence that the paragraphs listing the instrumental competence of several members, are longer than many of the songs listed. Writer Steve Vai, with four lines of guitars & amps credits, is at least equipped with an eye for satire--the video track "God Blessed Video" can see through the rock scam of aiming videos at a certain intelligence--as Vai writes: "To play with a non-descript song/ We'll shoot all the crotch shots for 12-year-old hopefuls", and "Break out the cameras to re-shape my face/ And get someone to carve up my hair."

Writing in tandem with guitarist/vocalist Graham Bonnet, Vai and Alcatrazz reveal more than the usual measure of awareness of their world--"Wire and Wood" is a frantic ditty about concertgoers, while "Stripper" and "Painted Lover" explore sexuality from a cynical stance. This quintet certainly has the requisite playing and singing credentials, and it will probably be up to the marketing and video exposure to decide whether Alcatrazz will bust out in a big way.

# Piggery Theatre plans plays, concerts and suppers

**NORTH HATLEY** — The Piggery Theatre is bustling with activity inside and out these days preparing for its 1985 season.

One of the many steps being taken to get ready for the three ma-

ior plays and other activities this summer is the installation of a new roof.

Like last year, three plays will be featured, along with a series of mini-concerts. There will be one drama, a comedy and a thriller.

"I think we have a group of plays with a lot of substance," says Piggery manager Timothy Belford, adding that artistic director Perry Schneiderman "made good choices".

However before the season opens the construction of the new heat-resistant roof will top off the theatre. According to Belford, the old roof was in dire need of fixing or replacement. So, this week the work began to not only provide a guard against leaking, but to improve on ventilation inside.

#### KEEPING COOL

Instead of black, the roof will be a light grey to reflect rather than absorb the heat of the sun, and silent ventilation fans will be installed to keep theatre-goers cool during performances.

"The roof is one of many steps are being taken to get ready for the new season," says Belford.

The new season officially kicks off June 22 with the annual fundraiser gala, which features a 10-piece orchestra. "We're hoping to raise between \$2000 and \$3000," says Belford.

The first play, which runs from June 27 to July 13, is a one-woman show entitled *Mommy*. Written by actress Louise Dussault, the play is the premier of the English-language version of *Maman*, the successful and well-known French play. Christine Moynihan, who has appeared in other Piggery productions, plays all the roles in *Mommy* — a mother, her children and the other passengers on the bus in which they're travelling to visit Grandma.

"It's the story of the relationship between a mother and her children," says Belford. "It's really a good play which has been successful (in French) all over the world. Sometimes people are unsure about going to a one-person play, but this one is really interesting and thought-provoking."

#### SERIOUS COMEDY

The second play is a comedy written by A.R. Gurney and entitled *What I did last summer*. The story centers around a young man's coming of age during the Second World War years. The scene for this comedy is the north shore of Ontario's Lake Erie cottage region. According to Belford, the play is "a comedy, but it has a purpose. There is a serious point to it."

The production features a cast of six and opens July 18 and runs until August 3.

The last main production of the summer is *Angel of Death* by Canadian playwright Ray Storey. Opening August 8, this mystery-thriller revolves around a girl revisiting her home towards the end of WWI and finding something's not quite right.

"I don't want to give anything away," Belford says, "but the idea is the girl's father is trying to hide the fate of Cousin Jamie from his daughter, and something's pretty fishy."

The Piggery's annual 'concert series', which actually features two concerts and one play, will be presented on Monday evenings. The first show on July 22 brings world renowned Canadian harpichordist Martha Hagen to stage for a one-hour concert. The

following Monday, July 29, a one-man show entitled *Tighten the Traces — Haul in the Reins* will star Robbie O'Neill as a victim of cerebral palsy. According to Belford the skit takes a "unique look at life from a wheelchair-bound person." The play is based on a real-life character whom O'Neill knew.

#### BRASS BAND PLAYS

The last in the series, a concert by the Outremont Quintet, will be presented August 12. "It's a brass ensemble who play everything from Bach to Count Basie," says Belford.

The Piggery will also present its usual country suppers, but with a difference — wine connoisseur Belford has changed the wine list and customers will be offered a wide selection to purchase with dinner.

The annual Piggery bazaar and the second consecutive craft show will also be held towards the end of the summer.

Belford is enthusiastic about the coming season. "Things are looking really good," he says. "We had to raise prices slightly but that was inevitable. We try to bring in good shows while keeping prices down," and the new roof "took a good chunk of our allotted budget."

"Our fund-raising is going really well so far and I think we have a good season coming up."

## Exiled Writers In Paris: A Matter of Survival

**PARIS (AP)** — The Lost Generation of North American literary expatriates, whose brief self-exile in Paris was part adventure and part cultural salvation, has been replaced by another group of important foreign writers for whom exile is a matter of survival.

Today's exiles come from the Soviet Union, Eastern Europe, Africa, Latin America and Iran. They are older, mostly in their 50s, and they live and write in Paris because for political reasons they cannot do so at home.

Most did not choose exile but were forced into it by repressive governments. What they share with their exuberant Jazz Age North American predecessors is that they chose France.

"We Romanians have a special relationship with France," said Paul Goma, 50, a novelist and human rights activist. "We share a Latin language and we are francophile by tradition. . . . There is something in the air about France for a writer."

"Like most South Americans, I didn't want to settle in Spain," said Ricardo Paseyro, 56, a Uruguayan poet and journalist. "We have an anti-colonial prejudice about Spain, which was, of course, fascist until recently. So

where do you go? You go to France, to Paris."

#### SECOND COUNTRY

Persian poet Nader Naderpour, 55, was a student in Paris in the 1950s. "I was here for the last days of the last French giants — Andre Gide, Albert Camus, (Jean-Paul) Sartre. France, for me, has always been my second country."

However, life in exile "has something of a false flavor" for Naderpour. "It isn't real. It doesn't give you that extraordinary sensation of life, of pleasure, of joy, even of sadness."

Though French culture continues to seduce artists from around the world, life in Paris, as some of today's exiles made clear, can be something less than what Ernest Hemingway once described as a "movable feast."

"For the Americans who came in the 1920s, Paris was a vacation, a lark," Soviet novelist Vladimir Maximov said. "For the Russian writers here now it's no vacation; it's a trial, and most of us have to fight to survive."

Maximov, 54, arrived in Paris on March 1, 1974, after being stripped of his citizenship. His published novels in the West include the semi-autobiographical *Farewell From Nowhere* and the criti-

cally acclaimed *Seven Days of Creation*.

#### WERE JAILED

Like Goma, South Africa's Breyton Breytenbach, Mongo Betti, a Cameroon author and publisher, and others, Maximov served prison terms at home before being forced into exile.

Naderpour left Iran on July 31, 1980, repelled by the culturally reactionary aspects of the Islamic Revolution. Like Czech novelist Milan Kundera, Paseyro and others, he chose exile after publishing at home became impossible.

Some of the exiles, including

Kundera and Breytenbach, have achieved international acclaim since leaving their native countries. Kundera's latest novel, *The Incredible Lightness of Being*, was an international literary event. Breytenbach gained critical acclaim this year for *The True Confessions of an Albino Terrorist*.

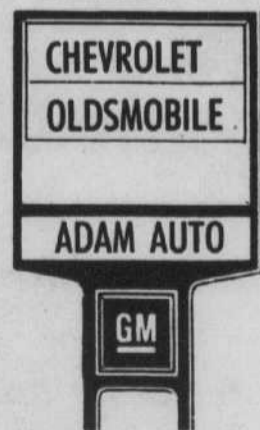

# Nature artist to hold her first exhibition in Quebec

LENNOXVILLE (LL) — Nature artist Christine Marshall will be presenting her first Quebec show at the Homestead this weekend.

Well-known as a romantic realist artist, Marshall specializes in acrylic on canvas nature pieces.

Marshall is referred to as a romantic-realist because she imitates nature in a sympathetic non-scientific 'romantic' light. She has received nationwide recognition for her work and is now moving into the Quebec market.

The exhibition features 10 originals and several limited edition prints. However, only prints are for sale.

According to Homestead owner Bev Musty, the originals are in such high demand that they are sold well before Marshall paints them.

The limited edition offset lithograph prints are signed, numbered and guaranteed for 100 years. Print prices range from \$100 to \$260. However, according to Musty, some trade on the secondary market for as much as \$1250.

According to a recent press release Marshall's original works escalated in value 511 per cent from 1982 to 1984, making her 1982 paintings originally valued at \$1,800 worth \$11,000 in 1984.

The exhibition will be open Saturday, April 27 from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. and on Sunday, April 28 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. The artist will be there Saturday from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday from 1:30 to 6. Admission to the exhibit is free.

## 'Spirit Bay' finds middle ground in depiction of Canada's natives

TORONTO (CP) — There are roughly a half-million native Canadians. You'd never know it watching Canadian TV.

Few programs ever focus on the native plight. When they do, they're usually either bogged down by an outsider's instincts for social melodrama or driven by an insider's devotion to cultural detail.

Choose one approach and the depiction is inaccurate; choose the other and the entertainment is sometimes defused.

One of the chief accomplishments of Spirit Bay, the seven-part series of half-hour dramas starting Friday on CBC-TV, is

that it triumphantly finds the middle ground. There's authenticity galore and enough of a story in each episode to capture its intended after-school audience.

The first-ever Canadian series to focus on a native community is essentially an outgrowth of A Time to be Brave — a 1982 film, seen as part of the series May 3. CBC was so impressed with the drama that it helped arrange a series based on many of the themes in the film. TVOntario and Telefilm Canada were the other financial participants.

### NATIVES PARTICIPATE

Episodes were filmed during the last two years in Macdiarmid, a northern Ontario community in the Rocky Bay reserve on the south shore of Lake Nipigon. Effort was made to ensure native creative assistance and many of the continent's best native talents lend a hand to it — including singer Buffy Ste. Marie, who contributes a powerful theme song, and artist Shirley Cheechoo.

Although the first two instal-

ments are rescue episodes, the seven-part series is a generally placid offering, seen through the eyes of children.

Part one Friday, Rabbit Pulls His Weight, is a lilted story about a young boy's coming of age through the rescue of a downed pilot in the wilderness. There are some moments of dramatic overkill, but much of what Spirit Bay does is warm and understated.

The series doesn't overlook the problems of reserve life, but it doesn't make issues out of them. In many ways, its themes and lessons could fit into a series about children on the streets of Toronto or Montreal.

On the surface of it, however, the soft pace of Spirit Bay may not successfully compete for hard-core music video viewers, even though CBC has scheduled the program as a lead-in to its Video Hits series. It will be interesting to see if many children want to see something TV executives have long denied them.

Well, I think I've devoted enough time to that side of things so let's get down to the kind of music that counts — the kind that comes with a liquor license.

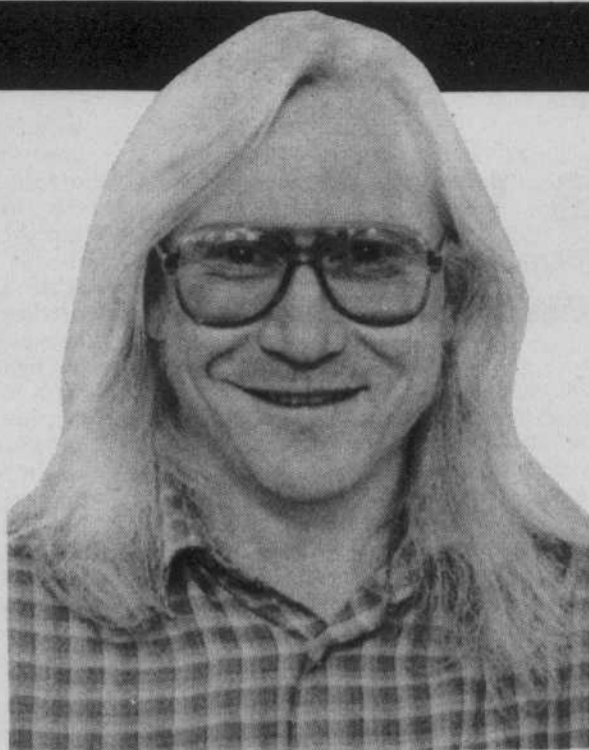

## Television

Titus returns to Imperial Rome with the Gothic Queen Tamora, her three sons and a Moor as captives and is soon the victim of their vicious schemes for revenge.

At 1 tomorrow (Saturday) afternoon on Channel 12, Michael York and Genevieve Bujold star in *Final Assignment*, the 1982 suspense thriller about a Canadian journalist in Moscow who agrees to smuggle the granddaughter of a dissident Soviet scientist out of the country so she can receive treatment for a brain tumour.

At 2, Vermont ETV offers the 1950 classic thriller *The Third Man*, starring Joseph Cotton and Orson Welles. A writer sets off in search of a mysterious and dangerous black marketeer.

At 8, Charles Bronson stars in *Death Hunt* based on the true story of the largest manhunt ever undertaken by the RCMP, in search of a killer in the Canadian north on Channel 12.

Also at 8 on CBC the excellent story of love in the aftermath of war *Saigon: The Year of the Cat* tells the story of a CIA analyst, one of the last Americans left in Saigon in 1974, and an Englishwoman who meet and fall in love. Their new affair is rapidly overshadowed by the precarious situation they find themselves in as Communist troops approach the city. An excellent story, powerfully presented and well-acted.

At 9 Vermont ETV presents a Humphrey Bogart double-feature beginning with his last film *The Harder they Fall* about a sportswriter turned publicist who becomes increasingly disturbed at the treatment of professional fighters. This is followed by *We're No Angels* about three convicts who manage to escape from Devil's Island, only to find themselves helping a French shopkeeper and his lovely daughter cope with some serious problems. Lots of fun, the movie co-stars Aldo Ray and Peter Ustinov.

On Sunday at 4, CBC continues *The Music of Man* series with Yehudi Menuhin investigating *The Flowering of Harmony* in western music in the Middle Ages.

At 6:30 Channel 12 rebroadcasts *Don't Talk to Strangers*, a half-hour instruction piece designed to help make children street-safe and out of the hands of the sick people out there who would harm them. This is followed by *Adam*, the true story of a family's torture

after the disappearance of their young son. Daniel J. Travanti and JoBeth Williams star.

At 8 on Vermont ETV, *Nature* looks at *Man's Best Friend*, and attempts to determine why the dog, among all other animals, has earned such an important place in man's life.

At 9, author Ken Follett's wonderful WW II adventure drama *The Key to Rebecca*, is dramatized. Cliff Robertson stars as British agent, hot on the trail of a Nazi spy (David Soul) who carries information that could cause the destruction of Allied forces in North Africa. The whole chase ends up in the lap of a beautiful woman whose reaction to the spy is crucial. The show concludes on Monday at the same time.

At midnight Channel 12 presents an excellent psycho-spy drama called *The Fury* with Kirk Douglas as an ex-CIA agent who is set up for murder by his best friend (John Cassavetes) so that the Company can experiment with his son's psycho-kinetic powers. A beautiful Amy Irving also stars as a young girl similarly ensnared.

On Monday at 9, Vermont ETV offers *Nightsongs* the story of a Vietnamese woman's struggle to survive in New York City's Chinatown. The production is based on the haunting poetry of Fae Ng.

On CBC at midnight *Thirties Week* kicks off with a stunning performance by Ann Dvorak in *Three on a Match* co-starring Bette Davis and Joan Blondell in a story about three women who renew a childhood friendship only to find tragedy and suspense.

On Tuesday, Vermont ETV's *NOVA* presents a portrait of *Space Women*, the ladies in NASA's space program featuring a look at Sally Ride, the first American astronette. (yech, that's bad even for me!).

At 10, still on Vermont ETV humorist Jean Shepherd's *America* presents *Filthy Rich At Last*. The writer takes us on a tour of the rarefied haunts of those awful people who have more money than most nations.

On Wednesday at 9 on Channel 12, comedian David Steinberg interviews Burt Reynolds, Mr. T, Mel Brooks and Dudley Moore.

Also at 9, on Vermont ETV *The Compleat Gilbert and Sullivan* features *The Pirates of Penzance*, the story of lovable pirates, bumbling soldiers and budding romance.

On Thursday on Vermont ETV *Mystery* presents a dramatization of Wilkie Collins' classic novel *The Woman in White*, largely credited with being the first modern mystery story. The new art master for a prosperous family begins his duties with the sighting of a mysterious apparition completely dressed in white. Intrigue, mistaken identity and deceit soon follow. This is the first of five parts.

Finally, get ready for the really big news, when next Friday CTV begins the new two-part *Lace II* starring Brooke Adams, Deborah Raffin and (be still my throbbing heart!!) Phoebe Cates in a sequel to the original piece of nonsense. I can hardly wait.

## Radio

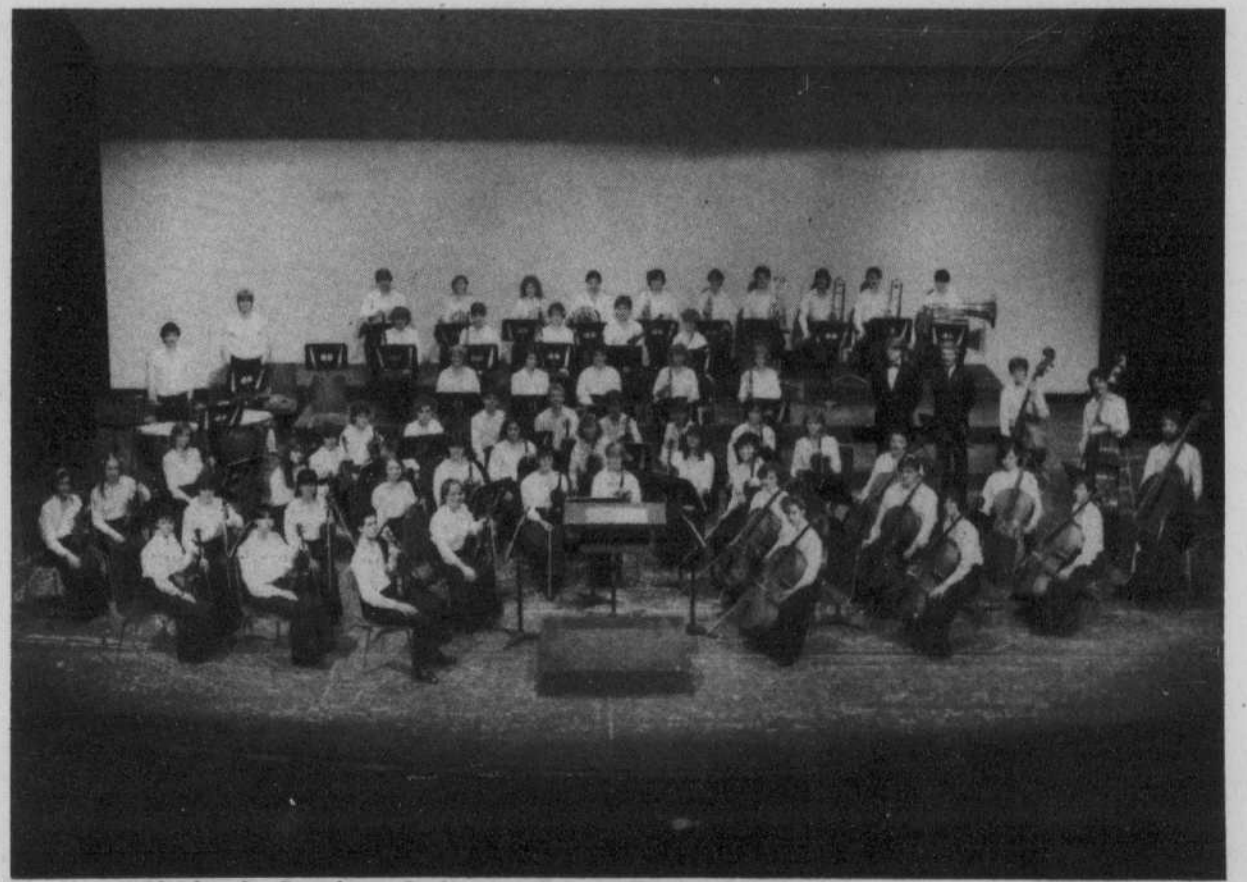
At 8:05 on Jazz beat, super guitarist Pat Metheny and his trio are highlighted in a recording from the *University of Toronto*.

## The wonders of down under

### *Australia offers sundrenched beaches and sparkling cities*

AUSTRALIA — The land down under. Apty nicknamed the Land of Oz (from Aussie), it is a land of enchantment. It is a world away from the world. Its land is a spectrum of climates, confusion of wildlife and an immensity of forests. It has sparkling cities and sundrenched beaches. Its outback is civilized adventure. Sculptured by wind and sun, it is violently, incredibly colorful. Its people are relaxed, unpretentious, fun-loving and always friendly individuals. It is a country unlike any other, but with bits and pieces from them all.

Like Canada it is a young country looking for its place in the rust empire of the world. Like Canada it has an enormous American influence. Its youth all dress in Levis and Ocean Pacific t-shirts. Aside from accents, it is easy to mistake tow-haired kids for Californians. Every major American TV show can be seen, including NBC's Today Show live at midnight the following morning! In fact, like North American television there is an Eyewitness News, World News Tonight, ABC (Australian Broadcasting Company) News Nightline, and there is even The National. All of these come complete with the exact same computerized logos, emblems and music that are seen and heard at home.

The northeast coast with its one

gas station/general store type towns could easily be mid-western U.S.A., except for its tropical climate, palm trees and sugar cane fields with mountains in the backdrop which were reminiscent of Fiji. A European influence is felt in major cities and in architecture, but the Outback is unique. It is unlike anything else in the world!

Heidi and I began our travels in Sydney and first worked our north to Cairns. (pronounced Cans - like a can of soup). In between, we discovered that Brisbane (pronounced Brisbin) is larger than Los Angeles, that the State of Queensland is twice the size of Texas and that its premier likes to act unilaterally on federal matters, models himself after Reagan, and like René Lévesque believes that the state would be better off as a sovereign nation. On a lighter note, we found the Lone Pine Koala Sanctaury where we walked amongst and fed kangaroos and Emus, and got to hug Koalas. (Not only are they adorably cute, they are even softer and more cuddly than a Dakin stuffed animal). Along the Queensland coast we moved from beach to beach, island to island. It was days of sand, tanning, water, swimming and fun! We discovered boom-netting, (sitting in huge nets attached to the boat's boom and getting dragged along) beaches and forests to explore and hoards of young fellow-

travellers to converse with — we even met a former Champlainik from the days of Compton. It was purely decadent, and we loved every minute of it. It was, however, a mere prelude to Cairns, and snorkeling in The Great Barrier Reef!

#### MONSOON SEASON

Out of the Youth Hostel we latched onto a relatively cheap full-day trip out to the Reef. Being the start of monsoon season the day began windy and rainy with turbulent seas, subsequently, a few of our breakfasts were left in the Pacific. But it was all worth it. There were two stops, each of

which gave us the opportunity to snorkel through the most amazing coral, fish and sealife I could ever imagine. A first-timer is most surprised by the actual depth and height of the coral. It is hundreds of feet down and extends forever. It comes in every color, and shape. There is Brain coral, stinging coral, staghorn coral, hard coral and soft-spongy coral. The fish swim right up to you and are brilliantly colorful — like those you only see in fancy aquariums, or books. Very little seemed real. The giant crabs appeared almost fantasy-like. Straight out of Land of the Giants they looked like they were constructed on a Hollywood soundstage. They have purple velvet insides, white, translucent eyes and mouth, and movement that resembles film in slow motion. I could probably write a novel on that day alone!

#### TALKING TO AUSSIES

Somewhere about that time Heidi and I decided that between buses filled with tourists, and youth hostels filled with foreigners we were living in a buffer zone. The country was great, but we were not talking to Aussies. So we decided to hitchhike. (Just remember Ma I'm fine...) out to the center. Our rides were as diverse as the countryside. There were businessmen in suits, ties, guchi shoes, and perfume with whom we discussed politics, history and geography, and there were teens in a 1970 beat-up Ford who introduced us to Australian Crawl (a rock group). In between there were rides with some terrific truck drivers, one of whom taught us Waltzing Matilda sin-

ging as we drove, and another, who after ten hours, two blown tires, and diesel fuel all over our bags became our friend and brought us home with him. However, we were not always so lucky, and sometimes got stuck in such bustling metropoli as Julia Creek: a one-store, three-pub town with a cop who decided that two Canadian girls eating melted peanut butter and jam sandwiches in 40°C heat on the sidewalk was not a good for the image of the town. It all made for interesting experiences!

The highlight of the entire trip was the Red Centre, such named

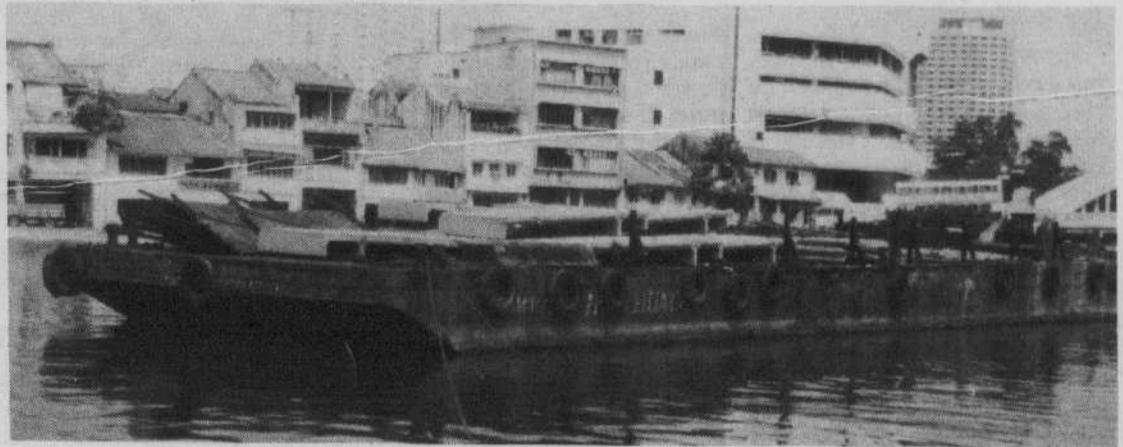
for the land and dust which is a deep, deep red. It did not hurt that we met two guys whom we traveled with for a few days, but the main attraction was Ayers Rock. Stuck deep in the heart of absolute nowhere it is a giant monolith four kilometres long, two wide, and rises 343 metres above the surrounding plain. It is a beautiful sight to behold. At sunset it glows, changing colors every few minutes, and at sunrise when it is a "cold" 35° - 40°c it is a rough climb. It is so steep there are chains to pull oneself along, it is fearfully windy at points and upon every plateau reached is the realization that there is lots more.

### FRIENDLINESS UNEQUALED

There is a peacefulness in this outback, and a friendliness une-

qualed anywhere. When we asked a store owner directions to a museum she not only left her shop and drove us there, ("it's much too hot for you to walk,"), but an hour later when we emerged she was waiting for us to "perhaps show y'around and take y'back." From bus drivers to store owners little episodes like that happened so often we almost began to expect it.

Australia is a land of opportunity. With 15 million people in a country the size of mainland U.S.A. there is room for everyone. Papers are filled with help-wanted ads, and stores hang them in their windows (something I have only seen on television). It was once a country that seemed so foreign and so out of reach to me. Now it is a continent that I am in love with and contemplate settling in.

## New Zealand: Lush countryside, quaint towns

**NEW ZEALAND**—My around-the-world ticket did not include New Zealand, but having gone all the way to Australia I thought it ridiculous not to make the relatively short trip over. I had been assured New Zealand was another Switzerland and a hiker's paradise. Through Student Travel Australia I bought a cheap return ticket to correspond with my scheduled departure from Sydney. (There is a \$20 departure tax in Australia, and I only wanted to pay it once). Leaving Heidi to start university in Sydney I began the next leg of my travels in New Zealand's South Island.

Every guidebook ever written about this country has sheep on the cover. I now know why. Sheep outnumber every man, woman and child by 30 to one. After two months of bareness in Australia it was impossible not to notice the lush green which they grazed on covering the countryside. But the real beauty of this island lay in the mountains, forest and lakes overlooking quaint, European-type towns.

After Australia's stifling heat New Zealand's autumn weather was refreshing. The air was cool with a warming sun, but the mountain nights were just plain freezing!

### TREKERS HEAVEN

For nature-lovers this was the place to be. I rented a 10-speed bicycle and disappeared into the west coast mountain range. It is a trekkers heaven. I walked through forests, drank water from cold, running streams and hiked close enough to touch snow. The scenery provided a solace as only mountain air, flora, and tranquility can.

On a tight budget one rarely pays for anything beyond the bare necessities. You become an expert at staring at museums from the outside. But the New Zealand dollar being 47¢ to the American convinced me to splurge on a small luxury I would have otherwise drooled over. For \$30 N.Z. I got the 10-minute Thrill of a Lifetime — a helicopter ride over Franz Josef Glacier. I have always been plane crazy. I crave the sensation of being above the world staring at miniature homes and cars and I love the speed! A helicopter is even better. You feel like a bird as in seconds the you're gone from the landing pad to the air. Once the stomach has settled into the throat, there is a floating sensation and then the realization that you are flying. Unlike an airplane, you see where you are going. Heading into the mountains there is a David and Goliath feeling. As if the mountains were swallowing you alive. The glacier is just as imposing. The ice is 2000 feet deep, the crevices charcoal black and hun-

dreds of feet long, and the whole glacier moves at the speed of one metre a day. This rate of movement is unusual and dangerous, thus the glacier has been closed to would-be explorers.

### TRAMPING AND CAMPING

New Zealand is very reminiscent of the alps except it's cheaper and the people are friendlier. My only regret is that I did not have more time. Six months is not sufficient to cover all the tramping and camping this country deserves — let alone two weeks!

From New Zealand I flew back to Sydney, then on to Singapore — a 22-hour Alitalia headache culminating in lost luggage! Singapore, an island about the size of Chicago lying 1° north of the equator once again left me in wilting humidity. It is a study of fascinating contrasts: Sampans and skyscrapers, east merging with west, multifacial and multilingual, an appealing mix of peoples and cultures.

There are no Youth Hostels in Singapore, only 'Crash Pads'. Despite being illegal, they are numerous and easy to find as everyone knows where they are. For \$3.50 Canadian a night you get a mattress on the floor, a pillow, and a clean sheet every morning. Depending on the night there can be anywhere from 10-20 people in the room. There is one bathroom with a cold shower, a broken showerhead, a blocked toilet, and a constant line-up for its use. It is an incredible place! Its walls possess a wealth of information, from local tours, to help-wanted ads (only females need apply) to cheap airline tickets, and meeting people is even easier than in hostels.

### ANCIENT CUSTOMS

The city is broken up into different quarters; Indian, Chinese, Arabic, business, hotels, etc... Each day, armed with a map and camera, I explored a different area. Walking through each section is like retreating hundreds of years in time. Ancient customs still prevail. There are few tourists here and it is a great way to understand what life was like before the skyscrapers on the other side of town sprung up. Very few of these people speak English so I communicated in sign language. Smiles, however, are understood in any language, and I often walked away with small gifts.

Eating here can be lots of fun. There are heaps of designated areas called Food Centres where dozens of families have set up food stalls. The choices are endless: Chinese, Arab, Indian, Indonesian, Malay, Muslim... the list goes on. It is easy to try something different each meal. At lunch and dinner-time locals throng to these centres. Between the incomprehensible selections (even if they were written in En-

glish I still would have no clue what they were), the hoards of people, the pushing, shoving, elbowing, and shouting, a first-time foreigner can be quite overwhelmed. There is no obligation to sit in front of the stall you have ordered from, so it is beyond me how with all the constant chaos each chef keeps meticulous tabs on all his dishes and chopsticks. Aside from the food, one can get the most imaginative mixed tropical fruit drinks, blended until frothy, and served in giant mugs. A superb thirst quencher. A filling meal plus drink never cost more than \$2.00 Cdn.

### ANTI-SPITTING SLOGANS

The government here is very big on national campaigns. Posted on buses, posters and billboards are anti-spitting slogans anti-glue sniffing warnings, Mandarin is the universal language "hints", and a "courtesy is in us, let's show it" campaign. I often wondered about this last one as I got approached on the street by total strangers who insisted on taking me to lunch, taking pictures together, and one man who after saying hello asked if I would spend the night with him. He huffed away when I started laughing hysterically.

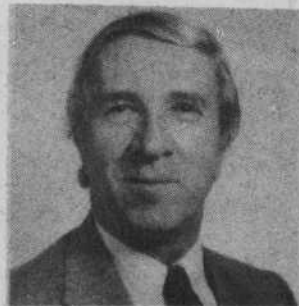
Singapore is also a shopper's delight. From t-shirts to stereos the more you bargain, the better the price. The cheapest place of all is a peddler's lane called Change Alley. There you can buy genuine imitation Lacoste, Ellese and Fila shirts for under \$6 Cdn, pre-recorded pirated cassette tapes for \$1.30 Cdn, Nikes, watches, stereos, cameras — it is all there. Bargaining is half the fun. The less interested you are,

the further the price drops. My brother is now the proud owner of a 100% cotton Singapore t-shirt because at \$1.50 Cdn. I would have been dumb not to buy it.

Today Singapore is the melting pot of Asia. From dawn to dusk this Republic vibrates to a kaleidoscope of different sights and activities. It is hard not to be caught up in the dynamism and charm of this crossroads between East and West.
